

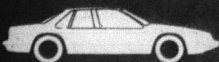

County to ban organized nudist camps

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is taking what they call the necessary steps to stop Nudist Colonies from locating in Rockcastle County.

The fiscal court voted on Tuesday to authorize County Attorney Jeff Burdette to draft an ordinance to prohibit nudist camps or colonies from locating in the county.

The subject was brought before

the court by Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis, who said that his office had been contacted by such a group from out of state about the possibility of purchasing a large tract of land in the county for adult camping only.

Carlotis said the same group had talked with a deputy clerk in the county clerk's office and told county attorney Burdette.

Third District Magistrate Bill

McKinney said members of the group had also stopped in his business on a Saturday afternoon about three weeks ago inquiring about four tracts of land in the county. "They wanted to know about two pieces of property on Hwy. 1004, one tract on Hwy. 490 and one tract on Red Hill Road.

McKinney said the people told him they wanted to buy a large wooded tract for a cheap price.

Burdette said that when a mem-

ber of the group, (which is apparently based in Florida), contacted him they asked if they could serve alcohol in the county without being prosecuted.

"I told them it was a dry county and they would be prosecuted," Burdette said.

After a discussion on the matter, the court authorized Burdette to draft an ordinance that in essence would prevent organized nudist camps or colonies from locating in the county.

Burdette said the ordinance could be adopted on the basis that such camps or colonies would lower the high community standards set forth in Rockcastle County.

Carlotis said that he thought the group had tried unsuccessfully to purchase property in Whitley and Laurel Counties before moving on to Rockcastle County.

The judge said that he thought it was very important to pass the ordi-

nance as a preventive measure against such groups.

In other business, the court discussed a request by Randy Skaggs of Carter County, founder of the Trixie Foundation, to provide him with information about the county's program to taking care of stray dogs.

The county attorney told the court he was responding to the request, but that Rockcastle seemed to be in com-

Police search Lake Linville Wednesday for missing person

After an anonymous tip, police searched Lake Linville on Wednesday looking for the body of a local man missing since late April or early May of 1997.

Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith and deputies Darrell Doan and Doug

Thomas, along with members of the Rockcastle Rescue Squad conducted the search. Smith also brought in search dogs to help.

Deputy Sheriff Sonya Prewitt said that the informant said police should find the body of Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon in the lake where his body was dumped after he

was murdered. Prewitt said the informant told Deputy Doug Thomas that Baker's throat had been cut, he had been chained and that concrete blocks had been tied around his body before he was dumped in the lake on the Hysinger Holler side.

Baker has been listed as missing since he did not show up for a May 14 court appearance.

Prewitt said that no one has apparently seen Baker since late April or early May.

As of press time, no body had been found in the lake, but the search continued.

Joe Howard, others file for May primary

With the filing deadline for the May primary only 12 days away, several other Rockcastle Countians have thrown their hat into the political ring.

Among those were Rockcastle County Jailor Joe Howard, who announced his candidacy for re-election on Tuesday.

Howard, 47, has served as Rockcastle Jailor since 1991, finishing the unexpired term of Billy Kirby. Howard was then elected in 1992, defeating five challengers. His closest challenger was Harlan "Buck" Farthing, defeating him by 957 votes.

The jailor and his wife, Geneva, also deputy jailor, live in Mt. Vernon.

Howard said Tuesday that he thought he was the most qualified candidate for the job because of his eighteen years of experience in corrections.

Other filings include: Bill W. Dowell, 60, of Mt. Vernon, incumbent county coroner. Dowell, a republican has served as coroner since 1966.

Incumbent Sheriff Shirley Smith, 59, of Wildcat, for Sheriff. David Abney, 58, of Mt. Vernon for Sheriff.

Jim King, 47, of Mt. Vernon for Sheriff. King has resigned as constable in district two.

Facing some problems

Schools have 352 computers

Rockcastle County Schools are moving into the computer age in a big way - with possibly some big problems.

