## \$357,000 headed to WHIP

On February 27, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) will receive \$24 million during FY1998. Kentucky is expected

to receive \$357,000 in financial assistance in 1998. The WHIP, administered by the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, provides financial and technical assistance to help landowners improve

fish and wildlife habitat on private lands. The WHIP allows each state to tailor its program to ensure the greatest benefits for threatened or endangered habitats and/or animals.

Kentucky's WHIP focuses on the restoration of Kentucky's native habitats that are in decline. These habitats include native grass prairies, early successional habitat, wetlands and other habitats where threatened and endangered wildlife abide. Practices eligible for cost share assistance include native grass establishment, fescue conversion, tree and shrub plantings, wetland creation, fencing for livestock exclusion from woodlands and streams, alternative water, aquatic habitat restoration, wildlife water ponds, and other practices. WHIP pays up to 75% cost share to establish, manage and maintain these practices during a five to 10-year cost share agreement period. WHIP sign-up will begin April 1, however, after that date a continuous sign-up for the

WHIP is offered. Applications must include more than five acres to ensure enough area for a noticeable habitat improvement.

WHIP is a competitive program where applications are ranked according to their environmental benefits. Applications having the greatest benefit to wildlife habitat will receive cost share. Applications ranking periods will occur throughout the year as money is appropriated to Kentucky. The first application ranking period will extend from April 1 to May 29. To ensure that your wildlife habitat improvement project receives consideration during the first ranking period, sign up at your local Natural Resources Conservation Service office or talk to your local Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources biologist between April 1 and May 29.

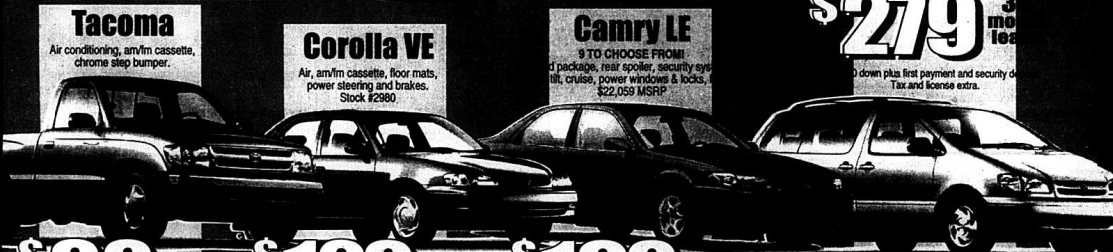

## Apparent tornado hits in county

The weather service in Jackson said Tuesday they could not confirm that any tornadoes had touched the ground in Rockcastle County during the extremely harsh weather that hit the county last Thursday night. But, you certainly couldn't convince Peggy McClure, who lives with her two teenage daughters on Wab-Jones Road, of that.

Mrs. McClure, who teaches first grade at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, said she saw one destroy her three car garage and uproot large trees in her yard. And, by the looks of her garage and the trees, she knows what she is talking about.

Mrs. McClure said that a Somerset radio station had given out a tornado warning for Rockcastle County just before 8 p.m. Thursday night and that shortly after that (only a few minutes) she heard a loud noise, like a freight train.

"I went to the patio doors in the

back of my house and there it came, shaped like a funnel and coming right at my house. It dropped out of the sky and hit my garage, causing stuff to go everywhere and then it prooted large trees around the garage, it was a scary sight," she said.

When the twister had gone, it had completely destroyed the three car garage and in doing so had actually twisted portions of the metal roof on the garage into the limbs of other trees in Mrs. McClure's yard. The metal itself was shaped like a funnel by the time the storm got through with it.

But there was good news. A barn, owned by Gary Mink, on one side of Mrs. McClure's garage and Mrs. McClure's house located on the other side was not damaged.

Mrs. McClure estimated her loss at \$15,000, plus some of the contents were also destroyed.

On Sunday things got worse. Larry Strunk, 37, of Renfro Valley

was helping to clean-up the storm site when he was seriously injured.

"He was unbolting an automatic garage door opener from one of the beams, when it snapped back and caught his right hand," Mrs. McClure said with a sigh.

Strunk's right wrist and thumb were severely injured in the accident. He was taken by ambulance to Rockcastle Hospital and then transferred to Jewish Hospital in Lexington. His wife Michelle said he spent eight hours in surgery on Sunday night and was due to be released from

Jewish Hospital on Wednesday.

Mrs. Strunk said that doctors had to take bones from her husband's hip and use them to reconstruct his hand.

"I am a little worried about what might happen next," Mrs. McClure said jokingly.

