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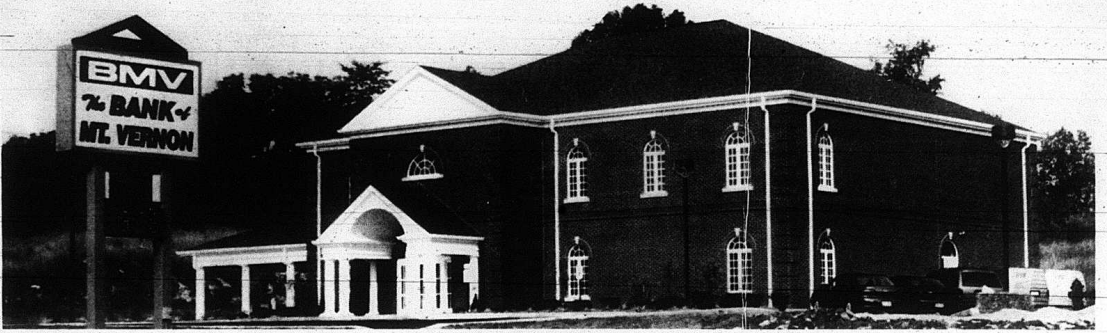

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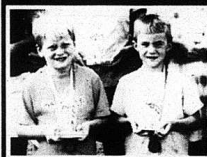

Court will try to clear annex debt

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will try to wipe out over \$2 million dollars in debt currently owed on the Rockcastle County Annex, when they meet with state officials in

Frankfort on September 29. The court voted unanimously Tuesday to re-issue just over \$2 million in bonds to generate enough funds to discharge and refund bonds that were issued in 1990 and 1991 to build the courthouse annex. Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis told the court that, if approved, the payback money for the bonds would come from the budget of the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) and would be wiped off the county's debt.

Carlotis said that Tom Armstrong, the state's director of local government was also the hearing officer who would make the final decision. If Armstrong decides that the county should foot the bill, Carlotis told the court it would cost \$40,000 a year for 14 years because of the agreement signed in 1991. "It was a nasty surprise, we were all under the impression that the county would never have to pay anything for the annex, because the rental

payments from AOC would take care of it," Carlotis said. However, Carlotis referred to a paragraph in the 1991 agreement that said the county would pay on the bonds if the state wasn't able to because of any shortfall. Carlotis then presented the court with a bill for \$8,429 to complete this year's bond payment to Central Bank of Lexington, saying the state apparently had a shortfall in funds. Executive Secretary Anna Rose Mullins told the court that the only

way the court could pay the bill was to take the money from the Economic Assistance Fund, which they did. Magistrates Jack Bradley and Amos Burdette, who were members of the court in 1991, told the rest of the court that they were "led to" by the AOC in 1991. "They told us we wouldn't have to pay anything and if we did not accept their offer to build the annex, some other county would get it," Jack Bradley said. Bradley and Burdette both balked at paying the \$8,400 bill, but Judge Carlotis told them if the court did not pay it, they would most likely lose their jail project.

Carlotis indicated that the state would not approve the jail renovation if the court did not pay the bill on the annex. "They have told us in so many words, to pay this or lose the jail project, and the jail project will make the county money," Carlotis said. In order to pay for the jail project the county also has to issue bonds in the amount of \$880,000. \$180,000 of that money will be used to pay off phase I of the jail renovation, which has been completed. That money was borrowed from the two local banks. Carlotis said the bond issue will be at a lower rate than the bank rates and save the county money.

The court also authorized the advertisement for bids on the jail project, with construction slated to begin in October. (Cont. to A2)

Troopers credited with saving life

Two Kentucky State Troopers are credited with saving the life of a Tennessee woman on I-75 Monday afternoon.

According to Gilbert Acciaro, Jr., Public Affairs Officer with the London Post, Trooper John Yates was flagged down on I-75 near the 71 mile marker by a man advising that his mother was having an asthma attack.

