Mother, daughter found in Illinois

A Mt. Vernon girl, who was reported missing by her father two weeks ago, was found in Illinois last Thursday.

According to Mt. Vernon Asst. Police Chief Eddie Delaney, 5-year-old, Leigha "Kayla" Smith, and her mother Michelle Baker, both of Mt. Vernon were found in Lacon, Illinois by Marshall County Sheriff's deputies.

Delaney said that Baker was arrested by police on the warrant from Mt. Vernon for custodial interference.

But, Delaney said that Baker posted a small bond and was released from custody, although she was indicted on Friday by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury for custodial interference.

Baker's daughter however is being held by the Illinois Department of Child Services, although her father Larry D. "Tommy" Smith has custody of the child. "They tell us they are holding the child because Smith was awarded custody in Kentucky and not Illinois," Delaney said.

Delaney said that Tommy Smith had been in Lacon, Illinois to pick up his child after his ex-wife was arrested, but was not allowed to do so. "It is a mess, they are being very uncooperative with us," Delaney said. Smith's attorney John Clontz said that his client will probably have to file another suit in Illinois to get custody of his child because the five-year-old was in the custody of its mother when she was arrested.

Lois and Artie Stevens and Chrissy Baker caught a lapse in the rainfall on Monday afternoon to set part of their tobacco crop. It was the first time this season the Stevens have been able to set any of their tobacco. County Agent Tom Mills said that only about 50 percent of this year's crop has been set and farmers are losing plants everyday. Mills said there would be a major shortage of tobacco plants because of the heavy rainfall in the county this Spring. In June alone, 6.73 inches of rain has fallen.

Livingston man killed in Tennessee

A Livingston man was killed last Thursday morning when the truck he was driving was hit by a commuter bus in Murfreesboro TN.

Wayne Durham, 57, a crane operator for 3-D Construction of Lexington, was on his way to work at a wastewater treatment plant site when the 5:40 a.m. accident occurred, according to Tennessee Highway Patrol.

According to police, Durham died at the scene after he was thrown through the back of his pickup truck.

Police say Durham's 1994 Ford Ranger was struck broadside in the driver's side by a Metro Transit Authority Bus, after the two vehicles entered an intersection at the same time.

Lt. Clyde Adkinson of the Murfreesboro police said they still did not know if the bus or the truck ran the red light at the time of the accident. Adkinson said an engineer is checking the lights at the intersection to see if there may have been a temporary malfunction.

The 28-year-old bus driver from Nashville was not injured and there were no passengers on the bus. The

bus slid to a stop after the impact. Police said that Durham was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the wreck. Durham was the third traffic fatality in Murfreesboro in one week.

Durham is survived by his wife, Helen and two children, Mitchell Durham and Lavis Lynn Long.

Burke gets ten years

A Negro Creek man was sentenced Friday to ten year sentences in the state penitentiary after he pled guilty to two counts of manslaughter.

Vernon Shane Burke, 26, was sentenced by Circuit Judge William T. Cain on Friday after he pled guilty on April 3, in connection with an April 7, 1995 wreck at Lake Linville.

Roman Dale Brummett, 23, of Negro Creek and Jessica Rae Saylor, 2, of Stanford were killed in the wreck.

According to court records, both victims drowned after the 1983 Datsun Burke was driving plunged into the lake. At the time of the wreck Burke was charged with driving under the influence and later indicted for manslaughter.

Brummett died at the scene, while the two-year-old died the next day at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Burke will serve his sentences concurrently, along with a three year sentence for a guilty plea for possession of a controlled substance.

In his final sentencing order Cain denied Burke probation saying, "probation would unduly depreciate the seriousness of the defendant's crime."

From all over the world, many of the 50 states, one foreign country and one U.S. territory are calling the Rockcastle County High School home this week.

The group is taking part in the National Cave Rescue Commission's annual week long training session, held each year in different parts of the United States.

Over 120 administrators, instructors and students will learn the finer points of cave and cliff rescues, meet some new friends and get reacquainted with old ones.

"I've probably never worked with a finer group of people," said RCHS Ronnie Cash, who has turned the school's gymnasium, locker rooms showers and rear parking lot over to the group for the week.

And what a diversified group of men and women it is, from Dr. Sam Chewning an orthopedic surgeon from Charlotte, North Carolina to Bruce Bannerman an Amway Salesman from Culloden, West Virginia.

