

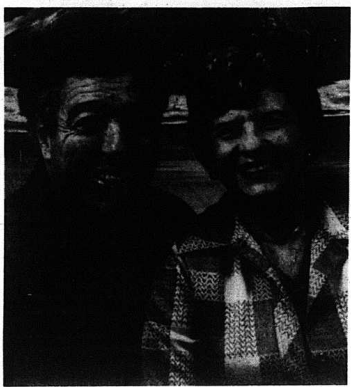

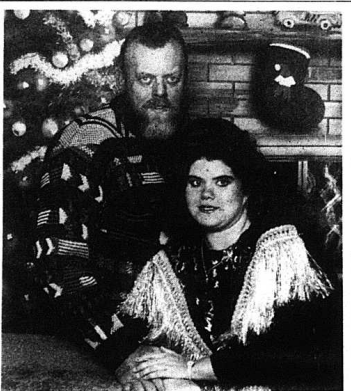

Water project could start by end of summer

There is hope this week for the Rockcastle Water Association's \$1.7 million dollar water line extension project.
During a meeting last week to discuss water, the association decided to seek a water users agreement with Western Rockcastle Water Association.
For months the association had tried to obtain such an agreement with the City of Mt. Vernon, but because Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer says the water plant is pumping at capacity no such agreement was ever signed, therefore holding up the water line extension project.
Representatives from the water association, the City of Mt. Vernon, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and Farmer's Home Administration met Friday to discuss how to get a water users agreement for 21,000 gallons of water a day for 150 customers in

the Pongo, Sand Springs, and Buffalo areas of the county.
Vernon Brown and Doug Moore of Rural Community Development Administration, suggested the group try and buy their water from Western, on a temporary basis until Mt. Vernon can supply the needed water.
Brown said that Western could buy the 21,000 gallons from Southeast Pulaski County Water Association and in turn sell it to Rockcastle.
Rockcastle's president Bob Fields, said Wednesday that while there is a lot of paper work still to be completed, "things look much more promising for our customers."
Fields said that because the cost of water from Southeast is higher than the cost of water from Mt. Vernon, his association is willing to pay the difference in cost so Western so the project can get started.
Mt. Vernon is currently Western's major supplier of water.
Fields also said a meeting with Western Water officials on Tuesday went very well and that Western was certainly cooperative.
The association president said Western would act as a go-between for Rockcastle and Southeast, but by doing so they could give the association the much needed water users agreement.
The engineers and lawyers are working out all of the specifics, but I think we could see water lines being laid by the end of the summer," Fields said.
All total, 400 customers will receive water once the expansion project is completed.
The other 250 customers will get their water through a water user's agreement with Jackson County Water Association and Woods Creek Water Association in Laurel County.

Board approves \$33,000 more for pre-school program

The Rockcastle County Board of Education voted unanimously last week to approve an additional \$33,000 for the Pre-School program in Rockcastle County Schools.
Tammy Gabbard, coordinator of the pre-school program in the county, told the board that because of the board's willingness to spend general fund dollars on the program, pre-school was available to ninety-percent of all Rockcastle County children.
Superintendent Larry Hammond said after the meeting that federal funds for the program had been cut in recent years, but that no county children were being turned away because of these cuts.
Under current guidelines only handicapped three-year-old children and economically disadvantaged four-year-old students actually qualify for pre-school.
"This board feels like all county students that want to prepare themselves better for kindergarten should have that opportunity, that is why they voted to put money in the program from the general fund," Hammond said.

The \$33,000 will be used to purchase supplies, a computer and playground equipment.
The board also approved another payment for work at the Rockcastle County High School.
Although the structure has been occupied by students for three years not all of the necessary paper work has been completed.
The board approved a \$574,000 payment to an electrical contractor that had to step in to finish the job after the first contractor filed bankruptcy during construction of the school.
The halfmillion dollar plus payment was in the school's construction budget.
The board also approved a \$149,900 payment for the football locker and weight room at RCCHS, which has now been completed.
The school system will also spend \$22,271 for removal of floor tile and mastic (floor tile adhesive) which contain asbestos at the Rockcastle County Middle School, Roundstone Elementary School and Broadhead Elementary School. Environmental Recovery Systems, will also monitor the air in each building after the work is completed.
Superintendent Hammond also announced his personnel actions for the past four weeks.
He announced that Connie Hamm, Doris P. Cash and Mary Alice Hunt were retaining.

his two children. He is accused of not paying child support for nearly ten years and, according to court records, owes child support in the amount of \$41,328. He posted a \$10,000 property bond.
Michael E. Quinley, 34, of Rt. 3 Mt. Vernon was indicted for breaking into the home of Hylton Hirman on February 5 of this year.
Quinley is accused of taking a camping stove, movie camera, two photo cameras, a jewelry box and 63 pain killers. He has not been served.
Eric Wheeler, 26, of Rt. 3, Brodhead and Shawn Spencer, 19, of Richmond were indicted on two

counts in connection with a break-in at the home of James E. Owens, Jr. in Mt. Vernon on February 2.
The two men are accused of taking rings, watches, shoes and clothes from Owens' residence.
The two men are being held in the Rockcastle County jail.
Luther Lovell, of Rt. 2 Mt. Vernon was indicted for a third offense driving under the influence charge, but the warrant was recalled after it was learned the charge against him had been amended in Rockcastle District Court on April 21. The charge was amended to operating on a suspended license first degree.

