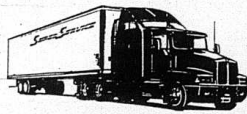

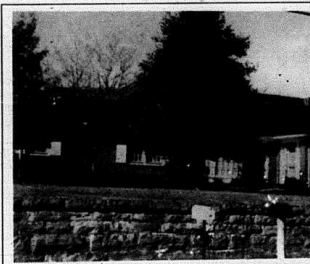

Mt. Vernon may bring natural gas to county

Natural gas may be on its way to Rockcastle County.

During the regular monthly meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, engineers from Nesbitt Engineering in Lexington told council members, it may be feasible for them to bring gas to Mt. Vernon.

The good news, the gas could

also supply the Crab Orchard and Brodhead areas.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer said that he became very interested in looking at such a proposal, after at least two potential factories located elsewhere when they learned there was no natural gas service in the county.

Engineers told the council that they had done only a preliminary study on the project, but that it would probably be best for the city to bring the gas in from the Lincoln County side.

Approximately 19 miles of gas line would be laid and the supplier would be Columbia Gulf company,

which gets its natural gas from the Gulf of Mexico.

Cromer said that although this project is in its earliest stages, it seems to be feasible.

"The city would get funding for the project and run it as a city utility," Cromer said.

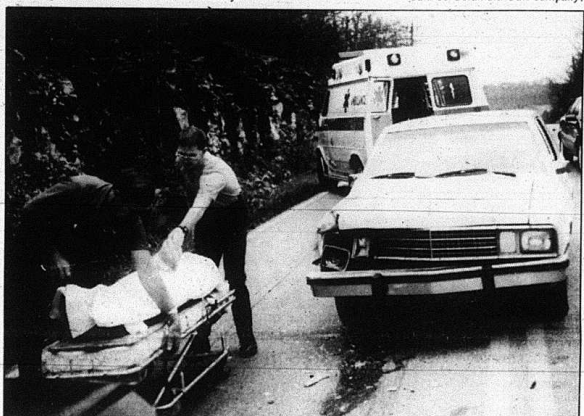
He said that several businesses

and private individuals had expressed a need for the gas and it would be a great asset to the city and the county.

The Mayor said the easiest place to lay the gas lines would be along the old L & N railroad track, because of the fact you would have only one landowner, in which to secure an easement from.

Cromer also said that if the city was able to complete such a project and tie in Lincoln County, the gas would be made available to Crab Orchard and Brodhead residents and others along the line.

The council voted unanimously to allow Nesbitt to proceed with the preliminary study.

Livingston will hold their parade December 20th at 6 p.m.

The Rockcastle County Kiwanis Club will hold their annual tree lighting ceremony in the Mt. Vernon City Park on Friday at 6 p.m.

Last week, Kentucky Governor Paul Patton signed a death warrant for Ronnie Bowling, 27, of Burning Springs. He is to be executed on December 23.

Bowling was convicted of killing two men in 1989, one of those a local minister, who owned a gas station in Laurel County.

Marvin Hensley, 48, of Burr, who founded the Lighthouse Assembly of God Church, was shot to death on February 22 at his gas station. A few days before Hensley was murdered, another Laurel County man also working at a service station was shot to death.

However, when Ronnie Bowling tried the same thing at the Burr Sun-

oco in Rockcastle County on February 25 of that year, owner Ricky Smith shot back.

According to court records, when Bowling tried to shoot and rob Smith, Smith wounded Bowling in an exchange of gunfire.

Smith's description of Bowling and the car he was driving led to Bowling's arrest.

Besides the murder conviction, Bowling was convicted of attempted murder in Rockcastle Circuit Court on February 28 in connection with the attempt on Smith's life.

There will be several appeals made upon Bowling's behalf before he is actually executed, and the appeal process will take some time.

Arson suspected in two fires

Two homes were completely destroyed by fire this week and in both cases police believe arson is involved.

On Sunday morning, the home of

Gary Lanville at Conway was completely destroyed by fire. Mt. Vernon firefighter Brian Hansel said that the fire occurred sometime during the

Brock pleads guilty to burning officer's car

A Brodhead man has pled guilty to second degree arson.

Charles Brock, 31, was indicted in February for the burning of a vehicle belonging to a Mt. Vernon police officer.

Brock and Phillip Falin were indicted for the January 6th burning of officer Barry Adams' 1985 Buick Regal.

