







# Hiking Shiltowee

Lorin Rockwell, affectionately known as "Rocky," began walking the Shelton Trace National Recreation Trail, which traverses the Daniel Boone National Forest, for fun and recreation nearly two years ago. Last week he, his faithful dog Nick, and Henry Robbins finished the journey. Henry, a friend and neighbor, who joined him half way through the trek at Turkey Foot, added great spirit, humor and companionship.

Rocky's plan was to drive his ancient truck to a trail head, park, walk the trail segment both directions and return home the same day; returning to the last turnaround point on the next leg of the trail working his way from north to south. He hoped that it could be done at least once a week, completing the 254 mile trip, (which then becomes 508 miles) in about 25 days hikes, covering approximately 20 miles each day. Due to a number of factors including weather, poor trail conditions, and the constraints of work and home life, it took 45 days. Sometimes only four or five miles could be accomplished in a day. Struggling over storm damaged trails, unmarked segments, (and retracing portions thought to be trail only to find dead ends) cut deeply into what was thought to be well planned trips. An important factor also, was the need to return to the truck before dark. Being caught in wilderness area at night was not part of the "day hike" plan.

The trail starts at the extreme northern end of the Forest and runs the length of Kentucky ending at the Pickett State Park just inside Tennessee, (see map). Sheltowee, an Indian word meaning "Big Turtle" was the name given Daniel Boone by the Shawnee Tribe when he was adopted as a son. This trail is named in his honor. It covers some of the most spectacular scenery in the United States. It runs lush forests, rugged deep canyons, and narrow rocky outcroppings overlooking pristine rivers and lakes fed by streams that cascade over ancient rocks displaying beautiful waterfalls. Many are spectacular, like Yahoo and Van Hook Falls, but most are small and unnamed, seen by few. The trail passes through rock arches and natural bridges, evidence of erosion over millions of years. In abundance are birds and animals as well as a large variety of wildflowers, trees and shrubs showcased to those willing to travel this wilderness path. Because Rocky, Henry and Nick traveled the trail through all four seasons, they were able to see the varied and abundant beauty that is bestowed upon this rugged and timeless trace.

Kudos to Nick, our Australian Shepherd, who at the advanced age of eleven, traveled at Rocky's side for the entire journey. From the moment he jumped into the truck on morning mornings, until the return home, on late late at night depending on the

distance of the drive, he was an inspiration. A quiet dog, he never gave chase, even to the most inviting squirrel, rabbit or wild turkey on the trail; it was his duty to stay near. Though older and often still after a long hike, he was always ready to press ahead. The same could not always be said of the two men. Both at the back end of 59, they found their energy level called into serious question at times. Prase also, to old Ford trucks...they never die. They just make strange sounds, cough, wheeze, and just keep going.

The objective of this trip was not to just endure, but to enjoy the walk and see Kentucky as few do. Both Rocky and Henry are avid hikers; the trip was just an extension of an activity they both enjoy for health and happiness almost every day. Henry states, "it has been an awesome journey, a rare opportunity to discover just how beautiful Kentucky is." Rocky often says that "there is hardly a day goes by that I do not admire the natural beauty and picturesque scenery of our adopted state." Rocky has kept a journal of his walk and took enough pictures to fill two photo albums. He plans to edit the journal and put together an informational booklet for possible publications later.

Since moving to Rockcastle County five years ago, Rocky has not been hiking trails since the very first day, usually in the company of several of his dogs. (some brought home from walks in the woods...lost, sick and hungry...) and Rocky not having the heart to leave them behind, knowing they face an unkink and uncertain future. He wakes each day hoping he might be able to fit a little walk into the nearby countryside before his day is done. I have often been surprised to see his face light up when some free time is available and it is below zero, raining or snowing, or so hot the devil would refuse.

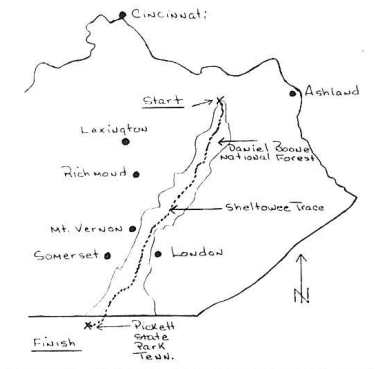

The journey finished - Rocky, Rockwell and pal Nick at Pickett State Park April 2, 1997.



