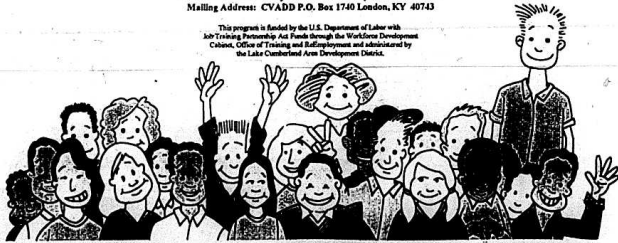
SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAM

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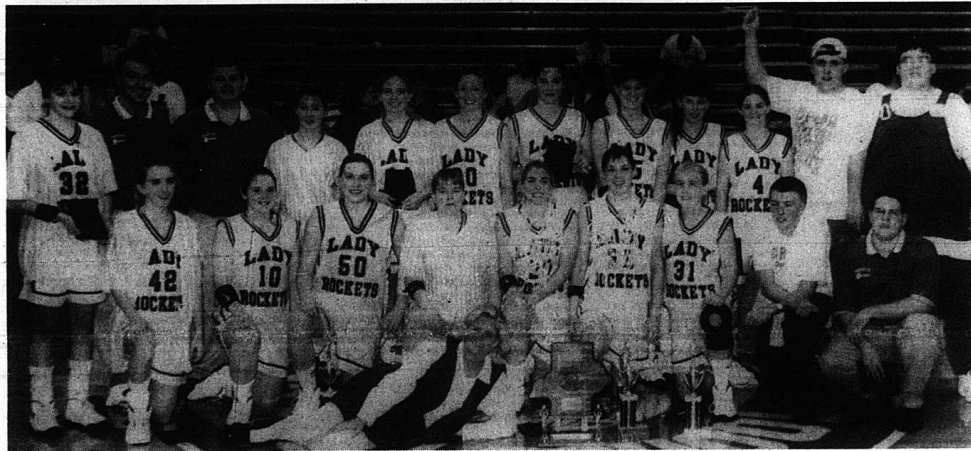

Girls take region with 51-47 win

The Kentucky Wildcats victory Sunday to win the SEC Tournament Championship was sweet, but nothing was sweeter than the Lady Rockets win at Bell County Tuesday night. Before a packed house, the Lady Rockets became the first Rockcastle Co. High School basketball team ever to advance to the Sweet Sixteen tournament.

"They accomplished this feat after defeating Cawood 51-47. They accomplished the feat after winning their third straight close grueling game. They accomplished the feat after losing the 49th district tournament in overtime. They accomplished the feat after being placed in the toughest bracket of the region with three teams all ranked higher. They accomplished the feat after knocking off two district champs on their way to the truly "Sweet Sixteen" tournament in Frankfort.

Head Coach Chrysti Noble was ecstatic after the game. "I was never really nervous, but I got a little anxious at times. I just had a feeling these kids would pull it out. This team is special, they are winners. They have worked extremely hard all year and have stayed really focused. One of our girls said after the game she has never been so happy to have to go to practice."

"We will have our work cut out for us against Assumption. They have two 6'2" players and one of the best freshmen in the state. We are not just going to go to participate in the state tournament, we are going to win," Coach Noble said.

The fans drew praise from Coach Noble as well. Noble said Wednesday, "Our fan support was really great. I can't say enough about it. I just want to thank everyone who came out and supported this great group of kids. The spirit line that went through town behind the bus was great. It made me cry again. I really want to thank the local fire and police departments for their escort on the interstate and to the high school. I hope the fan support continues through the state tournament. This is a valuable tool to a winning performance."

They are the first team in 25 years of Rocket basketball to advance to the state tournament. The only other two teams to ever make it to the "Big Show" was the boy's team at MVES in 1953 and from Brodhead in 1972. Former resident found murdered

A former Rockcastle County man was found shot to death Sunday in southeastern Kentucky.

A mother's worried call led police late Sunday to discover a grisly triple murder in a remote McCreary County community.

Two women and a man were found shot to death in a bedroom of one victim's mobile home. The three had left a Somerset country music club early Sunday with a fourth person, who was interviewed Monday by state police.

No arrests have been made.

The bodies were discovered about 8:30 p.m. Sunday. But the county coroner said Monday that the shootings probably occurred 12 to 16 hours earlier and went undetected until the mother of one victim became concerned when her daughter didn't answer repeated phone calls.

"It's pitiful," said McCreary County Coroner Milford Creekmore. "We're losin' too many, too young."

