

## Court criticized over building of new bridge

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met some very harsh criticism over the building of a new bridge on the Old Conway Road, during their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday.

Nina Powell told members of the court that they had "caved in" to the demands of her neighbor (Mrs. Ona Coffey), and she expected them to meet her demands as well. She said the court would be discriminating against her if they did not do so.

Mrs. Powell told the court she had spent over \$100 on film and film processing and had made trips to the highway department in Somerset and the transportation cabinet in Frankfort to try and get the Fairview Bridge replaced.

In June the court voted to replace the bridge, which was constructed in 1932. But before they could get final approval on the project from the state they had to obtain easements from each property owner.

To get an easement from Mrs. Coffey, the court agreed to several concessions including the installation of a water gate.

Mrs. Powell told the court that she too wanted a water gate put on the lower side of the bridge and she wanted the county to maintain it. "We're not going to maintain a water gate," Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis said. Fourth district Magistrate Amos Burdette agreed with Carlotis saying, "I've been in office and I've never had a problem like this, most people are just tickled to death to get a new bridge," Burdette said.

Monday the thermometer at the Bank of Mt. Vernon told the entire story. Hot, hot, hot.

Although the Bank thermometer registered 100 degrees, probably because of its location, (above a slab of concrete) the official high was 94.

The official high was also 94 on Sunday when the heat index across the county and state soared well into the 100s.

But a Monday evening shower cooled things off for the county and dropped the high temperature on Tuesday to just 81, according to figures from the Cox Funeral Home weather station.

During the month of July the county experienced twelve days of 88 degree temperatures or higher and six days of 90 degree or better.

Only 1.5 inches of rainfall was recorded the entire month with .93 of that falling Monday.

In June the county got 6.66 inches of rain and the high temperature was 89.

Last July almost eight inches of rain fell and the high never reached 90.

A new summer season electricity demand was reached also reached last week on the Kentucky Utilities Company. The new peak of 3,358 megawatts came at 2 p.m. July 21.

"That is a bad time (4:30) for our men, many of them are still at work out of town and the others are leaving for their second shift jobs," Ott said.

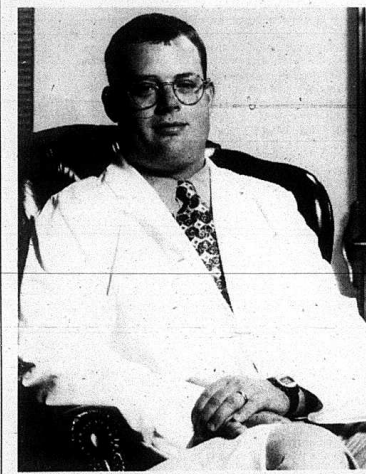

I've been moaning about the dry weather for over three weeks now. Wetting the garden, what little is left of it, down with that good city water every evening and getting my hopes up for nothing every time a cloud blows over or when it thunders off in the distance.

The name of our little Paint Lick suburb is Lowell. Katie Rollins says it used to be two words, Low Well, and so named because every summer the wells go low on water and I'm starting to get the accuracy in the name. Twice last week I drove through down pours within five miles of home but we didn't get so much as a sprinkle.

Last Thursday, way up in the night the thunder rolled and the lightning flashed and I jumped out of bed and ran to the front porch in my skivvies. You don't have to worry about getting caught with your pants off in

Lowell after midnight unless it's by a dog on the prowl.

Anyway, I was sure we were going to get a cloud-burst and I intended to run right out in it. I understand Richmond got nearly an inch in less than fifteen minutes but many a dog fell in the vicinity of Paint Lick.

The only silver lining in the clouds we've been getting is that nobody has to worry about mowing the lawn every three days the way we did back in May and early June. I flipped a cigarette butt out in the yard Sunday evening and Loreta yelled, "Go ahead Dummy!" Set the yard on fire!" And she was dead serious.

I read Clifton Caudill's column in The Mountain Eagle a couple of weeks back and he mentioned that he had the prettiest sweet corn patch he'd ever grown. And that's a pretty big statement because Clifton was growing sweet corn before World

War II.

We managed to get one row about 150 feet long to survive the wet weather and now I'm carrying water in five gallon buckets to see if I can get few hills to survive the drought so that we can have a mess or two of raising ears. three or four bushels off a similar number of vines. This year I'll be tickled with a peck.

