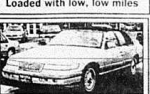

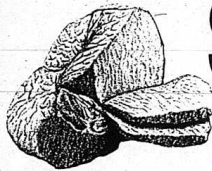

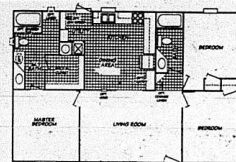

Wreck caused by rowdy students on school bus

Four people were slightly injured Thursday afternoon in a four-vehicle wreck that included a Rockcastle County school bus.
According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan, bus driver Randall Adams was apparently distracted by students on bus 901, which caused him to look away from the roadway for a short time.
"When he looked back, he just couldn't get stopped, causing the wreck," Doan said.
The wreck occurred at the junction of Hwy. 70 and Hwy. 150, around 3:10 p.m.
Adams was on his way to Brodhead Elementary School from the Middle School when the wreck occurred.
Doan said that Jearl Evans, 37, of Mt. Vernon, was waiting to turn left

onto Hwy. 70. Sitting behind Evans in traffic was Emanuel S. Smith, 20, of Mt. Vernon and sitting behind him was Roderick Shelton, 46, of Brodhead.
The school bus hit Shelton, Shelton hit Smith and Smith hit Evans. Smith and his passenger Kelly Smith, 16, were slightly injured as was Shelton. All three were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital.
Of the twenty-one students on the bus, only one, Josh Wicker, was treated for injuries, but that was not until about three hours after the accident and released.
Doan said that Adams was traveling about 40 miles per hour when the accident occurred.

Appeals court upholds Cain's dismissal of indictment

Last week the Kentucky Court of Appeals upheld the dismissal of an indictment in Rockcastle Circuit Court in 1995.
According to the opinion, handed down on October 17, Rockcastle Circuit Judge William T. Cain did not err when he ordered the dismissal of an indictment against Clarence W. Jones, on August 11, of 1995.
Jones was indicted on June 10, 1994 for a second degree assault and operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol. After several court appearances his trial date was set for April 12, 1995.
But on April 12th everyone showed up for court except for the prosecution. Commonwealth Ray Carmichael nor any of his assistants were in attendance.
Defense attorney Jerry Cox of Mt. Vernon made a motion for dismissal of the charges because the prosecution didn't show up on the 12th.

Cain set a hearing date for May 12 for the Commonwealth Attorney's office to show cause why the indictment should not be dismissed.
After the May 12th hearing, Judge Cain dismissed the indictment against Jones on August 11, 1995.

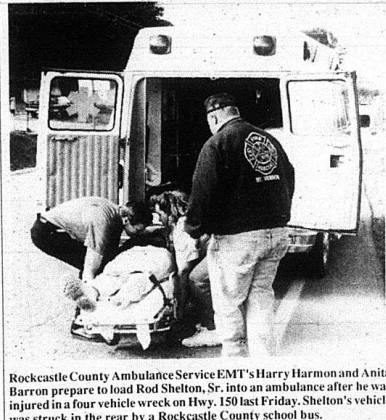
Ottawa woman hurt in two car collision

Game Warden shot Wednesday

Police were searching for three men in a wooded area in Laurel County Wednesday morning after one of them shot a Fish and Wildlife Game Warden.
According to police, Randy Brumback, who serves as game warden for Jackson and Rockcastle County, was shot with a high power fully automatic rifle, about 9:30 Wednesday after he stopped a pickup truck on Winding Blade Road in Laurel.
Police said that Brumback apparently started trying to stop the truck in Jackson County, but ended up in Laurel.
Fifty to sixty officers were searching the woods for three suspects, who fled on foot after the shooting. The truck was registered to a man in Laurel County.
Brumback was flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he is listed in serious condition.

