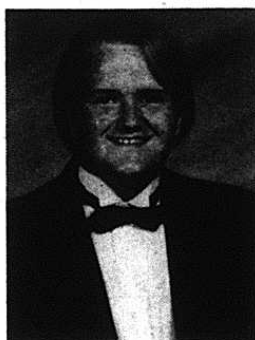

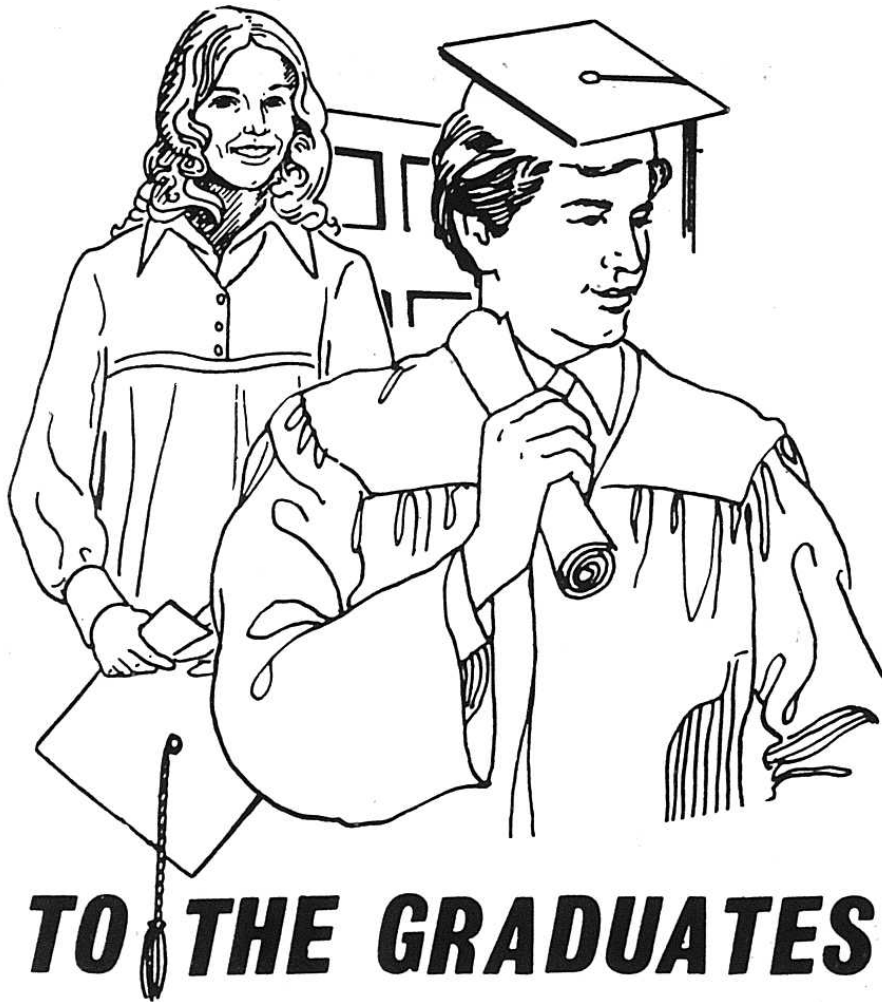

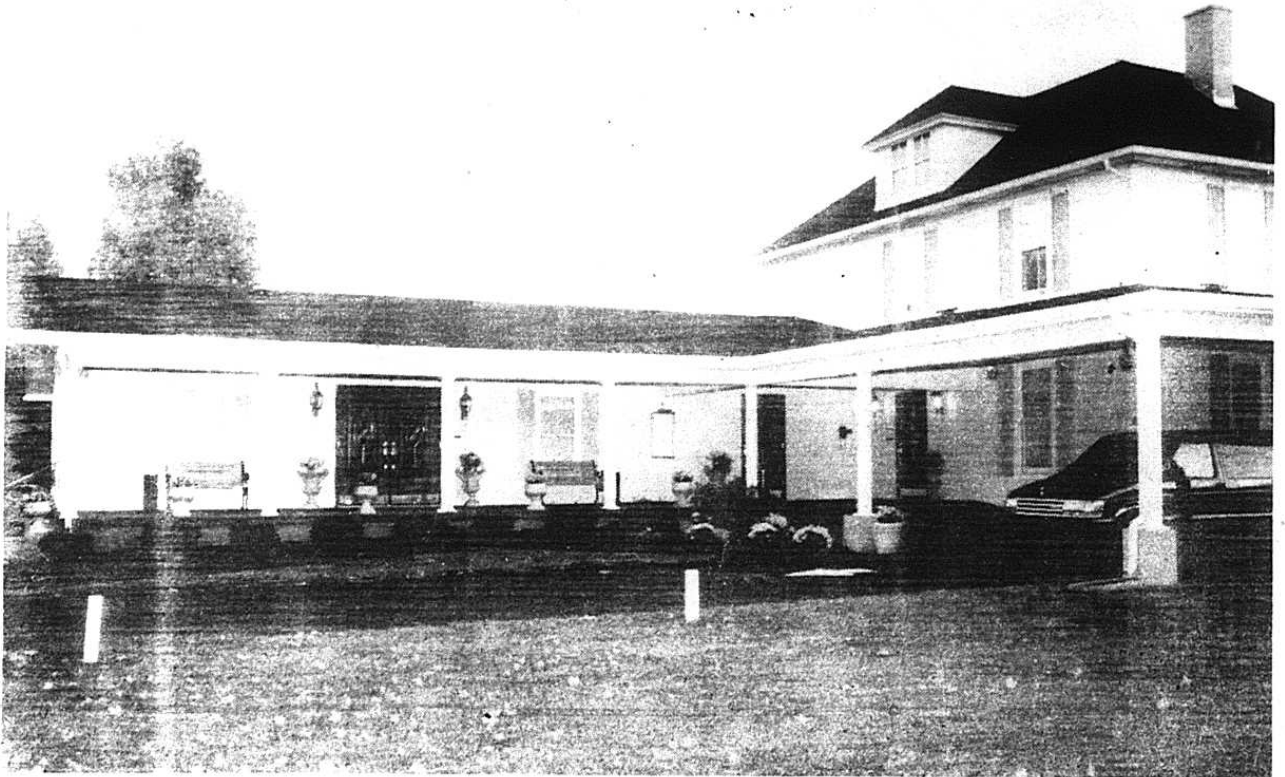

Rockcastle County School Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith will present the diplomas.

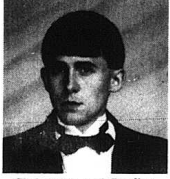
The awards ceremony for the Silver Anniversary class will take place at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, in the school auditorium.

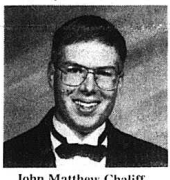

### Access to obscene material discussed at length

The Rockcastle County Board of Education voted Tuesday night to allow paddling to take place in Rockcastle County schools.

In a unanimous vote the board paved the way for each of the county's Site Based Decision Making Councils to decide whether they want to spank their students.

Although Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry B. Hammond had already placed a recommendation for approval of corporal punishment on the agenda, several community members voiced their support for the measure.

A show of hands of the standing room only crowd, indicated that virtually everyone in attendance was in favor of the policy change.

The change in policy had been requested by Rockcastle County Middle School Principal John Hale.

Parents speaking for the measure included Mike Renner, Carolyn Hunt, Maleigha Amyx and Darlene Matekovich. Middle school teacher Gerald Alexander, as well as local preachers, Don Stayton and Eddie Hammond asked the board to pass

the measure. They also told the board they thought many parents would dodge corporal punishment by not signing a consent to spank form included in the Superintendent's recommendation. Hammond said he thought the parents of the children that needed spanking the most would probably be the ones that did not give their permission.

All of the board members, Chairman Dr. G. W. Griffith, Terry Burton, Dwight Griffin, Sherry Isaacs and Teresa Boles said they were in favor of the measure and in favor of it being more strict, but they agreed in the end that the board would have to shield themselves from possible litigation by using the consent form.

Hammonds told the board and the crowd that well prepared teachers could eliminate a lot of disciplinary problems and that corporal punishment would simply give principals one more option in trying to deal with discipline problems.

Hammond said that parents should be aware that paddling would not take the place of suspension when such an instance occurred requiring the extreme measure.

The Superintendent's recommendation basically mirrored a request by Middle School Principal John Hale with only a few changes.

Superintendent Hammond told the board that elementary principals and RCHS principal Ronnie Cash said they did not know if corporal punishment was actually needed in their schools, but it will be left up to each site based council.