Acciaro said the man had pulled his vehicle into the median when his mother became ill.

According to Acciaro, Yates checked the woman and radioed for help from Trooper Steve Long, who was also in the area.

Acciaro said that the two troopers worked with the victim until a Rockcastle County Ambulance arrived on the scene. "The victim's heart stopped and she quit breathing so the troopers performed C.P.R. (two person rescue) on the victim until the ambulance arrived," Acciaro said.

The Rockcastle County Ambulance transported the woman to the Berea Hospital where the victim's heart stopped again. Acciaro said doctors at Berea had to use paddles to shock the heart. She was later transferred by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Doctors at Berea said the woman would have died if not for the troopers' actions.

Local woman charged after incident

A Mt. Vernon woman will appear in Rockcastle District Court on September 24 to face charges of obstruction of government operation, setting fire on own land without precautions, resisting arrest and fourth degree assault of a police officer.

The charges stem from a Saturday night incident on Floyd Street. Mt. Vernon police officer Barry Adams arrested Mary Lou Bullock Neace, 44, after she apparently set fire to a couch and chair that belonged to Mike Bullock, also of Mt. Vernon.

The benefit auction is being held to help cover the costs of construction of Brush Arbor Church.

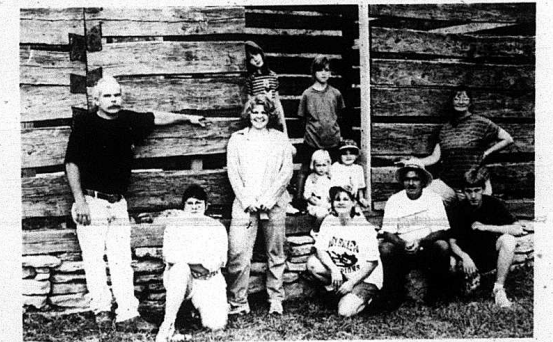
Creststone was used as the foundation of the church and was laid by volunteers, including Ron and Janice Owens and their six children.

Carloftis told the court that the state had given him a written agreement to use all empty beds in the jail for state prisoners once the renovation is completed.

The Judge said the state would use about 40 beds at \$23.50 per day which would generate \$340,000 a year for the jail fund.

The jail will pay for itself after the renovation and we will be able to

keep the jail in the county," Carloftis said.

Currently the jail has 34 beds, but once completed there will be 64 beds. The total cost for phase II and phase III is estimated at \$700,000.

In other business, the court voted to buy the Brindle Ridge Fire Department used pump for one of their fire trucks. The truck, which is an old military fire truck, is used a lot to fight forest fires.

Alonzo McCollum, Don Gabbard and Fred Ramsey, members of the board of directors of the fire department, and Forest Ranger Marvin Stone told the court the pump was needed and cost \$550.00. Stone suggested the court take money from the forestry fund to pay for the pump, which the court did. They voted to spend \$400 of the forestry tax money and \$150 from the general fund.

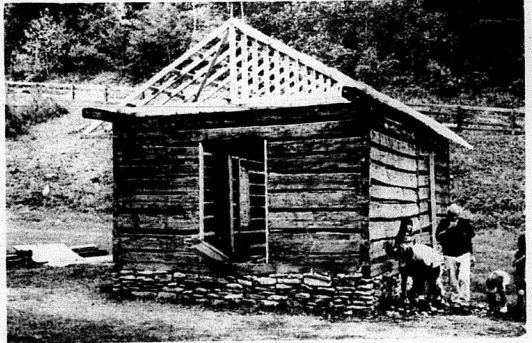
The court also accepted Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith's 1995 settlement.

The settlement showed that the Sheriff paid tax money in the amount of \$166,394 to the fiscal court, \$950,582 to the local board of education, \$68,280 to the board of health, \$36,155 to the library board, \$56,951 to the extension board, \$14,640 to the soil conservation board and \$1,567 for forestry fire protection.

