Just how young is the Rock this year? One indication may be that Coach Larkey expects freshman quarterback Christopher Parsons to see quite a bit of action. Parsons is Bishop's back up on the varsity, but will also play freshman and junior varsity ball early in the season.

And Rocket fans are not accustomed to less than a "good" season from the Rock. In the past six seasons the Rockets have a combined record of 60 and 16 with six straight play-off appearances. They have advanced to the quarter finals twice, the second round three times and been beaten in the first round only once.

The Rock will sport new uniforms when they kick off the 1997 season on Friday night.

Game time is 8 p.m. at the Rock's home field at the Rockcastle County Middle School.

A Mt. Vernon man is being held under a \$30,000 cash bond after he was arrested and charged with two recent crimes.

Police arrested Robert Newcomb, Jr., 19, of Mt. Vernon on Monday and charged him with three counts of arson, criminal mischief and theft by unlawful taking.

Newcomb and a Mt. Vernon juvenile who was also arrested on Monday, are accused of stealing five cars from Willard's Auto Sales in Renfro Valley on August 6, according to Mt. Vernon police detective Eddie Delaney.

Newcomb and the juvenile are also accused of trying to break into White Star Auto Parts in Livingston earlier this month. Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith is investigating that case.

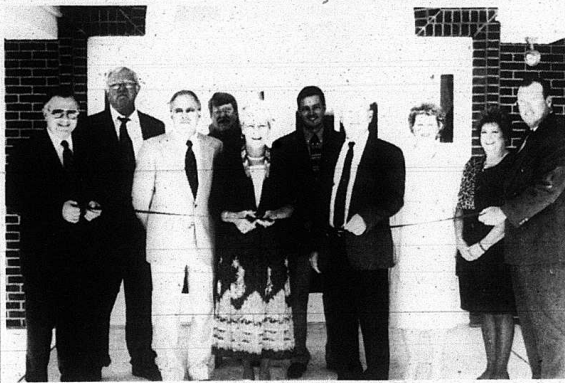
## Get a Rocket Card New football ticket price

RCHS principal Ronnie Cash has announced the first price increase for football tickets in over ten years. Beginning with Friday night's home game, ticket prices will be \$4 at the gate for everyone except children under six who will be admitted free.

To help offset the price increase for local residents, RCHS is selling "Rocket Cards" at each game. The cards cost \$5 and will save \$1 off each ticket price for each home game -- making the cost to holders of the "Rocket Card" \$3 each instead of \$4. You will need only one Rocket Card per family for all sports (the price of basketball tickets will be \$2 instead of \$3 with the card). However, you must show the Rocket Card to ticket sellers at all events. (See ad elsewhere in this week's Signal).

## Most county school children above average

# Roundstone leads way in CTBS Scores

By: Richard Anderkin For the past four years Rockcastle County Schools have stacked up pretty well with the rest of the state in test scores, but for the past seven years, educators have not known how local students compare to the rest of the nation.

Now they know. On Monday results of the Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills were released showing Kentucky students about half way up the ladder when compared with students from the rest of the nation.

The CTBS, which was the only test given to students in Kentucky for decades, measures basic skills such as reading, language, math, spelling, social studies and science.

The statewide rankings figured by the Lexington Herald-Leader used only the scores in math, reading and language because some schools in the state opted to test only on those subjects.

In Rockcastle County, the top achievement award goes to the county's third grade students who scored the highest on the national test.

All three of Rockcastle County's Elementary Schools scored well above the national average of 50.

Roundstone Elementary led the way with their third graders scoring the seventh highest in the entire state.

67.9 percent of Roundstone's third graders scored at or above the national average with their best scores coming in math where 72.1 percent of the third graders scored at or above the national average. Roundstone's third graders had a score of 62.4 in language and 61.2 in reading.

At Brodhead, where student test scores usually rank among the top in the state on the KIRIS test (the test the state uses to see how well the

Kentucky Education Reform Act is working) the scores were high as well. Brodhead third graders ranked 16th out of the state's 787 elementary schools.

66.1 percent of Brodhead's third grade student score at or above the national level. Their best scores were in math as well with 66.6 percent scoring at or above the national level. 63.4 percent scored at or above the national level in math and 60.7 scored at or above the average in reading.

Rockcastle County's largest elementary school also did very well on the CTBS.

Mt. Vernon Elementary's third graders ranked 60th of the 787 elementary schools in Kentucky with sixty percent of the students there scoring at or above the national level.