Same thing with tomatoes. The ones we're getting aren't as big as tennis balls and I'm not even fooling with them any longer. E.J. Hasly has been getting some ripened tomatoes off the produce wholesaler and it's a lot easier and cheaper on me to just buy them off him than try to get anything out of the garden. I don't know where they're coming from, but E.J. has the best store bought tomatoes I've ever tasted right now.

I'll start selling Bufford Caudills and some good sweet corn I may just burrow Virginia's Kubota and turn my garden under.

Uh oh! I see a cloud coming up out of the west. There may be hope yet.

### TUG OF WAR OVER TAX CUTS

The tax war in Congress just turned into a tug of war. With the economy on track, there's much less fighting over whether or not a tax cut is fiscally responsible. Instead, Republicans and Democrats are struggling over who should reap the benefits of tax relief.

On one side of the rope are those pulling for middle and low income families. On the other side are those willing to throw their weight behind the wealthiest one percent of Americans.

At the center of the debate is the Republicans' refusal to give the full \$500-per-child tax credit to families who owe less than \$500 in income taxes, but pay substantial payroll taxes.

Speaker Newt Gingrich at first went so far as to say that helping such families would turn the tax bill into a "welfare bill."

Police, schoolteachers, bookkeepers, dental assistants, carpenters and other hard working Kentuckians might be surprised to find that a tax break for their children amounts to "welfare," while a tax credit for the children of those making five times their salary is called "tax relief."

Like many Americans, on average, these workers make less than \$25,000 a year. And if they support a family, they probably pay more in federal payroll taxes than they do in income taxes. They're not alone. Well over 50 percent of all Americans pay more in payroll taxes than income taxes.

While some don't consider these Kentuckians as "taxpayers," the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities estimates that families with incomes of less than \$30,000 will owe \$644 billion in federal taxes between 1996 and the year 2000. Ninety percent will come from payroll taxes. And these are the same Americans whose incomes have taken the greatest beating in the last decade.

But these numbers should come as no surprise to Gingrich and company. Three years ago, when they were touting their Contract With America, Republicans promised to apply child tax credits to any net tax liability, even going as far as including an employer's contribution.

Their change of heart would close the door on 25 million children - 40 percent of all children in the United States - whose working parents would not be able to benefit from a child tax credit.

With the economy going strong, we need legislation that not only distributes the tax benefits more evenly among all income groups, but also one that's more fiscally conservative. The costs of both the House and Senate proposals would balloon after a decade, costing \$650 to \$700 billion.

Over the next few weeks, we have to look out for the hardfought gains we've made in the economy and the interests of low and middle income families.

And you can be sure that's going to take more than just a tug or two.

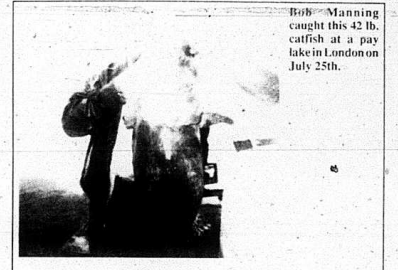
The final date to report crop acreage for tobacco and all other crops except small farms was July 15. If a crop was NOT PLANTED by the final reporting date of July 15, the acreage must be reported by 15 calendar days after the planting is completed to be considered timely filed. If a crop report is filed after the final reporting date because the crop was planted late, a statement will be added to the report saying when the crop was planted, and initiated by the producer. Late-filing fees will not apply if the crop is reported within 15 days after planting. Late-filed reports may be taken on tobacco even if planting was completed prior to the deadline, with no late fee charge.

Nominating petitions for the FSA Committee election are being accepted now through October 27. The FSA County Committee is the most direct link between USDA farm programs and local producers. The County Committee system helps shape nation-wide programs, into programs that work at the local level by making decisions on things like commodity price support loans and payments and establishing allotments, yields and marketing quotas for some crops. FSA committees also make eligibility determination for farm loans and conservation programs, as well as disaster assistance. To make the system work, it must represent all of the different parts of local agriculture. This means the business side of the operation, the small farmer, people in specialty crops, truck farmers, new farmers, women — all people with unique and valuable insights and perspective to the business. We need their help and experience.

The Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP) provides protection against a widespread loss caused by a natural disaster to designated areas for which crop insurance is not available, to qualify for this program an

undesignated shares prior to August 1. Undesignated shares mean that payments have not been allotted to anyone. Shares should be designated so that final payments can be issued in September.