According to court records, Falin, 23, of Orlando pled guilty to third degree arson in August. Falin's guilty plea was part of a plea agreement with Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael's office. Falin was sentenced to five year in prison after he

agreed to testify against Brock as part of his plea.

Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Mike Pratt said that a sentence of ten years in prison would be recommended for Brock when he is sentenced on December 22.

Brock, who was also indicted in connection with an armed robbery at Dairy-Mart in Brodhead last December, has been in jail since March. That indictment is still pending against him. Falin was also indicted in connection with that robbery and his case is also still pending.

Two other local men were indicted in the Dairy-Mart robbery and their cases are also still pending.

Holbrook arrested twice on same day

The criminal problems for former First District Magistrate Charles Holbrook continue to mount.

Last Friday, Holbrook was arrested twice, once by Brodhead City Police Officer Joe Bussell and the other time by Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas.

It was Holbrook's third and fourth arrest in three months.

Bussell charged Holbrook, 65, of Brindle Ridge, with alcohol intoxication in a public place and disorderly conduct.

According to Bussell's citation, Holbrook was on Main Street in Brodhead wearing one roller skate around 10 p.m. Bussell also stated in his citation that Holbrook did not

want to get in his police cruiser after he was arrested and that he tried to tear up Bussell's paper work after he was arrested.

Earlier that day, at approximately 4 a.m., Holbrook was arrested by Deputy Thomas on the farm of Elmo Price, six miles west of Mt. Vernon.

In his citation, Thomas reported that Holbrook was sitting in a parked car on Price's property extremely intoxicated. Holbrook was released from jail after that arrest on his own recognition.

Holbrook, who served as magistrate from 1989 to 1993, also faces other charges of wanton endangerment, a Class D Felony, assault, re-

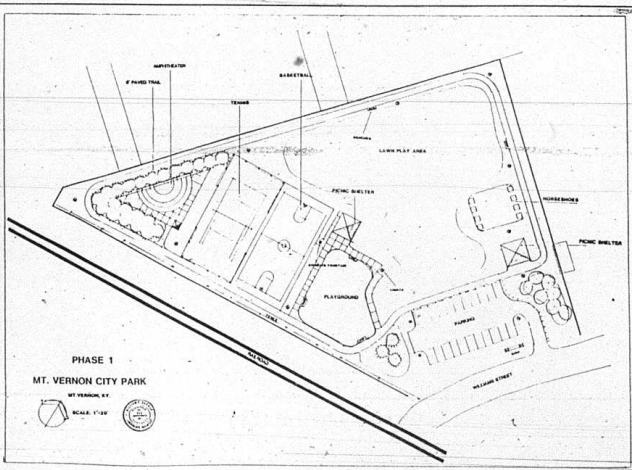
Adams is married to the former Carrie Bennett and has a daughter, Sara, 2, and a stepson, Christopher, 6.

They serve as teachers in our child development centers and adult education programs, counselors in our spouse abuse, respite care and teen centers. Others make home visits to care for elderly folks, perform emergency out-reach, teach young children with disabilities, work as carpenters in our home repair programs or do whatever else needs doing.

They come from all walks of life. Teachers, nurses, accountants, carpenters, technicians—name a profession and we've more than likely had it represented on our volunteer staff. Some are straight out of college and some are retired. Some are just taking a year off to serve mankind.

And they come from all over the country, from California to Maine. From the Great Plains to mid-town Manhattan seeking opportunities to

unselfishly give of themselves.

The hours are often long and tiring, but what a wonderful gift.

Still almost to the person they will tell you when their year is up that they received more out of the experience than they gave.

A hug from a child who needed someone to hug. A tender smile from an elderly lady who had no other way to pay for a ride to the grocery store.

And the assurance that they have brought some joy into lives that desperately needed it.

I envy our volunteers and if God's willing, one day I hope to be able to lay everything aside and find a place, maybe even CAP, where I can simply say, "Here I am. What do you want me to do?" And give myself for at least a year to whatever needs doing for the sheer joy of it.

And I spent the holiday weekend, one evening of which I just told you.

We celebrated Turkey Day early by going to Malissa's house in Knoxville on Sunday for her birthday. We didn't get to converse much with Lee, her husband, because he slept most of the day, having worked a night shift at Methodist Hospital where he is a respiratory therapist. But we did get to talk with Katie, our darling, only granddaughter! She's six months old and looking more like her mother every day. Thank heavens! I would have pushed hard for plastic surgery had she looked like her daddy.

