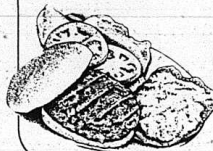

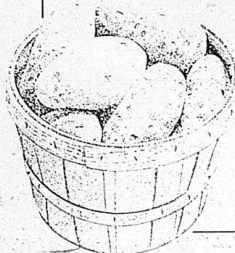

Men Can Ruin A Marriage
Men, if you have been looking for ways to ruin your marriage, your search has ended. Here are some things you can do to guarantee that you will soon be single.

-Don't listen to your wife. Most of her opinions are wrong anyway. There's nothing you can learn from her.

-Spend nearly every day or night out with the guys. It doesn't matter if you fish or golf or play softball, just as long as you are out of the house and away from her.

-Leave 95% of the parenting to her. Raising kids is, after all, woman's work. They instinctively know how to change diapers and feed babies. Doing those chores makes us men look like wimps.

-For your 5% of parenting, correct your wife when she does something wrong. This is best done in front of a crowd (such as your parents or her family). Being publicly humiliated guarantees that she will remember the important lesson you have taught her.

-Threaten her. She will stay in line better if she is afraid of you. You can threaten her physically or in some more subtle way, such as threatening to leave or to commit suicide if she leaves.

-Forbid her to go out with the

"girls". Though it is important for you to go out with the "boys," she does not need similar time away. When she is out with friends, you cannot control what she does, so keep her close at hand.

-Limit the number of contacts she has with her family. Gripe, complain, moan or whatever it takes. Make seeing her family so much of a hassle that she will eventually quit seeing them.

-Do not hesitate to use force if the occasion arises. If she disobeys an order you have given her, grab, push, shove, hit or kick her to make sure she pays attention next time. (I hope, dear reader, that you have caught on to the tongue-in-cheek nature of this column.)

-Try emotional abuse. Telling her she is stupid, fat, ugly, a lousy mother and a failure will make her feel so bad about herself that she will be afraid to leave you.

-DO NOT LET HER GET A JOB OR GO TO SCHOOL. This is very important. If she gets a job or goes to school, she may begin to drift away from you. Don't take that chance.

Women Can Rid Themselves of Husbands

Women, do you want to get rid of that man in your house? Looking for ways to send him packing? Well, here is the help you have been seeking: How to ruin your marriage and run off your husband.

1. Gripe and complain—about anything and everything.

2. Criticize him. No matter what he does nor how well he does it, find something wrong. Criticizing him in public is even more effective.

3. Accuse him. Almost anything will do here. Accuse him of an affair, of gambling, of loving his work more than his family. The point is to keep him always on the defensive.

4. Be critical of his friends. It doesn't matter if he runs around with Sunday School teachers, find something to criticize about them. Also complain because he spends too much time with them and not enough time with you.

5. Try to change him. This is a very crucial part of any plan to get rid of him. Find something about him that you don't like and nag him about it. (He drinks too much, try to change him. He's his alcohol, pour it down the drain, and holler at him when he

comes in drunk. Or nag him about how much he works and try to get him to change. Try to get him to spend more time with the kids. It doesn't matter what, just try to change him.

6. Set up problems with his family. Take any opportunity to slander them behind their backs: "Do you know what your mother said to me today?" Be cold to them when they come to visit. Refuse to take your children to spend time with them. Get in a fight with your sister-in-law. Before long you can have his entire family in arms against you.

7. Turn your children against their father. Get them on your side. Point out his faults (which may be very evident). Confide in them about your marital problems. Let them know that you are their friend and he is not.

9. Always put the children ahead of him. Refuse to get babysitters because you "don't want to leave the kids." When he plans something for the two of you to do, make sure you sabotage his plans. Finally he will get the point that his planning is useless and he will stop trying.

10. Criticize the way he does chores around the house, and when he stops doing them, criticize him for not helping.

There you are. Ten (almost) sure-fire ways to help bring your marriage to an end. If you don't want your marriage to end, you might want to go another route. Try a little tenderness.

5 week period between October 14 - November 14. This is the second CRP general sign-up since Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 amendments to the Food Security Act of 1985.

