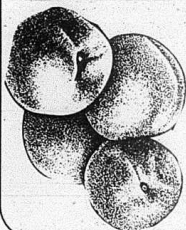

**"IT IS WRITTEN"**

Today we would like to study from an Old Testament story back in Genesis 37. You remember from the story that Joseph was sold into slavery by his brothers, thus they had to tell their father something about Joseph. In verses 31-34, "...and they took Joseph's coat, and belted a kid of the goats, and dipped the coat in the blood... and they sent the coat of many colors, and they brought it to their father, and said: 'This have we found; know now whether it is thy son's coat or no, and he knew it, and said, 'It is my son's coat; an evil beast hath devoured him; Joseph is without doubt rent in pieces...' and Jacob rent his clothes, and put sackcloth upon his loins, and mourned for his son many days." Now this illustrates for us a very important principle we want to notice. The passage says that Jacob mourned for his son many days. If someone asked Jacob if he felt that his son was dead, what would you think his answer would have been? Of course he would say that he felt that his son was dead. Were his feelings accurate in this matter? Did his feelings make his son dead? Or can we see an important lesson here? Yes, Jacob received some misinformation and his feelings were misdirected. I do not believe that Jacob could have felt any more sadness if his son was truly dead. But beloved we need to see that feelings can be mislead. We have lots of folks today who feel that they are saved. They feel that they have been forgiven by God. If you ask how they know that they have been forgiven, they will say they feel it in their heart. But the problem is that they have not obeyed what the Lord has said for a person to do to be saved. They have been given misinformation, as like Jacob, and their feelings are misdirected. We are saved when we obey from the heart what the Lord teaches us to do to be saved, and then the feelings of joy will follow. cf. Ac 8:35-39. It's facts, faith, and then feelings.

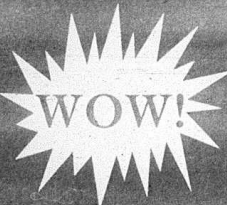

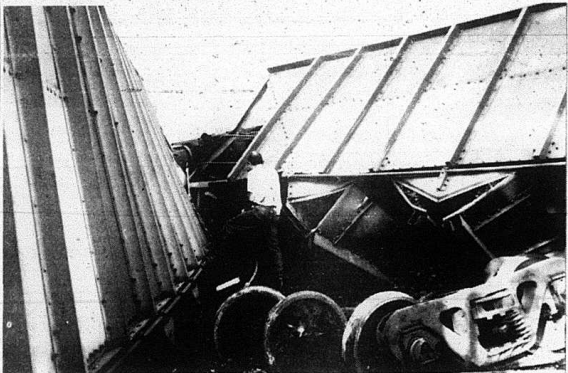

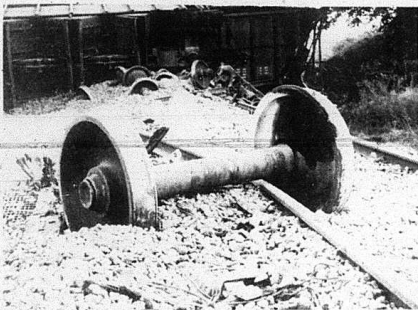
## Train derails at Roundstone

## Bad axle blamed for five rail car wreck

The derailment division of the R.J. Corman Company of Nicholasville was busy on Tuesday, still trying to clear the scene of a train derailment at Roundstone that occurred Friday morning.

A CSX southbound train hauling coal derailed in the middle of the train at the railroad bridge that crosses Roundstone Creek, around 6:20 a.m. Friday.

Some of the derailed cars came to rest behind Parsons Gas and Appliances.

However, none of Parsons propane, storage tanks or equipment were ever placed in danger by the derailment.

One CSX official on the scene said that an axle on one of the coal cars broke causing the five cars to derail.

The damaged cars and most of the coal were still at the scene on Wednesday morning, however CSX officials opened the track to traffic again on Friday night.

## Lawsuit ruling goes against former clerk

A former deputy county clerk has lost the first round in a law suit she filed against the Rockcastle Fiscal Court over a year and a half ago.

