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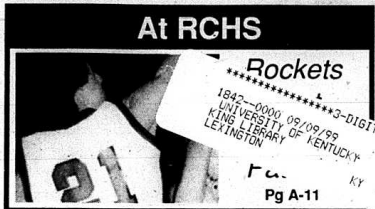
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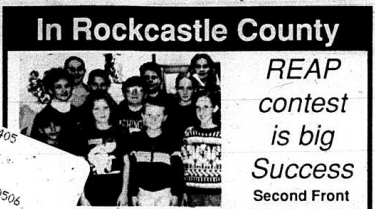



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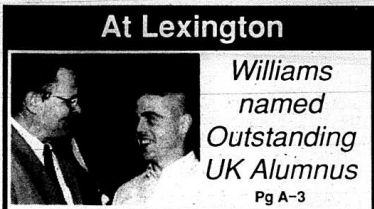

## Board likely to add more security at high school

 Because of recent vandalism at the Rockcastle County High School, and a situation involving two female students, the Rockcastle County Board of Education has voted to study increased security for the high school.

The board's actions came during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Rockcastle County High School Principal Ronnie Cash told the board he had always believed there was no need for security personnel at RCHS, but with the recent incidents, it should be considered.

Cash said that he did not want any security people inside the building but the time may have come for security outside the building.

Cash told the board about two situations, one in which several cars were broken into in the fall and another where two female students were approached by a strange man in the parking lot.

Cash said the stranger apparently stopped the girls as they were going to their cars and exposed himself to them. The principal said the girls returned to the school very upset by the situation and he called police.

"By the time they were able to get here it was gone," Cash said.

The other situation involved three men from Lexington traveling on the by-pass. "Charges have been filed against them, but all of the stuff that was stolen from the cars had already been sold when police tracked them down," Cash said.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond told the board he, too, was concerned about the situation.

## Baker pleads guilty Friday

 17-year-old Will Baker, Jr., may be headed for the state penitentiary after he entered a guilty plea in Circuit Court on Friday.

Baker was released in December by officials at the Madison County Juvenile Detention Center because the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court had not paid the bill to hold Baker.

When Baker was released the county owed Madison County over \$5,000.

Baker, who was certified as an adult and indicted in August after he broke into the home of Dexter Chandler in June, pled guilty to first degree burglary on Friday.

Baker was arrested by Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith on Thursday night and held in the Sheriff's office until Friday when Sheriff's deputies

transported him to Pulaski County for court.

After Baker's guilty plea, Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael recommended a sentence of ten years in the state penitentiary, but sentencing was delayed until January 31, so a pre-sentencing investigation could be conducted.

Following Baker's guilty plea his attorney, public defender Timothy Despoies, filed a motion for probation.

In his probation motion, Despoies said that Baker is a good candidate for probation because he was 16 at the time of the crime, he has a supportive family and the crime in question involved no act of violence, even though a gun was stolen.

Despoies said in his motion that Baker would not be a threat to society

and would enroll in school or complete a GED.

The attorney also said Baker would be willing to enroll in a substance abuse program and hold down a job.

Although Baker has pled guilty, his incarceration is still the responsibility of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court until five days after final

sentencing.

That means that the county will be out at least another \$2,600 to hold Baker in the Owensboro Juvenile Detention Center until he is sent to the penitentiary or released on probation.

To date, the county owes over \$30,000 to several juvenile detention centers across the state.

## Ford re-elected house minority floor leader

Rep. Danny Ford, of Mt. Vernon, was re-elected unanimously by members of the Kentucky House Minority Caucus for a second term to the highest House Minority Leadership position, as Floor Leader.

A veteran legislator, well respected by his fellow House members, Ford has received appointments to the Appropriations and Revenue, Committee on Committees, Elections and Constitutional Amendments, Rules and State Government Committees.

As a member of leadership, he will continue to serve on the Legislative Research Committee. Ford is also serving as a member of the Governor's Task Force on Higher Education. The Task Force has been charged with gathering information, hearing testimony, and making recommendations for total reform of higher education in Kentucky.