Site based councils can water down the policy, but they cannot make it more stringent than what the board passed.

The new corporal punishment policy states:

**Definition:** Corporal punishment shall refer to the deliberate infliction of physical pain by any means upon the whole or any part of a student's body as a punishment or penalty for misbehavior.

**Application:** Corporal punishment shall be administered by striking the student's buttocks with a paddle. No other form of corporal punishment may be administered.

### Use of Physical Restraint:

Employees may use within the scope of their employment, such physical restraint as may be reasonable and necessary to protect themselves, students or others from physical injury, to obtain possession of a weapon or other dangerous object under the control of a student, or to protect property from serious harm.

**Parental Notification:** Parents will be notified by phone prior to administering corporal punishment or notification will be mailed by principal or his designee within two (2) school days following the use of corporal punishment. The notification shall be by certified mail, return receipt required.

**Who Can Administer:** Corporal punishment may be administered by the Principal Only and only in the presence of another certified employee of the same gender and race as the student being punished, except when a staff member of the appropriate gender and race is not assigned to the school.

**Reasons:** Prior to punishment, and in the presence of the student, the principal shall state the reasons for the punishment. (Cont. to A10)

## Corrections Cabinet threatens to close down county jail

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court was put on notice Monday to either continue with the renovation of the county jail or face the possibility of it being closed.

Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotts told the magistrates during a special called meeting that he had been notified by the Kentucky Department of Corrections that they would close the county jail if phases two and three of the renovation project were not completed.

Carlotts said the county could not afford to let the jail close and must move toward completing the project.

Rockcastle County Jailor Joe Howard told magistrates the project could cost around \$225,000, but Carlotts said he thought Howard's estimate was high.

The Judge/Executive said that jail architect Jim Woodrum was sending renovation plans to him immediately and that he also did not think the cost

would be that great.

Carlotts said the court must have a Plan of Corrective Action ready for the Corrections Department by June 8 and he hoped the court would be ready to pass such a plan at their May 29th regular meeting.

The Judge and Howard agreed that it would be much more costly for the county to let the jail close than renovate to state standards.

Currently the jail houses 27 to 30 county prisoners a day. If they were

housed in another jail it would cost the county approximately \$300,000 a year besides the cost of transporting them back and forth.

Carlotts presented letters to the

magistrates that stated the corrections cabinet would seek an order in Franklin Circuit Court to enforce the closing of the jail if work is not completed. The court took no action during the meeting.

### Local man injured

A Brindle Ridge man lost his left thumb in a mowing accident Monday afternoon.

Wayne Lear, 68, was mowing a bank in his yard when his riding mowing apparently began to turn over, according to his daughter Millie Eaton.

Mr. Lear probably tried to stop the mower from turning completely

over and his left hand was struck by the mowing blade, Mrs. Eaton said.

Mr. Lear was taken to Rockcastle Hospital and later flown to Jewish Hospital in Louisville where he spent ten hours in reconstructive surgery. However Mrs. Eaton, who said her father is right handed, said that doctors were unable to save his thumb.

### Hammond reinstates bus driver

A Rockcastle County bus driver, who was suspended in March after being charged with a moving violation in Danville while returning from a field trip to Frankfort, has gotten his job back.

Driver Jack Stallsworth had pled not guilty to the charge of failure to stop at a railroad crossing, and on April 23 charges against him were dismissed in Boyle District Court.

Stallsworth had contended he did not stop because his bus would have been hit by another bus coming up from behind him too fast.

The other driver, Garner Brown, was relieved of his duties.

Superintendent Larry Hammond notified the board of education on Tuesday night that Stallsworth had returned to work on April 24.

## Local library board gets "Outstanding" award

## Points East

Last week I spent the better part of two days in a symposium put together by several folks at the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP). The meeting focused on what is apt to happen to impoverished people as a result of welfare reform and also touched on the fact that thousands of coal mining jobs are being lost every year.

A parade of speakers—experts in such fields as health care, education, economic development, housing, religion, telecommunications, social services, politics, demographics and so forth—generally agreed that the mountains are on the verge of a major crisis. What happens to single mothers and their children when they are no longer eligible for food-stamps, Aid for Dependent Children, and medical care? In the Appalachian counties alone, we are talking about more than 50,000 people.