According to police, when Hopkins attempted to go from the left lane, into the right lane to make a U-turn on Haley Pike, she was hit from behind by a truck driven by James McCall of Taylorsville.
Hopkins car overturned and burst into flames, while McCall's car came to rest off the roadway against a tree.
Both drivers were taken to the University of Kentucky Hospital for treatment of burns and other injuries.
Mrs. Hopkins said Wednesday that she was wearing a seat belt at the time of the wreck, but does not remember how she got out of her car.
"Some lady had put me into her car before the ambulance got there, but I don't remember anything else about the wreck," she said.
Mrs. Hopkins was hospitalized for two days at U.K. and has been recovering from her injuries at home since.
She suffered first and third degree burns on her body, but her face was burned the worst.

The expansion project and new construction at the jail will cost the county a total of \$880,000. That will include \$200,000 to pay off phase I of the project, which has been completed.

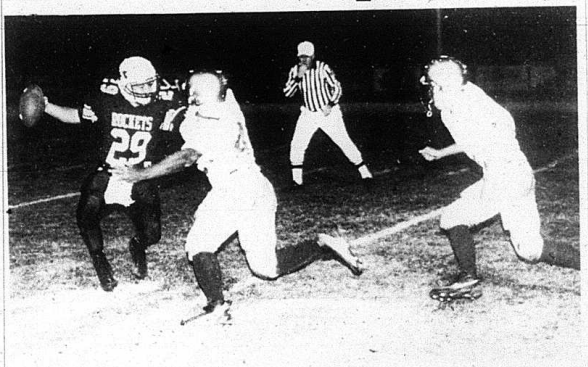

Recently I was talking with a member of the Kentucky General Assembly who was asking lots of questions about the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) where I work as director of marketing. During the conversation he noted that CAP is one of the best kept secrets in eastern Kentucky and he is probably right.

My job, however, is to let the cat out of the bag. Over the last year various CAP activities have garnered frequent mention in the press, but still relatively few people are able to put those activities in perspective. So, assuming that the editors will bear with me, I'm going to explain in a few paragraphs who we are and what we do.

CAP was incorporated in 1964 by Father Ralph Beiting who was then pastoring in the Berea, Mt. Vernon, McKees and Lancaster necks of the woods. Father Beiting became keenly aware of the social and economic problems many people were enduring

and he began raising money and recruiting volunteers from all over the country to help solve some of those problems. His bottom line was that he wanted to help people learn to solve their own problems.

The story of how CAP got from where it was in 1964 to where it is today would fill several volumes, but I believe that the single greatest accomplishment that Father Beiting has made is that we are now an organization of many faiths working together because we have learned to trust and appreciate each other.

Up until the 1980's CAP was generally viewed as Catholic organization. And Catholics were generally as welcome in the mountains as porcupines at a balloon festival. Lot's of people still refer to us as "that Catholic bunch," when, in fact, Protestants outnumber Catholics on our staff by at least 10 to 1. Of the 270 people on our payroll, most are Baptists, First Christians, Methodists, Presbyterians, Free Pentecostals, and a few

renovate instead of closing, because it would too costly to pay to house all county prisoners in out-of-county facilities.

Besides the renovation, there will be new construction in the current court yard and the former Clontz and Cox law offices will also be renovated for jail use.

Carloftis said that once completed the county jail will be able to house state and federal prisoners. "There is a shortage of beds throughout the state and when our project is complete we will be able to keep enough prisoners from other places to pay for the jail project," he said.

The jail fund which has been hit hard by juvenile detention bills, the cost of phase I renovation and loss of state prisoners at one time because of security problems, continues to cause the jail to operate in the red.

"When we get this project completed it will help our jail's financial situation - if we had not gone this route - the county would have been bankrupt, it would have cost us over \$200,000 extra to house prisoners elsewhere," Carloftis said.

The Judge said that although bids came in high the first time they were let, the architects have negotiated with contractors to make the bids acceptable.

The Judge said the rate on the \$880,000 will be 4.1 percent and construction should start within six weeks.

A grant of \$120,000 from the state over a ten year period will also be used to help pay back the money.

The re-bid of the courthouse annex bonds have also been approved. That move will save the county \$40,000 a year over the next 14 years.

