

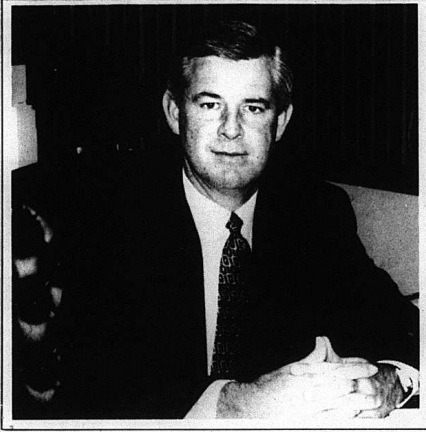
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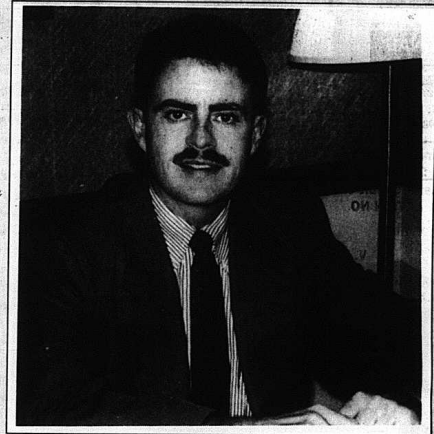
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Bluegrass Summer Games first deadline Friday, June 26th

McKinney murder trial to begin next week

The Rockcastle County man accused of killing his wife and her two small children in 1995, is scheduled to go on trial in Pulaski Circuit Court on Tuesday.

Gary McKinney, 31, of Level Green, has been behind bars since his arrest in 1995, by then Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Randall Reynolds.

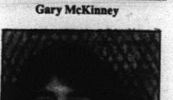
Reynolds and Deputy Darrell Doan arrested McKinney for driving under the influence and later charged him with the murders after a friend of McKinneys told police McKinney had killed his wife and her children. Shirley Faye Bowles McKinney, 29, and her children, Brian Lee Bowles, 11, and Amy Michelle Bowles, 3, were shot April 2, 1995 and their bodies were burned beyond recognition in a house fire in rural Pulaski County.

Autopsy reports revealed that Mrs. McKinney and Brian Bowles were shot multiple times, with two separate guns and Amy Michelle was shot once.

Pulaski County Coroner Alan Stringer said the three were dead before the house fire.

McKinney and his wife, of only one month, and her two children were renting the house that investigators later said was intentionally burned.

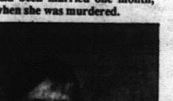
The house was located in the Plato Community, near the Rockcastle/ (Cont. to A12)

Hwy. 150, I-75 part of major road projects

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has some major plans for Rockcastle County roadways over the next four years.

The Cabinet announced this week six major projects for the county beginning in 1999.

The projects include widening Interstate 75 to six lanes from the Madison County line to the Sand Hill overpass, 4.5 miles south of Mt. Vernon. That will be 21 miles of interstate, which is scheduled to begin next summer.

One of the most heavily traveled roadways in the county, (Hwy. 150) is also scheduled to be completely reconstructed from Brodhead to Hwy. 461 beginning in the year 2002.

The state did not list a route for the new roadway, although three different proposals are on the drawing

board. The transportation cabinet also listed nine tenths of a mile up West Main Street in Mt. Vernon from Hwy. 461 for major widening.

The stretch of road that carries traffic to the Rockcastle County Middle School, several apartment houses, a small shopping complex, and numerous homes is heavily traveled and extremely congested during the school year. The state did not list a date for construction to begin on that project.

The state will also reconstruct Hwy. 2549 (Old 461), from the entrance at the Rockcastle Industrial Park #2 to Hwy. 150. Currently B & H Tools is the only employer in the new park, but local officials hope others will follow. No date for that project was listed either.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will discuss the projects at their regularly scheduled meeting.

Indictments for sex abuse, drug trafficking

A Mt. Vernon man, who threatened to start a blood war with local police and the county attorney, is behind bars after he was indicted this month for escape.

Steven E. Tompkins, 27, is being held without bond. He was indicted for escaping Brodhead Police Officer Joe Bussell in May.

