**Bullock not guilty**

A Rockcastle Circuit Court jury spent only twenty minutes in deliberation before they returning a not guilty verdict for a local man last week.

Joshua Ryan Bullock, 21, of Ford Drive, Mt. Vernon was acquitted of child abuse charges after the two day trial.

Bullock was indicted last November on child abuse charges, after his seven-week-old son was treated at Fort Logan Hospital in Stanford.

Bullock's son has been in the custody of other family members since his arrest last year.

Bullock was represented by local attorney John Clontz. Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Mike Pratt prosecuted the case for the state.

Since January, six cases have been tried in Circuit Court, resulting in two convictions, two acquittals and two hung juries.

**Men sentenced**

Two Lexington men were sentenced to six months in jail and ordered to pay nearly \$3,000 in restitution Friday by Circuit Judge William T. Cain, for a break-in last Fall at the Rockcastle County High School.

Eric Bethards, 22, of Cedar Crest Drive, and Owen Hill, 19, of Lowrey Lane, were also placed on probation for two and a half years after they pled guilty to breaking into several cars in the parking lot of the school during school hours.

Under the conditions of their probated sentence the two will ante up \$2,861.50 each to pay for items taken in the break-in.

Another Lexington man, James Farthing, who was also charged with the same crime, is being held in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting court proceedings.

**Marijuana charge for Flat Gap man**

A Flat Gap man was arrested Sunday after police found marijuana growing on his property.

According to police, 193 marijuana plants, were found at the residence of Tony Danrell on Flat Gap Road by Deputy Sheriffs Nathaniel Price, Doug Thomas and Trevor Hemslry.

Danrell, 32, was charged with cultivating marijuana. He is free on bond pending a June 16th court appearance.

Last week Deputy Darrell Doan and Kentucky State Police found and destroyed 154 marijuana plants on Fuzzy Duck Road in Brodhead. No arrests were made. Doan is continuing his investigation.

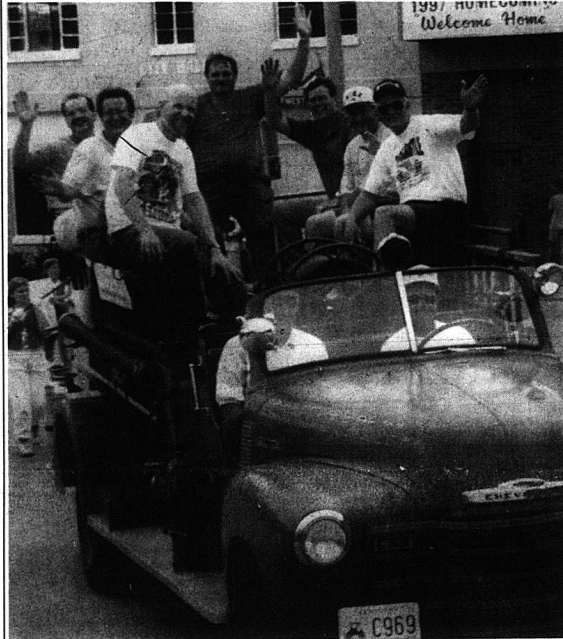
**Schools set to re-open August 11**

**Some SBDM Councils will probably not adopt corporal punishment**

Although the Rockcastle County Board of Education amended a policy which will allow corporal punishment in county schools earlier this month, it is not likely that each school will adopt such a policy.

Each principal has a different opinion about the change that will allow paddling again in Rockcastle County Schools, but each one said this week the topic would probably be discussed at length when their site based councils meet in June.

Rockcastle County High School Principal Ronnie Cash said this week, that although the subject would be discussed at the SBDM meeting at the high school, "it probably will not be adopted." "I would hope our council does not even consider it," Cash said.

"We have a good discipline policy in place and I don't think that will change," Cash said.

"I believe the in-school detention we now have for students is much more effective, because in all honesty most of the students in that class would rather take a spanking than be placed in detention," he said.

Roundstone Principal David Pensol said he had not discussed the policy change with members of his council, but he said the subject was on the June agenda.

"We probably will discuss this for quite some time before we make any decision," Pensol said.

