Migratory bird seasons, new fishing laws proposed at meeting

ROCKCASTLE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION
VENDOR PURCHASES (AP040)
FOR JULY, 1997 THRU JUNE, 1998

Tentative dates for this year's migratory bird hunting seasons were approved at the quarterly Fish and Wildlife Commission meeting in Frankfort Friday, June 17. These dates are pending federal U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service recommendations. The federal recommendations are announced the first of July with a 30-

day comment period. Federal guidelines are anticipated to be unchanged for all species except woodcock. Dove season will be three segments with a total of 60 days. The first segment is September 1 through September 30 with shooting hours from 11:00 a.m. to sunset. The second segment runs October 3 through

October 26 with shooting hours from 11:00 a.m. to sunset. The third segment runs November 26 through December 1 with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag and possession limit for doves is 15 and 30.

Woodcock season is October 17 through November 30. Bag and pos-

session limit for woodcock is three and six respectively. Snipe season is September 16 through November 1 and the second segment is November 26 through January 24. Bag and possession limits for snipe are eight and 16.

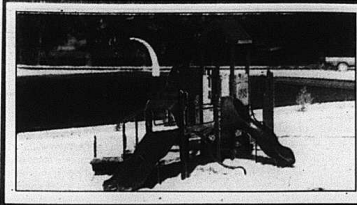

bird hunters is whether there will be an early wood duck and teal season again this year. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has allowed Kentucky to have this experimental season for the past 17 years. The season proposed is September 16 through September 20. The daily bag limit would be four of which no more than two could be wood ducks. Possession limit is twice the daily limit.

At their same meeting, the Fish and Wildlife Commission approved several fishing regulation changes. On Grayson Lake white bass, yellow bass, striped bass and their hybrids will have a size limit of 15 inches and daily of five singly or in combination. The limit will be needed to protect an annual stocking program of hybrid striped bass. On Dale Hollow Lake the size limit for largemouth bass will be 15 inches. The daily limit for black bass on Dale Hollow will decrease from six to five fish, only two of which could be smallmouth bass. They will also be a crappie size limit of 10 inches and a walleye daily limit of five on Dale Hollow. These regulations will go into effect March 1, 1999. The changes conform to existing Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency regulations which manages the majority of the Dale Hollow Lake. Somersal lakes will have more liberal fishing regulations come March 1, 1999. On Elmer Davis Lake the slot limit for largemouth bass will be 15 inches. On Peabody Wildlife Management Area (WMA) Goose, Island and South lakes the size limit for largemouth bass will be 15 inches. There will be a largemouth daily limit of 3 and possession limit

Mt. Vernon City Police were called to the Rockcastle County High School on Tuesday after a student reported that he had brought a gun to school in a sack.

Police searched 15-year-old and his locker, but found nothing.

Mt. Vernon police chief Bill Mink said the student admitted that he was making the story up about the gun. However, Mink said that the case was turned over to the Department of Social Services. "This young man will probably wish he had never made such a threat when he realizes how much trouble he is in," Mink said.

RCHS administrative assistant Barry Noble, who handles discipline at the high school, said that all threats of violence will be taken seriously and dealt with seriously. "We are not taking any chances with the safety of our students and staff," he said.

Sheriff gives settlement

Rockcastle County Sheriff Shirley Smith made his final settlement with the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court for 1997 last week.

The sheriff reported paying tax money to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court in the amount of \$168,823.

\$974,875 was paid to the Rockcastle County Board of Education, \$14,746 was paid to the Soil Conservation District, \$70,078 was paid to the health district, \$61,132 was paid to the extension district and \$37,564 was paid to the library board.

Ronnie Bradley, others indicted in federal court

A local man who has been rumored for years to be one of the biggest illegal drug dealers in the county, was arrested last Wednesday by state police and federal agents.

Ronnie Bradley, 45, of Quail, was arrested on Wednesday along with 50 other southeastern Kentuckians, in a massive round of suspected high-level drug dealers following a federal and state investigation, according to officials in U.S. Attorney's office in Lexington.

A federal grand jury in London returned sealed indictments against 54 people in Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Leslie and Bell Counties.

The indictments were the result of a ten month long undercover investigation, according to Captain William Stewart, Post Commander at the KSP Post 11 in London.

The indictments charge those individuals with conspiracy and possession with the intent to distribute.

Two middle school students hurt in four wheeler wreck

Two Rockcastle County Middle School students were injured, one seriously, in a four wheeler accident on Monday evening.

wheeler off her.