Another tornado was reportedly sited in the Renfro Valley area, but could not be confirmed.

During the stormy period last week, 3.6 inches of rainfall was recorded at the Cox Funeral Weather Station in Mt. Vernon. A total of 6.33 of rain has fallen in April.

## Police search at Tark Hill for local man

Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith and Deputy Darrell Doan, along with Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane used a backhoe Tuesday to search for the body of a local man missing since last May.

Deputy Doan said that Detective Lane had received an anonymous tip as to the whereabouts of the body of Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon, who was reported missing last May after he did not show up for a court appearance.

Tuesday, police found nothing but a toboggan, in muddy ground inside a footer for a new house.

The footer was located on property at Tark Hill, off Negro Creek Road. Doan said the property was owned by David Lovell, 30, of Brush Creek.

Rumors have been rampant at times throughout the county as to what happened to Baker and where his body may be located.

## Parents petition board for metal detectors at local schools

A Sand Springs woman told the Rockcastle County Board of Education last week that she is concerned for the safety of her children - so concerned she thinks that metal detection devices should be placed at each of the county's five schools.

Donna Hasty, a mother of three, two of whom are students enrolled in the Rockcastle school system, told the board that she and many other parents were concerned for the safety of their children.

Mrs. Hasty presented the board with a petition with over 50 names on it, in support of metal detectors at each school.

The homemaker said that guns were simply too accessible for children during this day and time and that she thought it was only a matter of time before a student brought one to school.

Mrs. Hasty pointed to the recent shootings on school grounds in Kentucky, Mississippi and Arkansas.

"A lot of kids go unsupervised these days, and they see things on television like those terrible shootings and they can get crazy ideas, it just scares me to death," she said. "You know that because of their situation at home - some kids will do something like use a gun to just get attention," she said.

Mrs. Hasty told the board that she had consulted with Commonwealth Security Systems in Mt. Vernon about the cost of the metal detectors. She said each doorway metal detector would cost from \$3,000 to \$5,000 and that each school needed two.

"\$50,000 ain't nothing, most parents wouldn't take a million dollars for their kids, I know I wouldn't," she said.

Mrs. Hasty said she became very concerned earlier this year when students at the Rockcastle County Middle School were told by a fellow student that they were going to bring a gun to school.

"I talked to Mr. John Hale, (principal at RCMS), and he told me he had talked with the student and the parents and that everything was under control," she said.

"But, when I told him I thought the school should have metal detectors, he told me that he did not think they were needed at this time," she said.

"I'd say the principals at those schools in Paducah and Mississippi would have probably said the same thing, before the shootings happen there," Mrs. Hasty said.

Mrs. Hasty said that even if the cost of the metal detectors was a problem she knew enough parents who would work to raise the money to buy them. "We don't want our children to have to go to school afraid. They shouldn't have to worry about some other student blowing them away," she said. "Our children are in school to learn and they should be able to do that in a safe place, without fear for their life," she said.

Mrs. Hasty also has first hand knowledge of guns in school. In 1989, her brother, Carlos Cameron, was a student at Jackson County High School when a fellow student took his History class hostage. "The boy only wanted to talk to his father, but he endangered those students' lives with a gun, it can happen anywhere," Mrs. Hasty said. "That boy's father had moved away and he was living with his grandparents and he wanted attention - you never know how a child's mind works," she said.

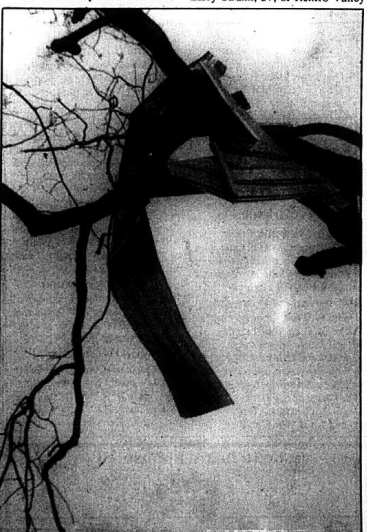
Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said Wednesday, that safety of students was always a top priority for the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

"We are gathering information about this matter and are looking at other ways to keep students safe," Hammond said.

"But, I would hate to think that it has gotten to the point where we need metal detectors in our schools," he said.

"But, if our data deems it necessary, I'm sure this board will look at it very hard," Hammond said.

# Points East

After 18 months of home-ownership, I'm starting to wonder if the Great American Dream is all that it's cracked up to be.

Actually I'm relearning lessons that I had somehow forgotten since the seventies when I went through a couple of previous sins of being my own land-lord. I'd forgotten that fishing rods and golf clubs become nothing more than stuff that gets in the way when I needed to find a tool in the garage.

