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# Rockets lose to South Laurel 14-13

For the first time in several years, the Rockcastle County Rockets have lost two regular season games in a row.

On Friday night, the South Laurel Cardinals played host to the rival Rockets and all the Rockets sweat and tears and the multitude of fans couldn't save the Rockets from suffering a heart-breaking loss 14-13. The loss followed a drubbing by Lexington Catholic the week before.

The Rockets went ahead in the game early in the second quarter when Josh Singleton carried the ball around the right side for a three yard touchdown run.

Place kicker Greg Terry's extra point kick was good and the Rockets led 7-0.

But, the Cardinals came right back behind the passing attack of Quarterback Neil Warren.

Warren hit Cardinal receiver Matt Thompson on a ten yard touchdown pass and Daniel Bodager's kick was good.

Rockcastle finished their scoring early in the fourth quarter when sophomore Christopher Parsons carried the ball in from the one yard line.

Terry's extra point went wide to the right and Rockcastle's lead was only 6 at 13-7.

It seemed like the Rockets would hold on for the six point victory, but with two minutes to go, the Cardinals scored.

Facing a fourth and 25, Quarterback Neil Warren found a wide open Travis McDaniel on the goal line. The extra point was good and the Rockets found themselves behind and behind they would stay.

"I thought we had a good chance to win this game, and it was very disappointing to lose, especially the way we lost, but I felt like the players gave all they had," head coach Tom Larkey said.

"Our players must continue to work hard each week and not get down on themselves," Larkey said.

The Game from the first Play South Laurel won the coin toss and elected to receive. They took over on the 33 yard line.

South Laurel's first play caught the Rockets off guard when they ran a trick play that garnered them 40 yards.

South Laurel completed a couple of more passes before sophomore Sean Smith ended their drive when he recovered a Cardinal fumble.

After an exchange of punts, the Rockets offense began moving the ball behind some excellent running of backs Josh Singleton and Josh Dooley.

But, after picking up two first downs the Rockets lost the ball on a fumble of their own.

The second quarter began with both teams having to punt after failing to gain a first down.

Senior Andy Hale helped set up the Rockets score with a 35 yard punt return that gave the Rockets good field position on South Laurel's 30 yard line.

That was the drive that ended in the Rocket score with 6:00 left in the first half.

South Laurel came back quickly behind their passing attack.

The South Laurel scoring drive took only seven plays for Neil Warren to hit Matt Thompson in the end zone and leaving the score tied at 7.

South Laurel got one more chance to score before halftime but missed a 40 yard field goal, after they got the ball back on an interception.

Jeff Linville and Brooks Ingram partially blocked the attempt as time expired.

Rockcastle got the kick-off to start the second half on the 30 yard line.

The Rockets were able to move the ball to the 35 of South Laurel, but a quarterback sack for a large loss forced the Rockets to punt.

On their next possession, South Laurel stalled on a fourth and two after a good surge by the Rocket defensive unit.

"We played much better than the week before, we hit extremely well and as a defensive team we were much improved," said defensive coordinator Tony Saylor.

After South Laurel's failure to convert fourth and two, the Rockets went on to take the lead behind the running of backs, Derrick Bussett and Josh Singleton.

Bussett picked up 14 on one run and Singleton gained four, before Parsons took the ball in from the one.

After Greg Terry's kick sailed wide right the Rockets led 13-7 with 6:00 minutes to go in the game.

South Laurel failed on their next possession, but South Laurel punter Matt Thompson punted the ball to the three yard line, where the Rockets took over.

After failing to get a first down, a quick kick on third down by Rocket punter Henry Bryant gave the Cardinals the ball on the Rocket 35 yard line with 4:00 minutes to play.

After a 12 yard gain for the Cardinals, the Rocket defense began putting pressure on the Cardinal quarterback which resulted in two quarterback sacks and a fumble by South Laurel.

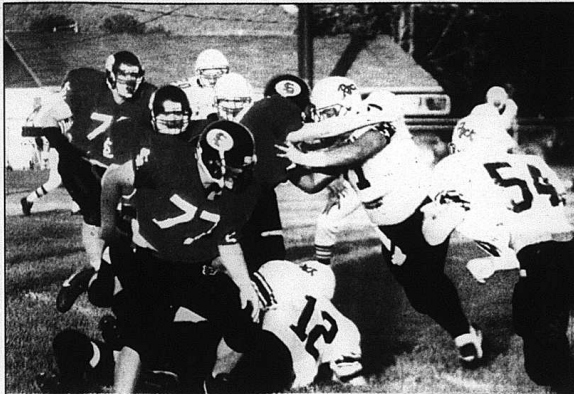
The Rockets weren't able to come up with the fumble recovery, but South Laurel faced a fourth and 25 from their own 33 yard line with 2:00 minutes on the clock.

