Eating any kind of fat is bad for our health. Right? Not

you necessarily.

In fact: substituting unsaturated fats for saturated fats is a smart move. It helps lower blood cholesterol, lessening the likelihood of coronary heart disease. Reducing the amount of saturated fat also

cuts the number of catories and helps you shed excess weight. On average, no more than 30% of your calories should come from total fat. And you should eat less than 300 milligrams of cholesterol

a day.
Saturated fat should only account
for 8-10% of total calories. So a