CRP is designed to improve America's natural resource base. Landowners enter into contracts with the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to enroll erodible and other environmentally sensitive land in contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, they receive annual rental payments and a payment for up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing approved practices. Under Sign-up 16, the CCC will continue to evaluate and rank all eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index based on the environmental benefits that would potentially accrue if the land were enrolled in the CRP. Maximum CRP payments will be determined based on county average dryland cash or cash rent equivalent rental rates adjusted for site-specific, soil-based productivity factors.

Rural Development will be changing their servicing dates for Rockcastle County. They will now be at the USDA Service Center on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month during the hours of 9:00 a.m. - 11:00

a.m. Rural Development makes housing loans for the former Farmers Home Administration. Their next scheduled servicing date is October 28.

For producers who may wish to disaster lease tobacco poundage later, the following are some of the requirements for the farms involved.

The transferring farm (lessor) should file a crop report and an FSA 574. Application for Disaster Credit prior to harvest or immediately after harvest. Request farm visit, and pay fee. The transferring farm's percent of production shall not be greater than 80% of effective quota to reflect a 20% loss. Producer must have planted enough acreage to equal the farm's effective quota. Producer must have other required paperwork on file (AD1026 and FSA 570) to reflect eligibility.

The receiving farm (lessee) should file a crop report and an FSA 574. Statement of Tobacco Production. Marketing sale bills and/or weigh tickets listing excess pounds shall be photocopied. Planted acres will be verified by county officer per aerial slide. The total estimated production must be within range of the farm effective quota. Farm production plus 1996 unmarketed tobacco minus the farm effective quota will equal the total pounds available for lease.

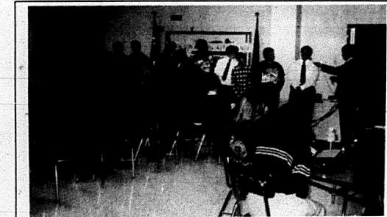

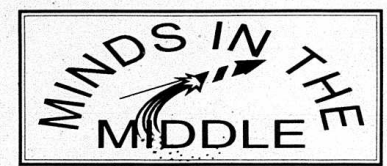

Must appear in Frankfort

State cites three over illegal dumping

The Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet has warned Kentuckians for some time now about the consequences of illegal garbage dumping.

And now at least three Rockcastle countians know just how serious.

On Wednesday, Lily Lawhorn of Valley View Apartments appeared

before a hearing officer in Frankfort to answer a complaint filed against her by the Cabinet for Natural Resources.

On November 10, Jack and Margaret McCormick of Pine Hill will appear in court to answer the same charges of illegal dumping.

Both parties could be fined \$5,000 a day for dumping their garbage illegally if found guilty, according to the

state.

Lawhorn is accused of dumping garbage in Spark's Quarry at Burr and the McCormicks are accused of dumping garbage in an illegal dump at Pine Hill.

Rockcastle County's Solid Waste Coordinator Nancy Meadows declined to comment on the particular

cases of Lawhorn and McCormick, because her office does not have anything to do with the state action, but said she was very pleased that the state was taking steps to correct such a terrible problem. She did say that the dump at Pine Hill had been cleaned up.

"It is about time, I'm glad we are

getting help, nothing makes me madder than to see garbage thrown all over the roadside," Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlifotis said.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette also said this week that he had written several criminal summons for people who had dumped

garbage illegally throughout the county.

"We have had a real problem with people from other counties, Lincoln, Jackson and Garrard to name a few, who dump in our county," Burdette said.

17 chosen for local planning committee

Seventeen Rockcastle countians will help decide the long range building needs for the Rockcastle County School system. The seventeen were selected at last week's Rockcastle County Board of Education meeting from 21 names submitted to the board. The group will also serve on the board's local planning committee.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said the committee will come up with a plan that eventually will be approved by the board and the state department.

The committee actually has two options. They can come up with a new facility plan or amend the one that is in place now.

The decision of which direction to go, and the choosing of a chairman, will be the first order of business for the committee.

The state allows school systems, with plans less than eight years old, to ask for a waiver that allows the committee to use the plan now in place. Rockcastle's head of buildings and grounds, Glen Vanwinkle said Tuesday that a state department official would be at the first meeting to explain all of the committee's option.

