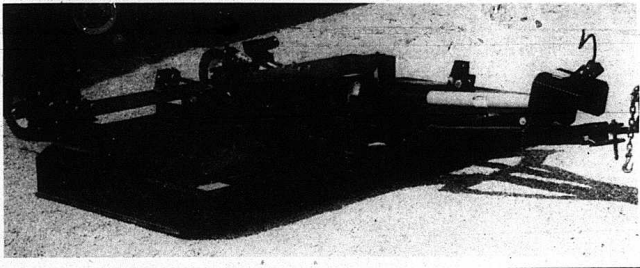

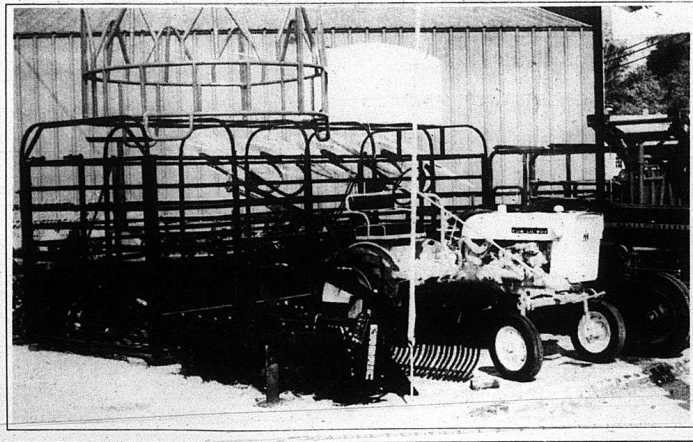

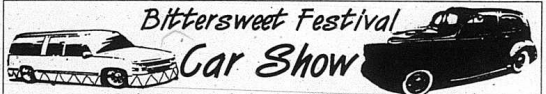

Court passes first hurdle to save \$40,000

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court held a couple of public hearings last Friday but no one showed except members of the court.

The special meeting included several items of business but the two main items were an Annex Bond Refinancing Hearing and a Jail Construction Financing Hearing.

The Annex Bond Refinancing Hearing was the first step in the court's attempt to not be liable for \$40,000 a year for 14 years in partial repayment of the Circuit Court annex debt.

The process involves a lot of "ifs," according to County Judge/Executive Buzz Carltoftis. The first "if" was passed Friday when the bond issue was approved locally. The second is a state hearing on September 29th in (Cont. to A11)

Mt. Vernon man indicted for selling marijuana

A Mt. Vernon man will be arraigned on Friday, after being indicted for selling marijuana to a seventeen-year-old boy on June 13.

Jason K. Vanzant, 21, of Old 25, was also indicted as a second degree persistent felony offender. According to court records, he was convicted in 1996 of third degree burglary.

Chris Bradley, 19, of Rt. 1 Brodhead was indicted for entering the home of Bill Hammons in June and stealing seven firearms. Bradley will also be arraigned on Friday.

Another Brodhead man, who intentionally gave police his brother's name when he was arrested last November, will appear in court on October 10.

Larry D. Woodall, 34, of Union Chapel Road, was arrested on November 16th of last year by Kentucky State Trooper Millard Root.

But, according to court records, Woodall gave Root the name of his brother Michael Woodall.

Besides giving false information, Woodall was charged with driving a motor vehicle under the influence, fourth offense. Woodall had been convicted of the same offense in Pulaski, Laurel and Rockcastle County.

Statistics say...

Many county residents living in poverty and are uneducated

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court got some very disturbing news Friday about the condition of families living in Rockcastle County.

According to information from the U.S. Census and the Kentucky State Data Center, only 44.9% of Rockcastle residents have a high school education and only 5.8% are college graduates.

The state average of Kentucky residents with high school diplomas is 64% and the national average is 75%. 20% of U.S. residents have college educations.

But the most disturbing statistics concerned families and their quality of life.

