Kirby pleads to lesser charge of manslaughter

A Chestnut Ridge man pled guilty Wednesday to a lesser charge of second degree manslaughter in connection with the shooting death of his girl friend in 1995.

Wally "Junie" Kirby, 39, was scheduled to be tried again for the February 1995 shooting death of Tracy Caudill, 22, of Orlando, but the trial never began.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain accepted Kirby's plea and set formal sentencing for June 26.

According to court records, Kirby will receive a five year sentence for the plea to the lesser charge. He had been charged with murder and wanted endangerment.

In March of last year, a Rockcastle County Circuit Court Jury could not reach a decision in the case after a three day trial.

When Caudill died in 1995 she was carrying the couple's second child. The eight and 1/2 month old fetus was delivered by cesarean section at the Rockcastle Hospital. The child is a healthy three-year-old girl now.

Martha Morgan, Tracy Caudill's sister, said Wednesday that although her family was not satisfied with the amount of time Kirby got for killing

her sister, she and other family members were glad it is over.

"This was killing my mom and dad and we are just glad it is over for their sake," she said.

"Our whole family will attend the parole board hearings, every time there is one that involves Junie, we intend to see that he spends the entire five years in jail," Mrs. Morgan said.

Kirby will remain free on bond until his sentencing date.

Local man killed Thursday in ATV accident at Sand Hill

A Renfro Valley man was killed Thursday night when he apparently lost control of the all-terrain vehicle he was driving.

Shane Vinzen Linville, 20, died of massive internal injuries after he apparently struck a tree, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell. Dowell said Linville died only minutes after arriving at the Rockcastle Hospital.

The accident occurred on the Calloway Hollow Road near Sand Hill, about 9 p.m., according to Kentucky State Trooper Millard Root.

Officer Root said that Linville and Melvin Cromer, of Sand Hill, had been working on the ATV when Linville decided to take it for a test drive.

"It was just an accident, it appeared he just lost control of the ATV because nothing seemed to be wrong with the vehicle," Root said.

Ironically, the same night that Linville died, a household shower was held for his bride-to-be.

Mrs. Edna Kirby, the mother of Linville's fiancée, Erin Kirby, said that friends of Erin held a household

shower on Thursday night before Shane Linville died. The two were to be married on May 2nd.

"We are all just devastated, especially Erin," Mrs. Kirby said.

"Our hearts are just broken - this is so tragic," Mrs. Kirby said.

And the Kirbys have had to deal with another family problem that could have also turned tragic.

Edna Kirby's father and Erin's grandfather suffered a heart attack on Thursday afternoon (before Shane Linville died) and had to be flown to

Controversy at high school gains statewide attention

Editor's Note: The state's two largest newspapers have published stories this week about a situation at the Rockcastle County High School.

On Monday, the *Lexington Herald-Leader* ran a front page story concerning Principal Ronnie Cash and English teacher Julie Cruse. On Tuesday, the *Courier-Journal* ran an associated press wire service story concerning the situation. The AP story follows. The *Signal* has run two stories connected with the following story as well. One appeared on Thursday, April 9, and the other appeared on Thursday, July 10, 1997 when Joyce Ponder filed suit in federal court against Cash, the Rockcastle County Board of Education and Superintendent Larry Hammond. That suit is still pending.

Neither Cruse, Cash nor Hammond will currently comment on the situation.

Cash said he could not comment because of the confidentiality of stu-

dents and staff members involved, but that when he could he would make a public statement.

A battle of finger-pointing at Rockcastle County High School has the principal accusing an English teacher of falsifying scores on 57 student writing portfolios and the teacher accusing the principal of sexually harassing her.

Principal Ronnie Cash, reported to the state that the teacher, Julie Cruse, corrected students' portfolios for them. Teachers are allowed to tell students to make corrections, but not to correct the work. For example, they could circle an improperly spelled word, but not give students the correct spelling.

Cruse could lose her teacher's license if found to have committed the violations.

But a month before Cash made the charges against Cruse, she accused him of sexually harassing her -

and she's not the only one to do so at RCHS.

