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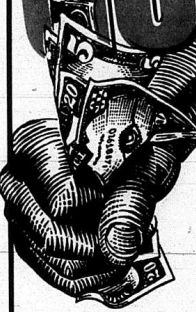

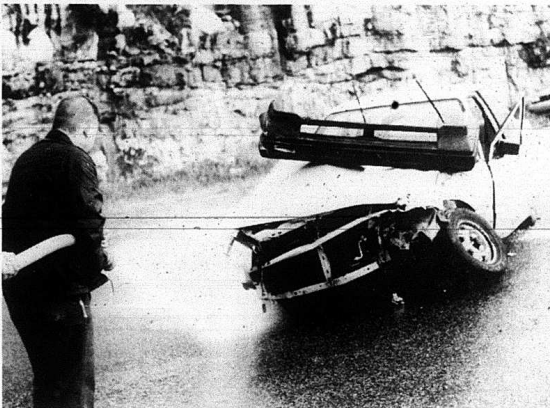
In his citation, Roark said that Holbrook cursed him and tore his shirt off of him during an altercation at Holbrook's farm on Brindle Ridge, August 22.

But, Holbrook said this week that he was attempting to remove neighbor's cattle from his yard and porch at the time and that Roark assaulted him during the arrest.

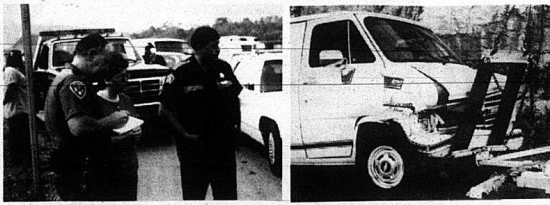
Holbrook said that he was considering filing a civil suit for false arrest and assault. "The deputy drug

Pool, walking track may be in city park plan

A swimming pool, basketball court, walking and running path, swingsets and a slide are just a few possibilities for the new city park in Mt. Vernon.

Council members and Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer discussed plans for the park at the regular meeting of the council Tuesday night.

Architect Bill Carman of Lexington told the council he would come up with two plans for the 2.5 acre site within 30 days.

Carman, who works for the Fayette County Parks Department said that he thought the former Thrifty Lumber Company site was an excellent choice for a park site and he was looking forward to drawing up the necessary plans. Carman has done free lance work throughout the state.

Mayor Cromer told the council that low interest money was available for the park and that several local residents have said they would donate to the project.

"Once people see the work being done and know this is going to be something they can be proud of and make use of, we will get more donations," Cromer said.

Councilman Lee Keene also re-

ferred to a Kentucky Division of Waste Management Report that said the site was suitable for a park. Local resident Dr. Joe Henderson had requested that the site be inspected by officials because of the type of products sold there.

Bill Belcher, of Kentucky Division of Waste Management, said in his report that no division of waste management violations were observed when he conducted his investigation on August 6.

Loretta and I made what is rapidly becoming an annual excursion to Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky over Labor Day weekend to attend Riverfest '97 and take in the sights and sounds.

Our good friend, Martha Wheeler, who lives in the Northside Neighborhood of Cincy, puts us up and we spend three days and evenings running around the city and attending the fire-works display from the Kentucky side of the Ohio River.

This year's fireworks, sponsored mainly by Toyota, O'Doul's and a local FM rock and roll station was billed as the largest ever produced in the world since it was the 30th anniversary of Riverfest. Frankly, we doubted they could improve on or get any louder than last year without causing structural damage to the bridges that cross the river. And frankly we would have gladly fought the traffic

to see the same show as the one in '96.

So there we were, parked on a blanket with Martha and her friend, Renetta at the base of the flood wall at the edge of dark along with well over half a million other folks. About 15 minutes before the shooting was scheduled to start, I made a last minute trip to porta-john row which was set up directly under the old L&N Railroad Bridge.