The court also agreed to widen the Red Foley Road at Renfro Valley at the request of Glenn Renner and Ed Wesley. The road has a forty foot right of way and is heavily traveled, according to Renner and Wesley. Much of the traffic is due to the campers at KOA. The county will stake the road off before they begin the widening work.

And one dedicated first district magistrate John Holbrook, who had open heart surgery last Tuesday, was in attendance at the meeting for about an hour.

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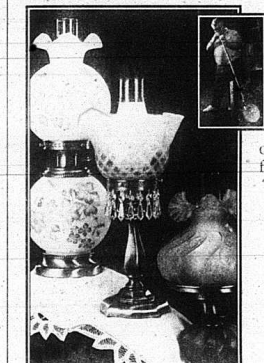

USDA's next CRP sign-up begins October 14

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the next Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up will be held during a 5-week period from October 14 through November 14 in USDA Service Centers across the nation.

"This is an opportunity for landowners to participate in a cost-effective, voluntary program to improve their land, water and wildlife resources," Glickman said. "Many landowners have not participated in CRP in the past. Now they will have another chance to do so."

Applicants should be aware that CRP is a highly competitive program and that the Environment Benefits Index (EBI) system was changed for this sign up to address concerns arising from the 15th sign up and to better protect the Nation's natural resource base," said Glickman. I encourage applicants to find out about the EBI well in advance of November 14, and to consult with USDA experts locally on steps they can take to maximize their EBI points. Landowners who do this have a higher likelihood that their acreage will be accepted."

The EBI's wildlife habitat factor is revised to recognize the benefits attributable to vegetative covers planned to address the habitat needs of specific wildlife species.

USDA also modified the EBI's air quality factor to reflect more accu-

rate wind speed, moisture conditions, particle size, organic material, volcanic and organic soils. Other minor revisions also were made.

"We want to make sure every potential applicant has the information he or she needs to make an informed decision," Glickman said. "We will be holding public informational meetings and making other efforts to get the facts out to landowners in plenty of time before the sign-up begins."

"This also will be an opportunity for landowners whose contract offers were not accepted in Sign-up 15 last spring and who wish contracts expiring this fall to make new contract

offers. USDA will continue to evaluate and rank all eligible CRP offers using an EBI based on the potential environmental benefits from enrolling the land in the CRP. "Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made only after Sign-up 16 concludes," Glickman said. "And we may not use the same cutoff that we used in the 15th sign up. We decide the cutoff after analyzing the EBI of all bids. Those who would have met previous EBI thresholds are not guaranteed a contract this time around."

Approximately 27.8 million acres will be under CRP contracts on October 1, 1997. Just over 4.8 million acres are under contracts that expire next year on September 30. USDA is authorized to maintain enrollment of up to 36.4 million acres.

Except under special circumstances, CRP rental rates will be based on local land rental rates just as they were for the 15th sign up, which was held last March.

Landowners should contact their local Farm Service Agency or Natural Resources Conservation Service office for additional information.

The CRP is designed to improve the nation's natural resource base. USDA enters into contracts with landowners to enroll erodible and other

environmentally sensitive land in long-term contracts — for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, landowners receive annual rental payments and a payment for up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation practices.

The program protects millions of acres of American topsoil from erosion. By reducing water runoff and sedimentation, it also protects ground water and helps improve lakes, rivers, ponds and streams. Acreage enrolled in the CRP is planned to resource-conserving (vegetative) cover, which make the program the major contributor to increases in wildlife populations in many parts of the country.