Abney receives Spiritual Aims Award

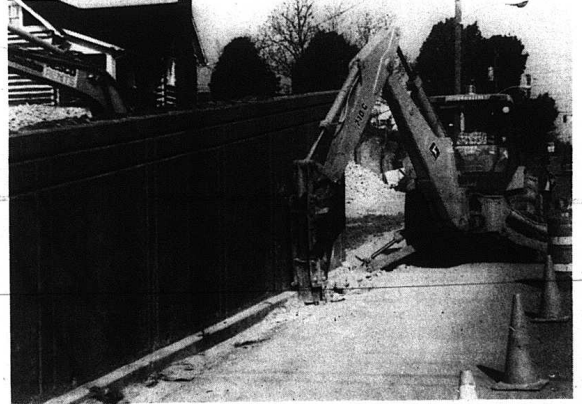

A couple of weekends back I made it into the auditorium at Garrard County High School just as the curtain was going up on a student production of *Lil' Abner*. I'm no fan of Al Capp who originated that cartoon because it has played the major role in stereotyping mountain people as dumb and dirty—something I know

to be an absolute lie.

Loretta had seen the play the night before and was going back again. She assured me that I wouldn't find the play insulting. And besides that J.C. Loretta had already left without me figuring I didn't have time to take a shower and dress up. I figured the play would have already started and nobody would see me anyway. Rotational Grazing Means More Money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotating between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles.

The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at least 10%. Depending on the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.

Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and potassium are removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system reduces fertilizer topdressing needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when pasture areas rest between grazings. Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture trample and defecate

on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up, becoming more mature and longer in quality.

Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or near its peak nutritive value. Rotated pastures have higher digestibility because forage is kept in a vegetative and growing stage with less dead and over-mature material, compared to continuously grazed pastures. Animals tend to select only the best and leave the worst.

Rotational grazing systems also allow use of species that are more productive and responsive to management including alfalfa, native warm season grasses, and red clover. Different species enable farmers to improve the seasonal supply of forage, grow more forage and grow better quality forage. Using these species also can reduce hay harvest costs.

THISTLE CONTROL IN PASTURES

Musk thistle, also known as nodding thistle, can be a serious weed problem in pastures, hayfield and also roadsides. This plant interferes with grazing and limits the amount of available forage to livestock.

Seed is the only method by which musk thistle reproduces. Therefore, limiting seed production is the key to successful control of this plant pest. Mature thistle

plants are capable of producing an abundant amount of seed. If uncontrolled, one mature plant is capable of producing over 40,000 new seed. These seed can then be transported or spread to other areas by wind, contaminated hay, or farm equipment.

As previously indicated, the primary step in an effective thistle control program is to prevent or reduce seed production. This can be accomplished by using chemical, mechanical or biological control methods.

Chemical control of musk thistle can be utilized in permanent grass pastures and non-cropland areas. However, the timing may be too late for this year. An important aspect when using a herbicide for control is choosing the proper time for the application. Best results are obtained when thistle plants are in the rosette stage of growth, generally in early spring. The rosette stage is when the plant is growing close to the ground in a circular pattern.

Best chemical control occurs when herbicides are applied during March and April. Herbicides which can be used on permanent grass pastures and non-cropland areas include 2,4-D, Banvel and Crossbow. For early spring applications, wait until thistle plants

are actively growing and air temperatures are above 55 degrees Fahrenheit for 2 to 3 days. Complete spray coverage of the plant's rosette is also important. When herbicides are applied after flower stalks elongate, control will be inconsistent and less effective.

When using a herbicide for control, read and understand the label directions for proper use and any precautionary statements. Avoid spraying on windy days or days with high temperature and humidity. Also, avoid spraying when sensitive crops such as tobacco and home gardens are growing nearby.

At this late date, mechanical controls, such as mowing or hand-

hoeing, should be done before flowers begin to open in the early spring. Some regrowth and production of flowers may occur after mowing; however, seed production will be noticeably less than if plants had not been mowed or hand-hoed. Thistle plants mowed or removed after flowers bloom contain enough stored energy reserves in the stalk to produce viable seed that will germinate into new plants.