Tompkins will be arraigned Friday. Earlier this year, Tompkins threatened to harm, County Attorney Jeff Burdette, Officer Bussell and Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas.

Rachelle M. Gardner, 26, of Hwy. 490 Livingston, was indicted on seven counts stemming from a May 25th incident.

According to the indictment, Gardner was charged with taking property owned by Marvin Rigby of Mt. Vernon and shoplifting at Dairy Mart in Mt. Vernon the same night.

Records indicate Ms. Gardner was intoxicated and escaped from Mt. Vernon police officer Roy Gamberel after her arrest. She is free on bond until her arraignment on July 10.

Donald Hellard, 40, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon was indicted for first degree sexual abuse.

Hellard is accused of having sexual contact with a girl less than 12 years old in August of 1995.

He is free on bond until his arraignment on Friday.

Steven Pierce, 23, of Livingston was indicted for having drugs in his possession when he returned to the Rockcastle County Jail to serve a sentence on the weekends. He is now a full-time prisoner and will be arraigned on Friday.

Randi Faye Saylor, 22, of Brodhead, was indicted for trying to obtain drugs by altering a prescription on June 5. She is free on bond.

An Anville man filled a full \$10,000 cash bond so he could be released from custody after he was indicted on six counts stemming from an April 19th incident in which he is accused of beating his estranged wife with a coffee table and destroying (Cont. to A12)

Renfro donates 5,000 tickets to help PRIDE program

Eastern and Southern Kentucky has always been known for the natural beauty it possesses. The region has often times been referred to as God's Country because of its magnificent beauty.

But in recent years, pollution problems have plagued our region. The main two pollution sources have been straight pipe sewage discharge and illegal dumping of trash.

However, thanks to a new program created by U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers and Kentucky Natural Resources Secretary James Bickford things are changing in Eastern and Southern Kentucky.

Last year the PRIDE program was created in an effort to focus people's attention on the pollution problems in a 40 county region of eastern and

southern Kentucky, and to find solutions to clean up and stop the pollution spoils in the rivers, lakes, creeks and streams in the region. PRIDE, which stands for Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment has a unique approach to the pollution problem.

"What PRIDE is trying to accomplish is to rekindle a sense of pride in people, in the communities and for the future," said PRIDE'S Executive Director Darrell L. Ishmael.

"PRIDE's main goals are to ask every citizen of the 40 county region to become involved in this effort and to do their part to help clean up Eastern Kentucky," Ishmael said. "Second to provide resources for local governments to provide the water and waste water infrastructure needed to eliminate water pollution prob-

lems and assist in their efforts to eliminate other environmental problems such as illegal dumps and third by educating the public on why this project is important and how they can help and participate in the PRIDE program." Ishmael said.

Currently, the PRIDE program has received \$25.5 million in funding for activities such as education materials, new and innovative sewage treat-

Only four prisoners left in local lock-up

All but four inmates have been moved from the Rockcastle County Jail, according to Jailer Joe Howard.

Howard said Wednesday that demolition of the old kitchen area in the current jail would begin this week and that meals would have to be catered in for those remaining.

Jailer Howard said the number of inmates held on a day to day basis would average around ten because of arrests made each day, but he would not be able to hold more than ten inmates during the next two months. Howard said contractors were estimating it would take that long to fix the kitchen area so meals could be

cooked at the jail again. The inmates were transferred to Laurel and Pulaski County jails.

J & J Food Mart of Mt. Vernon will cater the meals to the inmates for \$11.50 per day. Howard said he requested bids from several local restaurants for the three meals a day and that J & J was the low bidder.

The entire jail renovation project is scheduled to be completed by September 28, but the jailer said he didn't think that would be possible.

"I doubt if it is completed during my term, which ends at the end of December," Howard said.



Travelers along Interstate 75 have found the going a little slow at times this past week. On Thursday morning, an Illinois man lost control of his rig at the 68 mile marker, totaling the tractor-trailer and on Friday morning, an Irvine man hauling a load of lumber to Somerset dumped the entire load when his rig overturned in the median. Our Readers Write

To The Editor:
Until my recent 5 mph auto accident, I was not aware of Kentucky Comparative Negligence Law. This law allows the insurance company to reduce the amount of a settlement by the percentage they feel the claimant contributed to the accident. I was hit broadside, in the middle of an intersection, by someone who had a stop sign and HIS insurance company found me to be 15% responsible for the accident, thus charging me with 15% of the cost despite a police report that showed I was not a fault.