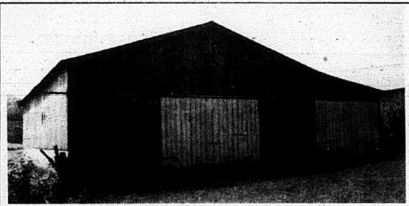

Coffeys before." Mrs. Powell said she wanted the other watergate because she was afraid the Coffeys would use the water gate installed by the county for something else.

The court voted to install water gates on each side of the bridge and to place a concrete post in place of a large tree which is used for boundary purposes which will be removed by construction of the bridge. The court also agreed to send three other requests of Mrs. Powell's along with those requests already granted to Mrs. Coffey to Frankfort.

"That will be the responsibility of the contractor and I can't guarantee you they will do any of them, yours or the Coffeys," Carolotis told Mrs. Powell.

Third district magistrate Bill McKinney told Mrs. Powell that the court was actually trying to accommodate her (Mrs. Powell) by agreeing to Mrs. Coffey's request.

"If we had condemned the bridge, it would not have been built this year. Mrs. Coffey said she didn't care if we built a new bridge, but we knew it was needed," McKinney said.

Mrs. Powell didn't seem convinced by McKinney's statement and after the meeting she told the court that "come spring we will help all of you as much as possible."

Judge Carolotis said after the meeting that the court was pat in the middle of an apparent problem between neighbors and had done everything they could to satisfy the needs of everyone in the area. "That bridge serves forty to fifty families in the area and it had to be replaced," he said.

"With the little amount of money we were receiving from Frankfort these days we could not take a chance on this project, we had to move now," the Judge said.

In other business, the court discussed a bill presented for payment from Central Body Service.

The \$1,148.39 bill was for wrecker service and work on the county fire truck housed at Mt. Vernon. The truck was damaged in a wreck on Sand Springs Road during a fire run on June 24.

"They had it worked on before anyone knew it and they were supposed to get three estimates and didn't," executive secretary Anna Rose Mullins told the court. Mrs. Mullins said she doubted if insurance would pay anything at this point. The court voted to pay the bill along with sev-

eral others. However they passed on a \$2,000 bill presented to them by County Judge-Executive Buzz Carolotis.

Carolotis told the court he had paid \$2,000 in December to local contractor Gary Barnett for work on the Copper Creek slide. "We owed the money and he needed it and the federal government was dragging their feet so I paid him," Carolotis said.

The magistrates agreed that they did indeed owe the county judge the money but they declined to pay him on Tuesday. "We had better wait until we can talk to the county attorney and make sure which is the right way to go about this," magistrate Bill McKinney said. Burdette is on vacation and was not at the meeting.

Carolotis told the magistrates that would be the end of the matter.

The court also discussed damage at the Rockcastle County jail, which at least four inmates were charged with criminal mischief for doing over \$3,000 damage to the facility.

The judge told the court the repairs on the steel ceiling had been repaired and he also told the court he had spent some of his own money again, this time to repair the jail damage.

Although Carolotis did not ask for reimbursement at the meeting of

the money, totaling over \$2,000, he showed the court a bill he had paid because material had come in cash on delivery. He also said he had paid contractor Mike Cameron after he had completed work at the jail.

Carolotis also told the court the reimbursement at a later date. "We can't pay for C.O.D. orders because the court has to approve all payments so I really had no choice," Carolotis said.

The latest personal payment by Carolotis for county goods or services was for the cost of the repairs to nearly \$5,000. In December he paid \$700 to the Madison County Detention center to hold a juvenile offender because the county's jail fund was depleted at the time. Carolotis said on Tuesday that he would not seek reimbursement for that particular payment.

The court also reappointed Rockcastle County Middle School teacher Ken Mattingly to the board of the Rockcastle County Public Library.

Carolotis told the court that circulation at the library had increased by 25 percent in recent months. Carolotis said that Librarian Geraldine Robbins said the increase was due largely in part to the library's ability to access the internet and the addition of audio books.

## Poison Ivy—A Perennial Problem

Uh-oh. What's that nasty three-leafed weed hanging out in the hostas and climbing up the hollies? And is it just out imagination, or is poison ivy showing up in more places and growing faster than usual this summer?