Highly qualified, principled and compassionate, Rep. Ford was named Outstanding Legislator of the Year in 1996 by the National Conference of State Legislators.

## More than \$80,000 spent locally on heat assistance

 No doubt federal budget cuts are necessary to keep the federal government from going bankrupt.

But where to cut and what to cut is always a hot topic.

For the past several years, the federal government has helped low income families pay their heating bills, but that is beginning to change.

Last year Kentucky received \$12 million dollars. Three years ago the federal government spent \$24 million in Kentucky, but those that administer the program say less than \$12 million will be spent this year.

The federal monies, which are overseen by the state and administered on a local level by community action agencies, may dry up completely by next winter.

In December, the Clinton administration proposed reducing the \$1 billion program by 25 percent in the next budget and phasing the program out over five years.

However, after lawmakers from cold weather states, including Senator Wendell Ford of Kentucky, lobbied the Clinton administration they

backed off.

In Rockcastle County, the heating assistance program is administered by the Rockcastle County Weatherization office, which is part of Daniel Boone Development Council, a community action group that works in Laurel, Clay, Jackson and Rockcastle Counties.

Betty Carter, coordinator of the local program said that so far this winter, her office has served 833 households and spent \$80,770.

Her office administers two different programs, the first in November is a subsidy program that allows low income families to sign-up and receive help based on their income and number of people in their household.

Mrs. Carter said the amount of funds received by families varies from less than a \$100 to over \$200 in some cases.

The other program, which is labeled crisis is currently underway.

To qualify for the crisis program, families must be down to a two day supply of fuel oil, coal, wood, propane or have received notification

their electricity will be turned off.

"It really is a needed program in this county, we know some people probably abuse it but the good it does outweighs the abuse," Carter said.

Mrs. Carter said that she has no idea how long the money will hold out this winter, because many of the people that are helped in the crisis program are often helped over and over. "We may have enough money to get through February, but if the temperatures stay as low as they have been, we probably won't," she said.

Funds for Rockcastle County are lumped with funds for Clay, Laurel and Jackson Counties and Mrs. Carter said that it is virtually impossible to know when they will run out.

There is a crisis situation can receive 100 gallons of fuel, a ton of wood or coal and money to pay their electric bill. Of course they must qualify by income.

Assistant Fire Chief Bud Cox said the temperature was about five degrees when the fire occurred and that water froze almost immediately when it hit the cold surface.

Cox said that a highway department salt truck had to be called to the scene.

On Tuesday, Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain delayed the murder trial of Wally "Junie" Kirby, 39, of Chestnut Ridge.

Kirby is charged with the shooting death of his girlfriend Tracy Caudill, 22, of Orlando on February, 25, 1995.

Cain rescheduled Kirby's trial for January 27.

Cain has also rescheduled the murder trial of David Lindsey, of Wolf Creek for March 31.

Lindsey is accused of killing J.B. Alexander of Crooked Creek on May 17.

## Carloftis delays court meeting

 The January meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court will be January 28. It was rescheduled from its regular meeting on the second Tuesday of the month.

The meeting is often put off until a date later in the month for various reasons and needs. But is often even more of a necessity in January.

It is the year end for county clerk, Norma Houk. She must get her year-end report completed before she is called on to present them to the fiscal court. However, Mrs. Houk said Tuesday that she is not required to

present her year-end report until March 15th and will probably not present it until at least the February meeting. Mrs. Houk's office reports in a fiscal calendar year instead of a fiscal year like the other county departments.

Putting it off also provides the fiscal court, the county judge and magistrates time to review each of the funds before the January meeting.

"I spoke with Laurel County Judge/executive Dennis Karr and he told me the county had planned to convert the old jail in London into a juvenile detention center, but it didn't work out.

He said a juvenile center will be 'prohibitively expensive' so the plan has been shelved.

The judge said Laurel County is in the same situation as Rockcastle, but unlike Rockcastle they manage to meet their bills. They have an 8.5 million annual budget while we have a 1.5 million budget."

