



The change in policy had been requested by Rockeastie County Middle School Principal John Hale.

Prennts speaking for the measure included Mike Renner, Carolyn Hunt, Maleigha Amyx and Darlene Matkowich, Middle school teacher Gerald Alexander, as well as local preachers, Don Suyton and Eddie Hammond asked the board to pass

the measure. They also told the board they thought many parents would dodge corporal punishment by not signing a consent to spank form included in the Superintendent's recommendation. Hammond said he thought the parents of the children that needed spanking the most would probably be the ones that did not give their permission.

that needed spanking the most would that needed spanking the most what do not give their permission. All of the board members, Chairman Dr. G. W. Griffith, Terry Burton, Dwight Griffith, Sherry Isaces and Teresa Boling said they were in favor of the measure and in favor of it being more strict, but they agreed in the end that the board would have to shield themselves from possible litigation by using the consent form. Hammonds told the board and the crowd that well prepared teachers could climinate a lot of disciplinary problems and that corporal punishment would simply give principals one more option in tying to deal with discipline problems. Hammond said that parents should be aware that padding would not take the place of suspension when such an instance occurred requiring the extreme measure.

Superintendent Hammond told the board that elementary principals and RCHS principal Romie Cash said they did not know if corporal punishment was actually needed in their schools, but it will be left up to each site based council.

Site based council can water down the policy, but they cannot make it more stringent than what the board passed.

Corporal punishment shall refer to the deliberate infliction of physical pain by any means upon the whole or any part of a student's body as a punishment or penalty for misbehavior.

Use of Physical Restraint:

Some point in their lives.

Some people experience multiple disorders. An anxiety disorder can lead to drinking which can lead to depression. Sometimes it is difficult for the counselor or physician to know which to treat first.

I visited with some of my family over the past weekend and listened as they talked about our family history Depression, manic-depression bulimia and alcohol dependence have all been a part of my family. My great

grandmother died in what was then called the "insane asylum." She may have had manic-depression. Most familises can find at least some form of mental illness in the family tree. It is not something of which to be ashamed. The stigmath as been attached to these kinds that seen attached to these kinds of illnesses is not as strong as it once was. The "insane asylum" is gone, replaced by hospitals and treatment centers. Mental illness is not a signor weakness nor a symptom of sin. It is an illness just as much as-diabetes and cancer.







As you go your separate ways, I would wish you much success in achieving those goals you have set in the world beyond the confines of Rockcastle County High School.