Chemicals such as 2,4-D, Banvel and Crossbow will kill broadleaf plants like red and white clover. For this reason, farmers will need to plan on working thistle control into their rotation when replacing clover.

SEEDCORN MAGGOTS A PROBLEM

Many growers were able to get their crops in the ground early this season because of dry workable soils early on. However, several reports have been made of seedcorn maggots attacking vegetable and field crops. Planting into cool soils just after green manure crops have been plowed under has contributed to stand loss by seedcorn maggot.

White seedcorn maggot has caused stand reduction in some fields this year, most fields with poor stands do not have seedcorn maggot. There is a large number of stand reduction causes including equipment malfunction, chemical injury, seedling diseases, poor seed, wet soils, other insects, birds and slow germination. If seedcorn maggots are suspected, carefully look for seeds in the row skips and examine them for evidence of seedcorn maggot damage. Maggot damage may range from a few meandering tunnels in the seeds to the entire contents of the seed destroyed. Cotyledons and first leaves of the remaining seedlings may be deformed or spindly.

Seedcorn maggot eggs are laid just below the soil surface in humid ground that is high in organic

matter. The maggot feeds primarily on decaying organic matter, but will feed on many types of seeds and seedlings if available. Eggs are laid shortly after green manure crops are disked into the soil. Depending on the crop, insecticide treatments at planting and transplant water, or even seed treatments may be available to control these insects. After damage is observed on the crops, rescue

treatments are not usually effective. Retesting or replanting of crops may be necessary if stand loss is severe.

When soil temperatures are below those for optimal or rapid germination, shallow planting will increase germination rates and aid in speeding up germination and reduce losses to maggots. Higher seeding rates should be considered to offset stand loss.

Tips for Reducing Salt

Sodium has been linked to high blood pressure. It is a chemical element which is naturally found in many foods, but primarily found in table salt which contains 2,300 milligrams of sodium per teaspoon. The recommended sodium intake is 2,400 milligrams.

There are several no-salt or low-salt seasoning mixes on the market, but you can use spices and herbs to reduce your sodium intake. Experiment with small amounts to find seasonings your family will accept. Start with one teaspoon of mild herbs or spices, such as basil, cinnamon, cumin, lemon pepper or oregano per six servings. Start with only 1/4 teaspoon of strong herbs or spices such as allspice, cloves, ginger, nutmeg, rosemary or tarragon per six servings. Ground herbs are stronger than dried which are stronger than fresh. If a recipe calls for 1/4 teaspoon of ground herbs, use 3/4 to 1 teaspoon

of dried or 2 teaspoons of fresh herbs.

Our taste for salt is acquired, so it is possible to cut back on salt a little at a time. Gradually your taste buds will adapt to the new and more subtle flavors of herbs and spices. With a little imagination, you can develop your own seasoning mix.

Aromatic Seasoning for Grilled Meats (yield: 1/2 cup)

- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon ground basil
- 1 tablespoon ground anise seed
- 1 tablespoon ground oregano
- 1 tablespoon powdered lemon rind

Blend all ingredients together. Store in a tightly covered container.

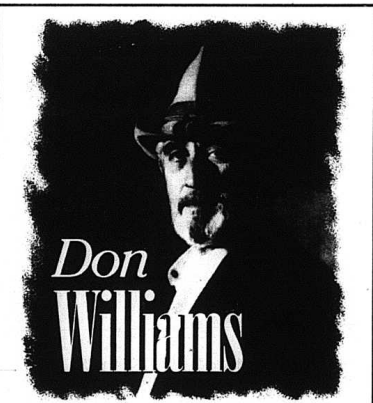

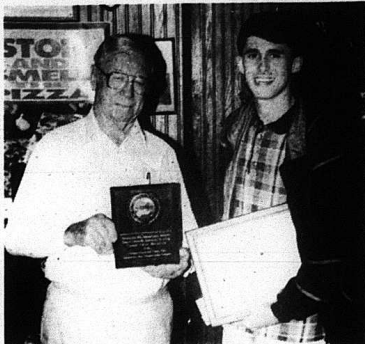

Overall the JROTC lock in was a huge success due largely to the great support from the numerous chaperones who attended and helped with serving supper and competing with the cadets.