I had just closed and locked the door and gotten situated when all of sudden what sounded like sticks of dynamite began exploding right on top of the johns. I've never been so glad to have my pants down in my life, because if I hadn't, I would have been very humiliated.

The old bridge was being used as part of the staging area for the display and some joker had decided to get everybody's attention and let them

know that what was coming was going to be loud. It darn sure got my attention and prompted me to get my business done in a hurry without any need for concentrating on it.

Now the actual fireworks may not have been the largest the world has ever seen, but they eclipsed anything I've ever witnessed. For forty-five minutes, non-stop, hundreds of thousands of shells exploded in a synchronized display that was an awesome work of art so large that photographing it was out of the question.

If you ever attend Riverfest, you will lose interest in anything that happens around dark on the 4th of July. It's free. Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on the premises and there's a lot of reasonably priced food and non-alcoholic beverages available at reasonable prices. Numerous bands start playing around noon at different stages along the waterfront and the music is non-stop right up till dark.

But best of all, it only costs a dollar to get in. The dollar is used to clean up the mess that 600,000 people leave behind.

Cincinnati is a wonderful place to shop if you get away from downtown. We are particularly fond of Northside and College Hill because there are dozens of shops and wonderful old architecture. The Spring

Grove Cemetery where graves are marked with monuments that cost more than my house also serves as an arboretum that covers some 200 acres. It is, in my opinion, the best museum in the city and it's open to the public during daylight hours seven days a week year-round.

Plant and wild-life lovers like myself could spend a week in it and not even begin to see or experience everything within its bounds.

At the back entrance to the cemetery is Funk's greenhouse and nursery operation where you could spend another day just looking. Loretta and I would be spending over a hundred dollars on landscaping plants, (roses in bloom for five bucks each that are in better shape than stuff that usually starts at twenty).

And finally there's the drive home on Monday when you basically have 1-75 South to yourself while the Northbound traffic is crawling along bumper to bumper because all the transplanted hillbillies are headed back to Michigan, Indiana and Ohio after spending the weekend with their home folks.

In fact, Martha said we were the talk of Northside because the natives couldn't understand what a hillbilly was doing in Cincinnati on Labor Day weekend.

She doesn't know what "idle" means. The renters of her home place across the road from Nod's Little Acre moved out and left the grounds a veritable jungle. So Nancy tied into a thicket that had grown up on the bank behind the house. She leveled a lot of it before deciding to wait until late fall when leaves have fallen, when using a chain saw will not produce as much sweat as now.

But the thicket got back at Nancy. Her hair was full of stick-ticks and burrs! So I spent a considerable amount of time that evening getting stick-ticks and burrs out of her knotted-pang without damaging it.

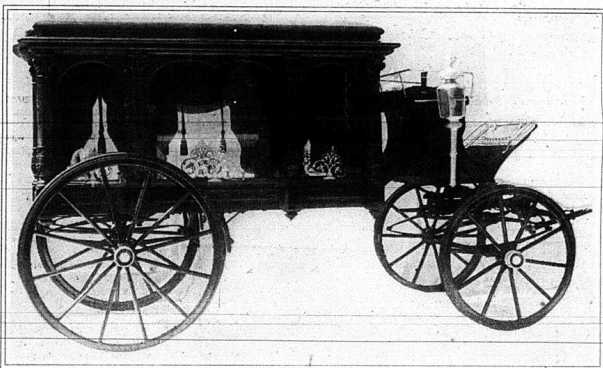

Appendix A • Public Notice

In accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, written policies and procedures have been developed which describe the Rockcastle County School District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information. Stated in this notice is a summary of your rights under the Act. These rights are passed on to the student at age eighteen. For the purpose of this notice, the student 18 years or older will be referred to as the "eligible" student. Parents, guardians and eligible students may review and inspect all education records relating to that student by making a request to the Principal of the school where that student attends.

The RCSD will presume that the parent has the authority to review and inspect records relating to their children unless the district has been advised in writing that the parent does not have legal authority under applicable state law governing such matters as guardianship, separation and divorce.