If there's one thing I love about all this zero weather we've been having, it's is the opportunity to get some gardening done.

Molly and Junior Helton and I spent about two hours on the phone last Saturday when the temperature got up to around ten degrees, not only gardening, but canning as well. Later in the day, Ralph King and I spent more than an hour on our asparagus beds.

I worked on my new orchard and arbor for another two hours or so between dark and bedtime and then spent another hour before the finally dozed off trying to convince Loretta that I could turn the screened-in porch on our renovation project into a green house accessible through the kitchen door.

But Loretta is a spoil sport. She loves to have a garden as long as she doesn't have to do anything except walk through it with a basket and

pick whatever looks good for dinner. When the beans are full and the tomatoes nice and red, the garden becomes Loretta's even though she doesn't have a clue about how it became a garden in the first place. But anyway, suffice it to say that a green house attached to the kitchen went over like a lead balloon.

Seriously though, planning a garden is half the fun of stuck in the house with nothing to do except gripe at the kids and step on the cat's tail just to hear him squall. The only thing I hate worse than being stuck in the house is being outside with cold hands and feet.

The only thing I can think of that would make me like snow would have something to do with being stuck in the dessert without water and having no other choice about getting a drink. But I'm off the point yet again.

So let's get back to putting the garden out.

I like to grow at least 100 different varieties of vegetables and I try at least a dozen new ones every year. That requires a lot of reading seed catalogues and a lot of calling to see who saved what kinds of seeds themselves that I can swap for. Molly and Junior, for example grew beef-heart tomatoes last year and I called to see if Molly saved any seed and before you knew what was going on we were talking about which beans canned best and froze best and stuff like that. All of which are important considerations to mull over before any seed actually goes into the ground. If you're not particularly about your

tomatoes, then go to a discount store green-house. But if you want the good stuff, get a catalogue, order some seed and grow them yourself. The only tomato I grow from brought on plants is Burpee's Big Boy. Last year, Dave Maggard and I grew 15 varieties from seed we'd ordered from half a dozen different catalogues. Same way with pepper plants. Allen's Florist in Berea starts a variety of bell peppers called Big Bertha and I always get three or four of their plants, but I grow at least another dozen that I start from seed myself. (And if you see my wife, please tell her how much

**P**recious souls, children of an evil age, greetings and circumlocutions from the frigid Weald of Wabd, one-time home of Queenie L. Sudsmore, long-time seamstress for Loretta's of Wabd, and part-time chandler of Aunt Ella's Scented Soap for Débutantes, who said, "Those who are always arguing religion probably have the least of it."

Last Sunday, Sallie Coffey, after ninety-one years here below, broke through the veil spread o'er all the earth (*Isaiah 25:7ff.*) and went to be with Robert, her husband, who departed several years ago. Sallie and Robert together again - a wonderful thought! I remember them well.

I was a freshman in college and pastor of the Mount Zion Baptist Church on Rose Hill way. Robert, Sallie, and their children attended that church. They lived on a farm about a mile north of Renfro Valley. But they had no vehicle. So, I gladly

picked them up twice every Sunday. Although there is a road straight up through the valley to the church house, it was at that time too rough to travel in a car. We took the long way back through Mt. Vernon and out past "the dam" (I know a squemish preacher who refers to that reservoir as "the dem." Ha!) Many times on the return from the morning service, the Coffeys asked me to take dinner with them. (In those days "dinner" was the mid-day meal and "supper" was the evening repast - the way the Almighty meant it.) And when I stayed, which was often, the meal always included biscuits, mashed potatoes, country ham, and red-eye gravy. Hard to beat, wouldn't you agree?

Robert told Raymond Lawrence, our evangelist for a revival at Mt. Zion, what he thought of me. And Raymond told me. "If it came down to it," said Robert, "I'd fight for that boy." Now that's a friend indeed. Wouldn't you also agree on that?