What happens to families who have been dependent on high-paying jobs in the coal industry when those jobs are no longer there? And they're falling like flies in a cold spell all over the mountains.

The fact of the matter is that there are no easy answers. The very premise of welfare reform is to get people off public support and into the work force which is really a great idea except for one thing. There aren't any jobs for folks in the work force if they expect to work in eastern Kentucky.

Every time a mine closes a grocery store, clothing store, bank and even local government is affected. The same is true with welfare reform. When you take welfare payments and food stamps out of the economy, every business in the community is affected. Which means they have to start laying people off too. And folks are trying to be awfully painful for far

more people than just welfare recipients.

Out-migration isn't even much of an option. The midwestern factories are employing fewer and fewer people and more and more machines. Without sophisticated training in new technology there's no longer much hope of leaving home and finding a job that one can afford to live on.

It's easy enough to say that we need to be concentrating on economic development and there are a few bright spots that indicate some hope for an economic base of sorts to de-

velop around the timber industry and maybe a bit in tourism. But not nearly enough nor nearly as fast as we are going to need it. And both of those industries are rife with the potential for worker and environmental abuse.

I don't pretend to know what we're going to do because there are no simple solutions. But I can tell you for sure that we'd better start thinking about it right now. I am not prone in being a doom-sayer but it seems pretty obvious to me that a major crisis is already on the horizon.

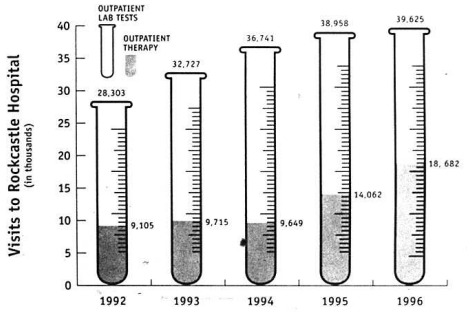

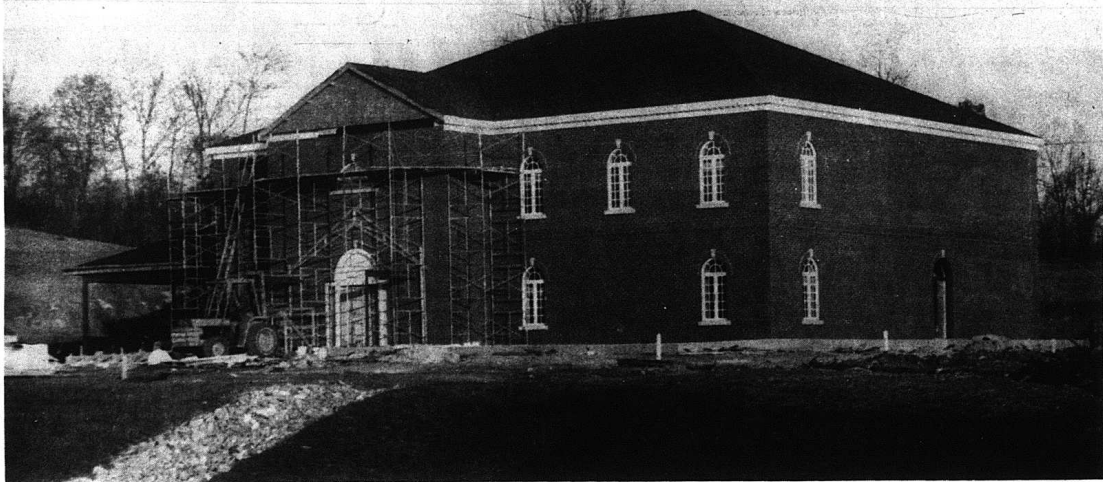

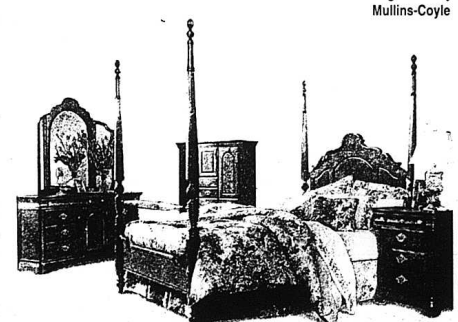

## Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, Director

Crop reports will be taken now through July 15. Producers will be receiving postcards through the mail with a designated week for their certification. Producers who have crops planted prior to their scheduled week may come in earlier to do their reports, but all crops MUST BE PLANTED prior to filing your report. Producers are urged to call FSA at 256-2525 as soon as crops are planned to schedule a time at their convenience as soon as all crops are planned. Burley tobacco producers are advised to file a crop report, since this will serve as a record of farm production for disaster leasing and production history.

