**Welfare Reform Is Needed to Strengthen Families**  
It is much in vogue these days to speak of welfare reform. Every congressman who makes a statement seems to be in favor of reforming this system for helping people in need.

There are good reasons to restructure the United States welfare system (which is actually made up of several programs). Reader's Digest loves to do stories on welfare abuse, and in a recent issue they found a good one. The Watson family of Providence, Louisiana consists of Mom, Dad and seven children. This family of nine draws \$3893 per month in income from federal welfare programs. That adds up to \$46,716 per year (and remember its tax free). The family members receive payments for a variety of reasons including "too stressed out to work," "obesity" and "failure to demonstrate age-appropriate behavior."

It is fun and relatively easy to bash welfare by finding ridiculous instances of welfare abuse. Any politician who wants a cheer from the crowd has only to rail against "those welfare cheats," and the crowd responds approvingly.

While cheats are taking advantages of the welfare system, there is another side to this story. That side is about women who could not get away from abusive husbands if they didn't have financial assistance.

Take the case of Mildred (a fictitious character). She has three children under the age of six, no high

school diploma and no job skills. Her husband beats her and he gets drunk, which happens once or twice every weekend, but his small paycheck is the only income the family has. Mildred has no family who can help her. She feels trapped.

When the abuse became more than even she could bear, Mildred went to a shelter for abused women. It was not her first visit to the shelter. Because of the nature of the abusive relationship, it is hard for Mildred to decide to leave her husband. Finances are not the only issue for her. She has been in an abusive situation since she was born and knows nothing else. The shelter staff help her to confront her past and start to take a new course in the future.

All of this hard work cannot pay off for Mildred if she does not have financial assistance to provide food, clothes and shelter for her children. The shelter staff helped her put

together a package of financial assistance that would allow her to become financially independent from her husband. The package included subsidized housing and Supplemental Security Income (the same program that the Watson family in Louisiana is abusing).

Reforming welfare is not as easy as it may seem at first glance. Reform must take into account both the Watson family and Mildred's situation. Anger at the Watson's for welfare abuse should not be taken out on Mildred and her children.

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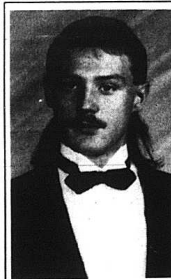

## Mayor says water line extension ban possible

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer told council members Monday night that a complete water line extension ban may be imposed on the city of Mt. Vernon by the state.

Cromer said state officials had also told him they were considering banning water meter hook-ups on current lines throughout the county. The ban would be on lines served by the City of Mt. Vernon's water plant.

"We are at capacity and we simply cannot produce anymore water," Cromer said.

"If we have dry conditions like we did four years ago, we are going to have problems because we have a lot more users than we did then," he said. Cromer's comments came during a discussion concerning the city's multi-million dollar expansion project for their water and sewer system.

The Mayor said the project could be bid this fall with completion of the project in the fall of 1998.

The City also discussed an entertainment tax ordinance passed in 1995 by the city, which requires all entertainment businesses in the city to pay a percentage of their ticket sales.

But, no taxes have ever been collected by the city because of two lawsuits between the city and the Renfro Valley Entertainment Com-

plex

In their suits Renfro Valley has contended they were being unfairly treated by the city because they think they tax was passed just for them.

The last lawsuit was dismissed in

### Unless changes made

City won't provide water to new industrial park

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer told council members Monday night that unless changes and/or improvements are made to the water and sewerage systems at the new industrial park, the city will not provide them with water.

Cromer said the county had not complied with an agreement to build water and sewer lines according to specifications and unless the necessary changes were made, the industrial park would not be supplied with water.

That would mean the new industry preparing to locate there, B & H Tools would not have water or sewer.

Cromer said that the county and city had a written agreement about certain guidelines the county would follow in preparing the site and that

## City won't provide water to new industrial park

until the County made the necessary changes, the city would not take over the water and sewer lines.

"Those change requests are ridiculous, we have done everything we were supposed to and have built water and sewer lines that can more than take care of the park's needs," Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlofits said Tuesday.

"Our engineers tell us there should be no problem, but when you deal with the city there seems to always be a problem," Carlofits said.