Those Mt. Zion days were some of my best. In addition to Robert and Sallie, there were other great souls, like Jack and "Sister" Fugate, Harv Berry, Cola Grace Wilson, Dolie and Ida Abney. And old Mr. Singleton - what was his first name? - who sat in the back pew and sang bass with a flair. I hear him now, rumbling out on the chorus of "Over There."

Speaking of Sallie, she, before my tenure, often walked to church. Yes, folks used to do that! Sallie would walk from her house to Cola Grace's place, and then the two together walked on to church. They wore old shoes, but when they got to the meeting house, they put on their best ones.

I'm reminded that when my mother was a young girl, she, in warm weather, walked bare-footed to church and put on her shoes as she arrived to save wear and tear on them - the only shoes she got for the entire year.

Jack Fugate helped me several times in a way that no one knew, perhaps not even Sister. Occasionally, the offering was not enough to pay my salary. Handling the cost of being college and traveling home from Williamsburg every weekend wasn't easy. I really depended on the income from the church. On several of those small-change Sundays, Jack discreetly handed me a twenty dollar bill. No small money in those days.

But, as thankful as I was for the monetary blessing of that little flock, I wasn't there for the money. At the time, dearly beloved, I dearly loved preaching. And if some old-timers who heard me are to be believed, it showed.

Credit Cola Grace with my being there. The church was without a pastor, meeting only for Sunday School and Prayer Meeting. Cola Grace told Harv Berry about me. Harv asked me to "fill in" for them, and later the church "called" me.

We had neither song leader nor pianist, so I led the congregational singing from the piano stool. Just behind me on the left side of the sanctuary were two pews checked with children whom I dubbed my "Sawed-Off Choir." Most of them belonged either to Raymond Sargent's crew or Maggie Lear's tribe. They sang like cherubs.

And then there were the "young people," a good number of teenagers who wouldn't dare sit close to those children - like Kathleen Coffey, Patsy Anderson, Billie June Wilson, Jimmy Harold Roberts, and Sue Renner.

## Carbon Monoxide Poisoning:

A Hidden Danger In The Winter

Improper use of supplemental heat sources to take the bite off cold winter weather poses a hidden danger -- carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide poisoning is a threat anytime people use gas or other fuel-burning appliances incorrectly or without these heat sources being vented properly.

Although people normally associate carbon monoxide poisoning with car exhaust, any device that burns natural gas, liquid petroleum gas, kerosene, heating oil, wood, or charcoal will produce carbon monoxide. It is one of the deadliest gasses because it's colorless and odorless and a relatively small amount released into an unventilated space can cause sickness and even death.

Incomplete combustion of any type of fuel can produce carbon monoxide. The potentially lethal gas robs oxygen from the blood. Low levels can cause dizziness, nausea, headaches and watery eyes -- symptoms often associated with other illnesses. At high levels, and without medical attention, carbon monoxide poisoning can be fatal.

Proper ventilation and use of fuel burning appliances will reduce the likelihood of carbon monoxide poisoning. All fuel burning furnaces, water heaters and stoves should be properly vented to a chimney or flue. Have vents checked to be sure they are properly connected and that the chimney or flue is open and in good condition. For extra protection, install an Underwriters Laboratory approved carbon monoxide detector in or near sleeping areas. Carbon monoxide detectors are available for \$25-\$35 at most hardware or discount stores.

Some of the newer gas space heaters and artificial gas fireplace

logs are approved for use without a vent. Be sure these heaters and logs are installed according to the manufacturer's specifications and that they have oxygen depletion sensors to detect reduced levels of oxygen and shut off before hazardous levels of carbon monoxide accumulate.

It's a good idea to review the operation instructions for gas fireplace logs because some types must be used when the chimney flue is open, just as with conventional wood logs. Use kerosene heaters only in open, well ventilated areas. Never use unvented appliances, such as a kitchen range, to heat a home.

## Rockets even record at 6-6 with win over Model Patriots

It took an overtime period but the Rockets finally prevailed over the Richmond Model Patriots Tuesday night by a 73-64 margin to even their season record at 6-6.