In the past two years, two other teachers at the school have filed complaints against Cash, saying he retaliated against them after they complained.

Those teachers, Joanna Ward and Joyce Ponder, filed formal sexual-harassment and discrimination charges with the Education Professional Standards Board in Frankfort.

The standards board dismissed both complaints against Cash last year.

Ponder charged Cash with sexual harassment and discrimination, and Ward made charges of harassment, degradation and intimidation.

After several complaints that the state Department of Education did not properly investigate cheating allegations across the state, the agency created the board, to investigate every complaint received from school districts. The complaints are kept pri-

rate until the board issues its findings.

Marcia Seiler, the prosecutor for the board, said the simultaneous investigations of Cash and Cruse will come before her.

"It will come out in the mix if there are findings that this is in retaliation," Seiler said. "I think I'd have to look at both investigations together."

One of Cruse's students, Dana Mason, supports the teacher. Dana said she had conferences with Cruse to look over the portfolio, and Cruse would point out potential problems but leave any changes to Mason.

"I don't feel like if a teacher tells you a comma is out of place that they are changing the content of your work," said Dana, an A student who will attend Berea College in the fall.

Mason was also a co-captain on this year's cheerleading squad at RCHS. Cruse was the squad's sponsor.

911 Communications

This week's column is devoted to "mapping." This is one of the most difficult and time consuming tasks related to the implementation of E-911. If done correctly, though, the mapping of the county will prove to be an invaluable asset not only to the Rockcastle County communications center, but to other agencies as well. According to the schedule laid out several months ago, the mapping of Rockcastle County will begin in approximately two weeks. As with the first column in this series, I will answer some of the most commonly asked questions concerning the issue.

Why is necessary to "map" the county? Mapping the entire county will enable the communications center to create a computer database of every residence and structure in the county and to assign every structure and residence a "locatable address."

As you are already aware, house numbers have not been assigned to homes

located in more remote parts of the county. The people living in these areas are located by a rural route box number, which does work for local delivery, but is not ideal for location by emergency services and law enforcement. For example, imagine that you are a deputy sheriff who has been dispatched to an emergency situation somewhere in the northern end of Rockcastle County near Disputanta. The name of the person(s) needing assistance, a rural route address, and a brief description of the house are the only pieces of information you have in regard to location. Upon arriving in the area you discover a row of mailboxes with partial names and address (letters and numbers missing) located near the intersection of two roads with no signs. It is obvious that the location you are looking for is on one of these roads, but you are not sure. It is a frustrating

time-consuming problem. Eventually, you may find the location, possibly by going door to door and asking for directions, or by trying to find a house that matches the description given by the caller. By the time you arrive, 20 minutes has passed and the situation has become more critical. This is the kind of situation that our emergency responders have to cope with on a regular basis. However, with the assignment of locatable address and road names, these problems can be eliminated.

Who will map the county and will these people be given any sort of training? People from within the county will do the mapping. Currently the 911 director, a county road department employee, and an employee from the Property Valuation Administrator's office are being trained in mapping methods. These people, once trained, can provide hands-on training to other people as they are needed. The training materials, and technology (measuring devices, computer software, etc.) for the mapping project is being provided by EmergiTech, a company based in Ohio. EmergiTech will provide assistance and support from the day that the first mapping crews go out until the process is complete. The 911 Board hired EmergiTech last fall after considering other consulting firms.

How long will it take to map the county and put E-911 into effect? We will try to complete the process as quickly as possible. The realistic time frame for mapping completion is somewhere between 15-20 months. This means that E-911 will most likely be implemented in the fall of 1999. (Remember, though, basic 911 is a different matter and will go on line, June 1, 1998.) The mapping process will begin in Mt. Vernon and move outward to other sections of the county. The areas closest to towns can be mapped easily and quickly. Obviously, the remote areas will take more time.