Mt. Vernon's best scores were in reading with 60.5 scoring average or better. 60 percent of the third graders at MVES scored at or above the national level in language and 58.3 percent of the students scored at or above the average in math.

Overall each of the county's elementary schools scored well above the state's average third grade score of 49.7.

The results of the KIRIS tests have always shown that elementary students in Rockcastle County do better than their older counterparts.

The CTBS showed the same thing, although scores at the Rockcastle County High School were higher than those at the Rockcastle County Middle School.

Ninth graders at RCHS had the 141st best scores of the state's 234 high schools. 47.2 percent of the students scored at or above the national level. Kentucky's average was 48.9.

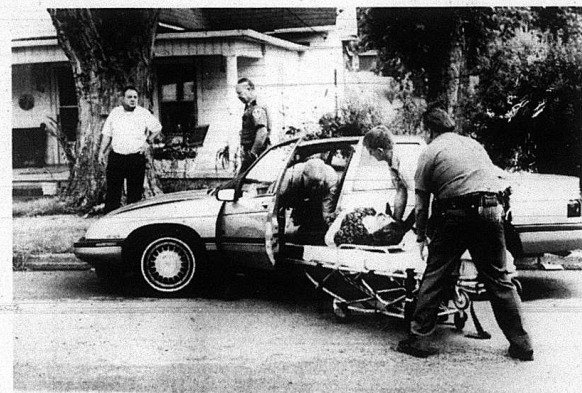

**Wassail Tea**

## "It is Written"

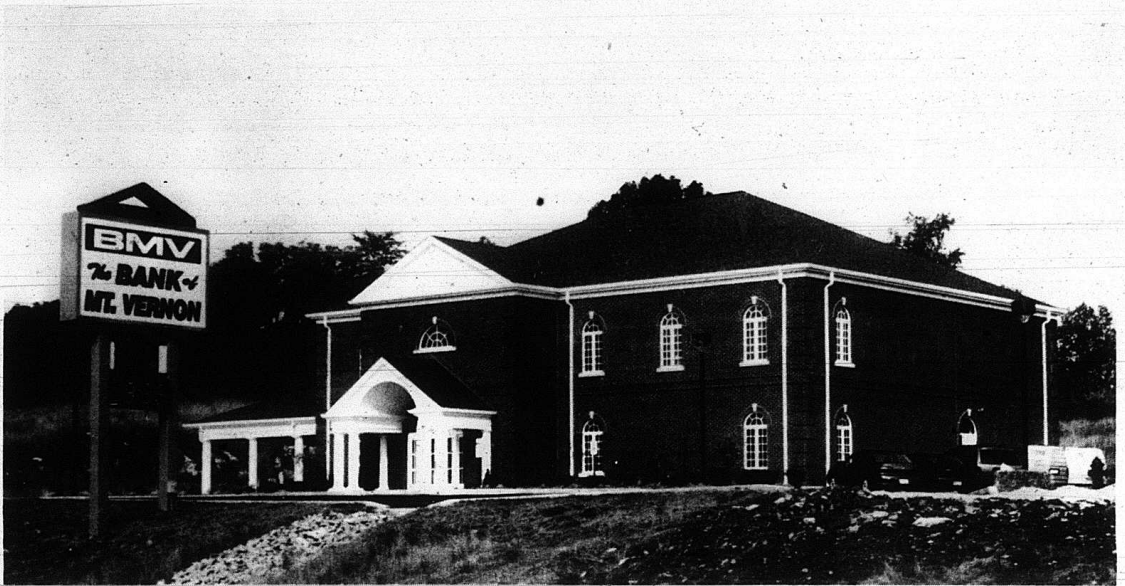

## A Tribute to Willie Taylor Grandpa

Willie Taylor passed away on July 27, the following is a tribute written by his daughter-in-law and some of his own stories and experiences. As the rest of the world goes back to school, this educator would wish you well whatever you are a student, janitor, bus driver, cook, teacher, volunteer or administrator and thank each of you for all your kind considerations.

Ever since I have been a part of this family in June, 1965, I have admired your optimistic attitude and appreciate your patience and kindness toward me. At the beginning I didn't know exactly what to call you. Having been a teacher, out of respect for you I wanted to call you Mr. Taylor, but as soon as the children came along you became Grandpa, and that title fit you well.