The three were identified as Chris R. Boswell, 38 of Science Hill in Pulaski County and formerly of Mt. Vernon; Crystal D. Conatser, 22 of

Pine Knot; and Willa Jean Ferrier, 26, of Round Top. Their bodies were found at Ferrier's home, which is near Pine Knot in southern McCreary County.

Chris Boswell's sister, Sherry Hansel of Mt. Vernon said Wednesday that police had interviewed several people in the case, but had told family members very few details.

Kentucky State Police Public Affairs Officer Gilbert Accardo Jr. said that police were still trying to determine a motive for the killings. He could not say if they had any

suspects.

According to Creekmore, this is how the case unfolded:

Ferrier, Conatser and Boswell spent Saturday night at the Lake Cumberland Country Music Hall in Somerset. They headed back to McCreary County about midnight with a fourth person.

Creekmore declined to identify that person, but said he was interviewed by state police early Monday and agreed to take a polygraph test Monday afternoon, the results of

Garner Brown and Jack Brodhead man surrenders

A Brodhead man surrendered to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan and State Trooper John Yates after he broke into the home of Roy and Judy Adams on Negro Creek Road on Monday morning.

Arthur Bailey, 18, was charged with burglary, criminal mischief and criminal trespassing.

The two officers located Bailey in a cornfield near the Adams home, after they (the Adams) called police.

Both drivers were charged with failure to stop at a railroad crossing near the intersection of U.S. 127 and Stewart's Lane, according to court records in Boyle County.

Danville Police Officer Woodrow Goodlet and Detective Bob Williamson interviewed Brown, Stallworth and local transportation director David Perkins on the Wednesday following the incident on Friday.

According to police reports, Stallworth and Brown were driving north on U.S. 127, when Brown, who was following Stallworth abruptly pulled his bus into the left lane, to

avoid hitting Stallworth in the rear.

According to the report, Thomas G. Lovell of Monticello told police he was driving his tractor and trailer in the left lane when Brown's bus forced him into the median.

There was no contact between the school bus and the tractor trailer, but the truck was unable to continue after being forced off the road.

At least one student on Brown's bus said it appeared to him that Stallworth had started to slow down for the railroad crossing, when he realized that Brown's bus was close to hitting him in the rear. Stallworth apparently sped up to avoid the collision.

According to police reports nei-

ther bus stopped after the accident and no charges were filed until a witness gave police information about the accident three days later.

The witness saw a picture of the wrecked truck in the Danville newspaper - which said the two buses involved had not been identified. The witness notified authorities of the identity of the school district, bus numbers and license numbers.

Hammond said both drivers were suspended until the investigation by the local system and police were complete.

The Superintendent said that each driver's situation would be evaluated individually once the investigation is complete.

A truck will take the supplies to the destination on Friday.

Then one cold evening Patrick was trapped in a burning car and was thought to have been killed. His casket held nothing more than some ashes.

From a short distance away, Patrick watched his own funeral. Then he fled. Six weeks later, a fortune was stolen from his ex-law firm's off-shore account. And Patrick fled for real this time. But they found him.

THE DANCING FLOOR by Barbara Michaels... For years Heather Tradesant had dreamed of a journey with her father in England on a pilgrimage to the great gardens of history. Now her father is dead and Heather is determined to fulfill their dreams. To Heather's annoyance, her request to see the fabled seventeenth-century garden of Troyan house is denied when she finally reaches England. But she braves a wall of briars and reaches the Victorian manor and senses a strange miasma of evil lurking. When the reclusive owner finds her he seems all too pleased to see her when she tells him her name. Heather begins to wonder whether it is only stories of witchcraft that haunt Troyan House and the village or some more modern evil near at hand.

One non-fiction book; **MURDER IN BRENTWOOD** by Mark Fuhrman... Fuhrman reveals such fascinating eyewitness details as his own role as one of the "shooters" prepared to take Simpson down at the end of the Bronco chase, and Simpson's incriminating reaction

upon being informed of his arrest. Is Fuhrman a racist? Vigorously contesting that hurtful charge,

Fuhrman answers each of the "Dream Team's" wild allegations with solid facts. Yet he movingly apologizes for using racist words on a screenwriter's research tapes.

Why did Fuhrman take the Fifth and plead "no contest" to perjury? His emotional answer will surprise and move you. His account of the tremendous outpouring of support he received from people across the country is one of the most inspiring moments in the book.