I'd forgotten about getting the blues on Friday afternoon because getting back to the office on the following Monday was the best thing I could not think of to look forward to.

I do not enjoy carpentry, wiring, plumbing, roofing or painting. I despise fixing stubborn doors and re-hanging gutters that the snow ripped off.

For 15 years Loretta and I paid our rent on time and when something broke that wasn't our fault, we'd call the landlord and he'd send someone right out to fix it.

Now we pay way, way more in taxes and interest than we used to pay in rent but when something breaks I can't call the credit union or the tax collector and get them to do a darn

thing to fix it. When the basement floods or the drains clog up or the storm doors blow off its hinges all I have to do is look in the mirror to find the repairman.

I know more than a dozen proprietors and sales clerks at four different hardware stores on a first name basis. They even send me Christmas and birthday cards. I can walk in the front door of either one of them and be greeted with some attempt at humor because they know I'm not there to make a social call. They know they're going to get a wad of my money and they want me to feel cheerful about it.

"What's the problem at the mansion today?" they may inquire. Or they'll ask me where the funeral is or something like that.

Last weekend it was the sewer system. Between Friday evening and Sunday night I made three trips to Richmond looking for a pipe snake that would make a 90 degree turn, a host of solvents and enzymes, a plunger, a high pressure air tank and general yip.

Between trips I bailed, plunged and tried to run pipe snakes up the septic line for more than 100 hours. In the process I became filthy and I stunk worse than a dead skunk in the

## 911 Communications

Since this column appeared last week, I have received many favorable comments about it and have offered some helpful suggestions as well. I want to take this opportunity to thank all of those who took the time to read the column and express their interest in our 911 communications center. As I read the column last week, it occurred to me that I had overlooked an important piece of information that the public needs to be aware of—the function of the 911 Board and the responsibilities and duties of the 911 Director/Coordinator. Before I begin a discussion of E-911, I would like to briefly deal with these issues.

The 911 Board consists of the following individuals and the agencies or jurisdiction they represent: Gary Wade Mink, acting chairperson, who represents the 2nd magisterial district; Harry Harmon, the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service; Deputy Sheriff Trevor Hensley, the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Dept.; Gary Hansel, Rockcastle County's four fire departments; Gwen Ponder, the city of Livingston; Ann Taylor Gentry, the city of Brodhead; Asst. Chief Eddie Delaney, the city of Mt. Vernon; Buzz Carlotts, Rockcastle Fiscal Court; Ethelene Cash, magisterial district #1; Tom Bustle, magisterial district #3; Alonzo

McCullum, magisterial district #4; and Justin Davis, magisterial district #5. The board is the sole governing body for the Rockcastle 911 communications center and as such makes all decisions relating to fiscal matters and helps to formulate the policies and procedures for the center. At the time of this writing the Kentucky State Police does not have a representative on the board, but because this agency serves the county, the County Judge Executive, along with board will be in the process of considering a representative from KSP.

The major of each incorporated city choose their representative, as did the satellite agencies (fire dep'ts, the ambulance service and the sheriff's office), the representatives of the magisterial districts were chosen by the County Judge Executive. The duties and responsibilities of the Director/Coordinator are manifold. The Director works with the Board (the Director can make recommendations, but is not a voting member of the 911 board) in hiring personnel, helps in establishing policies for the center, prepares the 911 budget, and generally supervises the daily operations of the center. Currently, the Director is considered an employee of the county government and is accountable to the 911 board. Because the Director is involved in managerial tasks, the position demands an all-around "troubleshooter" who may, in one day, handle problems ranging from small functioning repairs, to purchasing office supplies. Inevitably, a portion of the Director's time must be spent serving as a liaison between the various agencies for which the center dispatches and answers complaints and questions from the public.

Now, I will turn my attention to the subject of this week's article: the difference between basic 911 and E-911, or enhanced 911. As now projects the county's basic 911 service is scheduled to go on line June 1st. The equipment involved in basic 911 consists of phone lines, radios and recorders (all phone calls and radio traffic is recorded as a supervisory tool and to insure that dispatchers have a fail-safe way to double check calls). This simply means that, when an individual calls, the dispatcher notes the crucial information such as the location of the emergency, the nature of the problem, a call-back phone number and so forth. The dispatcher can only rely on the information that the caller can or will provide and, if the caller is disconnected or disorients that call for some reason the dispatcher may have sent out an emergency unit with only a partial address.

