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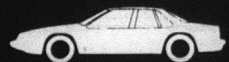
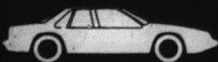

B&H Tool Works Rockcastle welcomes new employer

Rockcastle Countians welcomed a new employer to the county on Thursday, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony for B&H Tool Works of Rockcastle County.

About 100 people attended the ceremony at the new plant in Rockcastle Industrial Park #2. B&H is the first plant to build in the new park, located off Old Hwy. 461 near Mt. Vernon.

The plant is an expansion of B&H Tool Works of Richmond. The company was started by two Richmond men, Sammy Hammons and Tommy Brown, in 1983.

The Rockcastle plant will initially employ 25 to 30 people but many more could be hired depending on the amount of work, according to general manager Everett Harper of Brodhead.

The new 24,000 square feet facility is located on a two-acre site, but B&H has an option on eight more acres in the park. Harper said he hopes the eight acres would be needed, meaning there would be more jobs.

B & H President Sammy Hammons said he was looking forward to working in Rockcastle because of the excellent work force in this area. He commended Rockcastle Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolitis for his cooperation on the project.

Along with Carlolitis, 5th District U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset and Rockcastle Industrial Authority President John Clontz welcomed B & H to the county.

Harper said the Rockcastle operation will focus on smaller, less intricate dies, giving the company a competitive edge with an expanded customer base and expanded product line.

In 1996 the Richmond B&H Tool plant had sales of \$6 million and 116 employees.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony at B&H was also held in conjunction with the opening of the new industrial park.

Harper said that B&H Rockcastle is taking applications, but will not be hiring for about a month.

Divers to be brought in No body found in search of Lake Linville

A search of Lake Linville for a local man, missing since last May, has proved fruitless thus far.

But, search dogs did pick up the scent of something, police believe may be the dead boy on the Hysinger Hollow side of the lake, according to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan.

Doan said Monday that members of the Rockcastle Rescue Squad had dragged areas of the lake looking for the body of Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon but did not locate him.

An anonymous tip from a local resident last week led police to the lake on Wednesday and Thursday.

The informant told police that Baker had been killed in late April or early May and that his body was dumped into the lake.

The informant said Baker's throat was cut and his body had been tied to concrete blocks before he was dumped into the lake.

Baker has been listed as missing

since he did not show up for a May 14 district court appearance.

Doan said that the Sheriff's office would bring in divers from the Kentucky State Police to conduct a more thorough search of the Hysinger Hollow side of the lake. "We definitely think the body is in the lake," Doan said.

1,500 more registered to vote in May primary

When the Primary Election rolls around on May 26th, there will be at least 1,500 more registered voters in Rockcastle County than there was in the last county election.

According to figures in County Clerk Norma Houck's office, 10,095 Rockcastle countians are currently registered to vote.

In January of 1993, four months before that year's county election 8,517 residents were eligible to vote.

As in 1993, more people are registered to vote in West Brodhead than any other precinct. 1,143 are cur-

rently registered in West Brodhead, as opposed to 986 in that precinct in 1993.

However there are more registered voters in magisterial district number two than any other, with district three being a close second.

District two has 2,331 voters, district three has 2,295.

District two is made up of up South Mt. Vernon, West Livingston and West Mt. Vernon voting precincts.

Besides West Brodhead, district three is made up of Brown and Bullock.

The largest voting precinct in dis-

trict two is West Mt. Vernon with 1,087.

In 1993, district two had 1,937 voters, district three had 1,990.

The largest Republican precinct in the county is West Mt. Vernon with 874 Republicans registered.

The largest Democrat precinct in the county is West Brodhead where 338 Democrats are registered. But, 771 Republicans are also registered in that precinct.

All total, 7,774 Republicans are registered in the county and 1,959

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Attention Taxpayers

If you have built a new house, garage, barn, etc., purchased or sold a mobile home or made any changes in your existing property since last year, it is especially important that you notify the PVA Office as soon as possible. Also, if you own property and did not receive your tax bill, check with the Sheriff's Office or PVA Office to see if we have the correct address.

Attention Senior Citizens

The Homestead Exemption for 1998 will be \$24,400. If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the PVA in order to be eligible for this exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, \$24,400 will automatically be deducted from your 1998 assessment, and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application.

Attention Disabled Persons

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is **TOTALLY DISABLED**. In order to qualify for this, you must receive 100% disability payments for the entire calendar year and must reapply each year. Your disability must be through the Federal Government or Railroad Retirement Act.