Last week, Rockcastle Circuit Judge William T. Cain dismissed a sex discrimination suit filed by former deputy clerk Sheryl Bullock in January 1996.

In Mrs. Bullock's law suit she alleged that County Clerk Hook began to treat her differently after she (Bullock) told Hook she was pregnant with her second child in December of 1993.

Mrs. Bullock alleged that she was eventually dismissed from her job in June of 1995 because she had filed a pregnancy discrimination charge against Mrs. Hook with the Equal Opportunity Employment Commission.

But, according to Cain's ruling, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court is a separate entity from the clerk's office and therefore not responsible for hiring or firing deputy clerks.

In the original law suit, Bullock's attorneys claimed that Norma Hook's office was a political subdivision of the fiscal court, making them ultimately responsible for the clerk's actions.

Mrs. Hook said Wednesday that

she was happy with Cain's ruling and had expected such a ruling from the beginning.

As to Mrs. Bullock's charges, Mrs. Hook said, "She was dismissed because of her job performance, which included insubordination." The clerk declined to comment further.

Mrs. Bullock, 34, who worked for Mrs. Hook for eight and a half years, has thirty days to appeal Cain's ruling. She has not yet done so.

## Grand jury indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down twelve indictments last week for crimes ranging from child abuse to drug trafficking.

John L. Lamb, 44, of Livingston was indicted for an August 19 incident in which he is accused of shooting Richard Caudill, 27, of Calloway in the back.

Lamb was also indicted for wanton endangerment because he shot in

the direction of Donald and Martha Hellard, who were walking with Caudill at the time of the shooting.

Lamb's is being held under a \$50,000 cash bond. He will be arraigned on August 22.

Two Hazlettville men will be arraigned on September 12 after they were indicted in connection with a traffic stop on Cove Branch Road on July 16.

Mrs. Meadows said that families applying for the loans must agree to work at least 200 hours themselves on construction of the new homes.

## Damage suit filed by couple against CSX

A Livingston couple has filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit court against the CSX Transportation Company and conductor Bobby Fain of Mt. Vernon.

The suit seeks an unspecified amount for damages.

Jesse Mahaffey, 79, and his wife Ruby, 77, of Hwy. 590 filed their suit last week in connection with an accident in Mt. Vernon on October 3 of last year.

The suit alleges that CSX and Fain acted in a negligent manner when they allowed a railway car to roll down the tracks toward Mt. Vernon from the west.

That railway, which had appar-

ently rolled from a side track near Kentucky Stone, hit the Mahaffey's 1992 S-10 pick-up injuring the two occupants. The mishap occurred at the Spring Street crossing behind the Mt. Vernon Signal building and totaled the vehicle.

The suit further alleges that as a direct result of CSX and Fain's negligence the Mahaffeys were seriously injured by the accident and have lost some permanent body functions due to the accident.

Neither CSX nor Fain have answered the suit. An initial filing of a civil suit presents only one side of the case.

## Local man involved in Laurel Co. fatal wreck

Two Iowa residents were killed Saturday afternoon when the full size van they were riding in crossed the median on I-75 near the I-64 exit ramp at London and struck an oncoming tractor and trailer driven by Ricky D. Thompson, 40, of Brodhead.

Killed were Lori Mae Eastman, 40, and her son, Joshua Jeffrey James Eastman, 4, of Evansdale, Iowa.

According to London Police, the mother and her son were riding in the back of the van when it struck Thompson's tractor broadside. The two were ejected on impact and pronounced dead at the scene by a Laurel County coroner's office official.

The driver of the van, Janice Aleen Clay, 67, and another passenger, Faron Good, 13, were taken to Marymount Hospital in London. Police said neither had life threatening injuries.

Thompson, a veteran truck driver, was not injured.

Kentucky State Police accident reconstruction specialist Craig Sutton said that Thompson did everything possible to try and avoid the wreck, but that Ms. Clay's vehicle was completely out of control when it eroded into the northbound lane.

The accident closed I-75 for over an hour.

Jim doesn't have the problem. I have tried discussing it with him and his answer is invariably, "we'll figure out something."