You never seem to complain and you always have a pleasant spirit. I realize there must be times when you are in pain and great discomfort, but you have always managed to keep the attention focused on the other person rather than yourself.

Over the years you have taught Renee and Nathan through your patience and kindness. You never ask anything for yourself, but always return the question, "How are you?" with "Doing very well I guess. How are your folks all doing?"

### His Recollections

"I stayed away from when I was at Sue Bennett College for 4 to 5 weeks at a time.

My first teaching job was at Rulo School in Pulaski County in 1942. It was a two room school. There was no electricity. The Rockcastle River was one mile from the Rulo School. On a Sunday afternoon Mr. Adkins and I rode horses and saw the huge pile of slab lumber at the sawmill. The Rockcastle River was at flood stage and the water was running swiftly on the way back. I had never seen such unusual rocks. There were rocks as

big as a house, some were egg shaped and big as a football, and some were round from the force of the water.

Squibbs as between Somerset and London 3-4 miles East of what is now Highway 80. There were no livestock laws and no fences everywhere just ran wild. Somerset and London still sparsely settled on either side of Rockcastle River."

I boarded with Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Adams when President Roosevelt was in his fourth term. The President was to speak on the radio in night, later than they normally stayed awake. I asked Mr. Adams if I could stay up late and listen to the President.

The above quote was his own words. He taught in the one and two room schools until he retired. Upon retirement he was a school board member for 22 years. He was a Kentucky Colonel.

### Is Rent-to-Own Right for You?

Many times when consumers need a major item such as furniture or appliances, they turn to rent-to-own before checking out other options.

Unfortunately, consumers may not realize that the rental charges for such appliances and furnishings can amount to three or four times what the cash price would have been.

Rent-to-own businesses usually offer contract terms of either a week or a month at a time. At the end of the arranged time, the customer can either renew the contract or end the agreement and return the merchandise. If they renew the contract a certain number of times (usually spanning 18 months), the customer will then own the item.

About 75% of customers return the rental item within the first four months and less than 25% of customers actually continue renting long enough to own the item.

Before deciding to use rent-to-own to make a purchase, there are several questions you should ask yourself:

- Would a used item from a garage sale, classified ad, or consignment shop serve my needs?
- Do I absolutely need this item right now? Could I borrow the item temporarily from a friend or relative?
- Can I wait until I have saved enough money to pay cash—or at least make a down payment on an installment plan?
- Could I use a layaway plan at a retail store instead?
- Have I considered all my credit options, including applying for rental credit from a store or

borrowing money from a credit union, bank, or small loan company?

If you do decide to purchase a new item instead of a previously owned one, you will want to calculate your actual costs by comparison shopping.

• If you do decide that rent-to-own is your best choice, ask your salesmen these questions before signing the contract:

- What is the total cost of the item?
- Am I getting a new or used ("previously rented") item?
- Can I purchase the item before the end of the rental term? (Some rental companies will offer a "90 days same as cash" plan.)
- Will my rental payments count towards the purchase price if I decide to buy the item?
- Is there a charge for repairs during the rental period?
- If the item does need repairs during my rental period, will I get a replacement while it is being fixed?
- What happens if I am late on a payment? Will the item be repossessed?
- Will I pay a penalty if I return the item before the end of the contract?
- As with any purchase, be sure to compare shop among various rent-to-own merchants.
- And be sure to read the contract carefully before you sign. Always know exactly how much you are paying and what you are getting for your money.

## IMMUNIZATIONS GET A SHOT IN THE ARM

Have you ever noticed that when you want to make something better, you give it a shot in the arm? Well, when you're talking about your health, that little saying goes without saying—especially when it comes to proper immunization.

Immunization is an often overlooked, yet a vitally important aspect of our good health. Having your immunization shots up to date can mean the difference between life and death.

Immunization, also referred to as inoculation, is a means of tricking your body into building a resistance to certain potentially deadly diseases. A vaccine containing modified microorganisms is injected into the body. The microorganisms have been genetically produced or killed so that they do not trigger the disease. But, the mere presence of microorganisms tricks your body into thinking it has the disease and alerts your immune system. In turn, your immune system kicks into high gear to begin warding off the disease.

According to Joy Callahan, a certified infection control practitioner (CIC) at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, there also are many misconceptions regarding immunization, including the idea that only kids need inoculation.

"That's just not true," Callahan said, who also holds RN and BSN degrees.