"The site is ready and if the city wanted to they could turn the water on and B & H Tool would be set," Carlofits added.

The Judge said that Everett Harper, of Brodhead, B & H's future plant manager told him Wednesday

that his company was ready to begin construction, but that they wanted the problem with the water solved first.

"The Judge signed the agreement and knows that the corrections must be made before we can continue," Cromer rebutted.

One of the items in question is a water line from Old Hwy. 461 into the park. The Mayor says the line is needed to make distribution pressure even throughout the park. He said the line would also help keep water pressure good for the residents along Hwy. 150 and in Brodhead. "That line is part of the city's expansion program and must be built for the good of the entire project," Cromer said.

"Our first estimate of costs for the

needed changes was about \$30,000, but we have made some concessions on three pressure detection devices on the three fire hydrants and that will save the county about \$15,000," the Mayor said.

"We are not trying to be hard-headed about anything, we simply

want things done correctly, but we will not concede on the water line from old Hwy. 461, it is a must," Cromer said.

In the meantime a much-needed Rockcastle county employer hangs in the balance, B & H cannot operate without water.

## Rockcastle Water will offer money for improvements

The Rockcastle County Water Association Board will make an offer to the city of Mt. Vernon that would help them to temporarily upgrade the city's water plant so a water line extension project can get under way.

Bob Fields, president of the Rockcastle Water Association said Wednesday that his board will offer nearly \$20,000 to be used to make temporary improvements to the city's plant that would make it possible for the water association to receive about 21,000 gallons of water a day.

"That is the amount we need for about 150 customers in the Sand Springs, Pongo and Buffalo and other areas along Hwy. 1249," Fields said.

In 1995, Rockcastle Water Association received grants and loans totaling \$1.7 million dollars for a water line extension project that will eventually serve about 400 customers in Rockcastle County.

Other than obtaining easements, the project has not gotten underway because the state and federal governments will not release any funds.

"They will not release our funds because we do not have a solid water users agreement with the city of Mt. Vernon," Fields said.

"That is one of the reasons we need to make a lump sum payment to the city - we want to work together and this project is something that is very worthwhile," Fields said.

"We simply want the truth from the city," Fields added.

However, Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer said the truth is, "You can't provide something you can't produce. We are pumping water 23 an a half hours a day and simply are at capacity," Cromer told the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night. Councilwoman Karen King asked the Mayor if there wasn't something the city could do to help the water association so funding wouldn't be lost. Cromer said that Rockcastle would not lose their \$600,000 grant even without a water users agreement at this time.

The Mayor said he had given Rockcastle Water Association an agreement that would provide all of the water they need when the city's multi-million dollar upgrade is completed.

"We also offered to sell them any excess water we could produce on a daily basis, but they did not want to do that," Cromer told the council.

Fields said that funding for the project is not in jeopardy at this time, but it will be in a year or so and if projections he has heard are true, it

could be three or four years before Mt. Vernon's upgrade is complete.

"If it takes that long we could certainly be in jeopardy of losing our funding," Fields said.

But, the Mayor told the council that everything was in place for the project and that bids could be let as early as this fall. The Mayor said the project would take only about one year to complete.

The other 250 customers that will be served by Rockcastle's expansion project will get their water from Jackson County and Woods Creek Water Association.

They have solid agreements with those people, the hold up is simply the city of Mt. Vernon's water users agreement," Fields said.

Mayor Cromer said he had not seen any such offer from Rockcastle and would not comment further.

## Mullins trial gets underway

A Lexington man went on trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Wednesday, accused of killing an entire Ohio family last July.

Charles Mullins, 35, was involved in a head-on collision on Hwy. 461 by-pass on July 3.

Prosecutors say Mullins caused the wreck when he drove his service van into the path of the family's Chevrolet suburban. Three of the four people in the suburban died in the crash.

Since his indictment and incarceration in Rockcastle County, Mullins has amassed over \$80,000 in medical bills the county hasn't been able to pay.

A jury was seated Wednesday morning and the trial is expected to end on Thursday, (today).

## Rogers announces funds for water improvements

U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-5) announced recently that Western Rockcastle Water Association has been awarded economic development assistance totaling \$1.142 million.