The new rate on the bonds is exactly half the old rate.

Carmichael made a motion to reconsider dismissing the indictment on May 23 of 1996, but Judge Jones overruled that as well. That is when the case went to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

The Commonwealth Attorney alleged that Judge Cain abused his discretion in the case when he dismissed the indictment against Jones and overruled the Commonwealth's motion to reconsider.

Carmichael also contended in his appeal that he had a verbal agreement from Judge Cain to continue the case on April 12 which, according to Carmichael, was the reason no one

showed up to prosecute the case.

But, the court of appeals said there was no evidence as to such a conversation and no way to prove whether or not the phone conversation ever took place.

The ruling stated: "When the case was called for trial, Jones, his counsel, (Cox) and witnesses for the defendant appeared and announced ready. The Commonwealth prosecutors were not present. At least one witness for the Commonwealth appeared. In light of the facts contained in the record on appeal, which do not include a reasonable excuse for the failure to be ready for trial, we (the court of appeals) must find no abuse of discretion."

Although the 1994 indictment against Jones was dismissed he still has plenty of legal troubles. Jones is currently being held in the Rockcastle County jail on several charges, including an indictment for kidnapping and car jacking, stemming from an incident in Brodhead this summer.

He is also charged with a 1996 burglary and two counts of theft by unlawful taking.

a year or more working in our programs in exchange for room and board and a small stipend.

We are simply a Christian organization united in our belief that we absolutely have to work together if we are to have a meaningful impact

Our staff and volunteers make sure that nearly 1,000 elderly folks, many of whom have no phones or transportation, receive regular visits and whatever help they need.

Our home repair staff and volunteers make several hundred homes for those in the direct need livable each year. them find employment.

We procure millions of dollars worth of educational material, building supplies, food, clothing, school supplies, household goods and other material that we distribute to well over a thousand community-based non-profits throughout the 13 state Appalachian Region. And for all that, we are barely scratching the surface of all the real human needs that exist in our mountains as this column just barely scratches surface of a real understanding of CAP.

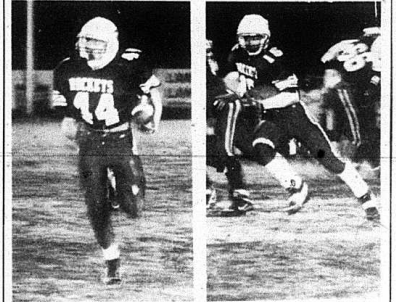

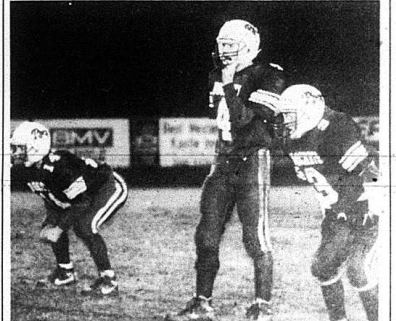

On defense, the Rockets recovered five Catholic fumbles and Wesley Falin added an interception.

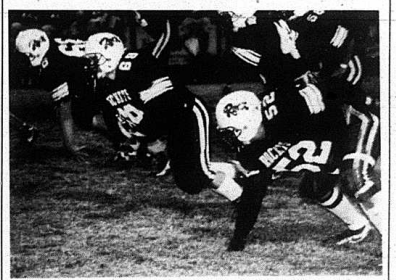

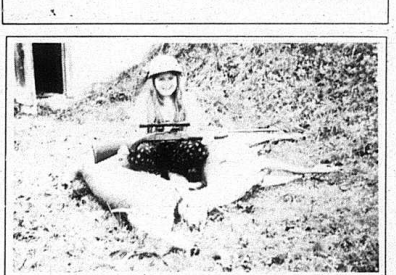
Above left, Josh Singleton takes off for a Rocket score in their JV game Monday. Above right, Derrick Bradley carries for a six yard gain.