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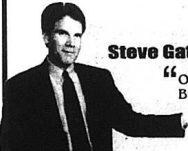

## Court votes to right ship, will lease up to \$200,000

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court began setting their house in order last Wednesday when they voted to lease up to \$200,000 to pay off debts in the general fund and jail fund during a special called meeting.

The court voted unanimously to lease the needed money from the lending institution where they could get the best rate.

The money will be repaid by the year 2000 with revenues generated by the recent tax levy on insurance premiums, according to Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis.

The leasing arrangement is being used by the court since borrowed money must be repaid by the end of the fiscal year (June 30) in which it is borrowed.

The money will enable the county

to balance their books and avoid any conflicts with the Department of Local Government in Frankfort when it comes to approving next year's budget.

Carlotis said that the county did not need the entire \$200,000 but decided to do the necessary paper work, so they would not have to keep having special meetings when money is needed. Carlotis also said that Wednesday's actions would also enable the court to have money available for capital projects.

## Orlando man crashes into Miller home

An Orlando man was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol after he literally drove his 1984 Ford pick-up into the home of Carl Miller Monday night.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas, Dennis Howard, 29, of Rt. 1, Orlando, lost control of his vehicle around 11:15 p.m. Monday on Brush Creek road and plowed into the stone home of Miller's which sits at the junction of Carpenter subdivision road and Hwy. 1004.

Thomas said that Anthony Barnett, 13, was lying on the couch in Miller's house, watching television when Howard's vehicle knocked an interior wall over on him.

Barnett was treated and released at the Rockcastle Hospital.

The deputy sheriff said Howard's vehicle left the roadway over 100 yards before it struck the Miller house.

Howard was lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

## Mullins found guilty of manslaughter

Last Thursday a Rockcastle County Circuit Court Jury found a Lexington man guilty of three counts of manslaughter.

The jury recommended a total sentence of 24 years or eight years on each count for Chester Mullins, 34, following the two day trial.

Mullins was convicted of killing an entire family from Ohio on July 3,

1996, on the Hwy. 461 by-pass.

According to court records Mullins drove his van into the path of the family's Suburban around midnight, killing C. Romie Schumaker, 38, his wife Cindy Schumaker, 40 and their son, Carl Justin, 9.

The couple's niece, Amanda Schumaker, 12, survived the crash. The young girl was the only one

wearing a seat belt and she received only minor injuries. She testified against Mullins during the trial.

According to assistant commonwealth attorney Mike Pratt, who prosecuted the case, Mullins had a blood-alcohol level of nearly three times the legal limit when the crash occurred.

Pratt said that a witness traveling with the family in another car, testi-

fied that Mullins never touched his brakes before hitting the Schumaker vehicle head-on after crossing the center line of the roadway.

Charles Mullins will be sentenced on May 9.

It was the first conviction for the Commonwealth Attorney's office in Rockcastle County this year.

In three other trials this year, one person was acquitted and two other cases ended in hung juries.

## Bailey indicted in break-in

A Mt. Vernon man was indicted Friday on two counts in connection with a break-in at the home of Roy and Judy Adams on Negro Creek Road on March 10.

Arthur Ansell Bailey, 19, was charged with criminal trespass and criminal mischief. He is currently lodged in the Rockcastle jail awaiting a April 25 arraignment.

## Johnson pleads guilty

A Mt. Vernon woman who pled guilty in federal court last year to breaking into the Brodhead Post Office, pled guilty last week to receiving stolen property.

Police arrested Tammy Johnson, 23, on March 24 of last year after they found a stolen handgun belonging to Brodhead Police Officer Joe Bussell in her possession.

## Hill to serve six months

A Lexington man will be sentenced on May 9 after he pled guilty to breaking into cars at the Rockcastle County High School on October 21 of last year.