I don't suppose there is any point in getting bent out of shape about it for a few more years. I think the thought that bothered me the most is that when Allison finishes high school, I will be in my sixties and I will be old. When I was younger and would hear people talking about getting old and regretting it, I remember thinking, "that's foolish, there's not much alternative." But, as I approach my old age, I find myself resenting the fact that my body doesn't respond with the quickness it once did; that my mental processes seem to be slowing down; that I just don't have the energy I once could count on to be almost limitless. The one thing I re-

ally resent is younger people's general attitude to older people. I don't get much of it yet but I am more aware of it than I used to be and I am concerned. When I was young, my parents were not strict disciplinarians, although there were behavior boundaries and we knew what they were and didn't stray over them often, but one thing that was sure to bring their instant wrath was if we showed any sign of disrespect to older people.

This was a sticking point with my Dad particularly. That and not being as gracious as possible to a guest in your home -- even uninvited ones.

Early last year, a senior Defense Department official was quoted in the *New York Times* as saying, "There's a lot of the Army National Guard that's just irrelevant to our strategy. It's kind of like a welfare program for weekend warriors..."

A comment like that is enough to make a supporter of the National Guard just a tad suspicious of the Army's attitude and consequently, of the Army's actions toward the Guard. And it's enough to make us believe that it's time to change the dynamics of this strained relationship.

That's why I've joined the Chairman of the Armed Services Subcommittee, Senator Ted Stevens (R-AK), in introducing legislation elevating the Chief of the National Guard Bureau to a four-star general and including that position as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

There are close to half a million men and women in the National Guard, accounting for about 20 percent of this nation's Armed Forces. Because of their dual federal-state mission, National Guardsmen are on hand to serve in both the international arena and in our own backyards. Perhaps more than any other soldier, guardsmen embody our forefathers' vision of the citizen-soldier. That's because the citizen-soldiers of the National Guard find their roots in the history of this country, but equally important, in the communities of this country.

Unfortunately that service to country is not receiving the respect it deserves. A perfect example is the Army's recent refusal to consult with the leadership of the National Guard Bureau or the leadership of the Army Guard during consideration of a major review of the defense system. When asked about this oversight, the Army spokesman responded, "There is an Army Reserve Colonel and a Guard Colonel here in our offices. They get to weigh in on the issues."

It doesn't take an extensive knowledge of military affairs to realize that a colonel doesn't pull much weight against a group of active duty Army generals protecting their turf. And that's simply unacceptable -- when you consider that the Guard represents one-fifth of those who can be called to defend our nation in any crisis.

The Army National Guard currently provides more than 55 percent of the ground combat forces, 45 percent of the combat support forces, 25 percent of the Army's combat supply units, while receiving only two percent of the Department of Defense's budget.

These men and women have undergone the same training as their counterparts in the 50 active-duty Army National Guard units and women coming off active duty with the Army. Yet, the National Guard is not represented by the most senior military advisors to the President.

Opponents should also remember that when we had to send our forces to the Persian Gulf, the call was answered by 75,000 National Guardsmen. Their successes were matched by other guardsmen in Somalia, Bosnia, and Haiti.

Assuring this change becomes law is critical to the future of both the National Guard and our entire national security system. Because the National Guard is such an integral component of our national security system, it must have a voice in the Department of Defense's senior decision-making process when it comes to defense strategy, force readiness, and allocation of resources.

And those who believe "two colonels in the office" to weigh in on the issues is enough, need to be reminded that being in the room where decisions are made isn't enough. You have to have a seat at the table and a voice that carries some weight.

With this legislation, we can not only pull up a chair for the National Guard Bureau, but give them a voice that can be heard loud and clear.

The 474,673 men and women citizen-soldiers of the National Guard deserve nothing less.