We continually get all of the books connected to the O.J. Simpson murder trial because of the large number of requests we receive and not be-

cause we are presenting one side over the other. Everyone has to make up their own mind. And I do have an

opinion too but it is strictly my own. We have been getting books supporting both sides.



Teach Children Safety Rules for Familiar Strangers

Most children know enough to stay away from strangers they meet on the street. But do they know how to follow safety rules when they are around familiar strangers, people they have seen before but do not know well?

Because most parents today grew up during a time when children thought they could trust most adults, they are uncertain whether they need to teach their children to question the motives of people they see every day or know well.

Of the more than a million children that disappear or are sexually abused each year, research shows a majority of them are abused or abducted by individuals familiar to the child. Often these people are relatives, not the total strangers parents traditionally fear harm from.

Nationwide, only a few thousand of the missing children reported each year were kidnapped by total

strangers. Most have voluntarily run away from home, been abandoned by parents or have been abducted by the non-custodial parent. In 80% of child sexual abuse cases, the offender is known to the child.

Children between the ages of 8 and 11, especially girls, are at risk for child molestation. Some evidence indicates that the number of male victims may be increasing.

People who abduct or abuse children use a variety of methods to gain the children's confidence of which children should be aware. Abusers may make a simple request to get the child alone. They may pretend to be sent by a parent, promise something desirable or ask

for the child's help. They may also threaten the child so he or she will not report the incident.

Teach children to stay with a group of friends in isolated areas where they are away from home or adult supervision. Dark or isolated places should be avoided. Law enforcement officers recommend children keep walking without talking if they are approached by someone they do not know well and then immediately tell an adult they know.

In addition, teach children never to go near, go with or accept gifts from strangers. If they think they are being followed, children should seek help at a public place or friend's house, not go home to an empty house or to a deserted area.

Parents also need to teach children that their bodies belong to them and that no one—not a stranger, friend, teacher, relative or even a parent—is allowed to touch them inappropriately. Children confused or upset by advances of someone need to know to say "no," get away and tell someone.

If parents teach their children basic safety skills, they will be more confident in the children's ability to be safe when they are on their own.

Take Good Soil Samples For Reliable Test Results

The saying "garbage in, garbage out" often is associated with computers. This adage applies to taking soil test samples too.

The result of a soil analysis is no better than the sample collected. Since a pound of soil can represent several acres, take samples that depict the area on which you want fertility data.

Take random core samples at a uniform depth throughout the area. Mix cores together well in a clean, dry plastic bucket; then fill the sample bag and take it to the County Extension Office. Analyses will be done at a University of Kentucky soil test laboratory. You will receive research-based recommendations on lime and fertilizer requirements for the crop or land use.

How many cores should you take for a soil test sample? If you are sampling a 5-acre area, take at least 10 cores; 10-acre area, take 15 cores; 20-acre area, take 20 cores. No single sample should represent more than 20 acres.

When sampling a large field, divide it into smaller areas based on soil type, cropping history, or problem areas. Label each area with a letter or number to make record keeping easier.

When collecting soil samples for a home garden or lawn, separate samples according to land use. Take separate samples for a garden, lawn, fruit trees, ornamental shrubs and azaleas, because each may have different fertility, acidity or alkalinity requirements. Take at least 10 cores for each separate area and mix them together well.

How deep you go to take cores

depends on the tillage system used. Cores from tilled areas should be taken to plow depth, usually 6 to 8 inches. Take cores 4 inches deep in no-till fields and pastures.

In home lawns, collect cores at a depth of 4 inches. Take cores 6 inches deep for gardens, ornamentals and fruit trees.

Collect cores at the same time each year so you can compare results from year to year. Although you can take samples through much of the year, fall and spring are the best times to take them. Don't take cores when soil is too wet because it is difficult to mix them well and they are hard to handle. The soil should be dry enough to till when you take samples.

For more information, contact the County Extension Office at 256-2403. Soil probes are available for you to check out.

Warden Alexander, Director FCIC Insurance is now available for purchase through FSA. Producers who did not purchase the insurance in 1996, and wish to purchase it for 1997, should come in **NO LATER THAN MARCH 17**, as this is considered a new policy. Limited resource producers (who gross less than \$20,000 per year) are offered this

insurance coverage at no charge, but they must come in and fill out the required paperwork to take advantage of this offer. Deadline for application of new policies is Monday, March 17. Producers who purchase the insurance in 1996, and wish to keep the coverage have until July 15 to pay fees. Producers who do not pay their 1997 premium by July 15, their policies will be canceled. If you have any questions concerning the FCIC program, please feel free to contact this office.