"There actually may be little need for any changes to the current plan which was adopted four years ago, but the committee will decide that," Hammond said.

Members of the committee are: Hammond, board chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith, Vanwinkle, Teresa Davis, Rebecca Cash, Pam Burdette, Virginia Miller, Gary Scott, Judy Bullock, Lisa Noe, Jason Coguer, Mark McKinney, Rosamond Brown, John Hale, Ronnie Cash, Gail Burdette and Earl C. Cummins.

The local planning committee recommended the closing of Livingston school.

In other business, the board heard from Middle School Principal John Hale, who presented the board with assessment results from the middle school.

Hale said that although he is not completely satisfied with recent CTBS test scores, the middle school is still rated above average and is fourth among area schools. He said that as far as the scores, "numbers tell various stories," and explained that all students at the middle school were tested, including special education students, and that all scores were included.

Hale said elementary schools may have an advantage in that they test exit level students, and in some cases choose not to test all students.

In response to a question about testing from board member Dwight Griffin, Hale said, "It is not my philosophy to teach a test," and stressed that the students need to be taught more than the core content to be successful individuals.

Hale agreed that often a narrow focus is driven by the results of the state's KRIS test which narrows the scope to be successful.

During the discussion, Hale told board members that the library and technology departments at the middle school were in need of expansion. Hale said that some shelves in the library were bare because of lack of materials.

He said that although he believes the middle school is doing a good job educating their students he and his staff will continue to try to do a better job.

Board member Griffin voiced concern at the last board meeting

Seal program benefits 101 students at Mt. Vernon

The official kick-off for the Seal Kentucky Program was held last week at Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

The school is the first to take part in the mobile dental care program, which is funded by the E.O. Robinson Trust. This trust provides funds to the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry to administer the program throughout 29 counties in the Robinson Forest.

101 second level primary students at MVES received the treatment from local dentists, Dr. John Parsons, Dr. Bill Reynolds and Dr. Jennifer Chadwell. Three U.K. dentists also participated.

Seal Kentucky brings together the talents of UK dental care professionals, and community dentists to apply dental sealants to the teeth of elementary school children. These plastic sealants are painted on the chewing surfaces of the back teeth in the form of white liquid. This substance then hardens, preventing decay from forming in the crevices and grooves of the teeth, where 80 to 90 percent of the dental caries (decay) occur.

Although fluoride treatment has been beneficial in reducing numbers of dental caries, the crevices of the teeth don't benefit from the protective effects of fluoride. Dental sealants, on the other hand, are targeted specifically to this area and have the potential to cause more dramatic reductions in the incidence of dental caries.

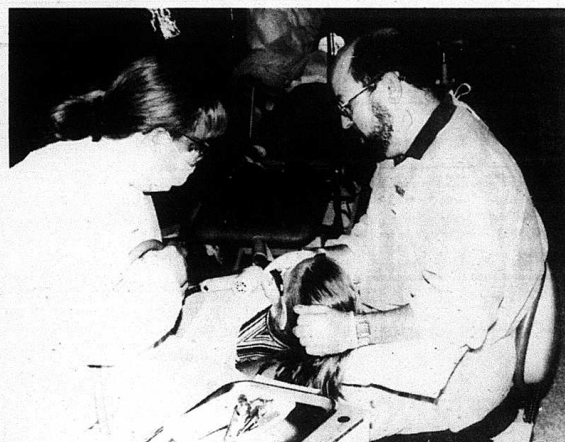
In 1989, less than 11 percent of American children had benefited from

the highly effective advantage of dental sealants. In Kentucky, in the 1987 Oral Health Survey, only 7.6 percent of the children in the sample had received at least one sealant. Lower

income children are only half as likely to have received sealants — a particular concern since these are the very children who are least likely to receive treatment when dental caries

occur.

As part of the Seal Kentucky Program, children also received dental screenings, oral health education and science demonstrations.

What I cannot abide, dear hearts, are singers who hardly ever *open* their eyes while singing. As in speaking, so in singing: if you lose eye contact with me, you lose me.