"Proper immunization is necessary for people of all ages from infants to senior adults.

While it is true that some diseases, such as chicken pox and measles are more prevalent in children, adults are not immune."

Diseases such as Hepatitis A and B, influenza, pneumococcal and rubella are especially targeted to adults. Hepatitis B is a liver disease spread by contact with blood or other body fluids with someone who is infected. It can enter the blood stream and, attack the liver, causing severe illness or even death.



Hepatitis A is a viral infection of the liver. Symptoms of Hepatitis A include nausea, fever, and loss of appetite. Hepatitis A can be transmitted through contaminated food, especially shellfish, or from a contaminated water supply.

Many people have experienced bouts of influenza, or "the flu." Influenza is a highly contagious disease that exhibits symptoms such as chills, high fever, headache, sore throat, and body aches. Most people catch the disease through contact with someone who has the disease or through contact with the airborne elements of the virus.

Influenza vaccinations are available in the fall and are recommended for anyone 65 and older. For people with chronic health problems, or anyone who wants to reduce their risk of catching "the flu."

Another potentially deadly disease that can be warded off with proper immunization is pneumococcal disease, also known as pneumonia.

"Pneumococcal disease is not widely recognized, but it extremely dangerous, especially to senior adults," Callahan said. "Each year, more than 40,000 people die from pneumococcal disease. Worse yet, less than 30 percent of all people over the age of 65 have their recommend pneumonia shot."

According to Callahan, the best way to ensure that your immunizations are correct and that you're protected against deadly diseases is to have your physician keep a complete record of all your shots.

"Check with your physician to make sure that you have received all the necessary shots," Callahan said. "And, if you don't have complete records, talk to your physician about having your record completed and updated."

### THE RIGHT WAY TO PERFORM THE HEIMLICH MANEUVER

The Heimlich Maneuver is the best known method for dislodging an object from the airway of someone who is choking. This first-aid procedure was named after its inventor, the American physician Henry Jay Heimlich. It involves the application of sudden pressure on the victim's abdomen to bring about the ejection of the food that is blocking the windpipe.

Here are the steps for performing the Heimlich maneuver correctly:

- Stand behind the choking person and wrap your arms around his or her waist.
- Bend the person slightly forward.
- Make a fist with one hand and place it slightly above the person's navel and below his or her rib cage.
- Place the other hand over the first fist. The thumb should be inward directly against the abdomen.
- Press hard into the abdomen with quick, upward thrust.
- Repeat as many as four times if necessary to dislodge the object.

## CTBS Scores (From Front)

Ninth graders scored highest in reading where 51.9 percent of RCHS students scored at or above the national level.

48.5 percent scored at or above the national level in language and 42.9 percent scored at or above the national level in math.

At the Rockcastle County Middle School, the only school in the county that did not score well enough to receive cash awards last year.

45.8 percent of the sixth graders at the middle school scored at or above the national average.

Compared to 50.1 percent for the rest of the sixth graders in the state.

48.1 percent of the sixth grade class scored at or above the national level in language. 46.7 percent at or above the national level in reading and the school's lowest scores were in math where only 44.4 percent scored at or above the national level.

The sixth graders at the middle

school ranked 359th out of 502 middle schools in the state.

The statewide rankings were based on scores from the third, sixth and ninth grades, which were the only grades to take the test.

Roundstone Principal David Pensol said Tuesday that while there is always room for improvement, he was very pleased with the CTBS scores at his school. "We have worked hard to provide a good education for our students and I think the scores are reflective of our efforts," he said.

"The CTBS scores really only reinforced what we already knew from the results of the KIRIS tests," Pensol said.

Pensol said he thought probably the most important aspect of the CTBS is that parents in Rockcastle County have a better understanding about how their children stack up with the students in the rest of the nation. "I'd say overall we stacked up pretty well."

There is progress toward a cure. Scientists, supported by the C.F.F., are writing a remarkable medical success story. C.F. researchers are quickly translating what they learn about the C.F. gene and C.F. cells in the laboratory into promising new treatments. Based on their success, landmark gene therapy studies and clinical trials of new drug treatments are now underway. The results of these extensive clinical trials will determine the best treatment to alleviate C.F. related problems. For example, some drugs thin the dangerously thick mucus that clogs the airways and others fight life-threatening lung infections. These new drugs should improve the length and quality of life for people with C.F.

ment in C.F. science, education and patient care.