While Jessie got only bumps and bruises, Amy received a broken leg. Amy's right femur was broken, requiring a full leg cast. Amy said that x-rays would determine if surgery was necessary, but that she would be in the cast for six to eight weeks.

Jessie and Amy are both starters on the RCHS eighth grade girls' team, which begins play in September 1. Amy will miss the entire season.

Amy is the daughter of Randy and Edith Barnett of Mt. Vernon and Jessie is the daughter of Mike and Sheila Hayes of Brodhead.

Jackson County man pleads guilty to illegal dumping

A Jackson County man who allegedly accepted payment to haul citizen's trash and then dumped it in Rockcastle County found himself in jail this week.

Joe Estep, 21, of Sand Gap, was charged with two counts of illegal littering, class A misdemeanor on Monday.

Court records indicate that at least two Jackson County citizens, whose trash was picked up by Estep, swore out complaints because Estep dumped their trash somewhere other than an official waste station. He allegedly drove to Rockcastle County and dumped it in the Burnt Ridge Road area.

When the trash was found, solid waste coordinator Nancy Meadows wrote letters to the Jackson County citizens who later showed up to press charges against Estep.

The court agreed that the magistrate in each district would have the say over the change in road names in their districts.

Peters said that all of the allegations made against Cash by Hammond in Cash's letter of termination are false.

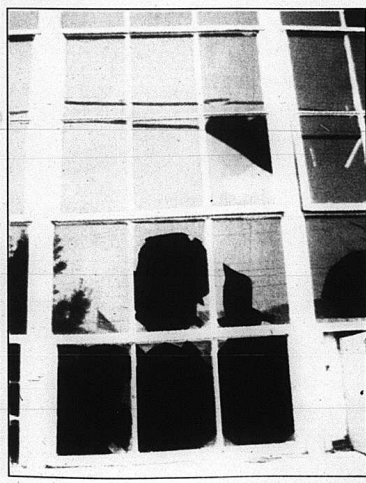
"There is not sufficient grounds to terminate the employment of my client by Hammond and we are going to fight this vigorously," he said Wednesday.

Precious souls, children of an evil age, greetings and contemplations to you and yours from the beginning-to-brown-a-bit Dell of Wabed. Life-long home of the late Espy T. Wainwright, long-time "shop" teacher at Wabed High, and part-time collector of used Britilo papers, who said, "A fellow ain't really educated until he learns to read usself."

A-mercy! Espy's grammar could stand some refining, but his insight is 20-20. How much more pleasing would my ministry have been had some folks read themselves rightly. How much more pleasing would my ministry have been had I read myself rightly!

Beloved, with this column I begin a series of essays, each of which falls under the rubric *Were I to Preach* usself.

Again. For some time I've thought that I would say if I were asked to preach somewhere (I've even contemplated writing a book entitled *Were I to Preach Again!*)

Almost ten years ago I left the ministry. But I didn't leave the church. My view from the pew has been both heartening and saddening. During my exile I think I've focused on what is genuine and what is farced. Beloved, let me lay aside some of my foolishness for a few weeks so that I can share with you in sermonic essays the things that are on my mind and heart. Bear with me as I commence my first of several themes (in no particular order of importance).

Were I to preach again, I would preach about ENVY, which William Barclay said "is the last sin to die."

According to my *Random House Dictionary*, envy is "a feeling of resentful discontent, begrudging admiration, or covetousness with regard to another's advantages, possessions, or attainments; desire for something possessed by another."

Envy, dear hearts, is the kissing cousin of jealousy, which is often referred to as "the green-eyed monster." Envy is also a green-eyed miscreation, but there is a slight difference between the two terms.

For instance, I am envious when I long to possess something that has been awarded to or achieved by another, as when a friend inherits a fortune. But I am jealous when another is awarded something that I think more rightly should have been awarded to me, as when a coworker receives a promotion.

Some other terms that keep company with envy are *resentment, grudging, greed, covetousness* (as in the Ten Commandments), and *spite*.

Hello! Are you still with me? No more definitions, I promise. I suppose Christmas morning holds more potential for envy than any day of the year. Think about it. And the church, which depends on voluntary gifts and service, holds more potential for envy than any organization I have known.