Owen Hill, 19, of 1369 Dale Drive, will serve six months of a two and half year sentence. Charges are still pending against two other Lexington men charged in the case.

## Former editor dies after long illness

Raymond McClure, of Lovell Lane, Mt. Vernon, a life-long journalist, died Thursday in Danville. He was 75.

A native of Harlan, he grew up in Mt. Vernon and graduated from Mt. Vernon High School in 1941 and the University of Kentucky in 1950.

He was an army veteran of World War II, serving in 11 campaigns in the South Pacific.

He began his newspaper career reporting high school news for the *Mount Vernon Signal* where he later was editor for many years in the 1960s.

McClure was also editor of the *Whitley Republican* in Williamsburg and a correspondent for the *Lexington Herald-Leader* in the late 1950s.

He began his daily newspaper career, in 1950 at the *Daily Pantagraph* in Bloomington, Ill., which was partly owned by one-time U.S. presidential candidate, Adlai Stevenson.

McClure was also commercial manager and public relations director for Kentucky Telephone Company in London for four years, and in the late 1960s he was employed in the public relations department of the University of Kentucky.

In 1968 he joined the *South Bend Tribune* in South Bend, Indiana where he retired in 1984. After retirement, he worked part-time at the *Mount Vernon Signal* for nearly 13 years.

McClure always had a keen interest in city and county affairs and belonged to various civic clubs throughout the years.

He was a Kentucky Colonel and a member of the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs.

Robert King of Havasu Lake, California and by a brother, Grover C. Sowder Jr., of Camarillo, California, a nephew and three nieces.

McClure was preceded in death by his adoptive parents W.R. and

Ella Marie Glancy McClure. Services were conducted Sunday at Cox Funeral Home Chapel by Bro. Harvey Penso.

Interment was in the Pittsburg Cemetery in Laurel County.

For more than a month after moving into our new place, I Loretta and I slept on the pull out bed that folds up like an accordion and? our living room sofa. The notion was that we'd let one of the lods have our old water bed and purchase a new one for ourselves, when we moved into our new bedroom.

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## "Secret Commonwealth" composer visits Roundstone Elementary

On Friday, April 11, Roundstone Elementary School fifth graders were delighted with a visit from artist, musician and composer Daniel Dutton. Dutton's visit was the culminating activity for a nine-week Arts and Humanities Unit of Study in preparation for the KIRIS Assessment.

Dutton, a Somerset native, is the composer of the opera, *The Secret Commonwealth*. Loosely based on "Jack and the Beanstalk" and other folk and childhood stories and memories, *The Secret Commonwealth* was first produced in Somerset and then broadcast on Kentucky Educational Television (KET) in early 1997. Dutton performed some of his songs, shared costume designs and musical instruments used in the production. He also discussed the production process in creating *The Secret Commonwealth* while the students read critiques and reviews they had written using Dutton's opera as an example of incorporating art, music, dance and drama into one complete production.

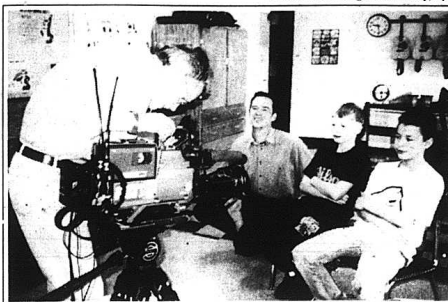
According to Norma Eversole, RES Arts and Humanities Unit Instructor, "We had already critiqued some works of art, dances, musical pieces and stories using the vocabulary in the Arts and Humanities Core Content when 'Commonwealth' aired on KET. We felt this production focused on all the arts components and elements of the core, including the Academic Expectations. Since it was a Kentucky-based production, the students could claim some ownership to the entire project. We used local artists and locally produced examples of the arts whenever possible." Dutton added, "Roundstone was the first school to respond to my opera. It's fantastic that they took this work and let it work for them as part of their unit of study. This is what I've hoped for since it was first produced."

Early in Dutton's career, he used some songs and stories in school residency programs before putting them all together to create the first part of *The Secret Commonwealth*.

