Carmichael was out of town this week and could not be reached for comment.

Bids for City Park come in at \$249,000

The Mt. Vernon City Council will award the bid for construction of a new city park in Mt. Vernon to H.G. Wilson Company of Lexington, after they were the apparent low bidder on the project.

According to Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer, bids for the park, which will be located on Williams Street, at the former Thrifty Lumber Company site, were opened last Thursday.

Cromer said construction should

begin soon. Plans for the park include an amphitheatre, walking track, two picnic shelters, a tennis court, basketball court, horse shoe pits and a grassy area.

It will cost the city an additional \$249,300 to construct the park on the 2.5 acre site. The city initially paid \$95,000 for the site.

Cromer said he hopes the project will be completed this summer.

Court to hire private contractors to clear county road right-of-ways

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will hire private contractors, and possibly some volunteer fire departments, to finish clearing up county road right-of-ways.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloloff told members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court that the only way the county could be totally reimbursed for the clean-up due to the February snow storm was to hire private contractors to do the work.

"I know it sounds crazy, but if we (the Fiscal Court) use our own workers to clean up the county right of ways, we will not be reimbursed, but if we hire someone else to do the work, we will get our money from the federal government," Carloloff told the court during their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday.

Carloloff also said that by hiring private contractors to do the work it would be done faster.

The county has only twelve road workers at this time.

Carloloff said that approximately three hundred county roads need some type of work and that if it wasn't done by several different people - it would take too long and therefore not qualify for reimbursement either.

At the suggestion of third district magistrate Bill McKinney, the court also voted to give volunteer fire departments the first chance at bidding on the work - so they could raise needed funds for their departments.

"These people put a lot of their own money into keeping their de-

partments running and this would give them a chance to raise a significant amount of money," McKinney said.

As it stands now, the federal

County Jail to remain open during renovation project

Because of the ongoing renovation project at the Rockcastle County jail, the fiscal court was once again faced with a decision of whether or not to close the jail so the work could proceed faster.

In the next few weeks the old cell area and the kitchen will be torn out of the jail - leaving the jailer scrambling for a way to feed his inmates.

On Tuesday the court discussed whether or not it would be better to send the prisoners elsewhere while the \$700,000 project is being completed, but after a discussion between jailer Joe Howard and the court a decision not to move the prisoners was reached.

Third district magistrate Bill McKinney said that he had never

known any jail renovation project to be completed on time - and although estimates were that prisoners would be gone only a couple of months from the jail, it would probably be more like six months. "The county can't afford to pay somebody else to keep our prisoners for six months," he said.

911 Communications

As you are already aware, Rockcastle County's 911 system is scheduled to go on-line later this spring. As 911 director/coordinator I am excited about the prospect of helping provide Rockcastle County with this much needed service. I wish to thank the citizens who realized the need for this communications center, the County Judge Executive, the members of the Fiscal Court, and the 911 Board for the long hours they have spent on making this project a reality. The implementation of 911 is just one more step toward making Rockcastle County a progressive county. The board hired me in October and since then I have come to appreciate the amount of time and energy these people have invested. Over the past several months since my appointment as 911 director was announced, I have spoken with many people who have had questions and concerns about how 911 will operate and who it will serve. The 911 Board believes it is in the best interest of the community to use this weekly column to answer these questions and educate the public. We believe that in order for our 911 center to be successful the public must be aware of the purpose and functions of 911 communications. As an employee of

this county, I want to do everything possible to provide the best service to all our residents. The following are just a few of the questions and issues I wish to address this week.

What is the purpose of a 911-dispatch center? 911 provides an easy to remember, three digit number that the public can "dial" to access emergency services e.g. fire departments, ambulance service, and law enforcement agencies. When second count, as in the case of a fire, a medical emergency, or a crime in progress why dial a seven-digit number when "911" is available. One of the important facts about 911 is that even a small child of 4 or 5 years of age, if properly trained, can access 911. GTE has provided educational packets containing 911 stickers, a coloring book, and some pamphlets that will be distributed to elementary school students shortly before the 911 center is implemented.