"All that rain early in the season probably did help it along a little bit," said Jim Martin, Extension weed scientist for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, "but it's a pretty prolific plant in Kentucky anyway. However, the weather has been favorable for a lot of perennials this year, and unfortunately that includes poison ivy."

Some people are so sensitive to poison ivy that the slightest contact causes blisters and swelling, while others can pull it up barehanded with little or now adverse effect. The different reactions arise from varying degrees of allergy to an irritating oil found in poison ivy's leaves, vines and roots.

It's also possible to come in contact with the oil, or "urushiol," without touching any part of a poison ivy

"I always knew I'd go back to a small town," Dr. Hamilton said. "I'm just glad to be back home in Rockcastle County, where there's plenty of friends, family, great people and a great hospital."

plant. "It can get on your pet's fur," said Martin, "and when poison ivy burns, there's oil in the smoke too."

Poison ivy can be identified by careful leaf-counting. Martin says all poison ivy leaves are composed of three leaflets. Some poison ivy plants may also have clusters of whitish-green drupes, a berry-like fruit that serves as a winter food source for birds.

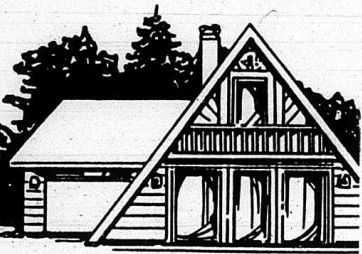
"Hand removal or digging it up with a shovel is good," Martin said, "but wear gloves and throw them away when you're done." Then scrub up with an alkaline soap.

If you're uneasy about handling poison ivy at all, a lawnmower or weedeater may be your best defense.

"You can just keep moving it down," Martin said, "and you'll eventually kill the plant by starving out the root system."

Whether you dig, pull, mow or spray, the roots of poison ivy have to go. "It's a perennial, and it's not easily controlled," Martin warned. "If you don't get rid of the roots, it's probably going to come back."

### AGRICULTURAL FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Brodhead Fair is planned and conducted according to Kentucky Department of Agriculture regulations for use of State Fairs.
2. All entries must be on grounds and remain on display to conform with regulations.
3. All exhibits (except livestock) must remain on display until 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 9, 1997. Premiums will not be paid for exhibits removed prior to that time.
4. All exhibits (except open livestock shows) are limited to residents of Rockcastle County.
5. 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show in all open division classes with the same animals as shown in 4-H and FFA departments. All entries must be made prior to the show.
6. The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes when a class has fewer than three entries and/or two exhibitors.
7. All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations.
8. No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes.
9. The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters connected with or incident to the fair.
10. The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.
11. Blue ribbons are not to exceed \$30.00 in livestock shows. Money not used in one division may be transferred to another division on the Danish system.
12. Foods, fruits and vegetable entries are to be made on paper plates. Canned foods are to be exhibited in standard canning jars.
13. When there is only one entry in a class, it is the discretion of the judges to determine the ribbon received.
14. All entries in 4-H and FFA classes must have been produced in conjunction with an approved project.

## DIVERTICULITIS

**O**uch! There's that pain again. That searing abdominal cramping. Sometimes it is on the right side of your stomach. Sometimes it is on the left. Regardless, it hurts.

Is it appendicitis? Ulcers? Kidney stones? Actually, it may be diverticulitis.

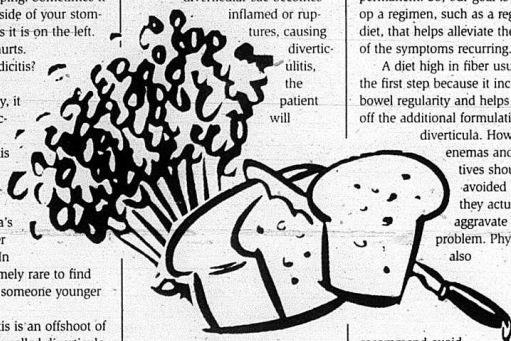
Diverticulitis is a stomach ailment affecting more than half of America's population over the age of 65. In fact, it is extremely rare to find this disease in someone younger than 40.

Diverticulitis is an offshoot of a related illness called diverticulosis that originates in the colon.