Many years ago, I accepted a pastorate in Mercer County. From the first Sunday to the day I left, a certain woman, call her Honey, spoke nothing but ill of me. She criticized Nancy's house-keeping, although she was never in the parsonage. She even criticized my clothing. Nancy gave me a beige corduroy suit with a vest for Christmas. I wore it to church on the first Sunday of the new year. A few

months later I was told that Honey had berated me in public in a store in Harrodsburg. "He had the nerve to wear corduroy in the pulpit!" The first day I wore that suit was the last day she attended church during my three year tenure.

Honey was relentless in cursing me. Had she done so after I had been there a while, I might have understood. But she literally hated me from day one. So, I went to her house to see if I could be reconciled with her. She let me have, telling me I was too young to be in the ministry (twenty-two), that God had no part in my being at that church, and that she would rejoice when I left!

"Why?" I asked a member friend who was aged and wise. "It's simple, Brother Johnny," he said. "A few months before you came, we nominated and elected three deacons [I was not one of them] and you were not elected. And the three new deacons were on the pulpit committee that presented you to us. She would have had it in for any preacher that committee chose."

After a few more pastorates I realized that being chosen as a deacon was - and still is - a status symbol in too many churches. And I also realized that there would be no little envy on the part of some who were not chosen, especially their wives.

Envy raised its ugly head in the company of Jesus' disciples. They got into it one day over who would sit at Jesus' right hand in the messianic age. That must have frustrated the Master.

Not only is envy the plague of voluntary organizations, it is the scourge of nations. Envy incites all kinds of evil between the *haves* and the *have nots*, between the *ins* and the *outs*.

Old Espy's comment at the start of this column is noteworthy at this point. Envious souls surely don't "read" themselves. In fact, envy is obvious to everyone except the *envier*. And let me hasten to add, beloved, that some of the most envious people on the face of the earth are preachers! Let a deserving preacher be called to a prestigious pulpit and lead the green course through the veins of the shepherds of smaller flocks. Let a student preacher work hard, burning the midnight oil in study to attain religious education's highest degree, and listen to the carping of his compatriots.

Beloved, it is when we are envious that we are most vulnerable to the wiles of the Tempter. When Abel's offering was acceptable to God and Cain's was not, God warned Cain, telling him that evil lurked in a hungry beast at his doorstep, but assuring Cain that he could be acceptable. Cain did not heed. Instead, he murdered his brother. How ironic: murder began at a place of worship!

Envy is most often expressed in evil-speaking, which is a more sophisticated way to "kill" someone.

Oh my, how many times were during my years of ministry. Always disparaging, forever seeking out something "wrong" and telling it everywhere, and - get this - thinking that in snooping and telling they somehow elevated themselves!

Ah, beloved, when I think of the envious souls I have known, and when I heed old Espy's advice and "read" my own envious heart, one thing is clear: our old world needs a Savior.

Were I to preach again, I'd say, "There is a Savior!"

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Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon is September 12th at Brodhead

The Cystic Fibrosis Bike-a-thon will be held September 12, 12:30 to 4:00 at Brodhead School. (Rain date Sept. 19) The event will be supervised and refreshments will be served to all participants.

Make a difference in the life of a child with Cystic Fibrosis. C.F. is the number-one genetic killer of children and young adults in this country. C.F. causes the body to produce a thick, sticky mucus which clogs the lungs. This abnormal mucus leads to frequent lung infections and fatal lung damage and also interferes with digestion.

The symptoms of C.F. are diverse, vary in severity, and are often confused with pneumonia, asthma or other respiratory problems. A child is diagnosed C.F. by measuring the amount of salt in the sweat. An abnormally high level of salt indicates that a person has C.F.

Approximately 30,000 people in the United States have C.F. (at least three in Rockcastle County). A child must inherit two defective C.F. genes - one from each parent - to be born with C.F. Twelve million Americans (one in 200 are symptomless carriers of the defective C.F. gene.

When the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation (CFF) was founded in 1955, few children with C.F. lived to attend elementary school. Today, the median age of survival for a person with C.F. is 29 years - still however, an unacceptably fact.

There is progress toward a cure. Scientists, supported by the C.F.F., are writing a remarkable medical success story. C.F. researchers are quickly translating what they learn about the C.F. gene and C.F. cells in the laboratory into promising new treatments. Based on their success, landmark gene therapy studies and clinical trials of new drug treatments are now underway. The results of these extensive clinical trials will determine the best treatment to alleviate C.F. related problems. For example, some drugs thin the dangerously thick mucus that clogs the airways and others fight life-threatening lung infections. These new drugs should improve the length and quality of life for people with C.F.