Will the 911 center operate 24 hours a day? Yes. The 911 center located on the 2nd floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse will operate around the clock. A trained dispatcher will be available to take your calls day or night.

Which agencies will the 911 center dispatch? The 911 center will

receive calls and dispatch emergency units for Rockcastle County's four fire departments: Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Livingston and Brindle Ridge, the Rockcastle Ambulance Service and Rescue Squad, the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office and the city police officers in Brodhead and Livingston. If a resident needs to contact any of these agencies during normal working hours for non-emergency purposes the administrative lines should be dialed (the white pages telephone number listed for this agencies).

Will Rockcastle 911 dispatch police officers for the city of Mt. Vernon? No. The City of Mt. Vernon has opted to keep its own dispatch center. If 911 receives a call from a resident of the city of Mt. Vernon requesting a police officer (this applies only to police officers, not the Mt. Vernon Fire Department or the ambulance service) be dispatched, the call will be directed to City Hall's emergency number of 256-2121. The City will have a dispatcher on duty 24 hours a day.

What is the responsibility and legal duty of the 911 dispatcher? The 911 dispatcher has the responsibility and the duty to get certain information from the caller, verify the information with the caller, and dispatch the appropriate emergency responders e.g. fire departments, ambulance, police, etc. to the scene as quickly as possible. It is also the dispatcher's responsibility to update the units as to the status of the situation while the units are enroute to the emergency. The objective is to safeguard life and property! The dispatcher is actually the first responder to the emergency. The individuals answering the phones and operating the consoles are a vital lifeline between the victim and the police officers, firefighters and EMS units.

What can the person calling 911 do to help the dispatcher and the emergency responders do their job more completely? The caller should try to give the dispatcher usable information such as the exact location of the emergency, the nature of the emergency, a call-back number, a description of people and weapons involved if a crime has been, or is being, committed, and so forth. The dispatcher will ask pertinent questions and help the caller provide needed information. It is vital that the public realize that the 911 lines in the communications center are to be used for emergencies only and that

any other type of calls will not be tolerated.

Can having a 911 communications center really shorten the response time of the fire departments, law enforcement and EMS in Rockcastle County? Yes, having 911 can make a difference in the response time of any of our emergency responders. The victim/caller saves seconds, if not minutes, accessing 911 rather than thumbing through a phone book searching for a number and dialing a seven digit number. Once the number is dialed, the caller must wait for someone to answer. When accessing 911, the caller can be assured that the call will be answered immediately and the appropriate units dispatched by radio. The

emergency responders and the dispatcher can be in constant communications throughout the emergency. Rockcastle County is fortunate in having four fine volunteer fire departments, a well staffed and trained ambulance service and rescue squad and both city and county-wide law enforcement agencies. All of these agencies cooperate with each other and, by teaming up with them, the 911 center can help provide Rockcastle County with emergency services comparable to any county of its size.

Next week's column will address the magazine of the county to implement 911 and the difference between Basic 911 and E-911 (Enhanced 911).

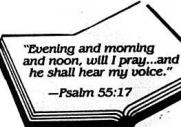

Four indictments returned

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down four indictments last week for crimes ranging from assault to receiving stolen property.

Ben E. Buff, who was arrested last week after he reportedly stabbed Leroy F. King Sr., in front of the Dollar General Store in Mt. Vernon, was indicted for second degree assault.

Buff, 22, of Ramsey Trailer Court, will appear in court on May 8.

Bill Jack Rayburn, 20, of Pine Hill, was indicted on three counts involving a stolen vehicle.

According to the indictment, Rayburn stole a Plymouth Sundance owned by Shaun Gilmore of Pine Hill, and slammed it into a police

crusier driven by Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Roark as Roark tried to apprehend him. The incident occurred on March 8th and Rayburn is still at large.

Roy Lee Bullock, 21, of Chesnut Ridge was indicted for having in his possession on February 27 a stolen 1997 Yamaha Timberwolf ATV valued in excess of \$300.

