things you can do to guarantee that

Don't listen to your wife. Most of
her opinions are wrong anyway.

-Spend nearly every day or night out with the guys. It doesn't matter if you fish or golf or play softball, just as long as you are out of the house and

-Leave 95% of the parenting to her. Raising kids is, afterall, woman's work. They instinctively know how to change diapers and feed babies. Doing those chores makes usen look like wimps.

Hale said that although he is not completedly satisfied with recent CTBS test scores, the middle school is still rated above average and is fourth among grea schools. He said that as far as scores go, "numbers tell various stories," and explained that all students at the middle school were tested, including special education students, and that all scores were included.

Hale said elementary schools may have an advantage in that they test exit level students, and in that they test exit level students, and in some cases choose not to test all students.

#### Seal program benefits 101 students at Mt. Vernon

The official kick-off for the Seal Kentucky Program was held last week at Mt. Vermon Elementary School. The school is the first to take part in the mobile dental care program, which is funded by the E.O. Robinson Trust. This trust provides funds to the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry to administer the program throughout 29 counties in the Robinson Forest.



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



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#### Extension Home Economics Car Leasing Revisions On The Way

If you've ever been confused and frustrated by the seeming doubleand fine print of leasing a car, help may be on the way. By revising the automobile leasing regulations of 1976, the Federal Reserve Board has established new disclosures to improve consumers.

Reserve Board has established new discisours to improve consumer discisours to improve end other lease transactions. The changes are set to go into effect January 1, 1998.

The Federal Reserve Board approved the new regulation to ensure that donsumers receive accurate and meaningful disclosures through computer generated programs when they enter into lease transactions. With one out of every three new chicles now being leased, and used car leasing leased, and used car leasing growing at an even faster rate, the effects of the revisions are farreaching.

growing in effects of the revisions reaching.

Before entering into a lease agreement, the rental company or dealership must give customers up to 20 disclosures, including the mount of initial charges, amount of initial charges, identification of and responsibilities for maintaining the leased vehicle,

a payment schedule, and liabilities for ending a lease early. The changes have required the preparation of new leasing forms and the reprogramming of the computer software used to produce the consumer lease disclosures at automobile dealerships. This affects the 22,500 new car dealerships that arrange leases through approximately 9,000 leasing companies.

#### Farm News



Autumn is here, and Kentucky hardwood trees are beginning to put on their annual show of searlet, orange and yellow. It's not a time of year when people pay much attention to pines, and many of those who do wind up worried. Extension Offices get a lot of calls—this—time—of year—confusing—normal fall needle drop with disease or insect attack. But a pine tree loses its leaves naturally, too, and it does it in the fall of the year. Pine needles just don't go through the colorful ceremony that hardwood leaves do.

The life of an individual bundle opine needles is typically five to pine the pine save being attacked by insect of disease, or simply losing needles due to the time of year.

Normal needle fall affects only the innermost needles of the limbs, closest to the main stem of the tree. There's no need to worry unless you see foliage turning from green to brown on the exterior part of the limbs while it's still green on the interior.

Another tipoff is that the color

Another tipoff is that the color

change caused by fall needle drop is usually uniform, with effected needles on a tree turning the same color at the same time. In contrast, disease or insect attack often produce several shades of brown on

produce several shades of brown on the same tree.

By early November the winds will blow the brown needles off and you won't see them any more. The pines will be uniformly great again during the winter and ready for new growth in the spring. Fall needle browning is normal for all Kentucky pine trees when the particularly obvious on white pines.

particularly obvious on white pines.

Their limbs typically grow is white, rather like an artificial Christmas tree. Brown needles on the inner branches are easily visible because limb groups are set as much as three feet apart. The interesting thing about the white pine is that it loses all its internal needles at once. It's not just sopty. A white pine puts on a whole flush of growth at one time and drops needles the same way, so they may lose needles for three or four feet on the inner limb closest to the trunk.