Also in attendance this week is Mimi Ortiz from Puerto Rico and Bernardo Morales a resident of Mexico City. Taking the week long training also are a New York City Police officer from Long Island and paramedics from San Bernardino, California. All of the instructors are volunteers and pay their own expenses as do 95% of the students taking part this week.

The group's training is held in a different state each year during the summer, but in the winter, a training session is always held in Puerto Rico for the Caribbean Region. In recent years the group has gathered in South Dakota, up state New York, Arkansas and Utah.

Hay baler stolen at Negro Creek

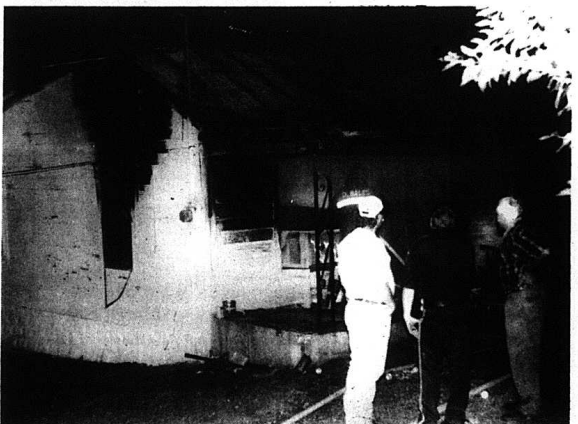

said the group chose Kentucky this year because of its somewhat central location and because of the numerous caves in the Rockcastle area.

Among the caves the group will train at this week are the Climax and Pine Hill caves. Some of the cliff rescue training will take place at the cliffs on Burnt Ridge Road near the Rockcastle-Madison County line.

Rick Deel, an Emergency Response Coordinator for Chemical Plants in Houston called the week long training session working vacation.

"I love to see the different states where we train and talk to the people in areas like Rockcastle, where most people will still take time to throw up their hand and speak," said Deel, who has been an instructor for NCR for about four and a half years.

"The NCR does not actually go out and rescue people as a group, but we can put rescue squads in touch

with those who can help when someone is trapped," Bannerman said.

"In the mid 1970s the average response time for a cave rescue team was four and half hours, now it is about 45 minutes," Bannerman said.

"The NCR's goal is to teach the right techniques and methods of rescue and to maintain the proper equipment," Bannerman said.

And there are local connections, actually an Ohioian in attendance this week who calls Rockcastle his "caving home."

Jerry Unverferth, a member of the Greater Cincinnati Grotto Club said he was taking the week long training for the first time, although he had a weekend class in Pennsylvania not long ago.

Unverferth, who worked on the set of the movie, "Fire Down Below," when segments of it was filmed at Salt Petre Cave last fall, was with the group of level one students when they trained at the cliffs on Burnt Ridge Road on Tuesday afternoon. He may be from Cincinnati, but he certainly is familiar with Rockcastle.

Unverferth's club owns the Great Salt Petre Cave, where the group hosted a reception for NCR on Wednesday night.

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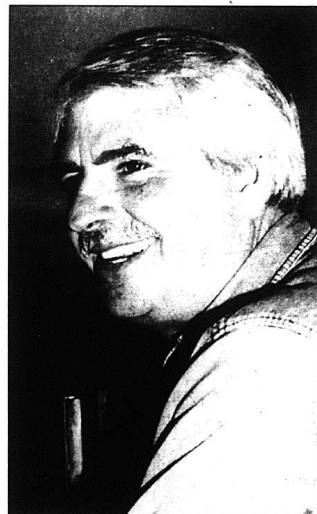

Blue Mold Warning

All of Kentucky's tobacco production is now under a BLUE MOLD WARNING, because weather events favor blue mold development, plants are massed and highly susceptible, and airborne spores of the fungus probably are drifting in the Commonwealth. Blue mold has been confirmed in Crittenden and Todd counties in Kentucky.

THREATENING SOURCES. Strong centers of blue mold are known to be present in east Tennessee, southern middle Tennessee, western Virginia, southern Georgia, and eastern North Carolina. Winds from one or more of these areas have probably carried spores into all of Kentucky's tobacco production areas by now. Affected transplants may have recently been introduced into Kentucky, and the demand for out-of-state transplants increases rapidly with loss of plants in Kentucky for a variety of reasons.