Karl Wayne Pittman, 24, of Fair Street, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for driving a motor vehicle while under the influence fourth or subsequent offense. Pittman has been convicted of DUI in Rockcastle district court five times since 1993.

Rayburn, Bullock and Pittman will all be arraigned on Friday.

Court of appeals rules in favor of Carmichael

A ruling by Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain has been overturned by the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael said last week that the case involved Elmer Boyd Stewart, 36, of Orlando.

In a prepared news release, Carmichael said Stewart was indicted on April 12, of 1996 in Rockcastle County, on charges of possession of a controlled substance and being a

persistent felony offender.

At the time of his indictment, Stewart was on probation on three unrelated cases and Stewart's probation was revoked due to events leading up to the 1996 indictment.

But Judge Cain suppressed the evidence in the case, declaring that the evidence obtained by police was inadmissible.

Carmichael said the Kentucky Court of Appeals reversed the decision of Cain and remanded the case

back to Rockcastle Circuit Court.

"The Court of Appeals declared that the decision of the Circuit Court had not been supported by the court record," Carmichael said.

"The Court of Appeals declared that there was nothing in the court record which would support an order suppressing the evidence in this case and we intend to proceed and set this case for trial," Carmichael said.

The evidence in question was gathered during a traffic stop on

March 13 of 1996. Stewart was a passenger in a car driven by Barbara Fetters when she was stopped on Hwy. 1004. Police said they found Tylox pills and marijuana in Stewart's possession, which ultimately led to his indictment.

Stewart's attorney Jerry Cox has filed a motion for a re-hearing of the case at the Court of Appeals.

Stewart is currently in jail on other convictions.

government's Federal Emergency Management Agency is already paying for all of the gravel that is being put down on county roads because of the heavy storm. "We are looking for the gravel, use of our trucks and our worker's wages," Carlolis said.

The judge said that many of the 300 roads would be combined into bid packages on which contractors would bid.

The judge also pointed out that all debris from the roads must be removed by the contractors and simply could not be cut away and left.

Carlolis said that FEMA would also review the bids to make sure none were excessive - and that the county would be responsible for paying for the work first before being reimbursed by FEMA.

Some roads have already been cleaned by county crews. They include Crooked Creek, Upper Piney, Trace Branch, Old Gauley and portions of Poplar Gap and Wabed Jones Road.

Bid packages can be picked up at the Judge-Executive's office beginning Thursday at noon.

In other business the court voted to accept the 1995 audit of Sheriff Shirley Smith's office.

That audit showed \$119,000 in receipts in the Sheriff's office with only \$200 in excess fees being returned to the county. The major expenses in the Sheriff's office in 1995 was Smith's salary of \$45,217 and the combined salaries of his deputies which was \$49,280.

The court questioned whether or not the Sheriff was allowed to earn more than the County Judge-Executive, who is required by state law to be the highest paid county official.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette took a few minutes to research the law and said that while it is somewhat vague it appears that as long as guidelines were in place for the County Judge to take a higher salary, other county officials, especially those in fee offices could make more. "Just because he doesn't opt to take raises, doesn't mean his salary is actually set at a lower scale, so it appears the sheriff paid clerk can make a higher salary," Burdette said.

The court also approved applications for solid waste haulers for the county for the coming year.

Approved to haul garbage in the county were: Owen Mink, Cassie Little, Laurel Linger, Linda McWhorter, United Waste Systems, BEE Garbage, and BEE Garbage Transfer Center. All applications were approved by Solid Waste Coordinator Nancy Meadows before the court's unanimous vote.

The court also approved a \$5,000 final payment to Big Sandy Juvenile Detention Center for the incarceration of juvenile offenders.

be dispatched through the county's 911 system.

Anglin said Mt. Vernon residents could still call 911 and their calls would be forwarded to Mt. Vernon's dispatch if they needed police assistance. Anglin said the center would be able to dispatch all fire calls, including Mt. Vernon's and would dispatch all ambulance calls as well.