Technology Coordinator for Rockcastle Schools, Kelli Pensol, told the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Tuesday night, that the local system has 352 computers in the school system that the state department considers adequate to do the work needed in training local students. And 300 of those computers, (48%) are networked together and have access to the Internet.

Pensol said the goal of the school system was to have 937 computers district-wide, which would take care of all computer needs, according to the state department's (KETS).

The Kentucky Educational Technology System, by which all school districts model their technology curricula, was part of the sweeping Kentucky Educational Reform Act.

Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith told Mrs. Pensol that the board had received some complaints from principals in the school system about computer breakdowns. Griffith said that MVES principal Rose Brown told the board that on the average

20% of the school's computers are down.

Mrs. Pensol said that she agreed there was a problem, mainly because of the constant changes in networking and the increasing number of computers in the system. Mrs. Pensol said that the MVES principal was not the only one to complain either.

The local school system will spend over \$25,000 this year to keep their technology program in good shape, with \$16,200 of that being paid for one man to come to the school district one day a week for 45 weeks a year.

But Mrs. Pensol said that still wasn't enough to do the job. Mrs. Pensol told the board that in her opinion the school system needed a full-time person to work on the computers in the schools and keep everything running smoothly.

Superintendent Larry Hammond told Mrs. Pensol to come up with dollar figures and some other possible solutions and report back to him.

In other business the board voted to

re-elect Dr. Griffith board chairman and Terry Burton vice-chairman for the coming year.

*approve the 1998-99 draft budget, which will be approximately \$17.5 million.

*approve new lights for the Rockcastle County High School football field and running track at the middle school at a cost of \$83,671.

The board also reviewed the superintendent's personnel actions report which included:

*hiring of Jessica Robin Rumsey as a fourth grade teacher at MVES.
*hiring of April D. Harris, lan-

PROBOSCIS BOVA, CHILDREN OF AN EYIL AGE, greetings and faciliatities - Yes, I made that one up - to you, my beloved readership, from the placid Weald of Wabd, where winter is trying to make a comeback, and where, eighty some years ago, in January, the late Sidney "Nuther" Arlsfarcker, was born. He who was a long-time Wadbonian ball bondman, and part-time self-taught paleontologist. He who said, "I side with those who consider life to be a terrible disappointment, but I want to stay around and be disappointed as long I can."

Then "Nuther," a nickname he embraced for over fifty years, until he went to meet the Almighty a little over a year ago.

Now, beloved, I would be remiss if I did not say that although he was a master at putting off a multitude of matters until a "nuther" day, Nuther was neither lazy nor idle. He always had several projects going at the same time, some of which were simultaneous, especially those that had to do with his interest in paleontology.

Roaming around his father's farm, Nuther came upon, or dug up, bones of all shapes and sizes. Then he would try to find that "fossil" in Rinehardt Hurlbutt's *Back to the Bones*, probably the definitive paleontological text of our times, now in its eleventh edition (published by Wordsmore & Prince of Wisabaw, Michigan. Nuther purchase his copy at a yard sale in Ottawa (Kentucky).

When I taught at the college level,

Hurlbutt's text was "the final word" insofar as my anthropological and paleontological colleagues were concerned. The fundamentalists in that area, however, wanted the book banned because it "sanctioned evolution." And now that the fundys are in charge, Hurlbutt's work cannot be found on the library shelves, or in any professor's office.

But old Nuther liked that text. And now and then, he discovered a bone that resembled "finds" in *Back to the Bones* and would send his specimen to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. for evaluation. He received a reply each time he sent a sample to the Institute.

Occasionally, Nuther found remains for which there was no counterpart in Hurlbutt's text. So, he studied it, theorized about its place in the scheme of fossilized history, and then send his prototype to the Smithsonian, along with his interpretation, to which he always received a reply.

Each reply made Nuther ever more determined to make a "find" that would get him recognized by the American Society of Paleontologists. And not long before he expired, Nuther uncovered what he thought was the "bone of all bones" in Dangers's Cave, up the hill behind Nod's Little Acre. He sent it and his theory to the Smithsonian, certain that this time he had struck pay dirt (pay bone?). And the following is a word for word reproduction of the reply he received. The letter is genuine and exemplifies one public servant's thoughtful consideration and response. So, the next time you think no one in Washington cares, you might want to re-read the following.