But, Cardinal quarterback Neil Warren rolled out to his right, with Rocket linemen chasing from behind he unleashed a desperation pass that found Travis McDaniel all alone in the end zone.

Even with a bad snap on the extra point Daniel Bodager kicked the ball through the uprights to take the lead for good at 14-13.

With 1:57 remaining the Rockets went to their shotgun passing offense, but after Parsons found Andy Hale for a first down on the first play, the offense stalled and the Rockets were not able to get the ball far enough down field for Greg Terry to make a field goal attempt.

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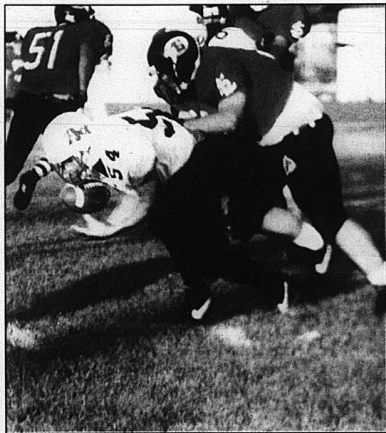

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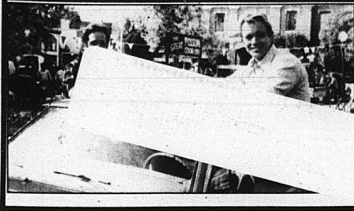

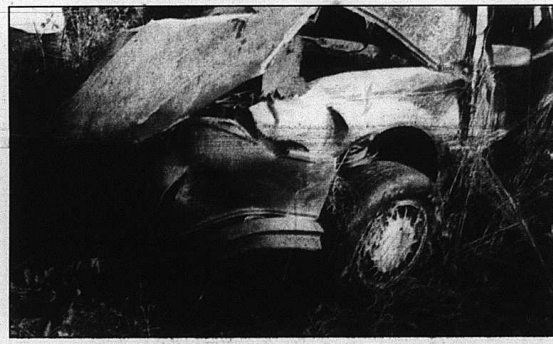

## One killed, several injured in local auto accidents

Several wrecks have occurred in Rockcastle over the past week, with the most serious being a fatal accident at Conway on Saturday night.

According to police, Jessie D. Lunsford, 17, of Berea, died in the 5 p.m. accident Saturday on U.S. 25 at the junction of Hwy. 150S.

Police said that Lunsford was apparently traveling at a high rate of speed when he lost control of his 1988 Chevrolet Beretta. Police said that the car flipped several times before coming to rest in a field adjacent to Hwy. 25.

Police said that Lunsford, who was ejected from the car, died in the helicopter as he was being transported to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Lunsford was employed at Gibson Greeting Cards in Berea. Members of the Brodhead and Mt. Vernon volunteer fire departments and the Rockcastle Ambulance Service were called to the scene of an accident on Hwy. 150 at Hall's Hill Friday morning.

According to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas, Farron Cox, 30, of Somerset apparently lost control of his compact car as he traveled toward Brodhead just after midnight.

Thomas said that after Cox's car left the roadway, it flipped over onto its top pinning Cox's body to the ground from the waist down.

Rescue workers used the jaws-of-life apparatus to free Cox from the wreckage. He was taken to Rockcastle.

## The case that led to the case against Ray Carmichael

According to a federal indictment, disqualified Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Carmichael's problem began after a criminal complaint was filed against a local pawn shop owner.

Less than a year later, on August 12, Carmichael was indicted on federal charges of extortion and attempted extortion.

Carmichael claims he is innocent of the charges and says he will be found innocent during his trial which begins October 5 at the U.S. Federal Courthouse building in Lexington.

According to open court records, here is what is known of the case that eventually led to Carmichael's indictment.

In November 1997, pawn shop owner Rodney M. Adams was arrested for terroristic threatening and weapon endangerment in connection with a criminal complaint filed by Bobby Gumm.