Dr. Charles Hadden, University of Tennessee, reported that very strong blue mold activity has developed in east Tennessee (Hancock, Jefferson, Granger and Claiborne counties). In some cases the plant beds have been destroyed with massive sporulation. Dr. Steve Bost, University of Tennessee and stationed in Nashville, confirmed that two blues mold was active in two counties in southern middle Tennessee - Maury and Williamson counties, south of Nashville.

In Lee County Virginia, the local

Extension Agent reported finding an entire greenhouse of plants covered with blue mold. Transplants arriving in Kentucky from southern production areas

carry a much greater risk of harboring blue mold now than locally grown plants, because they are closer to the sources of active blue mold. Let's not underestimate the fact that the risks have increased recently. Action that producers got by with two weeks or a month ago can spell problems if repeated now. I strongly urge Kentucky growers to import tobacco transplants from any other southern production areas at this time, because of increased potential for exposure from blue mold. It will soon become risky enough moving plants about the Commonwealth.

AIRBORNE SPORES ARRIVING. The North American Blue Mold Forecast System has advised that the trajectory of travel of the spores from southern Georgia, eastern North Carolina, and Tennessee could expose tobacco in all Kentucky counties to blue mold infection during the past 10 days. Mixed populations of the fungus are likely to be involved: both metalaxyl-resistant and sensitive strains.

All of Kentucky's tobacco is now under a BLUE MOLD WARNING. All of Kentucky's tobacco could have been exposed and could now be developing blue mold from the events of the past two weeks. The southeastern counties have the

greatest probability of having been exposed to high levels of inoculum. If the initial lesions are not controlled, five days later the entire plant bed or greenhouse can be destroyed. It is important to stop (control) these early infections, but it is equally important to detect them early where they are not controlled. Missing a few early lesions can result in a widespread epidemic at the site within three weeks, which is what east Tennessee is now facing.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS: Do NOT bring plants into Kentucky from any state to our south. As the blue mold threat increases in the south, the risk of introducing blue mold on transplants increases rapidly! Crops with any connection to southern transplants should continue to receive the Acrobat MZ spray program. Yes, that grower who's added burden, but it owes that to the rest of the producers for potentially exposing the neighborhood.

In transplant production, use Acrobat MZ at the rate of 2-3 teaspoons per gallon, using 5 to 6 gallons per 1,000 square foot of bed and repeat at 5-day intervals. Too many people are waiting for dry weather to start spraying; for best results you need three hours of

drying after the spray. But, if you cannot get three hours, the benefits from spraying will outweigh not spraying. To aid in drying, improve air circulation in greenhouses and remove bed covers in outdoor systems. Keep systems clipped as recommended by UK Agronomists, but clip prior to spraying fungicides (clip, then spray). However, do not clip plants that have active bacterial rot! If plants are ready to transplant, be sure to make at least one fungicide application prior to transplanting.

What about the field? Because both metalaxyl-sensitive and resistant blue mold strains are likely involved, pre-plant applications of Ridomil or Ridomil Gold should be highly valuable to eliminate the sensitive portion of the population. Furthermore, Pythium root rot is very active now and Ridomil is highly effective in controlling it. Also, start weekly (5-7 day intervals) applications of Acrobat MZ to control Ridomil-sensitive blue mold. Use the rate of 2 1/2 pounds per 100 gallons of water. Start with 20 gallons of water per acre and increase the volume by 20 gallons on each application. At the fifth application, the rate should be up to 100 gallons per acre.

ufficient number of agents are available in each state to provide this service.

USDA will continue to subsidize all policies, establish policy terms and conditions, set rates and guarantee funds for the payment of approved claims.

The transfer begins with 1998 fall planted crops. Policyholders will receive a letter informing them of this change in about one month. However, producers are to continue to go to the local FSA office for service on 1997 policies. This includes reporting 1997 planted acreage and production as well as any losses.

Although a producer's policy will be randomly transferred from USDA to an insurance company, producers may select another agent or insurance

company if they do so before the sales closing date for the insured crop. To ensure that all producers are served, insurance companies are required to insure all eligible crops, and provide all levels of coverage in the states in which they operate. Further,

participating companies must insure all qualified applicants. Waiver of administrative fees for producers who qualify as limited resource farmers is required by the Risk Management Agency and is available through private companies. Private agents are prepared to assist those qualifying producers with certification of their status.

A listing of local crop insurance agents is available in all FSA county offices.