Now there are some singers who shut their eyes when they're experiencing "glory," which is best defined as the Spirit of God bearing down on the singer - and maybe the listeners. That may well be. I've felt the need to close my eyes when singing parts of certain songs, but *not throughout the entirety of the song*.

While I'm at it, I might as well fire one more salvo. You would have to be a preacher to fully understand this, but I'm sure you will get my drift. A-mercy! I recall a church that had a good choir, one member of which was an excellent soloist. But she went to the podium with her Bible marked with what seemed a hundred pieces of paper, ready to read the verses she would use in her five-to-ten minute, pre-song, mini-sermon. Not only was that absolutely not needed, it took away from my sermon time.

Singers out there in Church Land, let the song be your message, and leave the preaching to the preacher. And, please, dear singers - again I say, *please* - don't preface your song with "Listen to the words and not the music." If you're afraid you can't sing the song, don't sing! Did you ever stop to think how ridiculous that plea really is. It's impossible! Do it.

Oops! I must take leave of you, dearly beloved, and go affix the mulching blade to our riding mower so Nancy can do with our leaves what she pleases. They and their nutrients be returned to the earth from which they came - and not to a landfill.

Until next week, precious souls, give a word of meditation to the words of Philias T. State's top rated passer grounded

The state of Kentucky's leading passer in high school football came to the Rock on Friday night, something he probably wished he hadn't had to do.

The much heralded Stanley Neace, the state's leading passer at 309 yards per game was rushed, sacked, hurried, thrown down, deflected and eventually put out of the game.

Neace and his Estill County teammates were simply outmanned and outplayed by the Rockets who amassed 353 yards compared to the Engineer's 107.

The Rock also won their seventh game in a row, 41-12.

"We were a little flat when we came out, but our players responded well and simply dominated Estill

County on the line of scrimmage," Larkey said.

"We did a good job blocking for Brooks Ingram and Andrew Carrera," Larkey said. "Josh Jones, John LaFavers, Josh Martin, Gary Coffey, Kevin Bradley, Nathan DeLeon and Andy Hale just outplayed Estill County's line and it showed, because we had 259 yards rushing on just 49 carries," the coach said.

As for Stanley Neace's performance, or lack of, "We were ready for him. Our kids had watched a lot of film and prepared well. Our players did a great job disguising the blitz and our defensive backs had good coverage most of the time," defensive coordinator Tony Saylor said.

Ironically, Rocket quarterback Chris Bishop had more yards than Neace in the air. Bishop completed

six passes for 94 yards, compared to Neace's 90 yards on six completions. One of Bishop's completions was to Andy Hale for a touchdown.

That grab and run, down the left sideline, was the Play of the Night on WYMT-TV's football highlights.

The Hazard station was on hand at the Rock as part of their mountain coverage of high school football.

Beside's Hale's 45 yards of receptions, he also had 21 yards on the ground.

Carrera and Ingram combined for 173 yards on 30 carries. Ingram led the way with 94. Carrera had 79.

Junior Josh Hendrickson had 52 yards on the ground on just five carries and he also added five of six extra point kicks. Carrera and Ingram each rushed for two touchdowns while Hendrickson rushed for one.

Josh Singleton picked up four yards on two carries and Bishop had nine on the night.

Dusty McClure had two catches for 30 yards and DeLeon grabbed one ball for 19 yards.

The entire Rocket defensive squad played well and was led by linebacker Brooks Ingram, who had seven tackles and assists and a quarterback sack. Ingram also made it very difficult on Neace with some great blitzes up the middle.

Gary Coffey recovered two fumbles and Kevin Bradley recovered one.

Coffey had two tackles and a quarterback sack, while Bradley had five tackles. Nathan DeLeon had seven tackles and two sacks, one a crushing hit that caused Neace to fumble and Chris Bishop had eight tackles.

Andrew Carrera had one tackle, while John LaFavers picked up four and Bobby Cundiff had two. Cundiff also had a quarterback sack. Andy Hale had three tackles and a quarterback sack and Dusty McClure, Cliff Matekovich, Josh Hendrickson and Jeff Livville each picked up a tackle. McClure and Matekovich played extremely well in the secondary defending the pass.