Gumm signed an affidavit saying that Adams told him he "was going to blow his brains out and pulled out a gun and stuck it in the affiant's (Gumm) face."

The incident was allegedly witnessed by several other employees at Thunder Electronics.

In the affidavit, Gumm says he told Adams to put the gun down and Adams told him to leave before he shot him.

Although Adams was arrested and charged in connection with the incident, the case never came to trial. According to court records, on February 24, 1998, Pulaski District Judge Mike Henry entered an order dismissing the charges against Adams.

The order states that, "(t)he commonwealth of Kentucky has failed to indict the defendant, Rodney Murray Adams."

The charges were dismissed with prejudice, which means they cannot be brought before the court again.

The recent federal indictment against Carmichael alleges that he took money from Adams. Specifically, the indictment charges that Carmichael accepted \$500 in December 1997 for Christmas decorations used in his office.

The indictment says that Carmichael discussed the matter with Adams' attorney, who relayed the message to his client.

## London police officer, two others indicted in federal court

### Indictments returned in connection with fire at Renfro

A London City police officer and two other Laurel County men were indicted on federal arson charges last Thursday afternoon that stem from a fire that gutted an arcade near Renfro Valley last May.

The arcade was located in the former Renfro Valley Country Store building and was slated to open on May 15.

Terry Johnson, 42, a sergeant with the London City Police Department and a 17-year veteran of the force, was charged with conspiracy to commit arson and mail fraud, aiding and abetting, use of fire to commit a felony and arson.

Bill Abrams, 41, and his brother David Abrams, 39, face identical charges following a lengthy investigation into the May 12 fire that authorities suspected was intentionally set.

The men are suspected in setting fire to the leased building and destroying over 40 near-worthless arcade games, then attempting to collect a settlement, claiming the machines were worth nearly \$300,000. If convicted of the crimes, each man could face up to 40 years in prison and be ordered to pay \$1.25 million in fines.

According to the indictment handed down from a federal grand jury in London Thursday, the three men schemed to defraud the Penn-American Insurance Company.

"It was part of the conspiracy that the defendants would maliciously damage and destroy by means of fire

a building, real and personal property used in an activity affecting interstate commerce, that is, the building and its contents located at 2750 Richmond Street, Renfro Valley," read the indictment.

The 12-page indictment continued by stating that "it was further a part of the conspiracy that the defendants would devise and intend to devise a scheme and artifice to defraud and to obtain and attempt to obtain money from Penn-American Insurance Company, by means of false and fraudulent pretenses, representations and promises."

Sometime in March of 1998, Johnson leased the building in Renfro Valley for \$800 per month from London businessman Ernie Tackett.

Tackett had purchased the building from Willard Collinsworth, who had operated the Country Store for years at that location.

Also that month, the indictment states that Johnson "entered into a fraudulent agreement which set out among other things, that Bill Abrams would sell to Johnson '75 arcade machines, for the sum of \$285,000' and that those machines would be placed in the leased building to operate under the name of Speedway Family Arcade.

The indictment continues, stating that on April 7, 1998, Johnson "made false and fraudulent representation and statements to a broker for Equity Insurance Managers Incorporated in Lexington, an agent for Penn-

# Changes in burning laws take effect October 1st

October 1 is the beginning of the official Fall Forest Fire Hazard Season in Kentucky. With the passage of House Bill 488 by the 1998 General Assembly there is a significant change in the law concerning burning during forest fire hazard seasons.

Kentucky law designates October 1 through December 15 as Fall Forest Hazard Season. During this time, the law requires burning within 150 feet of the woods or burning anything capable of spreading fire into the woods to the hours of 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.

The burning law was changed from 4:30 p.m. to midnight to the new hours of 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. The change in the burning law is intended to prevent fires by allowing burning only during the time when typically the wind is calm and humidity is increased.

While burning is allowed between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., no one should burn unless the fire is calm and there is adequate moisture in the air to allow control of fire. It is illegal to start a fire any time of the year on or near timberland without taking all reasonable precautions to prevent it from spreading.