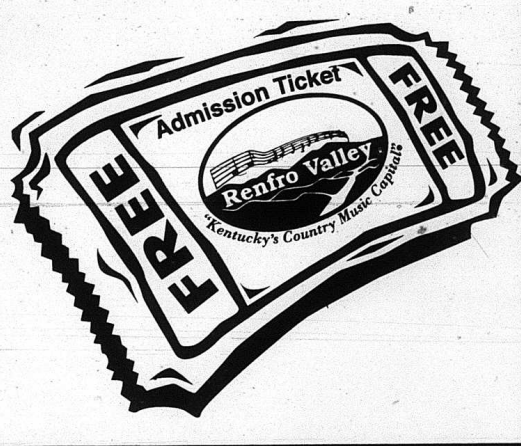

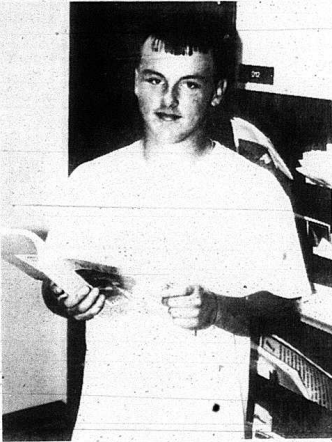
Our first P.T.A. meeting will be held Thursday, September 11, at 7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria. You may still

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October is Breast Cancer Awareness month

Breast cancer strikes one in about nine American women. According to the National Cancer Institute, the incidence of breast cancer has increased about one percent a year since the early 1970's. Researchers have identified several risk factors for breast cancer. We now know that a woman has a higher-than-average risk if: 1. She is over 50 years old, or 2. Her mother or sister has had breast cancer, or 3. she has had breast cancer before. However, all women need to be aware of the warning signals: 1. a lump or thickening in the breast, or 2. change in the breast shape, or 3. Discharge from the nipple. All women should practice monthly breast self-exams. Women ages 20-30 should have a breast exam by a physician every three years and annually after age 40. Women should have a baseline mammogram between 35 and 40 and every one or two years from 40-49 and annually after age 50. Mammography is the best method available for detecting tumors in their early stages. It can discover a tumor up to 2 years before a doctor or patient would otherwise know it was there.

Many women tend to ignore the above advice, especially if they have

no high risk factors. No woman can afford to be complacent as is illustrated in this account from a 42 year old woman who was diagnosed with breast cancer in December 1990.

"I had no risk factors at all... There was just nothing. The one mistake I made was that I didn't have a mammogram. I knew I should start having them at 40, but I was only 42. I was very healthy, I had no risk factors and I felt no urgency. I just hadn't gotten around to it."

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and we at the Rockcastle County Health Center are encouraging women of all ages to practice monthly breast self-examination and have mammograms as recommended. The earlier breast cancer is detected the better the chances of survival and successful treatment. Call the health center at 256-2242 for a breast examination. The medical staff can also teach you breast self-examination, and schedule you for a mammogram if you meet age, risk and income guidelines.

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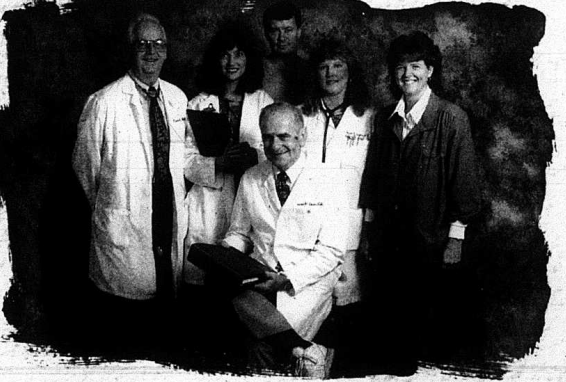

were depressed. An antidepressant works by affecting the chemicals in the brain. Somewhere along the way in testing the antidepressant, researchers discovered that the drug helped people who wanted to quit smoking. So they repackaged it, gave it a new name, and now sell it as Zyban. It came on the market last summer. This drug is available by prescription only. As with any medication, there are possible side-effects. Seeing the doctor is a must.