The Rockets had a four point lead with 26.5 seconds left in the game but Model came back with a three point basket to pull within one and, after free throws by Travis Anderkin and Blake Childress put the Rockets ahead by three with 6.9 seconds left, Model sank another three to put the game into the overtime period.

The Rockets came out hot in the first quarter and built an 11-4 lead over the 8-7 Patriots who didn't get their second field goal until the end of the first quarter.

However, in the second quarter, the Patriots gave the Rockets all they wanted and came back to win one before a three point basket by Layne Nicely at the buzzer gave the Rockets a 25-21 half-time lead.

In the third quarter, the Rockets regained the upper hand in the game, primarily by hard work inside by John Brown and Childress and took a 42-33 lead into the fourth quarter.

Coach Clayton Cash got slapped with a technical early in the fourth quarter but the Patriots were able to convert only one of the two free

throws and then had a turnover that gave the ball back to the Rockets who beat back an 8-3 run by the Patriots to go up 56-52 before the Patriots tied the game at 58 all to send it into overtime.

in the overtime period, with three starters for the Patriots on the bench with five fouls, the Rockets drew first blood on two free throws by freshman Andrew Cash. Dusty McClure added a basket and a free throw to give the Rockets a 63-58 lead and it was pretty much over for the Patriots as they had to keep sending the Rockets to the free throw line and the Rockets were equal to the task, hitting 8 of 12 from the charity stripe to help seal the 73-64 win.

McClure, who saw little playing time in the second and third quarters, still led the scoring with 18 points; John Brown got 17 points; Anderkin and Cash, 8 each (both scoring all their points from the free throw line); Childress 7; Matt Ford and Layne Nicely, 6 each and Andy Hale, 3.

It was a good win for the Rockets as they managed to even their season record, but may have been a little harder than it should have been with the Patriots only ranked 16th out of 17 teams in their 11th region.

## Jayvees beat Patriots 61-45

Coach, Clayton Cash moved sophomore Andy Hale to the Jayvee team Monday but Jayvee Coach Barry Noble probably didn't mind as Hale came through with 14 points in their 61-45 win over the Model Patriots.

The Rockets led at every quarter stop, building a 10 point lead in the first quarter for a 19-9 margin and adding to it in the second for a 40-13 half-time difference.

It was the Hale and Nicely show during the first part of the second quarter with the two guards accounting for 11 points for the Rockets during a 14-0 run that saw the Rockets go ahead 33-9 before a free throw by the Patriots put them on the board for the first time at 3:09 in the second quarter.

After Hale and Nicely, got things started, freshman Jacob Burdette and sophomore Stevie Bradley took over to account for the last 9 points of the second quarter.

In the third quarter, the Rockets again outscored the Patriots 12 to 10 for a 52-23 margin. However, in the fourth quarter, with Coach Barry Noble clearing his bench, the Patriots put on a 14-2 run to cut the final margin to 16 at 61-45.

Freshman Matthew Brown accounted for all the Rocket points in the fourth quarter, except for one free throw by Jacob Burdette.

Brown, who scored 10 points in the second half, eight in the fourth quarter, and Hale led the scoring for the Rockets with 14 each. Layne

Nicely, who was perfect from the free throw line (5-5) was next with 13 points; Bradley got 8; Jacob Burdette came off the bench to score 7 points;

Luhman, the director of Eastern Kentucky University's Division of Student Financial Assistance, said that Increased Financial Assistance, said of several dollar amounts are available through a variety of grant and loan programs, but "certain programs run out of funds very quickly."