One of the leading causes of forest fires in Kentucky is fire accidentally escaping when people burn trash and other unwanted material. Reasonable precautions require that the ground be cleared around a fire and that tools and water be readily available. The law also requires that all outdoor fires be attended until extinguished. Remember to check state air quality and waste management regulations, and local ordinances before conduct-

ing any outdoor burning. Arson is another leading cause of forest fires in Kentucky. Deliberately setting fire to the forest is punished by fines and/or imprisonment. Forest arson can be reported by calling 1-

800-27-ARSON (1-800-272-7766). "Wildfire damages more than just forests. Wildlife habitat, residential settings, forest resources, scenic beauty, and water quality are lost or damaged by wildfire. Kentucky is

blessed with 12.7 million acres of forestland. Please exercise extreme care with fire in and around our forests," said Mark Manuszewski, Director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. ## New sewage disposal requirements affect electricity availability

If you are planning to construct a residential or commercial building in any area in Kentucky without sewers, you are now required to have a site evaluation for a sewage disposal system before you can get electricity for the project.

Senate Bill 18, which was passed by the 1998 General Assembly, is targeted at stopping "straight pipe" disposal of sewage. Kentuckians have been legally required to inform their local health department about new construction since 1982, but an estimated 30 percent of all new developments are being built without permits and it's difficult to find illegal sewage systems, said Mark Hooks, a sanitarian with the Kentucky Department for Public Health. As a result,

surface and ground water is being polluted and it is a serious health hazard.

"This is a tool that we now have to find all new construction and to ensure that they have adequate sewage disposal and they are not polluting our streams or the ground water," Hooks said. "This is important because about a third of the state drinks ground water."

The requirement works on the assumption that people will need electricity at a construction site and they will want electricity in the completed building. By tying the requirement for a site evaluation to getting electricity, the local health department will be notified before construction starts and people will have to make plans for an adequate sewage disposal system before they get too far into the building process, Hooks said.

In addition to keeping drinking water from being polluted and becoming a health hazard, Hooks points out that planning for the sewage system at the beginning of construction saves the homeowner money and time.

"We help the landowner to pick the best spot for the sewage disposal system so they can protect it during construction and avoid construction mistakes that can cost them thousands of dollars and delay moving into the house," Hooks said. "If there is a problem with the site or if gets

damaged during the construction, you have to recreate good soil conditions for the sewage disposal system to work. Hooks said inadequate disposal systems are found across the state but most often occur in rural areas that do not have sewers or a building code.

"I have seen whole subdivisions that were done improperly and the homeowners are stuck with the problem," Hooks said.

Some areas in Kentucky already have local ordinances in place that are similar to the new state requirements. For example, Bell, Clay, Harlan and Jackson counties in the Cumberland Valley Health Department District already require a site evaluation for electrical hook-up and an approved sewage disposal plan. The local ordinances were enacted county-by-county over the last seven years.

"When we first implemented the ordinances in Bell County, we probably tripled or quadrupled the number of legal systems, at that time, probably fewer than one in four systems were in compliance," said Danny Davis, the District's Director of Environmental Health. "We had no way of finding illegal systems."

Davis said during his 25 years with the district, he has seen vast improvements in the sewage disposal systems because of the ordinances and he thinks the state will benefit from the new requirements.

Senate Bill 18 is the best thing environmentally that's happened in my 25 years. Anytime you stop sewage from going into drinking water, you improve the quality of life," Davis said.

Both Hooks and Davis said that most people want safe drinking water and clean waterways but they have to be educated about the effects of inadequate sewage disposal and proper system installation.

For Kentuckians who feel that working with their local health department environmentalist is too restrictive, Davis says, "our job is to help people do it right, not to keep them from doing it."

Public Health Sanitarian give people the general information and opinions for sewage disposal and the applicants present their plans to sanitarians for approval.

"This gives us the opportunity to educate before we evaluate. Most people do the right thing," Hooks said.

In addition to health officials,

environmental groups and home builder associations supported the new requirements.

Inadequate sewage disposal systems not only pollutes drinking water, but also many miles of streams in Kentucky can't be used for swimming or other recreation because it can make people sick, Hooks said.