Youth who are involved in 4-H, FFA, or other similar activities may be eligible to receive needed funding

to develop income producing projects through FSA's Ag Credit program. Loans of up to \$5000 are available to assist youth in financing the times which are necessary to establish their project. Loan repayments will be scheduled to coincide with the project's income schedule.

EQIP Conservation money is to be allocated soon to counties. We are keeping a list of producers who have inquired about cost share money for the EQIP practices. If you wish to be added to this list, please contact the FSA office.

Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt tolerant vegetation and shallow water acres for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under the CRP continuous sign-up. For more information phone us at 256-2525.

Producers are reminded that farms which do not have a history of leasing and/or growing their tobacco quota 2 out of 3 preceding years will result in a dropped quota. Farms in danger have been notified and should take action.

The following are some of the FSA deadlines that are coming up: Planting deadlines for FCIC insured crops are May 31 for corn, June 30 for tobacco. Tobacco leasing deadline is July 1; Crop reporting and FCIC reinsured deadline is July 15.

The Rockcastle Farm Service Agency and Natural Resources Conservation Services Offices will be closed Monday, May 26, in observance of Memorial Day.

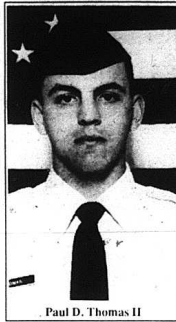
## Thomas graduates from basic training

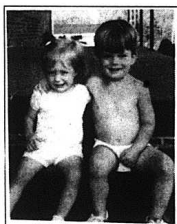

# Rockets beat Corbin 6-2; Durham pitches no-hitters

The Rockcastle Rockets won four of their last six games, beating mighty Corbin 6-2 and losing to Madison Southern 2-1 and to the Wayne Co. Cardinals 11-4. The Madison Southern loss was especially heartbreaking since senior George Durham pitched a no-hitter but saw his effort go down the loss column from two consecutive runs.

The only Rockets run came off a solo home run by Marcus Reppert.

Members of the team include Sergeant First Class Kristen Cobb, Staff Sergeant Shaun Jones, First Sergeant Kyle Kirby and First Lieutenant Kris Taylor, who also received first place in the Individual Sport category against 63 others.

JROTC students started the weekend event on Friday, getting a glimpse of military life by staying overnight in the barracks at Fort Knox.

On Saturday, the team watched a drill competition team and later competed against 16 other teams at Knox Central High School.

In the match, students were required to shoot from three different positions: standing, kneeling, and

prone (lying down). From each position they shot at 10 targets from 33 feet away.

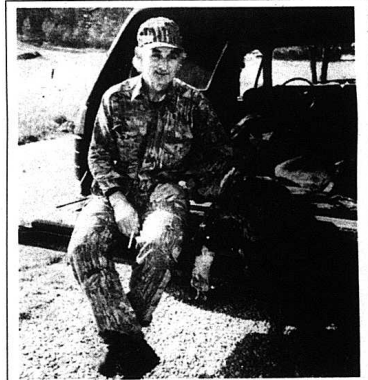
Each target was worth up to ten points, making each position worth 100 points, and each individual score up to 300 points. The RCHS team had a score of 893 points.

presence of the witness, the student shall be informed of the reason for the punishment and permitted to give his/her account of the incident or infraction.

**Other Pupils Not Present**  
Corporal punishment shall not be

administered in the presence of other students.

**Last Resort:**  
Corporal punishment is a last resort to be utilized only after other disciplinary means have been tried and found to be ineffective. Prior to exhibiting the misbehavior resulting in corporal punishment, the student shall have been made aware that the misbehavior could result in corporal punishment.

**Not Excessive:**  
Corporal punishment shall not be excessive or unreasonably. Among the factors to be considered shall be the age, size and health of the student.

**Required Parental Permission:**  
Written parental permission to administer corporal punishment shall be on file in the school office prior to the administration of corporal punishment on the student. If parental permission is not on file, other appropriate punishment shall be administered in lieu of corporal punishment.