After communicating with Dutton about his planned visit to RES, KET scheduled a taping session with Dutton and the students. Mary Ann

Mosley, program producer said, "KET is always looking at the way schools integrate our programming. Roundstone Elementary has piloted an excellent program and example of utilizing existing resources with their own goals and objectives. Our plans are to take this raw footage and develop it into a professional develop-

ment seminar to be broadcast in late September or early October." In closing his visit, Dutton told the students, "As you grow and continue to write, share your stories; paint, dance and sing. Always remember who you are and how you can use the familiar to create your own 'Secret Commonwealth'."

## Former Rockcastle resident lost at sea

Roy Lee Pickle, of Beaufort, North Carolina, formerly of Rural Retreat, Virginia and Berea, was one of the three crewmen lost aboard the commercial fishing vessel, Char-Lee II when it attempted to ride out a storm 70 miles SE of Cape Lookout, North Carolina on Monday, March 31.

The Coast Guard Search and Rescue Team of Elizabeth City, North Carolina, along with ships, planes and helicopters from Florida to Maine, assisted by the USS George Washington from Norfolk, Virginia and three of aircraft searched a 440,000 square-mile area but were unsuccessful in their attempt to find any trace of the crew or the boat. Their search was halted at 5:00 p.m. on April 8.

Roy Lee Pickle was born in Rural Retreat, Virginia, the oldest son of the late Lloyd L. Pickle and Nancy H. Pickle. The family moved to Berea. After school, Roy entered the army and served 2 tours of duty in Vietnam. He was a Staff Sergeant in the 82nd Airborne Division and made over 1000 jumps. At Fort Bragg, North Carolina, he was a Military Police. After leaving the military he

became a commercial fisherman. Roy has two sons, Alex and Victor, a grandson and a granddaughter in Fayetteville, North Carolina. His wife, Barbara and son, Joshua live in Beaufort, North Carolina. He has five brothers, in Kennebec, Lennie in Sand Gap, Sherwood in Frankfort, Kenny in Lexington, Gary in Big Hill and Michael in Berea. He has two sisters, Nancy Isaacs in Conway and Kitty Canterbury in Berea. He was preceded in death by his parents and one brother, Lloyd Bailey.

A memorial service will be held in Beaufort, North Carolina on April 20. A service celebrating his life is planned for May 10 at 2:00 p.m. at the Fairview Baptist Church in Rockcastle County. Contributions may be made to his six-year-old son, Hospice of Ky. River or the Gudeons to purchase Bibles.

Part of the funds to be leased by the county will be used to pay past due bills in the general fund and jail fund.

To date the county has almost \$40,000 in outstanding bills to house juvenile offenders. Those will be paid, as well as outstanding bills for food for the jail.

"One thing that will not be paid is a supposed \$80,000 medical bill for

inmate Charles Mullins. Apparently no such bill exists.

Rockcastle County Jailor Joe Howard said Tuesday that someone, namely, Judge Carlolufs, was mistaken about the bill he has referred to on several occasions.

"Charles Mullins had amassed \$73,000 of medical bills before he was ever indicted and put in jail here," Howard said.

"He has incurred some medical bills, but only a thousand or two since being held," Howard said.

"I think the Judge may have misled people into thinking the jail build- ing is mainly responsible, for the insurance tax, but that is not the case," the jailer said.

Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz agreed with Howard. "I pay all of the jail's bills and I've never received a medical bill for \$80,000 for Charles Mullins," Clontz said.

However Carlolufs said that he never indicated the insurance tax was passed because of Mullins' bill. "We still do not know how much we will be required to pay for him, but the jail and the general fund has plenty of other expenses that required the tax," Carlolufs said.

"With the loss of revenue from coal severance money and the increased county expenses for juve-

niles and dispatching, we had no choice but to pass the tax," Carlolufs said.

The Judge said that no actual money will be borrowed, it will be leased over a three year period. "This court will make sure any leased funds are paid back by the year 2000," he said.

"We are going to sit down with state officials and see exactly where we are, how much money the tax will bring in and what our pay back period will be. We are not going to leave another court embroiled in debt, like we were," Carlolufs said. The court will meet in regular session this month on April 22.