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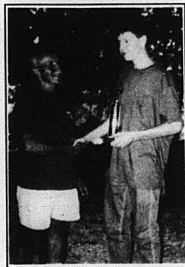

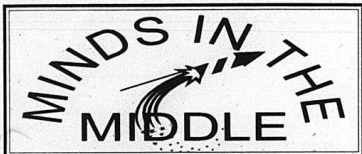

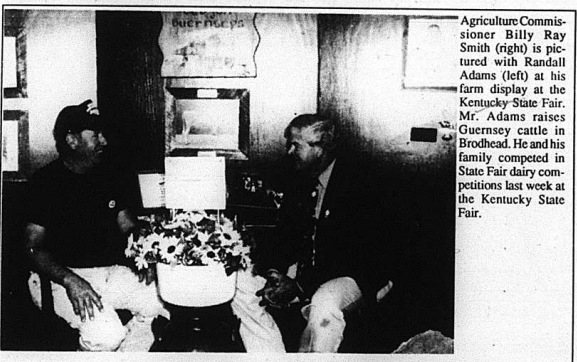
During the August 21 meeting, school principals issued an open invitation to the officers to come into their schools to have lunch, to talk to

Burley Tobacco Warehouse  
Advances:

It has come to our attention that some burley tobacco warehouse operators are buying tobacco from producers and later reselling this tobacco as product tobacco. In order to obtain price support eligibility the producers' marketing cards are used by the warehousemen to identify the tobacco as a first producer sale. Only first producer sales at auction are eligible for price support. Some warehouse operators are saying that the original payment to the producer was an advance.

USDA regulations do not prohibit a warehouse operator from making an advance to the producer. Advances may be made provided the following conditions are met:

1. There is a written agreement covering the advance.
2. The parties comply with the written agreement.
3. The advance price per pound is less than the average net sale price per pound for the farm for the mar-

keting year.

The written agreement, available from the FSA office, shall be between the producer and the warehouse operator, dealer or other person who makes the advance that fully and accurately sets forth the conditions of the advance. The written agreement shall contain:

1. The amount, nature and date of the advance of consideration.
2. The pounds of tobacco on which the advance or consideration is made.
3. The date that final settlement will be made, which can be no later than the traditional auction sale of tobacco for which there is no advance.
4. The signatures of the producer and the person making the advance.

If you have been contacted to sell your tobacco by any means other than the traditional auction sale you may want to contact this office to assure that your marketing transaction is handled properly.

If you receive an advance, your tobacco should not be co-mingled with other producers' tobacco. You should be provided a copy of the sale

bill showing when the tobacco was sold at auction. Compare the auction price with the advanced price to see if the warehouse owes you additional monies.

Producers who fail to follow proper marketing procedures may be subject to prosecution under Title 18, Section 1001 of the U.S. Criminal Code which provides a fine of not

more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years or both. Civil monetary penalties and quota reductions may be applied in addition to criminal penalties.

Your cooperation in this matter will help insure a fair and equitable market for all burley growers this season.

American Insurance Company, that representative being Shannon Sams, an employee of Dell Sams Insurance Agency in London, for the purpose of causing to be issued an insurance policy on building's contents.

"At that time," continues the indictment, "Terry Johnson falsely and fraudulently represented to Shannon Sams that machines which he had purchased for the sum of \$3,800 each for a total of \$285,000... that the seventy-five arcade machines were located at the business known as Speedway Family Arcade.

The indictments state that the policy was issued in April. Because fraudulent information was sent via the U.S. Postal Service, mail fraud and federal charges against the three were filed.

"On or about May 12, 1998," reads the indictment, "Bill Abrams and David Abrams set fire to the building... for the purposes of causing said building and its contents to be destroyed by fire."

Mt. Vernon firefighters were able to extinguish the blaze early enough to allow investigators to examine the remains. Found were 44 arcade machines with a total value of approximately \$750. Not present were any of the 75 \$3,800 machines Johnson claimed to have purchased from Abrams.

But firefighters did reportedly find holes in the floor, which had apparently been cut to help the fire spread quickly throughout the structure. Fire captain Tim Bostic also said that there was a strong odor of

diesel fuel when firefighters arrived on the scene at approximately 3 a.m.

The indictment goes on to detail the process by which the three men filed false and fraudulent claims in an attempt to obtain an insurance settlement from Penn-American.

An officer with the Kentucky State Police Special Investigation division said that summons were being delivered to all three suspects. They are scheduled to appear before U.S. Magistrate Judge J.B. Johnson, Jr., on Tuesday, September 8, 1998 at 9 a.m. in London.

that in January 1998, Carmichael informed Adams that he was aware that Adams was engaged in illegal gambling in violation of Kentucky laws.

According to the indictment, on March 19, 1998, Carmichael and Adams' attorney met at the courthouse in Pulaski County. Carmichael told Adams' attorney that he was aware that Adams had access to large amounts of cash, and that Adams' name had come up in a federal criminal investigation. Carmichael also reminded the attorney that he had kept confidential the fact that Adams provided information in connection with an ongoing investigation being conducted by local law enforcement.