The colon, a part of the large intestine, is a long tube-like form that attaches to the rectum and is essential in eliminating waste from the body. As the body ages, the muscular wall of the colon becomes thicker. Pressure within the colon causes it to form small sacs that protrude outside the large intestine. These sacs are called diverticula. Sometimes, these sacs become inflamed, causing a condition called diverticulitis.

"Diverticulosis usually causes few or no symptoms" said Dr. Karen Saylor, a physician at

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "But, when a diverticular sac becomes inflamed or ruptures, causing diverticulitis, the patient will



experience a great deal of pain and discomfort."

According to Dr. Saylor, some of the symptoms of diverticulitis may include abdominal tenderness and cramping, constipation, diarrhea, bloating, fever, and nausea. More severe cases may report blood in stool and colon obstruction.

Most people who have diverticulosis require no treatment because they exhibit few or no symptoms. However, when the disease progresses to diverticulitis, treatment becomes a priority.

"Usually, we administer antibiotics to combat the inflammation

and infection," said Dr. Saylor. "The diverticula, once formed, are permanent. So, our goal is to develop a regimen, such as a regulated diet, that helps alleviate the chance of the symptoms recurring."

A diet high in fiber usually is the first step because it increases bowel regularity and helps ward off the additional formulation of diverticula. However, enemas and laxatives should be avoided because they actually may aggravate the problem. Physicians also

recommend avoiding certain foods, such as nuts, corn and seeds, which can deposit in the sacs and cause inflammation.

"A high-fiber diet that includes foods like bran, leafy, fibrous vegetables, and cereals are best for fighting diverticulitis," said Dr. Saylor. "I recommend avoiding foods that can cause a gaseous buildup, such as beans, cabbage, cauliflower, and brussels sprouts, however. The gas build up may make symptoms worse."

If you think you may suffer from diverticulosis or diverticulitis, contact your physician immediately for a complete evaluation.

### REHYDRATION

Remember those cartoons of desperate characters, stranded in the middle of the blazing hot desert? Mirages of cool waterfalls and shady palm trees are dancing in their minds. Sometimes, the summer heat can make you feel like one of those cartoon characters. But, when it actually happens, it's not so funny. Dehydration is one of the most common maladies of summer. It can cause headaches, cramping, and nausea. In severe cases, it can be fatal.

How do you know if you're at risk for dehydration? It's easy. Take a few minutes to complete this test after you've been working or playing outdoors. It will help determine how much dehydration you incur during an outdoor activity:

- Empty your bladder and record your weight.
- Proceed with your usual outdoor activity and drink liquids as you normally would.
- Towel dry. Empty your bladder and then record your post-exercise weight.
- Subtract your post-exercise weight from your pre-exercise weight to get the number of pounds you shed during exercise.
- To find out what percentage of your weight you lost during exercise, take the number of pounds lost and divide by your first weight. Then multiply by 100. This equals the percent of your body weight lost.

For example:

Pre-activity weight = 115  
Post-activity weight = 113  
Pre-activity minus post activity weight:  
115-113 = 2 pounds  
Percentage of body weight lost:  
2/115 = .0174  
.0174 x 100 = 1.74 percent

When you reach percentages of four percent or more, you are entering the danger zone. Re-hydrate with water immediately and see a physician.

- 0%—normal heat regulation and performance
- 1%—thirst is stimulated, heat regulation during exercise is altered, performance begins to decline
- 2%—further decrease in heat regulation, increased thirst, worsening performance
- 3%—more of the same
- 4%—exercise performance cut by 20-30 percent
- 5%—headache, irritability, fatigue
- 6%—weakness, severe loss of thermoregulation

## USE YOUR HEAD WHEN CHOOSING A BIKE HELMET

### MEDICAL MATTERS

#### CT SCANNER

Rockcastle Hospital recently purchased a new CT scanner, which will help increase patient comfort and care. The scanner has "spiral" capabilities that allows for fast, non-stop scanning. Patients, therefore, will spend less time on the table. Scans that used to take 15 or 20 minutes are done now in under five minutes.

The machine also has the ability to scan in 1mm increments or "slices," instead of the typical 10mm scans at many hospitals. Doctors can actually go back in and look between the slices if something looks suspicious. That translates into a 30 percent increase in finding pathology and helping make clearer diagnoses.

Patients also have noticed two other benefits. The table lowers closer to the floor for easier patient access, and there is a larger opening in the gantry to help reduce patient anxiety.