**Required Records:**  
Each use of corporal punishment shall be documented by a written record that includes the student's name and age, the name and the gender of the person administering the punishment and the name and gender of the witness.

The written record shall also include a complete description of the circumstances requiring this punishment, including the misbehaviors for which the punishment was administered, the severity of the punishment recorded by the number of strikes administered. The Principal who administers the punishment, as well as the official witnesses, shall provide written verification of this information.

Each school shall maintain all corporal punishment records that may be required by law.

**Students With Disabilities:**  
In cases which involve students with disabilities, the procedures mandated by federal and state law shall be followed.

Currently 50 schools in Kentucky administer corporal punishment, although the Kentucky School Board Association recommends they do not.

### Internet blockers discussed by board

The board also discussed at length obscene material and the Internet.

Many of the same parents voiced their concern about students ability to access obscene material on the Internet in the county schools.

Parents told the board they should obtain blockers that would keep students from accessing pornography and that such services were available at no cost to the school system.

Carolyn Hunt said that she knew for a fact that students were not always supervised at Brodhead School before school and after that and that concerned her that her daughter might be exposed to the obscene material on the Internet.

Jeff Boling, husband of board member Teresa Boling, who has voiced her strong opposition to the school system's lack of blockers, told the board that Proxy Servers were available to the school system that would be very effective in blocking obscene material.

Bible Baptist Pastor Don Stoyton said he knew no board member wanted any child to be exposed to the pornography on the Internet. Parent Mike Renner said his children, who are in high school, said other students were accessing the material there.

Stoyton also told the board that state officials were not blocking any of the obscene material on the Internet.

The Rockcastle County School System, along with many others in the state, uses the State Department of Education as their Internet provider.

Stoyton said that anyone who thought the state was blocking anything on the Internet was mistaken. After discussion on the matter, the board agreed to discuss the matter at the June and July meeting and make a decision probably in June, according to chairman Griffith.

Griffith said he appreciated the large attendance at the meeting and hoped more people would come to the board meetings and contribute their thoughts.

Superintendent Hammond said if

the board made a decision to use the blockers, no vote, only a directive would be needed and it would be in place by the beginning of school in August.

involved in vandalism at Hummel. Smith's made the offer on Wednesday after the Merritt Cemetery was vandalized sometime last week.

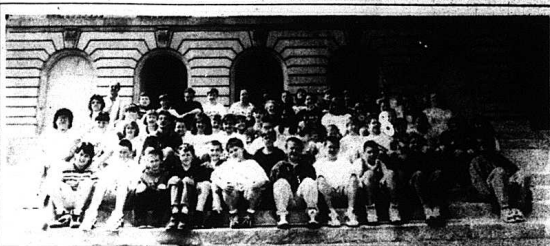

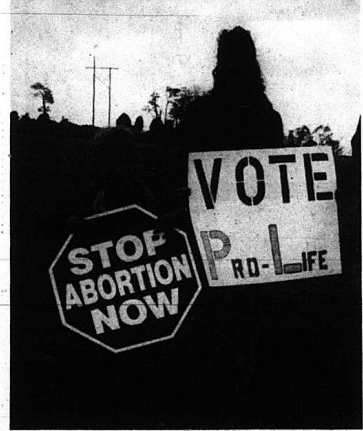
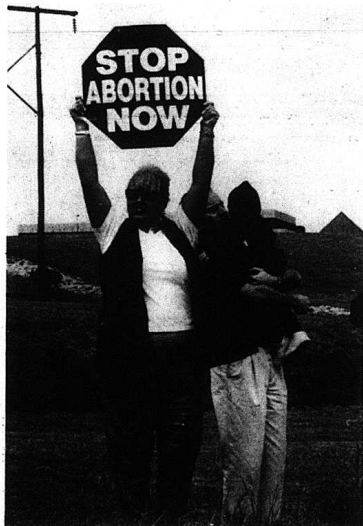

## Ninety people participate in Life Chain

More than ninety people gathered Sunday afternoon to observe the third annual Mother's Day Life Chain, sponsored by the Rockcastle Right to Life organization. That is an increase of more than thirty over last year's Life Chain. Nine different churches and three counties were represented in the group. The group ranged in age from at least one preborn, to several school-age children and teens, to some sixty five-plus adults, to at least one "eightyish" elder. Three pastors, one from each of the counties represented, participated in the event.