The Dairy Refund Payment Program is open for applications thru close of business March 17. Producers who qualify may get a refund of withheld amounts if they can show that they marketed less pounds in the refund period (1996) as compared to the base price (1995). Receipts with the monthly marketing must be submitted at the time of application.

29 is the deadline to report production from 96 corn (for insured producers); MAY 31 is the final plant date for corn (for insured producers), but a late planting period with reduction in coverage is in effect for an additional 25 days; JUNE 30 is the final plant date for burley tobacco (for insured producers), but requests for late planting agreement may be signed by this date also if the crop will be planted late.

The sign-up period for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is scheduled for March 3 through March 28, 1997, to accept offers of environmentally-sensitive acreage for new 10 to 15 year contracts to enroll acreage for program years 1998 to 1999. CRP is a voluntary program that offers annual rental payments, incentive payments for certain activities, and cost-share assistance to establish approved cover on eligible cropland. Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt tolerant vegetation, and shallow water areas for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under the continuous sign-up, and are not subject to competitive bidding.

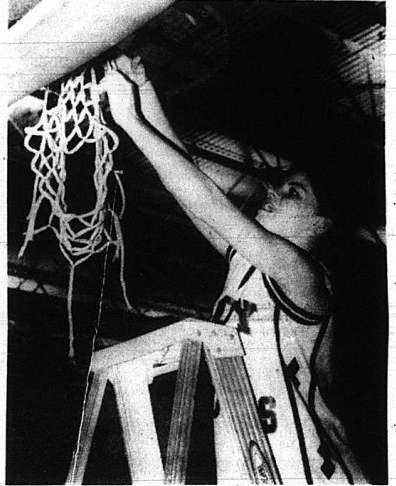

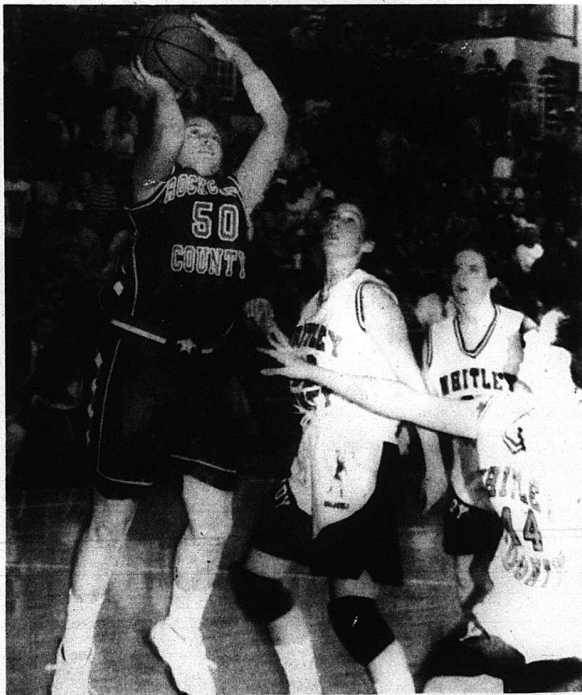

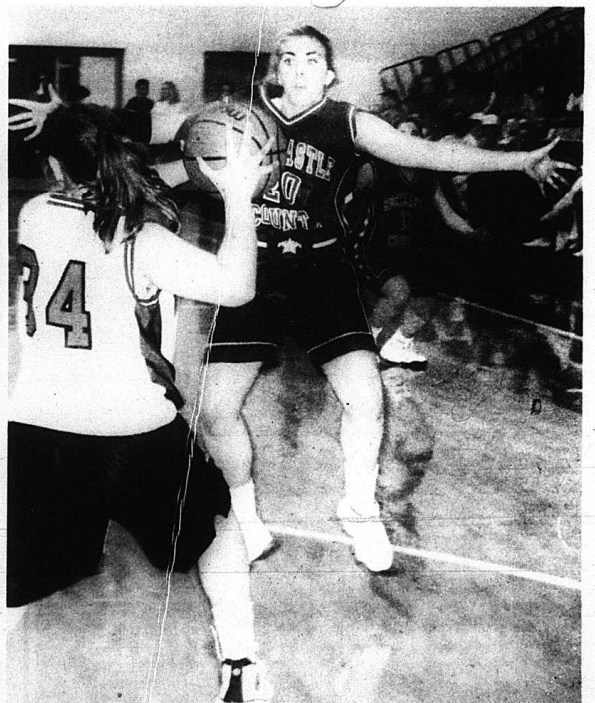