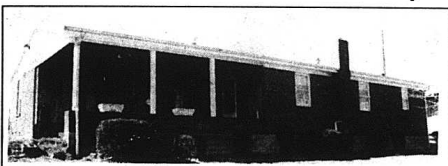

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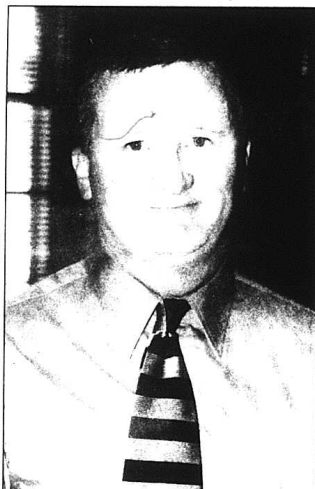

Southern added another run in the seventh to make it 7-5 and the Rockets went down in order to end the game.

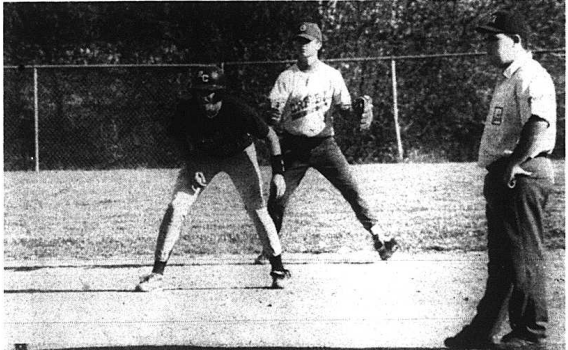
**Rockets 3 - Wayne Co. 2**

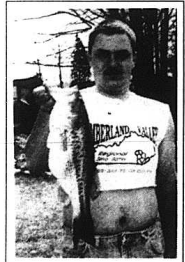

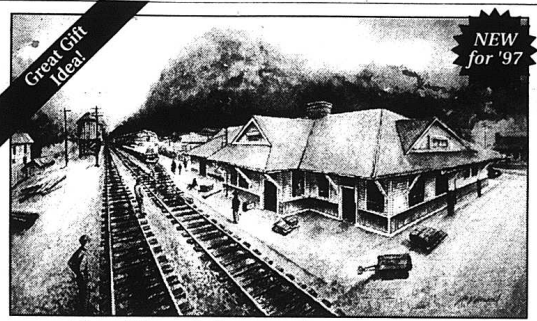
## Bradley named Beta Scholar

Beginning with the Class of 1998, Rockcastle County Seniors will be awarded Incentive Scholarships

(ROCKCASTLE INCENTIVE SCHOLARSHIP TRUST, R.I.S.T.) recognizing the hard work and perse-

verance they have shown during their middle school and high school careers. The dollar amount of the scholarships received will depend upon 1) the total number of points accumulated by the student during middle and high school, and 2) the number of Seniors receiving these scholarships that year.

ANY student who has 1) accumulated points and 2) been accepted into

a college (two or four year) or technical school by May 1 of the student's graduation year will receive an Incentive Scholarship.

The Incentive Scholarship Trust is unique in that ANY student that puts forth effort can receive a scholarship. Any graduating Rockcastle County Senior has the ability to be accepted into a college (two or four year) or a technical school. The ma-

majority of the activities that earn points for students require only dedication and commitment.

At the beginning of each school year, students will receive a list of activities that qualify for points. Student can earn points for such things as perfect attendance, academic achievement, taking college entrance exams and community service. Parents can earn points for their children by attending activities such as parent-teacher and open house meetings.

points for that year. Point Sheets will be verified by school personnel.