There is no one method of quitting that is better for everyone. Usually a combination of the methods helps more than just using one alone. In one

study 36% of the patch users were able to quit for at least a month. Almost 49% of Zyban users quit for that long. Among those who used both the patch and Zyban, 58% could quit for 30 days.

Quitting smoking is not easy, but there is new help available. For those who want to quit, now may be the best time.

There Is New Help

To Quit Smoking

Nicotine is one of the most addictive drugs available. For some, trying to quit smoking is like trying to fly - it is very hard to do. Others seem to quit smoking easily. My hunch is that they can quit easily because they are not as physically addicted to the nicotine as others. For those who have tried to quit and can't, there is now new help available. Here is the latest news.

Many are already familiar with the patch and the gum. The patch adheres to the skin and releases small amounts of nicotine into the bloodstream. This is to help the smoker get over the physical withdrawal from the drug. Patches are extensively advertised on television, and there are several kinds. Another method to get nicotine into the body is with the nicotine gum. It works on the same principle as the patches.

If unsure about which method to use, the smoker should contact his or her physician. The patches and gum are not meant to be used alone, but in conjunction with a comprehensive behavioral smoking cessation program. The American Cancer Society and the doctor can provide more in-

formation.

One method that I use to help people quit smoking is hypnosis. The power of post-hypnotic suggestions affect the cravings for a cigarette. As one woman told me, "I just don't have the cravings for a cigarette like I used to." To find out more about hypnosis, call me at (606)679-4134 or call toll free at 1-888-HYPNO11 (497-6611).

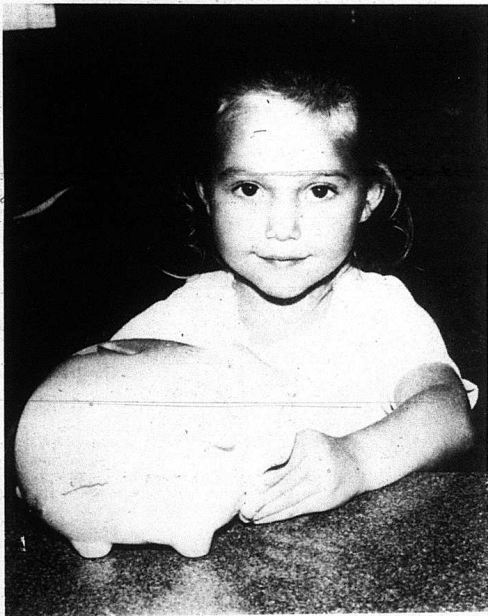
A newer method of nicotine replacement is the nasal spray. That's right, folks! It is a nasal spray that shoots nicotine up your nose. And does it work? It certainly can help. This method of delivery may provide quicker relief than the patches or the gum. Again it needs to be used along with a stop smoking plan, and it also requires a prescription from the physician.

The newest medical help for those who want to quit is a medication called Zyban. It contains no nicotine! Zyban works differently than nicotine replacement methods. To understand how it works, I'll divulge a little secret: Zyban has been available for years, but it was sold under a different name. As Wellbutrin, it's previous name; it was an antidepressant that provided help for many who

Rock rolls over Warriors 20-0

The reports of their demise may have been somewhat exaggerated, based on their performance Friday night.

Coming off a dismal performance in their opener, the Rockets rolled into Somerset Friday night and kicked the home team good, defeating the Warriors of Southwestern, 20-0.

The Rockets simply did not look like the same team that lost 28-8 the week before to South Laurel.

They blocked, ran, tackled, pass covered and executed much better than the week before. What a difference a week makes.

Big games by Dusty McClure, Andy Hale, Chris Bishop and especially the Rocket defense helped even the Rock's record at 1 and 1.

After failing on their first two possessions of the game, the Rockets first score came on their third possession of the game.