In my opinion, Kentucky National Insurance, and I'm sure other companies as well, is abusing this law to save themselves millions of dollars each year. People told me it would cost more to fight than to settle. To date, fighting this insurance has cost me \$2,100. Repairs to my car were only \$2,000.

I have fought this all the way to the State Insurance Commissioner, but the wheels turn slowly. My one voice is not making enough of a difference. If you feel you have been forced to accept liability, and the ensuing expense, in an accident that was not your fault, I would like to hear from you. Together we can make enough noise to get the attention of the legislators so that this type of abuse can be investigated and stopped.

Tobacco farmers who depend on migrant labor may now obtain copies from the FSA county office. Recent raids leading to illegal migrants remind farmers who use migrant workers it is very important that farmers who use migrant workers are aware of the new labor law as they are being enforced.

The Rockcastle County FSA Office is now assisting farmers in the lease and transferring of tobacco. A bulletin board is available for listing your tobacco for lease. Producers who did not lease or market tobacco in 1997 is urged to remember burley quotas will be dropped permanently if not planted, leased or sold two out of the three preceding years. DEADLINE FOR SIGNING TOBACCO LEASES OR SALES IS JULY 15TH.

Producers are reminded to report crop acreage such as wheat, corn, tobacco, etc. by the deadline of July 15th. This assures the producer history for these acreages.

Several policy changes were implemented for 1998 and future years to streamline the AMTA program. One policy requires all signatories and eligibility documentation deadline for the program to be August 1st. In deadline data is to ensure that PPC payments may be issued timely in September. Another policy requires the deadline for filing all reconstructions as June 1st. County

office shall complete these reconstructions requests by July 15th in order for all AMTA signatories and eligibility documentation to be filed by August 1st.

Producers are reminded beginning January 1, 1998 all FSA payments shall be made by Direct Deposit. If you are producer eligible to receive a FSA payment please be sure you have signed up for Direct Deposit by December 30th.

Rockcastle Farmers' Market is now accepting fresh fruits and vegetables from local farmers for sale. Remember this is the place for buying and selling nutritious food produced in Rockcastle County. KEEP THE FOURTH OF JULY FESTIVE

Look both ways before you cross the street." "Buckle up." "Don't talk to strangers."

These statements are a parent's daily reminder to their children to be careful and to stay away from danger. During the Fourth of July holiday, Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center (RHRCC) urges parents to add one more reminder to the list.

"Don't play with fireworks."

Each year, nearly 13,000 people are injured by fireworks, according to Prevent Blindness America. And more than half of those injured by fireworks are children.

A child's favorite, the sparkler, reaches a temperature of 1,800°F, which is hot enough to melt gold. And, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, sparklers are the second highest cause of hospitalization resulting from fireworks, with the first being bottle rockets. Approximately 72 percent of fireworks-related hospitalizations are caused by bottle rockets, which are illegal in Kentucky.

"If you want fireworks to be a part of your family's Fourth of July celebration, we encourage you to take your family to a community-sponsored fireworks show," said Gary Asher, director of material management and plant operations at RHRCC. "That is the safest way you can celebrate the Fourth with fireworks."

However, if you decide to incorporate consumer fireworks into your celebration, Asher has recommended the following guidelines to make your Fourth of July safer.

And, to make it easier to discuss these

safety regulations with your children,

RHRCC has supplied a search-and-find puzzle below that you can use during your discussion. The bold words listed in the guidelines can be found in the puzzle.

- Make sure an adult is present when fireworks are being used.
- Always use fire

works outdoors in an open, solid and level area away from flammable material.

- When selecting a location, allow room for fireworks to land or move without coming in contact with bystanders or flammable material.
- Make sure anyone watching is at a safe distance. Forty percent of fireworks

injuries are to observers.

- Read and strictly follow all directions on fireworks.
- Use a "punk," a device that burns without an open flame, or fireplace matches when lighting fireworks.
- Light one item at a time.
- Never light fireworks while holding them in your hand or placing your body or face over them.
- Keep a hose or fire extinguisher nearby in case of a fire.
- Spray all used fireworks with water and place in a bucket of water.