A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 Rockcastle History Book which was published by the Rockcastle County Historical Society

Mail Delivery of Yesteryear
It has always been a main concern as to where and how the people would receive their mail. It appears that in Kentucky the Post Office Department established little post offices within easy access of most of its citizens and within walking distances of their homes. These places were the hub of activity in a community and were the sources of vast information, rumors and gossip, in addition to picking up ones' correspondence. One such post office was established at Boone four miles south of Berea in the edge of Rockcastle County, and on the Cincinnati to Corbin Branch of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad. J.H. Lambert, the first postmaster, became furious when people addressed letters in a strange manner such as, "Oh carry me away at a rapid

rate, but let me remain in Kentucky state, at Boone Post Office let me be, until Myrtle Smith calls for me." In sorting the mail, the postmaster went into a frenzy when he found a letter addressed thusly. These type addresses were usually generated by the young people writing to their sweethearts. The small post offices were as a rule located in a corner of a

grocery store.

The mail was carried in bags by train in a specially designed car, "the mail car," and kicked out the side of the car as the train went by the post office. The outgoing mail was placed on a mechanism beside the track called the "mail catcher." A long "sided arm" reached out from the train as it sped by and caught the mail bag as it hung between two points of the mail catcher. The incoming mail was sorted by the Post master and put in boxes for the patrons of the office.

There were star route carriers to carry the mail by horse or mule from the post office on the railroad to outlying offices. The Boone Post Office served Rockford, Disputanta and Climax. Climax was fifteen to twenty miles from Boone. The trip was made by horseback until roads improved making it possible for delivery by truck.

I have found a list of post offices in Rockcastle County in a book copyrighted in 1941. At that time it listed the following as post offices in Rockcastle County: Bloss, located in the southern end of the county; Boone and Brodhead, on the west side of the county; Bromo, three or four miles out of Mt. Vernon; Bunney, on the east side of the county; Burr, two miles southeast of Mt. Vernon; Cedarville, in the southern part of the county; Climax and Conway, on the railroad; Coplay, the location of which is unknown to this scrivener; Disputanta and Dudley, on the railroad a couple of miles south of Wildie; Elem. and Gauley, a mile northeast of Livingston; Goochland, in the Crooked Creek area; Gum Sulphur, three miles west of Brodhead; Hansford, six miles south of Mt. Vernon; Hiatt, on Brindle Ridge; Horse Lick, near the Jackson County border; Hummel, on the railroad, four miles south of Wildie; Jep Hill, on the Red Hill Road; Langford,

on the railroad; Level Green, eight miles south of Mt. Vernon; Livingston, on the railroad and Rockcastle River in the southeast edge of the county; Luner, near Laurel County line; Mareburg, midway between Brodhead and Mt. Vernon; Mt. Vernon, the county seat and a receiving point on the south end of the county; Orlando, on the railroad; Ottawa, seven miles southwest of Mt. Vernon; Sinks, near Mullins Station on the railroad; Spiro, a mile or so from Mareburg; Three Links, on the Jackson County line; Wabd, four miles southwest of Mt. Vernon; Well

Hope, four miles, south of Mt. Vernon; Wildie, ten miles south of Berea on the railroad; Willalla, near the Pulaski County line; and Withens.

The Government did an extremely good job in delivering the mail to its citizens. This was a long and difficult task. The star routes were bid on by patrons who often carried the mail for very little compensation and took an extremely hard toll on the carrier and the animal which was often carrying heavy weights, were carrying items of produce and supplies from point to point.