The Rock started their drive on their own 38 and picked up three first downs in the process. The drive was capped off by a 15 yard run by Andy Hale for one of the first downs and a six yard run by Dusty McClure for

another. McClure went on to carry the ball 20 yards for the touchdown with 24 left in the first quarter. Quarterback Chris Bishop's pass to Andrew Carrera was good for the two-point conversion and the Rockets had a quick 8-0 lead.

The Rockets were able to squeak another touchdown in before the end of the first half as they scored on a 10 yard pass from Bishop to Nathan DeLeon. DeLeon also had a 17 yard run in this drive. The two-point conversion was no good and the Rockets had a 14-0 lead going into the locker room at the half.

Southwestern did manage to move the ball to the Rocket 20 before the end of the first half but good defense only allowed a field goal attempt and that fell short for the Warriors.

Unlike last week, good fortune shined on the Rockets when Cliff Matekovich picked off a Warrior pass in the third quarter, giving the ball back to the Rockets on their own 42.

It took only five plays after the interception for Brooks Ingram to find the endzone on one yard run. The extra-point kick was no good and with 2:13

left in the third the Rockets had a 20-0 lead. This drive for the Rockets was highlighted by a 43 yard run by Hale that gave the Rockets a first and goal on their own four yard line.

Offensively for the Rockets: Andy Hale had nine carries for 71 yards. Dusty McClure had eight rushes for 51 yards. Chris Bishop had nine carries for 33 yards, threw one touchdown pass and completed four passes for 43 yards. Brooks Ingram had seven carries for 21 yards. Andrew Carrera rushed for 18 yards on 5 carries and had one reception. Josh Singleton had three carries for 13 yards. Nathan DeLeon caught three passes for 32 yards and one touchdown. Christopher Parsons completed a seven yard pass. The Rockets rushed for 205 yards and threw for 50 for a total of 255 yards.

The Rocket defense held their ground as they held the mighty Warriors to only 161 total yards. Brooks Ingram led the way with 10 tackles and a 1/2 quarterback sack. Andrew Carrera and Nathan DeLeon each had six tackles. Dusty McClure picked up five tackles. Gary Coffey, Kevin Bradley, and Cliff Matekovich each had four tackles. Matekovich also had an interception. John LaFavers and Andy Hale picked up three tack-

The head coach was especially proud of his punting game. "We've been backed up several times this

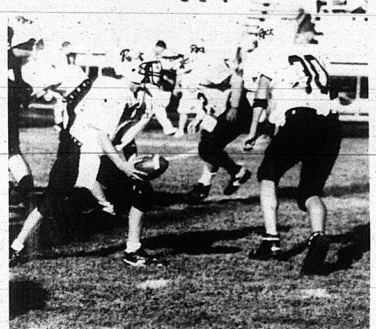
year and Henry (Bryant) has gotten us out of the hole with his foot," Larkey said.