With this advancement in medical technology, Rockcastle Hospital patients can have advanced tests done closer to home, instead of making special trips to Louisville, Lexington or Knoxville.

**S**electing a good bicycle helmet may be the best pocket change you will spend this year. To put it in perspective, a good bicycle helmet costs about one-tenth of what a good bicycle costs.

According to the Bicycle Helmet Safety Institute (BHSI), a non-profit organization, nearly 600,000 Americans seek emergency treatment for bicycle-related head injuries every year. Nearly 1,000 die as a result of those injuries. Additional statistics published by a leading medical journal indicate that if these cyclists had been wearing adequate head gear, their chances of avoiding serious injury increase dramatically.

The article notes that "... helmet use is associated with a reduction in the risk of any head injury by 69 percent, brain injury by 65 percent, and severe brain injury by 75 percent. ..." Those are sobering statistics.

"It is unfortunate how many injuries we see in our emergency room that could have been prevented if the person had only been wearing a helmet," said Renee Robinson, an emergency room nursing director at Rockcastle Hospital. "Both child-rend and adults need to wear protective head gear when cycling."

Most helmets are made of a thin plastic shell, with an inner-layer of stiff expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam that helps absorb the impact of a collision. EPS is the same type of foam used in picnic coolers.

If you are in the market for bicycle helmet, the BHSI offers these guidelines: Try it on! A

good fit means the helmet is level on your head, touching all around. It should fit snugly, but not tight. You should not be able to move it any direction, and it should not pull off, regardless of how hard you try. The helmet's outer shell should be smooth so it skids easily on rough pavement and won't jerk your neck, causing further injury. It also should have a strong chin strap that will sustain multiple impacts—such as a car, then the pavement. Make sure the strap won't unfasten on the first impact. Look for an industry

standard certification. If a helmet does not have a Snell, ASTM/SEI or CPSC sticker, it does not meet basic safety standards. Choose a colorful helmet that is visible to other cyclists and drivers. Reflective strips also provide added safety. Lastly, look at ventilation. Does the helmet offer enough ventilation for the sweat to evaporate without sacrificing safety?

Have a professional at a bike shop help you determine which helmet is right for you.

Speakers included: Buster Poindexter, Josh McDowell, Tony Campolo, Reggie Dabbs and Ken Davis.

Mike Howard, an 8th grader at R.C.M.S. this year, said about the conference and its speakers, "It rocked!" Reggie Dabbs is the main "We gotta show some love!" referring to Dabbs message of sharing God's love through our actions.

Peyton Rogers, also an 8th grader, said the top-notch groups were the highlight for her. "The musical groups were just great! They inspired me to really listen to what God was saying."

Some unexpected guests also made appearances. Three members of the Bible Baptist group gave up their front-row seats for the Jars of Clay concert so former French Open tennis champion Michael Chang could watch the concert after he shared his personal testimony in one session. The local members said they didn't mind losing their seats for the #2 ranked tennis player in the world. "Who wouldn't give up their seats for a chance to meet a famous Chris-

tian athlete like that," said Jody Kirby, one of the chaperones on the trip. "Besides, he signed some magazines for us, and we still had second and third row seats. So we got the best of both."

Also attending the conference was actor, Austin O'Brien, who plays the oldest son on the C.B.S. series "Promised Land." O'Brien took part in many of the skits and video dramas used at the superconference, which had students from all 50 states and 17 different countries.

Despite all the headlines and big names at DCLA '97, each of the Bible Baptist team members said the real highlight of the event was meeting with one person — God.

"When you run into these kids, you'll realize this week that no one is perfect, and God loves us anyway. It was awesome!" said Faith Bader, a junior at North Laurel High School who attends Bible Baptist.

Building, Smithsonian Museum, Holocaust Museum and Arlington Cemetery, among other sites and attractions.

"Most people will hear about all the fun things we did in Washington; but these kids had to have some real determination at times. We walked more than 25 miles in eight days, and three of four of those days saw 100-degree temperatures," said Stoyton. "All the hard work getting ready to make the trip paid off. It was like we were training for what we would do in Washington!"

Erin VanWinkle, a 7th grader at the Middle School, jokingly added, "We said we'd never eat another chili dog or slice of pizza again after all our fundraisers, but we did. We ended up eating them every day because the lines in the restaurants were so long!"

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Stoyton added that plans are already in the works for the next DC/LA superconference, which will take place in the year 2000.