Mayor Gary Cromer said Mt. Vernon was keeping their dispatchers because of the number of police calls within the city. "We simply need our own for police, but the fire calls and ambulance alarms will go through the 911 center," he said.

Broadhead and Livingston police calls and the Sheriff's office for help will be writing the 911 center.

Anglin is giving a weekly column for the Signal to give residents more information about the proper use and functions of the 911 center.

The 911 communications center is paid for by Rockcastle County telephone numbers at a rate of \$2.00 per phone line. However some of the equipment that will be used at the center has been purchased by monies from the State's Disaster and Emergency Services.

Nickirk also testified before the grand jury last week, but he too was out of town and unavailable for comment.

Carmichael is the state's elected prosecutor in Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln Counties.

The prosecutor has made headlines in recent weeks with several of his cases, but the most publicized was a case in Pulaski County that was dismissed by a Circuit Judge.

Circuit Judge William Cain dismissed a case involving a woman accused of beating her children with an aluminum baseball bat that, in reality, was a wooden stick of some type.

There is no question but that a material false statement was made to the grand jury . . . when you say something was an aluminum baseball bat it is completely different from a stick," Cain said when he dismissed the case.

Carmichael has said he will accept Cain's ruling in the case.

Howard presented the court with three options: 1) to bring already prepared food into the inmates 2) temporarily move the kitchen out the corner part of the jail that is not being renovated and 3) move the kitchen to another part of the courthouse on the second floor.

the Cumberland Valley Area Development District in the amount of \$400,000.

"No government entity, (the tourism commission) can use government funds to compete with a business from the private sector, doing the same thing," he said.

Cromer was referring to a project near Renfro Valley on Hummel Road. Jerry Hayes of Hamilton Ohio is in the process of developing his own log village, which he says is being funded completely by himself, with no government funds.

Hayes said Tuesday, the tourism commission's project was in direct competition with his own private project (Brush Arbor - Appalachian Pioneer Village) and that because they (the tourism commission) want to use public funds to set up the project, it is not legal.

Hayes said he has invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in his project and has written the governor in protest of the tourism commission's project because of using public money to compete with his business.

But, Glennis Miller, president of the Tourism Commission said the Log Cabin project at Renfro Valley and Brush Arbor's business were two completely different things.

Miller said the only thing at all similar about the two projects is they both involve log cabins.

"We don't want to compete with anyone in the private sector, we just want to do something for the good of the county, something that will promote tourism and bring more people to the county," Miller said.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolis said that he "also has his understanding that the two projects would not be in competition and the court stood by their resolution.

Rockcastle girl's team also had a great meet and placed first overall out of eight teams, easily defeating Leslie County and Pulaski County by over 30 points.

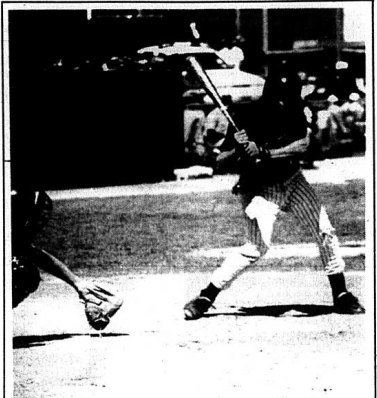

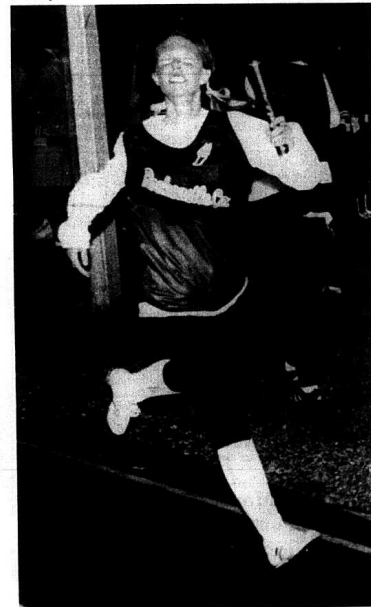

and honorable intentions, goals, objectives and purpose, and without one penny of a "free" tax payer money, we have a genuine Appalachian Pioneer Village and Homestead that moves visitors to tears of joy and appreciation when they visit us. We now have a village which is attracting positive attention from Frankfort, newspapers, TV stations, historical associations and magazines just to name a few. We are being approached by "living history" associations who want to provide living history performances and story-telling on site!