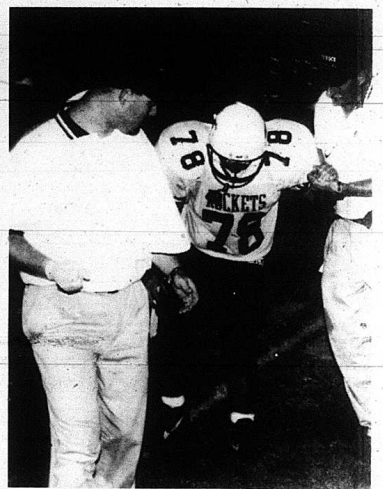

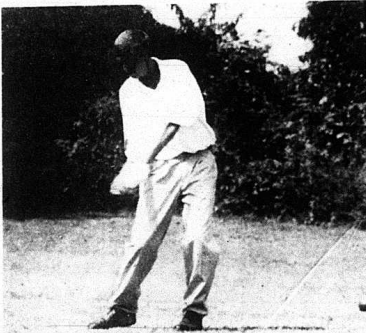

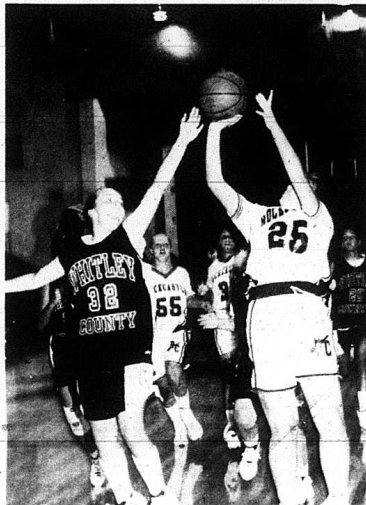

KDFWR expands duck, turkey hunting seasons

Expanding waterfowl hunting seasons and offering all-day spring turkey hunting were top actions taken by the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission at its quarterly meeting August 21 in Frankfort.

Hunters will have a 60-day spring season to pursue ducks, geese and mergansers beginning their first weekend in November (1-2). The season resumes November 22 and continues through January 18, 1998.

This year a second mallard hen may be added to the daily bag limit of six ducks. The daily bag limit may include no more than four mallards (two by hen); three pintails; two wood ducks; two golden ducks; one black-bellied and one canvas-back.

Canada geese may be hunted in the Western Goose Zone from December 6, 1997 through January 31, 1998, except for the Ballard Reporting Area which closes January 20. The Canada goose season in Fulton County may continue through February 15, 1998.

Removal of Coalfield Goose Zone hunters will have 35 days to take Canada geese, beginning December 28 and running January 31, 1998.

Eastern Zone Canada goose hunting remains December 13-January 31.

White-fronted geese may be taken statewide from November 27, 1997

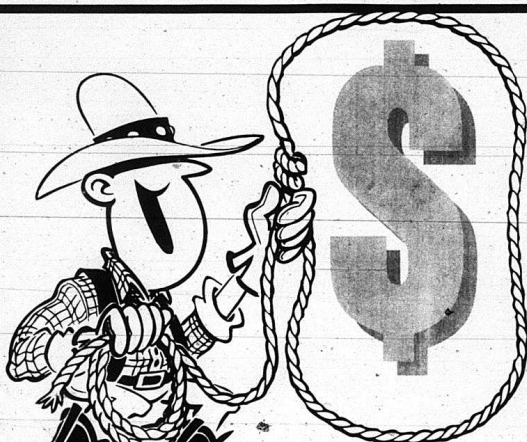

The food collected from the drive will be donated to local food banks in recognition of the goals of the National Food Recovery Summit, which will be hosted by Secretary Glickman in Washington, D.C.

USDA has announced the 1997 Tree Assistance Program (TAP) Tap provides cost share assistance to small orchards for replanting or rehabilitating orchard trees and grapevines and damaged by flooding and other natural disasters in the fiscal year 1997. An eligible orchard tree or vineyard owner may receive up to 100% of the cost to replace or rehabilitate the orchard trees or grapevines lost or damaged by fiscal year 1997 natural disasters. TAP applications for eligible losses suffered in

FY 97 must be filed during the sign-up period to be held August 18 through September 12, 1997.

Payments may now be accepted at the FSA Office for Rockcastle producers who have farm loans with Ag Credit (formerly Farmers Home).

The lease and transfer of barley tobacco quota due to a disaster is authorized according to FSA's regulations. County offices shall require, as a condition for approving a disaster lease and transfer, that the lessor file an FSA-578 (crop report) and an FSA-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) immediately upon the determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20% in all cases and BEFORE THE CROP IS HARVESTED.

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county we urge any and all producers who have not received a voting petition in the past election (DEC 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age if

Vegetables To Go

Recommendations from the Food Pyramid Guide suggests adults need to eat 3 to 5 servings of vegetables each day. It's no secret vegetables provide important nutrients and vitamins. They're also important for high fiber diets and offer preventive benefits for many diseases such as cancer.