So, when Thursday rolled around, we were alone, and Nancy served me a most delightful but non-traditional meal - cornbread, beans, shucked beans, and butter-milk. Ah, my soul, it don't get no better than that!

That evening we called some of our Bagdad friends of yesteryear to wish them the well and to tell them that our firstborn, Mark, would be on *The Tonight Show* again (last Friday). They had not seen him playing his bass guitar in Meredith Brooks' band last summer.

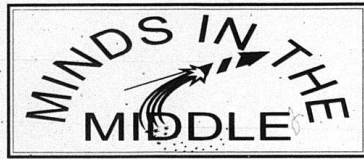

An Open Letter to Neighbors and Friends of Rockcastle County:

Recently, we were issued a Notice of Violation for violating Kentucky State Laws regarding the proper handling and disposal of household garbage. Other people in our county and adjoining counties have been caught and fined for the illegal dumping of garbage. Please be aware of the following facts:

1. First, you cannot bury household garbage - even on your own property. Placing garbage in a sinkhole or throwing it over an embankment is not only illegal but may damage drinking water for you and your neighbors or pollute creeks and rivers.
2. You are allowed to burn leaves, trees and limbs. However, you cannot burn household trash such as plastics and metals.
3. All household garbage must be disposed at a permitted landfill, a garbage transfer station, or picked up by a garbage collection service.
4. You need to sign up for regular garbage collection from a county-licensed hauler. Keep your receipts so you can show proof if your garbage somehow ends up in an illegal dump.

Contact the County Solid Waste Coordinator, Nancy Meadows, (606) 256-5315 if you are not currently subscribing to a collection service or have any other general questions about proper garbage disposal in our county.

Be aware if you are caught illegally disposing of your garbage—you can be fined from \$100.00 to \$5,000 dollars and be required to clean up the dump site. Further, if you witness illegal dumping call toll free 1-888-NODUMPS and report it to state officials.

Please join in creating a clean and healthy environment for Rockcastle County.

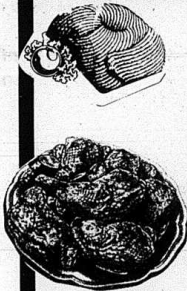

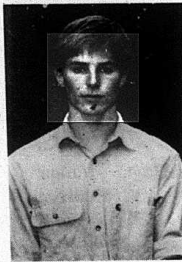
A new program that the council will be participating in this year is a