Two years in the making, with nearing completion of the old log church and the stacking of the old

cattler log barn, Brush Arbor Appalachian Pioneer Village on Hummel Road, will be open to the public within a matter of weeks.

County in top five in collection of support

Figures released by the Cabinet for Families and Children for the quarter ending December 31, 1997 show Rockcastle County in the top five percent statewide in overall performance in child support collection efforts.

In the year 1997, Kentucky's overall child support benefit ratio was at four to one. (For every \$1.00 spent, \$4.00 was collected). In comparison, the Rockcastle County Attorney's office collected \$6.25 for every \$1.00 expended and has increased collections nearly 160% over the past four years.

County Attorney Jeff Burdette attributes the dramatic increases in overall performances to his staff and cooperation with the area collection office in Somerset.

"It is good to know that most parents take care of their children by paying their support, but there are still so many that do without and there is still so much work to be done," Burdette stated.

Dear Editor,
I appreciate the opportunity to meet with President Clinton during his visit to Carrollton and talk about the very serious issues that are on the minds of Kentucky tobacco farmers, their families and their neighbors. Tobacco is potentially a billion-dollar crop for Kentuckians this year, and farmers are rightfully concerned about the treatment their industry is receiving now in Washington.

During our discussion I told Mr. Clinton that Kentucky farmers share his concerns about youth smoking and youth access to tobacco products. I pointed out that despite the fact that Kentucky is the number 2 producer of tobacco among all states, we have what is arguably the toughest youth access law in the nation. And state inspectors tell us that this law, which was passed with Farm Bureau support in 1996, is working beyond that most optimistic projections to reduce the number of times young people are able to purchase tobacco products from Kentucky retailers.

The fact that smoking rates by young people are continuing to rise, even while more retail outlets are cracking down on would-be youthful purchasers, indicates that the problem of children and smoking won't be solved by governmental action. Such practices are, and always have been, primarily the province of parental responsibility. I told Mr. Clinton that no level of government intervention would eradicate youth smoking, unless parents resolve to reassert control in this important aspect of their children's lives.

I expressed grave concerns about the content of the McCain bill, which was approved recently by the Senate Commerce Committee. That version of tobacco settlement legislation threatens not only to diminish the size of the domestic tobacco business, but it would also serve to cut sharply into our export trade and move the bulk of our current American tobacco production offshore.

Farmers appreciate the efforts of Sen. Wendell Ford and others to create mechanisms for farmers compensation in the overall settlement. However, if the legislation is so onerous

that it threatens bankruptcy for some of the major cigarette manufacturers, there will be no money to compensate states, the federal treasury, or tobacco growers.

I hope Mr. Clinton has seen, through his visit to tobacco country, that tobacco is more than a political football to be kicked around with no ill effect. Tobacco has a face, in fact it has millions of faces, and the President now has seen some of those faces. Kentucky farmers have produced tobacco since the state was first settled, but the crop provides more than one-fourth of all our farm income, and economically underpins the state's rural communities.

I urge President Clinton and the

Congressional leadership to stop playing the game of political ups-and-downs that has Democrats and Republicans vying for the title "Biggest Tobacco Hater." We hope all political factions will unite to deal effectively with youth smoking issues, but we also urge both to move away from the tobacco bashing that threatens the financial viability of the industry, and the futures of thousands of Kentucky farm families. Now is the time for real political leadership on tobacco issues. That's the message I hope Mr. Clinton takes away from his Kentucky visit.