According to the report, 27% of all Rockcastle County families live in poverty. More startling is the fact that 41.9% of all Rockcastle County families with children under the age of 5 live in poverty.

The state average for families in poverty with children under 5 is 25.8% and the percentage in the U.S. of extremely poor people with children under 5 in the household is 38.3%.

16% of Kentucky families without children under five are considered poor and the average across the nation is 10%.

In an eleven county target area, that includes, Adair, Casey, Clinton, Cumberland, Laurel, Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell and Wayne, only Clinton, Cumberland, McCreary and Wayne have higher poverty levels.

The information was supplied to the court by Somerset Community College, which is applying for federal funding for an Educational Opportunity Center for the 11 county area.

The center will have the ultimate goal of increasing the number of adults who enroll in postsecondary education institutions.

The court agreed to a letter of commitment, which includes the appointment of Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carltoftis or another county resident to serve on the EOC Advisory Council. The court also agreed to locate and provide space in the county where EOC counselors can meet to work with Rockcastle residents and the court will promote interaction of other programs and services with the EOC and keep the EOC staff informed about emerging needs and conditions in the county.

Judge Carltoftis said the center and their services were definitely needed in the county. "With the recent cuts in state services to the low income, education is more important than ever," the Judge said.

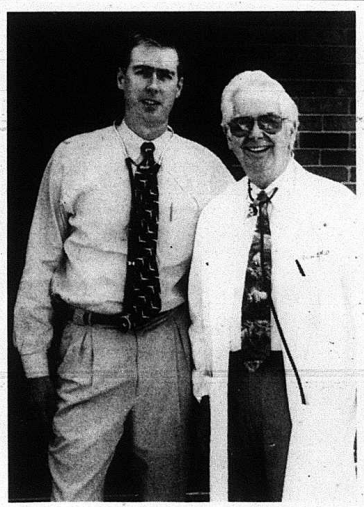
"I am looking forward to seeing patients," said Dr. Tony Arvin. "It is always nice to come home and work among family and friends. This will be the best of both worlds."

OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer found in women, striking one in every eight females. But, with early detection, the survival rate for breast cancer is more than 90 percent.

No one is sure what causes breast cancer. However, there is evidence that the presence of certain factors greatly increase your chances of developing breast cancer. If an immediate family member, such as a parent or sibling, has been diagnosed with breast cancer, you are at higher risk to develop the disease. Also, women who have their first child after the age of 30, begin their menstrual cycle before the age of 12, or complete menopause after the age of 55 are at risk as well.

"While there are no known preventive measures to ward off breast cancer, there are several methods for early detection that dramatically increase your chance for survival," said Janice Mullins, a mammographer at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "A physical examination, mammogram and self exams all are key elements to early detection."

Mullins suggests that self examinations should be practiced monthly. While in the

shower or when getting dressed, move your hand in a circular motion around your breast to determine if you have any unusual lumps.

"If you are unsure of how to do a self examination, ask your doctor for instructions during your regular checkup," said Mullins.

The most effective means for detecting breast cancer appears to be mammography. A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast that can assist physicians in detecting any suspect lumps that may be cancerous. During a mammogram, two X-rays are taken of each breast—one from above and one from the side.

"Due to advances in technology, there are virtually no risks associated with having a mammogram," Mullins said. "In fact, there is a much greater risk if you ignore your health and choose not to have one."

There is some disagreement among medical professionals regarding how often women should get mammograms. The American

Cancer Society recommends women age 40-49 should have a routine screening every one to two years, with those over the age of 50 getting an annual screening.