Dear Mr. Arlsfarcker,

Thank you for your latest submission to the Institute, labeled 93211-D. We have given the specimen a careful and detailed examination and regret to inform you that we disagree with your theory that it represents conclusive proof of Early Man in Rockcastle County two million years ago. Rather, it appears that what you have found is the head of a Barbie Doll, of the

variety one of our staff members, who has small children, believes in a *Malibu Barbie*.

It is evident that you gave a lot of thought to the analysis of your specimen, and you may be quite certain that those of us who are familiar with your work in the field were loathe to come to contradiction with your findings. However, we do feel that there are a number of physical attributes that might have tipped you off to its modern origin.

1. The material is molded plastic. Ancient hominids are typically fossilized bone.

2. The cranial capacity of the specimen is 9 cubic centimeters, well below the threshold of even the earliest proto-hominid.

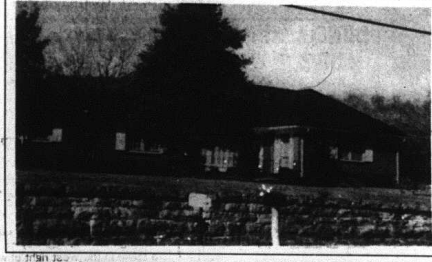

Also, if you own property and did not receive your tax bill, check with the Sheriff's Office or PVA Office to see if we have the correct address.

• Attention Senior Citizens •

The Homestead Exemption for 1998 will be \$24,400. If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the PVA in order to be eligible for this exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, \$24,400 will automatically be deducted from your 1998 assessment, and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application.

• Attention Disabled Persons •

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is **TOTALLY DISABLED**. In order to qualify for this, you must receive 100% disability payments for the entire calendar year and must reapply each year. Your disability must be through the Federal Government or Railroad Retirement Act.

Now 10-5 on season

Rockets beat Lions and Warriors; face Bell Co. Bobcats Friday night

The Rockets got their ninth win of the season, 56-36, last Friday night, against the 0-10 Golden Lions of Garrard County. This equals last year's number of wins for the Rockets and there are still 12 games on the schedule. The Rockets also have five losses on the season, two of those against Clay Co.

At Garrard Co. Friday night, the Rockets may have been overlooking the Lions when the game started. After a 16-7 edge for the Rockets in the first quarter, the Lions came back to put on a 9-0 run and tie the score at the beginning of the second quarter. At half-time, the Rockets only owned a two-point edge, 26-24 and the Lions actually took the lead in the third quarter at 29-28. But the Rockets outscored Garrard 7-3 in the last minutes of the third period to take a 35-32 edge into the final quarter.

The beginning of the fourth quarter saw the Lions go into a stall to try and force the Rockets out of the zone, but, the Rockets, with a 3 point edge, didn't respond and the Lions wound up losing the ball. Blake Childress got the first basket of the fourth quarter for the Rockets. Steve Bradley got all seven of his points in the fourth quarter and the Rocket defense tightened and held the Lions to just four points.

Andrew Cash led the scoring for the Rockets with 12 points; John Brown got 10; Layne Nicely and Blake Childress, 9 each; Steve Bradley and Matt Brown, 7 each and Travis

Anderkin, 2.

Tuesday night, the Rockets topped their season record to 10-5 with a 61-58 win over the Pulaski Southwestern Warriors.

It was a close game all the way, with the Rockets maintaining a small lead most of the time. The Rockets were ahead 20-14 at the end of the first quarter, behind 12 first quarter points by John Brown. However, the Warriors came right back to get the first six points of the second half, tying the score at 20 all and going ahead 28-27 at the 3:26 mark. The Warriors extended their lead to 33-29 before back-to-back goals by Matt Brown, Steve Bradley and Layne Nicely put the Rockets ahead 36-33 at half-time.

