Some tips for breathing easier

Some people say they know when it is going to remain by aches in their joints. Others say they have a" nose" for the weather—and they may. "The lining of the nose is an excellent barometer," says Dr. Sanford Archer, University of Kenutekyear, nose and throat specialist. "Changes and fluctuations in temperature and humidity can cause changes in the lining of the nose."

can cause changes in the lining of the nose."

Kentuckians experience humid summers and wet winters accompanied by high seasonal pollenand mold counts. As a result, many are accustomed to having regular nasal compession and drainage and resign themselves to living with their symptoms. For those who can never find relief, it becomes aquestion of when the problem is irritating enough to prompt a visit to the doctor. "When people complain about having 'sinuses' or sinus trouble, it usually means they are experiencing a lot of nasal drainage, stuffiness and irritation. Most of the time this is an inflammation of the lining of the nose called rhinitis. Sinusitis, on the other

inflammation of the fining of the nose called rhinitis. Sinusitis, on the other hand, is an actual infection in the sinuses," says Archer. There are four paired sinuses in the head which lie behind the eyes, cheeks and forehead and between the cheeks and forehead and between the eyes. No one knows exactly what function the sinuses have. They probably help in resonance of sound when we speak, and they make mucous which drains from the sinuses into the back of the nose and throat. The opening of the sinuses is only a few millimeters in size and located at the ten of the eiting cavity.

opening or the sinuses is only a tew millimeters in size and located at the top of the sinus cavity. According to Archer, patients who suspect they have a bad sinus infer-tion are usually correct, because swelling and soreness in the face and accessive drainage (sometimes ac-companied by a fever) make sinusitis easy to diagnose. Simustis is cause by a cold, flu or allergy that tritates the nasal membranes, causing them to increase mucous production, swell and block the sinus opening. This prevents drainage and creates a good environment for bacteria to develop. Since simustis is an infection, it is treated with antibotics prescribed by a doctor, who may also recommend over-the-counter-medications to help over-the-counter medications to help

'It is easy to understand how you could end up with a sinus infection, but surprisingly we get very few. Most people will have one acute si-

nus infection and not many more. If nus intection and not many more. In someone is having recurring infec-tions, there could be an anatomic problem with the nose that may need to be corrected surgically," says Ar-cher.

cher.
The septum, the mid-portion of the nose, is a fairly rigid structure that can block the airway and cause breathing problems if it is crooked. The turbinate bones, which grow on the side of the nose into the nasal passage, are very vascular and shrink

and swell depending on circumstances like the weather. The turbinates also warm and humidify the air we breathe and are part of the natural mastle cycle, in which one side of the nose gets 'stuffy' and the alternate side opens up every few hours. The liming of the nose can also shrink and seed in the natural responsibility of the nose of the natural responsibility of the natural responsibility of the natural responsibility or in the natural responsibility or

Anatomic abnormalities or irritation with any of these structures can lead to nasal problems.

"The majority of people only have thinitis which can be treated with medical management. This means avoiding allegrens, such as cigarette smoke and dust mites, and using medi-

avoiding allergens, such as cigarette smoke and dust mittee, and using medications to help control the problem. There are many over-the-counter medications that act in different ways todo the same thing. You need to find one that works for you, suggests Archer.

If you have symptoms related to allergies, such as teary eyes and sneering, a product containing an anthistamine will help dry up the nose. If your symptoms do not have these allergy components, then a decongestant may give you some relief. For hort-term relief, most over-the-counter decongestant nasal sprasy work in a few seconds and can large to the counter decongestant nasal sprasy work in a few seconds and can large the such as the sprays can cause a rebound effect, leaving you with worse symptoms in the end.

One of the most effective treatments for rhinitis are steroid nasal sprays, which are obtained by pre-scription only. Unlike traditional nascription only. Unlike traditional na-sal sprays, steroid sprays can be used long-term. The word "steroid" may send some people running; however, these sprays are not absorbed into the blood, so there is no danger of harm-ful side effects commonly associated ful side effects commonly associated with steroids. Still, any medication should be used in moderation. Spray, decongestants and anjthistamines are helpful in allevating the symptoms of rhinitis only: sinusitis requires antibotics and a visit to the doctor. Says Archer, "There is no time limit for consulting a doctor about busings results with a read conges.

limit for consulting at doctor about having trouble with nasal congestion, drainage or breathing. Unless you see signs of infection, you can attempt to treat your symptoms at home. Most people seek help when they just can't live with it any longer."

Congressman **Harold Rogers** Report to Kentucky



A Balanced Budget for America Tax Relief, Medicare Protection & Welfare Help for Kentucky

A truly historic event has happened in the nation's capital. The Congress passed and the President will sign a Balanced Budget package that balances the budget for the first time in 30 years and gives Kentuckians tax relief for the first time in 16 years.

I have long preached the goal of deficit reduction, because it

brings so many positive things to our people. Interest rates will go down. That means you pay less for your credit card payments, student loans, or a home of your own. The conomy will continue to flourish, which means more jobs and economic opportunity. If we all sacrifice a little-none too much-then we can balance the

budget and everyone will benefit.

But, not only will this historic agreement lead us to a balanced budget in five years, it also delivers critical tax relief for Kentucky's families, farmers, college students and businesses. For example, next year families with children ages 16 or younger will receive a \$400 per year tax credit, which will increase the following year to \$500. College students will be eligible for a tax credit of up to \$1,500 for the first two years of college, and up to \$1000 during years three and four, graduate education, or continuing education. There is also a reduction in the estate tax and the capital gains tax that will help Kentucky's farmers and family-owned businesses.

In addition to tax relief, this bill also protects Medicare for Kentucky's seniors, and expands coverage for mammographies, diabetes testing, and prostate screening. It establishes a new health insurance program for children. And, it provides states with additional resources to move people off welfare rolls and onto payrolls, and gives states the flexibility to exempt up to 15 percent of able-bodied welfare recipients without children from welfare

One of the items in this package that was very hard for me to swallow was the increase in the tobacco tax. The proposal increases the tax by 10 cents per pack in the year 2000 and an additional 5 cents in 2002. Additionally, the amount of the tax increase will be credited towards the tobacco settlement.

Given the anti-tobacco crusade of the Clinton Administration, the fact that Clinton proposed a 43 cents per-package tax, and that the Senate was pushing an immediate 20 cents tax increase, we could have been looking at a lot worse. Frankly, this was the best we could do under the circumstances. The tobacco settlement is where the real battle will take place, and I will fight tooth and nail to take care of our farmers.