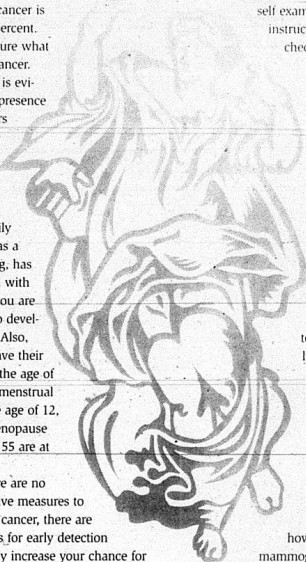
"A mammogram is so important in early detection because it can usually find a cancerous growth up to two years before it can

HOW TO BE PREPARED FOR YOUR MAMMOGRAM

- Wear a two-piece outfit so you will only have to remove your top.
- Don't use deodorant, talcum powder, or lotion under your arms. These can be detected on an X-ray.
- Bring any information you have on past mammogram screenings, including the date of your last exam.
- If you're concerned about discomfort, take an over-the-counter pain reliever about an hour before the mammogram.
- Ask questions. It is important that you understand the facts.

be found through other methods," Mullins said.

"Consult with your physician if you are unsure when you should begin having a mammography," Mullins said. "Take just a few minutes to find out the facts because it could save your life."

FOOD MYTHS

Today, people have access to more information than they ever have before. The Internet, the media and improved scientific research all contribute to Americans having a greater understanding about many issues, including their health.

But, according to Jill Stevens, a dietitian at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, many people still have misconceptions about issues regarding nutrition.

"Despite the advances in nutritional science, many myths still exist," Stevens said.

For example, Stevens said many people mistakenly believe that if they use liquid oil, such as vegetable oil or canola oil instead of a solid shortening, they need not limit the amounts they use. That simply is not true.

"While liquid oils are lower in saturated fats than butter or shortening, they are still not necessarily healthy," Stevens said. "One teaspoon of liquid oil has the same amount of calories as one teaspoon of solid shortening, butter, margarine or mayonnaise. All are calorically dense and contain 40-45 calories in only one teaspoon."

Another food myth may have been perpetuated by a cartoon character.

"Often, people mistakenly believe that spinach is a good source of iron," Stevens said. "While it indeed contains lots of iron, it also contains a great deal of oxalic acid. The acid attaches itself to the iron in the spinach, breaking it down so that only about two to five percent of iron is actually absorbed by the body."

To gain the daily recommended dose of iron, Stevens suggests eating good sources of iron such as lean beef three times weekly. She also suggests that iron enriched breads and cereals are good sources.



"When learning about proper nutrition, it is best to check your information with a registered dietitian," Stevens said. "If that is not an option, make sure you verify your information with more than one resource. That way, you can feel confident that your information is accurate."

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Rock beats Dayton

The Rockcastle County Rockets traveled to Northern Kentucky Friday night and beat a good Dayton team, bad.

The Rockets upped their record to 3 and 1 with a 42-12 win over a highly regarded undefeated team.

The Rockets scored in several different ways, including a punt return and a 70 yard pass.

Rockets head coach Tom Larkey credited his offensive line, saying they played the best game they have played all season long.

John LaFavers, Josh Martin, Kevin Bradley, Daniel Forbes, Gary Coffey and Josh Jones did an out-

standing job controlling the line of scrimmage," Larkey said.

"These young men are getting better as a unit every game and so far have been able to stay relatively healthy," Larkey said.

Larkey also said the fact that his offense has been able to mix in the pass with the run has helped open up the field somewhat.

And indeed the Rockets have thrown quite a bit more than they did a year ago, when they had two of the best backs in the region. For all of 1996, the Rockets put the ball in the air only 36 times.

Through four games this season, QBs Chris Bishop and Christopher

Parsons have launched the ball 34 times for 357 yards. Bishop has also thrown five touchdown passes and Nathan DeLeon has completed one for a score on a halfback pass.

Friday night, halfback Andrew Carter topped in his best performance of his career. The junior carried the ball just nine times, gaining 114 yards. He also caught one pass for thirty five yards for a total offensive output of 149 yards. Carter also scored three touchdowns and one extra point.

Bishop, who performs consistently each week for the Rockets, did so again on Friday when he rushed for 52 yards on seven carries, while completing five of six passes for another 155 yards. The senior also tossed two touchdown passes and one extra point conversion. All total Bishop was part of 207 yards of offense and 14 points.