But, the Warriors got the first basket to tie the score at 36 all in the second half and, again, Nicely came through with two buckets to give the Rockets a 40-36 lead which they maintained throughout the third quarter for a 48-44 margin at the end of that period.

The Rockets were ahead 52-51 with 4:59 remaining in the game when a Rocket turnover gave the Warriors a basket and the lead but Andrew Cash then canned a three to give the Rockets the edge again. It was 56-55 when Blake Childress got one of two from the free throw line, at the 1:47 mark, to tie the score again and then Childress got an important put-back to give the Rockets the edge 58-56

with just under a minute to play. Following a Warrior time-out, Southwestern got two to tie the score at 58 all with 38 ticks on the clock but then Layne Nicely came through with a jumper to put the Rockets ahead 60-58. By the time the scorekeeper got the clock stopped there was 2.1 seconds on the clock but the referees made them reset the time to six seconds remaining. Travis Anderkin was in position to pick-off the long inbounds pass when he was pushed by a Warrior and went to the line for the double bonus. Anderkin missed the first but got the second for a three point lead for the Rockets and the Warriors, with six seconds still remaining on the clock, were unable to get their shot to fall.

Cash led the scoring for the Rockets with 14; Brown got 13; Nicely and Bradley, 9 each; Childress 7; Matt Brown, 6 and Anderkin 3.

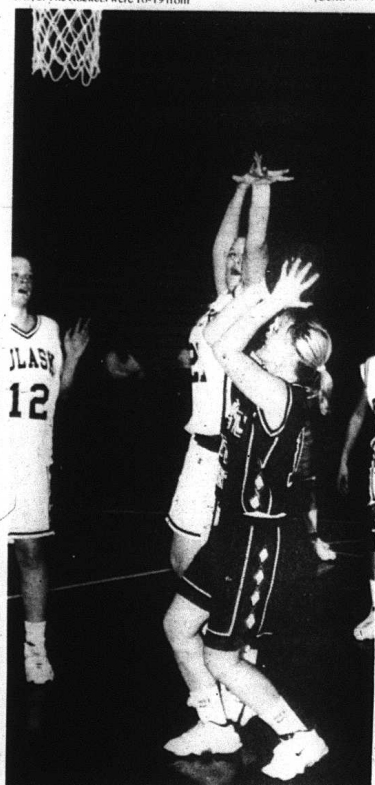
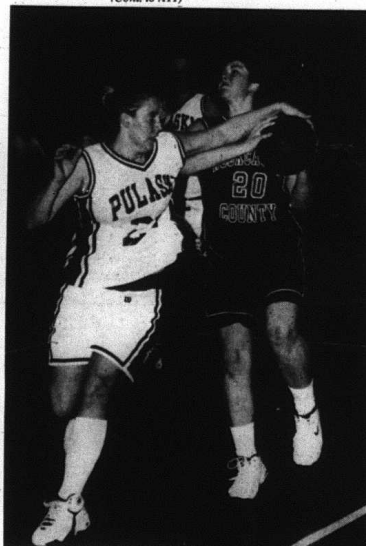
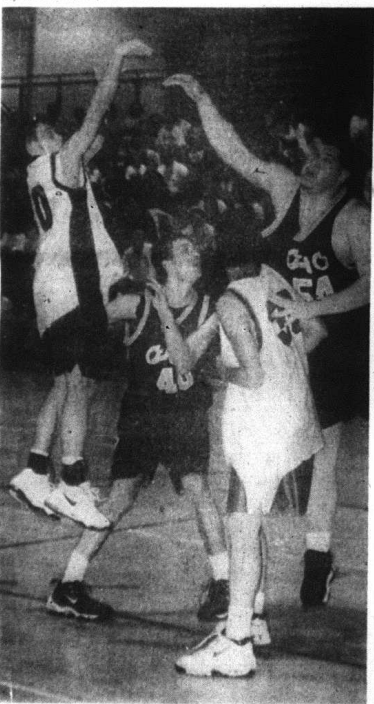
of the season against eight wins.

the free throw line and the Indians canned 11 of 17, with all seven of their final points coming at the charity stripe.