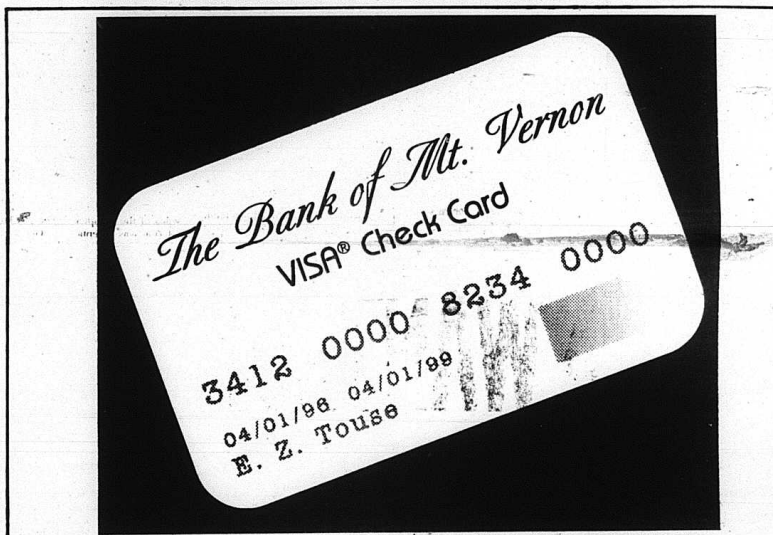

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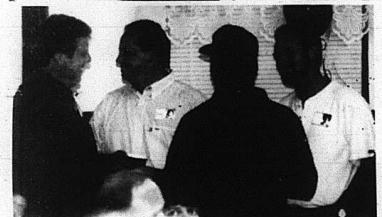

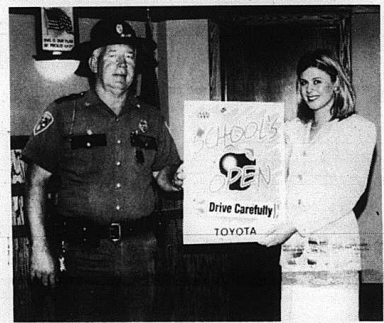
School's open, drive carefully

maintain the fairgrounds the way they should be and that much needed repairs were way past due.

"The board could use the money they make to upgrade the fairgrounds and make them something we could all be proud of," he said.

Carloftis said that now was the time to make such a move because the lease agreement between the county and Little World's Fair owners, Bill Frank Martin and Bill Gentry has expired.

The Judge said that once a board was in place that if they wanted to sublease the fairground to a private group for the annual fair that was always an option.

Magistrates told the Judge before they could make any decision on such a move they would have to know more about how the board would be set up and how they would operate. The magistrates told Carloftis to research the matter in more detail and

report back in September.

The court also agreed to reapply for an Appalachian Regional Commission grant for the Livingston Rejuvenation Project.

Funding for the project, which mainly involves a complete renovation of the former Livingston school was declined by the ARC, although it made it to the final stages.

Daniel Boone Development Council representative Ruth Martin told the court that Daniel Boone had high hopes for funding for the project.

If granted, the \$1,046,000 project would include: ten one bedroom assisted living apartments, it would convert the old school to a community center complete with office space for the Livingston Economic Alternatives Program.

There would also be room in the renovated school for a trade emporium, conference room, special needs rehab center, day care and education training center.

Daniel Boone, which is a community action agency based in Manchester, has been working on the

Livingston project since March of 1996.

They purchased the property from the Rockcastle County Board of Education with the help of state funds for \$42,500.

The school property has also been vandalized heavily since it closed.

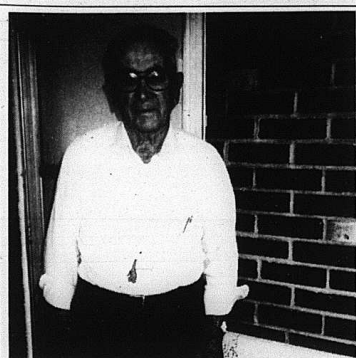

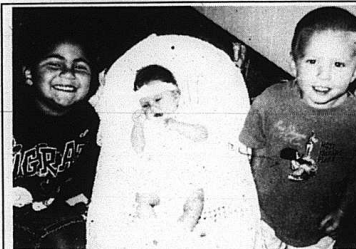

quantities of cocaine, methamphetamine, marijuana and scheduled prescription pills.

More specifically in Bradley's case, he is accused of distributing measurable amounts of methamphetamine (Crank), a scheduled II controlled substance from May 12 to May 20, of this year.

On Friday, Federal Magistrate Judge J.B. Johnson detained Bradley without bond.

According to the Judge's order, Bradley is considered to be at risk for flight and that the crimes he is charged with, if found guilty, could impose a sentence on him of at least ten years. Bradley's trial date has been set for October 26.

He is currently being held in the Laurel County Detention Center.

Unlike many other drug round-ups in recent years, this investigation did not center on the street-level dealer, but individuals suspected of being higher level distributors. Ste-

wart said.

The commander said there will likely be a lot of property seizures as the result of the investigation.

A stepson of Bradley's, who is a minor, was also originally named in the same indictment as Bradley, but a spokesperson for the U.S. Attorney's Office said that because he was a minor the indictment against him would not continue.

Bradley's next court appearance will be September 25 for a pre-trial hearing.