E-911 provides the dispatcher with complete information such as Automatic Number Identification (ANI) and Automatic Number Location (ANL) which means that the phone number from which the call is being placed and the exact location of the caller is displayed on a computer in the dispatch center. Utilizing the e-911 system, the dispatcher is within less than five seconds where

the emergency call is coming from and can dispatch a unit to the scene within approximately 20-30 seconds from the time the phone rings in the communications center. If a hysterical caller suddenly "hangs-up" or, as in the case of a crime in progress, such as an assault, rape or robbery, where the call is abruptly discontinued by the caller, the dispatcher already has the location available and can send assistance immediately. E-911 works with CAD or "Computer Aided Dispatching." CAD system that the local telephone company comes into play. E-911 is able to work because GTE maintains a database for everyone in the county that has phone service. This database will be available to the Rockcastle communications center through a computer network. E-911 will be

available in Rockcastle County in June 1999. E-911 cannot be implemented until the entire county is mapped every structure—whether it be a residence, a CSX call box, or an

abandoned house is given a "local address" consistent with the U.S. Postal Service guidelines. Next week's column: "Mapping Rockcastle County."

## REAP and Ashlee's House plan to re-open May 1st

It has been four full months since the Rockcastle County Homeless Program and Ashlee's House Homeless Shelter have been closed due to major damage to the building and its contents due to approximately 700 gallons of water being allowed to flood the lower floor, which houses the Food Pantry and the administrative offices for both the REAP program and the homeless shelter.

Insurance covered a very small portion of the cost and we called upon volunteers from various agencies to assist us. We had just received a grant from the Calle Foundation to purchase needed office equipment. This equipment was totally destroyed when the water gushed through the ceiling. The previous equipment belonged to the Coordinator and Administrator of both programs and in some instances were as old as 18 years. It is extremely difficult to operate without a telephone, calculator, typewriter, copy machine, fax machine and other necessities that were rusted and inoperable. Even the file drawers were full of water which made most of records indistinguishable (most papers are biodegradable) when they came in contact with water. We have had to reconstruct several years

of financial records, etc. and this is all a requirement of the State and Federal governments.

During the upheaval of the "flood", Christmas and the apartment fire at Rockcastle Villa, we have been unable to send out individual Thank You notes to everyone who has helped us have the biggest Christmas program ever. It took a lot of cooperation from agencies working together to do the best that we could for all of the families that were served. Many hours go into this program to try and make sure that same families are not getting more than their fair share.

Agencies who worked together with us in coordinating this program were the Migrant Program, Family Resource Centers, Health Department, Home Health, Hospice, Sr. Citizens, LEAP, Social Services and other interested groups or individuals who referred families to us. CAP works with us very closely and we served in the neighborhood of 600 plus families in our county. Businesses, such as NACO and Brandy Valley help us each year by donating gifts and taking children's names. We take care of children to age 18 in our program, but each has their own set

Donations are very difficult to get, but we served over 40,000 meals and took care of 2,000 plus people in less than 12 months. In five months this year we have already exceeded that number. There is a tremendous amount of work that goes into keeping the Pantry and Shelter going. We are volunteers. Maybe the reason we keep going is because we have all been homeless, ill, hungry, and no clothes for our children. Things are different when you have been in the other persons shoes.

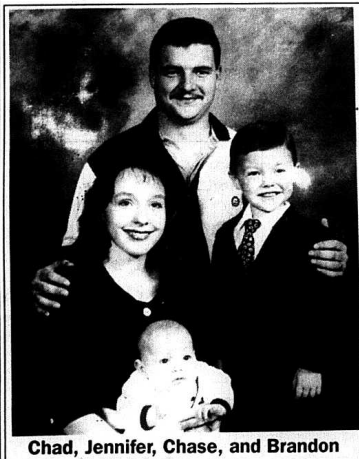

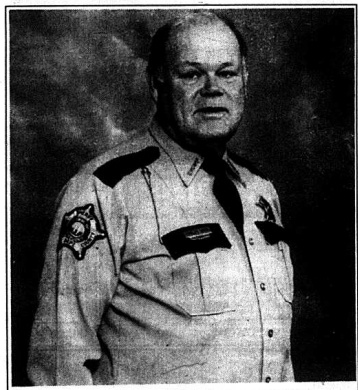

sible," said George Page, administrator of KBHC's Southern Region program. "It was also an opportunity for the campaign leadership to meet the kids and see the difference a loving, positive environment is making in their lives."

"We saw the fruits of our labor right in front of us," said Oscar Hornsby, the capital campaign's chairman. "The shelter fills a gap for these boys. They can stay there until the right decision for their future is made and they don't have to go back to their problems."