"The most important precaution is to never try to re-light fireworks that did not go off," said Asher. "Many children and adults are injured by approaching faulty fireworks. Leave the fireworks on the ground and spray them with water before approaching."

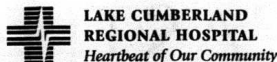

Fat and Cholesterol. What are they and Where are they found?

In addition to providing calories (or energy), fat also helps our bodies absorb certain vitamins. Some fats provide linoleic acid, an essential nutrient.

You're probably aware of pure fat foods, like butter, margarine, shortening and oil. But don't forget the "hidden" fats in foods like well-marbled meats, chicken skin, whole milk and cheese, ice cream, nuts and nut butters, seed salad dressings, and some baked products.

Cholesterol that comes from our liver is a fat-like substance. Our bodies are able to make cholesterol, so it's not a necessary nutrient in our diets. Cholesterol is only found in animal foods, like meat, poultry, egg yolks, and dairy foods. Cholesterol is NOT found in any plant foods. So, fruits, vegetables, grains, nuts and seeds, and beans all contain zero cholesterol. That means you shouldn't get too excited about the "No Cholesterol" claims on foods like peanut butter, margarine, and vegetable oils; all these foods are plant foods, so they never contained and cholesterol in the first place... unless it was added during processing. It's more important to remember that all these foods are concentrated sources of

FATs are, therefore, of calories. Fatty acids are the basic units of a fat molecule. You've probably heard the term "saturated," "polyunsaturated," and "monounsaturated;" these are the different types of fatty acids that make up a fat molecule. All fats are mixtures of these three types of fatty acids, but different fats vary in the amount of each fatty acid they contain.

Saturated fatty acids tend to raise blood cholesterol levels. They are found in largest amounts in animal fats. These include the fat in whole milk, cream, cheese, butter, meat and poultry skin. The three types of vegetables oils that are high in saturated fats are coconut, palm and palm kernel oil (the so-called "tropical oils").

Neither polyunsaturated fatty acids tend to raise blood cholesterol levels. Olive, peanut, and canola oils, and most margarine and vegetable shortenings, are high in monounsaturated fatty acids. Polyunsaturated fatty acids are found mainly in the fats of plant foods, like safflower, sunflower, corn and soybean oils, some fish are also good sources of polyunsaturated fatty acids.

49 Rockcastle 4-H youth attend camp at London

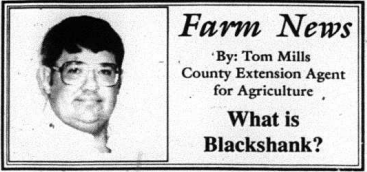

What is Blackshank?

Blackshank is a fungal disease which affects the roots and lower stem of tobacco plants. By damaging the roots ability to absorb water and the stems ability to move water up into the plant, this disease can lower production or even kill plants.

The first signs of blackshank are very similar to drowning. A wilted plant scalds and dies. Blackshank affected plants will wilt during hot afternoons but return to normal overnight. After 2 to 4 days wilting, many plants will scald and die. Upon further investigation, the roots and lower stem may show dark brown to black discolored areas. The key to positive identification is splitting the stem and finding pitch separated in disk. You could distinguish this as it dimes were stacked one upon the other with a small space between. A lab test is available to confirm visual identification. Only one other thing normally causes disking of the stems pH. When lightning strikes the tobacco, diskling occurs. However, the mid-vein of leaves will turn black, distinguishing it from blackshank.

The fungus which causes blackshank is moved from one infected field to another by several methods. Anything that can move dirt or plant trash can move the blackshank fungus. Most typically, we see blackshank moved to a farm by

borrowing infected transplants from a farm with blackshank. However, this is not the only means. Sharing plows, disk harrows and setters can allow soil from one field to be moved to another. Mud and dirt clinging to tires can move soil from infected fields. Even cattle can possibly move soil from fields. Fields located in flood-prone areas allow soil to be moved in to streams as well as downstream fields in the flood plane. The biggest threat to include in our publication, is when they spread stalks and stripping root trash on fields.

