Is It Cost Effective To Seed etter Varieties Of Red Clover? Research from the Agronomy
Department of the University of
Kentucky has compared the
performance of common or
unimproved red clovers to certified
varieties at research farms

performance of common or unimproved red clovers to certified varieties at research farms throughout Kentucky. Their results found that the certified improved varieties yielded an average of 1,000 pounds more forage per acre in the first year of production for a spring seeding.

In the second year, seeding a better variety was worth 2,500 pounds more forage per acre.

Even if the improved seed cost. So 7.5 more per pound and you seeded 10 pounds of seed per acre. A seeding a per seeding that carts \$7.50 was worth over 3,500 pounds of forage over the first two years. Improved varieties were thick and vigorous going into their second winter, while the commons were clearly thinning. A comparison of the lowest yielding common clover vs. the best certified clover over a 3-year period showed a 11,000 pound advantage to the certified clover. Getting an extra 220 square bales over three years can easily pay the

Why values, lifetytes or points.

• What values, lifestyles or points of view are represented by this

• What techniques are used to attract your attraction or authority or authenticity of this message?

• How might different people interpret this message differently?

• What was omitted from this message?

recipient of it. While making a special point to discuss such questions may seem awkward and artificial at first, thinking about such issues becomes automatic after a while. When that occurs, a person is well on the road to becoming a critical media

RDA has reissued a warning on

RDA has reissued a warning on the use of GHB which is used for body building and for its intoxicating effects. GHB is a chemical that has been promoted as a steroid alternative for several content of the several potentially dangerous drug. In the past GHB has undergone clinical testing for several indications, but it has not been approved for sale as a medical midications, but it has not been approved for sale as a medical product in the U.S. Numerous GHB-related illness has been reported including womiting, dizziness, tremors and seizures. Many of those injured have required hospitalization, and some deaths have been linked to the consumption of GHB.

USDA announces open sign-up for Wetlands Reserve Program

The Natural Resources Conserva-tion Service (NRCS), an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), is working with landown-ers to develop management options which protect and enhance wetlands. NRCS is announcing a sign-up for interested landowners beginning Feb-nuary 24, 1992.

uary 24, 1997. The Wetland ruary 24, 1997.

The Wetlands Reserve Program is a voluntary program pertaining to the restoration and protection of wetlands on private property. It is an excellent opportunity for landowners to receive financial incentives to enhance wet-

opportunity for landowners to receive financial incentives to enhance wellands in exchange for retiring marjunial agricultural land.

Landowners who choose to participate in WRP may sell a conservation easement or enter into a costentity of the control of the control
lands. The landowner voluntarily limits future use of the land, yet retains
private ownership. A plan for the
restoration and maintenance of the
wetland is developed by the landowner with the technical assistance
of the NRCS. A landowner continues
to control access to the land and may
lease the land for hunting. fishing and
other undeveloped recreational activities. At any time, a landowner
may request that additional activities

be evaluated to determine if they are compatible uses for the site. This request may include such items as permission to cut hay, graze livestock orharvest wood products. Compatible uses are followed if they are fully consistent with the protection and enhancement of the wetland.

The program offers landowners three options: permanent easements, and restoration cost-share agreements of a minimum 10-year duration.

A landowner must have owned the land for at least one year prior to enrolling the land in the program unless the land was inherited or the landowner can prove the land was not obtained for the purpose of enrolling it in the program. The land must be restorable and be suitable for wildlife benefits.

The local NRCS representative will coordinate and conduct a site visit with the landowner and a multiple cation is ranked by the team, application is ranked by the team, apprications will be selected and approved as funding becomes available.

FSA offers sign-up for the conservation reserve program

The sign-up period for the Con-servation Reserve Program (CRP) is scheduled for March 3 through March 28, 1997, to accept offers of environ-mentally sensitive acreage for new 10 to 15 year contracts to enroll acreage for program years 1998 and 1999. CRP is a voluntary program that of-fers annual rental payments, incen-tive payments for certain activities,


and cost-share assistance to establish approved cover on eligible cropland. The program encourages farmers to plant long-term resource-conserving covers to improve soil, water and wildlife resources. The duration of the contracts are between 10 and 15 years. Offers for CRP contracts are ranked according to the Environmen-tal Benefits Index (EBI). The Natural

based upon the relative environmen-tal benefits for the land offered. Bids are then ranked in comparison to all other bids offered and selections made

other bids offered and secretions make from that ranking.