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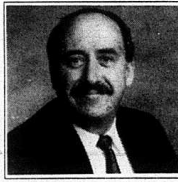
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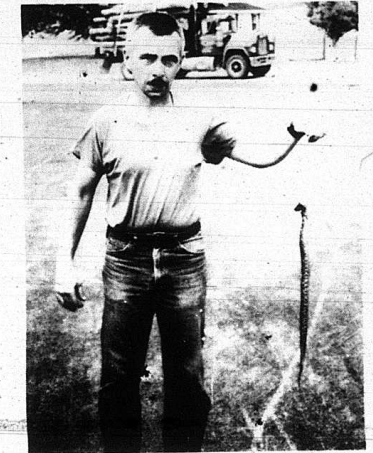

## Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, Director

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. County Committees administer federal farm programs at the

local level and are responsible for establishing policy and the overall management of each FSA Office. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county we urge any and all pro-

ducers who have not received a voting petition in the past election (DEC 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age if the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes conservation land owners for Native Americans, spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper. REMEMBER: If you want to vote in the upcoming election - YOUR NAME MUST BE ON THE VOTING LIST AS AN ELIGIBLE VOTER. NOW is the time to contact your local FSA Office for voting eligibility.

FSA makes and guarantees farm loans and provides technical management assistance to family farmers. A "family farm" is defined as one that a family can operate and manage itself with a reasonable amount of hired labor. FSA loans are tailored to a borrower's needs. The FSA Agriculture Credit Manager helps the borrower analyze problems, determine available resources and plan how resources may best be used. The FSA loans programs are: Operating Loans, Farm Ownership Loans, Emergency Loans, and Youth Project Loans.

The Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP) provides protection against a widespread loss caused by a natural disaster to designated areas

for which crop insurances are available. To qualify for this program an area must have at least 3 producers of crops on separate and distinct farms that were affected by the same natural disaster with total production loss of at least 5%. Products must have

been reported on file prior to the July 15 deadline to be eligible for benefits. Late-filed reports may be filed, but will require a filing fee. Some of the non-insurable crops in Rockcastle County include: hay, pasture, soybeans, pepper, sweet corn, green

beans, dry fruit or vegetable grown commercially for food.

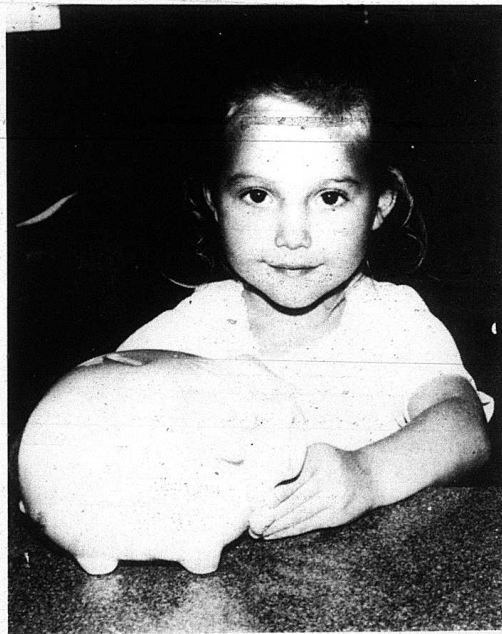

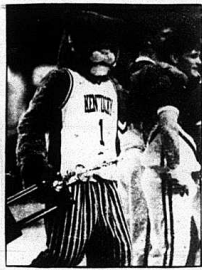

## USDA pumps 9.9 million into Rural Kentucky

Kentucky has received \$9,913,000 in grants and loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water and wastewater treatment projects located across the state. USDA Under Secretary for Rural Development Jill Long Thompson announced, USDA Rural Development administers a number of programs designed to strengthen rural economies and expand infrastructure in rural areas.

Thompson said, "Providing communities with necessities such as a clean and safe drinking water supply and new or upgraded sewer facilities help improve the economic infrastructure and expand job opportunities for all who live in the region."

"The funding announcement for Kentucky reinforces the Clinton/Gore Administration's priority for providing basic services such as a safe drinking water supply and environmentally sound waste treatment facilities to residents in rural communities," Thomas Fern, Kentucky State Director for USDA Rural Development,

said. "Some residents of these communities are relying on inadequate sources for their drinking water and are suffering from substandard plumbing systems. These funds should help alleviate some of these problems."

USDA's Water and Waste program, administered through USDA Rural Development's Rural Utilities Service, is designated to bring fresh, clean drinking water and sanitary and environmentally sound wastewater facilities to rural America. Loans and grants are available to rural communities of fewer than 10,000 residents.