Everyday, approximately three babies are born with C.F. in this country, and everyday at least one person with C.F. dies. ## Tom T. Hall to perform live at Renfro Valley September 27

Singer, songwriter, author, Tom T. Hall was born and raised in Olive Hill, Kentucky. The fourth son of Rev. Virgil L. Hall, a brick plant worker and ordained Baptist minister, Tom T. began playing guitar at the age of four and wrote his first song at nine. At fifteen, he went to work in a garment factory and performed on a local radio station with a Bluegrass band.

In 1964, Tom T. Hall made the big move to Nashville where for the next five years, he wrote songs eight hours a day, five days a week. He produced so many original songs that to get them recorded, he had to start signing them himself. Tom T. Hall recorded his first single, "I Washed My Face in the Morning Dew," which went to number one in 1968 for Mercury Records. His next song, "A Week in a County Jail," climbed to number one position on the country charts followed by his international smash country-pop hit, "Harper Valley PTA." This song, recorded by Jeannie C. Riley, sold six million records and won Single of the year from the Country Music Association, as well as the 1968 Grammy for Song of the Year. Now a member of the Songwriter's Hall of Fame, Tom T. Hall's songs have been recorded by many artists including: George Jones, Loretta Lynn, Johnny Cash, Johnny Rodriguez, Willie Nelson, Patty Page, Waylon Jennings, George Burns, and Phil Harris. Alan Jackson had a number one hit with Tom T.'s song "Little Bitty" in 1996.

While establishing himself as a songwriter legend, Tom T. Hall has continued his own recording career. There just isn't anyone else that sounds like Tom T. Hall. He has one of the most enduring and recognizable voices on the country music airways. The lyrical integrity of his material, coupled with the gritty straight forward texture of his vocal style, makes a Tom T. Hall song a song that stands on its own, evoking a concise statement that rings true in its clarity and legitimacy. It is said that there are few things finer than the sound of a man singing his own song.

and the fact that Tom T. stands with the greats in his profession is evident in his recordings such as: "Old Dogs," "Children and Watermelon Wine," "The Year Clayton Delaney Died," "Love," "Ravishing Ruby," "I Like Beer," and numerous others.

In 1995, Mercury Records released a compilation of his classic children's songs along with a boxed set of his classic story songs, and in 1996 released his latest album "Song From Sopchoppy."

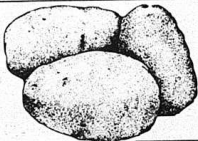

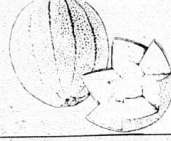

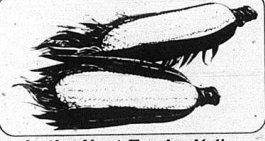

## Harding may have archaeological find

Howard Harding may have located a major archaeological find in the Clear Creek area.

Harding said he did not know if the larger creature had trapped the smaller creature for food or they were mating at the time of their death.

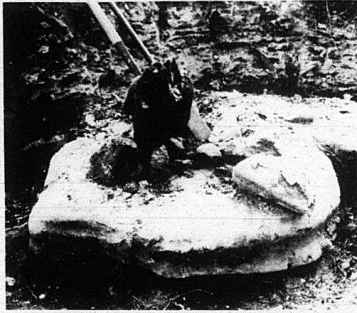
"Maybe she was like the Praying Mantis, which devours the male after mating," he said.

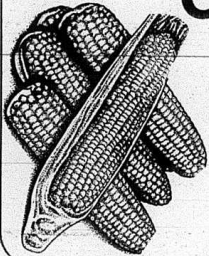

## Agricultural News

### Warden Alexander, Director

Payments may now be accepted at the FSA Office for Rockcastle producers who have farm loans with Ag Credit (formerly Farmers Home). Tobacco marketing season is just around the corner. The certification form, MQ-38, must be completed before FSA issues the price supported marketing card. The MQ-38 form will be mailed in September. The form should be completed, signed by the farm's operator and returned as soon as possible.

Over the past few years more and more cases of stolen tobacco have been reported. When tobacco is stolen from your farm, a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft. A copy of the police report shall then be submitted to the local FSA Office for documentation. All stolen tobacco cases shall be submitted to the KY State FSA Office.