Personally identifiable information is not released to another party unless there is written authorization from the parent or eligible student or there is a "Legitimate Educational Interest" as defined in the policies and procedures for confidentiality. A current list of employees' names and positions who have access to personally identifiable information is on file in each school. The RCSD has described in its policies and procedures the conditions under which personally identifiable information is released to another person without written parental consent.

"Directory Information" is information contained in an educational record which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. This information may be released to news media, athletic organizations, scholarship or college entrance committees, or official organizations whose need for data is connected with student help activities. "Directory Information" includes, but is not limited to the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. The parent, guardian or eligible student currently enrolled, may request all or part of the directory information to be withheld. The request must be in writing to the Principal of your child's school, within 30 calendar days after the notification has been distributed. The written request must specifically state what information may not be classified as directory information.

In accordance with federal regulation concerning the release or transfer of educational records, it is the policy of this school district to forward educational records on request to a school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Parents may obtain upon request a copy of the records transferred.

The Rockcastle County Schools keep child and youth records in a secure computer system and in locked files in each school and central office.

Any parent or guardian of a student, or any eligible student, may challenge the content or accuracy of any material or entries in the student's educational records on the grounds that it is inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of the student. Requests to amend the records are submitted to the principal of your child's school.

For students who have been determined eligible for programs for children and youth with disabilities, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parent when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. The RCSD will destroy the educational records of a child or youth without a parent's request after the records have been maintained for a minimum period of seven years and are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may be later needed for Social Security purposes. The RCSD retains for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance record, classes attended, grades completed, and year completed.

Children and youth determined eligible for special education include those children and youth with disabilities who have hearing impairments, vision impairments, emotional and behavior disorders, both deafness and blindness, health impairments, specific learning disabilities, mental disabilities, speech and language impairments, physical disabilities, autism, or traumatic brain injuries, and who because of these impairments need specially designed instruction and related services.

The Rockcastle County Schools will make sure any child or youth who has a disability, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided an appropriate public education at no cost to the parents of the child or youth.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County Schools find any infant, toddler, child or youth who may have a disability and need special education and related services. The district needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child or youth; the name, address and phone of the parent or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if special education is needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways Rockcastle County Schools collect the information needed. The information the school district collects will be used to contact the parents of the child or youth and find out if the child or youth needs to be evaluated or referred for special education services.

If you know of a child or youth who lives in Rockcastle County, who may have a disability, and is not receiving needed services, bring, telephone or send the information to:

Child Find activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts, Rockcastle County Schools will use screening information, student records and basic assessment information to collect on all children and youth in the district to help locate those children and youth who have a disability and need special education.

Any information the district collects through Child Find is maintained confidentially.

Parents, guardians or eligible students have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education related to perceived failures by the district to comply with confidentiality requirements. The address is: Family Policy and Regulations Office, U.S. Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202.

Written policies and procedures have been developed which describe the district's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and Child Find activities. There are copies in the Principal's office of each school and at the Board of Education office. Copies describing these policies and procedures may be obtained by contacting:

2. *HERE ON EARTH* by Alice Hoffman. After nearly twenty years

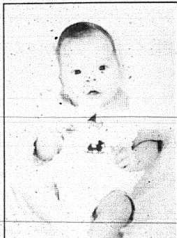

Appalachian Harvest Festival first weekend in October

Even with modern conveniences and labor-saving devices, life today can be hectic, strenuous and hurried. Imagine running a household where nearly everything was made with your own two hands. Most of us are so far removed from that fiercely independent, amazingly creative and strikingly individualistic spirit that pioneered the advances of today.

For three days, October 3rd-4th & 5th, Renfro Valley shines the spotlight on the musicians, artists and crafts people for whom making do and making it yourself was a way of life. In a lush green valley, surrounded by tree-covered foothills and bordered by clear country streams, visitors will witness and experience the skills necessary for life in rural Kentucky some fifty years ago.