Elevated Blood Lead Levels in Children Covered by Medicaid

The Department of Health & Human Services recently released the results of the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES). The report finds that the prevalence of elevated blood lead levels is much higher for children covered by Medicaid than for other children and that few children covered by Medicaid are screened for blood lead levels. (The analysis uses the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's definition of harmful lead level, which equals 10 or more micrograms of lead per deciliter of blood.) Specific findings include:

- Children covered by Medicaid represent about 1/3 of the U.S. population of children ages 1 to 5. But they represent approximately 60% of the estimated 890,000 children with elevated blood lead

levels.

- Approximately 1 in every 12 children between the ages of 1 and 5 covered by Medicaid has harmful levels of lead in his or her blood. These Children Are Three Times More Likely To Have Increased Blood Lead Levels Than Are Children Not Covered By Medicaid.
- 81% of all children covered by Medicaid had not been previously screened for blood lead levels.
- Approximately 65% of children covered by Medicaid who were found to have high lead levels had not been screened for blood lead before participating in the survey.

20 cows successfully re-bred. From May 20 to June 20, he had 17 of 21. Then from June 20 on, he had 8 of 16, only 50% of cows successfully re-bred.

That certainly supports his thesis that an earlier beginning to the breeding program is better.

UK is continuing to look at the experiment, but Burris believes previous year's data will be repeated.

Why would a farmer not want to begin his breeding program earlier?

Many people don't want their cows to calve in February because it's cold, but February is really not that much colder than March and it might be less muddy, which would be an advantage during calving time.

February is also a less busy month for most farming activities and it would be an advantage. Also, if the calves were born earlier, the farmer would have increased weaning weights in the fall, because the calves would be a month older.

By starting the breeding season in early May, this would give cows 2 heat cycles, or 2 chances, to get bred before hot weather sets in. Farmers may consider these facts as they plan next years calf crop.

Agricultural News

A severe snowstorm February 4 and 5, 1998 has caused severe damage in all areas of the county. Farms suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the Rockcastle County FSA Office if the damage:

- is so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to productive agricultural use
- is unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area

• affect the productive capacity of the farmland

• will impair or endanger the land

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 64% of the eligible cost of restoration measures. No producer is eligible for more than \$200,000.00 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures, may be eligible:

- removing debris from farmland
- grading, shaping or releveling severely damaged farmland
- restoring permanent fences
- restoring conservation structures and other similar installations.

Producers who have suffered a loss from a natural disaster may contact the local County FSA Office and request assistance immediately and up to May 1, 1998. To be eligible for assistance, practices must not be started until:

- an applications for cost-share assistance has been filed
- the local County FSA Committee or its representative has conducted an onsite inspection of the damaged area.

The agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earth, moving, etc., required for rehabilitation.

The FSA office will be holding an EQUIP sign-up starting April 1 and will run thru May 29, 1998. Practices eligible thru EQUIP are Land Management Practices, Animal Waste Facilities, Grassed Waterways, Livestock Water Development, Filter Strips, Critical Area Planting, Permanent Wildlife Habitat Development, Tree Planting, and Pasture Planting. All the practices that are available will be cost-shared up to 75% by the FSA Agency. For more information contact the FSA Agency.

Producers who have more than one farm and wish to combine the farms, but were previously restricted from doing so because one farm was participating in PFC and one farm was not; may now request a special combination for the 1998 crop year prior to June 1, 1998. Special combinations limit the planted acres of PFC commodities on the PFC farm if tobacco acreage is planted on the non-PFC farm.

The Rockcastle County FSA Office is now leasing tobacco. All producers must remember that their burley quota will be dropped permanently if not planted, leased or sold two out of the three preceding years. Producers must return marketing cards to the FSA office as soon as possible after all burley tobacco sales.

Breed Cows Earlier For Better Profits

Farmers who begin to breed their beef cows after the traditional recommended May 20 start-up date may be hurting themselves in the pocketbook.

By starting the breeding program a month earlier, University of Kentucky research suggests farmers may achieve a significantly higher pregnancy rate among their cattle herds which graze fescue pastures.

"Several years ago, we began to notice poor breeding rates across the state," said Roy Burris, Extension Beef Specialist with UK's College of Agriculture. "We noticed that most cows were being bred earlier or they weren't conceiving at all."