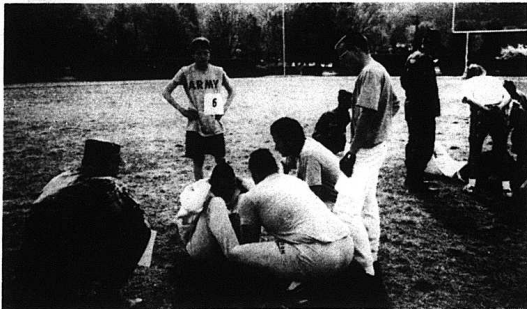

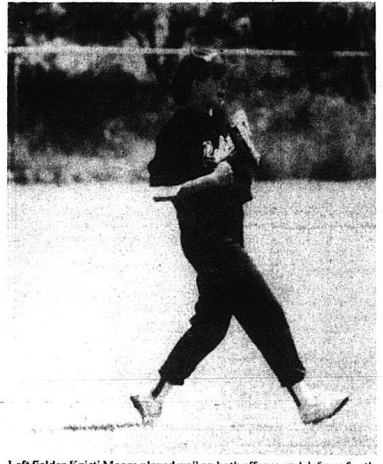

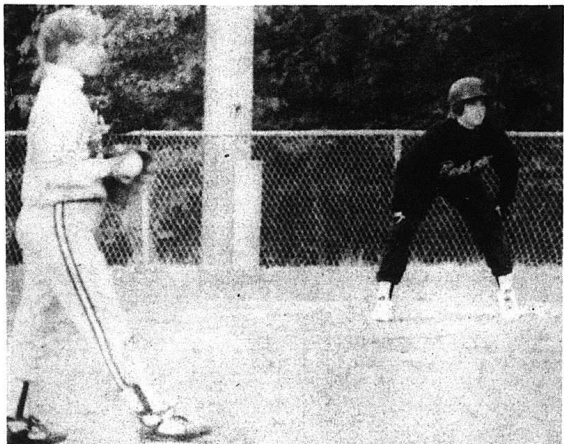

Last week we began a study of Holy Spirit baptism. We began by affirming that there are only two historical cases of Holy Spirit baptism in the New Testament. We studied last time from Acts 2, about the apostles being baptized in the Holy Ghost on the day of Pentecost. Today we want to study about Cornelius and his group being baptized in the Holy Ghost in Acts 10 & 11.

Cornelius and his group would be the first Gentiles converts to Jesus Christ. God sent Peter to preach to Cornelius and his group the gospel of Jesus Christ. In vs. 34-43 we read of Peter's speech to this group. Then something very interesting happen as Peter was speaking, notice in Acts 10:44-45, "While Peter yet spake these words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word. And they of the circumcision which believed were astonished, as many as came with Peter, because that on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost." As with the apostles, there was no seeking, praying, anointing, going to the altar, laying on of hands in order to get baptized in the Holy Ghost. "God simply poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost. Peter in Acts 11 was "called out on the carpet" about what took place with the Gentiles. Peter rehearse this matter step by step of what took place. Notice in Acts 11:15-17, "And as I began to speak, the Holy Ghost fell on them, as on us at the beginning. They remembered I the word of the Lord, how that he said, John indeed baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost. Forasmuch then as God gave them the like gift as he did unto us, who believed on the Lord Jesus Christ, what was I, that I could withstand God?" Observe that Peter calls this a baptism of the Holy Ghost, and notice also, that he has to refer all the way back to Acts 2, to what happened to the apostles on the day of Pentecost to find anything like it. Notice that statement again in verse 15, "And as I began to speak, the Holy Ghost fell on them, as on us at the beginning." He did not say, "As I began to speak, the Holy Ghost fell on them, as on all the churches." Nor did he say, "As I began to speak, the Holy Ghost fell on them as on us since the beginning," as if this was an everyday occurrence. Beloved, we do not read of these people anointing, on their knees praying, singing and shouting, seeking, anointing, going to the altar, laying on of hands, in order to get baptized in the Holy Ghost. Why was Cornelius and his group baptized in the Holy Spirit in order to prove to the Jews that the Gentiles can be Christians. Acts 11:18. Holy Spirit baptism does not take place today!

Fourty-three of the school's 165 graduates received some type of scholarship or grant during awards night ceremonies on Friday.

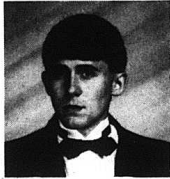

These are the parents (and children) about whom I worry the most. Since these parents don't make mistakes (they believe), they have no reason to try to be better parents. Their children may have to continue to suffer until the children are old enough to leave home.

One comforting thought to me is that kids are amazingly resilient. I know from being a counselor and listening to my clients for the past ten years that children can endure an incredible amount of pain (physical

and emotional) and still survive. Certainly they are affected and even scarred by the experience, but they somehow manage to survive.

I would like more for our children than just survival, however. We must provide safe places in which our children can grow up. We must provide a loving, caring environment that encourages each child to grow physically and emotionally.

If all of us can be a little bit better at parenting than our parents were, and if our children can be a little better parents than we have been, then our world has a chance. But if our children don't have a chance, then neither does our world.