Some People Are Dangerous To Your Health

"I don't mean to hurt your feelings, but..." When anyone says this to you, you can bet that the next statement is going to be one that will hurt you. When you hear the first few words of this statement, run—don't walk—run to the nearest exit.

There are other comments that usually mean it is time to get away from the person making them. Some people are dangerous to your mental health and are best avoided. Beware of people who say the following:

"I don't mean to be critical, but..." When someone says this to you, you can bet that he or she is getting ready to criticize you. Don't believe

her when she says that she "don't mean to be kidding."

"I was only critical. Why are you so upset?" This usually follows a cutting, critical comment. If you seem to object to what someone has said, he covers his tracks by claiming that he just meant it as a joke. Beware of these people! Sarcastic joking can cause you much pain.

"God has given me a message for you." (A variation on this is "I know what God wants you to do.") I am very wary around people who seem to have a direct pipeline to God about me and my life. Direct pipelines are great for handling your own life, but I am suspicious of someone who knows what God wants me to do. No

one else knows what is best for my life, and cloaking his opinion in religious language still does not give him the right to impose it on me.

"I'm not an alcoholic. I don't drink every day." Any time you hear someone defending his or her drinking habit, watch out. Someone who has no drinking problem feels no need to defend his drinking. The person who does have a drinking problem lives in denial of this fact and feels the need to defend himself when his problem is mentioned. This is one of those cases where "I'm thinks he doth protest too much!"

"I only hit my wife once." Does this mean it is OK to hit your wife if you only do it once? Even once is too much. This is another case of protest, just too much. I would not be surprised to find that there was other abuse in this situation. If he is willing to confess to one abusive incident, what else might he have done?

You don't like me anymore, do

you?" This can be an honest statement of doubt about a relationship. However, it can also be a manipulative attempt to get attention and pity. The speaker may expect you to respond with great assurances of your love and affection for him. He wants you to feel responsible for him so that you will stay in the relationship with him.

"I'm telling you this for your own good." This comment is usually followed by a critical remark. Most of us already know what we are doing wrong, and do not need it pointed out to us.

hausted all methods of "traditional" delivery have found a new pool of victims because it is harder to differentiate the size or legitimacy of a business based on their website. Further, the comparative normal cost of e-mail distribution and the ease of placing phony testimonials in a chat room have added to the allure of the Internet.

The deceptive advertising snares victims every time. While the BBB sees new informatics on television and hears radio ads picked up from national programming, the majority of the scams can still be seen through classified ads placed in newspapers and magazines. In fact, the newspaper industry has even started a "CaechSCAM Network" offering informational classified ads from the BBB and the Federal Trade Commission among others, along with an alert system for the papers to identify and pull the phony ads. One new twist — the classified ads are more enticing in their design to get you to call them, so they — the questionable companies — can skirt the new federal telemarketing laws.

Now that you know the catalyst behind these scams and the ways in which they reach you, it's time to focus on the Better Business Bureau's top three predicted scams for 1998. They can be summed up as Back to Basics."

#1 Phony Job Offers: These include bogus classified ads and in-

creasingly sophisticated work-at-home offers. That "management trainee" offer, that "guaranteed postal job" and ANY ad that claims you can earn "big bucks" working few hours, in the comfort of your own home. Work-at-home offers topped the nation last year as the number one most inquired-about business' throughout the Better Business Bureau system-locally, the BBB handled 1,204 inquiries about specific offers. Curious about the newest variations of work-at-home offers? Mystery shoppers, coupon clippers and computer commuters! Yes, you too can make easy money... all you need to do is send in \$49.95 (maybe more, maybe less) to find out more information. NOT! The BBB offers this free advice: don't waste your money.

#2 Advance Fee Loan offers: After a five year hiatus, this offer is making its way around the country once again. Typically presented to you as a "guaranteed loan", regardless of your credit history, this scam always involves an up front fee average between \$200-\$500. The point

to remember is that if a local financial institution located in your own community is unable to grant you a loan, what makes you think some out-of-state (and in most instances none, some out-of-country) entity is going to guarantee you a loan without knowing anything about you. The key is

"It is Written"

We conclude our series of studies on worshipping in spirit and in truth (Jn.4:23-24). God's goodness and favor provokes the saints to sing unto the Lord, Psalms 13:6, "I will sing unto the LORD, because he hath dealt bountifully with me." We need to sing with understanding, 1 Corinthians 14:15, "What is it then? I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also. I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also." Yes, let heaven and earth sing his praise. Finally, let me make note that instrumental music in worship today, is without divine authorization, and therefore is a work of iniquity, Mt.7:21-23!

