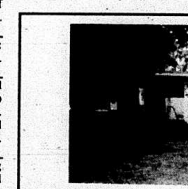

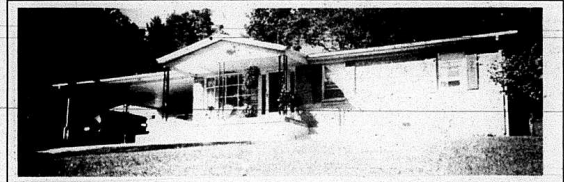

Ordinance #97-9-1

Be it hereby ordained by the City of Brodhead, a city of the 6th class, as follows:

Section General Provisions

- Penalty
- Definitions
- Animals—Running at Large
- Cruelty to Animals in the Second Degree
- Abandoning Domestic Animals Prohibited
- Destruction of Abandoned and Suffering Animal
- "Dogs"
- "Dogs Running at Large"

- Any person who violates any provision of III or V (animals running at large and abandoning domestic animals prohibited) shall be fined not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each offense. Each day the violation exists shall constitute a separate offense.
- Any person who violates IV shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), imprisoned for not more than 12 months, or both for each offense. (KRS 525.130)
- Any person who violates VIII ("Dogs Running at Large") shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each day of violation constitutes a separate offense.

II. DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this chapter the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.
"ABANDON" To forsake entirely, or to neglect or refuse to provide or perform the legal obligations for care and support of an animal by its owner, or his agent. Such abandonment shall constitute the relinquishment of all rights and claims by the owner to such animal. (KRS 257.100 (4))
"AT LARGE" Off the premises of the owner, and not under the control of the owner or his agent either by leash, cord, chain, or otherwise.
"OWNER" Every person having a right of property of an animal and every person who keeps or harbors an animal, has it in his care or permits it to remain on or about the premises owned or occupied by him, permits it to remain on or about the premises owned or occupied by him.

- ANIMALS AT LARGE**
 - No person who is the owner of any animal shall permit it to run at large in the public road, highway, street, lane, or alley, or upon unenclosed land, or permit it to go on any private yard, lot, or enclosure without the consent of the owner of the yard, lot or enclosure.
 - The owner of an animal who permits it to run at large in violation of this section is liable for all damages caused by such animal upon the premises of another. The animal itself shall be subject to capture, impoundment, and destruction.

- CRUELTY TO ANIMALS IN THE SECOND DEGREE**
 - A person is guilty of cruelty to animals in the second degree when except as authorized by law he intentionally or wantonly:
 - Subjects any animal to or causes cruel or inhuman mistreatment through abandonment, participates other than as provided in IV in causing it to fight for pleasure or profit, including, but not limited to being a spectator or vendor at an event where a four legged animal is caused to fight for pleasure or profit, mutilation, beating, torturing, tormenting, failing to provide adequate food, drink, space, or health care, or by any other means; or
 - Subjects any animal in his custody to cruel neglect; or
 - Kills any animal.
 - Nothing in this section shall apply to the killing of animals:
 - Pursuant to a license to hunt, fish or trap
 - Incident to the processing as food or for other commercial purposes;
 - For humane purposes;
 - For any other purpose authorized by law. (KRS 525.130) Penalty see Section 1.

STATUTORY REFERENCE

- CRUELTY TO ANIMALS IN THE FIRST DEGREE. A CLASS D FELONY SEE KRS.525.125**
- ABANDONING DOMESTIC ANIMALS PROHIBITED**
No owner of a domestic animal shall abandon this animal. Penalty see Section 1.
- DESTRUCTION OF ABANDONED AND SUFFERING ANIMAL**
 - Any peace officer may destroy or kill or cause to be destroyed or killed, any animal found abandoned and suffering and not properly cared of, or appearing to be injured, diseased, or suffering past recovery for any useful purpose.

VI. "DOGS"
For the purpose of this subchapter the following definition shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.
"Dog" any male or female member of the Canine family.

- DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE**
It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog, either licensed or unlicensed, regardless of the age of the dog, to allow the dog to be at large and unattended or to run in any street, park, lawn, garden, schoolyard, playground, or on any other public or private property. Any dog permitted to run at large in violation of this section shall be subject to capture, impoundment, and destruction.