"This assistance will improve the water system that serves 2,670 rural families in the western area of Rockcastle County, the eastern area of Lincoln County and a small area in northern Pulaski County," Rogers said. "This project will help ensure that the folks in these areas have clean, safe water."

## Two die in 461-150 crash



### Nine people have died on stretch of road since its construction

Two Pulaski County men were killed in a two vehicle crash at the junction of Hwy. 461 and Hwy. 150 Monday night.

According to Kentucky State Police at London, Robert Earl Cundiff, 32, and William Thomas King, 33, died in the 12:55 a.m. accident.

Police said Ronnie Hurley, 47, of Livingston was only slightly injured in the wreck.

According to Hurley, he was driving his 1995 Bobtail tractor east on 150 when he approached the light, which he said was green.

Hurley said he looked both ways, but that when he went through the light, his tractor collided with a pickup truck.

Police said the 1983 Ford truck was being driven by Cundiff and that he did not stop at the red light at the intersection.

Cundiff and King were apparently returning to Somerset when the wreck occurred.

Both Cundiff and King were ejected from the truck after impact. King was pronounced dead at the scene. Cundiff was dead on arrival at Rockcastle Hospital, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

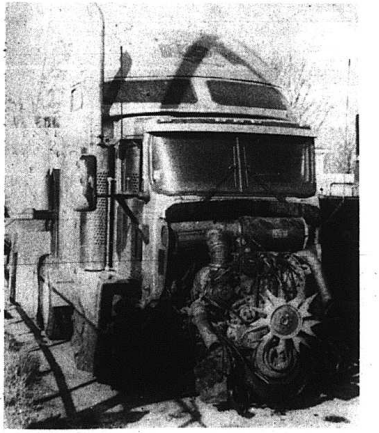
After colliding with Cundiff's truck, Hurley's tractor slammed into a rock wall on Hwy. 150.

Hurley was treated at Rockcastle Hospital for minor injuries and released.

Hurley, who is a driver for K and C Trucking based in Detroit, with a terminal in London, said Tuesday he had never been involved in an accident in his ten years of over-the-road driving.

The two Somerset men were the eighth and ninth victims to die on the two mile stretch of the Hwy. 461 by-pass that connects Interstate 75 with 461, since it was opened.

Vernon Elementary are calling on local organizations—professional, business, religious and volunteers, including parents, teachers, counselors, social workers, neighbors, friends, business owners, and relatives to make a personal commitment to intervene where necessary to prevent child maltreatment. One way to show your concern and commitment is to wear a blue ribbon on April 17, Blue Ribbon Day. This day was set aside to remember all the children who have been abused and to remind us that we all can help prevent this tragedy from happening.

We should each take a step to assure that growing up is a safe journey for all children. Here are a few suggestions: give a stressed parent you know a "breather," encourage an abuser to seek counseling, reach out to a family in need, give a child a hug,

and let them know that they are special and loved.

an hour or more it seemed, to "draw out the lock-jaw germs," he explained. (A few years earlier, he'd lost an eight-year old grandson to "lockjaw.")

The Almighty created a lot of ready-made medicines for mankind, especially those of the plant kind. But our fact-fare generations isn't "up" on what they are. It's much easier to buy something over the counter at the

Or how I could talk *children*. About how we grow with them. About how we laugh with them. About how we hurt with them. I could try to talk about the agony of losing children, but my talk would be empty. Haven't been there. Pray I never will be. O my soul, I don't think I could survive losing one of my children. Many broken but strong parents, however, have done just that.

*Dear Lord, help those who have lost children - day by day if You don't mind. And, Lord, don't think I'm being a smart-aleck when I ask if it would be possible for you to explain yourself to them. I know, Lord, that you didn't do it for Job, but I thought I'd mention it anyhow.*

My parents almost lost me. When I was less than a year old, diphtheria lay me low. The doctor, Gus Griffin, I believe, told the neighbors I would not make it, but he didn't tell that to my parents. Some folks said I made it because my mother was no stranger to prayer.

I wish I understood prayer. Why are some prayers answered and others, just as worthy, are not? So it seems. Do we ever think precisely what we're praying for when we pray for folk at church? Is it a cop-out to tack "if he'll be Thy will" to the end of an intercessory prayer?