Better Business Bureau predicts top scams of 1998

What's new in 1998? Your Better Business Bureau predicts the year's top three scams based on statistical information from the preceding year and emerging market trends. Our predictions for the top scams of 1997 held true, as we witnessed an increase in personal identity fraud, dialing unfamiliar area codes, and phony business opportunities. Consumers and businesses alike are advised to learn more about these newly predicted scams and in most cases, to BEWARE!

This year, our predictions for the top scams have several common denominators. The catalyst seems to be "something for nothing" offers that prey on one's basic needs and wants... they are each "too good to be true." Additionally, the ways in which these questionable offers target consumers are the same. There are four different delivery mechanisms and at least one of them is used in every scam: mail box bandits, telemarketing fraud, scams in cyberspace, and deceptive print and broadcast advertising.

The mail box bandits lurking behind phony solicitations are after only one thing — your money. This year, the U.S. Postal Service will deliver

more than 180 billion pieces of mail, including some interesting, appealing and attractive direct mail solicitations. Unfortunately, some of these pieces come from scam artists, and consumers need to be able to differentiate the good from the bad.

Telemarketing fraud is at an all time high, even as federal legislation has been toughened over the last several years to combat the problem. Solicitations to your home and business will continue to target you through the telephone as long as legitimate companies are allowed to market their products in this manner. The problem is with the boiler rooms set up to victimize whomever answers their phone, and as the U.S. takes steps to protect their citizens, the bad guys are crossing the border into Canada without skipping a beat. A new multinational task force called "Phone Busters" has been established in Canada to deal with the explosion of telemarketing fraud that is originating from that country with the intended victim sitting on U.S. soil.

Widespread use of the Internet as the technological marketplace has made scams in cyberspace a growing concern. Con artists who had ex-

that they charge you money up-front, and most victims learn the hard way that they never see their cash again - not the promised loan and not their advance fee. Stay away from these types of offers all together.

#3 Credit Repair and Credit Protection Services: Mistakes in credit reports have been consumer's #1 problem according to the Federal Trade Commission. But what consumers need to know is that now - thanks to a new federal law - fixing credit errors is easier than ever before. The BBB recommends that consumers get in the habit of checking their credit report (at all three major reporting agencies) on an annual basis. If you find something out of order, you simply notify the credit bureau and they must investigate your claim within 30 days by giving the creditor who made the mistake whatever evidence you submit to prove the information is inaccurate. If there are extenuating circumstances, at the very least, the credit bureau must provide your explanation alongside the item in question. Companies who offer credit counseling service are growing at a fast pace, as are places who claim they can "fix" your credit, regardless of the circumstances. Remember, the rule of thumb is that accurate, negative information that appears on your credit report will

stay there for up to seven years, and bankruptcy actions will remain on the books for up to ten years. Before spending the hundreds or thousands of dollars being charged to provide this service, spend some of your time first. Do your homework and see what you can do for free. Also, with growing consumer debt, the BBB is seeing an increase in credit card protection services. At its worst, some telemarketers are touting a non-existent law that claims senior citizens now have to purchase credit card protection services. Federal law states you are only held liable for up to \$50 if you have a credit card stolen or lost, as long as you report it immediately.

BBB Advice: As you carry out your New Year's resolutions, resolve to become an educated consumer, and to operate an educated workplace, training your employees on how they can best protect your business and themselves. Reliability reports on specific companies may be obtained by calling the Better Business Bureau's 24 Hour Line, 606-259-1008 or 1-800-866-6668 (toll free throughout Kentucky). For quick service 24 hours/day, seven days/week, have the company's 10-digit phone number ready, or a BBB service representative can be accessed between the hours of 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Except for one three point basket by the Bobcats, all the points in overtime came from the charity stripe. Childress got the tip for the Rockets and Cash got the first points of the