How will house numbers/addresses be assigned? 911 personnel will work with county officials and the postmasters in the various communities to assure there will be continuity in addresses within the county. Numbers/Addresses will be assigned in accordance to U.S. Postal addressing standards. This means that numbers will be assigned on the "city-block" standard (this method can be adopted easily in the cities where streets are plotted on a grid, but will have to be modified for the rural areas). Using this method, each block will be three-tenths (.30) of a mile

County Attorney speaks out about child abuse prevention

On average, there are 44 cases of child abuse every day in Kentucky alone. In 1996, 169 cases of child abuse were reported in Rockcastle County; 78 were substantiated.

The statistics are alarming, but Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who handles cases of child abuse in district court, said the increases in reporting could be a positive sign.

"When an instance of child abuse is reported, that means action is being taken to protect the child," Burdette said. "Although it is a shame that any child is ever abused, it is even more tragic when a case of abuse is not reported until the child has been severely injured or killed. We know we are making progress when people care enough to report the abuse."

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and Burdette said he has found there are many misconceptions about child abuse.

"Many people believe that child abuse is physical abuse alone," Burdette said. "They think of bruises,

cuts and broken bones. Although that is a form of child abuse, it is not the only form."

Burdette said he has seen several types of abuse in his four years of service as county attorney, including physical abuse, neglect, sexual abuse and emotional abuse.

"Each form of child abuse is devastating in its own way," Burdette said.

Children who have been abused may exhibit one or more of these characteristics: poor self-image, inability to trust others, aggressive behavior, fear of forming relationships and failure in school.

When child abuse is reported, the Department for Families and Children determines if there is reasonable cause to suspect child abuse in the home. If reasonable cause is found, the Department of Social Services notifies local law enforcement officials within 48 hours. While the police hold criminal investigations, Social Services interviews family members, inspects the child and contacts others, such as teachers and doctors, who might have information on the child's history.


If evidence points toward neglect or abuse, Social Services files a petition in juvenile court requesting emergency custody. A hearing is held within 72 hours of the petition. After the hearing, the police and Social Services report their findings to a judiciary board to determine if the child is in immediate danger. If action is necessary, one of two solutions may be mandated during a dispositional hearing: 1) the child will

be returned to his or her home with Social Services rendering the necessary services to make the home safe for the child; or 2) the child will be taken out of the home until problems have been resolved.

Burdette said he hopes Rockcastle Countians will play an active role in helping stop child abuse.

"By being watchful and concerned, we can recognize the signs of child abuse," Burdette said. "The next step is reporting it to protect the child."

erage is available to those disabled veterans who have received grants for the purchase of specially adapted housing. Such grants are available to certain severely disabled veterans who are entitled to compensation for service-connected permanent and total disability.

Q—I have seen ads in the paper listing VA properties for sale. Are those also available to people who were never in the military service?

A—Yes, interested persons should contact a real estate broker of their choice in the area where they are interested in purchasing a property. If they have difficulty locating a participating sales broker/agent, they should call the VA regional office managing the property for assistance. The VA regional office nearest a caller

can be reached at 1-800-827-1000.

Q—How do I file for service-connected disability compensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)?

A—Monetary benefits, called disability compensation, are paid to veterans who are disabled by injury or disease incurred or aggravated during active military service in the line of duty. Application should be filed on VA Form 21-526, Veterans Application for Compensation or Pension. Contact VA at 1-800-827-1000, a veterans service organization, or your local veterans service officer for an application.

Q—I recently filed a claim for compensation benefits at my VA regional office. What happens next?

A—Generally, additional medical evidence is necessary to complete a claim for VA compensation or pension benefits. VA assists veterans in securing any additional evidence for the claim by requesting it directly from private sources. A VA examination is sometimes necessary. If so, the veteran will be notified directly by the VA medical facility assigned to secure the examination. Once all the evidence is secured, it is referred to a VA rating board for review and determination. The process time for a decision varies depending on the length of time to secure the evidence and the number of claims before the rating board. A VA counselor where

you filed the claim can advise you as to the average processing time for each specific claim.

Q—Are compensation rates for service-connected disabilities the same for veterans who served in peacetime as they are for those who served in wartime?