Years later, I sat at the bedside of our second son, Michael, while he lay in a "covey tent" in a Harrodsburg hospital. The little fellow, two years old, struggled to breathe. After he recovered I learned that the doctor had told the nurses he might not make it through the night. And then a generation later, Michael and Terri stood at the bedside of Andrew, age two, whose battle with a vicious bronchial virus paralyzed an induced coma and paralysis. Andrew made it.

Amen! That's three generations in a row who've done battle with a respiratory evil. Does it run in the family?  
Well, let's see ... there's evolution, teeth, boils, medicines, children, and prayer. Which theme will I take up today?

Oops! The answer has to be none, dear hearts. I must take leave of you and go greet the mover so Nancy can cut grass when she gets home from work. After she fixes our evening meal, that is. A meal that will be low or no fat because a report last week said my cholesterol and triglyceride count is up to the heart-attack possibility level. (Did you know that the medical community prefers the term "brain attack" to "stroke"?) 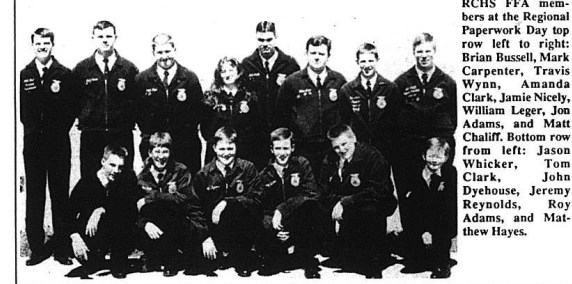

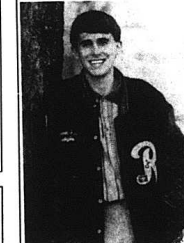

## "Grant for Western"

The rural development funds, of which \$75,000 is the form of a grant, will allow Western Rockcastle Water Association to purchase the North-

ern Rockcastle Water District. The project includes upgrading three existing storage tanks and replacing the transmission main and a booster pump station. The project has already received \$678,000 in previous years.

Denver Burton, president of Western Water District, said Tuesday that Western has been operating

Northern Water District since July 5, 1995 but will not actually own it until the Public Service Commission okays the sale. Burton said the PSC has said the sale would be approved. Burton said part of the \$1.142 million has already been spent on upgrading lines in the Northern Water District area.