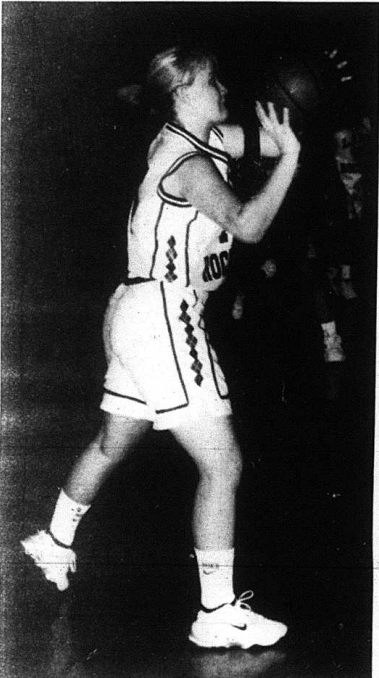

Junior Suzanne Brown got seven points in the fourth quarter to

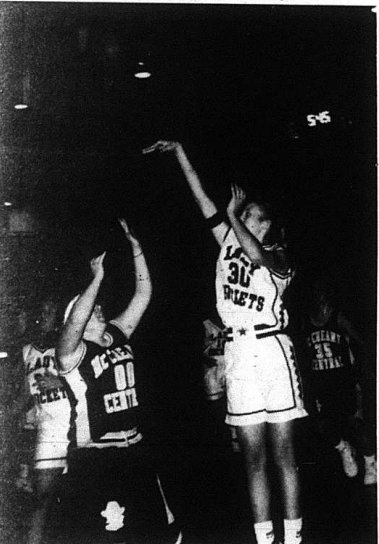

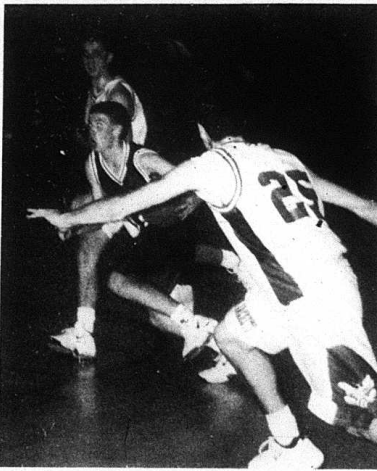

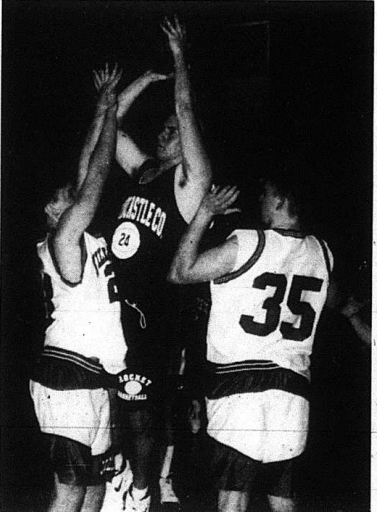

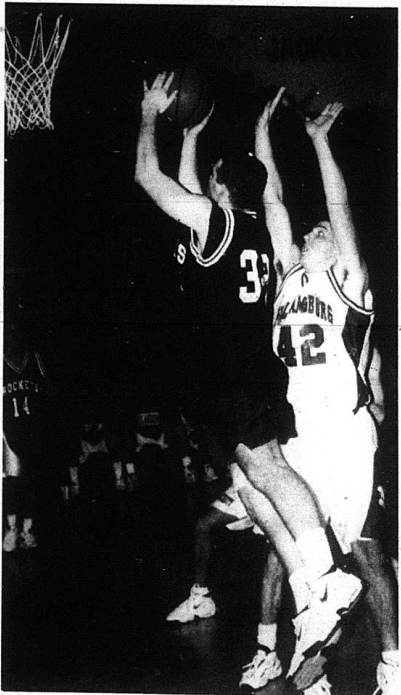

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IS IT JUST THE WINTER BLUES?

A change in appetite, a drop in energy level and weight gain are all things we associate with the hectic holiday season. However, it could mean more than that.

These symptoms—when accompanied by a lower concentration level, a higher tendency to oversleep, a craving for carbohydrates, and an increase in irritability—are associated with seasonal affective disorder (SAD). SAD affects people during the winter months, causing extreme changes in mood and depression.

Although everyone experiences some of these symptoms at one time or another, others exhibit these symptoms every winter season and seem to bounce back at the sight of spring.

"It is important that people let a physician diagnose SAD because there are other medical causes for depression that need to be ruled out," said Dr. Kimberly Cornelius, of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center.

Even though the exact cause of SAD is still uncertain, researchers have found it has an association with your internal body clock.

Melatonin is a protein that relays information to the rest of your body regarding the light/dark cycle. During the day, your body quits producing melatonin so you can wake up. However, there is less sunlight during the winter, so more melatonin is produced, which can cause seasonal affective disorder.

Since SAD is mainly controlled by the amount of light that surrounds us, one of its main treatments is exposure to light. About 85 percent of SAD sufferers respond to light therapy. The most common method of light therapy is light boxes. The boxes are about the size of a portable tele-



vision, and exposure time varies from a half hour to several hours depending upon the severity of the condition and the time of the season.

"It is extremely important that someone suffering from SAD receives treatment prescribed by a physician," Dr. Cornelius said. "Different intensities of light can damage your eyes."

It also is important to remember that anyone can suffer from the occasional winter blues, but frequent, intense mood changes during winter months could mean you are suffering from SAD. The

key is to consult a physician about your condition.

The following steps can be taken to alleviate some of the symptoms associated with SAD.

1. Expose yourself to as much natural light as possible. Sit near windows and go without sunglasses when possible.
2. Exercise daily, preferably outdoors.
3. Create and maintain a regular sleep/wake cycle.
4. Try to schedule social events during daylight hours.
5. Minimize stress when possible. Try to make major life decisions during the summer months.
6. Remember, if problems persist, contact a physician.

BEWARE OF HOLIDAY SPIRITS

The holidays bring a flurry of activities, most of which require us to travel—sometimes on the same roads traveled by people drinking and driving.

Here are some signs that may indicate if a driver is under the influence of alcohol.

1. Making wide turns.
2. Straddling two lanes.
3. Dangerous passing.
4. Driving off the designated roadway, for example, a sidewalk or shoulder.
5. Abrupt swerving in and out of lanes.
6. Driving more than 10 miles per hour under the speed limit.
7. Following cars too closely.
8. Unnecessary braking, which causes the car to move in a jerky motion.
9. Slow responses to traffic signals.
10. Rapid acceleration or deceleration.
11. Turning with excessive speed or from a non-designated turn lane.
12. Driving without headlights.
13. Using turn signals that are inconsistent with the driver's actions.