Antique farm machinery, often relying as much on muscle as on mechanics, provides silent witness to the days of the family farm. Nearby, amule plops patiently in circles, powering an authentic molasses mill. The mill is grinding cane stalks which are boiled in great cauldrons over open wood fires. As the sweet perfume of the boiling cane fills the air, molasses are being created.

A farmers market and displays of

Kentucky-made food items (jams, jellies, herbs, sauces, etc.) provide an accurate view and fresh taste of early kitchen life. Craftsmen will be on hand to demonstrate the art of stain glass, glass blowing, woodworking, diamond cut pewter jewelry, basket weaving, and spinning wool. Hand-stitched quilts will also be on display along with other homemade crafts. Native American art and beading, has shaped by steam, a village cooper, pine needle weaving and a covered wagon train will be some of the other features.

Other examples of rural workmanship, created for practicality and now treasured for their artistry, are the furniture and pottery being created on the festival grounds. Lumber limbs of willow and oak are fashioned into chairs, porch swings, plant stands and baskets by crafts people using decade old techniques.

Throughout the harvest celebration, clogging and live music is performed. Country, bluegrass, mountain and gospel music — the kind of music heard in the living rooms and front porches of Kentucky homes.

The Appalachian Harvest Festival has been selected as one of South-

east Tourism Society's Top 20 Events for the month of October, 1997. With over 440 members, the Southeast Tourism Society represents the 10 southeastern states of Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia.

It is fitting that this celebration is staged at Renfro Valley. For 58 years, Renfro Valley has celebrated wholesome family entertainment with music and laughter in its weekly live shows, concerts, special events and festivals.

Rock crumbles under weight of mistakes in home opener, lose 28-8

They were in the game, then they weren't in the game.

They had some big plays and they gave up some big plays.

And in the end, a capacity crowd watched as the Rock crumbled on opening night, falling to visiting South Laurel, 28-8.

It was certainly an unusual occurrence for the mighty Rock, (losing a home opener), but one that was expected by most.

What wasn't expected was the way the Rock went down, (mostly due to their own mistakes).

A bad snap, a fumble here, a blown pass coverage there and an interception on the five yard line, all things that led to the demise and eventual defeat of the Rock. All total, the Rockets made six very uncharacteristic turnovers.

Three of those six turnovers led to all of the Cardinal's points. A questionable interference call on defensive back Dusty McClure, after he picked off a Cardinal pass, led to the

other one.

South Laurel got on the scoreboard early in the first quarter on a 79 yard drive that ended with a 20 yard touchdown pass. The Cardinal's extra point kick was good for a quick 7-0 lead.

The Rocket defense got little rest. The first of the Rockets six turnovers came after a fumble gave the ball back to the Cardinals on the Rockets 38 yard line.

The Rocket defense looked as if they were answering the call as they held South Laurel on a third-and-seven when John LaFevvers and Kevin Bradley sacked the Cardinal quarterback for a seven yard loss. Facing a fourth-and-fourteen, South Laurel completed a 31 yard pass for their second touchdown of the game. The extra point was good and the Rockets quickly found themselves down 14-0.

The Rockets lone touchdown of the game came at the beginning of the second quarter on a nice play when quarterback Chris Bishop tossed to

Nathan Deleon who found Clifton Matekovich for a 37 yard touchdown reception. The extra point attempt was blocked after a bad snap and the Rockets were behind 14-6. This drive was highlighted not only by the Deleon touchdown pass, but by a 22 yard completion from Bishop to Andrew Carrera and also a 15 yard run by Bishop.

Another Rocket turnover led to another Cardinal touchdown. The Cardinals recovered a fumble on the Rockets nine yard line and took only

two plays to find the endzone for a 21-6 lead after the extra point attempt was good.

The Rockets missed a huge scoring opportunity as the first half was winding down. After starting on their own 31—the Rockets marched down the field behind two 15 yard carries by Brooks Ingram to the South Laurel 18. With time running out, South Laurel intercepted a Rocket pass on the five yard line to end the threat and the half with a 21-6 lead.