Pensol said that in his opinion Roundstone does not have a discipline problem. "We are a small school and we are able to deal with our discipline problems on an individual basis with the help of our parents," he said. "I do not know what the council will decide, but I don't think there has

been a time in the past couple of years when I would have had to resort to corporal punishment," Pensol said.

However at the county's largest elementary school, Principal Rose Brown said this week that she thought the council there would adopt the policy.

"We have not discussed the change in our council meetings as of yet, but it would be my opinion that this council will adopt the new board policy," she said. "I think we have a good discipline policy in place, but this will give us one more avenue, if the council decides to adopt it," she said.

"There has not been a time in the past three years that I have needed to spank a child," said Brodhead Principal Mark McKinney. "I have found that there are many other, probably more effective ways to handle a discipline problem, but it will be discussed at our council meeting in June."

"I wouldn't say there would never be an instance in which a student might benefit from a spanking, but there certainly hasn't been such a situation lately."

McKinney said the site based council at Brodhead would discuss the matter at length before they reached a decision.

But the new policy will likely be adopted at the Rockcastle Middle School. The policy change was requested by the site based council at that middle school, however principal John Hale was not available for comment.

Although the board adopted the policy change two weeks ago, each site based council will have to adopt the policy. The new policy allows for a student to be spanked if a parent gives permission.

**Community meeting scheduled for June 3 by Rural Development Center**

We hope that everyone can come out and participate in this public forum." To encourage cooperation and sharing of resources, The Center has formed regional partnerships with Southern Kentucky Tourism Development Association, Southern Kentucky Economic Development Corporation, Southern Kentucky Agricultural Development Association and the regional Export Assistance Center. Also housed at The Center are Eastern Kentucky University's Small Business Development Center, Kentucky Technology Service, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Services, Kentucky Procurement Services and the U.S. Small Business Administration's One Stop Capitol Shop.

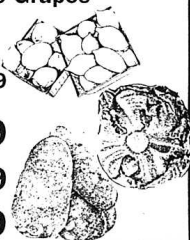

## Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

May I cite a few scriptures that show corporal punishment is right. "He that spareth his rod hateth his son; but he that loveth him chasteneth him beatings." Pr. 13:24. "Foolishness, is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction shall drive it far from him." Pr. 22:15. "Withhold not correction from a child; for if thou beatest him with a rod, he shall not die. Thou shalt beat him with the rod and shalt deliver his soul from hell." Pr. 23:13-14. (By the way beat does not suggest or mean abusing a child.) "The rod and proof give wisdom; but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame." Pr. 29:15. "Furthermore we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the father of spirits, and live? Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous; nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby." Hebs 12:9 & 11.

I know I speak for myself and a lot of other folks who have discussed growing up and receiving corporal punishment; that none of us feel we were warped; or mistreated by brutal, violent adults who were merely venting their anger. The punishment I got, I deserved; and I was made the better for it. If I had not been disciplined growing up, I may have been writing this letter from the state penitentiary. It's not "shame on us" but "shame on you."

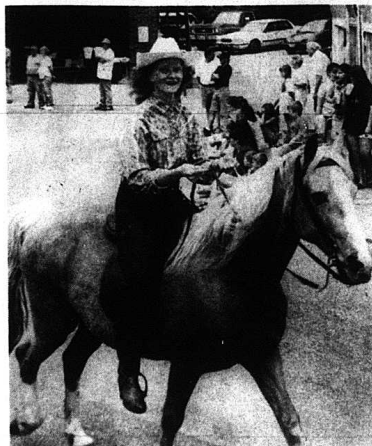
tried for the force out at home. However, his throw was off the mark, hitting Anderkin in the back of the helmet. The run scored and the bases were still loaded. But the Harlan