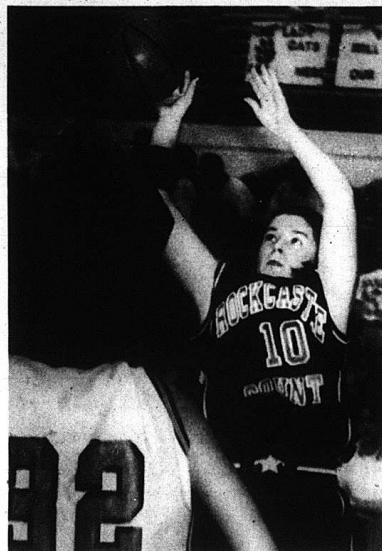

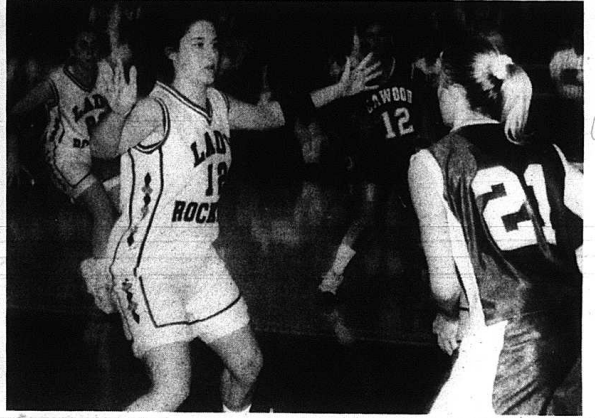

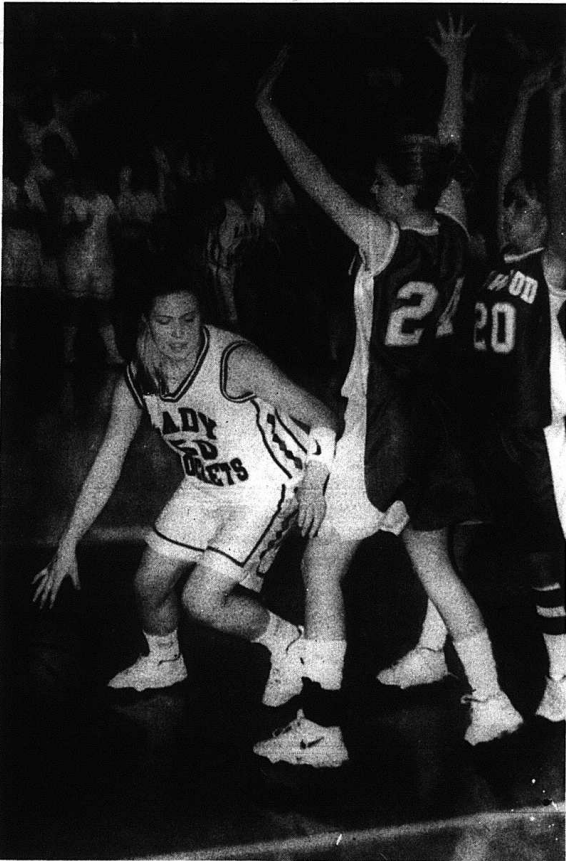

no three point ace -- there is just heart, determination and a desire to achieve, perhaps overachieve.

The Rockets met Harlan and Whitley County in the first two games of the tournament and both games provided tense moments for the Rockets. In their first game, against Harlan last Wednesday night, the girls came out and managed to only eke out a 13-12 first quarter lead and this was with missing three of four free throws, perhaps the weakest part of the girls game throughout the tournament.

In the second quarter, the girls came back to lead at halftime 28-23 behind a team effort that saw Kristi Moore get two baskets and a free throw, Suzie Carpenter and Amy Robinson each score four points and Jessica Albright with a basket.

The girls struggled in the third quarter, going to the 5:19 mark before Suzie Carpenter put in two free throws for the first score of the quarter. Harlan tied the game at 32 all with 3:28 to go and again at 36 all at the 2:01 mark before taking the lead 40-38 on a Rocket turnover just before the end of the third quarter.

It didn't get any better in the fourth quarter until halfway through the period when a basket by Moore put the Rockets in front 52-50 and from there the Rockets built their lead to the final 63-54. In this quarter, Amy Robinson scored seven of her game high 18 points and Carpenter and Moore combined for 6 each to contribute to outscoring the Lady Dragons by 25-14 in the final period.