"Keep your eye out for a bunch of kids washing cars, serving hot dogs or pizza, and trying to raise money for their next trip soon. Now that they have seen just how awesome an event this is, I expect a lot more to join us in three years. I can't wait to see all God is going to do between now and then with this great group of teenagers!"

## USDA join forces with HUD to fight housing discrimination

The U.S. Department of Agriculture can now assist rural Americans with housing discrimination complaints more quickly, efficiently, and with more remedies thanks to a new working arrangement with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

In a joint press conference held recently at Kanton Apartments in Georgetown, USDA Rural Development State Director Thomas G. Fern and HUD State Coordinator Gus Clay announced that under a new working arrangement, HUD will refer all fair housing discrimination claims to HUD for resolution. Under this system, HUD attorneys will represent complainants and HUD administrative law judges will hear the case.

"The American dream of homeownership must not succumb to the nightmare of discrimination," Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said in a fair housing signing ceremony with HUD Secretary Andrew Cuomo earlier this month.

"Equal access to own or rent housing is necessary if we are to complete our mission to help build a better rural America," Glickman said, adding that USDA has "zero tolerance for discriminatory practices" in any of its programs.

"This agreement with HUD is part of USDA's commitment to ensure the civil rights of all customers and employees of USDA, and it's also an important part of the President's race initiative."

"By working together, USDA and HUD can attack housing discrimination with greater force and move swiftly toward elimination of discrimination in housing programs," said Thomas G. Fern, State Director of Rural Development.

"Through this HUD/USDA Memorandum of Understanding, we will be able to ensure that all Americans, both rural and urban, will be afforded the protection of the Federal Fair Housing Act," said Gus Clay, State Coordinator of the Kentucky State HUD Office.

The Fair Housing Act provides several rights and remedies that USDA, before this agreement, did not have at its disposal, including the power to impose temporary restraining orders, sue subpoenas during investigation, employ testers where appropriate, and impose civil penalties, punitive damages, and damages for pain and suffering.

Through its various rental and homeownership loan programs,

USDA is the nation's largest provider of rural housing. As part of the agreement, USDA and HUD will share information and documents about civil rights claims which allege a violation of the Fair Housing Act. They will also jointly investigate these claims, maintain and share cumulative list of claims, and participate in joint training on fair housing.

"In addition, USDA is reviewing all programs and activities to investigate any past due discrimination in the sale or rental of rural housing it finances. Any discrimination uncovered by the investigation will be aggressively prosecuted," Glickman said.

In 1996 USDA financed new or improved home ownership opportunities for over 61,000 low to moderate income citizens in Rural America. Since 1949, USDA has helped over 2 million rural families purchase their own home and has financed construction of 458,000 units of affordable rental housing in rural areas.

Under the Fair Housing Act, HUD receives 10,000 claims of housing discrimination annually. Approximately 11 percent of those come from non-metropolitan areas.

While the Agreement provides that HUD will investigate and decide fair housing claims, USDA will continue to process complaints under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975.

## The Center for Rural Development offers technology to Rockcastle County

The Center for Rural Development is coming to Rockcastle County armed with the latest technology. Through a \$7 million grant from the Small Business Administration, The Center is creating Center Net, a technology infrastructure to link the forty-counties it serves in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

Counties will submit applications to The Center for telecommunications equipment to be used by local government, businesses, educators and nonprofits. The goal is to implement an application independent network that can be utilized by all members of the community. Each site will be fully equipped for video and desktop conferencing and Internet connectivity.

"The main ingredient is that these sites must be available to the public," said Hilda Gay Legg, Executive Director and CEO of The Center. "Our goal is that everyone who needs the equipment will have access."

All of the technology centers linked through CenterNet will be able to dial-up the other technology centers in the forty counties on the network without long distance toll charges. "We are enabling the forty counties to work together regionally," said Salo K. Fajer, Director of Telecommunications for The Center.

"With The Center as a hub, each of these forty counties has complete access to the other thirty-nine technology centers hooked on the network."

Communities are encouraged to devise partnerships within themselves to house, utilize and maintain the technology. In addition, community education and application development are very important to the long term advantages of the network. Long distance depositions, telemedicine, training and regional business meetings are just a few of the applications these systems can make possible.

The uses for the network are virtually unlimited," said Legg. "Through CenterNet, we can truly begin to form regional strategies to improve economic development in Southern and Eastern Kentucky."