Celebrate June Dairy Month

June is Dairy Month. Most people automatically connect calcium and dairy products. The recommended Dietary Allowance for calcium is 800 mg for children 1-10 years old; 1200 mg for children 11-24; 800 mg for adults 25 years or older; and 1200 mg for women who are pregnant or lactating. The best source of calcium is in calcium rich foods. 3 servings of dairy foods equals 800 mg of calcium.

Calcium fortified foods. Calcium is sometimes added to orange juice, bread, soft drinks, cereal, milk, yogurt, and other foods. The amount of calcium in these foods is listed on the label. Keep in mind that calcium-fortified foods can increase your calcium intake. However, they do not provide the body with other nutrients supplied by dairy foods.

Calcium Supplements. There are a wide variety of calcium supplements on the market. The amount of calcium in these supplements is listed on the label. There are no benefits for taking more than your RDA for calcium. In fact, high doses of calcium may interfere with the absorption of other nutrients, like iron.

In the case of calcium supple-

ments, synthetic is best. Supplements that rely on natural sources of bonemal and dolomite have been found to contain lead. Oyster shell can be very expensive and may be contaminated with lead also.

Vitamin D is essential for calcium absorption. But iron, excessive caffeine, sodium or protein can increase calcium excretion. Take iron supplements at different times of the day. Avoid aluminum-containing antacids or laxatives.

Calcium supplements may interfere with some medications. A person taking corticosteroids, anti-convolulsants, thyroid medication, tetracycline or diuretics should discuss calcium requirements with their physician.

Agricultural News

Crop reports will be taken now through July 15. Producers have been sent postcards by mail with a designated number for their certification.

Producers who have crops planted prior to their scheduled week may come in earlier to do their reports, but all crops MUST BE PLANTED prior to filing your report. Producers are urged to call FSA at 256-2525 at once as crops are planted to schedule a time at their convenience. We realize the weather is causing a delay in planting, it is for this reason we urge you to come in as soon as you can (after planting). Burley tobacco producers are advised to file a crop report, since this will serve as a record of farm production for disaster leasing and production history.

The Non-Insured Assistance Program (NIAP) provides protection against widespread loss caused by a natural disaster to designated areas for which crop insurance is not available. To qualify for this program an area must have at least 5 producers of crops on separate and distinct farms that were affected by the same natural disaster with total production loss of at least 35%. Producers must have a crop report on file prior to the July 15 deadline to be eligible for benefits. Some of the non-insurable crops

in Rockcastle County include hay, pasture, soybeans, pepper, sweetcorn, green beans, any fruit or vegetable grown commercially for food.

Producers are reminded that farms which do not have a history of flooding and/or growing their tobacco quota 2 out of 3 preceding years will result in

a dropped quota. Farms in danger have been notified and should take action.

A new program, Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP), was established to assist crop and livestock producer deal with environmental conservation on their own farm. Sign-up for this program began June 3, and will extend until July 30. The objective of this assistance to be provided is to ensure the maximum level of environmental protection. The Rockcastle County has not been allocated any funds for this program at this time.

Producers who have tobacco leases on file that have not been signed should be aware that the deadline to obtain signatures is July 14. If you have leases that you need to do, come in as soon as possible.

FCIC insured producers who wish to continue their coverage from 1996, have until the crop reporting deadline of July 15, to pay the administrative fee and sign appropriate application. If you will have tobacco insured through FSA and do not expect to have it planted by the June 30 planting deadline, please come into the office to sign an FCIC Late Planting Agreement, in order for the insurance to cover the late planted crop. The CAT insurance from FSA will also cover a crop that was prevented from being planted due to adverse weather conditions.

Farm Bill shifts all crop insurance sales from USDA to private agents

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman has today announced that crop insurance (CAT) will be available exclusively through crop insurance agents,

beginning in the 1998 crop year. Previously, the catastrophic level of crop insurance (CAT) was available through both local USDA Farm Service Agency offices and crop insurance agents in 36 states.

Glickman said this decision was made after carefully reviewing the number of crop insurance agents in each state to ensure that an adequate sales force is in place to provide all farmers with CAT coverage. The 1996 Farm Bill requires USDA to transfer the sales of CAT coverage entirely to the private sector if a sufficient number of agents are available in each state to provide this service.