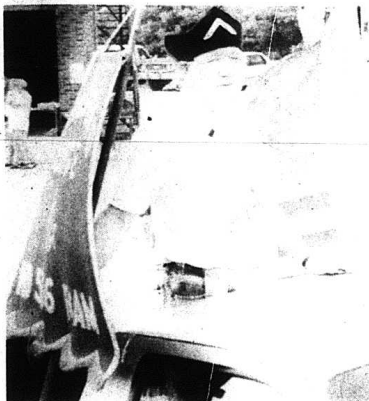

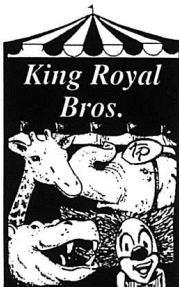

## HEALING A HEADACHE

**I**t begins as a dull ache. Then, gradually, your head begins to pound. Your vision blurs. You feel nauseated. Soon, all you want to do is curl up in a dark room, pull the covers over your head and make the whole thing go away.

### SOUND FAMILIAR?

If so, you are one of the 45 million Americans who suffer from chronic, recurring headaches every year. According to the National Headache Foundation, headaches cost businesses more than \$50 billion a year due to absenteeism and medical expenses. Last year alone, U.S. workers tallied up more than 157 million sick days attributable to headaches.

Headaches also mean big business. In 1996, more than \$4 billion were spent on over-the-counter headache remedies. But, is taking an analgesic—such as aspirin, ibuprofen or acetaminophen—a sure cure for the headache blues? Maybe or maybe not:

### ANALGESIC REBOUND HEADACHES

"For people who experience an occasional headache, taking the prescribed dose of pain reliever usually will eliminate the symptoms," said Dr. William McElwain, a physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "But, when used daily or nearly daily, headache medication actually



may perpetuate headaches rather than relieve them."

This occurrence is referred to as an analgesic rebound headache.

When taken too frequently, a person's body may build up an immunity to analgesic medicine because it adapts to having a pain reliever constantly in the system. Analgesics may provide temporary relief, but when the medicine wears off, headache symptoms return, usually more severe.

"It's a catch-22," Dr. McElwain said. "The best solution, instead of continued self-medication, would be to visit a physician if the headache pain becomes persistent. This is especially important, should a more severe problem exist. We need to be sure we are addressing the cause, not just the symptoms."

### MIGRAINE HEADACHES

Sixteen million Americans, most of whom are women, suffer from severe headaches labeled as "migraines." Migraines can occur

at any age, but tend to be more prevalent in people ages 35 to 45.

Researchers are unsure what causes migraines, but some preliminary findings are pointing to heredity as one source of the problem.

"If both parents suffered from migraine headaches, there is a 75 percent chance their children will suffer from migraines, too," Dr. McElwain said. "If only one parent suffers, there is a 50 percent chance the child will suffer, too. And, if even a distant relative has migraine attacks, a 20 percent chance exists that the person will be prone to migraine symptoms."

Usually, migraine sufferers can be treated with prescription medication that can be taken at the onset of symptoms. Other non-medical factors can have an effect on migraine symptoms. Doctors have found that stress, menstruation, estrogen therapy and environmental changes all can contribute to migraine headache problems. Diet may also stimulate symptoms. Food additives, such as MSG and sodium nitrate, may trigger severe migraines in some people.

"Read all food labels carefully," Dr. McElwain suggested. "If MSG or sodium nitrate appear in high concentrations, you may want to avoid that food if you are susceptible to headaches."

### FOOD FOR THOUGHT

If you want to avoid foods that trigger migraine headaches, steer clear of the following:

- dairy products
- yogurt, aged cheese
- liver
- dried fish
- chocolate
- soy sauce
- raisins
- bacon
- bologna
- beef jerky
- canned or processed meats
- fast foods
- seasoning salt

### GRILLING OUTDOORS IS SAFE WAY

As summer approaches, many people will begin moving their picnics from the nook and crannies of their garages to the back yards. But, grilling should be handled safely because the barbecue is used to fuel the grill highly flammable. Keep in mind that when handling a grill:

- Check grill for leaks in the tank
- Replace gas hose that even smells that even smells
- Keep flames open
- Never use a grill when you are asleep

## MEDICAL MATTERS

### HIATAL HERNIA: THE BURNING QUESTION

Do you ever think about how food travels from your mouth to your stomach? Probably not. It's just one of those things that occurs naturally, so why ask questions.