The Rockets have their toughest test of the season on Friday night when the Briarjumper of Somerset come to town.

Somerset has a record of 5 and 3 but has played great as of late.

The Jumpers knocked off Corbin two weeks ago and, like the Rock, are

undefeated in district play.

Friday night's game at the Rock will be for the district championship.

The Rock has beaten Somerset six of the last seven years, losing only two in them in 1994 on a fluke pass at the end of the game.

If the Rock wins on Friday it will

be their fourth district title in seven years. They have finished second the other three years.

But winning will be no easy task for the Rockets.

"Somerset has a tremendous ball team, they have been compared by high school experts to the great teams

they had over there in the late 1980s," Coach Larkey said.

"They have a huge front line with great speed in the backfield and I am sure they will be ready for us," he said. "We must have a perfect game to win," Larkey said.

Game time at the Rock is 8 p.m.

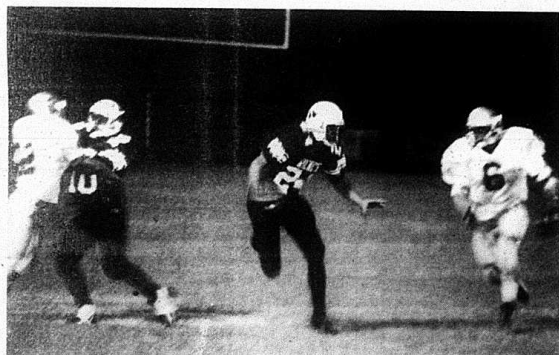

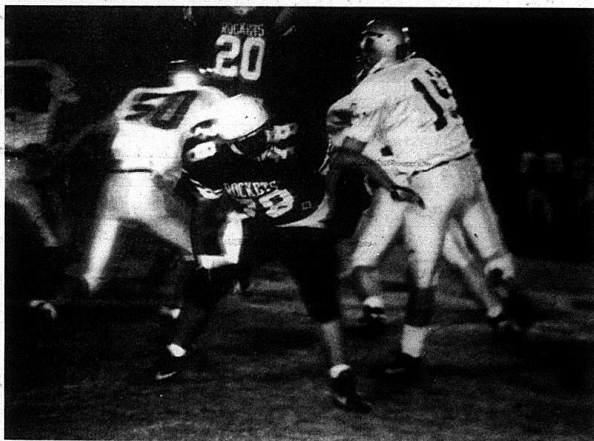

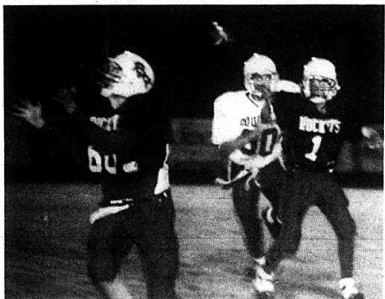

Car Leasing Revisions On The Way

If you've ever been confused and frustrated by the seeming double-talk and the print of leasing a car, help may be on the way. By revising the automobile leasing regulations of 1976, the Federal Reserve Board has established new disclosures to improve consumers' understanding of automobile and other lease transactions. The changes are set to go into effect January 1, 1998.

The Federal Reserve Board approved the new regulation to ensure that consumers receive accurate and meaningful disclosures through computer generated programs when they enter into lease transactions. With one out of every three new vehicles now being leased, and used car leasing growing at an even faster rate, the effects of the revisions are far-reaching.

Before entering into a lease agreement, the rental company or dealership must give customers up to 20 disclosures, including the amount of initial charges, identification of and responsibilities for maintaining the leased vehicle,

a payment schedule, and liabilities for ending a lease early.

The changes have required the preparation of new leasing forms and the reprogramming of the computer software used to produce the consumer lease disclosures at automobile dealerships. This affects the 22,500 new car dealerships that arrange lease for approximately 9,000 leasing companies.

A new consumer leasing brochure, "Keys to Vehicle Leasing - A Consumer Guide", will be available from the Federal Reserve Board some time in December. For further information, visit the Federal Reserve Board's website:

If you are planning to buy or lease a vehicle before the revisions take effect on January 1, 1998, you might want to read the April 1997 issue of "Consumer Reports" magazine to help you compare the cost of buying versus leasing a vehicle.

