

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

If second vote is successful, tax will become law

Court to decide fate of 911, insurance tax

On Thursday the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will vote on whether or not the 911 emergency dispatching program will be implemented in the county.

If the court passes the first reading of an ordinance concerning 911 is questionable at best.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlfortis, who has not supported 911 in the past, said last week that he was in favor of the ordinance and hoped the court would pass it.

"I think there are enough votes to pass the ordinance," he said.

The court will hear the first reading of the ordinance at 10 a.m. Thursday during a special called meeting. If the ordinance passes residents with phones will see an estimated rise of \$1.65 a month to their phone bill. That money would be used to pay for the cost of the service.

Currently there are about 4,200 phone lines in the county that would be subject to the fee. If 911 is implemented it would also save the county approximately \$32,000 a year now paid to operate emergency dispatching.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who has been in favor of 911 from the outset said, "Unfortunately, without 911 service, people such as out-of-town visitors, small children and the elderly are at risk unless they know the county's emergency numbers by memory," Burdette said.

If the court does pass the 911 ordinance they will then have to decide if the county will use basic 911 or enhanced 911.

According to Tom Sturtevant, an emergency 911 public safety representative for GTE, there are distinct differences between basic and enhanced 911 service.

"With the basic 911 service, the dispatcher must go through a time-consuming questioning period to determine where the caller is calling

from in order to get emergency units to that location. This can be a problem if the caller is semi-conscious, confused or otherwise unable to give the correct address. With enhanced 911 service, the dispatcher's computer automatically shows the address from which the call originated

Court reluctant to get involved in DBDC controversy

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court decided on Monday not to get involved in a dispute at Daniel Boone Development Council in Manchester.

The court had been asked by the Kentucky Cabinet of Human Resources, Division of Family and Childrens Services to accept a \$10,500 grant, that they would in turn pay out to a private investigator.

The Daniel Boone Development Council is one of twenty-three community action agencies in the state. The agencies were setup to help the poor.

Dr. Doug Arnett, deputy judge-executive in Clay County, told the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last week that he had discovered serious problems at Daniel Boone after an October meeting where it was revealed that Daniel Boone was having trouble paying their bills.

Daniel Boone has been in existence for over 30 years and was set-up to provide services to the poor in Rockcastle, Clay, Jackson and Laurel. Among the services are heating assistance and housing.

The Cabinet asked the local fiscal court to get involved by accepting the money which would in turn be paid to Arnett to continue his internal investigation of Daniel Boone.

Magistrates indicated to Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlfortis that they understood the need for Daniel Boone to continue operation, but that unless Daniel Boone actually would fund up they

did not want to get involved.

"We really don't have anything to gain by getting involved in this dispute," said Magistrate Bill McKinney.

Carlfortis, who has served as Chairman of the six member executive committee since December, told the magistrates that their actions or lack of, would not cause Daniel Boone to fold.

The Judge told the court that the state was looking into Daniel Boone's problems and the FBI was also investigating the actions of the executive director, Frank Jones.

Jones, who has been given an eight month leave of absence with pay, by the old board, has been accused of transferring property bought with government funds into his own company's name and transferring government funds into at least six different bank accounts that he controlled.

Arnett told the fiscal court that over \$100,000 was still missing from those accounts.

Carlfortis said he would continue to serve as chairman of the executive committee for Daniel Boone until a new board and new director are in place.

"We were told by officials in Frankfort and Washington that if we (Carlfortis and Laurel County Judge-Executive Dennis Karr) did not get personally involved in Daniel Boone, it may shut down, and over \$5 million dollars would be lost in our four county area," the Judge told the court "I really wish I had never agreed (Cont. to A10)

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and hibernations from the frosted Plains of Wabed, home of the late Quiddley W. Thobestoph, long-time proprietor of Town and County Hibernashery, and part-time perfectioner of the Spanish Pandango, who said, "Life not only begins at forty - it begins to show."

Beloved, my little office needs a good cleaning. It's oh so dusty. *Amidst* on my books! (The front of our house is close to the ground. Insulation under the floor ought to stop that. There's something for Nancy to do when she comes home from work.)