During this March 19, 1998 meeting with Adams' attorney, Carmichael allegedly asked the attorney to pass to his client that he wanted \$100,000.00 cash. Carmichael claimed that he had heard that Adams was interested in making contributions to political campaigns and told the attorney that Adams should pay him \$100,000.00 so that he could disburse the money as he saw fit. When the attorney commented that \$100,000.00 was a large sum of money, Carmichael told the attorney to tell his client the figure of \$100,000.00, so that he might actually pay \$50,000.00.

On March 21, 1998, Adams contacted the Kentucky State Police and informed them of the commonwealth attorney's solicitation.

The indictment charges that on March 24, 1998, under the supervision of the Kentucky State Police, Adams met with Carmichael in the parking lot of the Commonwealth's Attorney office in Somerset. At that time, Carmichael allegedly took \$5,000.00 from Adams.

Two days later, Adams contacted Carmichael to arrange for delivery of the remainder of the money. That same day, Carmichael walked out of his office into the parking lot to obtain the remainder of the money. He became concerned, however, about a van in the parking lot, which was a Kentucky State Police van surveilling the area. After spotting this van, Carmichael walked away.

she was injured in an accident at Wildie on Saturday night.

Joann Helton, 38, of Mt. Vernon is still in the intensive care unit at U.K., but her brother John McFar-

gus said she has shown some improvement.

Ms. Helton has been unconscious since she plummeted nearly 25 feet off a steep cliff near the Swinging Bridge on the Wildie-Clear Creek Road Saturday night.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Charles Gray said the accident occurred around 8:30 p.m.

Gray said that Ms. Helton received massive head trauma in the fall. Members of the Mt. Vernon fire department and EMT's from the Rockcastle Ambulance service had to remove Ms. Helton's body from

the creek bed at the bottom of the cliff.

Gray said that Ms. Helton was apparently riding around with Robert Hopkins, 32, of Mt. Vernon also known as Bud Mayhew, when she had to stop and use the bathroom.

Gray said that it is unclear why Ms. Helton went over the cliff, but that an investigation had been opened. Gray said that the case may involve some type of assault.

Ms. Helton was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and airlifted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

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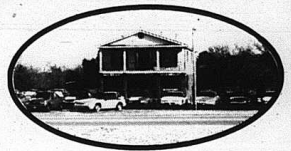

## Patton to help dedicate church at Brush Arbor

*Authentic Pioneer Village to open*

On Friday, the Honorable Paul Patton, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, will visit Brush Arbor Appalachian Pioneer Log Village at Renfro Valley, as it celebrates its Grand Opening to the public this Labor Day Weekend. Governor Patton is scheduled to arrive at Brush Arbor at 10:40 a.m., for a brief visit and personal tour of the newly completed village.

Brush Arbor is a privately funded, authentically restored Kentucky pioneer log village conceived and created by Jerry L. Hayes, an eighth generation descendent of Simon Kenton, who was a friend of Daniel Boone and self-appointed protector of early settlers of Northern Kentucky.

Brush Arbor, named by Hayes' father, Bob Hayes of Jackson County, which has been three years in the making, was created as a living memorial to its founder's pioneer ancestors, and is believed to be the only one of its kind in Kentucky.

Brush Arbor, consisting of eight authentically restored log structures including a cabin, of museum quality which was built in 1797 near Fort Boonesborough, complete with a dirt floor and lead balls embedded in its walls; is perfectly located on 28 beautiful acres, less than two miles off I-75 at Exit 62 and within walking distance of world renowned Renfro Valley Entertainment Center... Kentucky's Country Music Capital.

Festivities for the weekend following Governor Patton's visit on Friday morning, will be the dedication of the old pioneer log church at

12:00 noon. Two live bluegrass and gospel shows are scheduled for Saturday, featuring the local talent of the "Cucumber Valley Boys" at 2:00 p.m. and the "Just In Tyme" bluegrass band from 5:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. A fish fry is also scheduled from 5:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 5th.

Also appearing on Saturday will be the Jackson County Comedian and Animal Impersonator, Woody Brooks, whose credits include appearances on Jay Leno's Tonight Show, the Kentucky Opry and at Rupp Arena with Kentucky native Carl Hurley.