A—Yes.

Q—Who is eligible to buy VA-acquired properties?

A—Anyone, veteran or non-veteran, may offer to purchase these properties.

VA questions answered

Q—Does VA provide mortgage insurance for homes purchased with a VA-guaranteed loan?

A—Only if the home is specially-adapted house authorized by VA for a severely disabled service-connected veteran.

Q—What kinds of homes are available under VA's acquired properties listings?

A—VA often has a range of properties available, including single-family detached dwellings, multiple family units (up to four-plex), condominiums and townhouses. The properties are available for sale to the general public through the services of private-sector real estate brokers.

Q—Does VA offer mortgage insurance for the home loans its guarantees?

A—The only mortgage insurance offered by VA is Veteran's Mortgage Life Insurance (VMLI). VMLI cov-

Moore beats Tigers to give Rockets first seed in district

Senior Scotty Moore scattered five hits, struck out six and walked two en route to a 6-2 win over the Clay County Tigers Monday. The win gave the Rockets a sweep during regular season of their district and upped their season record to 14-2.

Freshman Brandon Bishop pitched a flawless seventh inning for the Rockets.

Balanced Budget? What Balanced Budget. Mr. President?

As most every Kentuckian probably knows by now, budget gurus and economic experts in Washington D.C. are predicting that the federal government will end this year with its first budget surplus since 1965. And how does the White House respond to this news? By submitting an unbalanced budget for next year, replete with big, new spending programs and various tax increases that clearly threaten to bust last year's budget agreement. The price tag: \$98 billion in new taxes over the next 5 years, and a four billion dollar budget deficit for 1999. To paraphrase former President Reagan, there they go again.

Last year, the President and the Republican Congress signed an historic agreement to balance the budget and reduce the tax burden on American families. The President committed to an agreement that would lead to a succession of balanced budgets or budget surpluses. With those surpluses, we in the Congress had hoped to invest in America's future by starting to pay off the national debt, strengthening social security, and giving all Americans well-deserved tax relief.

It now appears that the President understood the balanced budget agreement to mean that once the Congress forced him to submit a single balanced budget, he was then free to propose whopping tax and spending increases. According to the Senate Budget Committee, the President's new budget for 1999, proposes \$150 billion in new spending over the next five years and includes 85 new federal initiatives. The President's budget also calls for \$122 billion in new taxes and user fees. This from the same Administration that has repeatedly declared the era of big government over.

To make matters worse, the President's budget contains several gimmicks designed to hide most of his new spending. One of these schemes is to spend \$10 billion in revenue from the tobacco deal in 1999. I am sure that you are asking the same question that I asked when I saw it. "Just what tobacco deal is he referring to?" Yes, believe it or not, one of the assumptions in the President's budget is that he will have an additional \$60 billion to spend over the next five years, courtesy of a deal with the tobacco industry. Officials at the White House continue to take no role in negotiating a deal with the tobacco companies, yet they are already spending the proceeds. Talk about counting your chickens before they are hatched!

We fought long and hard last year to negotiate a good faith deal to produce a balanced budget, and we expect the White House to live up to their end of the deal. Unfortunately, the President is acting like a kid in a candy store with your hard-earned tax money burning a hole in his pocket. I believe the Balanced Budget Agreement is not the end of a journey towards fiscal responsibility, it's just the beginning of the long road toward solidifying our nation's economic future: paying off our national debt, guaranteeing the solvency of Social Security and Medicare and relieving the tax burden on all Americans.



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Beware of "Home Improvement" Scams This Spring & Summer

Homeowners should be cautious when some fly-by-night repairman calls to say he "just happens to be in the neighborhood." Such operators may claim to have just finished a paving job and offer to apply leftover asphalt on the homeowner's driveway at a bargain price. The price usually turns out not to be a bargain. Sometimes these callers will offer to spray coat the driveway with a sealer that turns out to be dirty car oil mixed with kerosene. This mixture will wash off the driveway with the next rain.