A listing of the projects to be funded follows:

\$1,700,000 loan and \$777,800 grant to the Town of Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County for the expansion and renovation of the existing water treatment plant, construction of a 100,000 gallon water storage tank, replacing and repairing storage tanks, pumpstations, transmission lines, and general upgrading of the water sys-

tem. \$1,500,000 loan and \$2,225,000 grant to the Town of Albany in Clinton County for one booster pump station, current treatment facility.

\$187,000 loan and \$65,200 grant to the Town of Prestonburg in Floyd County for the construction of approximately 4 miles of water lines, two 200,000 gallon water storage tanks, and one booster pump station. \$2,421,000 loan to Harlan County Water District #2 for the expansion of the White Mills treatment plant.

\$140,000 loan and \$300,000 grant to the Town of Lewinsburg in Logan County for the construction of one 300,000 gallon water storage tank and for the rehabilitation of an existing 100,000 gallon water tank.

\$597,000 grant to the City of White Plains in Hopkins County for the installation of approximately 10 miles of water lines, approximately 4 miles of force main, and a gravity sewer pump station to serve 325 new users.

Traveling "above the mountains" through the use of telecommunications in order to obtain the resources required to bring about economic development is a primary objective of the CenterNet project. CenterNet is the heart of an emerging economic development strategy for rural communities. By connecting the forty counties, CenterNet is forging a regional identity and creating sustainable and productive partnerships with which to accomplish our shared goal

of improving the quality of life for everyone in our region.

This meeting is designed to increase CenterNet awareness and understand the need for the necessary partnerships required to help support the network. The meeting will include brainstorming sessions aimed at facilitating the generation of ideas concerning possible locations, partnerships and applications.

The Center for Rural Development is a non-profit organization which serves a forty county area in Southern and Eastern Kentucky. Incorporated in 1996, The Center offers a variety of developmental programs and opportunities to the region along with CenterNet. The Center is part of a regional telecommunications initiative for Southern and Eastern Kentucky that houses a distance learning classroom, exhibit/convention hall, and 760 seat theatre. 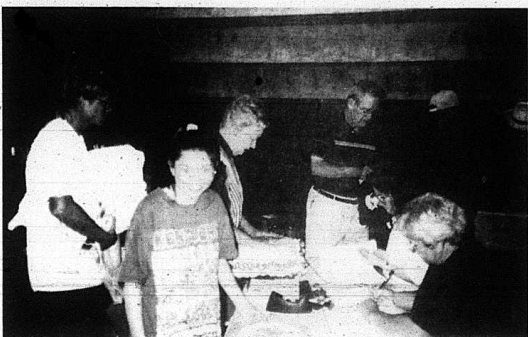

## "A Look at the Arts"

The Extended School Services Summer Program at Mt. Vernon Elementary School in Rockcastle County took on a new look this summer. After lengthy discussions with teachers, parents and students, Mt. Vernon Elementary School looked at

diverse alternatives to regular summer school programming. One alternative which allowed students who might not ordinarily show interest in the regular school year was participation in the performing arts. Drawing on three collaborative resource ef-

forts students at Mt. Vernon Elementary were able to benefit from a special core/curricula based Music and Drama program. In order for the program to impact as many students in the time allowed while realizing student success, Mt.

Vernon Elementary sought assistance from the Rockcastle County Family Resources Center. Additional support was received from a Drop-Out Prevention Grant approved as a tie-in with the existing ESS Performing Arts program.

The Drop-Out Prevention Proposal approached the problem from the perspective that the area of arts should be viewed as another possibility for career choices and not merely leisure activities. Talents need to be tapped into and awareness heightened early in the students' school careers. In order to prevent student drop-out, the program proposed to show a variety of professions in the areas of performing arts and that the arts are on a level with other content discipline areas. Approval of the Drop-Out Prevention Grant meant that the existing program could be further enhanced with funds to provide teacher resource materials, costume and instrument construction materials, and admission to the Renfro Valley Performing Arts Center for students, parents and teachers.