Senior Darryl McClure rushed for 20 yards on six carries and hauled in a 70 yard touchdown pass on his only catch of the night.

Junior Andy Hale had 25 yards on seven carries, caught one pass for 11 yards and scored a touchdown on a punt return.

Tailback Brooks Ingram had 31 yards on six carries and scored one extra point conversion.

Nathan DeLeon caught two passes for 39 yards, one of which was for a touchdown.

Some young players saw action Friday night, including Josh Hendrickson who scored two point conversion on his only carry. Jeff Linville had two yards on a carry and Josh Singleton also had two yards on a carry. Freshman QB Christopher Parsons attempted one pass, which was incomplete.

A bright spot for Rockets this season has been their punting game. Junior Henry Bryant is averaging just under 40 yards a kick and on Friday night he booted two for a combined 65 yards.

The Rockets defense was led by cornerback Andy Hale, who had eleven tackles and assists, a quarterback sack and an interception.

Senior noseguard John LaFavers had a great defensive game with eight tackles and assists, a quarterback sack and a fumble recovery.

Andrew Carter had six tackles and assists, Brooks Ingram had five, Nathan DeLeon had 4, Chris Bishop, 3 and Josh Hendrickson, 3.

Cliff Matkovich, Kevin Bradley and Josh Martin, each added two tackles and assists, while Gary Coffey, Bobby Cundiff, Dusty McClure, Henry Bryant, Steven Carrera and Travis Ingram each had a tackle.

McClure picked off a Dayton pass and Brooks Ingram and Henry Bryant each had a quarterback sack.

Defensive coordinator Torly Saylor said he was real pleased with his defense's play over the past three weeks. "We gave up only 120 yards on the ground and one of those was a 69 yarder, so I can live with that," he said. "Our pass defense was excellent Friday night with good coverage and especially good pressure from our line and linebackers," Saylor said.

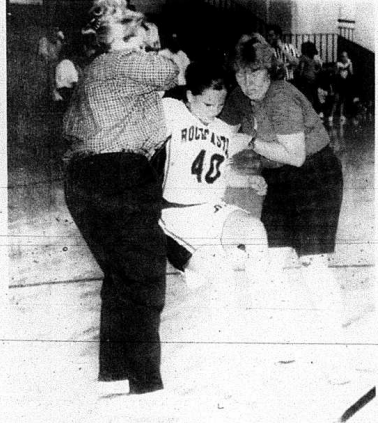

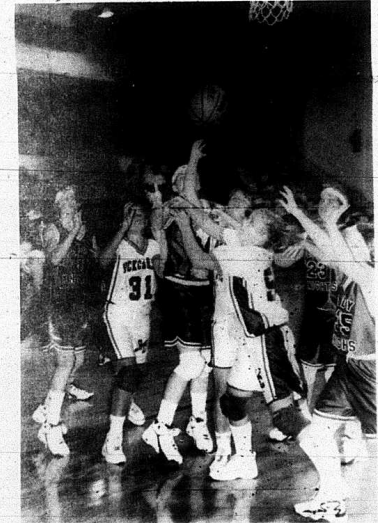

LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

In 1992, the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education approved 702 KAR 1:001 which provides for the development and adoption of a written plan by the local school district describing both the school facilities and construction needs of the district. The regulation requires the local school district assume responsibility for development of a Local District Facility Plan. This process requires the selection of a Local Planning Committee to develop a Master Educational Facility Plan and District Facility Plan for capital construction.

The Master Educational Facility Plan contains an assessment of various facets of the school district's attributes and operations, including the district profile, educational program, demographic information, facility conditions, transportation information and finances. This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequent to the Master Educational Facility Plan.

The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1998. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school office and the School Facilities Construction Commission.

