THE TAX WAY IN CORP. TAX CUTS

The tax war in Congress just turned into a tug of war. With the economy on track, there's much less fighting over whether or not a tax cut is fiscally responsible. Instead. Republicans and Democrats are struggling over who should reap the benefits of tax relief.

On one side of the rope are those pulling for middle and low income families. On the other side are those willing to throw their weight behind the wealthiest one percent of Americans.

At the center of the debate is the Republicans' refusal to give the full \$500-per-child tax credit to families who owe less than \$500 in income taxes, but pay substantial payroll taxes.

Speaker New Gingrich at first went so far as' to say that helping such families would turn the tax bill into a "welfare bill."

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

Poison Ivy—A Perennial Problem

Uh-oh. What's that nasty three-leafed weed hanging out in the hostas and climbing up the hollies? And is it just out imagination, or is poison ivy showing up in more places and grower faster than usual this sum-

mer?

"All that rain early in the season probably did help it along a little bit," as did Jim Martin, Extension weed scientist for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, "but it's a pretty prolific plant in Kentucky any—way, However, the weather has been favorable for a lot of preennials this year, and unfortunately that includes poison ivy."

Some conde are so sensitive to

Some people are so sensitive to poison ivy that the slightest contact causes blisters and swelling, while others can pull it up barehanded with little or now adverse effect. The different reactions arise from varying degrees of allergy to an irritating oil found in poison ivy's leaves, vines and roots

It's also possible to come in con-tact with the oil, or "urushiol," without touching any part of a poison ivy

plant. "It can get on your pets' fur," said Martin, "and when poison ivy burns, there's ool in the smoke too." Poison ivy can be identified by careful leaf-counting. Martin says all poison ivy leaves are composed or three leaflets. Some poison ivy blans may also have clusters of whitishams and the same country of the same poison in the serves as a winter food source for birds.

"Hand removal or digging it up with a shovel is good," Martin said, with a snovet is good, Martin said, "but wear gloves and throw them away when you're done." Then scrub up with an alkaline soap. If you're uneasy about handling poison ivy at all, a lawnmower or weedeater may be your best defense.

"You can just keep moving it down,"
Martin said, "And you'll eventually
kill the plant by starving out the root

system."

Whether you dig, pull, mow or spray, the roots of poison ivy have to go. "It's a perennial, and it's not easily controlled," Martin warned. "If you don't get rid of the roots, it's probably going to come back."

Diverticulitis is a stomach ailment affecting more than half of America's population over the age of 65. In fact, it is extremely rare to find

this disease in someone younger than 40 Diverticulitis is an offshoot of

a related illness called diverticulosis that originates in the colon. The colon, a part of the large

intestine, is a long tube-like form that attaches to the rectum and is essential in eliminating waste from the body. As the body ages, the muscular wall of the colon becomes thicker Pressure within the colon causes it to form small sacs that protrude outside the large intestine. These sacs are called diverticulum. Sometimes, these sacs become inflamed. causing a condition called diverticulitis

"Diverticulosis usually causes few or no symptoms" said Dr. Karen Saylor, a physician at

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, "But, when a diverticular sac becomes

and infection," said Dr. Saylor The diverticula, once formed, are permanent. So, our goal is to develop a regimen, such as a regulated diet, that helps alleviate the chance of the symptoms recurring."

A diet high in fiber usually is the first step because it increases howel regularity and helps ward off the additional formulation of diverticula. However,

enemas and laxatives should be avoided because

they actually may aggravate the problem. Physicians also

recommend avoiding certain foods, such as nuts, corn and seeds, which can deposit in the sacs and cause inflamma-

"A high-fiber diet that includes foods like bran, leafy, fibrous vegetables, and cereals are best for fighting diverticulitis," said Dr. Saylor. "I recommend avoiding foods that can cause a gaseous buildup, such as beans, cabbage, cauliflower, and brussels sprouts, however. The gas build up may make symptoms worse."