Brush Arbor Log Village has been a labor of love...one of rescuing a few of the hundreds of folk structures scattered across the Kentucky landscape consisting of log cabins, cribs, barns, smoke houses, churches and schools, which carry on traditions of the pioneers who built them, preserved in wood and in memory, rather than on paper. Like folk songs, tales and regional dialects, this material culture reveals the ways and legacies of our earliest ancestors and pioneer settlers.

The authentically restored log structures at Brush Arbor offers the best examples of how they endured the many hardships, inconveniences, and dangers of sheer survival of their times. They, and their legacies, are irreplaceable! The eight authentically restored log structures at Brush Arbor are placed as living memorials to those whose most pressing needs they served.

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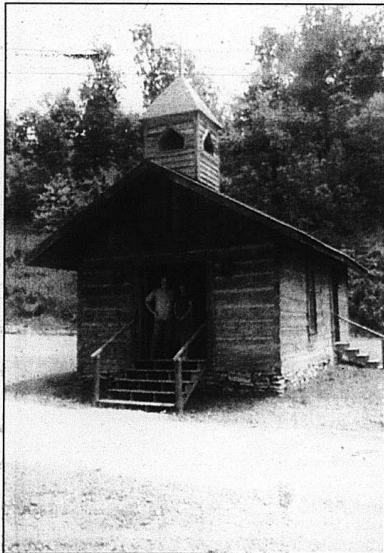
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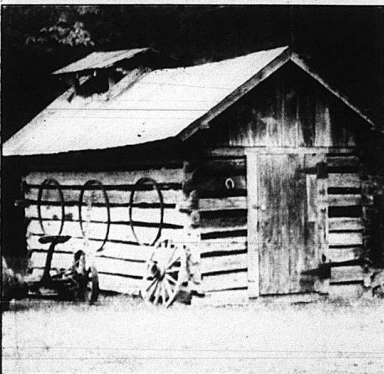

## NOTICE TO PARENTS, TEACHERS, AND EMPLOYEES OF THE ROCKCASTLE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required EPA to develop regulations which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan (40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination, and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education retained Barry W. Cooper, P.E. who completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos management plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan.

Copies of the management plan are always available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at 245 Richmond Street, Mt. Vernon, KY and at the Principal's Office at each school at any time during normal office hours.

Copies are available for duplication at a cost of 25 cents for each 8-1/2 x 11 page of the Management Plan.



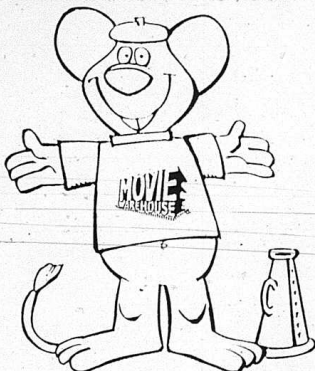

## After School Snacks Pack Powerful Nutritional Punch

Children often can't eat enough at mealtime to supply the energy they need each day. An after-school snack is one way to provide a steady energy supply and help children make healthy snacks a lifetime habit.

Because children have small appetites and stomachs, it doesn't take much to fill them. However, growing, active children need a lot of energy. In fact, their total energy needs are comparable to an adult. Research indicates that snacking is a good way to give children the variety of nutrients necessary for growth and development.

Snacks don't have to be high-calorie, low-nutrient foods. Many snack food choices can provide the essential nutrients children need. For example, fruits and vegetables make fast, easy snacks that are jam-packed with vitamins, minerals and fiber.

Lifelong eating habits are formed during childhood so this is a good time to instill a balanced approach to snacking. And the Food Guide Pyramid is a good place to begin.

The Food Guide Pyramid emphasizes five major food groups that give children the essential

nutrients. Each food group provides some, but not all, of these nutrients.

Youngsters ages two years and older need at least six child-size servings from the bread, cereal, rich and pasta group; a combined minimum of five child-size servings of fruits and vegetables; at least three servings from the milk, yogurt and cheese group; and at least two child-size servings from the group containing meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts.

Other factors affecting the number of servings daily from each food group include the number of calories a child needs and the youngster's size and activity level. The small tip at the Food Guide Pyramid represents fats, oils, and sweets. Eat these infrequently because they generally contain a lot of calories but have very little nutritional value.