I commenced cleaning a fortnight ago, but was sidetracked by an attack of reminiscence. It came over me when I picked one of my "seminary" books, tomes I've treasured across the years. The particular volume that captivated me was *Introducing the Old Testament*, by Clyde T. Francisco, penned in 1950 and revised in 1977.

Dr. Francisco, or "Fran," as some of his graduate students were wont to call him, died in 1981. He was only sixty-five. He dropped dead while preaching at a church in Georgia - the way he would have chosen to go. The Old Testament was his area of

teaching, but preaching was his first love. When Fran was a teenager in Danville, Virginia, he was a terrible *saterer*. You can imagine the apprehension his pastor felt when Fran sought his counsel about "going into the ministry." Because of Fran's speech impediment, his pastor discouraged him. That infuriated Fran. He thought on the matter for a moment and then adamantly told his pastor that if the Lord had called him to preach the Lord would take care of the stuttering.

And that's precisely what happened. Fran conquered the habit. On occasions, while teaching, when he was emotionally perked or piqued, traces of the habit would surface, but never to the point of distraction on the part of his listeners. He was living proof of the notion that "Whom the Lord calls, he enables."

Fran was much in demand as a teacher-preacher. Scores of churches invited him annually for a "Bible study." It was not unusual to see him "hit the road" after a full day of teaching. He bought a new car almost every year because he wore one out in a year's time, driving anywhere and everywhere to "open the Word."

The only time he was home on a weekend was during the Christmas season. He and his family visited with us every year at Yuletide. Nancy always prepared country ham with biscuits and red-eye gravy, one

of Fran's favorite meals. Afterwards, my family went with him to find and cut their Christmas tree.

Dr. Francisco and I were very close in those days because I was his *yellow*. I kept up with attendance, monitored and graded tests, evaluated term papers, and sometimes taught his classes when he was away. "John," he would say, "when you grade those papers, be sure to give the student the benefit of the doubt."

One semester, I discovered that a student had duplicated word for word another student's class notebook, a course requirement. I told Fran about the copying, fully expecting him to be *flunk*. He gave both the lowest possible passing score. When I expressed my surprise at his action, he looked me in the eye and said, "Let's hope they change. If they don't, they'll answer to God, not you or me."

Fran was a golfer. A good golfer. He didn't hit the ball real hard or very far, but he controlled it all the way. Playing alongside him one day, I asked how he learned such control. "I took up golf during the war when golf balls were hard to come by" was his reply.

On the links, however, a Christian attitude begged his consideration. He neither cursed nor cheated, but he'd do almost anything else to beat you. He played the year round, favoring Louisville's Cherokee and Crescent Hill courses. When we golfed together, we usually had an eight-hour conversation "going about the Old Testament or church life."

A mercy! How that man understood church people - and preachers. In the classroom he often reminded would-be pastors that they were not only "servants of the Lord" but "servants of the congregation." He was most observant and passed along many a swatch of church practicality.

When I taught the Old Testament at the college level, I emulated Dr. Francisco's teaching method. He maintained that to rightly teach a subject a teacher should expose the student to all views. Then he, the teacher, was free to state his own view, and the student free to form his own opinion. You could disagree with him if you did it with a good spirit. That's the way it was when I went to the seminary.

Fran once told me that if he had a class that leaned toward liberalism, he would emphasize a conservative viewpoint. Or the liberal side if they tended toward fundamentalism. A

good approach - if you can get away with it.

Dr. Francisco always commenced a course with a directive that went something like this: "I begin this class with the assumption that the Bible is the Word of God. If I say to the Bible, 'You are God's word to me,' I possibly will understand much of it, and never all of it. If, however, I say to the Bible, 'Prove to me that you are God's word and I'll believe,' then I might never hear what He has to say."

With Fran there never was a question about the Bible being God's word. But *how* we get at what the Word means today was a foremost concern of his. "There are few fixed rules for interpreting Scripture," he explained, "but we have some powerful guidelines from none other than the Savior himself." Then he talked about how Jesus took on the

Pharisees because they interpreted Scripture by its *letter* rather than by its *spirit*.