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee will be placed in a very strategic and important role as relates to the school district and community. The committee will need to begin meeting to assimilate all the district's data as the regulation requires, or it may request a waiver of the requirement to complete the facility planning process. Therefore, each committee member should allow for some time consumption in order to prepare a document, as required, to make recommendations to the local board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is in the process of acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the district committee shall consist of 4 Parents, 4 Teachers, 4 School Building Administrators, 1 Central Office Administrator, 1 Board Member, 2 Community/Business Leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also, the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4 SBDM Councils.

There Are Warning Signs of Marital Problems

Unfortunately many couples get to the marriage counselor too late. They visit a counselor as a "last resort" when everything else has failed. Even the best counselor and the most dedicated spouses cannot save some marriages; it is simply too late.

Getting help early is the key. Many marriages could be saved if couples sought help at the first, second or even third sign of problems.

What keeps couples from seeking help? Most people do not want to see the problems in their marriages. The husband may ignore warning signs because the problems are painful, therefore he chooses not to see them at all. Also the desire for privacy may outweigh the desire for help. "We don't want the neighbors to know we are having problems," the couple may say.

Seeing the warning signs of trouble early enough may save the marriage. Here are some of the indications that a marriage may be in trouble.

1. The couple spends little time together. They no longer have one night a week's "date night." Excuses abound ("we're too busy since we had kids"), but the bottom line is that they don't get any "couple time."

2. One spouse begins spending more time away from home than usual. This may involve working late, playing softball, shopping with friends, etc. Slaying away is one way to avoid dealing with the problems.

3. Addictions continue or increase. A social drinker may begin to get drunk on weekends or someone who has never drunk before may start hav-

ing a few drinks "just to relax." This is especially significant if there is a history of alcohol abuse in the family. Other addictions such as work or television may be indicators of trouble.

4. When one spouse asks, "What's wrong?" and the other answers, "Nothing," this is a sign that the lines of communication are crumbling. If the problems can't be talked about, then they won't be solved.

5. When the tension in the household is so strong that it can be "cut with a knife," there are problems that are not being addressed. Children's behavior can be an indicator of household tension. As tension increases, they begin to push for more attention. This adds another burden on the parents who are already emotionally overloaded.

6. Arguments begin over "little things." Who's going to take out the garbage becomes a major issue. That someone was fifteen minutes late is almost the beginning of World War III.

7. Physical or verbal abuse begins or continues. When one spouse beats the other or when one spouse pushes, pulls, shoves, hits, grabs or kicks the other, the marriage is in trouble.

8. One spouse has to be "right" all the time. Being right becomes more important to him than being married.

Even in counseling, this person may try to get the counselor to side with him against his wife. Being right, however, doesn't guarantee the marriage will work. Thus the counselor often asks, "Would you rather be

A caring Father is Important for Adolescents

While Americans celebrate fathers once a year on Father's Day, many take them for granted the rest of the year.

Results clearly demonstrate that the presence of a caring father is associated with a young person's overall well-being.

Those in the low care group are one and a half times more likely to drink beer, wine and hard liquor and one and a half times more likely to have drunk 5 or more alcoholic drinks at one time during the past month.

In addition, teens who do report high father care are two and a half times more likely to report that they will probably drop out before completing high school, two and a half times more likely to say that they have felt depressed or sad most of all of the time during the past month, five and a half times more likely to report having thought about killing themselves most or all of the time during the past month and three times as likely to have actually tried to kill themselves.

The differences are very similar both for boys and girls and for middle school and high school students.

While we assume that male role models are particularly important for adolescent boys and seem to think that children need less attention as they get older, the presence of a caring father appears to be just as significant for daughters as for sons and for older as for younger adolescents.

In order to determine if the mere presence of a father in the house contributes to adolescent well-being, the study compared young people living with single mothers with the two groups living with both biological parents.

While teens living with single mothers score worse on every measure of well-being and risk behavior than teens from two-parent families in the high father care group, they score better on virtually every indicator than teens in the two-parent low father care group.