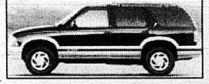

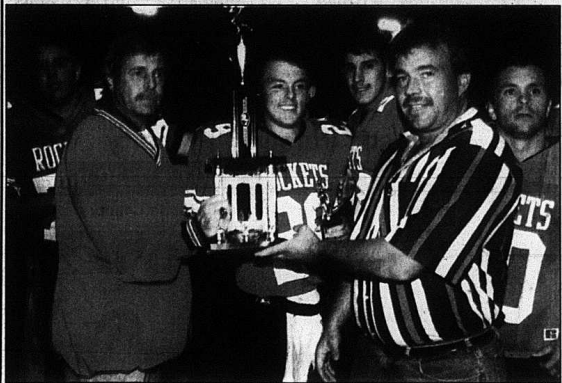

Board member voices concern over low scores in upper grades

Rockcastle County School Board member Dwight Griffin made it very plain last week that he is not pleased with the test scores of students in the middle and high school grades.

Griffin said during the regular meeting of the board that he could not understand why test scores at both the middle school and high school seemed to always lag behind state and national averages and be much lower than the scores of local grade school students.

Griffin's comments came after the school system's local test coordinator Claudinia Cash presented the board with the results of the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills.

That test, given last school year, is a national test that measures student's knowledge in math, reading, language, spelling, social studies and science.

As seems to always be the case, the county's third graders had the best scores. They beat the state average by over 24 points.

But the county's sixth grade students scored 7.5 points lower than the state average and the county's ninth graders scored just shy of three points lower.

Mrs. Cash told the board that the CTBS was not emphasized by teachers because the KRIS test is what Kentucky schools use to gauge the progress of their students.

However, Griffin said he thought that basic skills should be emphasized all the time and not just when there is a test to be taken.

Superintendent Larry Hammond and Cash told Griffin that administrators and teachers were well aware of the problem and although the low scores were part of a national trend, things were currently being done to improve student's skills.

Hammond said that teachers and principals were working very hard to improve their scores. The Superintendent said that Griffin's concerns were certainly warranted but that work had been underway for some time to improve the student's score at the middle school and the high school.

Griffin said his main concern was that students would not be able to compete in the job market, once they completed high school. "You have to have enough basic skills to get a job," Griffin said.

Activities for the two-day event are highlighted by a 5K Run/Health Walk and a Car Show.

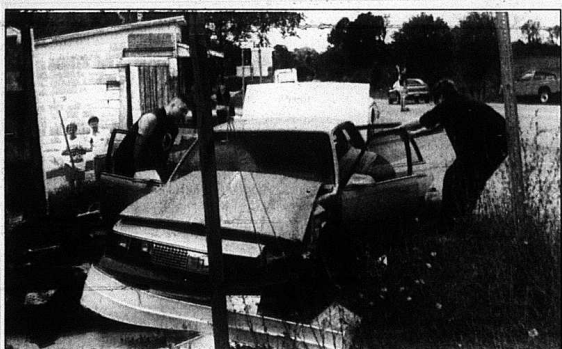
The 5K Run/Health Walk, sponsored by Vencor, begins Saturday, October 4th at 8 a.m. on Main St. in front of the courthouse.

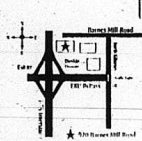

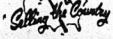

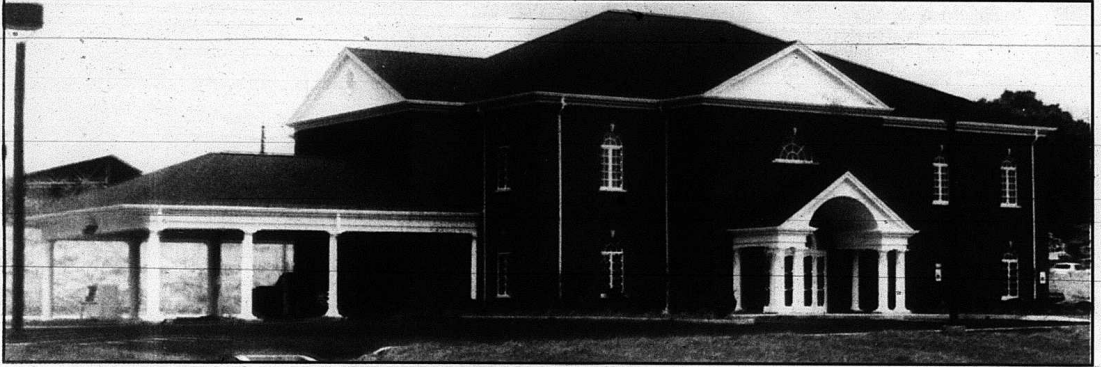

A former Clear Creek man who accidentally shot his son in the head last winter and a local man, set to go to trial October 8 on a murder charge, were among those indicted Monday by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

