



The board is the sole govern-munications center and assuch makes all decisions relating to fiscal matters and helps to formulate the policies and procedures for the center. Inevitably, a portion of the Director's time must be spent serving as a liaison between the vari-ous agencies for which the center dispatches and answering complaints and questions from the public.


When talking with the people in my district, some do not seem to care about registering to vote. They say, "voting will not make any difference!"