## ORDINANCE No. 017

**An Ordinance Relating to Emergency Telephone Service "911"**  
 Be it ordained by the Fiscal Court of the County of Rockcastle, the Commonwealth of Kentucky:  
**WHEREAS**, 911 is the three-digit number designated throughout the United States as the emergency telephone number to be used by the public to obtain law enforcement, medical, fire, rescue and other emergency services; and  
**WHEREAS**, 911 is a service, in Rockcastle County, reserved for the county's government; and  
**WHEREAS**, 911 Service includes lines and equipment necessary for the answering, transferring and dispatching of public emergency telephone calls by persons within the serving area who dial 911; and  
**WHEREAS**, pursuant to KRS 65.760, county governments are authorized to establish fees to be paid by the general public/telephone subscribers to defray the cost of establishing and maintaining emergency telephone services; and  
**WHEREAS**, GTE is the single provider of the local telephone service in the City of Brodhead, the City of Livingston and the City of Mount Vernon, and the remainder of Rockcastle County; and  
**WHEREAS**, the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County recognizes that the Public Service Commission regulates the area of telephone service and must approve subscriber rate increases and Rockcastle County, as a contracting party of "911," would be a subscriber for any rate modifications requested by the Phone Companies; and  
**WHEREAS**, the legislative bodies of the City of Brodhead, the City of Livingston and the City of Mount Vernon have requested that the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court enact an ordinance to provide emergency telephone service for Rockcastle County, including but not limited to their respective jurisdictions; and  
**WHEREAS**, the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, after extensive study and review, has determined that it is in the best and long-range interests of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Rockcastle County to establish an emergency telephone service.  
**Now, Therefore, Be It Ordained** by the Fiscal Court of the County of Rockcastle, in the Commonwealth of Kentucky:  
**Section I: ESTABLISHMENT**  
 There shall be and hereby is established a Universal Emergency Number Service to provide a single telephone number for emergency services within Rockcastle County, which shall be known as "911."  
**Section II: AGREEMENT**  
 Subject to the approval of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, the Rockcastle County Judge/Executive shall be and hereby is authorized to enter into any and all agreements with GTE and any other entity (hereinafter referred to as "Phone Companies") necessary to provide for the construction, implementation, and continuing maintenance of "911" within Rockcastle County, Kentucky. Said agreement shall be for a period of one (1) year commencing on the \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_, in the year 1997, and shall be automatically renewable upon the same terms and conditions unless prior to sixty (60) days of the close of the said twelve (12) month period either party notifies the other of its intention to modify and/or terminate said agreement.  
 Said agreement shall reflect the installation costs and the current tariffed recurring charges for 911 service charged during the contract period.  
**Section III: 911 FEE**  
 There shall be and hereby is established an initial 911 Emergency Telephone Service fee of \$2.00 per month for each exchanged telephone subscriber within the jurisdiction of Rockcastle County, including all municipal corporations within the County of Rockcastle, which is levied as a special fee as provided in Kentucky Revised Statutes 65.760.  
 Annually, on the 30th day of July, said fee shall be adjusted by the percentage increase or decrease in the previous year's Consumer Price Index (C.P.I.) published by the United States Government and approved by the 911 Board of Directors. Any and all increases/decreases approved by the 911 Board of Directors must be approved by the governing body of the County of Rockcastle prior to said fee's institution. Such fee shall be paid by each exchanged telephone subscriber in Rockcastle County on an individual exchange basis, commencing on the \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_, 1997, and each month thereafter unless modified by subsequent ordinance of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. All WATS, public pay station lines, foreign exchange lines, incoming-only lines, or non-originating lines shall be exempt from each fee.  
 The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court shall contract with any or all providers of local telephone service in Rockcastle County, Kentucky to collect the 911 Emergency Telephone Service fee from the telephone subscriber and remit said fee to the Rockcastle County 911 Board to be used in accordance with Kentucky Revised Statute 65.760.  
**Section IV: GOVERNING BOARD**  
 There shall be and hereby is established a governing board for the Rockcastle County 911 Board, hereinafter referred to as "Board." In accordance with KRS 65.760, the Board shall utilize said funds for the establishment, maintenance, management and operation of an Emergency Telephone Service.  
 The governing Board shall consist of thirteen (13) members, with the following reservations:  
 -Two members shall, at all times, represent the County's Fiscal Court  
 -One member, at all times, shall represent the Volunteer Fire Departments in Rockcastle County who shall be selected by all fire departments meeting in general session  
 -One member shall be a representative of the Sheriff's Department  
 -One member shall be a representative of the Rockcastle Ambulance Service  
 -One member shall be a representative of each of the cities.  
 -One member shall be a representative of each of the magisterial district  
 -During the first two full years only, the County Judge/Executive shall serve as Chair of the 911 Board. Thereafter, the Chair shall be chosen by the body of the Board  
 The term of any member of the Board who holds his/her position of the Board by virtue of his/her position in government, or the individual's designee shall not exceed that person's tenure in office. The terms of all other Board members shall not exceed two consecutive years. The By-Laws shall determine the terms of each Board member within the limits as herein prescribed.  
 The Board shall meet at least quarterly, or when so directed by the Chair, and shall meet when not less than three (3) members deliver written notice to the Chair requesting a meeting. Special meetings may be called by the Chair or the Secretary upon 48 hours' written or oral notice delivered to each member.  
 The Board shall be a body corporate for all purposes and may contract and be contracted with may enter into agreements to receive information from other law enforcement agencies, may purchase equipment and supplies in compliance with the Kentucky Procurement Code, KRS Chapter 45A, laws amendatory thereto or supplementary thereof, and, generally, do all things necessary and proper to provide for a proficient and efficient dispatching service for all emergency services within Rockcastle County, Kentucky. The Board may prosecute and defend suits, may retain and pay attorneys for the purpose of such suits and shall have all powers conferred upon Boards and Commissions by Kentucky Statutes.  
 No member of the Board shall receive any compensation for service upon the Board. The Board may, however, reimburse any member for reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred at the direction of the Board. All reimbursement shall be supported by documentary evidence, satisfactory to the Board, that such expense has been paid by the member.  
 No individual member, or any member of his family, may have a direct or indirect financial or pecuniary interest in such agreement. In any matter pending before the Board, should any member have a real or apparent conflict of interest, the Board member shall make such fact known to the Board and shall not thereafter participate in the decision or in the vote upon such subject matter.  
 A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum. A majority of members present shall be sufficient to pass any matter pending before the board unless a greater number is specifically required by statute. It is understood that any and all persons employed as dispatcher by the County upon the passage of this Ordinance shall, upon proper certification, have first dispatch opening position.  
 The Board may adopt By-Laws and amend same, and may establish rules and regulations for the conduct of its business.  
**Section V: SEVERABILITY**  
 The provisions of this ordinance are severable. If any sentence, clause, section, or part of this ordinance, or the application thereof is for any reason found to be unconstitutional or invalid, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect or repeal any of the remaining provisions, sentences, clauses, sections, or parts of this ordinance.  
**Section VI: EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon passage and publication.  
**So Ordained** by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Mount Vernon, Kentucky, for provision of emergency telephone communications on this, the \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_, 1997.  
**Date of First Reading: February 13, 1997**  
 The aforesaid Ordinance will be considered for Second Reading and Final Adoption by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court at a Called Meeting of the Court on April 22, 1997 at the hour of 10 a.m.

