



Cabinet has some major plans for
Rockcastle County roadways over
the next four years.
The Cabinet announced this week

six major projects for the county be-ginning in 1999.

The projects include widening Interstate 75 to six lanes from the Madison County line to the Sand Hill overpass, 4.5 miles south of Mt. Vernon. That will be 21 miles of interstate, which is scheduled to begin next summer.

One of the most heavily traveled roadways in the county, (Hwy. 150) is also scheduled to be completely reconstructed from Brodhead to Hwy. 461 beginning in the year 2002.

The state did not list a route for the new roadway, although three dif-ferent proposals are on the drawing





A child's favorite, the sparkler, reaches a temperature of 1,800°F, which is hot enough to melt gold. And, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, sparklers are the second highest cause of hospitalization resulting from fireworks, with the first being bottle rockets. Approximately 72 percent of fire works-related hospitalizations are caused by bottle rockets, which are illegal in

"If you want fireworks to be a part of your family's Fourth of July celebration. we encourage you to take your family to a community-sponsored fireworks show," said Gary Asher, director of material management and plant operations at RHRCC. "That is the safest way you can celebrate the Fourth with fireworks."

However, if you decide to incorporate consumer fireworks into your celebration, Asher has recommended the following guidelines to make your Fourth of July

And, to make it easier to discuss these

safety regulations with your children, RHRCC has supplied a search-and-find puzzle below that you can use during your discussion. The bold words listed in the guide-

lines can be found in the puzzle. •Make sure an adult is present when fireworks are being used.

 Always use fire works outdoors in an open, solid and level area away from flammable material.

 When selecting a location, allow room for fireworks to land or move without coming in contact with bystanders or flammable material.

· Make sure anyone watching is at a safe distance. Forty percent of fireworks

injuries are to observers

• Read and strictly follow all directions on fireworks.

Use a "punk," a device that burns without an open flame, or fireplace matches when lighting fireworks.

Light one item at a time.

• Never light fireworks while holding them in your hand or placing your body or face over them.

• Keep a hose or fire extinguisher nearby in case of a fire

· Spłay all used fireworks with water and place in a bucket of water.

"The most important precaution is to never try to re-light fireworks that did not go off," said Asher. "Many children and adults are injured by approaching faulty fireworks. Leave the fireworks on the ground and spray them with water before approaching."



> What is Blackshank?

Blackshank is a fungal disease which affects the roots and lower states of tobacco plants. By damaging the roots ability to absorb water and the stems ability to move water up into the plant, this disease can lower production or even kill plants.

The first signs of blackshank are very similar to drowning. A wilted plant sealed sand dies. Blackshank plant sealed sand dies. Blackshank can be sealed be sealed by the sealed by wilting, many plants will seal and die. Upon further investigation, the roots and lower stem may show dark brown to black diseased areas. The key to positive identification is splitting the stem and finding pith separated in disk. You could describe this as if dimes were stacked one upon the other with a available to confirm visual identification. Only one other thing available to confirm visual identification. Only one other thing normally causes disking of the stems pith. When lightning strikes tobacco, disking occurs. However, the mid-vein of leaves will turn black, distinguishing it from blackshank.

The fungus which causes blackshank is moved from one infected
field to another by several methods.
Anything that can move dirt or
plant trash can move the blackshank fungus. Most typically, we
see blackshank moved to a farm by

borrowing infected transplants from a farm with blackshank. However, this is not the only means. Sharing plows, disk harrows and setters can allow soil from one field to be moved to another. Mud and dirt moved to another. Mud and dirt clinging to tires can move soil from infected fields. Even cattle can possibly move soil from fields. Fields located in flood-prone areas allow soil to be moved in to streams as well as downstream fields in the flood plane. Farmers,

He noted that while blue mold activity continues to increase in westem, southern and central Kentucky, the activity appears highly variable.
"County agents reports the greatest damage so far has been to transplant production systems, especially
in traditional beds still under cover
and where filler preventive fungicides
have been used. Most field infections

Nesmith said that although direct

damage from blue mold may not have occurred yet, the disease's potential for devastating damage is great, with the disease being established in the state so early in the growing season. Use of foliar fungicides in the field is low statewide, he said, due to wet field conditions and decisions by many producers to delay spraying until other farming operations have age from blue mold may not have

been completed.