Remember those cartoons of desperate characters, stranded in the middle of the blazing hot desert? Mirages of cool waterfalls and shady palm trees are dancing in their minds.

Sometimes, the summer heat can male you feel like one of those cartoon characters. But, when it actually happens, it's not so funny. Dehydration is one of the most common maladies of summer. It can cause headaches, cramping, and nausea. In severe cases, it can be fatal.

How do you know if you're at risk for dehydration?

It's easy, Take a few minutes to complete this test after you've been working or playing outdoors. It will help determine how much dehydration you incur during an outdoor activity;

• Imply your bladder and record your weight.

• Proceed with your usual outdoor activity and drink liquids as you normally would.

• Towel dry, Emply your bladder and then record your post-exercise weight from your pre-exercise weight from your pre-exercise.

• To find out what percentage of your weight you lost during exercise, take the number of pounds tost and drike by your first weight. Then multiply by 100. This equals the percent of your body weight lost.

CT SCANNER

Rockcastle Hospital recently purchased a new CT scanner, which will help increase patient comfort and care. The scanner has "spiral" capabilities that allows for fast, non-stop scanning. Patients, there fore, will spend less time on the table. Scans that used to take 15 or 20 minutes are done now in under five minutes. The machine also has the

ability to scan in 1mm increments or "slices," instead of the typical 10mm scans at many hospitals. Doctors can actually go back in and look between the slices if something looks suspicious. That translates into a 30 percent increase in finding pathology and helping make clearer

Patients also have noticed two other benefits. The table lowers closer to the floor for easier patient access, and there is a larger opening in the gantry to help reduce patient anxiety.

electing a good bicycle helmet maybe the best pocke change you will spend this year. To put it in perspective, a good bicycle helmet costs about one-tenth of what a good bicycle

According to the Bicycle Helmet Safety Institute (BHSI), a non-profit organization, nearly 600,000 Americans seek emer gency treatment for bicycle-related head injuries every year. Nearly 1,000 die as a result of those injuries. Additional statistics published by a leading medical journal indicate that if these cyclists had been wearing adequate head gear, their chances of avoiding serious injury increase dramatically.

The article notes that ". helmet use is associated with a reduction in the risk of any head injury by 69 percent, brain injury by 65 percent, and severe brain injury by 75 percent. . ." Those

are sobering statistics.
"It is unfortunate how many injuries we see in our emergency room that could have been prevented if the person had only been wearing a helmet," said Renee Robinson, an emergency room nursing director at Rockcastle Hospital. "Both childrenand adults need to wear protective head gear when cycling.

Most helmets are made of a thin plastic shell, with an inner layer of stiff expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam that helps absorb the impact of a collision EPS is the same type of foam used in picnic coolers.

If you are in the market for bicycle helmet, the BHSI offers these guidelines: Try it on! A

good fit means the helmet is level on your head, touching all around It should fit snugly but not tight. You should not be able to move it any direction, and it should not pull off, regardless of how hard you try. The helmet's outer shell should be smooth so it skids easily on rough pavement and won't jerk your neck, causing further injury. It also should have a strong chin strap that will sustain multiple impacts- such as a car, then the pavement. Make sure the strip won't unfasten on the first impact. Look for an industry

standard certification. If a helmet does not have a Snell, ASTM/SEI or CPSC sticker, it does not meet basic safety standards. Choose a colorful helmet that is visible to other cyclists and drivers. Reflective strips also provide added safety. Lastly, look at ventilation. Does the helmet offer enough ventilation for the sweat to evaporate with out sacrificing safety?

Have a professional at a bike shop help you determine which helmet is right for you.

for discriminatory practices" in any of its programs. "This agreement with HUD is part of USDA's commitment to ensure the civil rights of all cus-tomers and employees of USDA, and it's also an important part of the President's race initiative."

