From the desk of State Rep. Danny Ford

A Showcase for Kentucky Agri-culture was the subtitle used by UK President Charles Wethington as he presented plans recently for the Uni-versity of Kentucky Animad Science Research Center. The sight is the 1.450 acre Pin Oak Farm in Versailles and is slated to become an oustand-ing advanced research facility. Wethington and Oran Little, Dean of the College of Agriculture, were ad-dressing Legislative members of the Agricultural and Natural Resources Committee, showing plans of a final-layout and architects renderings of what the total facility will ultimately be.

Ranked sixth in the nation as an agricultural research school and sec-ond in plant sciences for the number of transplantation crops, the new fa-cility means a great deal to the future advancement of the agriculture pro-gram for UK. The research results are most important for Kentucky's farmers. Purchase of the Pin Ock Farm was authorized by the General Assembly in 1988 when the Cold Stream Farm in Fayette County was designated for other research. As part of the Ag 2000 plan, the 1996 General Assembly authorized funding for phase one of construction at the center, which will include com-plexes for swince, sheep and beef. nd in plant sciences for the numb

plexes for swine, sheep and beef. Exciting research capabilities include recirculation of rain water: composting and liquid manure facili-ties for self-contained waste treatment and recycling; growing and fin-ishing complexes; and the capacity to grow and utilize experimental grasses.

Ultimately, the facility will in-clude twenty barn like structures and a total of 120,000 square feet en-closed space. Units to be added in future phases will include complexes

More serious offenses and repeat offenders are, however, referred to formal court.

CDW's are available in all 120 counties, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequent to the Master Educational Facility Plan.

The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1998. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school office and the School Facilities Construction Commission.

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee willb e placed in a very strategi important role as relates to the school district and community. The committee will need to begin meeting to assimilate all the district's data as the regulation requires, or it may request a waver of the requirement to complete the facility planning process. Therefore, each committee member should allow for some time consumption in order to prepare a document, as required, to make recommendations to the local board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is in the process of acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the above committee shall consist of a Parents, 4 Teachers, 4 School Building Administrator, 5 Pectral Office. Administrator, 1 Board Member, 2 Community/Business Leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4