The Rules for the Talk Meet are as follows:

7. A participant may secure assistance from anyone he chooses in writing or preparing his talk. There is no specific topic; any suitable topic can be used.
8. The participant and those who may work with him should be familiar with: a) Objectives of the 4-H Talk Meet Program; b) Judge's Score Sheet; c) Selecting and

Preparing the speech; and d) Pointers for giving a speech.

8. Each contestant will be introduced along with the title of talk by the room chairman.
9. After being introduced, the speaker will present the talk. The participant should not repeat the title of his talk.
10. Each representative for the County Talk Meet must register by calling the County Extension Office at 256-2403 by Wednesday, November 26th. When you call, we will need the participant's name, date of birth, full address, grade, teacher, school and title of their speech. (It is important that you get all of this information!)

Each representative for the County Talk Meet should be aware that if they win First or Second Place in their age category they will have the opportunity to go to the Area Contest which will be in

Not To Worry... Fall Pine Needle Drop is Normal

Autumn is here, and Kentucky hardwood trees are beginning to put on their annual show of scarlet, orange and yellow. It's not a time of year when people pay much attention to pines, and many of those who do wind up worried.

Extension Offices get a lot of calls this time of year confusing normal fall needle drop with disease or insect attack. But a pine tree loses its leaves naturally, too, and it does it in the fall of the year. Pine needles just don't go through the colorful ceremony that hardwood leaves do.

The life of an individual bundle of pine needles is typically five to seven years. It's easy to determine whether pines are being attacked by insect of disease, or simply losing needles due to the time of year.

Normal needle fall affects only the innermost needles of the limbs, closest to the main stem of the tree. There's no need to worry unless you see foliage turning from green to brown on the exterior part of the limbs while it's still green on the interior.

Another tipoff is that the color

change caused by fall needle drop is usually uniform, with effected needles on a tree turning the same color at the same time. In contrast, disease or insect attack often produce several shades of brown on the same tree.

By early November the winds will blow the brown needles off and you won't see them any more. The pines will be uniformly green again during the winter and ready for new growth in the spring.

Fall needle brown is normal for all Kentucky pine trees but is particularly obvious on white pines.

Their limbs typically grow in whorls, rather like an artificial Christmas tree. Brown needles on the inner branches are easily visible because limb groups are set as much as three feet apart. The interesting thing about the white pine is that it loses all its internal needles at once. It's not just spotty. A white pine puts on a whole flush of growth at one time and drops needles the same way, so they may lose needles for three or four feet on the inner limb closest to the trunk.

The Al Smith Award goes to Frank Dawahare. Dawahare is from

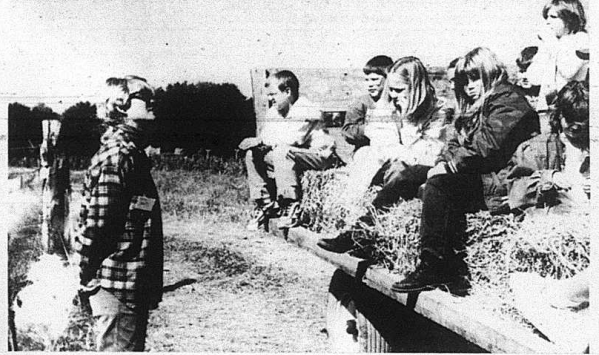



Eighteen years later, in Switzerland, a man with no memory is "recognized" as Richard Knight, the missing child. 2. COLD MOUNTAIN by Charles Frasier. This is an extraordinary novel about a soldier's perilous journey back to his beloved at the end of the Civil War. reveals Mother Teresa to be strong against abortion, even in cases of rape and to have a history of association with dictators. She also considers the highlights of Mother Teresa's dedication to the sick, dying and destitute and looks at the motivation that has driven this woman of love and determination. A great figure in history was lost in her death.

In this world we live in today, homemaking is very challenging. You do most the menial jobs with the most meaningful task, you accommodate

others all the time, and try to keep your identity. The demand is great, but Carol used to tell me, "the fringe benefits are terrific." She always opened her arms to those in need. 