Besides Robinson's 18 points; Moore and Carpenter each got 15; Albright and McClure had 6 each and Suzanne Brown came off the bench in the first quarter to score a bucket.

Against Whitley Co. After a five-day layoff, the girls came out tight against a determined Whitley Co. team and, before they could get their act together, the girls found themselves behind 6-2. However, a bucket by Robinson and one by Moore, off a steal by Tiffany McClure, knotted the score 6-6 all halfway through the first period. Then, Carpenter and Moore combined for 7 points and a 5-0 run which gave the Rockets a 13-12 first quarter lead.

In the second quarter, the lead changed hands seven times before a Robinson basket tied the score at 21 all. But, at 9-2 Whitley Co. ran put the Colonels ahead 30-23 at half-time.

The Rockets and Colonels both came out ragged to begin the third quarter as the Rockets immediately turned the ball over but, fortunately, Whitley quickly returned the favor. Both teams missed a field goal before Moore put in the first basket of the period for the Rockets and she started a 12-2 run that gave the Rockets a 35-32 lead and helped them to a 45-40 third quarter edge.

In the fourth quarter, Jessica Albright drew first blood for the Rockets at the free throw line, and Carpenter then went to war, scoring six points to give the Rockets their longest lead of the game 53-46 with four minutes left to play. But the Colonels didn't quit. Following a Colonel basket, the Rockets turned the ball over on the rebounds play and the Colonels converted this into a score and went on a 10-2 run that gave the Colonels the lead at 56-55 with a little under two minutes to play. But, again, Carpenter came through with a basket and free throw to give the Rockets a 58-56 edge at the 1:30 mark. However, the Rockets took a blow when Moore

fouled out of the game at that point and the Colonels tied the score on the two free throws. Jessica Albright then came through with a crutch basket at the :48 mark to put the Rockets on top 60-58. After a Colonel basket had again tied the score with :26 seconds to go in the game, Albright was fouled and went to the line to put the Rockets ahead by one, 61-60.

Probably the defensive play of the tournament was next on tap for the Rockets as, with :14 seconds on the clock and a Whitley player heading down the floor toward the basket and possibly the winning shot, Tiffany McClure picked her pocket clean and went in for the lay-up. McClure was fouled on the shot and stepped to the free throw line and managed to convert one to give the Rockets a two point edge at 62-60. But, the Rockets were not done as Amanda Osborne picked off an errant Colonel pass, flicked the ball to McClure and her jumps shot at the buzzer sealed the 64-60 victory and let Rocket fans catch their breath just before the passing out stage.

Suzie Carpenter was the star of the game offensively, putting in 28 points to lead all scoring; Robinson was next with 11 points; Moore and Albright scored 10 points each; and McClure 5 - three of them in the last five seconds of the game.

Championship Game Rockets vs. Cawood

For those who stayed to watch part or all of the Cawood-Jackson Co. game Monday night, the sentiment seemed to be the same - "Our girls can handle them, they just can't look past them." And, it looked at first as if the girls could handle them with ease. In the first period, as they did in the other two games, the Rockets scored 13 points in the first quarter to Cawood's 7 and then built their lead to 20-10 in the second quarter. But, with Albright on the bench with two fouls, Cawood came back to put together a 12-2 run that tied the score at 22 all with 2:18 to go in the second quarter and, from that point, Rocket fans stayed on the edge of their seats.

A bucket by Moore had given the Rockets a 24-22 half-time lead and the Rockets added to it with a basket by Robinson to begin the third quarter but Cawood hung tough and, at the :08 mark, took the lead at the end of the third period 41-40.

Part of Cawood's game plan had to be to deny Carpenter the ball and they did a good job throughout the game with Carpenter only scoring 12 points in the contest. However, six of those 12 points came in the fourth quarter when the Rockets garnered only 11 total points.

The Colonels had the lead 47-45 and the ball with 2:12 to go and had spread their offense to make the Rockets come and get them. And they did, with Albright coming up with the loose ball and finding McClure for the easy basket to tie the score at 47 all with exactly one minute to play. The Rockets took a two point lead, 49-47, off a steal by McClure. This steal led to a basket by Carpenter with 22 seconds left. Cawood's game tying shot came up short as Carpenter came up with the defensive rebound with :04 left, was fouled and converted the two shots to assure the Rockets of their first ever regional championship and their place in the state tournament.

When asked about the game clinching free throws, Carpenter said, "I told myself I bust these in practice every day. I knew if I only made one, the game would have a chance to go into overtime and I wanted to end it right there."