No other people from Rockcastle were named in the 54 indictments.

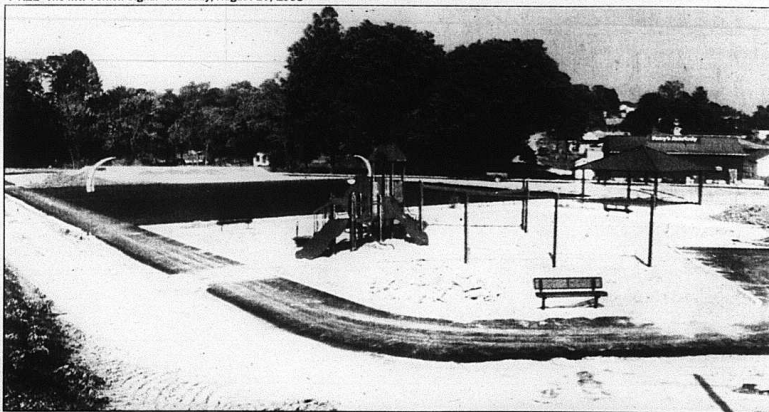

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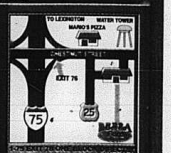
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Rockets lose to Knights 34-3

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team got something they are unaccustomed to on Saturday night.

A simple, good old fashioned drubbing.

How bad was it? 34-3, with the Rockets only score coming with five seconds to play.

The mighty Knights of Lexington Catholic handed Rockcastle their worst defeat in recent years, in the 51st Recreation Bowl in Mt. Sterling.

The Rockets only score came from the foot of placekicker Greg Terry, who booted a 23 yard field goal as time ran out. Terry is also the only Rocket to account for points in the Rockets last pre-season tune-up when they defeated Whitley County last week 3-0.

What is even worse for the Rockets is the injuries suffered by two starters.

Junior Gary Coffey, who plays full-back and was one of the Rockets leaders on defense is out for the season.

Coffey suffered the season ending knee injury early in the fourth quarter. "It is a shame for Gary and his family, they love football and he is a dedicated player, who gave everything," head coach Tom Larkey said.

"We will miss Gary, especially on defense, he was one of my best players," said defensive coordinator Tony Saylor.

Senior Andrew Carrera will also miss Friday night's contest after suffering a stress fracture to his right foot, also during the second half of

the game. RCHS coaches are not sure how long Carrera will be out, but he will not dress Friday night for sure, when the Rockets travel to South Laurel.

Saturday night's contest was not the normal game, Rocket fans or even the coaching staff is accustomed too.

Catholic scored on their first offensive play of the game on an 80 yard run, which had been set up as a pass play.

Catholic then added a 40 yard field goal to make the score 11-0 and just when Rockcastle started to move the ball in the second period, Catholic picked off an errant Rockcastle pass at mid-field and returned it 46 yards for the third score.

Probably the biggest nail in the Rockets' coffin came on the last play of the first half, when the Rocket defense didn't react well to a running play up the middle.

Catholic back Stephen Jones broke free on the 27 yard line and out ran the Rockets for a 73 yard score, which left the Rockets behind behind, 24-0.

During the first half Catholic had the ball only six minutes and ran just 14 plays. The Rockets had the ball 18 minutes and ran 40 plays.

Catholic added another touchdown and a field goal in the third quarter before calling the dogs off in the latter part of the fourth quarter and bringing in the junior varsity.

The Rockets had 212 yards of total offense.

Sophomore Christopher Parsons was 7 for 15 through the air for 79

yards. He also threw two interceptions.

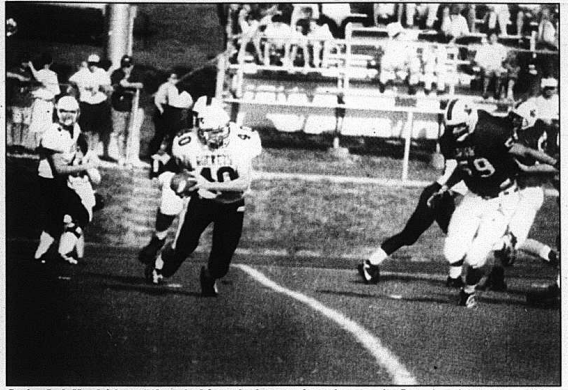
Senior Andy Hale caught six of those balls for 72 yards and Andrew Carrera caught one for seven yards.