A home is probably the largest single lifetime investment you will make. You should protect this investment by always dealing with reputable and responsible

businesses. The old adage of "if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is" applies. Another consumer fraud which affects people in rural areas is barn painting. The barn is often painted with watered-down paint or oil and kerosene. The owner soon discovers that the "paint" has washed away with the next rainfall. How can homeowners protect themselves from such fraud? Dealing with familiar, established businesses is the best way. Owners also should not hesitate to check out the people or companies they plan to hire for home repairs with the Better Business Bureau. Require a contract in writing to outline costs of all materials and labor separately. Require

contractors to provide a copy of liability and worker's compensation. Get more than one estimate or opinion. Be wary when contractors pressure you if work is not done today. Make sure warranties and guarantees are in writing. Always read the contract carefully before

signing and request check references from the company.

Slugs: Easy To Find, Hard To Control

These shiny trails and chewed plants are sure signs that slugs have been foraging in your greenhouse or float bed. While it's easy to spot signs of their visits, these frequent pests are hard to control. Slugs ooze a slimy, sticky substance that leaves a telltale shiny trail as proof of their visits when they use rasp, mouthparts to feed on plants. What makes control difficult is that they must feed on and ingest a toxic substance; contact alone won't control them. These pests emerge from the soil or surrounding area to enter greenhouses and float beds this time of year because temperatures are cool enough for them to be out. They usually forage at night, but might emerge during the day after a cooling shower if the temperature remains steady or declined. When temperatures rise, slugs crawl down into hiding places to rest and absorb water through the skin. Slugs are so sensitive to temperature that they can detect changes as gradual as two degrees F. per hour.

Several management practices can help control slugs. Since slugs are sensitive to air currents, improved ventilation might make them move. Slugs turn toward a gentle breeze and extend their antennae. However, as the breeze becomes stronger, they turn away from the source, probably to escape dehydration. Slugs usually hide in moist, dark areas during the day so remove extraneous vegetation, trash piles or other materials that provide shelter or food.

Slugs will feed on just about any kind of plant. The larger ones eat

irregular holes in foliage, while the immature ones chew on surface tissue. Since slugs and snails can eat several times their body weight in a night, they can cause serious damage in a short period of time. This damage often is blamed on cutworms or other insects, but the slime trails are a sure sign slugs were the real culprits.

To control slugs, use a bait that contains metaldehyde. Slugs feed intermittently so several applications will be needed for control. For best results, apply baits in the afternoon. Place baits in areas where slugs will find them such as under a board, pot or flat. Since metaldehyde is more effective under dry conditions, delay watering until the next day.

Baits with methoxychlor can attract slugs from up to three feet away. The toxic effects apparently are caused primarily from dehydration. Under wet conditions, slugs might be able to absorb enough moisture to compensate for reaction to the bait.

Agricultural News

A severe snowstorm February 4 and 5, 1998 has caused severe damage in all areas of the county. Farms suffering severe damage may be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP) administered by the Rockcastle County FSA Office if the damage:

- will be so costly to rehabilitate that Federal assistance is or will be needed to return the land to produc-

ive agricultural use and is not the type that would recur frequently in the same area

- affect the productive capacity of the farmland

- will impair or endanger the land

A producer qualifying for ECP assistance may receive cost-share levels not to exceed 64% of the eligible cost of restoration measures. No producer is eligible for more than \$20,000.00 cost sharing per natural disaster occurrence. The following types of measures, may be eligible:

- removing debris from farmland
- grading, shaping or releveling severely damaged farmland
- restoring permanent fences
- restoring conservation structures

and other similar installations.

- Producers who have suffered a loss from a natural disaster may contact the local County FSA Office and request assistance immediately and up to May 1, 1998. To be eligible for assistance, practices must not be started until:

- an applications for cost-share assistance has been filed
- the local County FSA Committee or its representative has conducted an onsite inspection of the damaged area

- the Agency responsible for technical assistance, such as the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has made a needs determination, which may include cubic yards of earth, moving, etc., required for rehabilitation.