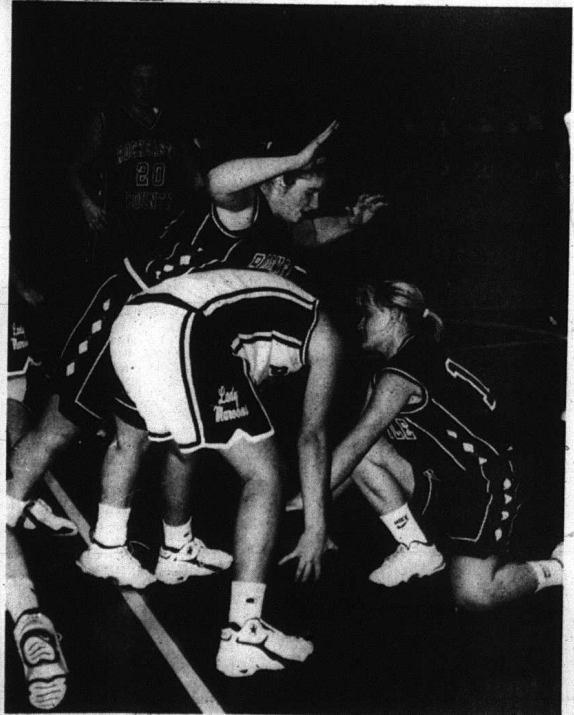
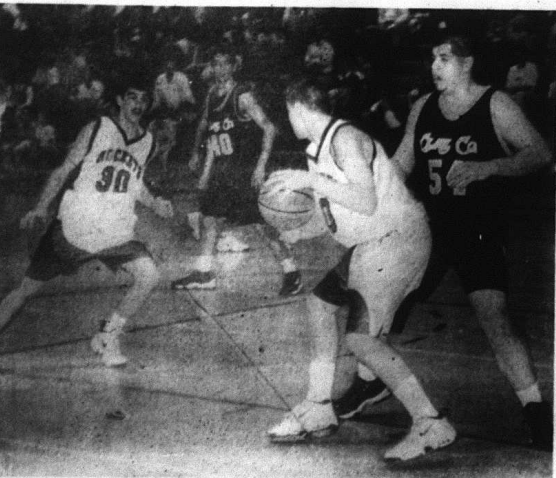

The leading medal winner this

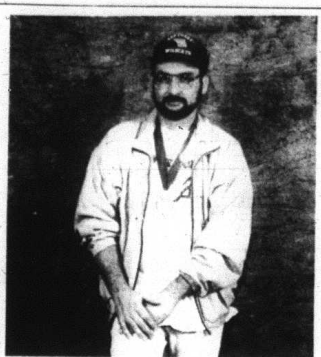
weekend was 41-year old Paul Lau of Fayette County, who took home three medals in Table Tennis.

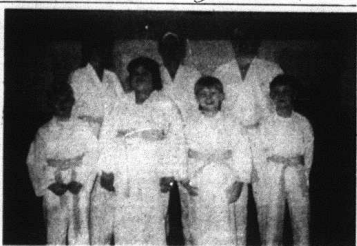

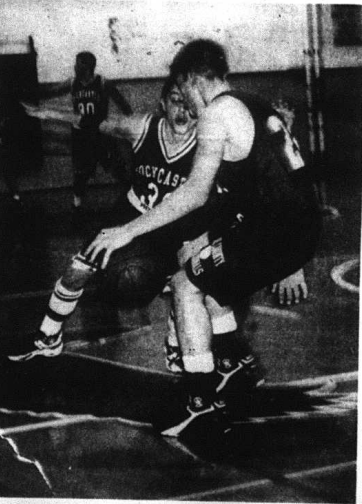

pliance with state laws on the matter. "We have a dog warden and a pin and I believe we are in compliance," Burdette said.

According to Burdette, a state law says, the county's dog warden must keep any dog that is picked up for seven days - giving the owner time to claim it - before destroying it. "I believe we are doing that," he said.