So Burris looked at 10 years data

on weather patterns and found that after June 20, the weather typically hovered over 90 degrees. Temperature that high apparently interferes with cattle re-breeding, especially for cattle feeding on high endophyte fescue.

Kentucky has 5 million acres of fescue, and most of it is the high endophyte fescue type. We're not going to get rid of it, so we may have to learn to live with it. Earlier breeding is one way to do that.

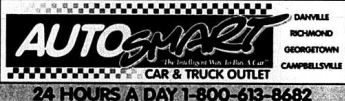



They had tried everything they knew, and finally Diane's school counselor suggested they talk to a family counselor who could help all of them.

Norm and Vera each had his or her own way of handling Diane: Vera screamed at the end Norm said nothing. After we had talked several times, Norm and Vera began to realize that the way they were parenting Diane was now working. We began to look at alternatives.

At one point Norm asked, "I know I ought to speak up more and tell Diane what her limits are, but I just can't. Why not?"

"Norm," I replied, "you probably learned to be a father from watching your father. What kind of a parent was your dad?"

"Well, he never had much to say," Norm admitted, "so I guess that's where I got it."

"And what about your mother?" I questioned. I had noticed that Norm said very little about his mother.

Norm hesitated before answering. "Mom was a screamer," he replied, "especially when she was drunk."

"Did she drink a lot?" I asked. "She got drunk every weekend," he answered quickly.

"Your mother was an alcoholic," I said.

"Well, she would never admit it, but I've thought that myself for a long time," he replied. "But nobody ever talked about Mom's drinking. I tried to talk to my Dad once, and he pretended not to hear me. Dad would never say anything to Mom when she was drinking. He'd just sit in his chair reading the paper or get up and leave as if nothing was happening. I guess I come from a very dysfunctional family, don't I?"

"There were a lot of problems in your family, Norm," I agreed, "but I bet there were some good things that you got from your parents. Every family has both dysfunctional and functional ways of operating. A functional family is one where the emotional and physical needs of the family are taken care of - at least a little bit. Where did you get your love and acceptance growing up, Norm?" He thought a minute: "Sometimes from Mom when she was not drinking, from Dad when he occasionally took me fishing, and from Grandma who lived down the street and baked me cookies. I used to love to go to her house."

Even though Norm grew up in a very troubled family, some of his emotional needs were met. This will help him as an adult. We will be glad to be a better father. "My folks did love me," he said. "They just had problems. Maybe I can show my daughter what fit's like to be loved by your family."

Vera had listened carefully to Norm and me as we talked. "I've always been glad that my family didn't have problems like Norm's

did. My family was a normal, loving family."

I suspected that Vera might not be seeing her family realistically, but I decided to wait to ask about her family until their next counseling session. If Vera can come to understand her family as well as Norm understands his, that will help their relationship even more.

"The 4-H camping experience is both learning and fun," said Dwight Crum, Extension 4-H program specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Crum is the coordinator of 4-H camping. At camp, Crum said, the young people learn important new skills, such as swimming, archery and athletics. They also make new friends and participate in many other youth activities.

The week-long camps begin just after school ends in May and continue through July or August, depending on the camp. The camps are located near Carlisle, Rush, London, Jabez and Dawson Springs. They range in size from 175 to 1,200 acres and all have modern facilities, including cabins, dining halls, swimming pools, lakes for canoeing and fishing, athletic fields and ranges for archery and shooting sports, Crum said.

More than 3,000 volunteers help direct the camps. Each camp also is staffed with emergency medical technicians, certified life guards and instructors for nature and recreation. "Young people don't have to be 4-H members to attend camp. In fact, many go on to become members of 4-H after they attend their first camp," he said.

All of Kentucky's 4-H camps participate in the federally funded Summer Food Service program, operating under guidelines similar to public school lunch programs, he said.

Criteria for determining eligibility of free meal service are based on family size and income. For a family of one, the base yearly income is \$14,597. The yearly income base increases \$5,032 for each additional family member, Crum said.