Besides Carpenter's 12, Moore led the scoring for the Rockets with 15

points; Robinson got 10; McClure 9; Albright 4 and Suzanne Brown 1.

which were not made public.

A friend stopped by Ferrier's home about 1:30 a.m., but after that no one is known to have heard from the three.

Ferrier's mother, Jeanette Musgrove, became concerned when she couldn't reach her daughter by phone all day Sunday. Musgrove was caring for Ferrier's four children, including a 9-month-old baby.

Because Musgrove does not drive, she called the McCreary County Sheriff's Department on Sunday night to ask for help.

When Musgrove and Deputy David Morrow arrived at the trailer, they found the back door open. Musgrove found the three bodies in a rear bedroom.

Boswell and Ferrier were lying on the floor. He had been shot once in the chest and once in the neck. She had been shot one time in the chest.

Consenter's body was slumped in a sitting position on the bed. She had been shot twice in the left shoulder blade, as if she had been sleeping until the shooting began, then raised up.

Boswell wore pants and socks. The two women wore T-shirts and underwear.

Creckmore said the wounds appeared to come from a .38-caliber gun. But no weapon was found at the home. There were no signs of robbery.

"Everything was in order," he said.

Investigators did find a clump of hair in Ferrier's hand, which could indicate a struggle with the killer.

The slayings saddened residents and stunned those who knew the victims well.

Boswell worked as a mechanic for Top Notch Service Station in northern Pulaski County. Consenter worked at Denim Processing in Oneida, Tennessee, and was raising one child. Ferrier was a full-time mother.

Wanda Rodgers of Eubank divorced Boswell in 1994, but she said the two remained friends and he regularly visited the couple's 14-year-old daughter, Katessa Starr Boswell.

"He was a real good father," Rodgers said.

Boswell was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on August 18, 1958, the son of Alton Boswell and Mildred Rickles Boswell. He was a member of the Good Hope Baptist Church in Eubank.

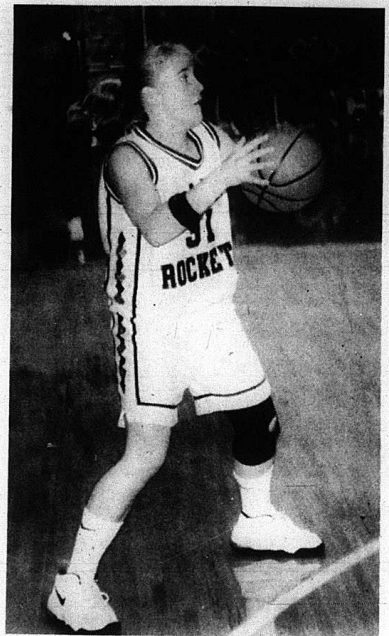

Quilting tally to top 3,200 for retiree

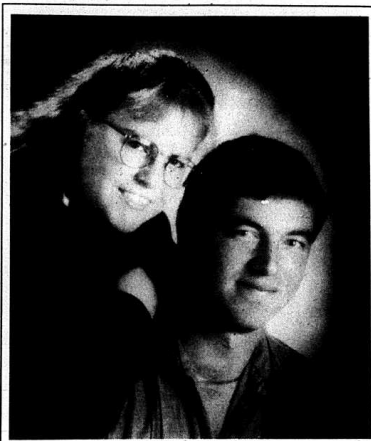
The sewing machine needle looped and swirled, guided by hands that have made too many stitches to count.

Luther Shell, formerly of Rockcastle County and a quilter for many years, worked on still another beautiful handmade creation in his basement workshop. He will reach more than 3,200 completed quilts this month.

He and his wife, Sinnie, work together guiding rolled quilts through an industrial size sewing machine that rolls on tracks across a wide bench made to fit the quilter's need.

Under a fine marker attached to the machine, a pattern is placed and Shell quickly gets a rhythm going as he follows a paper pattern.

He figures he has quilted and bound more than 3,200 quilts. A sec-

ond machine has a special gadget that helps him put bindings on the quilts. Those who wish Shell to complete an already-pieced quilt bring him the top and lining. He provides the batting, purchasing it in huge rolls.

"I enjoy doing it, and I don't do it for the money," he said. "I just like meeting the people who bring them in and making friends in the process. His fee for a king-size quilt is \$25.

One customer wanted more than 100 quilts finished.

Shell, who retired in 1980 from the General Motors Fisher Body plant after 30 years, said he got started with the hobby after watching his mother finish some beautiful bed coverings.