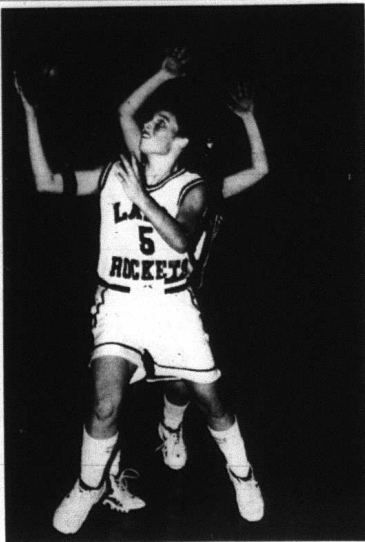

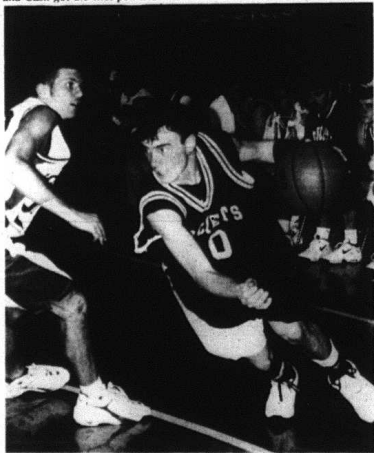
Against Monticello, the Lady Rockets also never encountered any problems, holding the Lady Trojans scoreless the first and fourth quarters for the 30-14 win.

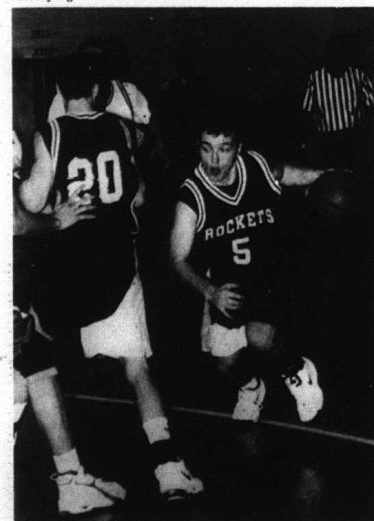

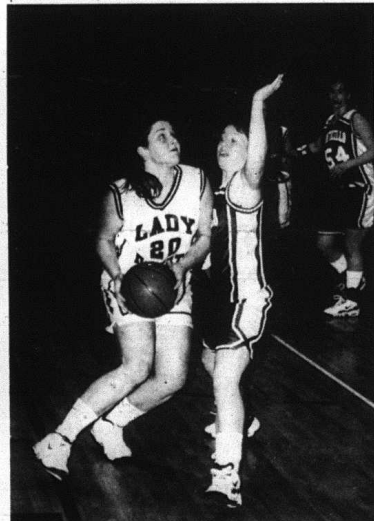
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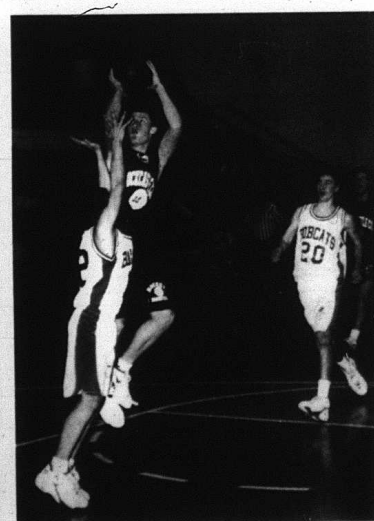

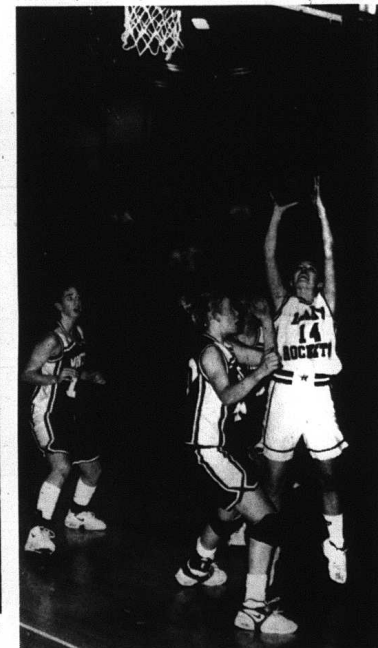

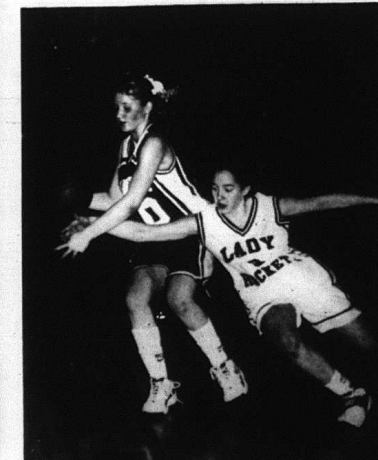
Senior center Suzanne Brown looks for the goal against a Lady Trojan defender. The Rockets won 74-43 and Brown had 10 points.