For instance, Fran would say, "Ask a Pharisee, 'Have you ever broken the commandment, Thou shalt not kill?' He will reply, 'Certainly not! No one has died by my hand. I haven't broken the commandment.' That's taking the commandment according to its *letter*."

"But along comes Jesus. He asks the Pharisee, 'Have you ever said anything that resulted in a person being murdered *socially*?' Have you maintained a posture of non-involvement when someone was wrongfully accused and punished? Would someone be alive today if you had spoken out? That's looking at the commandment in light of its *spirit*."

Dr. Francisco also used the concept of "holy war" to illustrate the above difference. A modern-day Pharisee, living by the *letter* of the Law, says, "Let's drop a bomb on all unbelievers. It's O.K. to murder the wicked. That's what holy war is all about."

If, however, we live by the *spirit* of the Law, we will say, "Holy war has not been abolished. The battle is still on. We are forever at enmity with the forces of darkness. But we now wage war with weapons of love rather than those of destruction." When you look at the Word that way, Fran said, "everyone is guilty, not just the Pharisee."

Clyde Francisco's cup was always full, and it was a blessing so that as his feet and catch the overflow. Gracious goodness, I miss him still.

Now and then, I hear someone say, "Preachers would be a lot better off if they never set foot in a semi-

nary." And I think, "You wouldn't think so had you studied with Fran."

Oops! I must take my leave of you, dear hearts, and go buy a new hammer for Nancy to use under our house. So, until next week, ponder the words of the late Otha DeHafive, long-time Wabedian beekeeper, and part-time practitioner of the Turkey Trot, who said, "Freedom's a lot like air - you don't appreciate it until you're about out of it."

And I think, "You wouldn't think so had you studied with Fran."

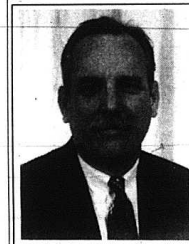

and can send appropriate emergency personnel to the scene immediately. "Most counties begin with basic service and upgrade to an enhanced system because it usually takes 18 to 24 months to get an enhanced system in place, while it only takes 60 to 90 days for a basic system," said Sturtevant. "But," he adds "an enhanced system is much more effective for saving lives."

Neighboring Laurel County has offered 911 service since 1989. More than 20,000 GTE and BellSouth customers pay \$.66 per month for enhanced 911 service, with the county and city also financing the service. Rockcastle County's monthly charge would be higher because there are fewer residents to share the expense. The start-up costs for Laurel County's enhanced 911 service were between \$100,000 to \$150,000.

"Our program has been a tremendous success," said Steve Pennington, Laurel County's director of administrative service for 911. "We usually have at least two dispatchers answering six lines 24 hours a day, seven days a week." Pennington said that Laurel County's 911 dispatchers usually handle between 25 and 30 calls each day.

Laurel County Attorney Elmer Cunningham, Jr., says he can't imagine his county without 911 service.

"I firmly believe that by having 911 service in place in our county, we have saved many people from premature death," said Cunningham. "Besides, these days, 911 is a service most citizens expect from their county and city government."

Lee Keene, administrator of Rockcastle County Hospital and Respiratory Care Center said the hospital supports the implementation of 911 service. "The people of Rockcastle County need 911 service, and this hospital will assist in any way in the development of a 911 system."

The Rockcastle County fiscal court will meet at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, February 13, at the county court house to vote on the 911 issue. The meeting is open to the public. Judge Carlotis said that if the court passes the ordinance, the basic 911 will more than likely be implemented.

The court will also hear the second reading of the four percent insurance premium tax. After the first reading, Carlotis and all of the county magistrates, except for Bill McKinney, voted in favor of the tax.

The new tax would generate about \$400,000 for the county's strapped general fund.

If the court passes the ordinance following the second reading, it will become law on July 1.

to get involved, it has been one huge headache," the Judge said.

Although it is obvious by all accounts that Rockcastle has not gotten its fair share of the \$5 million in government funds each year, Daniel Boone has been responsible for several projects.

