Historians say South could have won the Civil War

Military historian Charles Roland says most people are surprised when they learn how close the South came to winning the Civil War.

"Not winning in the sense that we defeated the Germans and Japanese in World War II," Roland said," and not winning in the sense that we defeated the Germans and Japanese in World War II," Roland special to the South. The Confederacy was close to winning because it came close to breaking the national will to continue."

Roland, professor emeritures of history at the University of Kentucky, has spen 10 years in retirement lecturing to Civil War and World War II, story at the University of Kentucky and his experiences as an infanty officer in Europe during World War II, Roland has mapped out a way the South could have overcome the unfavorable odds it faced in terms of troop strength and other resources.

"It's really part theory, part whinsy," he said, adding that he is not trying to rewrite or violate history but rather "play a game," in which he maneuvers armies like chess pieces. His theory aside for a moment, Roland says the South in reality had a least two potentially winning hands it didn't play because they were politically incorrect, running too much against the grain of the southern mentality. These were:

- Use wholesale guerrilla action instead of fighting pitched battles. But this would have meant allowing Union occupation of the South during the 10 or so years it would have taken the out-gunned Confederates to erode the Union will. This was unacceptable to the South. "Imagine we're at war with China," Roland sid. "Would we be willing to allow Chinese occupation of our homeland while we weaged unconventional warfare against them? How do you suppose that would go down with the American people today?"

• The spring and summer of 1864, after especially bloody fighting in Virginia between troops commanded by generals Lee and Ulysses S. Grant.

"If every battle had been a Fredericksburg, the war would in all probability have ended in Confederate victory because of a collapse of the northern will, a refusal by northerns to pay such a bloody price for victory." Roland said.

But every battle was not such a resounding rebel victory. "This is where my whinnsy comes in," he said.

Roland said the South could have won by avoiding key operational or

in," he said.

Roland said the South could have won by avoiding key operational or necicial blunders, provided the Union persisted in the mistakes it did make. He offered Shiloh as one example among many: The Union erred by positioning its troops on the same side of the Tennessee River as the robels instead of using the river as natural defense. And Grant, the Union commander, allowed the Confederates to take him by surprise. Those were costly mistakes, Roland said, but the result was not as costly as it would have been if seven week earlier Albert Sidney Johnston, the ranking Confederate general in the field, had not sent about 12,000 troops to Fort Donelson, where they were captured. Theorists say if Johnston had as many as 5,000 of those troops, hecould have destroyed Grant's ramy off Confederate collapse in its more vulnerable theater, the West.

Even without those additional toops, the Confederates probably could have won decisively at Shiloh.

could have won decisively at Shiloh if they had been deployed properly, Roland said. As it was, the rebels attacked in successive waves across the entire front, instead of concentrating themselves in such a manner as to cut the Federals away form their base on the river and sever their lines of reinforcement, supply and comof reinforcement, supply and com-

The mail was carried in bogs by train in a specially designed car, "the mail car," and kicked out the star die of the car as the train went by the post office. The outgoing mail was placed on a mechanism beside the track called the "mail catcher." A long "steel arm" reached out from the train sit sped by and caught the mail bag as it hung between two points of the mail catcher. The incoming mail was sorted by the Post master and put in books for the pations of the office. 





quantities of cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana and scheduled prescription pills.

More specifically in Bradley's case, he is accused of distributing measurable amounts of methamphetamine (Crank), a scheduled II controlled substance from May 12 to May 20, of this year.

On Friday, Federal Magistrate Judge J.B. Johnson detained Bradley without body

According to the Judge's order, Bradley is considered to be at risk for pradiety is considered to be at risk for flight and that the crimes he is charged with, if found guilty, could impose a sentence on him of at least ten years. Bradley's trial date has been set for October 26.

He is currently being held in the Laurel County Detention Center.

Unlike many other drug round-ups in recent years, this investigation did not center on the street-level dealer, but individuals suspected of being higher level distributors, Ste-

wart said.

DISEASE RAISES MANY QUESTIONS

FEW ANSWERS FOR MEN

he number of men who will die from this disease equals the number of women who will die from breast cancer. Yet its cause, how to prevent it and how to treat it are under debate.

The disease is prostate cance Approximately 200,000 men will be diagnosed this year. Nearly onethird of men over age 50 have microscopic prostate tumors. About 16 percent of all U.S. men will be diagnosed with the disease during their lifetimes, but most prostate cancers never become life threatening.

"The bad news is that studies have been unable to conclude what cause prostate cancer or how men can alter their lifestyles to try to reduce their chances of getting the disease," said Dr. George W. Griffith, family physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center.

"Some research suggests that there may be a link to such factors as high-fat diets, vasectomies and certain occupations, such as farming and welding. However, further studies must be conduct ed to prove those theories.

"The good news is that it is slow growing. This gives patients the ability to learn about their options and select the treatment that is best for them.

Researchers do know that age, race and family history play a role in determining risk. Older men and African Americans are more likely to develop the disease. Prostate cancer also tends to run in fami lies. Men with two close relatives who have prostate cancer are twice as likely to get it as men with no affected family members, and men with three affected relatives face a risk 11 times greater.

Like the cause, the value of detection screenings also is under debate. There are two screening-methods currently being used — a PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test and a digital rectal exam-

Some organizations don't recommend any screenings. However, the

American Cancer Society recommends that both exams should be offered annually to men beginning at age 50 and at age 45 for men who are at high risk. Early prostate cancer often does

not cause symptoms. However, when symptoms do occur, they may include:

- The need to urinate frequently;
- Difficulty or painful urinating;
- Blood in the urine; and/or Frequent pain or stiffness in the lower
- back, hips or upper thighs.

Treatment options

Men who are diagnosed with prostate cancer have several options. Some men whose cancer is slow growing and found at an early stage may not need treatment. According to the National Cancer Institute. treatments include watchful waiting, surgery, radiation therapy or hormone therapy.

Because there are so many options and possible side effects, patients should ask their doctors the following questions:

- . Do I need to be treated? What are my options?
- What do you believe is the best treatment for me? Why?
- Is there another treatment that may achieve the same results?
- What are the expected benefits, risks and side effects of each treatment?

- . Is it likely to affect my sex life? If so, are there treatments for that?
- Am I likely to have urinary problems? How often do you perform the treatment you are recommending?
- Will you check my lymph nodes?