"While the sales and servicing of policies will be done by the private sector," Glickman said, "this change will not weaken the existing safety net for producers. I am determined that everyone will have access to crop insurance - large farmers and small farmers alike, especially those with limited resources, minorities and producers in all areas of the country."

"Before making this decision, private company representatives gave me their commitment to reach out to all America's farmers and to assure that the highest level of risk management service is extended to everyone," Glickman said. "I look forward to this partnership. I also intend to exercise appropriate oversight over the companies to ensure compliance with their commitment."

Kentucky accepting applications for Environmental Incentives Program

Final rules for USDA's new Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) were published in the Federal Register on May 27, 1997. EQIP was created by the 1996 Farm Bill and combines the functions of several previous conservation programs including the Agricultural Conservation Program, and the Water Quality Incentives Program.

EQIP provides cost-share assistance for up to 75 percent of the cost of certain conservation practices such as grassed waterways and manure management facilities. In addition, incentive payments can be made for up to three years to encourage producers to perform certain land management practices that are currently not in use on their land.

Total cost-share and incentive payments are limited to \$10,000 per person per year and \$50,000 for the length of the contract, which can run from 5 to 10 years. The program is limited to persons who are engaged in livestock or agricultural production.

For fiscal year 1997, Kentucky will receive \$3.1 million dollars.

Approximately 65% of this will be used in 12 locally identified priority areas and 35% will be used for other significant statewide natural resource concerns including soil erosion, water quality and animal waste management.

Funds will be distributed on a competitive basis. While the sign-up for EQIP is considered to be continuous, cut-off points will be identified where all applications received up to that point will be scored according to ranking criteria. Applicants with the most environmental benefits for program costs will receive the highest consideration for funding. Because of the limited funding, all counties may not receive funding.

The first ranking period will run from June 3, 1997, until July 30, 1997. All applications received through July 30 will be scored and ranked against each other. Applications for EQIP may be made at the local Natural Resources Conservation Service, Farm Service Agency or Conservation District office. For more information contact John Graham at 256-2541.

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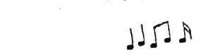

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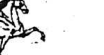
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


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Local students to attend leadership program

Elementary pupils are exposed to various careers through activities such

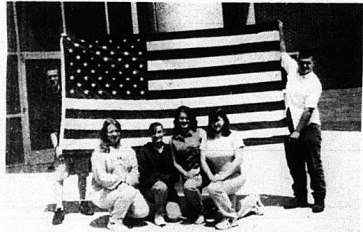

The 100 mile ride not only demands a great deal of endurance from the riders but also from the horses

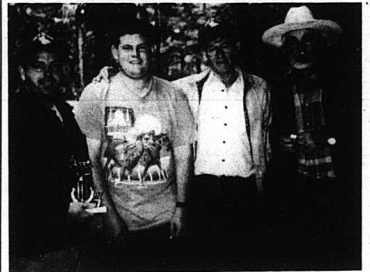

Report to Kentucky

NEW CAPITAL GAINS CROWD IN TOWN

The smell of expensive Italian leather is in the air once again. That's a strong indication that tax legislation is being written in the halls of Congress and corporate lobbyists are staking out their positions in Gucci Gulch.

But this time around that expensive shoe leather may just give way to the heavy soles of hard working middle income families. Not only has Congress and the White House agreed to a package that includes a \$500 per child tax credit and education tax initiatives, but there's a chance capital gains legislation could be targeted toward middle income families and small business owners.

I've introduced legislation cutting capital gains tax rates with just those Americans in mind. It would cut the rate on long-term investments even further than the latest House proposal and costs less.

The emphasis is on the long-term. By promoting long-term capital investment and savings, not only do middle income families with long-held property stand to benefit, but businesses will also find it easier to attract long-term investors. And this approach minimizes the long-term impact on the budget deficit.

Because my bill is based on a sliding scale, the longer an individual holds an asset, the greater the reduction in the capital gains rate. I've kept the current top rate of 28 percent as a maximum, but added additional rewards for long term investors. Assets held more than two years would qualify for an exclusion of one-fourteenth of the capital gain.

Assets held for more than three years would qualify for a two-fourths exclusion, and so on, extending out to assets held for more than eight years. At eight years, an owner qualifies for a seven-fourths or fifty percent exclusion.

With these changes in place, families would be able to pass a farm or business on to their children, without going bankrupt. And middle income individuals who hold onto assets for longer periods than speculators will be rewarded for their long-term investing.