James Weaver, 27, was indicted for possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. According to court records, Weaver was convicted of cultivating marijuana on February 24, 1992 in Rockcastle Circuit Court. His son, Joshua, 8, has since

recovered from his life threatening injuries. Weaver will be arraigned October 10.
David R. Lindsey, 40, of Wolf Creek was indicted for possession of cocaine in December of last year. Lindsey, who is scheduled to be

arrested for the May 1995 shooting death of J.B. Alexander of Crooked Creek on October 8, will be arraigned on September 26 on this charge. His first trial ended in a hung jury.
A local woman was indicted on five counts of assault and one count

of wanton endangerment, in connection with an August 4th and 5th incident at Bowling Ridge.
Tina Madden, 30, Old 461, Mt. Vernon was charged with molesting Paris McClure, Heather Mautz and Jonathan Bussell on August 5.

She was also indicted for allegedly hitting Frederick Bussell with a baseball bat and macing him the same day. Madden was also indicted for showing at Connie Kyla and Jonathan Bussell on August 5.

Eagles no competition as Rock rolls in Jamboree Bowl

After losing their opening game last week is back. Back in a big way. Allowing only three points, the Rockets handed Madison Southern a sixth straight Friday night loss, their tenth straight win over the Eagles. It was perhaps their easiest win of the ten, with the Rockets jumping on Southern early and never letting up.

It took only 12 minutes and 13 seconds for the Rockets to amass a 30 point lead and shatter the Eagles'

hopes of finally getting a win over the Rockets.

The Rocket defense was the first to shine as Madison Southern thrustened on their first possession, taking over on the Rocket 39 yard line after recovering a Rocket fumble on the first play of the game. After three downs, the Rocket defense had pushed the Eagles back to the 60 yard line bringing up a 4th and 17. A bad snap to the punter gave the ball to the

Eagles on the Eagles' 27 yard line. After only five plays and 1:49, Chris Bishop found Andy Hale on an eight yard touchdown pass for a 6-0 lead. The two-point conversion was no good.

Madison Southern did the Rockets' greatest favor as they fumbled on the first play of their next drive recovered by Andy Hale—giving the ball back to the Rockets on the Eagles' 29 yard line.

It took only two plays and :30 for the Rockets to score this time with Andrew Carrera taking the ball in from the 18 yard line. Bishop scored the two-point conversion for a 14-0 lead with 7:16 left in the first quarter.

After the Rocket defense held the Eagles once again, allowing no positive yardage, the Rockets were once again threatening. They marched from their own 45 to Southern's 38 where Bishop found Nathan DeLeon for a 38 yard touchdown pass and a 20-0 lead. Bishop again ran in the two-point conversion and, with 2:35 left in the first, the Rockets had a 22-0 lead.

The Eagles put together a mini-threat to the Rockets on their next drive, but Gary Coffey's fumble recovery gave the ball back to the Rockets on their own 32 yard line. On the second play of the Rocket drive, junior Brooks Ingram took the ball 68 yards for the Rockets fourth touchdown of the night. 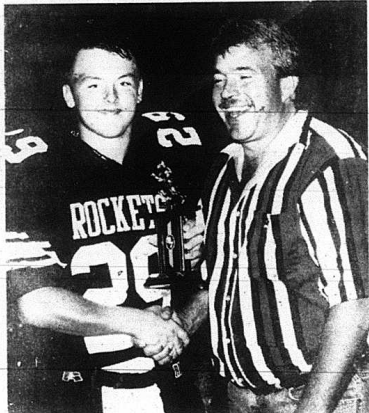

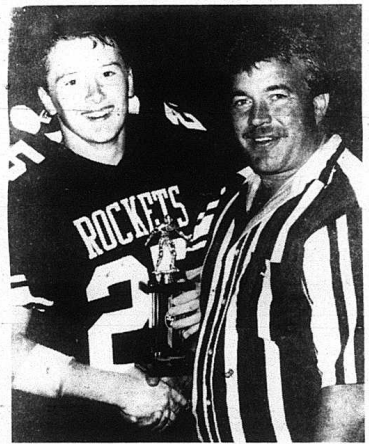
With Coach David Owens clearing his bench, Corbin managed to a mini-comeback, scoring 14 points the second half for the final 28-16 score.