What is most interesting is that the **debt was not due until I came into office**.
 - That the **Road Fund** has more than enough money. **Fact is**, our county must now maintain our roads on **less money** than it did in 1989. And I have had to see that \$80,000 a year of what we do have, is used to pay off old road debts.
 - That the state could **not require** the fiscal court to meet its obligations. **Fact is**, we had **two simple choices** with regard to raising revenue: 1) Take charge and place the **lowest possible rate** on the county to **cover old mismanagement**; or 2) **Do nothing and allow the state to set the rate** on all of us. We had only one month to do this and I am proud to say that I did **not allow** the state to set the rate for us. **I did my duty to save you money**. The state's rate would have been much higher. Our's is **one of the lowest in the state**, at 4%. Most are in the 10 to 15% range.
 - That our **juvenile delinquency bills** would shrink. **Fact is**, I am the only county judge-executive in the state to introduce a "Parental Responsibility" ordinance. The cost of housing juvenile delinquents is shrinking. When my opponent was county attorney, records show there were very few bills to house delinquents. Well, I believe when juvenile criminals are a threat to the elderly and others, they should be **locked up**. I am glad they are finally being prosecuted and we will gladly pay their detention bills in order to protect law-abiding citizens.
 - That the county was able to balance its budget in earlier years. **Fact is**, Congress shut off all federal revenue sharing money to all counties! This was a **loss of \$250,000 a year** to Rockcastle. In addition, we also lost \$60,000 a year because we no longer have a coal mine. While those funds were coming in, Rockcastle allowed its tax revenues to fall from 14.7% during the 1970s to **only 7.2% today**. The state required something be done to correct the situation.

I WILL continue using real blacktop on our county roads, one road at a time begin blacktopping program on Cemetery roads make business decisions instead of old, out-dated political promises

We must do what is right for our future.

THE BRITTLE FACTS ABOUT OSTEOPOROSIS

With May being the month for mothers, it is only appropriate that we

think about how we can protect our mothers' health as they once protected ours. That is why Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center has taken this time to explain the effects of something that one out of every two women over the age of 50 will have during their lifetime—an osteoporosis-related fracture.

Osteoporosis is a disease with no apparent symptoms. It leads to fragile bones and an increased risk for fractures of the hips, spine, ribs and wrists because of the structural breakdown of bone tissue. Bones become thin and weak, causing them to break easier and making them harder to mend.

"There is no cure for osteoporosis. However, steps can be taken to slow down the disease," said Dr. Kimberly Cornelius, a physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center. "Women who are not receiving estrogen replacement should consume 1,500 mg of calcium a day. And women receiving estrogen replacement should consume 1,000 mg of calcium a day."

Although osteoporosis affects men and women, 80 percent of its sufferers are women. Other risk factors include a thin

or small body frame, advanced age, family history, a diet low in calcium, smoking, excessive use of alcohol, being postmenopausal, and being Caucasian or Asian.



The best defense against osteoporosis is to build strong bones before age 30 and to keep healthy bones throughout your life. However, it is never too late to slow down the process of osteoporosis or to prevent it from happening. Some prevention methods include a balanced diet rich in vitamin D and calcium, a healthy lifestyle, which

includes not smoking and limiting alcohol intake, doing weight-bearing exercises, and when appropriate, bone density testing and medication.

Recent research shows that adults receive half or less of the daily calcium requirement.

"It takes a lot of discipline to consume enough calcium each day," said Dr. Cornelius. "But it can be done, whether it's through foods or calcium supplements. The key to prevention is to consult your physician before determining the right amount of calcium."

Another prevention method is to "fall proof" your home. Reducing the chances of a fall helps lessen the risk of breaking bones.

The following tips can be used to "fall proof" a home:

- Remove all loose cords, wires and throw rugs from the floors.
- Place grab bars and non-skid tape in the shower or bathtub.
- Install non-skid rubber mats near the sink, stove, or anywhere water or grease could be spilled.
- Immediately clean up all spills.
- Ensure that all rails and carpeting are secure on steps or staircases.