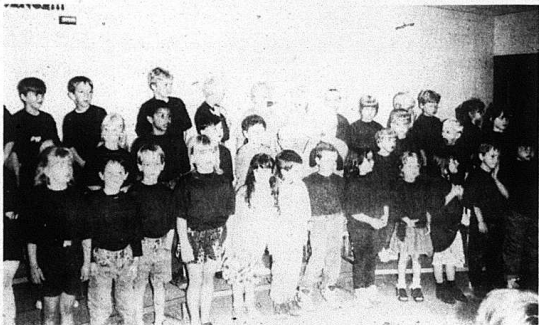
The intent of this collaboration was to show that careers in the arts are life skills. The multidisciplinary activities and experiences made available through this program allowed students to compare and contrast skills perceived with the actuality of the arts as career choices.

The Rockcastle FRC provided stipends to pay two teachers to address the music and drama content areas. Students were divided into two specific age groups: primary and intermediate. The primary students fo-

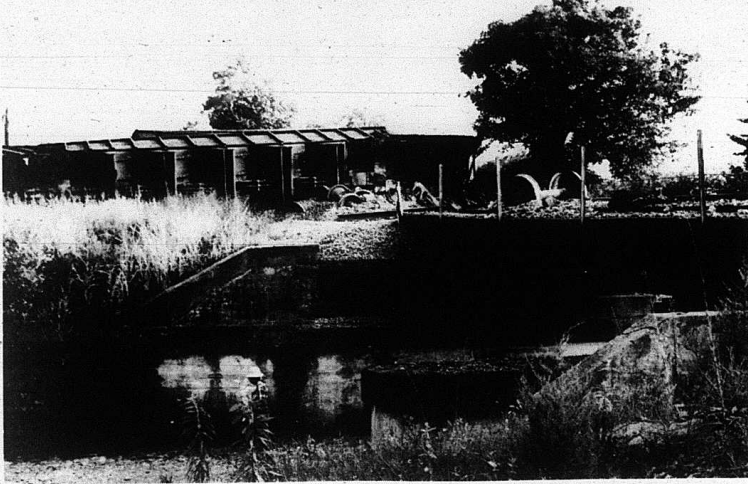
cused on music skills while the intermediate students addressed drama skills. The students presented a performance for parents as a culminating activity showcasing student knowledge of the performing arts, while successfully demonstrating the interdisciplinary focus.

This group will not end with the summer, but will allow students and

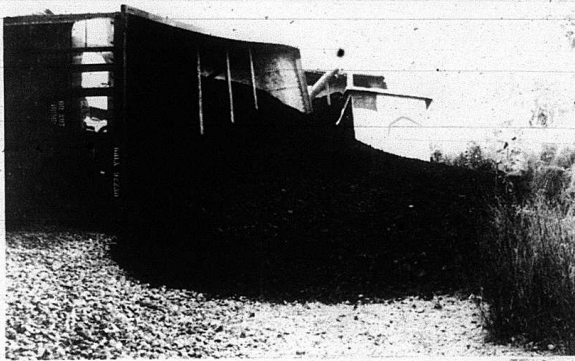
teachers to successfully integrate newly acquired skills and an understanding of those skills across the curriculum at school and at home. 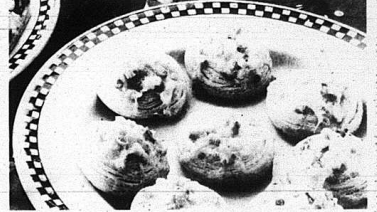

## Coping Without a Cure

Yelling, wandering, hallucinating, paranoia, pacing, and striking caregivers are just a few behavioral symptoms of Alzheimer's disease. Alzheimer's is characterized by a gradual loss of memory. The disease has no cure. Of the 60,000 Kentuckians suffering from Alzheimer's, roughly half will develop these symptoms known as "behavioral agitation." "People with Alzheimer's lose the context of what's happening to them. Their confusion, anger and fear can result in inappropriate behaviors which are painful for patients and their families," says University of Kentucky researcher J. Wesson Ashford.