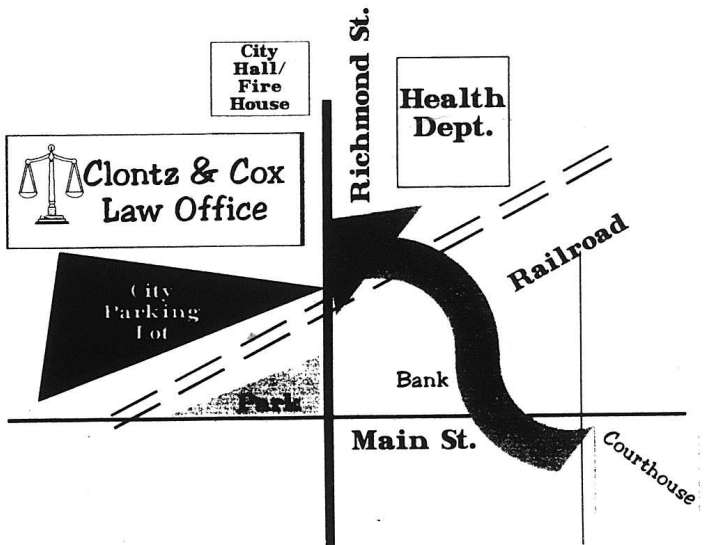

would be a necessity. If the stream were headed toward a large waterfall, for example, swimming upstream would definitely be a good idea.

Going against the flow is difficult whether in Rough Creek or in the stream of life. It is much easier to go along with what everyone else thinks and says.

This would be OK if the people around us always made the right choices. Unfortunately, they don't. Sometimes one must swim upstream against the current of public opinion in order to do what he or she thinks is right.

Swimming against the current might mean voicing an unpopular opinion on a crucial issue. The clearest example in my lifetime is probably the civil rights movement of the 1960s. Both blacks and whites were jeered, mocked, shot at and killed when they marched for the rights of blacks in the United States. Being pro-civil rights was not a popular position in most areas of the south, and yet some people had the courage to swim upstream against the flow of public opinion.

Human rights are still threatened in the United States and around the world. As long as there is discrimination, prejudice and inequality of opportunity, some of us need to swim upstream.

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## The Family Room

### Sometimes It Is Necessary To Be Different

My father and I did a lot of fishing when I was growing up. We fished in bar pits (huge holes in the ground from which the coal had been taken) and in Rough Creek. We fished with poles, rods, trotlines and nets. Sometimes we had good luck and sometimes we didn't.

My favorite was fishing with nets. The circular hoops covered with netting allowed the fish to get in but they couldn't escape. We once pulled thirty-five fish out of one net, ranging in size from two pounds to twenty-five pounds. When we dumped that net in the boat, we had fish everywhere.

Before the dam was built (now at Rough River State Park), Rough Creek would run full and rough after the spring rains. It would regularly flood the bottom-land that surrounded

it and force us out of the fishing business for awhile.

When Rough Creek was running swift and strong, paddling upstream was a major task. Dad and I would wade furiously to move twenty feet upstream. If we slackened off for even a moment, the current pushed us back.

I often wondered what it would be like to try to swim in the creek when it was running bank-full like that. I was not that good a swimmer, so I decided that the only thing to do would be to float along with the current.

"Swimming upstream" would be out of the question. The strong current and accumulated junk that had washed off the banks would make even the strongest swimmer think twice about going against the current.

Yet it occurred to me that on some occasions "swimming upstream"

 Clovers Mean More  
 Profit for  
 Livestock Producers

Growing clover gives livestock producers a win-win situation through increased animal performance and decreased production expenses.

Since clovers provide higher nutrition levels when compared to grasses they help overcome nutrition as the primary limiting factor to profitability on livestock farms. Better nutrition means more milk production, higher weaning weights, and an increased likelihood of higher reproductive efficiency. These factors have a positive effect on gross income.

Growing clovers produces higher forage quality that leads to improved animal performance. Clovers usually are higher in crude protein and digestibility than grasses. Clovers also have higher levels of minerals and vitamins and are digested more rapidly than grasses. The end result is better animal performance.

Clovers also help reduce production costs by lowering nitrogen fertilizer expenses, which typically account for 20-40% of the cost of producing forages from grasses. Clovers also can obtain atmospheric nitrogen and "fix" it to nodules on plant roots. Nitrogen fixation represents a value of \$25 to \$100 per acre per year. This value can more than offset the cost of establishing clover stands.

primary strategy beef cow-calf producers used to cope with the tall fescue endophyte. The presence of clovers in animals' diets helps reduce grass toxicity.