KBHC began work in Somerset in

1994 when it assumed control of a local shelter for young people. From there, an entire region of programs has developed including residential, foster care, family preservation and reunification and Christian counseling.

Donations and pledges of long-term support funded a new shelter on 100 acres near Lake Cumberland in rural Pulaski County which opened in July, 1997, replacing an aging structure in Somerset.

In a few weeks an administration and classroom building will open next to the shelter. Another residential program sharing space on the Bronston property is the Wilderness Camping Treatment Program that treats up to 24 young men through camping, hiking, work projects and other outdoor activities.

The Wilderness program's lodge is nearly ready for occupation and ground will be broken soon for the three cabins to house the youth. The

program currently rents space in Somerset.

Campaign funds also provide an endowment for Cornerstone Counseling in the Southern Kentucky area. Cornerstone is a professional Christian counseling service that partners KBHC with local churches, Baptist associations and other organizations.

There are 20 counseling centers across the state, including offices in Berea, Corbin, Harlan, London, Pineville, Somerset and Stanford. Donations will also be used to

expand the Southern Region's Family Foster Care program that currently has foster care workers in Pulaski and Laurel counties. A London-based after-school reporting center to provide additional care and support for children in need is also on the drawing board.

Kentucky counties involved in the campaign were Adair, Bell, Boyle, Casey, Clay, Clinton, Cumberland, Garrard, Green, Harlan, Jackson, Laurel, Leslie, Lincoln, Knox, Madison, Marion, McCreary, Mescalife, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Taylor, Wayne and Whitley.

KBHC provides care for children who has been abused, neglected, or whose families are crisis. The agency assists more than 3,300 children and adults each year.

Other residential programs are Spring Meadows Children's Home in Louisville, Glen Dale Children's Home in Glendale, the Baptist Youth Ranch in Elizabethtown, the Dixon Temporary Shelter in Morehead and the Genesis Home in Mayfield.

KBHC also operates a pregnancy counseling and adoption service; manages private foster homes; provides family preservation and reunification services; and provides independent living, college and career services.

Founded in 1869, Kentucky Baptist Homes for Children is the oldest Southern Baptist child care ministry and the largest private child care program in Kentucky.

## Clothes Care: 1997 IFI Report

Each year, the International Fabricare Institute (IFI) prepares a report on the garments they have analyzed over the past 12 months.

During 1997, the IFI Garment Analysis Laboratory studied nearly 21,000 garments and household textiles that failed in some manner to wear or clean satisfactorily.

Whenever possible, IFI assigns responsibility for damage to a garment or textile item.

Through the years, there has been a slow, but steady decline in problems that were considered to be the consumer's responsibility. In 1997, that figure amounted to 35%. As you might guess, stains continue to be the biggest problem. The most common stains resulted from inks and dyes, hair preparations, beverages, food and proteins found in milk, eggs, meats, oil, perspiration, and sugar. However, a great many consumers do not realize the changes that have occurred in recent years in the area of clothing care and maintenance. New fibers, new fabrics, updated equipment, changes in products as well as legislation have all impacted this area.

In terms of damage assigned to be the manufacturer's responsibility, the figure was 39%.

of all garments/items examined. It was found that some items simply cannot tolerate the cleaning process, in spite of the instructions on the care label.

In 1997, IFI saw a significant drop in the number of problems that were the drycleaner's/laundrer's responsibility... a total of 12% of garments in 1997, as opposed to 15% in 1996. Many cases with drycleaner's are solved without intervention by the analysis laboratory.

Some basics in avoiding stains on fabrics are:

- Read clothing labels and follow the cleaning instructions on the label.

- Be careful to check laundered clothing for stains before drying in the clothes dryer. The heat from the clothes dryer will "set in" the stain so that it may be impossible to remove.

- Immediately treat spills on clothing as they occur.

- Launder or dry clean clothing before storage for the season. Stains (especially perspiration) that are not visible now can become "set in" after being stored for a few months.

### Rotational Grazing Means More Money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotating between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles.

The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at least 10%. Depending on the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is continuously grazed.

Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages' phosphorus and potassium are removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when pasture areas rest between grazings. Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture trample and defecate on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up, becoming more mature and lower in quality.

Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or near its peak nutritive value. Rotated pastures have higher digestibility because forage is kept in a vegetative and growing stage with less dead and over-mature material, compared to continuously grazed pastures. Animals tend to select only the best and leave the worst.

Rotational grazing systems also allow use of species that are more productive and responsive to management including alfalfa, native warm season grasses, and red clover. Different species enable farmers to improve the seasonal supply of forage, grow more forage and grow better quality forage. Using these species also can reduce hay harvest costs.

