





Early last year, a senior Defense Department official was quoted in the New York Times as saying, "There's a lot of the Army National Guard that's just irrelevant to our strategy. It's kind of like a welfare program for weekend warriors..."

There are close to half a million men and women in the National

There are close to half a million men and women in the National Guard accounting for about 20 percent of this nation's Armed Forces. Because of their dual federal-state mission. National Guardsmen are nhand to serve in both the international arean and in our own back-yards. Perhaps more than any other soldier, guardsmen embody our forefathers' vision of the citzen-soldier, guardsmen embody our forefathers' vision of the citzen-soldier frant's because the citzen-soldiers of the National Guard find their roots in the history of this country, but equally important, in the communities of this country.

Unfortunately that service to country is not receiving the respect it deserves. A perfect example is the Army's recent refusal to consult with the leadership of the National Guard Bureau or the leadership of the Army Guard Guirge consideration of a major review of the defense system. When asked about this oversight, the Army spokesman responded. "There is an Army Reserve Colonel and a Guard Colonel here in our offices. They get to weigh in on the issues."

It doesn't take an extensive knowledge of military affairs to real ize that a colonel doesn't pull much weight against a group of active duty Army generals protecting their furt. And that's simply unacceptable when you consider the Guard represents one-fifth of those who can be called to defend our nation in any crisis.





velop these symptoms known as "be-havioral agitation." "People with Alzheimer's lose the context of what's happening to them. Their confusion, anger and fear can result in inappropriate behaviors which are painful for patients and their families," says Uniersity of Kentucky researcher J. lesson Ashford. At UK Ashford and Frederick A.

Coping Without a Cure

Schmitt, associate professors of psy-chiatry and neurology, and Marie Smart, licensed social worker, are studying ways to treat behavioral agitation. The Alzheimer's Disease Research Center of the Sanders-Brown Center on Ag-ing at UK is one of 29 research centers nationwide testing drug and behavioral therapy in this study. The study, which began in 1994 and is nearing conclusion, was designed to test two medications (Haloperidol and

Trazodone) already used to treat be-havioral agitation. The focus of the study is to pinpoint which behaviors each drug seems to help. Haloperidol is cinations and paranoia. It slows down novement and thought. Trazodone ocuses attention and promotes sleep.

In this study, patients were given ne of the two drugs or a placebo, or ehavioral therapy which focused on etting up routines for patients based n their lifestyle before they got sick. shford and Schmitt met with patients Both doctors were surprised and pleased that none of the nine Alzheimer's patients involved in the study a ad any adverse effects from the In the behavioral therapy, Smart

aimed to help caregivers recognize and manage agitated behaviors rather than confront patients. For example, Smart says she found that many patients

become very agitated in the afternoon because they worked second shift all of their lives. Smart believes "This is some thing that is deep-seated in their memory; at this time of day, they think there is something they should be doing." She should be doing." She says caregivers need to structure some afternoon activity for these pa-tients: Smart says behavioral therapy and medica-tions "go hand-in-hand" because even when families do everything possible in terms of behavioral approaches, there are still patients who

More beef means weaker feeder cattle prices late summer, fall

With significantly more cattle in feedlots, the supply of beef hitting the market in coming months is likely to rise substantially and will cause slaughter prices to drop later this summer and into fall, according to a University of Kentucky Extension livestock marketing specialist.

"U.S. Department of Agriculture reports indicate 14 percent more cattle are in feedlots as of July 1 this year than a year ago. Even moderate increases in marketings will add three to five percent more beef to the market in coming months," Meyer said. Some offsetting factors, however, will moderate the price slide, he said. "Net imports are moving in beef's favor, with imports from Canada down and exports to Japan on the increase Even more importantly, cow

increase Even more importantly, cow slaughter is declining which is reduc-ing the beef supply," he said. Another dimension of the price

problem, Meyer said, is that feedlots are losing money. They have been paying increasingly high prices for feeder calves, and with selling prices for slaughter cattle in the mid 560 range, they are losing \$25 to \$50 per head.

range, they are losing \$52.60 \$50 per hand." Soing to happen in 'the near future?

"More beef on the market will bring prices down. Feedlots are likely to lower their bids for feedlers and so feeder cattle prices will also decline," Meyer said.

Furthermore, he said, falling grain prices over the past year meant that prices for calves. Higher grain prices squeeze feedlot profits and buyers are less willing to pay high prices for feeder calves.

This season's weak com prices, he said, are fueling feeder cal fyrics, with the result of a \$2 to \$3 per feeder calves.