When you compare this proposal to the others already on the table, you'll find it provides both lower taxes to lower and middle income families and has less of an impact on the deficit over the long-term.

A lower long-term impact on the deficit. Greater capital gains tax cuts for long-term investors. The sliding scale approach is good policy aimed squarely at America's middle income families, but within the context of a balanced budget.

So step aside Gucci. There's a new capital gains crowd in town.

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Legislative Update

As the second full week of the General Assembly Special Session came to a close, three major bills were under consideration. The Session, which began May 12th, was called by the Governor for the purpose of attempting to improve our system of public universities and post secondary technical schools. Originally, the Governor proposed a complete separation of the state's community colleges from the University of Kentucky. This proposal severely divided the members of the House of Representatives and the Governor opted instead for a plan that keeps the community colleges under the name of UK, although UK would have little control of them. The bill passed the full House on Tuesday, May 20th.

The higher education bill, House bill 1, is now in the Senate Education Committee where it is expected to stay over the holiday weekend. The Senate committee has made several changes in the legislation, and a vote from the full Senate is not expected before Wednesday of the third week

of the Special Session.

The agenda for the session was expanded by the Governor earlier this week, to add budget legislation to fund House bill 1 through the next fiscal year. The Education Budget Bill, HB4, requests more than just education expenses. While HB 4, provides for appropriations to finance the proposed post secondary education reform program, it also makes funding requests for two juvenile detention centers, capital construction projects, and a new technology trust fund plan for computers in our elementary and secondary schools. The primary changes in the budget for post secondary education will be to increase base appropriations for universities, create strategic investment and incentive funds that will be available to colleges that improve their academic standings, and 11.8 million dollar infusion of new money into our community college system. Funds are also included for the new College of Engineering at Paducah. A provision in HB 4 requiring the state pay for confined juveniles was delayed until July 1, 1998.

Of some surprise was the introduction of HB 5, which is legislation supporting the Empower Kentucky Program. Empower Kentucky is an initiative to increase government efficiency and streamline programs. HB 5 would give the state more authority to take advantage of current financial trends in the borrowing and investing of state funds, and allow the state to take greater advantage of the advancements in computer technology for transacting business and storing records. A provision in the bill for severance pay for state workers who lose their jobs due to efficiency efforts was withdrawn by the Governor just before the bill was introduced.

The Governor is depending on the success of the Empower Kentucky Program to result in savings that will be necessary to keep the state budget in balance in order to enact his higher education reform initiatives. This has raised considerable concern for many of us in the legislature, and I plan to look at this legislation very closely as the special session progresses.

With many considerations yet to be made about the bills before us, it is expected at this time that the Session might continue into early June.

Bluegrass State Games first deadline nears

The first registration deadline for the 1997 Bluegrass State Games is over two weeks away and the entries are beginning to pour in. The 13th annual statewide event will be held on July 18-20 and 25-27 in Lexington and surrounding counties.

Entries for basketball, diving, equestrian, gymnastics, in-line hockey, soccer, softball, tennis and volleyball must be postmarked by Saturday, June 28. The registration deadline for archery, canoeing & kayaking, chess, croquet, cycling,

Hunters wanting to apply for this year's Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' (KDFWR) managed deer hunts, or quota hunts as they are commonly called, have a little longer than anticipated to send in their applications.

Applications for quota hunts must be postmarked no later than midnight, August 31, 1997. Earlier news releases reported the deadline as June 30, but this change was not approved by the KDFWR Commission at its last meeting.

KDFWR officials anticipate the deadline will be moved up to June for the 1998-99 hunting season, but this year, the deadline remains August 31.

Forms must be completed as instructed in the application packet. Each completed application must be stamped, self-addressed and accompanied by a non-refundable \$3 processing fee. (Make check or money order payable to Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.) Hunters may apply individually.

Those wishing to hunt in a party (up

to four hunters) should staple their application together and mail them in a single envelope, with their \$3 per person processing fees—one check or money order can be written to cover all fees.

A computer will randomly draw hunters from the pool of applicants for each hunt. Adults (16 and older) may apply for only one hunt. Multiple applications will result in rejection. An adult accompanying a youth on a youth quota hunt need not apply to that hunt.

Youth hunters ages 10 to 15 may apply to one youth hunt, one adult hunt and one Ballard WMA hunt. Youths are those who will turn 10 by the date of the hunt and have not reached their 16th birthday. Youth hunters must show a hunter education completion card when checking in for quota hunts.