"By working together, USDA and HUD can attack housing discrimination with greater force and move swiftly toward elimination of dis-crimination in housing programs," said Thomas G. Fern, State Director

said Thomas G. Fern, State Director of Rural Development.
"Through this: HUD/USDA Memorandum of Understanding we will be able to ensure that all Americans, both rural and urban, will be afforded the protection of the Federal Fair Housing Act," said Gus Clay. State: Coordinator of-the Kentucky State HUD Office.

The Fair Housing Act provides several rights and remedies that USDA, before this agreement, did not häve at its disposal, including the power to impose temporary restraining orders, use subpoenas during investigation, employ testers where appropriate, and impose civil penalties, punitive damages, and damages for pain and suffering.

As part of the agreement, USDA and HUD will share information and documents aboutcivil rightsclaims which allege a violation of the Fair Housing Act. They will also jointly investigate these claims, maintain and share cumulative list of claims, and participate injoint training on fair housing. "In addition, USDA is reviewing all programs and activities to investigate any past due discrimination in the sale or rental of rural housing it finances. Any discrimination aucovered by the investigation will be aggressively prosecuted." Glickman said.

In 1996 USDA financed new or improved home ownership opportunities for over 61,000 low to moderate income citizens in Rural America. Since 1949, USDA has helped over 2 million rural families purchase their own home and has financed construction of 458,000 units of affordable rental housing in rural areas. Under the Fair Housing Act, HUD receives 10,000 claims of housing discrimination annually. Approximately 11 percent of those come from non-metropolita areas.

While the Agreement provides that HUD will investigate and decide fair housing claims, USDA will continue up rocess complaints under Title VI of the Civil Rights &ct of 1964. Section 594 of the Republican Act of 1973, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975.



Extension Home Economics Removing Mildew From Household Surfaces

Do you think that you have mildew in your home? -Perhaps you see it growing on walls or floors or perhaps you smell a musty

odor. Sometimes dirt on paint, tile or wood also looks like mildew. To be sure that it is mildew, put a few drops of household bleach-solution on the discolored surface. Mildew will bleach out in a minute or two but most dirt will not. Several chemicals can be used for removing mildew. Test any of



them in any inconspicuous area first, however. Chemicals react differently with various surfaces and may harm some surfaces or cause colors to bleed.

Here are some combinations that will assist in removing mildew:

1) Rubbing alcohol solution is made by mixing half alcohol and half water.

2) Hydrogen peroxide can be used by mixing 2 Tablespoons with 1

to test in an inconspicuous area before using, however. Bathrooms can be scrubbed with a solution of 1 quart chlorine bleach, 1 tablespoon liquid detergent and 9 quarts water. Use a small brush to scrub grout lines.

Use care not to mix chlorine bleach with any other cleaning products. Rinse thoroughly after each cleaning chemical has been applied and before any other cleaning

and before any other cleaning solution is used. Be sure to work in a well-ventilated room and avoid breathing fumes as much as possible. Plastic shower curtains with mildew stains can be scrubbed with a brush dipped in a solution of: warm water and soap or detergent. If the item can be bleached (spot lett is necessary), use a chlorine solution of 1/2 to 1 cup chlorine bleach to 1 gallon of water. Rinse and dry. To help prevent mildew stains, pull the shower curtain along the rod after showering.

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations: Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action. Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of shool bus riding. Following is all stof basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcaste County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.

 1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.

 2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.

 3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.

 4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.

 5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrandements.

 6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
 7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
 8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
 9. Do not block alsies in any way.
 10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
 11. Never un toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
 14. Ride only our assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.

 15. Report any damages to the bus.

 16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.

 17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's intructions.

 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.

 19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times.
- at all times:

 a. Use of profane/foul language
 b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 c. Fighting on the bus
 d. Destruction of bus property
 e. Deflance of driver's authority
 f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.

 20. Disciplinary action; Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to
 the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall
 be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil
 and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid sout
 disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall
 be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.