HEALTHY TIPS

Finally, a reason to do housework! Even though housework is not a substitute for normal exercise, it is comforting to know housework does burn calories.

Following are some examples of how household chores can add to your normal exercise routine. The chart is based on how many calories a 130-pound woman and a 175-pound man would burn during 10 minutes of work.

SIGHT FOR SORE EYES

Although most people are busy during the summer applying sunscreen to their necks and shoulders to prevent sunburn caused by harmful ultraviolet rays, surprisingly few are aware of the damage these same invisible rays may pose to their eyes. As UV rays become more dangerous, it has been predicted that by the year 2030, twice as many people will be blind, and glaucoma cases will double.

"Ultraviolet rays are emitted by more than the sun," said Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center physician Dr. Michael Hamilton. "What few people know is that ultraviolet light also comes from computer monitors, fluorescent lighting and mercury vapor lamps used to light sports fields and parking lots at night."

The sight of a ski slope in the sun or a beach on a bright day are two examples of views that may reflect large amounts of UV light back into your eyes. Long-term exposure to UV light can lead to cataracts (cloudiness of the lens), pterygium (tissue growth on the white of the eye that can block vision) and skin cancer around the eyelids. Children are not immune to the danger, facing the possibility of photokeratitis, a painful sunburning of the cornea.

Dr. Hamilton recommends those who work or play in the sun wear sunglasses, which will absorb UV radiation before it strikes the eyes. Sunglasses without UV protection can cause great danger to the eyes, since beneath the lenses the pupils dilate, allowing more of the harmful rays to enter the eyes. The following guidelines



may help people to select sunglasses that are safe and appropriate for summer play:

- Select sunglasses that will block 99 to 100 percent of ultraviolet rays. This information should be labeled on the product.

- Check lenses carefully for scratches, bubbles and distortions. Flaws and distortions will cause your eyes to work even harder and can result in eye damage.
- Select children's sunglasses that are impact-resistant, bendable and that fit their active lifestyles. Children's sunglasses should never be made of glass.

Safety always in season

To most boaters, Memorial Day weekend officially kicks off boating season. As a result, thousands of boats celebrate by taking to Kentucky's waters to pleasure ride, water-ski, fish and just have fun. This increase in traffic on the waterways calls for an increase in caution.

As you prepare for fun and sun on your boat, don't let safety be the last

thing on your mind. Make sure you have the proper equipment on board. This includes personal flotation devices, fire extinguisher, navigation lights, signaling devices, exhaust muffling system and ventilation system. Other recommended, but not required, equipment includes a first aid kit, owner's manual, spare parts and tools, boat paddle, anchor, bail-

ing device, towline, radio and emergency food and drinking water.

The most important thing you can do while on the water is pay attention. Kentucky's waterways can become congested with skiers, pleasure boaters and anglers. So, just like on the highway, watch out for other divers. Pay particular attention to personal watercrafts (PWC), such as Jet Skis, Sea Doo's, Wave Runners, etc. Because of their small size and low profile, these increasingly popular vehicles can sometimes be difficult

to see.

Remember, as of March 1, 1998, a person must be at least 12 years old to operate a personal watercraft or motorcraft greater than 10 horsepower on Kentucky's public waterways.

Cedar Chests recalled

The Lane Company will voluntarily replace locks on cedar chests made before 1987 because they latch automatically when the lid is closed, posing a hazard to children.

Six children, ranging in the age from 21 months to 10 years, became trapped and later suffocated while playing in the chests between 1977 and 1994, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said last week.

The Altavista, Virginia, company made about 12 million chests with

automatic latches between 1912 and 1987, when the locks were redesigned. Furniture stores sold them nationwide, and some may have been handed down through families.

Consumers can determine if their chest has an old lock by closing the lid, without pressing a special lock button. If the lid doesn't open, they should call Lane at (888)856-8758 for a free replacement.

The old locks also click loudly when the lid is shut.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 4, through May 18, 1998. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1998 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1998 will be due about September 15, 1998.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment or real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.


Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax appeals.