Similar patterns were found for teens living with their mother and a stepfather. Teens living with a single mother generally fare worse than teens with a high care stepfather and better than teens with a low care stepfather.

It appears that fathers don't contribute to adolescent well-being by simply being in the home. They also have to demonstrate a high level of care for their adolescent children.

The good news from this study is that most adolescents feel that their fathers demonstrate that level of care. 82% of those living with both biological parents feel that their father cares for them all the time while 61% of those living with their mother and a stepfather feel that way about their stepfather.

Having good talks about heavy subjects doesn't totally explain whether an adolescent views his or her father as caring, however. Simply being around and showing an interest in what's going on in a teen's life is one of the best ways for a father to show that he cares.

They cleared off the forests. With Kentucky rifles close at hand. For the brave Indian warriors. Were disputing ownership of the land.

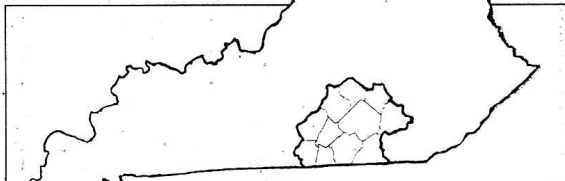
For safety they lived in or near forts. And on a second's notice would fight. With flintlock rifles and sharpened knives.

Frankfort when the state must give its approval to the issue. Then the AOC will have to agree and then the bonds will be sold for a low enough interest rate to make the plan feasible. "If every thing falls in line, the county will not have to come up with the \$40,000 a

year from their general fund. The Jail Construction Financing Hearing involves "lease" money through a program of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District. Court secretary Anna Rose Mullins said the money would be used to pay off the remainder owed on Phase I of the construction project and pay for

Phases 2 and 3 to complete the renovations. Mrs. Mullins said the \$80,000 leased would be repaid on an annually scheduled over several years and would give the jail the potential to operate in the black. The biggest result of the renovation would be the ability to house state prisoners in a wing to be built on the north side of the courthouse. Judge Carlotis said Friday that the state had assured him that they would furnish state prisoners at a rate of \$23.50 a day to fill up 40-44 beds.

In other business during the special meeting, the court transferred \$5,000 from the county road fund and \$13,000 from LGEAF to the general fund which will be transferred back when funds are available.

It paid a \$1,650 claim for the library roof to Joe Overbay for one-half completion of the project.

It approved the purchase of a new safe for the sheriff's office at a cost of \$1,250.

It accepted the sheriff's 1997 tax settlement and issued a quitus; it transferred \$15,350 to the Rockcastle Ambulance Service from a grant to the service for purchase of equipment for emergency medical services.

"It is Written"

When our Lord was crucified at Calvary, two thieves were also crucified with him, one on his right, and on his left. Matt 27:38. Both of them railed on him. Matthew 27:44. But later one repented, as we read in Luke 23:43. *And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on him, saying, If thou be Christ, save thyself and us. But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Do not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? And we indeed justly, for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but thou hast done nothing amiss. And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, To day shalt thou be with me in paradise.* Thus this man feared God, believed in Christ and his kingdom and repented, as we see from what has been stated and necessarily implied from the text.

Now many people cite this case to prove that one does not have to be baptized to be saved. Let me make two observations. #1. How do you know he was not baptized sometime earlier in his life? #2. In Hebrews 9:15:17 we read, *And for this cause he is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance. For where a testament is, there must also of necessity be the death of the testator. For a testament is in force after men are dead; otherwise it is of no strength at all while the testator liveth.* The writer points out to us that a testament or a person's will, is not in effect till the death of the testator. The thief was given salvation before the commands of the Great Commission were given, read Matt 28:18-20, Mk 16:14-16, Lk 24:46-48. Jesus said in these texts, that those who believe in the death, burial and resurrection, who repent, and are baptized shall be saved. Our Lord places baptism as a condition of salvation, just like repentance and faith are conditions of salvation. The thief on the cross did not live when Jesus gave the Great Commission after his death, but we do! So we better follow what Jesus said for us to do, in order to be saved, and not leaned upon vain reasoning to deliver us. Revelation 22:14, *"Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city."*