But, for about half of America's senior population, it is a burning question—literally.

Many seniors suffer from a condition referred to as a hiatal hernia that causes a burning sensation in the stomach. It is different from an abdominal hernia, which is the result of a weak section in the stomach lining.

A hiatal hernia occurs in the hiatus, which is a thin wall between the chest and the abdomen. The esophagus goes through the hiatus to get to the stomach. But, sometimes, pressure on the abdomen is greater than the pressure on the chest. This results in weakening the hiatus that allows stomach contents to push back into the esophagus.

There are ways to treat a hiatal hernia. First, visit a physician to confirm the problem. Secondly, avoid certain foods and substances, such as caffeine, peppermints and alcohol. Also, follow a physician-approved weight loss plan if you are overweight.

## SCREENING THE SUN

**W**hen it comes to being outdoors, most of us think of recreation not work. But for those who earn their living by working outdoors, such as farmers or construction workers, being outside for hours a day poses an occupational hazard—overexposure to the sun.

"Skin cancer has become one of the most common forms of cancer," said Dr. Karen Saylor, a physician at Rockcastle Hospital. "People often mistakenly associate it with one episode, such as a bad sunburn. Actually, though, skin cancer evolves from prolonged overexposure to the sun."

Dr. Saylor suggested keeping watch for early signs of cancer. "Look for a new skin growth, mole, discoloration or a sudden change in an existing mole," Dr. Saylor suggested. "If caught early, the chance of successfully treating skin cancer increases dramatically."

For those who spend a great deal of time outside, there are some basic ways they can help minimize their exposure to harmful UV rays. The nose of the neck, ears, face and eyes are especially sensitive to exposure. Fortunately, these areas can be protected easily with a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen. While baseball caps have long been standard headgear for the outdoors, consider other types of hats that provide more coverage, such as a wide-brimmed straw hat or cowboy hat.

When choosing a sunscreen, be sure to select one that is recommended for heavy outdoor expo-

sure. Look for sunscreen that is waterproof and won't rub off easily with sweat or water.

If you happen to suffer a serious sunburn, Dr. Saylor recommends rubbing the affected area with aloe to soothe the burn and replenish the skin with much-needed moisture.



### WATER BABIES

Small children are drawn to the sun. How do you keep them safe? Here are some tips she enjoys the sun.

- It is best to avoid the sun between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Remember that children under 6 months old should be kept out of the sun for at least 30 minutes.
- Avoid using suntans.
- PABA—it may cause an allergic reaction in some children.
- Apply sunscreen 15 minutes before exposure to the sun.
- Do not apply sunscreen to the face. Instead, purchase sunglasses formulated especially for sensitive areas.
- Lastly, watch your child's hydration and be sure they are drinking plenty of water.

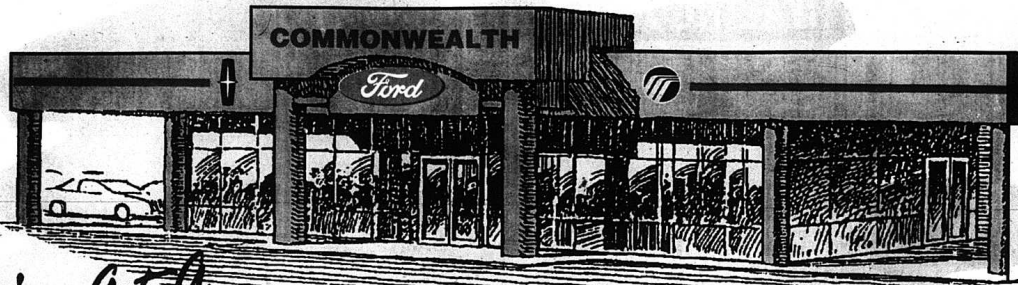

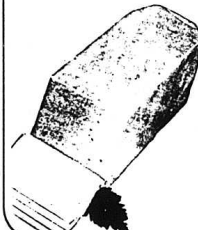

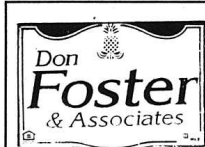