## Agricultural News

A severe snowstorm February 4 and 5, 1998 has caused severe damage in all areas of the county. Farms suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the Rockcastle County FSA Office if the damage:

- will be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to productive agricultural use
- is unusual and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area

- affect the productive capacity of the farmland
- will impair or endanger the land

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 64% of the eligible cost of restoration measures. No producer is eligible for more than \$200,000.00 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures, may be eligible:

- removing debris from farmland
- grading, shaping or releveling severely damaged farmland
- restoring permanent fences
- restoring conservation structures

and other similar installations.

Producers who have suffered a loss from a natural disaster may contact the local County FSA Office and request assistance immediately and up to May 1, 1998. To be eligible for assistance, practices must not be started until:


- an applications for cost-share assistance has been filed
- the local County FSA Committee or its representative has conducted an onsite inspection of the damaged area
- the Agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earth, moving, etc., required for

rehabilitation.

Rockcastle County Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith, said that he

thought Mrs. Hasty certainly had a legitimate concern, but he did not think metal detectors were the answer at this time.

"I don't think the detectors would solve all our problems. I think we need to look at the overall picture, review our policies and make sure that school personnel are aware of the policies and how they should be carried out," he said. "I think all school employees should be more aware of what is going on with students and take everything said or done seriously," he said.

"I think monitoring of students is as much as the answer to a safety program as anything and we, as a school system, should do everything we can to see that it is being carried out," he said.

"Preventive measures always

work better than reactionary ones," he said.

Griffith also pointed out that even metal detectors at the school in Jonesboro Arkansas wouldn't have stopped that tragedy.

Mrs. Hasty also said that if the cost of adding more personnel to the metal detectors was a problem, she thought parents would volunteer their time.

But, Superintendent Hammond said that in some cases someone would have to be manning the detectors for 18 hours. "We would have to have someone every time anyone entered or exited the buildings. I'm sure some parents would volunteer, but I'm not sure you could get enough because most of them would want to volunteer during the day," he said. "I'm not sure that would work at all," he said.

that the Lord had called him to preach. Bro. Rader recalls being surprised but he let Bro. Arnold preach a few times and said he did well. Bro. Arnold wanted to be ordained and they began inviting people to come and help him. One preacher told Bro. Rader he would not lay hands on Bro. Arnold to ordain him because he could not read the Bible. Bro. Rader told the preacher that if God could make a mule speak, he could make a man that couldn't read to preach. He was ordained and had become one of the greatest preachers that Rockcastle County has ever had in many souls being saved under his ministry.

One preacher asked Bro. Rader where Lester Arnold got his power and Bro. Rader says that when you work a mule hard all day and take off his harness, he goes to one spot to wallow and that spot will become slick. He told the man I can take you to an oak tree in Sand Hill where Lester Arnold goes and bows down and talks to the Lord everyday after work and it is all slick around that tree. He adds that the Lord Jesus Christ gives you the power to go out and preach the gospel.

The Lord dealt with Lester Arnold about two years ago. I stayed on his mind and one Sunday afternoon, the Lord kept speaking to him. He went into a hollow by a Dogwood tree and began to pray and ask the Lord what He wanted him to do. He asked the Lord that if he preached that night would he give him one soul — the Lord gave him four. After a six month waiting period, he was ordained as a preacher at Sand Hill and began his ministry October 31, 1954.

In one of Bro. Arnold's favorite stories, he tells about being in a church service at Buffalo where he said he noticed a lot of holes. Several of the older people got happy and started shouting. All of a sudden, rats started coming out of those holes and running around. Bro. Andy Clouse was with him and Bro. Arnold noticed that Bro. Clouse started stomping his feet. After church he said to Bro. Clouse, "That's the first time I ever did see you shout." Bro. Clouse looked at him over his glasses and said, "Now look here Bro. Arnold, I was 'shouting' — those mice and rats were trying to get up my briches legs and I was trying to keep them out."

He recalls that there was so much shouting and stomping, it was dusty you could hardly see.