Foods like cookies, ice cream and potato chips can be part of a varied diet in moderation. But remember, "moderation" is the key here. Give your children small and infrequent servings of high-fat and high-sugar foods.

### Two New Programs Offered

The Trim Life Weight Release Program is designed to introduce people to new ways of thinking and eating. The sessions explore the emotional reasons why people eat and ways people can control their weight by controlling emotions. Guided meditation (also called hypnosis) is

used to encourage participants to curb their appetites and enhance their desire to exercise.

Meanwhile, the Clean Break Program for smokers is designed to help those who are determined to quit smoking. The sessions help participants recognize and change triggers to the smoking habit, recognize withdrawal signs and learn relaxation techniques. Guided meditation (hypnosis) is also used as a part of this program.

Two free information sessions will be held at 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 13 and at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, September 17. The sessions are free and there is no obligation. Trim Life classes begin on Thursday, September at 7:30 p.m. and continue for the next four Thursdays. The Clean Break program is scheduled for four consecutive Sunday afternoons at 4:00 p.m. beginning Sunday, September 20.

you. You should be a good match with your ATV not only in size, but in strength. This will allow you to control it better, especially when you ride in more difficult terrain.

Use these guidelines to help determine if your ATV is the right size for you.

1. Clear between ATV seat and inseat while standing up on foot rests — this clearance will allow you to stand up and absorb shocks through your legs while riding on rough terrain and will minimize the possibility of your being struck by the seat and being catapulted over the handlebars. Proper clearance will also improve your visibility and comfort. Three inches should be a minimum clearance.

2. Upper legs: The upper portion of the leg, from the top of the knee to the hip, should be horizontal.

3. Foot Length: With the heel of your right foot locked against the foot peg or in the proper position on the running board, the toe of your foot should be able to depress the foot brake with a simple downward rotation of the foot.

4. Grip reach: In the normal seated position with your hands on the han-

dlers, your elbows should have a distinct angle between your upper arm and your forearm. If your elbows are at less than right angles, you are too large for the ATV. Steering will be difficult and possibly throw you off balance.

5. Throttle reach: With your right hand in the normal operating position, check to see if your thumb can easily operate the throttle.

6. Brake reach: With your hands in the normal operating position and your fingers straight out, check to see if the first joint of your middle finger extends beyond the brake level. If it does not, your hand is too small to effectively grasp the lever in an emergency. Make sure your thumb also reaches the emergency switch. Try squeezing the brake level a few times to be sure you can comfortably operate the control.

All-terrain vehicles are a source of fun and pleasure as well as useful for work activities. But remember they are definitely not toys since they can be potentially hazardous if not operated properly.

## ATVs provide hazardous fun

All-terrain vehicles (ATVs) have many uses especially around the farm. They provide a promise of adventure to young and old alike. All-terrain vehicles seem to be growing in popularity. Although they are useful and fun, they are not toys. Riding an ATV can be a potentially hazardous activity.

One only has to pick up a regional newspaper to read about a recent death or injury incurred while riding an ATV. Youth are at particular risk when they operate adult-size ATVs. Adequate physical size and strength, emotional maturity, decision-making skills, judgment and good motor skills are all important factors for youth operating motorized vehicles. ATVs require constant attention to avoid accidents.

Protective clothing is the sign of a responsible, safe rider. Always wear an approved motorcycle or ATV helmet, eyes protection and protective clothing — gloves, long sleeves and long pants are minimal.

ATVs are designed for off-road use only. Never operate an ATV on paved surfaces or public roads.

Substance abuse is especially dangerous when operating an ATV.

All-terrain vehicles are designed for one operator and no passengers. The presence of a passenger will seriously impair your ability to shift weight in order to steer and control the ATV.

Speeding and stunts are common among young operators, especially when peer pressure is involved. Stunt riding will increase your risk of losing control of the vehicle.

A hands-on-training course is recommended for all ATV operations. Inexperienced riders in their first month of using an ATV have 13 times the average risk of injury. Beginning riders should receive a training course from a qualified instructor. Basic maneuvers taught in training should be practiced regularly on safe terrain.

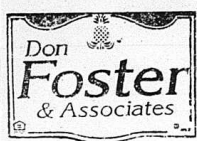

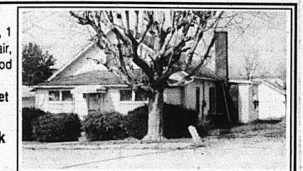