Nesmith urged producers to apply foliar fungicides at five-day intervals in all transplant production systems.

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

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A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 ockcastle History Book which was ublished by the Rockcastle County istorical Society.

Livingston was established as Point on February 12, 1867. The r was changed to Livingston Station on August 4, 1879. On May 11, 1882, the name was changed in the change of the ch

During my childhood period, 1912 to 1946, I recall that Livingston was then considered a progressive and growing small town. We had the then considered a progressive a growing small town. We had a L&N Railroad yards that repaired coal burning engines and freight ca working approximately 400 men. addition, we had a water station water tanks located near the residence which depot which worked approximatel twelve people. This included opera-tors, mailmen and freight men.

tors, mailmen and freight men.
Very few people owned automobiles. The roads were not paved and most people traveled by passenger trains. Most all of them stopped at

Livingston, traveling north to Cincinnati and Louisville, and south to Corbin and all other points south. The pay of the railroad men for labors was thirty cents per hour. Trainen made approximately \$200,000 per nonth. Most of the railroad people lived in their own homes, or at the three story hotel, called the Eight Gable, operated by the Nicely Family. In the hotel was a large dining room where they served food and in addition, they operated a large restaurant close to the depot. In the hotel, each room had a large pitcher and bowl filled with water, because there was no running water.

When I was ten years old, I sold newspapers to the railroad men, and picked up their overalls to be cleaned.

picked uptheir overalls to be cleaned, I received thirty cents a day as pay. Yes, we had a town board, policemen and a small jail. Most people were friendly and helpful to each other. There were medical services which included two doctors and one dentist. The doctors were always on call to come to the home as needed and charged a small fee. There were no hospitals in the county, so all babies were born in the homes, and the mothers were assisted

homes, and the mothers were assisted by midwives in the birth.

Livingston, was not without the WORD OF GOD. We had five could hear the church bells ringing all overtown. People read the GOOD BOOK (THE BIBLE), from Friday day, and that's how the weel

In addition to the railroad workers, we had a large saw-mill located near the nailroad bridge south of town crossing the Rockeaste River. This employed approximately twenty-five people and they lived in a large host earth er leight depot. The logs that came to the mill were floated down the Rockeaste River by men on rafts and, were stopped at the mill by a man-built dam.

The Livingston Grade School and High School was built of wood, it consisted of eight large rooms that were headed by coal stoves in each room. We were proud people with very little money to buy the necessities of life. Very seldom did you see trevely follar bills. Most people were honest and bought on credit. The ypaid their bills every two weeks.

We did have our own games such as basketball, marbles, baseball, out the window, agand as winming.

Now about the "Good old days" ress. Most children went barefoot in summer. The girls all wore dresses below the kenee, and bloomers just above the knee. The boys most all and caps for head dress. We got shoes and caps for head dress. We got shoes for winter. The necessities of life, such as radios, televisions, washing machines, dryers and various other appliances did not exist. People did everything the old fashioned way, by hand. Practically all homes did not week the particular plant of the practically all homes did not have electricity and used kerosene lamps for light. All roads were built by hand and consisted of only dirt and rock. Although there were very few automobiles, people traveled by horse or mule back or wagons. A

horse or mule back or wagons. A considerable number walked to town bringing their surplus vegetables, milk, and other farm produce to trade for groceries and other needed items the grocer

from the grocer.

It was a must to raise a garden, pigs, chickens and own a cow, and pick berries to can for winter foods. Prices were cheap for most every-thing, compared to prices today. However, people had very little money to buy with. Some people called it the "Good old days," I personally do not agree. Times were too difficult for most people to enjoy life as they should.