Blackshank has the ability to survive in soil for many years. Farmers consider this the worst of tobacco diseases because it stays around and causes such high losses. The best method for control is to return infected fields to sod. Move to fields that have not been in tobacco and use resistant varieties. If you are limited in land for rotations, use resistant varieties plus Ridomil.

Since blackshank can cause large losses, require lower yielding resistant varieties and expensive amounts of chemicals, the best control method is one of prevention. Do not borrow plants and clean all equipment used in other tobacco fields.

Blue Mold continues to spread throughout Kentucky

Kentucky tobacco producers throughout the state are being hit

hard by the blue mold fungus, a disease that has caused more than \$300 million in losses to the state's producers since 1995.

We have confirmed blue mold fungus in 40 counties. We believe the number of cases of active blue mold has been reported," said William Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Nesmith said that it is active in both dark and burley tobacco from the far west through central Kentucky. Only eastern and northeast

Kentucky counties have not yet experienced significant damage from blue mold, he said.

He noted that while blue mold activity continues to increase in western, southern and central Kentucky, the activity appears highly variable.

"County agents reports the greatest damage so far has been to transplant production systems, especially in traditional beds still under cover and where little preventive fungicides have been used. Most field infections caused by camp is making new friends, getting a chance to meet others from different counties. Watch for next year's 4-H Camp dates."

Nesmith said that although direct damage from blue mold may not have occurred yet, the disease's potential for devastating damage is great, with the disease being established in the state so early in the growing season. Use of foliar fungicides in the field is low, he said, due to wet field conditions and decisions by many producers to delay spraying until other farming operations have

been completed.

Nesmith urged producers to apply foliar fungicides at five-day intervals in all transplant production systems. Field sprays should be started in all counties with active blue mold as well as in those counties adjacent to blue mold-active counties.

"Acrobat MZ at 2.5 pounds per 100 gallons of water and Dithane DF at 1.5 to 2.5 pounds per 100 gallons of water are two fungicides labeled for use in Kentucky. Producers make sure their sprayers are calibrated to achieve complete coverage of plants," he said.

Nesmith also suggested that tobacco producers keep in close contact with their county Extension agents for agriculture for up-to-date information on blue mold and its prevention.

Rockcastle County Extension Agent Tom Mills said blue mold had been reported in Livingston and in Boe Lick.

represented, Everett, Evelyn, Lori, Katrina, Brett and Keith Adams with nephews Trevor Edwards and Zachary Wormouth.

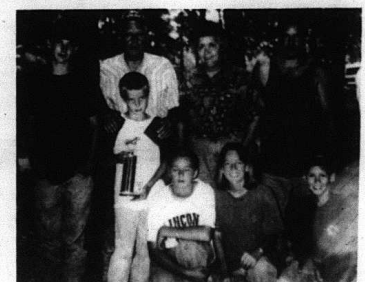

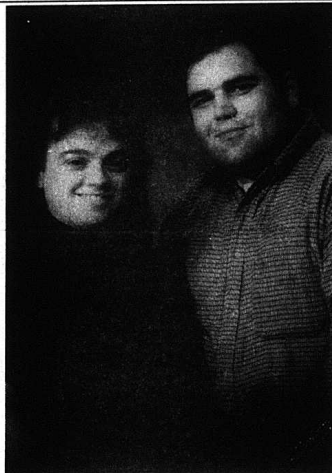

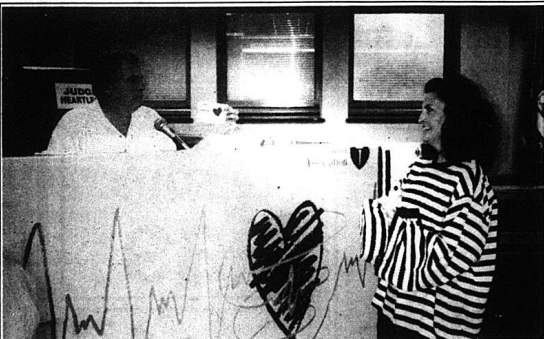
Cromer finalist in Miss Kentucky Preteen Pageant

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A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 Rockcastle History Book which was published by the Rockcastle County Historical Society.