Summer is a great time to get in the habit of eating more vegetables. Vegetables are nature's convenience foods. Many vegetables need little or no preparation to eat. Here are some tips for adding more vegetables to your diet:

- Support the local Farmer's Market. You'll find fresh produce and support the local economy.
- Plan your meals around vegetables. You'll meet the daily requirements, feel fuller and healthier. Add some tasty bread or crackers and serve as a one-dish meal.
- Keep it simple. Eating raw

vegetables cut out high fat sauces in casseroles. Steamed vegetables with herbs such as basil or Italian seasoning and a dash of lemon juice make good side liners for main courses. Grilled or baked vegetables are also simply delicious!

- Bag It! Bagged, clean and cut vegetables such as carrots are convenient, high nutrient snacks and good buys.

GARDEN SOUP

- 6 TBSP butter or regular margarine
- 2 green onions, thinly sliced
- 6 TBSP all-purpose flour
- 3 cups milk
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 2 medium sized carrots, thinly sliced
- 1 package (10 oz.) frozen peas, thawed

4 ounces fresh spinach, diced or frozen spinach
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper

Melt butter in large Dutch oven. Sauté onions in butter until tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in flour. Cook until smooth, stirring constantly. Remove from heat.

Gradually stir in milk and broth. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Add carrots, peas and spinach. Simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally, 15 minutes. Add salt and pepper. Makes 8 cups.

Late summer management can maximize Alfalfa survival

Time your late summer harvests and management to maximize alfalfa survival. UK recommends making the last cutting of alfalfa in early to mid-September and

allowing the alfalfa to rest until approximately November 1 or until a killing frost has occurred. The fall growth can be removed at this time by grazing or cutting. Late summer is a great time to apply fertilizer, especially potassium which helps alfalfa harden off for winter. Alfalfa removes about 45 to 60 pounds of K₂O per ton of hay removed each acre.

the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes reservation land owner for Native Americans, spouses of eligible producers in community property States and spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or shareholder. RE-MEMBER: If you want to vote in the upcoming election - YOUR NAME MUST BE ON THE VOTING LIST AS AN ELIGIBLE VOTER. NOW IS the time to contact your local FSA Office for voting eligibility.

There are times when it becomes necessary to make alfalfa harvests during the fall rest period. However, cutting at this time will affect the plant growth the following year in either slow initial spring growth, reduced yield, or in some cases stand reduction. There are situations when the risk of future damage due to cutting are reduced. If (a) the stand is in bloom at the time of the fall cut, or (b) it has been at least 45 days since the last harvest, or (c) the stand is old and will be plowed under for another crop anyway, the value of the forage may be great enough to risk the stand damage. Conditions where the risks associated with cutting during the fall rest period are greatest are: (a) The stand is less

than one year old, or (b) the field of alfalfa has been stressed during the past year by late frosts, diseases, excessive insects, or weed pressure, or (c) the field has not been adequately fertilized, or (d) the variety lacks multiple pest resistance.

Weigh the chances of stand risk against the need for feed or the value of the hay to be removed. This decision can often be a tough one. If you decide to cut during the fall rest period, be sure to watch the field closely over the winter for weed invasion.

HAY TESTING AND MARKETING

Don't forget that the Kentucky Department of Agriculture's hay testing service can also be an aid in marketing hay. When you test your hay by calling 800-248-4628, you have the opportunity to let them list that hay as being for sale on their computer listing of hay. The combination of visual observations made at the time the sample is taken and the chemical analysis make this database the most useful in the country for describing hay for sale. For more information, you can call 800-248-4628 and talk to the Hay and Grain Division of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture. The cost for analyzing one sample is \$10.

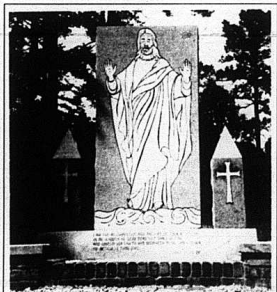