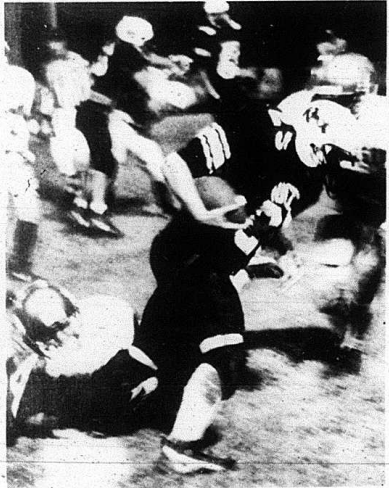
Josh Dooley and Jeff Linville set up with quarterback Christopher Parsons in the JV's 42-0 win over Lexington Catholic.

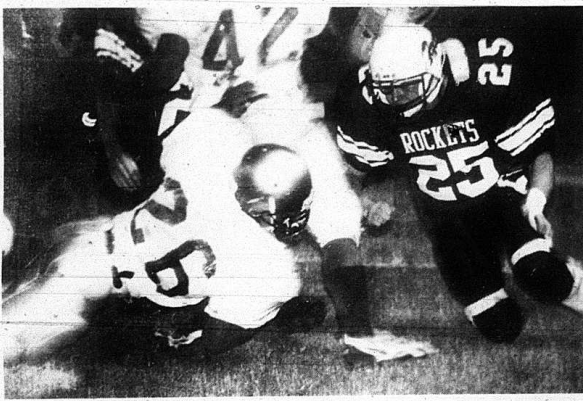

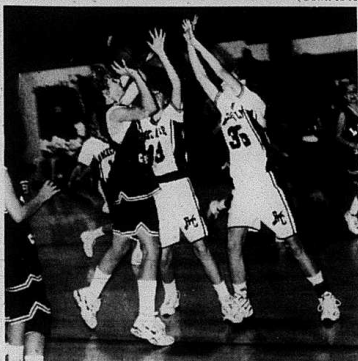
Tuesday night, the Rockets trav-

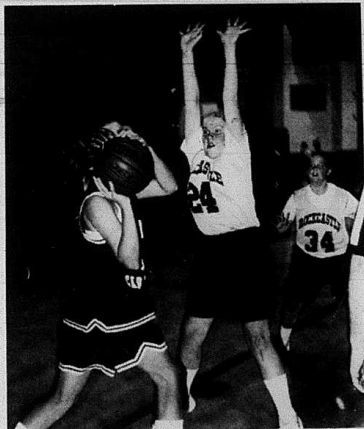

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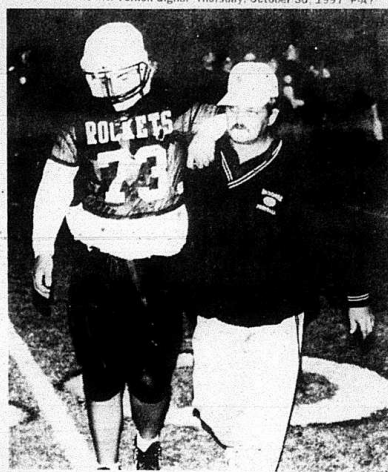

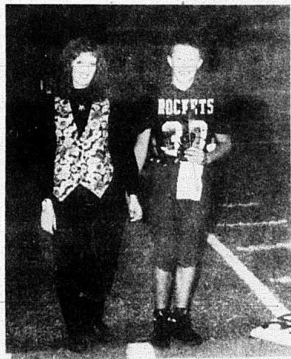

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Ten Halloween Safety Tips

Goblins, ghouls and ghosts aren't the only dangers children face on Halloween. The holiday and all its trappings increase the risk of injury.

"Most Halloween injuries involve environmental hazards such as steps, uneven pavement and other obstacles that may cause falls in the dark," said Erika Kravic, R.N., of the Kosair Children's Hospital Office of Child Advocacy. "Flammable and cumbersome costumes, wigs, and masks, careless motorists and treats that have been tampered with, also present a danger."