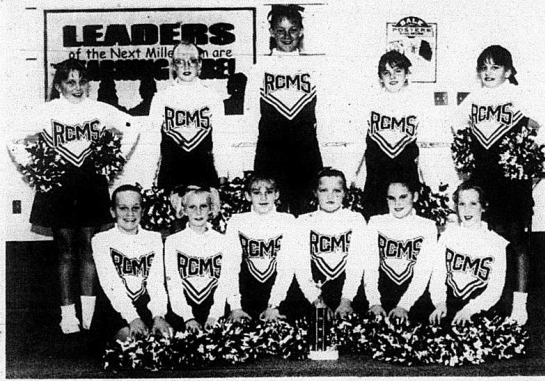

Two New Programs at RCMS Promote Youth Leadership

This year the high school will be working with Forward in the Fifth and Berea College through the School-to-Work program to teach students leadership skills. Twenty-five students are being selected by teachers, counselors and other students to participate this year. Students will work after school on Thursdays in the areas of leadership and entrepreneurship. The program will begin on Thursday, October 2nd with a curriculum called "Quest". They will be given start-up capital to begin a business, investment capital for the stock market, attend conferences, and develop a business plan. This will be a pilot year with hopes to increase the number of students involved each year.

One of their duties will be to serve on local "boards" such as the Fiscal Court, School Board, or others. They will have a "mentor" that will work with them and guide them through the problem solving process on these boards. They will also attend a regional conference in the spring to be held in Ashland. They will be asked to share some of their findings. The nine students selected are: Freshman, Jeremiah Myers and Brittany Owens; sopho-

mores, Luke McKibben and Abram Taylor; juniors, Josh Chaffin and Craig Sowder and seniors, Kelly Lane, Dana Mason and Jamie Owens.

Local Resident Member of EKU Marching Band

Lisa Midkiff of Mt. Vernon, is a member of the 1997 Eastern Kentucky University Marching Colonels.

Under the direction of Christopher Hayes, the Marching Colonels will perform this season at five home football games and at the Madison Central Tournament of Bands. In addition, a selected group will travel to Boone, North Carolina, to play at the EKU-Appalachian State football game.

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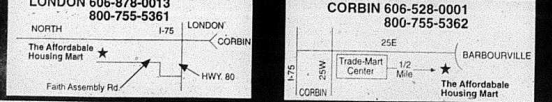

THE ROCKCASTLE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION IS ACCEPTING NOMINATIONS FROM THE GENERAL PUBLIC FOR COMMUNITY/BUSINESS LEADERS TO BE SELECTED BY THE BOARD TO SERVE ON THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE FOR SCHOOL FACILITIES.

LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

In 1992, the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education approved 702 KAR 1:001 which provides for the development and adoption of a written plan by the local school district describing both the school facilities and construction needs of the district. The regulation requires the local school district assume responsibility for development of a Local District Facility Plan. This process requires the selection of a Local Planning Committee to develop a Master Education Facility Plan and District Facility Plan for capital construction.

The Master Educational Facility Plan contains an assessment of various facets of the school district's attributes and operations including the district profile, educational program, demographic information, facility conditions, transportation information and finances. This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequent to the Master Educational Facility Plan.

The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1998. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school office and the School Facilities Construction Commission.

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee will be placed in a very strategic and important role as related to the school district and community. The committee will need to begin meeting to assimilate all the district's data as the regulation requires, or it may request a waiver of the requirement to complete the facility planning process. Therefore, each committee member should allow for some time consumption in order to prepare a document, as required, to make recommendations to the local board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is in the process of acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the district committee shall consist of 4 Parents, 4 Teachers, 4 School Building Administrators, 1 Central Office Administrator, 1 Board Member, 2 Community/Business Leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also, the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4 SBDM Councils.