Gary Coffey also played well on defense before getting hurt. Coffey was in on five tackles and he picked up one sack. Andy Hale had four tackles and assists as did middle linebacker Brooks Ingram. Ingram also had one sack.

Derek Bradley was in on three tackles and Josh Jones had two tack-

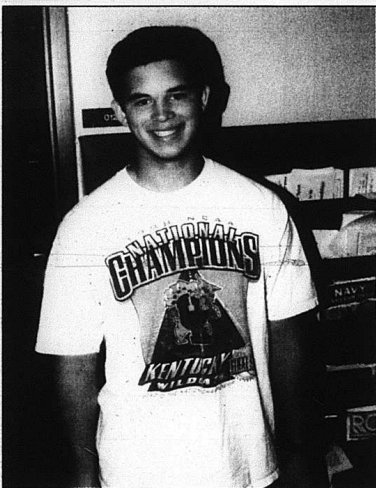

DISEASE RAISES MANY QUESTIONS

FEW ANSWERS FOR MEN

The number of men who will die from this disease equals the number of women who will die from breast cancer. Yet its cause, how to prevent it and how to treat it are under debate.

The disease is prostate cancer. Approximately 200,000 men will be diagnosed this year. Nearly one-third of men over age 50 have microscopic prostate tumors. About 16 percent of all U.S. men will be diagnosed with the disease during their lifetimes, but most prostate cancers never become life threatening.

"The bad news is that studies have been unable to conclude what causes prostate cancer or how men can alter their lifestyles to try to reduce their chances of getting the disease," said Dr. George W. Griffith, family physician at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center.

"Some research suggests that there may be a link to such factors as high-fat diets, vasectomies and certain occupations, such as farming and welding. However, further studies must be conducted to prove those theories.

"The good news is that it is slow growing. This gives patients the ability to learn about their options and select the treatment that is best for them."

Researchers do know that age, race and family history play a role in determining risk. Older men and African Americans are more likely to develop the disease. Prostate cancer also tends to run in families. Men with two close relatives who have prostate cancer are twice as likely to get it as men with no affected family members, and men with three affected relatives face a risk 11 times greater.

Like the cause, the value of detection screenings also is under debate. There are two screening methods currently being used — a PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test and a digital rectal exam.

Some organizations don't recommend any screenings. However, the American Cancer Society recommends that both exams should be offered annually to men beginning at age 50 and at age 45 for men who are at high risk.

Early prostate cancer often does not cause symptoms. However, when symptoms do occur, they may include:

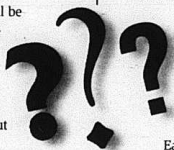
- The need to urinate frequently;
- Difficulty or painful urinating;
- Blood in the urine; and/or
- Frequent pain or stiffness in the lower back, hips or upper thighs.

Treatment options

Men who are diagnosed with prostate cancer have several options. Some men whose cancer is slow growing and found at an early stage may not need treatment. According to the National Cancer Institute, treatments include watchful waiting, surgery, radiation therapy or hormone therapy.

Because there are so many options and possible side effects, patients should ask their doctors the following questions:

- Do I need to be treated? What are my options?
- What do you believe is the best treatment for me? Why?
- Is there another treatment that may achieve the same results?
- What are the expected benefits, risks and side effects of each treatment?

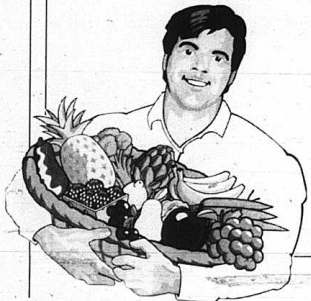


HEALTHY TIPS

BABY SAFETY 101

Outfitting your baby's nursery is an exciting venture for a new parent or grandparent. During baby's first years, it is easy to get caught up in purchasing equipment that meets the latest trends or goes well with the baby's nursery decor. It is important to create a playful, stimulating environment for your baby. However, your greatest concern should be the safety of your little one.

Many parents are unaware that preventable accidents are the No. 1 danger to their child during the first four years of age. Many of these accidents can be attributed to unsafe baby equipment. In fact, each year thousands of children are injured in accidents involving equipment such as cribs, carriages and strollers.