Nesting tobacco provisions have been revised. A tobacco producer whose tobacco is found to have been "nested" at the time of delivery for a price support loan advance will forfeit the advance, whether the producer knew it was nested or not. If the local FSA Committee determines that the tobacco was knowingly nested, the producer will be precluded from price support eligibility for the entire crop year. "Nested tobacco" is tobacco in a lot with a "NEST" of inferior tobacco or foreign material. If the nest is inferior (lower grade) the entire lot is adulterated and is of lower grade overall than the payment shall then be submitted to the local FSA Office for documentation. All stolen tobacco cases shall be submitted to the KY State FSA Office.

vary according to the severity of the offense.

The lease and transfer of burley tobacco quota due to a disaster is authorized according to FSA regulations. County offices shall require, as a condition for approving a disaster lease and transfer, that the lesser file an FSA-578 (crop report) and an FSA-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) immediately upon the determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20% in all cases and BEFORE THE CROP IS HARVESTED.

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. County Committees administer federal farm programs at the local level and are responsible for establishing policy and the overall management of each FSA Office. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county we urge any and all producers who have not received a voting position in the past election (DEC 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: Farm owners, operators, tenants and shareholders, of legal voting age if the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes reservation land owners for Native Americans, spouses of eligible producers in community property States and spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or shareholder. REMEMBER: If you want to vote in the upcoming election - YOUR NAME MUST BE ON THE VOTING LIST AS AN ELIGIBLE VOTER. NOW is the time to contact your local FSA Office for voting eligibility.

This rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan (40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination, and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education retained Barry W. Cooper, P.E. who completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos management plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan.

Copies of the management plan are always available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at 245 Richmond Street, Mt. Vernon, KY and at the Principal's Office at each School any time during normal office hours.

# Welcome to Kentucky— "The Wildcat State"

Don't alert the Tourism Cabinet about changing road signs just yet, but one percent of all Kentuckians surveyed recently think that The Wildcat State is the state nickname. However, that pales in comparison to the "incorrect" guesses for the state flower, which included dandelion, ragweed and even poison ivy.

"This survey polled people on what the state nickname, flower, bird, tree and motto are," said Phil Osborne, president and CEO of Preston-Osborne Research, the company that conducted the survey. "What struck us is how few people knew the correct responses."

The exception was the state bird, Ninety-one percent of respondents

correctly picked the cardinal. From there, though, correct responses took a nose dive.

"Only 70 percent of those surveyed correctly named the nickname as the 'Blue Grass State,'" Osborne said. "Incorrect guesses included 'Mountain State,' 'Hillbilly State,' 'Coal Mining State' and 'Welfare State.'"

Forty-seven percent named gold-rod as the state's flower. Incorrect guesses included the sunflower, black-eyed Susan (obviously from Maryland transplants), rose and tulip, but also included the unconventional dandelion, ragweed and poison ivy. Other mentions included dogwood and red bud, which are ac-

tually trees, not flowers. Of course, some argue that the goldenrod is a weed - not a flower.

Just over half of those participating correctly identified, "United We Stand, Divided We Fall" as the state motto. The most frequently cited incorrect answer was "In God We Trust."

"There were a number of variations on the old theme that has circulated for a number of years," Osborne said. "We had 'Fast Horses and Beautiful Women' and 'Fast Women and Slow Horses.' There also were mentions for 'All for One and One for All,' and 'Don't Tread on Me.'"

# Future of fishing and boating up for legislative review

Senator John Beatty calls the act "the cornerstone of our congressional efforts to restore and maintain healthy fisheries nationwide." And after 10 years at work, the Sport Fish Restoration Act is up for the review by federal lawmakers. The act funds many of the programs which protect and enhance fisheries in every state, without affecting the federal budget.

"The Sport Fish Restoration Act, also known as Walleye-Bream, is a user pay/user benefit program, yet very few of those who contribute realize what impact they are making. People contribute with a small tax whenever they buy hot fuel of fishing gear."

Since the Sport Fish Restoration Act was put in place ten years ago, more than 3,000 fishing access sites and boat ramp facilities have been built and another 10,000 have been improved and maintained. 1,500 impoundments and many canals were funded for boaters, and 470 lakes and several hundred miles of streams and rivers have been restored and their fisheries enhanced with the Sport Fish Restoration funds.

Funding from the Sport Fish Res-

toration Act is also used for fish population surveys and habitat investigations. Two million youth from 42 states have received aquatic resource education funded through the Sport Fish Restoration Act.