# FSA guarantees farm loans

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes and guarantees farm loans assistance to family farmers. FSA loans are tailored to a borrower's needs. The FSA Ag Credit Manager helps the borrower analyze problems, determine available resources and plan how resources may best be used. The FSA loan programs are briefly of livestock and equipment, for annual operating and family living expenses and for refinancing debts related to the operation of the farm. Most of these loans may be scheduled for up to a 7 year term. Dollar limitation is \$200,000. EMERGENCY LOANS are direct loans which may be used for either operating or real estate pur-

poses, depending upon the type of loss and the borrower's needs. In order to qualify, the county in which the applicant operates must be designated a disaster area.  
 Individuals, partnerships, joint operations, cooperatives and corporations primarily and directly engaged in farming on family-sized operations may apply. To be eligible, an individual must have a satisfactory credit history; have sufficient education, training or experience in farm management and possess the industry and ability needed to succeed in farming; be a US citizen or legal resident alien; possess the legal capacity to incur the obligations of the loan; be able to obtain sufficient credit

elsewhere at reasonable rates and terms to finance actual needs; be the owner or tenant operating a family farm after the loan is closed.  
 The FSA county committee determines the eligibility of applicants but not whether an eligible applicant meets the security of cash flow requirements for loan approval. Applications may be made to the Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency located on Highway 150, 3 miles west of Mt. Vernon. The office may also be reached by phoning 256-2525. Each person who applies gets equal consideration without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, marital status, national origin, or physical/mental handicaps.

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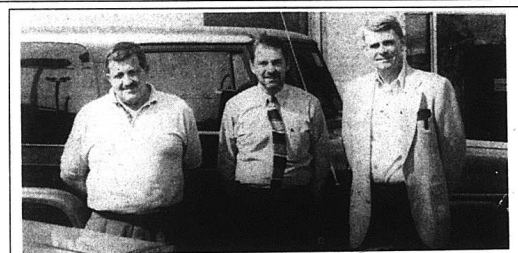

## Big name country music stars coming to Valley

# Loveless in Renfro Valley April 19, Cyrus, Oak Ridge Boys, Lynn, others to follow

If there is anything that sets hard country torch singer Patty Loveless apart, it is that commitment to connecting with people's moments of doubt, loss and exhilaration.

With songs like, "Only What I Feel," "Blame It On Your Heart," and poignant chart-topper, "How Can I Help You Say Good-bye," Patty Loveless stakes her claim as a woman willing to turn her heart inside-out to touch people.

On the song "When Fallen Angels Fly," the follow-up to her critically acclaimed Epic debut, Loveless brings a new depth to her song's emotional cores. Part of that stems from her own acceptance of who she is, what she has done and where she is going.

"To me, the fact that we're all human, we all make mistakes and everyone has shortcomings-is part of how we become who we're supposed to be. We don't have all the answers, only the journey, and those mistakes are part of it. There's mortal angels out there, people all around who help us.