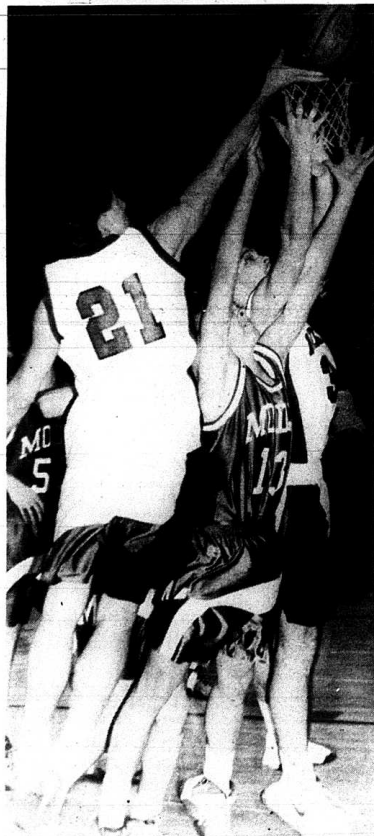
Prospective students may pick up a copy of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, as well as an EKVU Request for Aid form, from a high school guidance counselor or at EKVU's financial aid office in the Coates Administration Building. The federal form should be mailed by March 1, Luhman said, adding that Kentucky residents applying for state College Assistance Program (CAP) funds need to apply no later than March 15.

As soon as all relevant forms have been processed, Eastern's Division of Student Financial Assistance will begin in April to determine student's eligibility for various types of assistance.

"Those who have all their forms on file in our office by April 1 will be the first to receive a financial aid package," Luhman emphasized. "The earlier you apply, the better chance you have of getting more than one type of financial assistance. Timing is very important."

"There's no one program to pay the total cost of an education," Luhman added. "so many students have to use a combination. Some are helped by as many as five or six

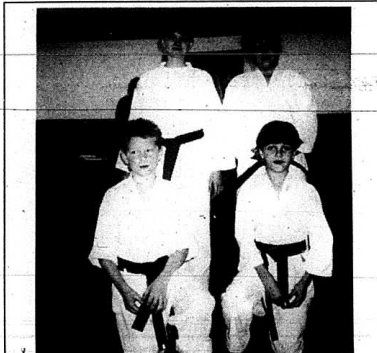

## Statewide Gobbler season opens April 14

Kentucky's turkey hunting gets better and better every year, and the 1997 season should be no exception with more than 120,000 turkeys and the entire state open to hunting.

The shotgun and archery spring turkey hunting season opens April 14 and runs through May 4. That's seven more days of hunting than last year's spring season.

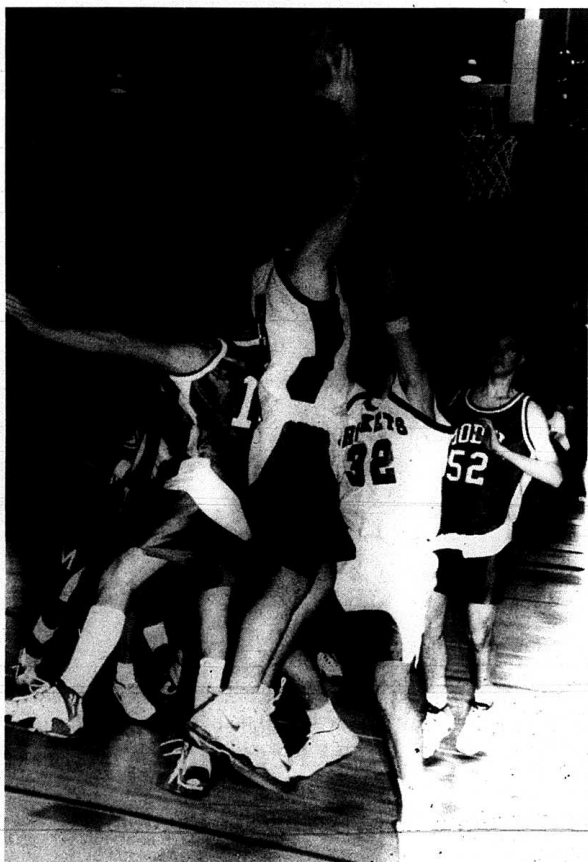
The limit is two turkeys with visible beards, but hunters cannot take both turkeys on the same day. Shooting hours are from one-half before sunrise to 1:00 p.m.