At UK, Ashford and Frederick A. Schmitt, associate professors of psychiatry and neurology and Marie Smart, licensed social worker, are studying ways to treat behavioral agitation. The Alzheimer's Disease Research Center of the Sanders-Brown Center on Aging at UK is one of 29 research centers nationwide testing drug and behavioral therapy in this study.

The study, which began in 1994 and is nearing conclusion, was designed to test two medications (Haloperidol and Trazodone) already used to treat behavioral agitation. The focus of the study is to pinpoint which behaviors each drug seems to help. Haloperidol is helpful in treating patients with hallucinations and paranoia. It slows down movement and thought. Trazodone focuses attention and promotes sleep. In this study, patients were given one of the two drugs or a placebo, or chavorial therapy which focused on cutting up routines for patients based in their lifestyle before they got sick. Ashford and Schmitt met with patients

and their families weekly to check for improvement or adverse side effects. Both doctors were surprised and pleased that none of the nine Alzheimer's patients involved in the study at UK had any adverse effects from the medications.

In the behavioral therapy, Smart aimed to help caregivers recognize and manage agitated behaviors rather than confront patients. For example, Smart says she found that many patients become very agitated in the afternoon because they worked second shift all of their lives. Smart believes "This is something that is deep-seated in their memory; at this time of day, they think there is something they should be doing." She says caregivers need to structure some afternoon activity for these patients. Smart says behavioral therapy and medications "go hand-in-hand" because even when families do everything possible in terms of behavioral approaches, there are still patients who need medication.

"The thing that makes me feel good about this work is that the patients do get better when we work with them," says Ashford. "This study allowed us to see them more often, so when we gave them medicine, they could come back the next week

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### More beef means weaker feeder cattle prices late summer, fall

With significantly more cattle in feedlots, the supply of beef hitting the market in coming months is likely to rise substantially and will cause slaughter prices to drop later this summer and into fall, according to a University of Kentucky Extension livestock marketing specialist.

"U.S. Department of Agriculture reports indicate 14 percent more cattle than a year ago. Even moderate increases in marketings will add three to five percent more beef to the market in coming months," Meyer said.

Some offsetting factors, however, will moderate the price slide, he said.

"Net imports are moving in beef's favor, with imports from Canada down and exports to Japan on the increase. Even more importantly, cow slaughter is declining which is reducing the beef supply," he said.

Another dimension of the price

problem, Meyer said, is that feedlots are losing money. They have been paying increasingly high prices for feeder calves, and with selling prices for slaughter cattle in the mid \$60 range, they are losing \$25 to \$50 per head.

"What's going to happen in the near future?"

"More beef on the market will bring prices down. Feedlots are likely to lower their bids for feeders and so feeder cattle prices will also decline," Meyer said.

Furthermore, he said, falling grain prices over the past year meant that feedlots were able to pay much higher prices for calves. Higher grain prices squeeze feedlot profits and buyers are less willing to pay high prices for feeder calves.

This season's weak corn prices, he said, are fueling feeder calf prices, with the result of a \$2 to \$3 per

hundredweight increase in early July. But a recent turnaround has reversed that, weakening feeder cattle prices slightly.

"The outlook for 1998 is more favorable. Declining feeder cattle numbers will force feedlots to pay higher prices or leave their lots empty," he said.