Because of chemical weapons stockpile in Madison Co. County one of 40 eligible for communication funds from federal government

Because of the government's aging chemical weapons stockpile in Richmond, Rockcastle County is only one of forty counties eligible for federal funds to upgrade their communications system.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolitis told members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last week that since the federal government considered Rockcastle residents at risk because of the location of the county, Rockcastle emergency response organizations have a chance to totally revamp their communication systems at the federal government's expense.

Carlolitis said that he had met with federal and state officials, who told him that Rockcastle was one of only 40 counties in the nation that qualifies for federal funds for communications equipment. There are approximately 3,300 counties in the United States.

Because much of the communications equipment used by local departments is outdated, a representative of the Federal Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program asked that all emergency response agencies compile a complete inventory of equipment they now have and who owns what. In many cases fire fighters throughout

Democrats are eligible to vote. There are also 362 registered voters from other parties such as the Communist Party, Taxpayers Party, Reform Party, Independent Party and Libertarian Party.

District One, which is the only district with only two precincts, has the lowest number of voters with 1,688. District One is comprised of North Mt. Vernon and North Brodhead.

District Four, which is comprised of Conway, Roundstone and Climax, has 1,953 voters.

District Five, which is comprised of East Mt. Vernon, Orlando and East Livingston, has 1,828 voters.

There are 5,037 females voters in the county and 5,037 male voters. Mrs. Hook attributes the increase in the number of registered voters to the Motor Voter Law.

Before the Kentucky General Assembly passed the law, everyone had to register in the county clerk's office, but now, anyone that gets a new driver's license or renews an old one can register in the circuit clerk's office as well.

Anyone wishing to vote in the upcoming May primary has until April 27 at 4 p.m. to do so in the clerk's office.

You must be at least 18 years old on or before the General Election on November 3.

You must be a U.S. citizen, a Kentucky resident, a resident of Rockcastle County for at least 28 days prior to the election date and cannot be a convicted felon.

Anyone that has been judged mentally incompetent in a court of law is also ineligible to register.

Also, anyone registering does not have the right to vote anywhere outside the state.

the county own their own radios. Carlolitis said during a mock disaster, a member of the state's disaster and emergency services department praised the county's emergency response departments because of the good job they were able to do with antiquated communications equipment now in use.

Carlolitis said that a 911 dispatch must in place in the county before the funds for the new communications equipment would be approved, but he said that G.T.E. told the 911 board on Tuesday night that the countdown for the basic 911 system in the county was on.

They have assured me that when they get done our communications

system will be state of the art, fire departments, ambulance service, sheriff's department, they will all be able to communicate anywhere in the county," the Judge-Executive said.

"On 911 - the board reviewed applications for dispatchers on Tuesday night and pulled out approximately 12 to interview.

"They also voted to begin mapping of the county in February for the 911 enhanced system, which will be put in place after each roadway, home and business in the county is identified.

"Currently, the county receives about \$12,000 a month from G.T.E., which bills county phone customers a monthly fee of \$2.00 per line.

Tobacco Expo '98 set for January 21 in Lexington

The new yearly Tobacco Expo will be held January 21 at Heritage Hall in downtown Lexington.

"Tobacco Expo '98 promises to provide tobacco producers up-to-date information that will help them in their next year's production and marketing," said George Duncan, Extension agricultural engineer with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The day-long show will begin at 8 a.m. with a viewing of the 65 commercial exhibits. Following that, presentations will focus on heating and cooling of tobacco greenhouses, field

curing structures, grower experiences with mechanical burley harvesters and disease control for the 1998 growing season. Presentations on migrant labor programs and the need for tobacco production research will conclude the morning session, he said.

The afternoon session will focus on tobacco policy considerations, tobacco transplant certification, pesticide sampling programs and the future of tobacco in the Kentucky economy. A discussion of the tobacco program and quota changes for the coming year will follow, Duncan said.

Signup up Livestock Indemnity Program ends February 20

Severe winter weather conditions in some states have caused significant livestock losses. Pub. L. 105-119, Departments of Commerce, Justice and State, the Judiciary and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 1998, was signed by the President on November 26, 1997. This Act provides for the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP).

Signup for LIP begins on January 20, 1998, and ends on February 20, 1998. Producers with eligible losses from 1997 were the result of damaging weather or related conditions may file an application for benefits anytime during this signup period.

A specific amount of money is available and, therefore, a factor must be determined. Producer shall file applications for benefits in the county where the loss occurred.