To request a quota hunt application or for a schedule of hunter education courses, call the KDFWR at (502)654-4336 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Eastern, Monday through Friday.

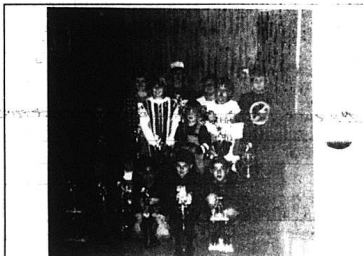

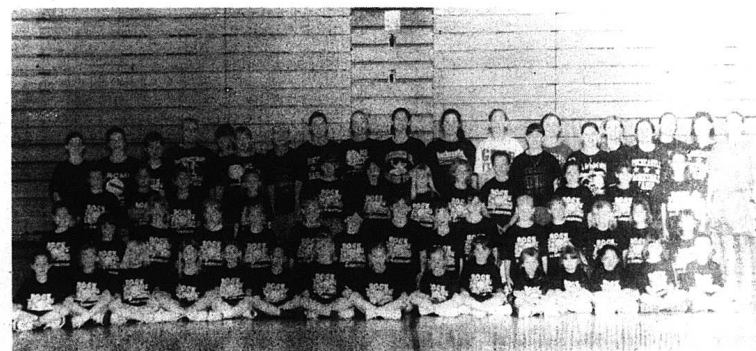

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Blue Mold watch

Kentucky tobacco growers are urged to take precautions to protect their beds and fields from blue mold, a fungus that can cause severe crop losses.

In a blue mold watch issued this week by University of Kentucky plant pathologists, Bill Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist, said that recent cool, wet weather, coupled with highly susceptible plants and the possibility of inoculum arriving in the state, means that blue mold could infect unprotected tobacco.

"It is believed that airborne spores have been arriving in Kentucky from outbreaks in southeastern states. In addition, infected transplants may have been imported from those states," said Nesmith.

Thus far, Nesmith said, no cases of blue mold in Kentucky tobacco have been confirmed as of June 10.

The current blue mold watch, which was expanded June 9, covers all tobacco growing in Kentucky.

A watch means that three conditions related to blue mold development are present, he said.

"First, tobacco plants are susceptible because they are growing rapidly or are crowded in beds. Second, environmental conditions are cool, wet weather — are conducive to blue mold development. Finally, blue mold

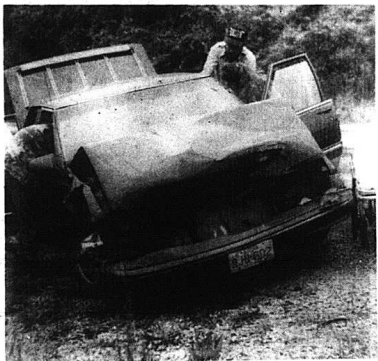
spores are airborne over Kentucky or infected plants have been imported to the state," Nesmith said.

Should blue mold be confirmed in Kentucky tobacco, Nesmith said that a blue mold warning will be put into place for areas with active blue mold, which means that the threat to unprotected conditions no longer support blue mold development.

"Producers' best strategies of controlling their crop is to heed blue mold watches and to keep fungicide regimens in place," he said. "Growers need to keep in mind that preventive approaches are needed, rather than rescue efforts to save already infected fields."

County Extension offices are alerted to changes in blue mold status simultaneously, he said, and they also have the most up-to-date recommendation for protecting crops from the disease.

National FFA Scholarship awarded to local student

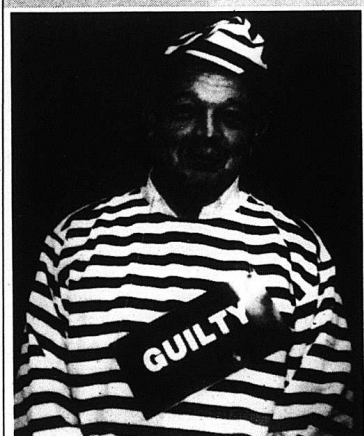

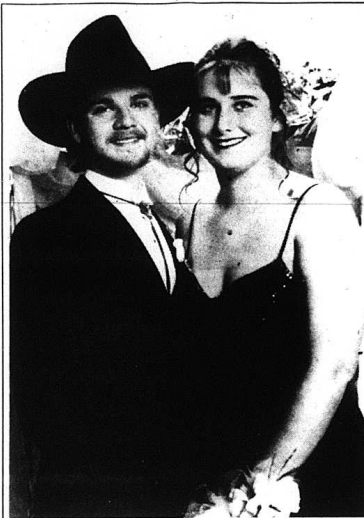

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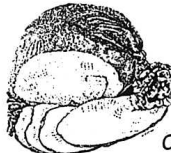