What does this mean in Kentucky? This fiscal year it translates to over \$4 million for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources in matching funds from the Sport Fish Restoration Act. The funds are used for building and maintaining boat ramps, researching fish populations, fish stocking programs, providing educational materials for the public and for aquatic education programs like the popular Hooked on Fishing, Not on Drugs program and Aquatic Wildlife.

Legislators will be asked to reauthorize the allocation of motorboat and small engine gas tax transferred annually from the Highway Trust Fund. When legislators, boaters and anglers are informed of the accomplishments of the Sport Fish Restoration Act, how it works and what it does for them, they should offer overwhelming support.

The lowest correct response was the state tree, even though two answers were considered correct. Fourteen percent named the tulip poplar, the current selection and 21 percent picked the coffee tree (the former official tree).

One in four made an incorrect guess ranging from various oak varieties to the elusive raintree.

In most instances, baby-boomers — those between age 35 and 50 — were the most correct," said Osborne, himself a baby-boomer. "Why? Who knows. 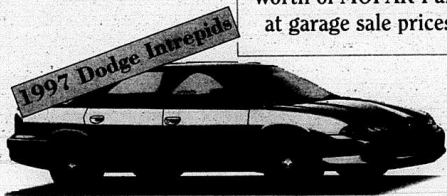
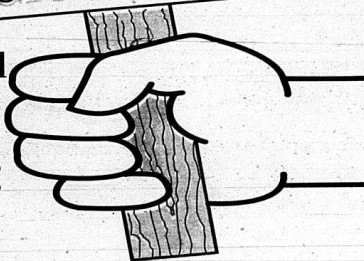

# Coaches cautious about 1997 Rock

How they get started and how their young team reacts, if things do not go well early, will determine the fate of the 1997 edition of the Rockcastle County Rockets.

Head coach Tam Larkey and his top assistant Tony Saylor are always cautious when they talk about their team's chances, but this year they may actually have good reason to be so cautious.

With only three returning starters on defense and five on offense the Rock is inexperienced to say the least.

Coach Larkey said this year's team lacks depth besides having a lot of inexperienced starting players.

"We will have eight or nine players going both ways, some of those players did not see a lot of action last year, so we won't know until we get a few games behind us, what kind of team we really have," Larkey said.

The coach said he would have several different looks this year on offense with different players in different positions. "We may be wide one series with three or four receivers in the pattern and then

Nathan DeLeon and Cliff Matekovich and Hale will play the three ends in the wide set.

Senior John LaFavers will anchor the offensive line at the center position with returning starters, guard Kevin Bradley and tackle Josh Martin playing the strong side of the offensive line. Sophomore Gary Coffey and junior Daniel Forbes will round out the offensive line.

Coach Saylor also expects a lot out of Bradley and LaFavers on defense as well as Ingram, who will be back at his middle line-backer spot.

Saylor said that only about fourteen players will see action on defense.

"We will find out the very first game if we can play defense against good teams," Saylor said.

"South Laurel starts seventeen seniors, nine on defense and eight

# Rockets hold their share of state records

For the past several years, Rockcastle High School football has been big, especially on a regional and local level.

But when you begin flipping through the state high school football records you realize that the Rock holds several statewide records as well.

They include a first place for the 1995 Rockets who allowed only 647 yards the entire season. The 1996 Rockets are ninth in the state with the most rushing yards by a team in one game. They picked up 497 yards against Whitesburg, with Jason Brown running for 271 of those total rushing yards. Leading that category is Bowling Green who picked up 700 yards against Warren East that same year.

J.D. Harris is tied in the eleventh spot for most touchdowns in a career. He scored 53 touchdowns during his tenure at RCHS. Derek Homer of Fort Knox scored 112 touchdowns between 1993-96. Harris is also in 22nd place with most yards rushing in a career. He ran for 4,086 yards from 1989-92. Homer also has that first place with 8,224 total career yards.

There has been no one better in the kicking department at RCHS than Raymond Blackburn. Blackburn is tied for eighth with a 45 yard field goal. Not far ahead is Christian County's Jeff Lancaster in first with a 52 yarder. Blackburn is also in sixth place in the category of most extra points kicked in one game. He booted eight against Allen Central in 1996.

Jon Cromer had 619 career rushing attempts and that is good enough for a sixth place finish in the record book. Cromer is also tied for sixth in the longest rushing touchdown category. He rushed for a 92 yard touchdown against Boyle County in 1996. His career lasted from 1993-96.