LIP is in effect only for counties that had losses from March 1, 1997, through November 26, 1997 that requested a Presidential or Secretarial disaster declaration. (Rockcastle is an eligible county.)

Eligible livestock are beef and dairy cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, including egg-producing poultry, and equine animals used for food or in the production of food.

Producers must provide verification of eligible losses and inventories claimed. COC's may accept a third-party verification of losses as the sole source of verification only when no other form or verification is available. Spot checks will be required with a farm visit for all applications that rely solely on third-party verification to support the beginning inventory, losses and ending inventory, according to handbook regulations.

Interested producers should contact the Rockcastle Farm Service Agency by close of business February 20, 1998.

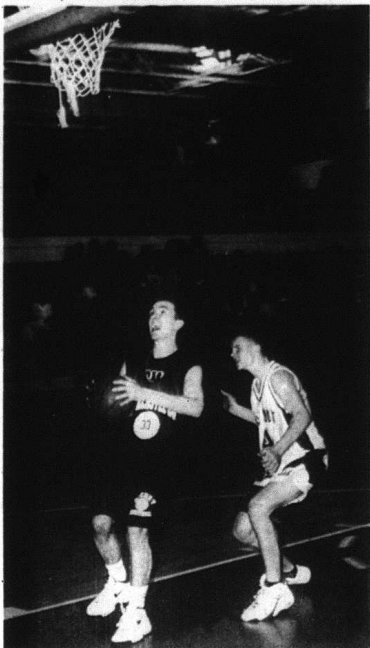

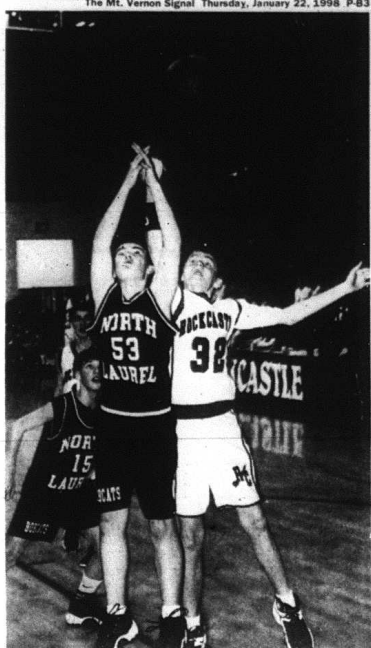

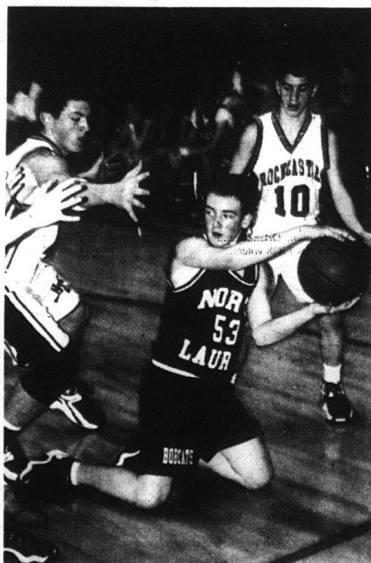

Usually about the time that my alarm clock goes off just before 6:00 a.m., I will hear the gravel crunch on Charlie Brown Road in front of my house. Then, after a pause of two or three seconds, I'll hear a vehicle accelerate and move on down the road. Immediately after that, ole Blue, our watch mutt will bark an alarm and I will know that my Herald Leader is safe in its box on the other side of the road. A more ambitious dog than Blue would fetch the paper and bring it to the front door but Blue figures that at his job description doesn't include any duties beyond making half-hearted announcements. I'm also sure that if he had his drawers, the paper wouldn't arrive until early afternoon.

For several years we lived on highway 52, the main drag between Lancaster and Richmond/Berea. I can never reason the Lexington paper wouldn't talk a delivery person to me by our house and that's a mystery to me even to this day. I'll bet we went in at least a dozen subscription orders over the years, just in case they changed their minds.

I never even crossed my mind that we'd be able to get daily paper delivery on Charlie Brown Road because we're not exactly on the beaten path. In fact, our road is probably the only one in the county where crab grass comes up through cracks in the asphalt.

But one day there was a card in the mail box which Loretta dutifully filled with and the next evening Tina Lainhart was on the phone wanting to know exactly where we lived. At the end of the conversation Mrs. Lainhart promised that her husband would start

delivery the next morning.