Sinnie, who helps with batting and arranging the quilt for the machine work, has pieced numerous quilts, some from patterns and others she has created from her own designs.

"Luther can copy any pattern he sees," she said, adding that her husband has pieced many of the quilt tops he has quilted for their family.

They have two sons, four grandchildren and two great grandchildren, all of whom have handmade quilts from the Shells.

One of the Shells' favorites is a "state quilt" they made together. It has replicas of the 13 colonies across the pillow space. The rest of the coverlet has the 50 states listed inside embroidered shapes of the states, each featuring the date the state joined the union.

One of their creations was recently displayed in a show at the Fitton Center for Creative Arts.

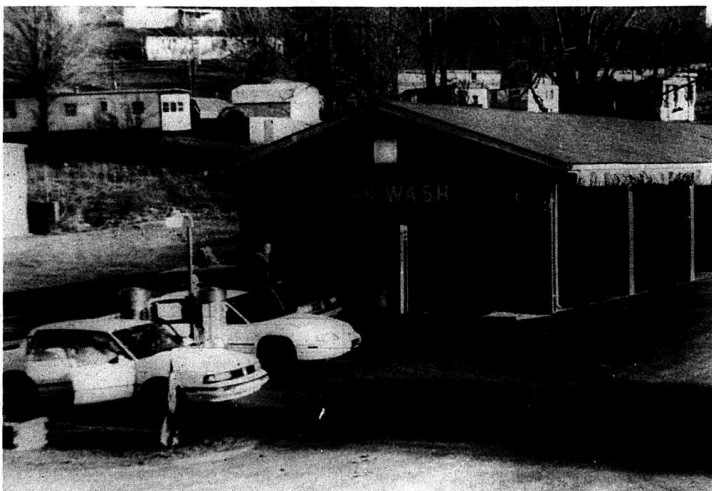

Spending three days in the misery of illness tends to clear out the mind. I was so sick that I did not feel like doing anything, reading anything or talking to anyone. I was such bad company that I did not even want to be with myself, but I didn't have much choice in that regard. As I (slowly) began to feel better, I discovered I had learned something from my time alone.

1. There is very little value on television these days. Since TV was about the only activity I felt like doing, I watched it a lot over seventy-two hours. Network television leaves me cold, and it was too early for baseball (though I did catch one Cubs spring training game). Even basketball had little excitement for me in my fevered state. Movies were the best reviewing I could find, and even some of them were not that great. I was also grateful for the Discovery Channel, and PBS had a wonderful story about two polar bear cubs that had been abandoned by their mother.

2. The Internet was a welcome diversion. With my little computer, I could access all sorts of information in all kinds of places. I spent most of time hooking up various diseases that I was imagining I had and finding out possible cures.

3. I missed two days of work which meant that I had to cancel several appointments. Somehow everyone survived without me. My over-inflated sense of responsibility tells me that I must do certain things, such as

always show up for work. It takes an experience like that of the last few days to remind me that I am not indispensable.

4. I need to take better care of myself. As I look back over the last few months, I now see that my family and I have been under a considerable amount of stress. Some of this I realized at the time, and some I didn't. Some was personal, and some, job-related. The stress of the last few months is part of the reason I became so ill.

5. Stress affects the immune system. I am becoming more and more convinced of the close connection

between mind and body. What I think and feel affects the physical processes of my body. The newspaper this morning reported research in which scientists have found that people under stress catch colds more frequently than others do. I am convinced that stress made me more susceptible to the bacteria and viruses that did me in.

6. I spend a significant amount of time running to get things done, some of which are not all that important. Since I felt so horrible, I did little or nothing for three days. My to-do list was just as full as when the illness began, and yet there were no awful consequences from ignoring some of those tasks. If I had not been ill, I would have spent some amount of time attempting to complete each of those tasks.

7. Because I felt so bad, I missed out on spending time with my son who was home from college. If I had taken better care of myself over the past months, I would have felt like doing things with him and the rest of my family.

8. My addictions came out more when I felt bad. I wanted to eat everything that wasn't nailed down. Having food in my mouth seemed about the only thing that made me feel better. I couldn't get enough cake and strawberries to satisfy my craving. (Now that I'm feeling better, I'm not sure I will want any cake and strawberries for quite awhile.)

9. I need to spend more quiet time by myself. Thirty minutes a day set aside for just me lets me meditate and prepare myself for the day. Taking this time helps me deal with stress.