Seeding clover in mid-April will require more management to assure a productive stand. Seed to soil contact is a must. At this time of year the best equipment for the job is using No-Till seeders. The Rockcastle Soil Conservation District has a new drill located at Mt. Vernon Produce and rents for

per acre rate. The second important factor in keeping a new stand will be controlling the grass competition. Grazing grass top growth off to prevent shading new seedlings will be needed. Rotational grazing will be needed to prevent cattle from grazing the young clover as well. And last but not least, adequate phosphorus, potash and lime is needed. We suggest you do NOT use nitrogen because of increased competition and shading by established grass.

Federal regulations have recently been changed for farms that are enrolled in AMTA and are involved in a farm reconstitution (division). AMTA farms cannot be combined with non-participating farms, so under the new regulation if an AMTA farm ends up with less than 1,000 pounds of tobacco it may be exempt from the 1000 pound rule regulation which will allow the farm to keep its tobacco base.

## Agricultural News

Warden Alexander, Director Producers who raise tobacco on their farm should be aware that tobacco undermarketings (pounds that you were short) can only be carried over for ONE year. If you do not sell the amount of your undermarketings the next preceding year, they will be lost the next crop year. Producers who lease extra poundage to their farm should be aware of this situation.

Burley tobacco quotas will be dropped on farms that have not leased away or produced their quota in two of the last three years. Farms in danger of this situation were notified on their tobacco notices that there may not be sufficient P&CP (planted and considered planted) credit to maintain the quota. To save your quota you must do one of the following

before July 1: Produce your tobacco or lease away your quota. Producers may also sell quota if they wish to do so. If you have any questions, you may call the office.

Producers who are enrolled in the Production Flexibility Program (AMTA) and have made changes in tenants, shares, etc. should revise their contract accordingly. Producers who have not made changes in their contract do not need to sign a new one unless some of the shares were UNDESIGNATED. Please be advised advanced payments were made for Fiscal Year 1997 in Dec. 1996 and Jan. 1997. Final payments will be made by Sept. 30, 1997.

Producers may sign up to have their program payments made through direct deposit. This method simply allows FSA to put money in your

## 4-H Camp experience benefits young people

Imagine a young person learning to paddle a canoe for the first time under the watchful eye of a trained supervisor with the Kentucky 4-H program.

Now imagine another learning to swim with the assistance of a certified swimming instructor. See the gleam in his eye as he comes to believe "I can" rather than "I cannot." Now imagine 10,000 Kentucky youth learning new skills in many fields such as archery, athletics and crafts as they meet new friends and participate in many other youth activities.

You've just imagined what will be reality for young people who will attend this year's 4-H summer camp program at one of five 4-H camps in Kentucky. The one week camps begin just after school ends in May and

continue through July or August depending on the camp.

"These young people will learn and develop skills in leadership, cooperation and responsibility," said Dwight Crum, Extension 4-H specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "But camp is not just a learning experience. It's also a fun time, a time for young people to become reacquainted with friends from previous years and to meet new ones."

The camps are located near Carlisle, Rush, London, Jabez and Dawson Springs. They range in size from 175 to 1,200 acres and all have modern facilities, including cabins, dining halls, swimming pools, lakes for canoeing and fishing, athletic fields and ranges for archery and

shooting sports.

More than 3,000 volunteers help direct the youth program, Crum said. Each camp also is staffed with emergency medical technicians, certified life guards and instructors for nature, recreation and crafts.

"Young people don't have to be 4-H members to attend camp," Crum said. "In fact many go on to become members of 4-H after they attend their first camp."

4-H Camp for Rockcastle campers will be June 16-20 at J.M. Feltnor Camp in London.

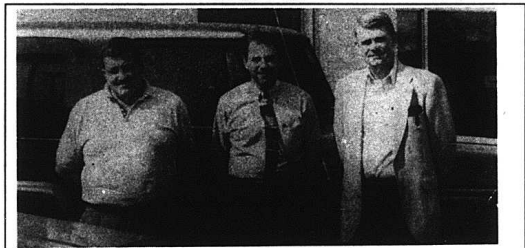