In the meantime I'm thinking that we might get one paper if, in fact, Mr. Lainhart was able to find our place. I mean there are politicians and vacuum cleaner salesmen in the county that don't know where we live. But early the next morning, just before daylight, I heard the little Geo Tracker first and then Pauch and it's been like that ever since.

Actually it's been better than that. Back in the good old days, at another residence, during cold, wet weather we might skip two or three days in a row and then get several papers when the weather fared up. We once had a paper carrier who didn't get out if there was a heavy frost and that was a bit upsetting. On the other hand, I don't expect anybody to do something that I wouldn't do and that includes risking my life to deliver a newspaper.

Over the last year we've missed one paper because a substitute driver couldn't find our house and another because the Herald Leader messed up getting the paper to the Lainharts. On two other occasions, the paper has been late because of road conditions.

On all four occasions we have received personal, hand-written letters of apology and explanation and the Lainharts have deducted the price of that day's paper from our monthly bill.

I've been subscribing to the Herald Leader for more than thirty years except for those three or so where we couldn't get delivery and I've never had service this wonderful.

I spoke with Tina Lainhart on the

phone Saturday night and learned that the route is really her husband, Randall's. Tina has a factory job in Berea where she is occasionally laid off, but when she isn't working her day job she says she loves to run the paper route.

And when Randall is late for any reason or if Tina feels like a customer needs a little personal attention she makes sure the correspondence happens.

"We just treat people like we'd want to be treated," she says.

And there are about 150 of those people scattered along a 95 mile route weekdays and 105 miles weekends. The day begins before 3:00 in the morning when one or the other of the Lainharts leaves Narrow Gap in Garrard County to pick up the day's delivery about five miles south of Berea on Highway 21. Then its through several subdivisions, zig-zag-

ging along the mainroad, back-roads and farm country to the edge of Lancaster before winding up back in Narrow Gap for breakfast just after the crack of dawn.

Folks, if you live in Madison County or Garrard Counties between Berea and Lancaster and you don't subscribe to the Herald Leader because the delivery is so unpredictable, I'm here to tell you that all that's changed. If you're going to quarrel about the service you'll get from Tina and Randall Lainhart, you need to join a grouch club, buy some t-shirts and identify yourself as "GRUMPY".

Tina says there are a few roads that they can't afford to serve unless they get more before 3:00 in the morning, but to give them a call at 606-925-3040 in the evening and she'll be glad to see if they can't serve you.

And if you like your news fresh and early like I do, you'll be glad you made the call.

Application for disaster credit must be filed by the producer before the crop is harvested. Due to weather related conditions, an exception has been made for the 1997 crop year to also accept disaster credit applications after the crop has been harvested. The following conditions must be met: Crop must have been affected by a natural disaster or disease and suffered at least a 20% loss, sufficient acreage planted to produce the effective quota. COC approves the application. Producers who have a loss, and think they may want to disaster lease, should contact the office. Deadline for disaster leasing is February 17th.

Youth who are involved in 4-H, FFA or other similar activities may be eligible to receive needed funding to develop income producing project through FSA's Farm Loan Program. Loans of up to \$5000 are available to assist youth in financing the items

which are necessary to establish their project. Loan repayments will be scheduled to coincide with the projects income schedule.

Producers who have more than 10 acres of non-industrial forestland may apply for Stewardship Incentive Program (SIP) benefits. This program includes cost share for establishing or re-establishing stands of trees through planting or direct seeding of trees for conservation and sustainable timber production, forest improvement and to maintain or improve water quality and soil productivity on forest land and to restore wetlands. As a condition for approving a burley tobacco disaster lease, an ap-

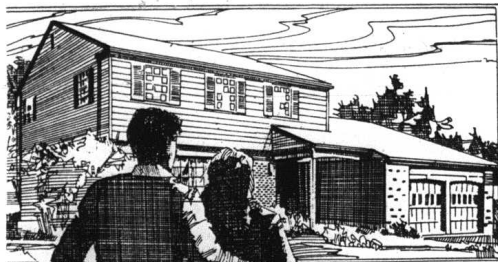

- To provide experiences for the learner to exercise civic responsibility and to have due regard for cultural

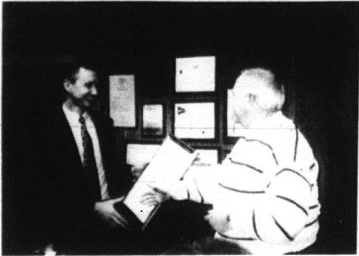
heritage:

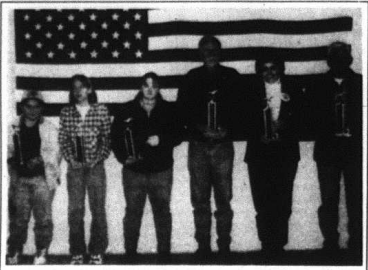

Winter Tetany in Beef Cattle

What is Winter Tetany?
Winter Tetany is basically grass tetany. Since this disorder occurs during winter months when cattle are not receiving pasture, the term winter is used to denote the difference.