Eligible acreage devoted to cer-tain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, liv-ing snow fences, contour grass strips, eat telerant vecetating and shallow salt tolerant vegetation and shallow water areas for wildlife may be en-rolled at any time under the continu-ous sign-up, and are not subject to competitive bidding. All other eligible acreage must be enrolled during the CRP sign-up period of March 3 through March 28.



Social Workers: Providing Direction and Resources to Those in Need

When a medical catastrophe strikes, it's not just the victim who suffers. The family, too. must sort through the haze choosing the right care, navigating the complexities of insurance coverage, or just coping with their own anxi eties

Carolyn Stevens, BSW. director of social services at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, describes her staff's role in providing comfort and care.
"Medical social workers pro-

vide a wide range of services, said Stevens. "We refer families to agencies for appropriate assistance, such as the Department of Social Insurance. We intervene in domestic and child abuse cases and find suitable shelter and counseling. We arrange psychiatric counseling and evalua-tion for patients suffering from emotional problems. The list is endless."

Rockcastle prides itself on the familial atmosphere it creates for patients and their families.

"Patients and their families know they can turn to us for assistance," said Stevens. They trust us to help them with whatever problem they are having—from a family crisis, to a medical crisis, to an emotional crisis-we're there.

LEAVING NO STONE UNTURNED

Dealing with and preventing kidney stones

KIDNEY STONES. Two of the most feared words in the English language, ranking right up there with "You're fired" and brussell sprouts."

If you haven't experienced kidney stones, consider yourself lucky. According to the National Kidney Foundation, 10 percent of the male and 3 percent of the female population will experience kidney stones-in their adult lives. And

as anyone who has suffered from kidney stones can attest, the pain can be excruciating.

During March, which has

been designated as National Kidney Month, the foundation is promoting health information to help keep kidneys healthy.

A kidney stone is formed primarily of calcium, although some stones contain other substances, such as uric acid and oxalate.

"Kidney stones originate as a small grain in the kidney or upper urinary tract," said Dr. George Griffith, a physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "The stones usually grow larger as compounds in the urine attach themselves to the stone." Stones become lodged in the ureter, a tube between the kidney and bladder. Griffith said that while most stones remain fairly small, some can grow to more than an inch in diameter.

"When the stone passes into the ureter, it can lodge and block the flow of urine and back up the kidney," said Dr. Griffith. "That's when the pain really kicks in. Between the movement of the stone and blocked flow, the pain can become nearly unbearable.

Some typical kidney stone symptoms include lower back pain, frequent urination, inability

to urinate, or pain and burning while urinating. If you experience any of these symptoms, Dr. Griffith recommends seeing a physician immediately. These symptoms accompanied by a fever may indicate an infection, so seek ing medical care is even more urgent

Kidney stones usually are caused by poor diet-especially one that is high in fat and lacks frequent water intake.

"The most common cause of kidney stones is that people just don't drink enough water," said Dr. Griffith. "Everyone should have at least eight to 10 glasses of water per day-even more if you already have suffered from kidney stones

Because most kidney stones consist primarily of calcium, some people mistakenly believe they should cut calcium from their diet in order to help alleviate the probem. But, according to Dr. Griffith. that's just not good sense.

Bodies, especially women's bodies, need calcium to build strong bones to help ward off health risks such as osteoporosis said Dr. Griffith. "Robbing your body of calcium is not the answer."

Instead, Dr. Griffith explains that you should continue to consume calcium-rich products, but also consume large amounts of water. It is the amount of calcium in the urine that creates problems. só as your water intake increases, the percentage of calcium

in vour urine decreases

There are a few ways to treat a kidney stone. One way is to simply let it pass. It can be extremely painful, but is the least invasive. Another option is to have the stones surgically

removed, but physicians often are reluctant to try this approach unless the presence of the stones is life threatening. The third, and most popular option, is a new technique called lithotripsy.

Lithotripsy, which is Greek for "stone crusher" generates shock waves that harmlessly penetrate body tissue, but exert enough pressure on the kidney stone to disintegrate it into smaller granules, making it easier to pass them in the urine. The advantage of lithotripsy is that there is no invasive surgery. But, it is not without risk because the patient does require a local anesthetic and may experience some tempo rary side effects, such as bruising, nausea, or blood in the urine.