One of these signs alone does not mean that a driver is under the influence. However, if several of these actions are apparent, you should call the authorities.

THE DREADED EXTRAS OF CHRISTMAS

During the holiday season, most of us can imagine an extra pound added to our body with each and every bite we take of holiday goodies. However, according to Jill Stevens, RRCC dietician, the dreaded thought of Christmas dinners doesn't have to be so grim.

"Roasted turkey breast with the skin removed is a naturally low fat food," Stevens said. "There are only 111 calories and 3.2 grams of fat in 3.5 ounces of sliced, roasted turkey breast."

Stevens also noted that it is true that dark meat is higher in calories. The same amount of roasted turkey in dark meat has 221 calories and 11.5 grams of fat.

"Moderation is the key to a successful, food-filled holiday season," Stevens said. "No one should punish themselves by not eating."

Stevens said there are many holiday recipes that can be made healthier with a few substitutions. The following are some examples:

PUMPKIN PIE (REDUCED FAT)

- 1 - 9 inch pie crust
- 1 - 16 oz. can of pumpkin
- 1 - 12 oz. can of lowfat evaporated milk
- 1/4 C egg substitute
- 2/3 C sugar
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. ground ginger
- 1/4 ground cloves

Beat pumpkin and other ingredients together. Pour into pie shell. Bake at 425 degrees for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake an additional 45 minutes. Chill. **Nutritional facts:** 1/8 pie = 318 calories, 7.75 grams of fat, 32 grams of cholesterol, and 5 grams of protein.

SOUTHERN CORNBREAD DRESSING (LOW FAT)

12 slices bread (torn into bite-size pieces and toasted)

- 1 recipe low-fat cornbread
- 1/2 C onion, chopped
- 1 C celery, diced
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 tsp. sage
- 2 cans of chicken broth
- 1/3 C lowfat margarine
- 1 C skim milk

Crumble cornbread and toss with toasted bread. Saute onion and celery in lowfat margarine. Toss with breads. Add season-

ings and liquids. Pour into 13 x 9 inch non-stick baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes.

LOW-FAT CORNBREAD

- 1 C white cornmeal
- 1 C all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 C egg substitute
- 1/3 C melted lowfat margarine
- 1 C skim milk and 1 tsp. salt

Mix dry ingredients. Stir in liquid ingredients. Pour into non-stick pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes.

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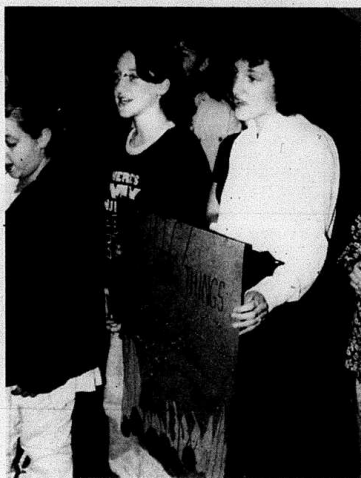
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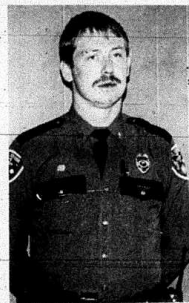

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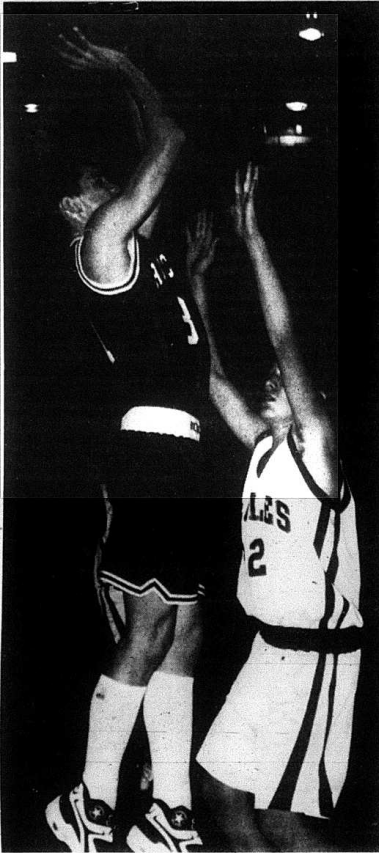

The Rockcastle County Middle School's eighth grade team opened their 1997-98 season by participating in the school's Thanksgiving Tourney.