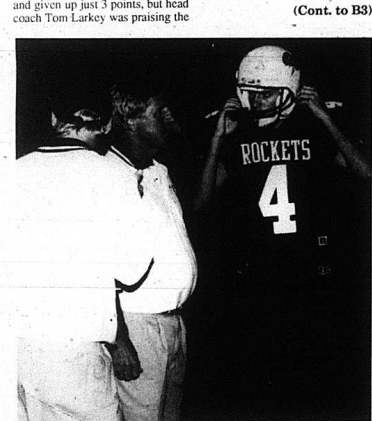

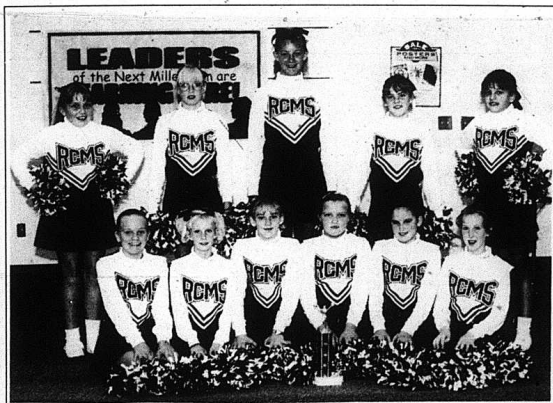

Dwight Whitley was born into a musical family, having grandparents and parents, who played and sang. He, along with his sister, Mary and two brothers, Randy and Keith, picked up the family trait and carried it on. As a teenager, Dwight played in a rock band called "The Ramblers." He later played banjo in a bluegrass band and sang harmony with his brother, Keith, who played guitar and sang lead. The Whitley Brothers were soon joined by the father-son duo of Hobart and Ricky Skaggs. After awhile, Keith and Ricky began playing with Ralph Stanley and The Clinch Mountain Boys.

Dwight had married, and despite the many opportunities afforded to him at that time, elected to stay in Eastern Kentucky with his wife, Flo and their two sons. His deep commitment to family came first with him. He continued to play in local bluegrass bands while his brother, Keith began his quest for a career in country music.

Dwight's support and opinions were extremely important to Keith as he progressed in his career. Dwight had been, and always would be, Keith's mentor. He would often call Dwight to discuss each new threshold he was about to cross in his career, or to let him listen to a new song he was going to record. Keith expressed to Dwight on several occasions the wish that the two of them could record something together. Due to the untimely death of Keith, this never happened. Randy also died in the prime of his life leaving Dwight as the only surviving Whitley brother.

It is truly ironic that the feeling of love and family loyalty that initially prevented Dwight from pursuing a career in music, are the same feelings that moved him to record the Neon Records album "Brotherly Love." It is a tribute to the musical legacy of Keith, dedicated to Keith and Randy, and brothers everywhere. He said, "I am appreciative of Keith's fans and their loyalty and support over the years, to our family, has meant a lot. I am now able to pay a debt to them, for him, as he's not here today."

At the time Dwight decided to do this album, he discovered a number of songs Keith had written, or co-written, but had never been recorded. "I wanted these songs on the album so the fans would have a chance to hear them, as they were written from the heart, and they meant a lot to Keith," commented Dwight. Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, Director

Now is the time to review your farming operation to insure that you are following the requirements of the conservation farm plan you signed

up for at your local Natural Resources Conservation Service office. Status reviews (farm checks) will be conducted this coming spring to insure

that landowners are following the four basic requirements of their plan. These requirements are: waterways to be left in soil during plowing and planting, cover crops to be sown in the fall of the year and/or residue left on soil surface to protect soil over winter months, sod based crop rotations, and contour or across the slope

planting and plowing. Landowners who are not following the 4 basic requirements of their conservation farm plan could lose tobacco price supports and be determined ineligible for other government programs and/or benefits.