Brother David Carr, a name well known to listeners to WTHL, 90.5 FM, in Somerset, gave the invocation to begin the Life Chain event. His son, Justin Carr, also in attendance, had the presence of mind to get a rough count of the vehicles passing by the Life Chain demonstration. Approximately 750 vehicles passed by during the one hour that the event lasted. Of those, 145 passersby gave waves and signs of approval and support. Only two responses were negative.

Standing with banners, posters and signs declaring the sanctity and value of human life, these demonstrators hoped to encourage more people to abandon their apathy and inaction toward the abortion issue. The peaceful effort of these demonstrators stands in vivid contrast to the violence and destruction which is the essence of the abortion industry, a business which destroys approximately 1.3 million human lives each year. One purpose of the Life Chain is to change peacefully, the law of our nation which now allow babies in the mother's womb, up until the time of natural birth, to be torn limb from limb and decapitated; or scalded alive by saline injections; or possibly have their skulls punctured and their brains literally sucked out. 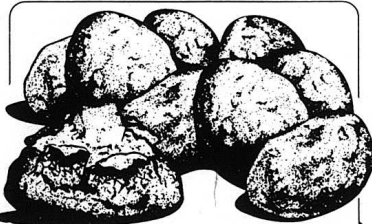

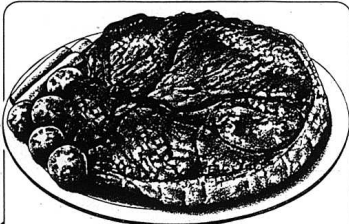

grandmother died in what was then called the "insane asylum." She may have had manic-depression.

Most families can find at least some form of mental illness in the family tree. It is not something of which to be ashamed. The stigma that has been attached to these kinds of illness is not as strong as it once was.

The "insane asylum" is gone, replaced by hospitals and treatment centers. Mental illness is not a sign of weakness nor a symptom of sin. It is an illness just as much as diabetes and cancer.

Finding out about the prevalence of mental illness helped John to feel better. "I guess I'm not as alone as I thought I was," he remarked. "I've even discovered that my grandfather and one of my aunts also suffered from depression."

If half of all Americans suffer from mental illness at some point, this means that there are a large number of sufferers who are not getting help. They feel ashamed or do not understand what is happening to them, so they suffer in silence, not realizing that help is available. Physicians and counselors now know how to treat depression and other such illnesses. No one has to suffer alone and untreated.

As Cecelia said, "I'm just thankful my husband talked me into getting help. If he hadn't, I might not be alive today."

## The Family Room

Half of All Americans Will Suffer Mental Illness

"Why me?" Cecelia asked. (All characters are fictitious.) "Why am I the only one in my family who has ever been diagnosed with manic-depression?" Everybody else seems healthy."

John wondered the same thing. "All my friends seem so well-adjusted, and I struggle just to get out of bed in the mornings," he declared. "Why am I the only one who suffers from depression?"

Stephen asks a similar question. "Other people drink and don't get addicted," he said. "Why do I have to be the one who becomes an alcoholic? None of my friends have this problem."

A recent study financed by the federal government shows that Cecelia, John and Stephen are not alone as they think. The study found mental illness more common than researchers had previously thought.

According to this study ALMOST HALF OF AMERICANS EXPERI-

ENCE MENTAL ILLNESS AT SOME TIME IN THEIR LIVES. Almost one-third are afflicted in any given year.

Headed by Ron Kessler, a professor at the University of Michigan, this study involved interviews with 8,098 people ages 15 to 54. The researchers looked for fourteen of the most common mental illnesses, including depression, manic-depression, alcohol and drug dependence, anxiety and panic disorders. Forty-eight percent of those interviewed had suffered from one of these illnesses at some point in their lives.

Some people experience multiple disorders. An anxiety disorder can lead to drinking which can lead to depression. Sometimes it is difficult for the counselor or physician to know which to treat first.

I visited with some of my family over the past weekend and listened as they talked about our family history. Depression, manic-depression, bulimia and alcohol dependence have all been a part of my family. My great



## "IT IS WRITTEN"

There is an important Bible topic that we would like to consider for a few moments today. It is the subject of Holy Spirit baptism. May we look honestly into this and let God speak on this subject as we open the word of God.