So what can you do to protect your infant? Your best defense against preventable accidents is to realize that they are just that — preventable. Assess the safety of your baby's equipment and consider these points in baby-proofing your infant-ware:

- High-tech doesn't mean high-safety. Even with the move toward high-tech function and material of newer baby equipment models, safety is not guaranteed. Remember to check labels to ensure that the product meets current safety regulations. A voluntary safety standard by the Juvenile Products Manufacturers Association (JPMA) is followed by the most reputable companies. Look for this seal when shopping for the safest in baby equipment.
- Take inventory in your home. Accidents in and around the home present a greater threat to the safety and well-being of your child than all childhood diseases combined. To ensure a safe environment for

your child, conduct a complete "crawl-through" of your home. Identify hazardous equipment throughout the house, remembering to check your baby's equipment for broken parts or older, unsafe designs. Realize many dangers may be unique to your home, so look for any potentially unsafe areas in your child's environment.

- In with the new, out with the old. Be cautious about accepting used or hand-me-down items. Although Aunt

Martha's beautiful antique crib would look exquisite in the new nursery, it is probably better off staying in the attic. In the last 10 years, baby equipment has gone through a series of changes that has made it safer and more functional.

- Read the instructions. To correctly assemble baby equipment, it is important that you properly follow the manufacturer's instructions. By taking this measure, you are ensuring the safety of the equipment — and your child.

APPENDIX A - PUBLIC NOTICE
 In accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, written policies and procedures have been developed which describe the Rockcastle County School District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information. Stated in this notice is a summary of your rights under the Act. These rights are passed on to the student at age eighteen. For the purpose of this notice, the student 18 years or older will be referred to as the "eligible" student. Parents, guardians and eligible students may review and inspect all education records relating to that student by making a request to the Principal of the school where that student attends.
 The RCSD will presume that the parent has the authority to review and inspect records relating to their children unless the district has been advised in writing that the parent does not have legal authority under applicable state law governing such matters as guardianship, separation and divorce.
 Personally identifiable information is not released to another party unless there is written authorization from the parent or eligible student, or there is a "Legitimate Educational Interest" as defined in the policies and procedures for confidentiality. A current list of employees' names and positions who have access to personally identifiable information is on file in each school. The RCSD has described in its policies and procedures the conditions under which personally identifiable information is released to another person without written parental consent.
 "Directory Information" is information contained in an educational record which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. This information may be released to news media, athletic organizations, scholarship or college entrance committees, or official organizations whose need for data is connected with student help activities. "Directory Information" includes, but is not limited to the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. The parent, guardian or eligible student currently enrolled, may request all or part of the directory information be withheld. The request must be in writing to the Principal of your child's school, within 30 calendar days after this notification has been distributed. The written request must specifically state what information may not be classified as directory information.
 In accordance with federal regulation concerning the release or transfer of educational records, it is the policy of this school district to forward education records on request to a school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Parents may obtain upon request a copy of the records transferred.
 The Rockcastle County Schools keeps child and youth records in a secure computer system and in locked files in each school and central office.
 Any parent or guardian of a student, or any eligible student, may challenge the content or accuracy of any material or entries in the student's educational records on the grounds that it is inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of the student. Requests to amend the records are submitted to the principal of your child's school.
 For students who have been determined eligible for programs for children and youth with disabilities, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parent when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. The RCSD will destroy the educational records of a child or youth without a parent's request after the records have been maintained for a minimum period of seven years and are no longer needed to provide educational programs and services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may be later needed for Social Security purposes. The RCSD retains for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance record, classes attended, grades completed and year completed.
 Children and youth determined eligible for special education include those children and youth with disabilities who have hearing impairments, vision impairments, emotional and behavior disorders, multiple deafness and blindness, health impairments, specific learning disabilities, mental disabilities, multiple disabilities, speech and language impairments, physical disabilities, autism, or traumatic brain injuries and who because of these impairments need specially designed instruction and related services.
 The Rockcastle County School has an ongoing Child Find system, which is designed to find any child or youth, age birth to 22 years, who may have a disability and need special education. This includes children and youth who are not receiving the special education they need to have an appropriate public education. The Rockcastle County Schools will make sure any child or youth who has a disability, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided an appropriate public education at no cost to the parents of the child or youth.
 Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County Schools find any infant, toddler, child or youth who may have a disability and need special education and related services. The district needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child or youth; the name, address and phone of the parent or guardian; the possible disability and other information to determine if special education is needed.
 Letters and phone calls are some of the ways Rockcastle County Schools collect the information needed. The information the school district collects will be used to contact the parents of the child or youth and find out if the child or youth needs to be evaluated or referred for special education services.