Kosair Children's Hospital recommends the following safety tips for keeping Halloween injury-free.

1. Small children should never carve pumpkins. Either paint the face directly on the pumpkin or have children draw the face with markers, then let an adult do the carving.
2. Place lighted pumpkins on sturdy tables and away from flammable objects. Never leave them unattended. Votive candles are safest for pumpkins.
3. Costumes should be short enough to avoid tripping over them. Avoid oversized shoes and high heels.
4. Look for "Flame resistant" labels on costumes, masks, beards and wigs. Use fire resistant materials for all homemade costumes.
5. Use non-toxic face paint or cosmetics applied directly to the face rather than masks that can obstruct a child's vision. Secure hats so they do not slip over a child's eyes.

6. Trick-or-treaters should carry flashlights and use reflective tape on their costumes or bags so they can see and be seen more clearly.

7. Children should stick to sidewalks when trick-or-treating. They should not cut across yards where they can trip over lawn ornaments or run into clotheslines that are invisible in the dark.

8. Keep the path to your home safe for trick-or-treaters by removing anything a child could trip over such as garden hoses, toys and lawn decorations. Sweep away wet leaves from sidewalks and steps and make sure

Signs of neglect in the family

In a family where neglect is occurring, the neglecting adult may be apathetic and have a constant craving for excitement and change. The adult will express dissatisfaction with his life and express a desire to be free of the demands of the child. There will be a lack of interest in the child's activities. The adult will have a low

acceptance of the child's dependency needs and will be generally unskilled as a parent. The neglecting adult will have little planning or organizational skills. He may appear to be unkept and will perceive the child as a burden or bother. He will be occupied more with his own problems than with the child's problems. The child

will seldom be discussed in positive terms and the neglecting adult will be overcritical of the child in most every respect.

There are several other family indicators where neglect is occurring and those will be discussed in the next article.

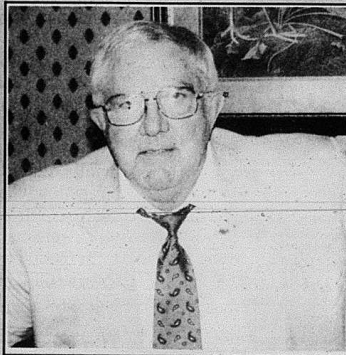

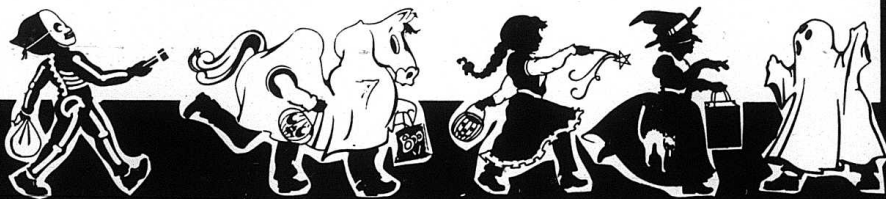

Make Halloween Safe & Fun

The temperature is dropping and trees are putting on a spectacular display of fall color. Before long small goblins will appear at the door calling out the familiar "Trick or Treat!"

Halloween is a tradition that draws children dressed in costumes from their warm homes to visit neighbors in search of treats. However, these activities can pose some safety risks for children. Follow some simple safeguards to ensure that their Halloween is memorable for the treats -- not tricks.

Here are some ideas for a safe Halloween:

- Choose costumes that enable children to see their surroundings well. Consider makeup as an alternative for a mask that doesn't allow good visibility. To keep children from tripping, or getting tangled up, don't allow a costume to drag on the ground. Make sure costumes are flame-retardant. Dress children in comfortable, safe shoes.
- Stick to neighborhoods that you

know. Since some households prefer not to take part in Halloween, avoid apartments or houses that have dark porches or windows. Use a flashlight to help light the way.

- If you wish to treat youngsters, turn on porch and outside lights for safety.