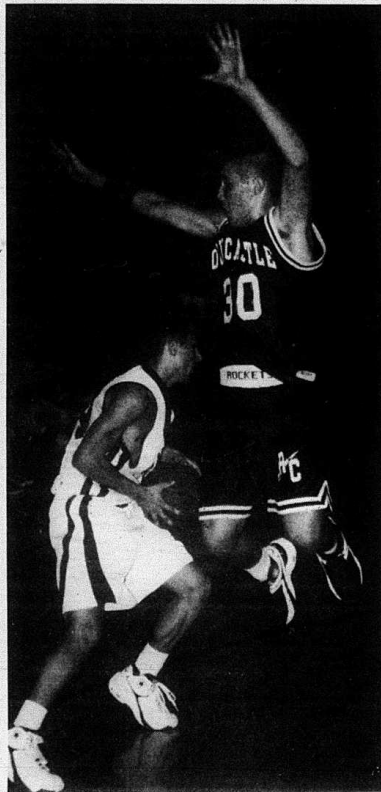

Blaming Each Other Wrecks Marriages

When Jesse and Delores came for marriage counseling, their marriage was in deep trouble. (All characters are fictitious.) Jesse had a serious drinking problem and Delores had recently had an affair. Both were very angry.

Jesse began the proceedings. "She had an affair with my best friend! I don't think I can ever forgive her for that. I've known for five years that she had these attractions to other men, and I told her to be careful. Did she listen to me? No, she never does."

Delores quickly voiced her side of the story. "He thinks all he has to do to be a good husband is bring home a paycheck. Well, I don't want to be married to someone who spends his whole life in front of the TV, drunk. I've told him to quit, but he won't listen to me. If I had a decent husband, maybe I wouldn't have gotten interested in another man." Jesse chimed back in with his defense. "You knew I drank when you married me. Why is it suddenly such a big problem? And maybe I wouldn't sit in front of the TV with a beer, if you would pay some attention to me. It wouldn't hurt you to act like a wife sometimes."

Agricultural News

Ballots for the election which was just held for Community B will be counted at the Committee meeting which will be held on Thursday, December 4.

Tobacco marketing cards were mailed Thursday, November 6, to producers who had all of their paperwork completed. If you have not received your marketing card, you probably need to come into the office and complete some paperwork.

AMTA (com program) producers have received a letter concerning advance payments. If you wish to change your payment status to receive an advance, complete the enclosed form and return it to the office. If the advance payment is to be issued by December 15, the request form must have been received in the office by December 1. If the advance payment is to be issued by January 15, the request form must be received in the office by December 31. For producers who do not request an advance payment, the entire FY 1998 payment will be issued by September 30, 1998.

Rural Development (formerly the Farmers Home Administration) is now serving Rockcastle County on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month. They can be seen on a first come first serve basis during the hours

of 9 a.m. - 11 a.m. on their scheduled days.

Documentation has been received in the county office providing the revised dates for FY 1998 for reconstituted farms enrolling expired CRP reduction acres, and revising CCC-478.

If a DEC 97 advance payment is requested and a reconstitution is needed, the recon must be requested by DEC 1, and all documentation signed by DEC 23. If a DEC 97 advance payment is requested and CRP/CAB reduction acres are on the farm to be enrolled in DEC, the acres must be enrolled by DEC 31.

If a producer does not request an advance payment, but a reconstitution is needed, the recon must be requested by JUN 1, and all documentation signed by AUG 3. If a producer does not request an advance payment and CRP/CAB reduction acres are on the farm to be enrolled in DEC, the acres must be enrolled by APR 3.

Youth who are involved in 4-H,

FFA, or other similar activities may be eligible to receive needed funding to develop income producing projects through FSA's Ag Credit. Loans of up to \$5000 are available to assist youth in financing the items which are necessary to establish their project. Loan repayments will be scheduled to coincide with the projects income schedule.

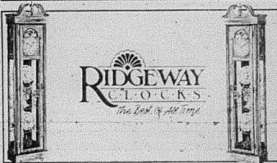
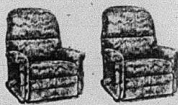

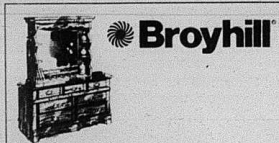