William Bullens stepped into a new position and the record books when he replaced an injured J.D. Harris against Williamsburg in 1990. Bullens scored five touchdowns from the tailback for a tie for third.

Dusty McClure is tied for seventh for the most interceptions in one season. He had eight interceptions during the 1996 season. Harvey Miracle of Bell County is in first with 16 during the 1987 season.

Two of the Rockets assistant coaches are in the record book: Chris Larkey and Adam Coleman.

Larkey is tied for second with his 101 yard interception that he returned for a touchdown against Berea in 1987. Only Paul Little of Paris is ahead of Larkey with his 102 yard interception returned for a touchdown against Mercer County in 1995.

Coleman is tied for fourth with his 70 yard punt he had against Evarts in 1988. Coleman went on to punt for Cumberland College.

Pete Harrison, William Hel-

lard and Jason Brown can all claim their names are first in the record book. Harrison had seven fumble recoveries during his 1987 season at RCHS. Kareem Merriweather

is not far behind as he had six in both the 1994 and 1995 season. Hellard has the most fumble recoveries in one game. He had three against McCreary Central in 1990

and Brown is tied for first with four blocked punts during his career at RCHS. He did this in 1995. Rockcastle is tied for twelfth in the longest touchdown pass

category. Quarterback Jamie Linville connected with Jason Childress for an 80 yard touchdown during their 1995 game with Madison Southern.

Southwestern returns several starters, including a backfield that gained more than 2,000 yards last year.

Running back Wess Daulton and the Warriors led the state in rushing a year ago and, with a good quarterback in Brian Morrow who can run the option and throw the ball, the Rock will have their work cut out for them. They play the Warriors on the road the second game of the season. Game time is 7:30 on the 5th.

Although the Madison Southern Eagles have moved out of the Rocket's district, (by moving up to 3A), they are still on the schedule the third week of the season.

The Eagles will come to town to play in the Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl. They will bring with them a new coach, former EKV assistant Teddy Taylor and several returning starters.

"We are 9 and 0 against Southern and they want to beat us bad. It will be a tough, tough game for our team," Larkey said.

The fourth week of the season the Rockets will go on the road. Really go on the road.

The Rock travels to Dayton High School in Northern Kentucky to face a Dayton team that lost in the play-offs last year to a Beechwood team by one point, that eventually won the state 1A title.

"When you play a team like Beechwood as close as they did, you must have a good program," Larkey said. "We don't know a lot about their team this season, but by the time we play them we will have seen them," the coach said.

4A Scott County comes to the Rock for Homecoming on Sep-

tember 26. They too have a new coach and eighty players on the roster. "Anytime you have that many kids you have a lot to choose from and usually a good team," Larkey said.

After the Scott County game, the real Rocket season begins.

The Rockets travel to Wayne County, to begin district play and will face a team that will probably be 5 and 0.

"They have lightened up their non-district schedule so they will be healthy and ready for district play," Larkey said.

"They have a lot of kids out down there and a great quarterback in Seth Rice," Larkey said.

To get ready for the Rock, Wayne County also has the week before the Rock comes to town off. Larkey expects Wayne to compete for the district title this season. Wayne is in the central time zone but game time will be 8 p.m. "Rock" time.

Things don't get any easier for the Rock the next week when they travel to Corbin.

The Redhounds are like the Rock, a bit on the young side, returning only eight seniors, but when the two get together, it is always a dog fight.

Mike Whitaker has renewed the Corbin fans faith in their program and tailback Zack Prewitt is one of the best backs the Rock will face all year. "I'd say by the time we play Corbin, the winner will be determined by whichever team has their chins still in the air and their skilled players healthy," Larkey said.

Estill County and quarterback Stanley Neece will come to town on October 17.

The Engineers lost to Breahtitt County 55-0 last week and are a little slow of foot. "Expect them to throw a lot, Neece is rated as one of the better quarterbacks in the state," Larkey said.

Somerset is loaded. "They will probably be the team to beat in our district," Larkey said.

Their coach, Jeff Perkins told a Somerset newspaper that his first eleven players on both sides of the football are good enough to play with anybody on their schedule. They also return 10 of 11 defensive starters. The only consolation is that the Briarjumper come to the Rock.

Possibly the only breather on the Rockets schedule comes at the end of the season when they host the Casey County Rebels.

"We'll need a game like that before we hopefully head into the play-offs," Larky said.