• Adult supervision will prevent festivities from becoming mischievous or an accident from occurring. It's essential for adults to accompany young goblins. Teach children that tricks should never be a part of the Halloween tradition.

- Wait until returning home to eat

treats. Let children help check each treat to be sure it hasn't been tampered with and is wrapped securely. If a treat is questionable, throw it away.

- To keep children from overdoing sweets, monitor how much candy they eat. Put some aside for future treats.

- Consider giving candy alternatives unsharpened pencils,

fruit, erasers, or stickers.

• Develop alternative activities for children who've aged out of trick-or-treating. Make a few phone calls to find out about alternatives

to trick-or-treating; have a party for your children and their friends at your home; rent a movie or take the children to see the newest children's movie.

Fall Is Important Time for Lawn Care

With summer over, many gardeners take a vacation from lawn care. But Fall is an important time to control weeds, remove leaves and trim and fertilize grass.

Fall is the number one time of the year to control broadleaf weeds like dandelion, plantain, chickweed, henbit and clover. It's easier to control broadleaf weeds when they are actively growing in the fall.

This time of year we have fewer sensitive plants in the yard that might be injured by drift or herbicide volatility. Winds usually are calmer, reducing the chance of drift. Don't depend on frost to control weeds; it stunts or kills the top but won't kill the crowns and roots.

Another advantage of fall broadleaf weed control is that grasses are actively growing and will fill in spaces the weeds occupied.

It's very important to keep leaves off the lawn because they shade grass and this prevents growth of new tillers, or grass plants. While you can chop up leaves with a mower it's best to remove them, because accumulation of chopped leaves on the crown hurts new plant and stem development.

Fall also is an important time to properly mow and fertilize the lawn. The calendar has no effect on when to stop mowing grass; keep mowing as long as grass is growing. Shorter grass maintains its greenness. Mow shorter in the fall than in the summer; grass should be no more than 2 inches tall going into the winter. Grass that is too tall tends to top over and

smother itself out. This can cause losses of up to half the grass density.

Mowing grass shorter and fertilizing in the fall produces a more lush lawn.

Short grass allows more light penetration and this, plus a high-nitrogen fertilizer, produces new plants that thicken up the lawn. It also produces growth and green up several weeks earlier in the spring.

Applying a high-nitrogen fertilizer in the fall promotes root growth that increases lawn density without excessive top growth. Conversely, fertilizing in the spring decreases root growth while increasing top growth. This makes a lawn more susceptible to drought stress and means it has to be mowed more often. Spring fertilization also encourages diseases and growth of crabgrass and summer annual weeds.

In the Fall, apply fertilizer at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 lbs. of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. The percent nitrogen is the first number in the analysis on the fertilizer bag. To get 1 lb. of actual nitrogen using ammonium nitrate (33-0-0), apply 3 lbs. per 1,000 square feet. 3 lbs. of 33% nitrogen equals 1 lb. of actual nitrogen. With a 10-10-10 fertilizer, apply 10 lbs. per 1,000 square feet. Make two applications between now and the end of November.

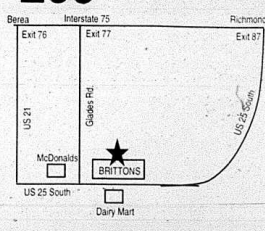

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Agricultural News

If you're farming in the area, chances are you're eligible to vote in the upcoming Farm Service Agency county committee election. It's time to get involved. FSA is looking to involve the broadest possible group of producers in the upcoming election—including people who haven't been involved with the USDA in the past. If you're farming in the area, chances are you can vote. All you need to do is contact the local FSA office and get on the list to receive a ballot. It's your committee, and it's time to contact your local FSA office and get involved. This year's election will be held for Community 2, southeast section of Rockcastle County, by Pulaski and Laurel Counties. Highway boundaries are 70, 150 and 25.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) sign-up #16 is scheduled for a five-week period between October 14-November 14. This is the second CRP general sign-up since Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 amendments to the Food Security Act of 1985.