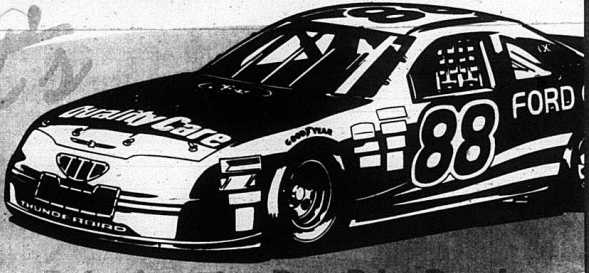

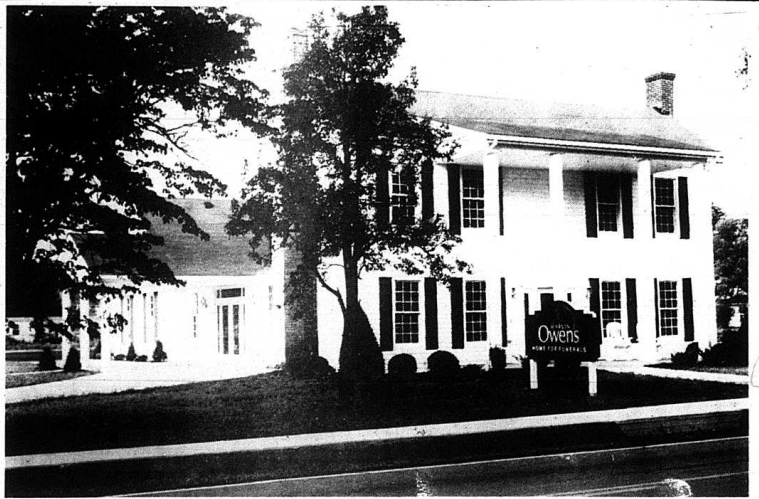

**Welfare Reform Affects Rockcastle Countians**  
According to reports, the food stamp cuts in the welfare bill from 1997-2002 will amount to \$77 billion. This is equivalent to withdrawing nearly 24 billion pounds of food from the poor, an average of 4 billion pounds of food per year. This is just a small example of what can expect in the next five years.

The poor have already been exploited, abused, used and flushed down the toilet of society. The needs of the poor are brought to the forefront of the political agenda when they need to institute more spending but the largest part of the money goes to administration and only a small portion goes to the ones who need it most.

Here is an article from USA Today... Tuesday, July 1, 1997 Food Fight: 27% going to waste... Americans waste 27% of their food... throwing out 365 pounds a year for every man, woman, and child, says a report released today. Even 5% of the 96 billion pounds of edible food tossed annually in this county could feed 4 million people a day for a year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said in releasing this report.

On average, a person consumes about three pounds of food per day. The 365 pounds each person wastes each year could be the equivalent of 1,000 hamburgers, 300 bananas and 60 sticks of butter.

Last week, a woman walked into the food bank and said she would like to make a donation. She pulled a tiny square from the corner of her wallet and began unfolding it, to eventually reveal a long-saved one hundred dollar bill. When she was asked for her name and address, so that a thank you

could be sent, big tears began to roll down her cheeks. "No, don't thank me," she responded. "I'm thanking you. When I was hungry, you fed me." And with that, she was gone.

It is sometimes easy to get caught up in the daily work of feeding the hungry and forget what happens to the people we serve after they leave us. It would be easy to de-humanize our work and forget the faces of hunger, if it weren't for the frequent reminders that the food we collect and distribute is for real people, with real lives, real worries, and usually a real sense of gratitude. These reminders come just often enough to make sure we keep a heart for our work.

The people we see everyday at R.E.A.P. are not the people that you will hear about on the news. The people we help are the ones affected by the recent discontinuation of GED programs and cuts in the food stamp program. They are the people who are quietly trying to make ends meet, by working at minimum wage jobs, often part time, or budgeting their minimal social security checks. ## The Family Room

### I Learned Much On My Vacation

Vacations have always been a learning experience for me. Not only do I learn from those historic sites that my family visits, I learn even more from watching us interact.

This year was no exception. For instance, I learned that there is a limit to the amount of time that one family can spend together in a small space such as a car or a motel room. Accustomed as we are to having more space that can be found in the inside of a car, even the most loving families

can begin to suffer from TMFT (Too Much Family Time).

There are some definite indications that your family is suffering from TMFT. First, parents begin to call the children by their first and middle names, as in "Billy Bob, you stop bothering your little sister!" Second, parents begin to make threats that they would never carry out, as in

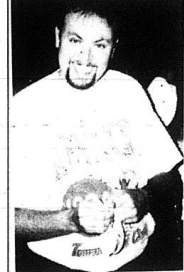

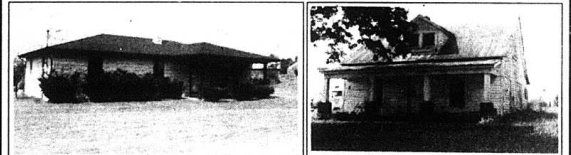