Typically, lithotripsy patients can return to regular activities within a few days.

"Kidney stones should be taken seriously," safd Dr. Griffith. "Proper treatment is necessary to ensure there is no long-term kidney damage. And, under medical supervision, a proper diet can be prescribed to help alleviate the potential for future stones."

But some other potentially dangerous products, such as medicine, should be kept out of the reach of children as well. - Never leave the cap off of medicine bottles.
- 2. Always use household products that come in child resistant
- packages.

 3. Do not assume small children cannot open bottles, even when they say "Child Resistant."
- 4. Refer to medicines by their proper names. Never refer to them as
- candy.
 5. Install child resistant safety
- latches on cabinets and doors.

 6. Never put unemptied containers in the trash.
- 7. Keep the Poison Control Center

ARTHRITIS: WHEN AN AGING DISEASE STRIKES A YOUNG BODY HE word arthritis n "inflammation of the joints."

It is a cruel, painful disease that usually strikes the senior population. But, make no mistake-it strikes children too,

Juvenile arthritis affects near ly 300,000 children under the age of 16. That makes arthritis more common in children than diabetes and as common as cystic fibrosis. About 75,000 children are diagnosed with a rheumatoid form, referred to as Juvenile Rheumatoid Arthritis (JRA).

When JRA strikes, the joints, such as knees or hips, become inflamed and swollen, making it painful to move.

"JRA causes different types of nptoms in children," said Dr Kimberly Cornelius, a pediatrician who also serves as medical direc tor at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center.

According to Dr. Cornelius, there are three types of JRA-polyarticular JRA affects five or more joints; pauciarticular JRA affects four or fewer joints; and systemic JRA affects both joints and internal organs.

"No one really knows what causes JRA, and it is difficult to diagnose," said Dr. Cornelius. "It often takes many tests and a complete medical history to deter mine if a child suffers from JRA."

Generally medication can be used to treat JRA by controlling inflammation and relieving pain

"Getting the child to exercise. such as walking or swimming, is especially important in keeping



"Only the little people pay laxes," Hotel magnate Leona Helmsley's opinion on taxes landed her a stay in Kentucky minus the room service and mints. But her comments probably had a lot of middle income families shaking their head in agreement.

A capital gains tax cut is a perfect example. When most Kentuckians hear about proposals to cut capital gains taxes, they envision millionaires and Wall Street financiers cutting deals sight and left and then writing them off.

And they're not too far off base. Most canital gains proposals

then writing them off.

And they're not too far off base. Most capital gains proposals we've considered in recent years provide a disproportionate benefit to those making six-figure salaries and above.

That's why I recently introduced capital gains legislation that targets middle income families, family farms and small businesses.

My legislation would provide a sliding scale for capital gains relief, lowering the rate at which capital gains are taxed based on how long the assets have been held. Starting with the current rate of 28 percent, for every year an asset has been held the applicable rate would be reduced by two percentage points down to a rate-of 14 percent.

would be reduced by two percentage points down to a rate of 14 preent.

Not only is my proposal aimed at helping family farms, small businesses and middle income families, but I wrote it with both the need to reach a bipartisan solution and balancing the budget in mind.

Congress has rarely been able to pass lasting legislative changes without bipartisanship. And nowhere is that more true than when it is sue for several years and if we're ever going to move beyond this stage we must find common ground.

I believe middle income families, small farms and businesses represent that common ground.

But we also have to get over a major hurdle — a balanced budget — before we reach that common ground. If a capital gains proposal is going to pass his Congress it must be included in an overall balanced budget package.

The Congressional Budget office estimated that proposals floated in the last Congress could add more than \$40 billion to the deficit over seven years. Finding offsets would be nearly impossible. And not only is this more than our nation can afford in the context of a balanced budget, it's also far more than what's actually needed to target relief to middle income families.

But make no mistake, while my proposal is directed at middle income families; it does not discriminate between assets. Instead it applies to all assets covered under current law. But because the slidning scale benefit is based on how long an owner has held onto an asset, there's no doubit this benefit long-term family assets over a speculator's short-term deals.

I'm sure Leona Helmsely is probably much more careful about what she says when it comes to paying taxes. But just in case, my legislation will assure the "ittle people" get a break on April 15th.