South Laurel squeaked out one more touchdown in the fourth quarter as they drove 58 yards on 18 plays. It looked as though the Rocket defense would deny the Cardinals a touchdown as McClure intercepted a Cardinal pass in the endzone but a pass interference call gave the ball back to South Laurel and two plays later the Cardinals scored for the final of 28-8.

The Rockets only other points came late in the fourth quarter when Carrera, Gary Coffey, and Bobby Cundiff sacked South Laurel's quarterback in the endzone for a two point safety.

The Rockets got the ball back but an interception on the first play of the drive gave the ball back to South Laurel to end the game.

The good news for the Rockets is that they have probably the toughest opponent on their schedule behind them. They didn't lose a district game and they didn't get anyone seriously hurt.

"We looked at the film and our players understand that they were in the game, even after making all of those mistakes," Head Coach Tom Larkey said.

"We are going to make some changes on offense, put in more play action passing and some other things and we are going to work hard to have a good season," the coach said.

"I am proud of the fact that our team did not quit," Larkey added.

The Rockets were led in offense by Brooks Ingram who had 10 carries for 48 yards. Chris Bishop had five carries for -4 yards. He also had one pass completion for 21 yards. Nathan Deleon had one carry for three yards. He also threw one touchdown pass for 37 yards. Andrew Carrera had two carries for -3 yards and one reception for 21 yards. Dusty McClure had five carries for eight yards. Andy Hale rushed twice for three yards. Christopher Parsons rushed once for -12 yards. Josh Singleton rushed twice for four yards. Clifton Matekovich had one touchdown reception for 37

yards. Although Ingram had 48 yards rushing on the night, the Rockets picked up only 47 yards total due to the negative yardage.

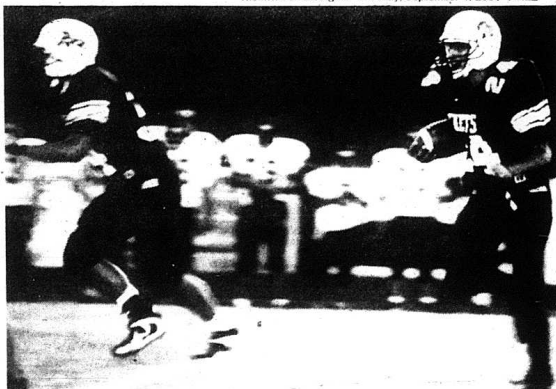
All total, the Rocket offense gained only 105 yards on the night. 58 yards in the air and 47 on the ground.

Monday night, the freshmen squad defeated Lexington Catholic 16-14 and the JV team lost 19-0 to Catholic.