There was a man named Willie Cromer who everyone was afraid to go talk to about the Lord. They were afraid he would kill them. However, one Sunday Bro. Arnold was eating and the Lord laid it on his heart to go visit Willie. He pushed back his plate and climbed into his old Model T. When he got down to the hollow where Willie lived, he was standing by the porch. Bro. Arnold rolled his wood yard and turned. He said to Willie, "Willie did you ever give it a thought that you're going to die and meet the Lord?" Willie looked straight at him and said, "You're the first man ever to come to my yard to talk to me." Bro. Arnold told him that the Lord had sent him there. Willie said

he was glad the Lord had sent him and Bro. Arnold told him he should prepare to meet the Lord. Willie agreed to go to church that night but he was in a bad shape physically and could sit on the hard seats so Bro. Arnold took his best chair out of his house and put it in the church. They carried Willie and put him in the chair. That night, Bro. Philbeck preached and Willie told Bro. Arnold that he had been saved. He said he wanted to take Jesus as his Saviour. He got saved that night. Bro. and Sister Arnold took him to a lot of baptizings. He got worse and around 4 1/2'clock, told Lena, his wife, that he was going to Heaven and wished she could go with him. He died that night. Everyone around talked about Bro. Arnold going there and Willie getting saved. Mr. Cromer was Verna Burke's dad and sister Janice Vanzani's grandpa.

Bro. Arnold says people knowing about his lack of education has never bothered him. When he was a young man, his dad bought him a good saddle horse and a lot of men pair him to go get whiskey for them. He missed a lot of school because of this.

He started going to Flat Rock Baptist church because he was friends with Bro. Henry Parrett who taught an adult class there. After he was ordained, he was asked to preach there. Since he couldn't read, Bro. Andy Clouse would stand up and read the Bible and then Bro. Arnold would preach. One night, Bro. Clouse hugged Bro. Arnold and said, "The Lord is good." He got up to read the Bible for Bro. Arnold and said, "It's a great joy to stand here and open this Bible." Bro. Andy Clouse then fell dead with a heart attack.

Sister Arnold and their children

would read Bro. Arnold the Bible every night and he memorized a lot of scripture and learned to read some. Bro. Arnold retired from the L&N Railroad. After he started to preach, he was called to preach many funerals. One week, he was asked to preach four funerals. His foreman told him he was going to have to decide to preach funerals or work. So, he told his foreman if he was told he couldn't

preach funerals, he wouldn't. A girl got burned up at Brush Creek and he was called to preach her funeral. They were working across from the girl's parents' home. The Superintendent of L&N pulled him and asked why he wasn't going to preach that funeral. Bro. Arnold told him the foreman wouldn't let him off. The superintendent said L&N was an awfully big company not to let one man off. "From now on, when Bro. Arnold is

called to preach a funeral, he is to be let off," he superintended told the foreman. From then on, Bro. Arnold says he was always allowed off and that the officials at L&N were always nice to him and accepted him as a minister.

At Maple Grove  
Years ago, Bro. Arnold said some churches only had one or two services each month. At one time, he pastored as many as five churches. He finally quit them all and pastored only Flat Rock. Wendell Renner recalls they were honored that he did this. He pastored there for around 17 years then Bro. Omer McNew and a group started a new church and called it Maple Grove and Bro. Arnold went there to preach. They put planks on concrete blocks and started having church before it was completed. Joe Daugherty sawed the lumber and the group started Maple Grove. They didn't have a piano but Omer played the guitar. That was 27 years ago and Bro. Arnold is still pastor of Maple Grove. He has an assistant, Bro. Tim Hampton, to help. The church has had a lot of ups and downs but Bro. Arnold said, "We can say one thing — the Lord has absolutely blessed Maple Grove."

One of Bro. Arnold's great blessings was that he once preached a revival for eight straight weeks and worked every day on the railroad. Many people were saved during that revival.

Bro. Arnold is the only preacher still on the radio that started when WRVK came on the air 34 years ago. WRVK sent a man to Bro. Arnold's house to ask if he wanted some radio time. He came on from 8 to 8:30 a.m. and was on at 2 p.m. for several years. Mr. Lair gave him the fifth Sunday air time free because he always paid his bill.

The churches that Bro. Arnold has pastored include: Sand Hill Baptist Church; Bethel Baptist in Berea; Big Hill and Indian Creek in McKeck; Mt. Zion and Pilgrim's Rest in Laurel County; Philpot Chapel in East Bernstadt; Buffalo Baptist, Green Hill; Pleasant Run in Jackson County; Flat Rock Baptist Church; Roundstone Baptist Church and Maple Grove.

In April, 1990, Bro. Arnold held a baptizing in the creek down on Cove Branch. He felt funny and on the way home, his arm was numb. That afternoon, he had a heart attack. He underwent bypass surgery on his heart and has had another surgery since. Bro. Tim Hampton preaches most of the time now but when Bro. Arnold feels good, he still preaches a powerful sermon.