Shotguns no larger than 10-gauge or no smaller than 20 gauge are the only firearms that can be used or possessed while turkey hunting. Only Number 4 shot or smaller is permitted. Guns must be plugged to hold no more than three shells.

An annual hunting license and spring turkey permit are required of all turkey hunters unless license exempt. While hunting, any turkey hunter under age 16 must be accompanied by an adult. Hunters born on or after January 1, 1975, except those under age 10 or are license exempt, must carry a valid hunter education course completion card while hunting in Kentucky.

Youth quita hunts for hunters ages 10-15 will be held on Ballard Wildlife Management Area (WMA), Ballard County; Grayson Lake WMA, Carter County; and Green River WMA, Adair and Taylor counties. In-person drawings will be held on each area-March 19 at 1:00 p.m. local time. The drawing on Grayson Lake WMA will be held at the Camp Webb office off Highway 1496.

Complete turkey season information should be available by March 15 from hunting license outlets or from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

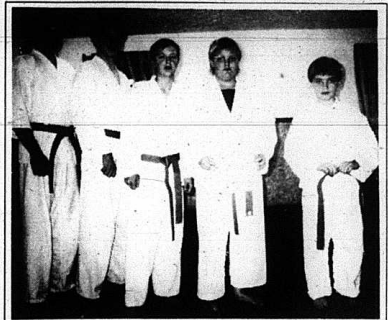
In addition, various assistance programs are available to veterans or families of deceased or disabled veterans.

Board Chairman, Dr. G.W. Griffith also directed Hammond to look into security at all the schools, noting that probably was not needed or wanted, but that it still should be looked into while the study was going on for the high school.

In other business, teachers Charles Norris and Diana Waddle gave a presentation on the School to Work Program at RCMS.

The two explained the program to board members and answered questions and concerns brought up by the members.

Currently, 56 seniors at RCMS are employed by local businesses and professional people.

The students work different hours at their respective work places, but in most cases they work from 20 to 25 hours per week.

Norris told the board that all students involved must be on target for graduation before they qualify and that each of them are closely supervised.

The program has been in place at the high school for two years and has been certified by the state board of education.

Businesses involved in the program include Mt. Vernon Shacks, Wendy's Restaurant, Citizen's Bank, B.M.V., Rockcastle Hospital and others.

Board member Terry Burton told other board members that he had always heard good things about the program and that his wife, Cindy a RN at Rockcastle Hospital, was a supervisor for one of the students. "She says the program has worked well and thinks it is a good situation for both the hospital and the student," Burton said.

Science teacher Cindy Witt also gave the board a short presentation on the Appalachian Regional Systemic Initiative program at RGHS.

The program is being funded by a \$10 million grant from the National Science Foundation and will last for five years.

Witt said the program is designed to improve the scientific and mathematical literacy and achievement of all students in 66 rural, economically

disadvantaged counties in the central Appalachian region of six states. Rockcastle has been listed among those counties.

Miss Witt said that program is designed to improve student performances in math and science and to make them more competitive when seeking employment.

Principal Cash told the board that he would be asking them to raise the graduation requirements at RCMS to 28 credits, from 26. He said one of those additional credits would be science, which would require all students to complete three credits in science.

Hammond announced his personnel actions during the last month. They include the hiring of Lisa Fox, Clay W. Dollins and Donna Snyder as substitute teachers.

Jennifer Cook was hired as a learning disorder teacher at Roundstone and Rebecca Daugherty as instructor of our cassas.

Charles Bullen and John Harris were hired as substitute custodians and John Tyler was hired as a substitute bus driver.

The selection will be made by the Affordable Housing Trust Fund Advisory Committee appointed by Margaret Handmaker, KHC Board

of Directors Chair. This committee is made up of housing industry professionals, as well as state and public officials.

Gracious in inevitable defeat, Lee and his army earned the respect of their former enemies. After the War Between the States he urged Southerners to lay down their swords, thus helping avert the guerrilla-style warfare which could have followed the fratricidal conflict. He led by example, becoming involved with the education of the South's youth at Washington College and encouraging the South to rebuild itself as part of a reunited country.