The Mt. Vernon Signal Thursday, September 18, 1997 P-C5 Producers who participate in AMTA will be receiving their final payments this month. Final payments are scheduled to be mailed no later than the end of the fiscal year, which is September 30. Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign-up #16 is scheduled for

October 15 - November 15. Sign-up #16 concentrates on environmentally sensitive acreage for new 10 to 15 year contracts to cost-effectively enroll acreage for program years 1998 and 1999. The announcement of the sign-up period will be in the local newspaper and broadcast on FSA's weekly radio program on WRVK Radio.

Legislation has been passed which requires that all NEW recipients of Federal payments made after 07-25-96, be made by electronic funds transfer (EFT). The law further states that ALL payments made after 01-01-99, be made EFT. We encourage you to sign up for direct deposit now. Payments may now be accepted at

the FSA Office for Rockcastle producers who have farm loans with Ag Credit (formerly Farmers Home).

The lease and transfer of burley tobacco quota due to a disaster is authorized according to FSA regulations. County offices shall require, as a condition for approving a disaster

lease and transfer, that the lessor file an FSA-578 (crop report) and an FSA-574 (Application for Disaster Credit) immediately upon the determination by the producer that production has been reduced by more than 20% in all harvests and BEFORE THE CROP IS HARVESTED.

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county we urge any and all producers who have not received a voting petition in the past election (DEC 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age if the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes

reservation land owners for Native Americans, spouses of eligible producers in community property states and spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper. REMEMBER: If you want to vote in the upcoming election - YOUR NAME MUST BE ON THE VOTING LIST AS AN ELIGIBLE VOTER. NOW is the time to contact your local FFA Office for voting eligibility.

Burton attends annual conference

Jennifer Burton, Court Designated Worker for the 28th Judicial District made up of Rockcastle and Pulaski

Counties, attended the 1997 state-wide CDW conference held in Lexington, August 25-27.

Seminars and general group sessions at the conference focused on a variety of topics, including in-depth

discussions about juvenile diversion programs, as well as a review of the resources available for use in diversion, such as educational programs, community service opportunities and counseling services. Sessions were also dedicated to reviewing case management procedures of CDW's.

Speakers at the conference included representatives from Morehead State University, the Kentucky Department of the Blind, Kentucky Deaf and Hard of Hearing Commission; and staff from the AOC. Nana Yan Asantewa, an artist and consultant from Louisville, also presented a motivational program.

The conference closed with an awards ceremony. CDW's from across the state were recognized for their efforts during the past year. Burton received an award for her efforts as a ten-year Court Designated Worker.

The CDW program is administered through the AOC Office of Juvenile Services. Through the program, juveniles are given alternatives to juvenile court. Diversion agreements can be negotiated between non-violent juvenile offenders and their local

CDW's. If the terms of these agreements are followed, no court case will be filed against the juvenile. This helps juveniles involved in minor offenses avoid having an official court record, while reducing the case load of the court. More serious offenses and repeat offenders are, however, referred to formal court.

CDW's are available in all 120 counties, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

 Make a beautiful pastoral scene.

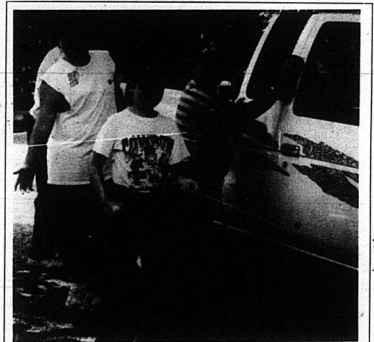
Sparkling white board fences

5. The 4-H's name, age, FULL address, county, area, teacher, school and grade MUST be affixed to the back of the poster board in the upper left hand corner.

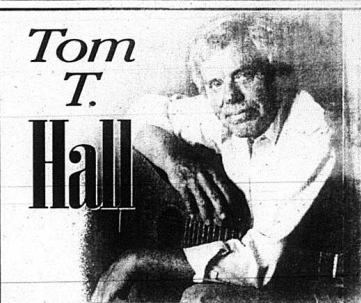

LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

In 1992, the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education approved 702 KAR 1:001, which provides for the development of a written plan by the local school district describing both the school facilities and construction needs of the district. The regulation requires the local school district assume responsibility for development of a Local District Facility Plan. This process requires the selection of a Local Planning Committee to develop a Master Education Facility Plan and District Facility Plan for capital construction.