The new environmentally-focused CRP provides immediate benefits to producers, ranchers and taxpayers through reduced soil erosion, improved water quality and expanded wildlife habitat. Under this volun-

tary program, landowners enter into contracts with USDA to place erodible and other environmentally-sensitive cropland in conservation practices for 10-15 years. In exchange, landowners receive annual rental payments for the land and cost-share assistance for establishing those practices. All land that is enrolled in the program must compete for acceptance based on an environmental benefits index that ensures fair and equal consideration for all types of land.

Rural Development will be changing their servicing dates for Rockcastle County. They will now be at the USDA Service Center on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month during the hours of 9:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m. Rural Development makes housing loans for the former Farmers Home Administration. Their next scheduled servicing date is November 25, due to training meetings.

Producers whom have tobacco stolon should report this to the local FSA Office by providing a copy of the police report to the FSA County Committee within 15 days of the theft. For cases where police report is not filed, the tobacco may be considered as marked on the farm where it was produced.

Youth who are involved in 4-H, FFA or other similar activities may be eligible to receive needed funding to develop income producing projects through FSA's Farm Loan Program.

Loans of up to \$5000 are available to assist youth in financing the items which are necessary to establish their

project. Loan repayments will be scheduled to coincide with the project's income schedule.

stage of suffering and disorganization, when the grieving person feels the terrible pain of the loss. He or she finds life very disorganized, because an essential part of life has been lost. The third stage is aftermaths and reorganization. In this stage life begins to return to normal, but often interrupted by aftershocks of emotions for months or years later. A birthday or anniversary may trigger the emotions.

There is no timetable for grief. Friends and family may expect the grieving person to get over the grief quickly. The grieving person may push himself to finish grieving long before he is ready. Grief is not finished in a few months.

Tatellbaum says, "This then is the essential process of grieving — repeating again and again the images of, and feelings about, our lost loved one until the mourning process is completed." To grieve fully means to experience the pain of the loss, without covering or denying that pain. To grieve fully means to experience and express all the emotions and reactions to the loss.

Most people do not like to hurt and so have invented various ways of denying the pain. When the pain is not expressed, the grieving process can stall and leave the person stuck in grief. Unexpressed grief is unhealthy. Friends and family may try to talk the grieving person out of expressing his feelings. "Don't cry" or "just stop thinking about him" are admonitions that discourage the person who is grieving from getting out those painful feelings inside.

Tatellbaum gives two extreme examples of the possible effects of unexpressed grief. One is Anna, who never mentioned her husband or shed a tear after his death. Six months later she began showing symptoms of senility. George faced the death of his son stoically, without tears. Six months later he had a heart attack. Unexpressed grief is both emotionally and physical dangerous.

In my own counseling practice, I often work with people who have

unfinished grief. Mary came to me because of her depression. (Mary is a fictitious character.) She had no energy and wanted only to sleep and eat.

Mary's mother had died one year ago. Mary was angry with Mom for leaving her to take care of all her younger sisters. Because Mary felt guilty about being angry, she tried to shut down her feelings. Then the grief stopped, leading to her current depression.

When I told Mary that anger was normal in a grief situation, she seemed relieved. She began going to the cemetery and "talking" to Mom, telling Mom about the anger and many other feelings that she had. As she found ways to express her feelings, her grief began flowing again.

I highly recommend *The Courage to Grieve*. Check with the nearest bookstore. If they do not have it, they can order it for you.

In the last month several people have asked me to recommend a book on grieving. All three were going through grief after a family member had died. I have found the book!

Judy Tatellbaum wrote *The Courage to Grieve* partly out of her own experience. Her brother died at age 20 in a car wreck, and that experience with grief started her on the journey that led to this book.

She identifies three phases of the

grief process that all people go through after a loss. First, there is the state of shock, when the grieving person cannot believe that the loved one is really dead. Numbness may be a part of this stage. Second is the