According to the Judge-Executive Skaggs requested the same information from all 120 counties in the state and has sued Morgan County because they do not have a dog warden or a dog pound. "I didn't appreciate some of the things this man said about us and other fiscal courts that he thought were not in compliance, it was unnecessary," Carolitis said. The judge was referring to a letter in 1997 in which Skaggs called members of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court a bunch of redneck god ole boys.

"It seems this man has taken up upon himself to stand up for the rights of all the stray dogs in the state," Carolitis said.

In other business, the court voted to: approve the state's rural secondary road program, which will mean blacktop for five miles of the Sand Springs Road (1956) and blacktop for 3 miles of the Brush Creek Road (1004).

inspect county surveyor Doug Mullins to survey the right of way on the Oscar Isaacs Road near Conway because one land owner, Denver O'Neil, was apparently placing stakes on the county right-of-way. Carolitis said that about 15 families live on the road and if the stakes were not removed it would be a problem for the road, which is maintained by the county.

The court also heard a report on the county jail from Troy Fraley of Architecture Plus on the renovation project at the county jail.

Fraley said that inside demolition work by county inmates was progressing well and requested the court authorize payments of \$9,378 on the project. \$5,500 of that bill was to Architecture Plus for their management fee, which will be due them each month during the project.

Fraley also told the court that because the county is exempt from

paying sales tax, a savings of \$4,643 had been realized on materials for the project this month.

Magistrates also presented Russell Jones and Billy Joe Shafer, employees of the highway department with their requests for work on county roads by the state.

First District Magistrate John Holbrook said that Purr Rigby Road needed worked in his district.

Second District Magistrate Jack Bradley said the Wald-Jones Road which runs between district two and district three needed work. Third District Magistrate Bill McKinney agreed with Bradley.

Fourth District Magistrate Amos Burdette asked for work on the Clear Creek Road and Fifth District Magistrate Donald Bullock submitted a list to Jones and Shafer but did not publicly request work on any road.

Each magistrate also listed other roads in their district. After the magistrates make their requests the state makes the final decision.

The court also voted to put about a half mile of the Halcomb East Road back on the county work program at the request of land owners Joe Roland and Chuck Elrod.

And finally the court voted to transfer \$15,000 to the jail fund from the general fund to cover expenses. Among the bills for the jail this month was \$2,900 payment to Mike Cameron Construction for emergency jail repairs during the Christmas holidays.

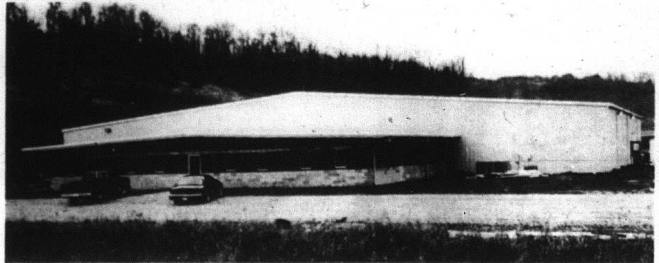
Carolitis said the state threatened to pull prisoners from the jail again, if the repairs were not made within forty-eight hours. Other claims were a \$12,000 payment to Saylor's Pharmacy for medicine for inmates and a \$1,900 bill from the Fayette County Detention Center to house one juvenile offender for 15 days. The court balked on the payment to Fayette County after the county attorney told them the juvenile was the responsibility of the state and not the county.

The money transferred to the jail account was already earmarked for the jail in the 1997-98 budget and the action was merely a formality.

Credit Watch

When was the last time you took a close look at your credit card bill? Do you look at the fine print and all of the other charges on your bill or do you just look at the total? Many credit card issuers are increasing old fees and creating new ones. If you don't look closely, you could be paying for fees that you are unaware of.

Many credit card issuers are charging higher annual fees, high late payment fees, cash advance fees and over the credit limit fees. You may even be charged a fee for paying off your balance on time!