Daniel Boone created the Ashley House, a shelter for homeless people and the Town Hill Project in Mt. Vernon that cleaned up an eyesore and created housing for the low income. Daniel Boone also owns the former Livingston school property,

which they plan to renovate into a community center.

Since 1993 the Daniel Boone Development Council has spent over \$1 million dollars locally.

Mrs. Carter, who has worked for the Daniel Boone Development Council since 1982 said the agency has spent over \$116,000 this year on heating programs alone.

Warden Alexander, Director Producers who have not returned their tobacco marketing cards need to do this as soon as possible. Quota notices for the 1997 crop year are scheduled to be mailed out February 28. If a farm's marketing card has not

been returned prior to preparation of the notices, this will cause the notice for the farm to be in error. February 15 is the deadline for producers who have purchased tobacco to their farm to turn in their proof of 'sharing in the risk' obliga-

tion. Marketing sale bills and receipts for crop expenses will be reviewed by the County FSA Committee and District Director for Rockcastle County. Failure to comply will mean a forfeit of the purchased quota.

FCIC insurance is now available for purchase through FSA. Producers who did not purchase the insurance in 1996, and wish to purchase it for 1997, should come in no later than March 15, as this is considered a new policy. Deadline for sale of new policies is March 15. Producers who purchased the insurance for 1996, and wish to keep the coverage have until June 30 to pay fees. Producers who had the insurance in 1996 and wish to cancel should do this no later than March 15 for corn policies; April 15 for tobacco policies. If you have any questions concerning the FCIC program, please feel free to contact this office.

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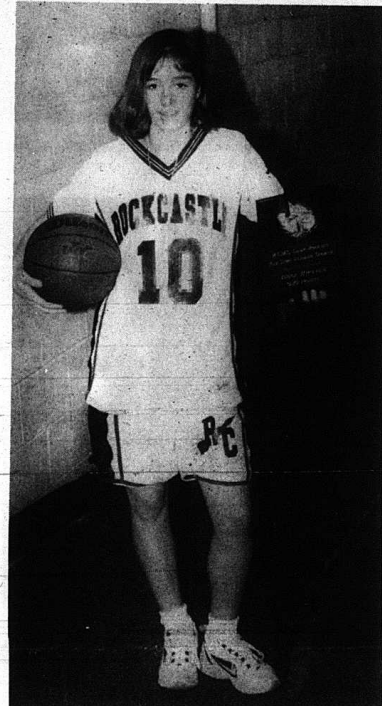

Rockets play Generals tough but lose 74-61

At times last Friday night, it looked as through the Rockets might also get revenge for an earlier season loss to the Jackson Co. Generals. But, they never could quite get over the hump and wound up going 2-6 in district play with the 74-61 loss.

The Rockets came out cold in the game, missing their first 10 shots and managing only 2-4 free throw for their first two points. In fact, the Rockets only took 16 shots the first quarter and missed 13 and it looked for a few minutes as if it was going to be another Jackson Co. rout. But, the Rockets regrouped and played some good defense to only trail 14-8 at the first quarter stop.

In the second quarter, sophomore guard Layne Nicely came on strong to score 11 straight points for the Rockets, two free throws and three three-point baskets, to pull the Rockets even at 22 all early in the quarter. The General regained the lead on a

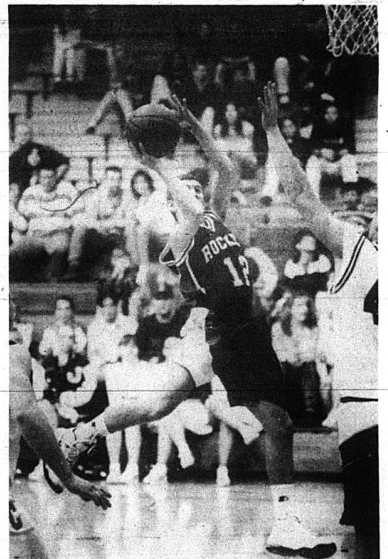

Besides Nicely's 22 points, the only other Rocket in double figures was Cash with 10. Bradley got 7; McClure scored 3; Childress 5; Matt