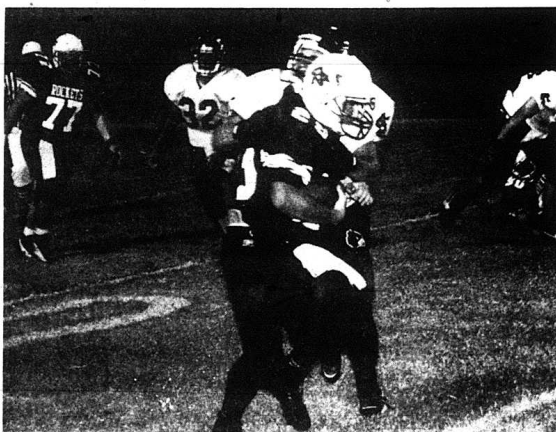

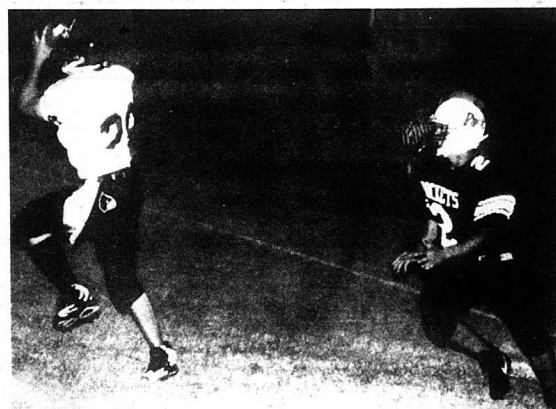

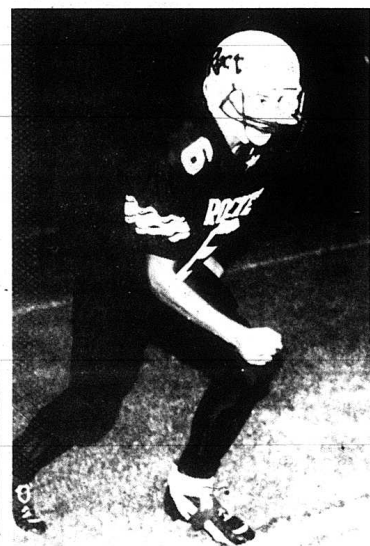

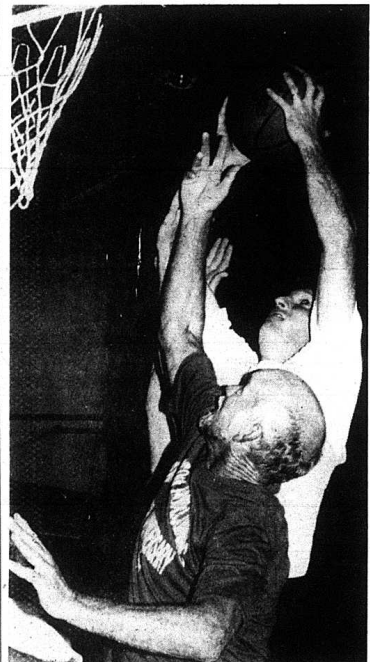

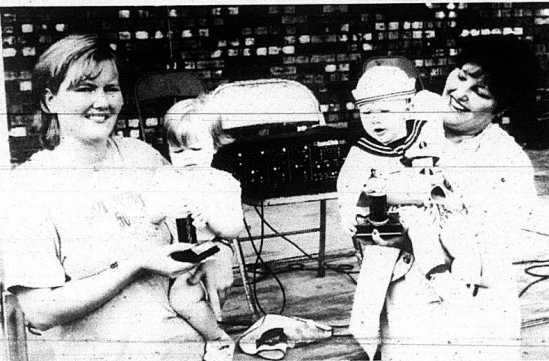
Rockcastle County is a better place because of the care and devotion given to our library by its director. She is forward thinking and energetic, and is indeed, a very special citizen.

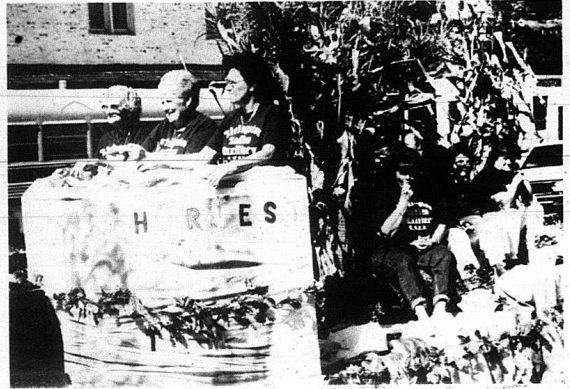

Food Storage Tips For Garage Refrigerators

- Rotate food stored in the garage refrigerator into your kitchen refrigerator as soon as space is available. Use the "first in-first out" rule to ensure food is used in the order it was purchased.
- Food items intended for long-term storage should be unopened foods that basically are better served cold—generally foods that are purchased off the grocery shelf rather than from a refrigerated grocery cabinet.
- Leftovers or extra party items should only be stored in the garage refrigerator temporarily (less than two days).
- Store delicate, temperature-sensitive foods—like ice cream and meat—in your kitchen refrigerator.