A recent survey of credit card companies showed that their fees have risen substantially over the past two years. Over the limit fees can run as high as \$25 per billing period. Many companies charge \$20 per billing period for being over your credit limit. The number of companies who are charging these fees increases each year. Many consumers mistakenly think that when they reach their credit limit, their charge will be denied. This is not always true. The company

issuing the card may let you go over your credit limit and then charge you an over-the-limit fee until you pay the balance back within the credit limit. This fee is in addition to your interest charge each month.

Many companies charge late payment fees as high as \$20 per billing period. In some cases, this fee is assessed to your account if your payment is only one day late. In the past most credit card companies gave you a grace period up to 30 days after the due date before charging a late fee. Some credit card companies increase the interest rate on your balance when you have a late fee. Again, read the fine print. Some companies raise the interest rate as much as 5 or 7%.

Often a credit card company will raise the rate to "Prime Rate" plus 12% or 13%. It doesn't take long to have an interest rate well over 21%.

If you are one of those people who transfer your credit card balance from one card to another every six months to take advantage

of the low introductory interest rates, be sure the new card won't charge you a cash advance fee and special interest on the amount you transfer. Check to see if there is a fee for balance transfers.

Be sure that you read the fine print that comes with your credit card bill. Make a note of any changes that are mentioned. You may find a notice that the annual fee has risen \$10 to \$20 with more services offered for it. These usually appear as a bill stuffer with your monthly statement. Be alert for words like "Important Notice of Change in Terms".

Make every effort to pay more

than the minimum balance due if you carry a balance. Sometimes, just paying the minimum balance actually increases the balance due next month. This is because of the extra fees that are added to your bill. Pay attention and try to reduce your credit card debt.

Lice Control on Beef Cattle



Lice populations build up on livestock in the colder periods of the year when the environment on the animal is more conducive to lice survival. During the summer, lice life cycle (eggs, nymphs and adults) exists only on cattle. None of the life stages can survive off the host. They cannot survive on other types of livestock or humans.

Lice are transferred from animal to animal by contact. In this fashion, an entire herd can become infested. During the summer, lice numbers are very low and usually concentrate on a few "carrier" animals. Late summer and fall is a good time to try to eliminate lice from the herd. However, if this is not followed, there is still time to eliminate lice before they have a great effect on cattle. Lice biology makes it feasible to totally eliminate these pests from a herd if all animals are thoroughly treated.

All animals must be treated -- if only one animal is left infested, that animal can serve as the

reinfestation source for the rest of the herd.

1. Treat each animal twice -- the first insecticide treatment kills the adult and nymph stage lice but leaves the eggs unaffected. The second treatment, 2-3 weeks after the first, kills the nymphs that have hatched from these eggs.

2. Keep the herd isolated from non-treated cattle -- any non-treated animal serves as a potential reinfestation source. Any new animals brought into the herd must be put through the "Double Treatment" program before they are allowed to join the herd. Also, cattle should be kept out of contact with neighboring herds unless those animals have also been put through a similar "lice elimination" program.

As you think about controlling lice, there are many effective ways and the cost varies with products used. Contact your local vet for the proper type of compound to

The Family Room

Parenting Teenagers is a Tough Assignment

"If you don't bring your grades up next semester," Norm shouted, "you'll be grounded for a year! You won't even get to see the car keys." (Norm and his family are fictitious characters.)

Norm's outburst came at the end of a long, loud and unproductive argument with Junior. Junior did not seem particularly disturbed by the three D's on his report card, and this irked Norm. (If Norm were honest, he would have to admit that, when he was in high school, he didn't care much about his grades either.)

Do you have a teenager in your house? Does parenting teenagers is either blind or unfaithful. Parenting adolescents is a tough assignment!

Being a teenager is also a difficult job. So much physical and emotional development occurs between thirteen and nineteen that it is a wonder any one survives with his or her sanity intact. There are few affirming us who would want to go through adolescence again.

Parents, there is help available. The book is **How to Sign the Battle With Your Teenager** by Don Fleming. Dr. Fleming describes the developmental processes of the teen years. Many things about which parents worry (hair, clothes) are not that serious. These are stages on the road to adulthood and will pass.