Winter tetany or grass tetany is a cow disorder caused by an abnormally low amount of magnesium in the animals blood. This is caused primarily by the cow's feed being low in magnesium. When grasses are used for feed, this condition will mainly occur in spring. However, some herds will experience the same problem on store feeds during January, February and March.

Grass tetany is usually confined to females and is more likely to occur in older animals. Cows are more susceptible during their third and fourth lactations. The animals exhibit milk fever symptoms and may begin to walk stiffly or stagger. Their appetites may decrease, and they usually become very dull in appearance. In many cases they will isolate themselves from the herd. As the disorder progresses, the animal sometimes becomes very nervous and occasionally has muscle tremors and will exhibit rapid breathing. In advanced cases the animal will collapse, go into convulsions and die. The disorder can run its course rapidly, and unless corrective measures are taken, death sometimes can occur less than an hour after the onset of visible symptoms.

The magnesium level in the blood is low, it is mainly due to a low level of magnesium in the animal's feed. Some reasons why magnesium may be low in the animal's feed are species of grass, soil nutrient status, potassium levels and weather.

Grasses are lower in magnesium than legumes. The early lush growth is likely to be all grass (since legumes start growth later in the spring) and may be deficient in magnesium. Pastures, even grass pastures, should have adequate magnesium content in late spring or summer. Cereal crops such as wheat, rye, barley and oats are poor accumulators of magnesium. Forages of this type are apt to be low in magnesium in the spring or fall.

The plant must get its magnesium from the soil, and soils low in magnesium cause a low plant content. However, at the present time, it appears that magnesium fertilization on most Kentucky soils would not be beneficial. If the soil has a high potassium soil test, the application will do little to increase the magnesium content within the plant. Only coarse (sandy) soils and soils with a low potassium soil test would show an increase in plant magnesium when fertilized.

However, massive applications, such as with dolomitic limestone, would probably have a beneficial effect.

The potassium content in the soil is probably the dominant factor affecting the uptake of magnesium by the plant. Potassium competes with the uptake of magnesium in the plant, and, as the potassium available to the plant increases, there is a sharp drop in the uptake of magnesium. A similar type of relationship appears within the animal itself. The higher the amount of potassium entering the animal, the lower the amount of magnesium found in the blood. If the intake of magnesium is constant, the amount in the blood is lowered by higher potassium intake. Because of this, the potassium content of the soil should not be allowed to get into the high soil test range. A medium or high medium soil test should be sufficient for good pasture production and prevent significant reduction of magnesium in the plant, and subsequently, in the animal.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a day-to-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium. Supplementation should start in mid-December and run through mid-May. This can be done with commercial mineral mixes containing magnesium or with homemade mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace mineral salt or 1 part distillers dry grain will do fine if this is the cattle's only source of salt.

Many farmers feed magnesium year round to avoid the problem in getting cattle back on feed. Not only is this an extra expense farmers do not need, the extra magnesium may interfere with the absorption of certain minerals. When mineral intake becomes a problem, many health problems occur which are hard to explain. For this reason, farmers are encouraged to stop magnesium feeding in mid-May. To help get animals back on minerals containing magnesium, distillers dry grain may be mixed in to take away from the bitter taste.

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EQIP Education Grants available

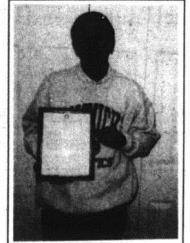
Through a cooperative agreement with the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Kentucky Division of Conservation is making available \$65,000 in grants as the

During the classes, your child will learn to use a sewing machine, follow a pattern and construct a simple garment. First year will make pants, shorts or elastic waistline. Second year makes a skirt with a waistband or simple top. Third year will make a simple complete outfit; fourth year makes a garment using knits; and fifth year makes a complete outfit of any type. 4-H'ers will be modeling their garments in the County 4-H Fashion Revue in April.

If your child wishes to participate in this 4-H project, please complete a permission slip, which will be handed out to them in the classroom or can be obtained from their teacher. Please return it to their teacher by February 9th.