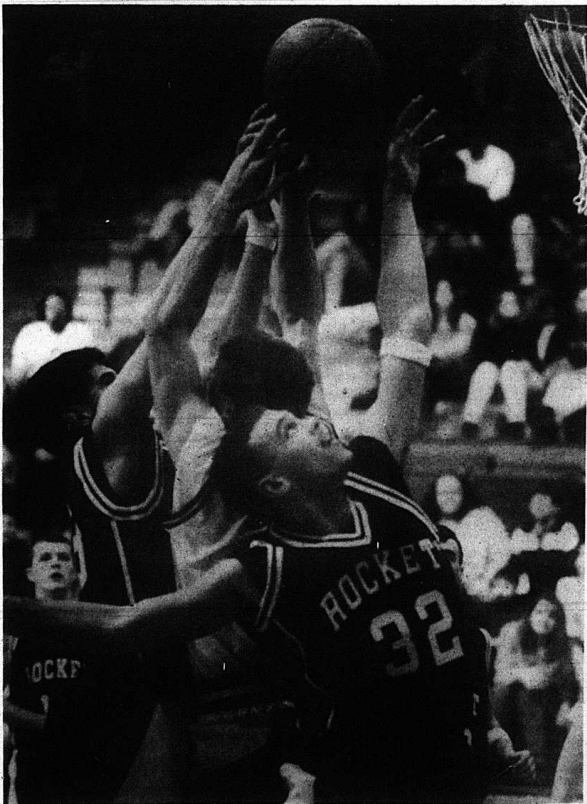

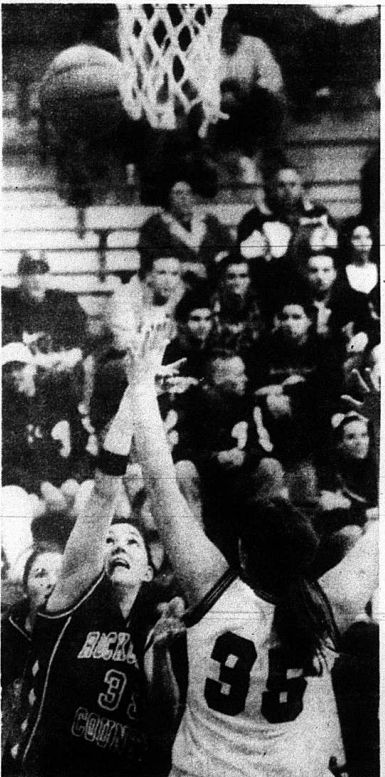

Friday night, the Rockets travel to Russell County; Tuesday night, they will host Barbourville and will finish their regular season next Friday night at McCreary Central.

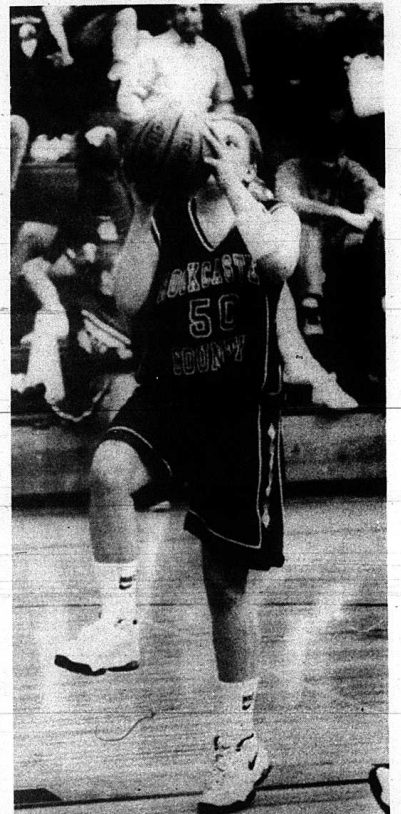

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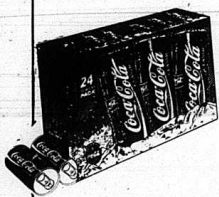
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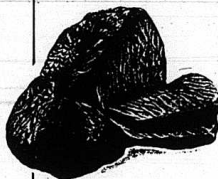