Some of them are the people in our lives and some are people who make music. For me, there was an awful lot in those Loretta Lynn and Dolly Parton songs, Merle Haggard and George Jones and the Stanley Brothers."

In the process of defining who she is in song, the woman who was born in Pikeville, has dug deeper into her own soul. The results can be heard in her albums that delve even further into the feelings that are so much a part of life in today's world.

"My albums have really allowed me to do a lot of soul searching," Loveless says of her growth.

"There's a lot of me there. But as I'm traveling on the road and people come up to me and tell me their stories, it becomes obvious how much of what's inside us is the same. I used

to worry about talking about myself on-stage, about why I sang the songs I have. But I've seen how much these songs have touched people-and how they've opened people up to tell me their stories. Experiencing that made me want to reach even deeper inside."

For Loveless, making friends through a song is something she has been doing since she was a tiny girl going to the Pollyanna Drive-In in Pikeville with her father. "I was 5 years old and Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs were playing between the two movies," she recalls. "There was something about the music that just reached down inside me and spoke to me about things I felt that I couldn't even explain. I knew then that was what I needed to do."

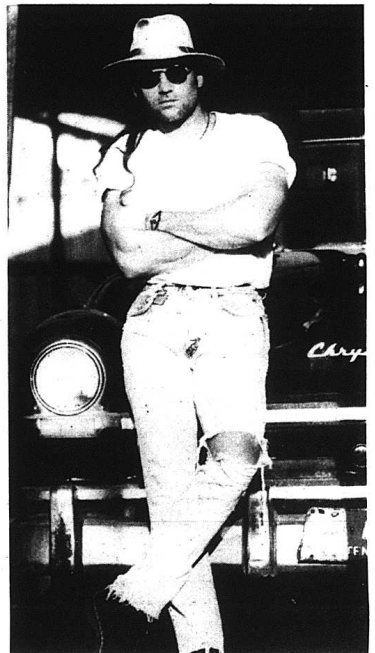

Mart Stuart Walker, married for twenty-one years to a Manhattan lawyer, keeps herself busy with volunteer work. . .Tanya Thomas, an award winning singer and rock star of international celebrity and proportions, enjoys all the trappings of fame and success—a mansion in Bel Air, legions of fans, and a broken heart. . .Dr. Zoe Phillips has her hands full as a single mother of an adopted two-year-old, as a doctor at an AIDS clinic in San Francisco.

But despite all the changes in their lives since college days, their friendship is still a bond they all treasure and share. For each of the women, a few weeks at the ranch will bring healing and release, as old hurts are buried, ancient secrets revealed and love replaced or renewed.

2. **CHROMOSOME 6** by Robin

Cook. . .When notorious underworld figure Carlo Franconi is gunned down, his Mafia competitors become prime suspects. Suspensions are fueled when Franconi's body disappears from the city morgue before it can be autopsied—much to the embarrassment of the chief medical examiner and the mayor, but to the amusement of the morgue's resident cynic, forensic pathologist, Dr. Jack Stapleton. A few days later, when the mutilated, unidentifiable body of a "floater" arrives on the autopsy table, Jack is troubled by the case. Just who is the person and what connection does it have with Franconi? Another of Robin Cook's cutting-edge suspense novels for you to enjoy.

3. **SANCTUARY** by Nora Roberts. . .Sanctuary. Successful photographer Jo Ellen Hathaway thought she has escaped that house long ago. It was where she spent her loneliest years, after her family was shattered by the sudden and unexplained disappearance of her mother. Yet the sprawling southern resort off the coast of Georgia continues to haunt her. Even more haunting are the pictures that someone is sending her, strange close-ups and candid shots. Is it time for Jo Ellen to return to Sanctuary to face the mystery that has been eluding her for so long.

For those on the island, they know that Sanctuary may be the most dangerous place of all. . .

Two non-fiction books are. . .**DE-NIAL OF THE SOUL** by M. Scott Peck. . .This book grapples with the deeper meanings of life, death, suicide, and euthanasia and ask whether we have the ethical right to kill ourselves even though we have the power. He helps us face the reality of doing the work of dying and coming to terms with our own and our loved ones' mortality. Dr. Peck poses the question we should all ask ourselves and help us determine the spiritual lessons that dying is meant to teach us.