If a man punches his wife in the nose, that is easily recognized as abuse. Sometimes however, the wife is not certain if what she is experiencing is abuse. (If you think you may be abused, read this checklist. If someone you know is being abused, pass it on to her.)

Have any of these things ever happened to you?
SLAPPED, SHAKEN, PUNCHED, BEATEN, BITTEN, PUSHED, PINCHED, KICKED, HAD OBJECTS THROWN AT YOU, DENIED PROPER MEDICAL CARE, CALLED DEMENTING NAMES, FORCED INTO UNWANTED SEXUAL ACTS.

If any of these have happened to you or another woman, then you are a victim of what is usually called,

"spouse abuse." In addition, your abuser may do other things to you that you don't think are abuse, but they are.

Abuse is scary. You know that physical abuse includes actions like being hit. But did you know that lots of other things, can also be abuse? Have any of the following ever happened to you?

THREATENED, HUMILIATED IN PUBLIC, CONTINUALLY CRITICIZED, CALLED DEROGATORY NAMES, HAD YOUR THOUGHTS AND FEELINGS CONTINUALLY IGNORED, DENIED ACCESS TO FINANCIAL RESOURCES OR THE OPPORTUNITY TO PARTICIPATE IN FINANCIAL DECISIONS, HAD VULNERABLE PROPERTY DESTROYED, YOUR CHILDREN

HAVE BEEN ABUSED TO PUNISH YOU, ACCUSED UNJUSTLY AND CONTINUALLY OF HAVING AFFAIRS OR FLIRTING, PREVENTED FROM SEEKING WORK, LOCKED OUT OF THE HOUSE, ISOLATED FROM FAMILY AND FRIENDS, ABANDONED IN DANGEROUS PLACES, DENIED AFFECTION AS PUNISHMENT AND MANIPULATED WITH LIES AND CONTRADICTIONS.

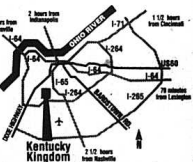

 Thank you very much for your support of the 1997 roadblock for the WHAS Crusade for Children. It would have been impossible for the roadblock to have been successful without your help.

As you know, the Rockcastle County Hospital and Respiratory Care Center has applied for a grant for the purpose of purchasing pediatric equipment for various departments here. Although the Crusade does not approve all applications, each one is given consideration by a

panel from the moral side of the news who then allocate funds to various places according to the organization's need and willingness to use the funds wisely. The Crusade is operated on interest funds. In 1996 the Crusade funded 166 programs. Grants ranged from \$647.00 to 1 million dollars.

Thanks to people like you, Rockcastle County's fund drive was successful. Over \$7,650 was raised. I hope you will be pleased to know that once again this year EVERY CENT THAT YOU ALL COLLECTED will go to an agency helping handicapped children.

The possibility of a large lawsuit against our already financially burdened schools is tremendous. Has this decision been thought through completely or is it a short sighted quick fix to the problem.

Do we really want our educators teaching our future adults that violence is the answer to problems that face our society today? I feel that if hitting is to be used as a form of punishment, it should not be the responsibility of schools officials to perform this deed, but left to the parent. Parental involvement should be absolute.

If corporal punishment, (spanking) is to be administered, should it not be by the hands of a parent, at school, under the supervision of school officials and possibly law enforcement, child welfare, social services and medical representatives,

rather than the principal?

Is the spectacle of requiring parents to strike children in front of a group of professionals, interested only in the child's well being, not better than having the principal perform this task behind closed doors?

Accountability for flogging children should rest solely with the parent, not the principal.

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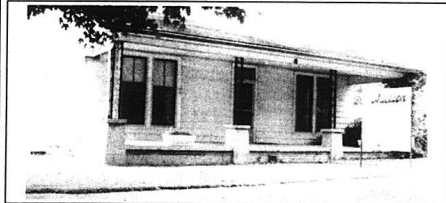