Let me begin by first affirming that there are only two historical cases of Holy Spirit baptism found in the New Testament: the apostles in Acts 2 and Cornelius and his group in Acts 10.

Observe what Jesus promised the apostles in Acts 1:4-5: "And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water, but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence."

In Acts 2:1-4 we read of the fulfillment of this promise ten days after Jesus spoke in Acts chapter 1 that the apostles were baptized with the Holy Ghost. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance." Notice in these verses the pronouns "they," who is the "they?" Well the antecedent of "they" is the apostles in Acts 1:26. Those who spoke were Galileans Acts 2:7, the apostles were all Galileans, Acts 1:11. Notice in Acts 2:14, "But Peter, standing up with the eleven, lifted up his voice, and said unto them, Ye men of Judaea, and all ye that dwell at Jerusalem, be ye known unto you, and hearken to my words."

The passage did not say Peter standing up with the one hundred and nineteen, "but Peter, standing up with the eleven." Thus we must conclude that only the apostles were baptized with the Holy Ghost here on the day of Pentecost.

One more observation, in Acts 2:2 it said of the apostles, "and it filled all the house where they were sitting." You don't read of them seeking, praying, anointing, going to be altar, laying on of hands in order to get baptized in the Holy Ghost; but they were sitting when they were and baptized with the Holy Ghost. For Christ is the one who did the baptizing of them in the Holy Ghost. Next week we shall look at Cornelius and his group in Acts 10.

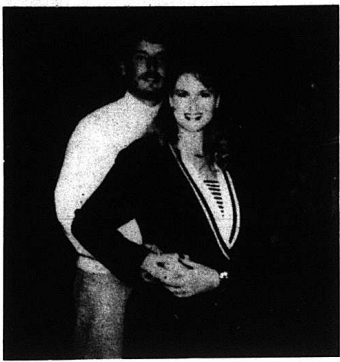

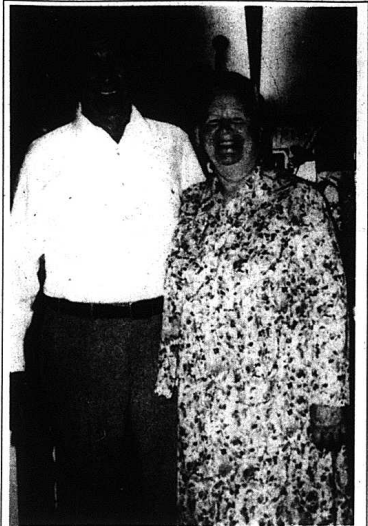

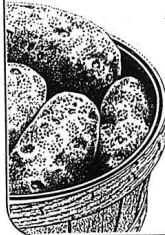

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON WATER AND SEWER RATE ORDINANCE**

**Whereas:** The Livingston City Commission deems it necessary and advisable to amend its Water and Sewer Rate Ordinance, to increase applicable water rates in order to enable The City to offset Rate Increase by Wood Creek Water Dist., and other expense.

**NOW THEREFORE BE ORDAINED** by Livingston City Commission as follows:

**Section One:** Amendment of section one of Water and Sewer Rate Ordinance as follows.

**Section Two:** That there shall be and there are hereby established from and after the effective date of this Ordinance, monthly rates and charges for the use of and the services rendered by the municipal water works of the City as follows:

**A. MONTHLY WATER RATES.**

Number of Gallons Per Month	Monthly Charge Per 1,000
For the first 2,000 gallons or less	\$6.75
For the next 5,000 gallons or less	\$13.50 minimum bill
For the next 3,000 gallons or less	\$5.50
For all over 10,000 gallons	\$4.30
	\$3.60

The minimum water bill shall be \$13.50 per month, and each water customer shall be entitled to 2,000 gallons (or less) of water in each month for such minimum charge

**B. MONTHLY SEWER RATES.**  
The rates and charges for sewer service shall be based insofar as possible upon the quantity of water supplied each month to the respective premises and shall REMAIN Ninety Percent (90%) of the monthly water bill determined by the above water rates. The minimum sewer bill shall be \$12.15 per month.

**Section Three:** All provisions of the Water and Sewer Rate Ordinance not specifically amended in this Ordinance, are hereby reenacted and reaffirmed and made a part hereof as if copied in full herein.

**Section Four:** This rate increase will become effective May 20, 1997

**Section Five:** This ordinance shall be adopted and published pursuant to required law.
