Former resident found murdered

Two women and a man were found shot to death in a bedroom of one victim's mobile home. The three had left a Somerset country music club early Sunday with a fourth person, who was interviewed Monday by state police. No arrests have been made.

The bodies were discovered about 8:30 p.m. Sunday. But the county coroner said Monday that the shootings probably occurred 12 to 15 hours earlier and went undetected until the mother of one victim became concerned when her daughter didn't answer repeated phone calls.



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

Teach Children Safety Rules for Familiar Strangers



Most children know enough to stay away from strangers they meet on the street. But do they know how to follow safety rules when they are around familiar strangers, people they have seen before but do not know well? Because most parents today grew



Most have voluntarily from home, been aband-parents or have been by the non-custodial In 80% of child sexual strangers. parent. In 80% of child sexual abuse cases, the offender is known to the child. before but do not know well?

Because most parents today grew up during a time when children thought they could trust most adults, they are uncertain, whether they need to teach their children to question the motives of people they see every day or know well.

Of the more than a million children that disappear or are sexually abused each year, research shows a majority of them are abused or abducted by individuals familiar to the child. Often these people are relatives, not the total

abuse cases, the ofteneer is known to the child.
Children between the ages of 8 and 11, especially girls, are at risk for child molestation. Some evidence indicates that the number of male victims may be increasing. People who abduct or abuse children use a variety of methods to gain the children's confidence of which children should be aware. Abusers may make a stimple request to get the child alone. They may pretend to be sent by a parent, promise something desirable or ask

for the child's help. They may also threaten the child so he or she will not report the incident. Teach children to stay with a group of friends in populated areas when they are away from home or adult supervision. Dark or isolated places should be avoided. Law enforcement officers recommendfulders keep walking without-talking if they are approached by someone they do not know well and then immediately tell an adult they know.

In addition, teach children no In addition, teach children never to go near, go with or accept gifts from strangers. If they think they are being followed, children should seek help at a public place or friend's house, not go home to an empty house or to a deserted area. Parents also need to teach children that their bodies belong to them and that no one-mot a

How many cores should you take for a soil test sample? If you are sampling a 5-acre area, take at 16 cores; 20-acre area, take at 15 cores; 20-acre area, take 20 cores. No single sample should represent more than 20 acres. When sampling a large field, divide it into smaller areas based on soil type, cropping history, or problem areas, abel each area with a letter or former to make record keeping easier.

When collecting soil samples for a home garden or lawn, separate samples according to land use. Take separate nor fruit trees, contamental shrubs and azaleas, because each may have different fertility, acidity or alkalinity requirements. Take at least 10 cores for each separate area and mix them together well.

How deep you go to take cores depends on the tillage system used. Warden Alexander, Director FCIC Insurance is now available for purchase through FSA. Produc-ers who did not purchase the insur-ance in 1996, and wish to purchase it for 1997, should come in NOLATER THAN MARCH 17, as this is considered a new policy. Limited resource producers (who gross less than \$20,000 per year) are offered this

insurance coverage at no charge, but they must come in and fill out the required paperwork to take advantage of this offer. Deadline for application of new policies is Monday, March 17. Producers who purchase the insurance in 1996, and wish to keep the coverage have until July 1 to pay fees. Producers who do not pay their 1997 premium by July 15, their policies will be canceled. If you have any questions concerning the PCIC program, please feel free to contact this office.

The Dairy Refund Payment Program is open for applications thru close of business March 17. Producers who qualify may get a refund of withheld amounts if they can show that they marketed less pounds in the refund period (1996) as compared to the base price (1995). 



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