The Master Educational Facility Plan contains an assessment of various facets of the school district's attributes and operations including the district profile, educational program, demographic information, facility conditions, transportation information and finances. This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequent to the Master Educational Facility Plan.

The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1998. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school office and the School Facilities Construction Commission.

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee will be placed in a very strategic and important role as relates to the school district and community. The committee will need to begin meeting to complete the facility planning process. Therefore, each committee member should allow for some time consumption in order to prepare a document, as required, to make recommendations to the local board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is in the process of acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the district committee shall consist of 4 Parents, 4 Teachers, 4 School Building Administrators, 1 Central Office Administrator, 1 Board Member, 2 Community/Business Leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also, the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4 SDBM Councils.

Board hears complaint over bus route

A Rockcastle County grandparent told the Rockcastle County Board of Education last week that he thought their bus policy was unfair.

Clyde Payne, and his son Scott, attended the regular meeting of the school board to ask the board to change a bus route policy that does not allow a bus to travel less than one half a mile on a spur route to pick up children.

Payne said that his grandson, who is attending kindergarten, is picked up by a small bus for his afternoon session at his home, but the big bus, which brings him home after school, will not bring him to the driveway of Payne's home.

Payne said a bus used to travel along Clifford Marker Road and pick up his own children when they were in school and he could not understand why it would not drop his grandson off now. Payne said the bus would have to travel only 2 of a mile to drop off the kindergarten.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond and transportation director David Perkins told Payne that a bus route policy, which has been in place for several years, did not allow for a bus to travel on a route if the route has been idle for a year and is less than a half mile.

The Superintendent told Payne that he was even in favor of changing that policy to a mile in the future.

But, Payne said that he knew of several buses that traveled less than a half mile to pick up students and it did not seem fair to him that his grandson could not be dropped off.

He said that his wife would not be able to pick up the child at the bus every day and the days she couldn't the child simply would not attend school.

Board member Sherry Isaacs told Payne that her son suffered from a weak muscle disease and it was hard for him to walk down their driveway, which is farther than .2 of a mile but he did so every day.

Board vice-chairman Terry Burton told Payne that he would like to see every child picked up at the door, but it wasn't feasible.

Burton also told Payne the board would review their policy, but it was highly unlikely it would be changed.

The length of the closure will be determined by how quickly the work proceeds. Hiking trails in the area will remain open but will not be accessible from the campground.

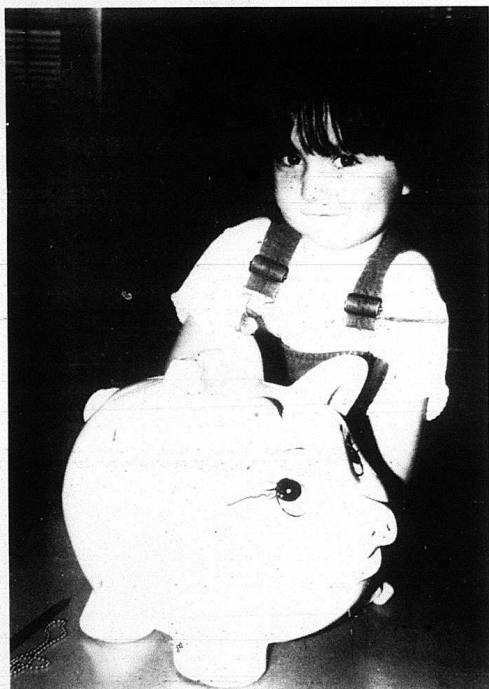

Sam comes from a long line of negative thinkers. As we talked more, he remembered things his grandfather said that also sounded very negative.

"Are you saying that if I start thinking positively, my luck will change?" Sam wanted to know. "I don't think luck has anything to do with it, Sam," I answered. "I think you have been making your own bad luck."

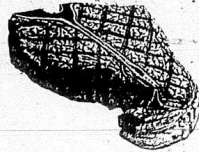

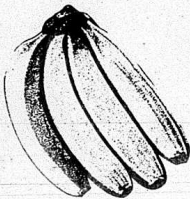