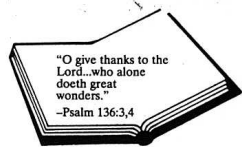

# Mt. Vernon Message

Dear Parents,

3rd, 4th and 5th grade students at MTVES will be involved in testing during the time frame of April 22-May 8. Following are some things that you can do before the assessment to help your child feel calm and confident.

1. Help your child feel confident about taking the test. Express confidence in your child's ability to do well.
2. Have a relaxed environment. Avoid any activities and conversations that may arouse anxiety, conflict or unpleasantness.
3. Try to avoid applying disciplinary measure to any member of the family on the evening before the test.
4. Have your child go to bed early enough to get plenty of rest.
5. Set the clock to alarm a little early in order to allow your child time to eat and dress without rushing.
6. See that the clothes that your child likes and feels comfortable in are laid out so that frantic searches are avoided.
7. Be sure that paper, pencils and other needed school materials are

together and located where they will not be forgotten in the morning.

8. You may want to talk briefly about the test in an encouraging way. Let your child know that you understand how difficult tests are, but you are confident in his/her ability to do well. Emphasize that test results help in planning the child's instructional program.

9. Ask your child to do as well as he/she can. Think of something that would be very pleasing to your child and say that this will be the reward following the test.

10. Let all conversation about testing be casual and brief.

11. Prepare a good breakfast for your child, but not a heavy one.

12. Be sure that your child is not late for school.

13. The test is constructed to be given in a group setting. Children seldom do as well when given the test individually. Therefore, it is very important that your child be in school Monday to start the test and finish with the other students. **PLEASE ATTENDANCE A PRIORITY!**

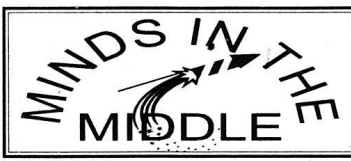

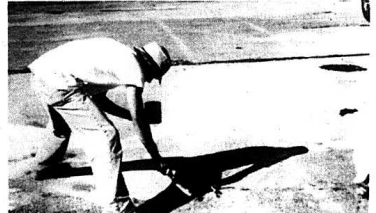

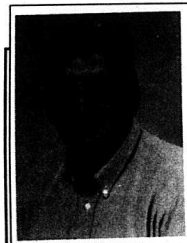

# The Family Room

## We Overeat For Emotional Reasons

"I want you to help me lose weight," Shelley told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "My doctor says I need to lose fifty pounds. I've tried everything and nothing seems to work."

Shelley had heard about the hypnosis work that I do and was hoping that with hypnosis she could lose weight. "Hypnosis can help you, Shelley," I told her. "With hypnosis you won't have the cravings for food that you have now. You will be better able to make healthy choices when it comes to eating. But there are many factors that affect weight. Each of us inherits certain genes and chromosomes, and these affect how much we eat."

"Another factor that affects appetite is the psychological one," I told her. Usually, it's not what you are

eating that makes you overweight, it is what's eating you."

Shelley looked puzzled. "Hunger is not the only reason we eat," I told her. "We also eat for emotional reasons, such as sadness, depression, anger, loneliness or nervousness."

"That is certainly true of me," Shelley agreed. "I eat when I feel unloved and lonely. When my husband is out of town, I binge on ice cream and doughnuts. Now that the children are gone, it gets lonely at my house."

"When did you begin eating to stop the loneliness?" I asked Shelley.

"Probably very young," she remembered. "I was a latchkey kid long before the term was used. Mom and Dad both worked and I would come home to an empty house. Every day when I came in I found a glass of milk and a dessert, chocolate cake or cookies or something. Mom would

leave me a note that said, 'I love you. Enjoy your treat.'"

"So you began to learn that food was love," I concluded.

"I guess so," Shelley replied. "Anytime I do not feel loved, I eat. Do you mean that things that happened to me years ago have an effect on how much I eat?"

"Certainly," I replied. "You and I and many other people are in the same boat. Many of us learned to use food to feel better, so when we feel bad, we eat."

"Sometimes I feel like I'm addicted to food," Shelley confessed. "You are," I agreed. "Food is the substance you abuse to try to deal with the emotional pain inside you. You use food for the same reasons other people use alcohol or other drugs."

"To get unhooked from food, you will need to deal with the pain that is inside you," I told Shelley. "Feeling that pain and letting go of it will help to release you from your need to eat. You can take back control of your life instead of being controlled by food."

"That's right, Shelley," I told her. "I get sad when I think some of the incidents that occurred in my childhood," she objected. "But you are saying that I should go ahead and feel that sadness, even cry if I need to, to free myself from my food addiction."

"That's right, Shelley," I told her. "The choice is yours."