Historical Events in Livingston
Livingston was established as Fish Point on February 12, 1867. The name was changed to Livingston Station on August 4, 1879. On May 11, 1882, the name was changed to Livingston, as it is known to this day. Livingston was named for James Livingston, who was among the first to settle in this town. Livingston is situated 165 miles from Cincinnati, Ohio; 140 miles from Louisville and 137 miles from Knoxville, Tennessee.

During my childhood period, 1912 to 1946, I recall that Livingston was then considered a progressive and growing small town. We had the L&N Railroad yards that repaired the coal burning engines and freight cars, working approximately 400 men. In addition, we had a water station for the trains consisting of four large water tanks located near the railroad depot which worked approximately twelve people. This included operators, mailmen and freight men.

Very few people owned automobiles. The roads were not paved and most people traveled by passenger trains. Most all of them stopped at

Livingston, traveling north to Cincinnati and Louisville, and south to Corbin and all other points south.

The pay of the railroad men for labor was very costly per hour. Trainmen made approximately \$200.00 per month. Most of the railroad people lived in their own homes, or at the three story hotel, called the Eight Gable, operated by the Nicely Family. In the hotel was a large dining room where they served food and in addition, they operated a large restaurant close to the depot. In the hotel, each room had a large pitcher and bowl filled with water, because there was no running water.

When I was ten years old, I sold newspapers to the railroad men, and picked up their overalls to be cleaned. I received thirty cents a day as pay.

Yes, we had a town board, policemen and a small jail. Most people were friendly and helpful to each other. There were medical services which included two doctors and one dentist. The doctors were always on call to come to the home as needed and charged a small fee.

There were no hospitals in the county, so all babies were born in the homes, and the mothers were assisted by midwives in the birth.

Livingston was not without the WORD OF GOD. We had five churches and on Sunday morning you could hear the church bells ringing all over town. People read the GOOD BOOK (THE BIBLE), from Friday to Monday, and that's how the weekend was.

In addition to the railroad workers, we had a large saw-mill located near the railroad bridge south of town crossing the Rockcastle River. This employed approximately twenty-five people who lived in a large hotel near the freight depot. The logs that came to the mill were floated down the Rockcastle River by men on rafts and were stopped at the mill by a man-built dam.

The Livingston Grade School and High School was built of wood. It consisted of eight large rooms that were heated by coal stoves in each room. There was no running water or electricity. We were fortunate to have outside toilets. The teachers pay was from \$75 to \$100 per month. However, they had complete control of the school and students respected them. If you received punishment, it was by paddle or switch and they didn't have any mercy. The parents approved of the manner in which the school was conducted. There was not a lunch room, so if you lived far from school, it was necessary to bring your lunch. We had one hour for lunch period.

We were proud people with very little money to buy the necessities of life. Very seldom did you see twenty dollar bills. Most people were honest and bought on credit. They paid their bills every two weeks.

We did have our own games such as basketball, marbles, baseball, out the window, tag and swimming.

Now about the "Good old days" dress. The children wore bare feet in summer. The girls all wore dresses below the knee, and bloomers just above the knee. The boys most all wore overalls, or knickers on Sunday and caps for head dress. We got shoes for winter.

The necessities of life, such as radios, televisions, washing machines, dryers and various other appliances did not exist. People did everything the old fashioned way, by hand. Practically all homes did not have electricity and used kerosene lamps for light. All roads were built by hand and consisted of only dirt and rock. Although there were very few automobiles, people traveled by horse or mule back or wagons. A considerable number walked to town bringing their surplus vegetables, milk, and other farm produce to trade for groceries and other needed items from the grocer.

It was a must to raise a garden, pigs, chickens and own a cow, and pick berries to can for winter foods. Prices were cheap for most everything, compared to prices today. However, people had very little money to buy with. Some people called it the "Good old days"; I personally do not agree. Times were too difficult for most people to enjoy life as they should.

Then came World War II. Most of the young men had to leave home to fight for their country. Many did not return. They gave all they had in their life. Others returned to various parts of the USA to seek employment and to live and raise their families.

Today most people and the life styles have changed for the better. This makes living more convenient.

So, that is the way I saw it. Now enjoy life as it comes, day by day and be THANKFUL for what you have accomplished in life, and THANK GOD FOR EVERYDAY.

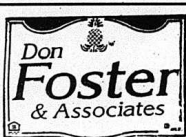