- **Cleaning and Maintenance Tips.**
If the garage refrigerator is connected to a GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter) protected circuit, check it once a day to prevent food loss.
- During humid weather, check the exterior of the product for moisture. Dry it off if necessary.
- Don't plug the refrigerator into a circuit controlled by a wall switch. You could accidentally turn off the lights and the refrigerator.
- Always be sure the receptacle is properly grounded to prevent electric shock hazard.
- Follow all installation guidelines in your use and care guide. Do not locate next to a heat source and do not store flammables near your refrigeration products.
- **Seasonal Tips.**
• **Summer conditions** result in increased energy consumption and

increased maintenance.
Warm and humid: Limit the number of door openings; vacuum the coils. (Garage get dusty.)
Humid: Mildew growth on gaskets is more likely. Clean and wash regularly. Use an auto paste wax on painted, metal exterior surfaces to help prevent rust. Do not get wax on plastic.
• **Winter conditions** result in

increased temperature fluctuations in food packages due to less frequent product cycling in unheated garages. In some cases frozen food can begin to thaw when garage temperatures are very cold. Check you use and care manual to determine the lowest safe operating temperature for your specific product.

Warden Alexander, Director Payments may now be accepted at the FSA Office for Rockcastle producers who have farm loans with Ag Credit (formerly Farmers Home).

Tobacco marketing season is just around the corner. The certification form, MQ-38, must be completed before FSA issues the price supported marketing card. The MQ-38 form will be mailed in September. The form should be completed, signed by the farm's operator and returned as soon as possible.

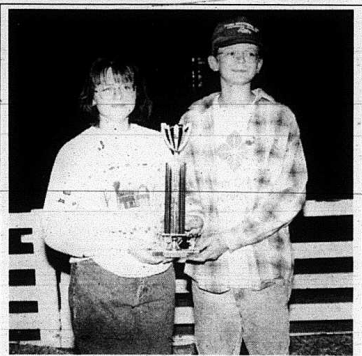
Over the past few years more and more cases of stolen tobacco have been reported. When tobacco is stolen from your farm, a police report must be filed within 15 days of the theft. A copy of the police report shall then be submitted to the local FSA Office for documentation. All stolen tobacco cases shall be submitted to the KY State FSA Office.

Nesting tobacco provisions have been revised. A tobacco producer whose tobacco is found to have been "nested" at the time of delivery for a price support loan advance will forfeit the advance, whether the producer knew it was nested or not. If the local FSA Committee determines that the tobacco was knowingly nested, the producer will be precluded from price support eligibility for the entire crop year. "Nested tobacco" is tobacco in a lot with a "NEST" of inferior tobacco or foreign material. If the nest is inferior (lower grade) the entire lot is adulterated and is of lower grade overall than the payment grade. The "NEST" may include such foreign material as manure, sticks, dirt, or anything other than the grade of tobacco of the entire lot. The FSA Committee must assess a penalty on the AMS Grader's determination of nested tobacco. The penalty may vary according to the severity of the offense.

The lease and transfer of burley tobacco quota due to a disaster is authorized according to FSA regulations. County offices shall require, as a condition for approving a disaster lease and transfer, that the lesser file an FSA-578 (crop report) and an FSA-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) immediately upon the determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20% in all cases and BEFORE THE CROP IS HARVESTED.

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. County Committees administer federal farm programs at the local level and are responsible for establishing policy and the overall management of each FSA Office. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county we urge any and all producers who have not received a voting petition in the past election (DEC 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers of legal voting age if the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes reservation land owners for Native Americans, spouses of eligible producers in community property States and spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper. REMEMBER: If you want to vote in the upcoming election - YOUR NAME MUST BE ON THE VOTING LIST AS AN ELIGIBLE VOTER. NOW is the time to contact your local FSA Office for voting eligibility.