The young son will not behave at age thirty-five like he does at age now. Even though his room now looks like the aftermath of a hurricane, this doesn't mean that he will still be like that when he is an adult. Although he seems to care little about school now, this does not mean he will be the same twenty years from now.

Dr. Fleming suggests that parents look at their own attitudes. He seems to think that parents may be a part of the problem! If parents approach teenagers with a critical, negative attitude, there will probably be a fight. For example, the way in which Norm talks to Junior about his grades only makes the situation worse.

Those of us who (attempt to) parent teenagers know how difficult this job can be. We should not feel like failures because there are problems: every family has problems.

The parent who can stay calm and in control, even while Junior has an outburst, has gone a long way toward

improving the relationship with his teenager. Sometimes we parent just our teenager in acting like an adolescent, and we throw our own tantrum while he throws his. This is not a pleasant experience for either party.

There are, however, some ways we can improve the quality of our parenting. If we parents can bring our own emotions under control, we will

have a much easier time dealing with our teenager children and their emotional outbursts.

Agricultural News

The USDA Service Center will be closed on Monday, January 19, in observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

The Rockcastle County FSA Committee held their first meeting of the year on Thursday, January 8, beginning at 8:00 a.m., at which time they elected their officers. Clarence Raymond Brown was voted Chairman of the committee, Darrell Whitaker was voted Vice-Chairman, and Joe Bullen was elected member. Burley tobacco producers are reminded to promptly return their marketing cards to the office as soon as all sales are final.

The Burley tobacco penalty rate for 1997-98 is \$1.44/LB.

The 1998 Burley Tobacco Referendum will be held in February. All eligible producers are encouraged to vote. Eligible voters include: owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers engaged in the production of burley tobacco; owners whose tobacco is under the CRP program; and owners who lease out their tobacco quota.

As a condition for approving a burley tobacco disaster lease, an application for disaster credit must be filed by the producer before the crop is harvested. Due to weather-related conditions an exception has been made for the 1997 crop year to also accept disaster credit applications after the crop has been harvested.

The following conditions must be met: Crop must have been affected

by a natural disaster or disease and suffered at least a 20% loss, sufficient acreage planted to produce the effective quota. COC approves the application. Producers who have a loss, and think they may want to disaster lease, should contact the office. Deadline for disaster leasing is February 17th.

Youth who are involved in 4-H, FFA or other similar activities may be eligible to receive needed funding to develop income-producing projects through FSA's Farm Loan Program. Loans of up to \$5000 are available to assist youth in financing the items which are necessary to establish their project. Loan repayments will be scheduled to coincide with the project's income schedule.

"It is Written"

We continue our look at the five acts of worship that are described in the New Testament for us. We are using Acts 2:42-47 as our outline of studies. Thus far we have looked at "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread." Today, we look at how they continued in "prayers" as an act of worship.

Prayer is talking to God. In Acts 4 we have a great passage that helps define what prayer is. In vs. 23-24 we read, "And being let go, they went to their own company, and reported all that the chief priests and elders had said unto them. And when they heard that, they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou art God which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them lie." Notice "they lifted up their voice to God." Then after their words are recorded, we read in vs. 31, "And when they had prayed, the place was shaken where they were assembled together; and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and they spoke the word of God with boldness." So here is a simple definition of prayer. Notice also, that they prayed "with one accord," which necessarily implies that someone led them in prayer, and that everyone else followed his lead. Prayers are to be offered in faith, James 1:5-8. We are to pray according to his will, 1 John 5:14. "And this is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask any thing according to his will, he heareth us." Jesus gives us the model prayer in Matt. 6:9-13. Prayers of the righteous will be avail, help, benefit, and aid much. James 5:16. "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much." Absolutely nothing is said in the Bible about praying to Mary, such is foolishly sinful. Let us close with the words of Luke 11:1, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples." and 1 Thes. 5:17, "Pray without ceasing."