In the form we were to give the current status of the library, including strengths, weaknesses and problems.

We are not planning on discontinuing bookmobile service to this county. We will need to make some changes later if the bookmobile should have a major problem, but we are planning on trying to get another one or make repairs if they are not too costly. There is no plans to take the bookmobile off the road so do not be alarmed about this.

This form was merely to make the Regional Office and the State Li-

brary aware of the problems that are in the library. I just wanted to let our patrons know of some of the things that do occur at the library such as this annual report that must be prepared every fiscal year. Also I wanted to let everyone know about the increase in library circulation and the many other services now available at the library such as the computers and the internet connection.

I have received several more books this week and some of them are... 1. UNNATURAL EXPOSURE by Patricia Cornwell... Virginia's chief medical examiner, Kay Scarpetta, is trapped in a nightmare of unsolved murders and a pernicious virus in this breathless thriller, where clues are elusive and the killer's threats are hurled through cyberspace.

Scarpetta soon discovers inconsistencies between a new case and

the serial-murders she has been investigating. With the help of her niece Lucy, they probe illuminating details in virtual reality, helping local authorities try to wrap up the case. But Scarpetta soon realizes she is up against a killer with access to an incredibly sophisticated arsenal of deadly force and she herself may have been exposed to this deadly virus.

2. MISSING PIECES by Joy Fielding... This is one of my favorite authors and this proves to be one of her best novels yet... Family therapist Kate Sinclair repairs other people's troubled lives, all the while reveling in her stable marriage and handsome home. But there are demons in her past that will not stay buried forever, and the carefully constructed edifice of her life comes tumbling down when her half-sister, Jolynn, announces her plans to marry Colin Friendly, a man on trial for the brutal murders of thirteen Palm Beach women.

Kate soon finds herself embroiled in a desperate struggle to protect her family from Colin's increasingly sinister advances. To make matters worse, her aging mother is losing her grip on reality and her rebellious daughter, Sara is falling under Jolynn's wayward influence.

As Kate Sinclair slowly slips across the razor-shin line separating ordinary life from unspeakable terror she realizes that there is no one she

can trust, nowhere she can run... and no way she can deny that she and her loved ones may be the next targets of a demented serial killer.

One non-fiction book that presents some facts about the Viet Cong Death Camps is by Mr. Anton. WHY DIDN'T YOU GET ME OUT? ... When Frank Anton took off in his chopper to fly another mission over Vietnam on January 5th, 1968, he had no idea that he was setting out on a five year journey through five different jungle camps that served as makeshift prisons. While in the camps he watched helplessly as his fellow POWs died of starvation and disease. Near death himself, he was eventually marched north along the Ho Chi Minh Trail to Hanoi where he spent the last two years of his captivity.

After his release he found an amazing revelation. He learned that the U.S. Government had known of his exact location all the while. He saw aerial photographs of the camps where prisoners were held and he even saw a close-up of himself walking the Ho Chi Minh Trail. In Frank's mind he wondered, "Why didn't you get me out?"

There have been other books by Vietnam POWs, but this is the first one by an American who was held in these Viet Cong jungle camps.

This account not only relates the horror of that experience, but sheds some light on issues still being debated, including the question of missing POWs.

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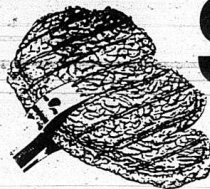


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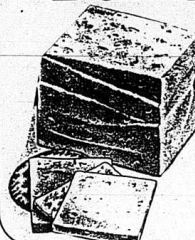

### SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations: Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
  - a. Use of profane/foul language
  - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
  - c. Fighting on the bus
  - d. Destruction of bus property
  - e. Defiance of driver's authority
  - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.



## Parents & Teachers School Bus Safety Alert

A child's clothing can be dangerous when getting off the bus. A number of children have been injured or killed when their clothing became caught when exiting the bus.

**Dangerous clothing that can get caught in handrails, doors or other areas include:**

Jackets or sweatshirts with drawstrings

Backpack straps

Scarves or other loose clothing

**Please talk with your children about these Safety Rules:**

Stay away from Danger Zones around the bus

If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. The driver may not see you. Tell the driver & follow his/her instructions.

Remember that motorists don't always stop for the school bus. Use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus.
