The council also voted to change the hours of city hall, which will be open 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mon, Wed., and Thursday, 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Friday and 10 a.m. to 12 Noon on the first and third Saturday.

Books close for general election

Rockcastle County residents wishing to vote in the November election who have not registered will have to wait until a later date.

The registration books for the fall election closed on Monday with a slight increase in the number of registered voters from the May primary.

As of Monday, 8,212 republicans have registered with 1,901 Democrats registered. 364 other voters have also registered in various parties to bring the total number of eligible voters for November to 10,477.

County Clerk Norma Hoot attributes the increase to the fact that there are races in each city this fall for council seats and two for Mayor in Mt. Vernon and Livingston. The November General Election is on the third.

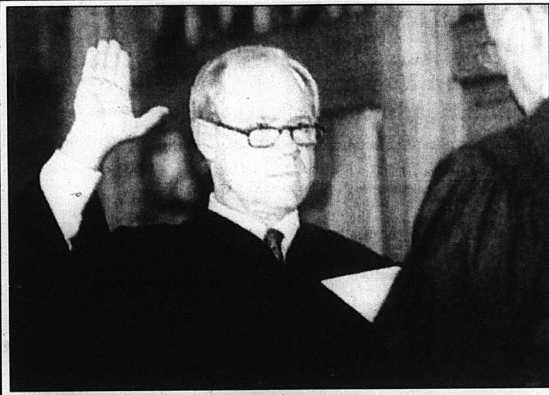

Prosecutors paint picture of desire for power, greed

Power and greed drove suspended Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Carmichael to demand payments from a Somerset pawn shop owner and bookmaker, federal prosecutors said in Carmichael's federal extortion trial this week in Lexington.

Witnesses called Tuesday to support the federal case against the Commonwealth's Attorney, said that Carmichael, the chief prosecutor in Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln counties, tried to use the Kentucky State Police and Rodney Adams, the pawn shop owner and convicted felon to find dirt on his political opponents and then demanded \$100,000 from Adams for a political slush fund.

Stephen Pence of Louisville, an attorney for Carmichael, had yet to begin calling defense witnesses at press time but said in his opening statement to the jury on Monday that his client was conducting an investigation of his own into Adams' busi-

ness dealings and the payoff that Adams supposedly made last March never occurred.

An audio tape of the alleged pay off played in court Tuesday revealed that Adams told Carmichael how much he was giving: fifty \$100 bills or \$5,000 total. Carmichael thanked Adams and said the candidates that the money would help support would, "be winners."

Adams testified that he understood that Carmichael would be using the \$5,000, and a promised later payment of \$50,000, that was never delivered because Carmichael spotted a state police surveillance van in the area, to help in the campaign of Kay Stringer, a relative of Carmichael's, in his race against Pulaski County Sheriff Sam Catron and other candidates that Carmichael favored.

"I think we have an understand-

ing," Carmichael told Adams after the first alleged payment.

Adams testified that he took that to mean that if Stringer won the election - the primary actually ended in a tie and Catron won a coin toss for the Republican nomination - he could continue with his illegal gambling business in Pulaski County unfeared by police.

Adams, who is a convicted felon and therefore suspected of dealing in guns illegally at his pawn shop, admitted on the stand that he operated a bookmaking operation in Pulaski County that took in between \$100,000 and \$400,000 in wagers each week.

In addition, he ran two poker tables in the back of his shop where \$5 games were in session almost continuously. Those activities were well known in the community, he said. Carmichael even introduced him

to a state police detective in January as a bookmaker.

But, Det. David Mirus of the Kentucky State Police testified that Carmichael said he was going to overlook the gambling because Adams was going to help him in an investigation of jury leaks, drugs, sex and video tapes involving some of Somerset's leading citizens. The drug and sex investigation resulted in the indictment of Jerry McKinney on drug and cruelty to animals charges. He allegedly forced a dog to have sex with a woman.

Barbara Bennett to run for council

Mt. Vernon voters will have to make a decision in this fall's general election for City Council - Barbara Bennett has announced her intention to run as a write-in candidate. With Mrs. Bennett's candidacy, there are now seven hopefuls for the six seats on the council.

Four incumbents filed - Lee Keene, Clark "Joe" Mullins, Clarice Kirby and Wayne Bullock and two filed for the seats vacated by Karen King, a candidate for mayor and Terry Owens, who chose not to seek reelection. Jackie Renner and Darrell Smith had filed for those seats.

Mrs. Bennett, who owns and operates Exquisite Cuisine, Tanning and Nail Salon from her home on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon, said she let the filing deadline go by because of deaths in her family and a fire in her home.

A lot of people have asked me why I returned to Mt. Vernon to live after all the experience I have had in business with large companies (in restaurant management and public relations). I tell them I came back because I have always considered Mt. Vernon my home and I want to make a difference here," Mrs. Bennett said in announcing her candidacy.

"I can work with people on all

levels and I think I can help make decisions that will make a difference for everyone," Mrs. Bennett added.

Mrs. Bennett is the daughter of Everett Thomas and the late Lillie Mae Thomas and the stepdaughter of Elsie Burdette Thomas. She is married to Lloyd "Sonny" Bennett and they have two children, Lloyd Bennett, Jr. and Carrie Adams and two grandchildren, Christopher Winnard and Sara Adams.

The Bennetts are members of Bible Baptist Church.

Mt. Vernon bank sold to company in Georgetown

After months of speculation the Bank of Mt. Vernon has been sold. Bank of Mt. Vernon owner Jerry Ikard announced the sale to his employees in a Tuesday morning meeting.

The buyer of Rockcastle County's largest and oldest financial institution is Premier Financial Bancorp, of Georgetown.

The Bank of Mt. Vernon will become the tenth independent community bank to join Premier. Premier will acquire Mt. Vernon Bancshares, Inc., Ikard's holding company, which owns the Bank of Mt. Vernon in a cash transaction.

Several employees of the bank said after the Tuesday meeting that Premier management told them the bank would remain a community-oriented bank.

They said very little would change that the bank would basically operate as it has under Mr. Ikard's ownership," said one bank employee.

Another employee said Premier officials told them they would work hard to help promote Rockcastle County.

Premier is a community bank holding company with nine individually managed commercial bank subsidiaries operating in smaller communities in central Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia. Earlier this year, Premier completed acquisition of Ohio River Bank, Ironton, Ohio, The Bank of Philippi, Philippi, West Virginia, and Boone County Bank, Madison, West Virginia.

As of June 30, of this year, Premier had total assets of \$650 million and the Bank of Mt. Vernon had total assets of \$129 million.

"The Bank of Mt. Vernon offers full service banking in Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties and has loan production offices in Berea and Richmond, which Premier plans to expand with the added capital and broader products and services that Premier can provide," said Howard Kelly, Premier President.

"We look forward to working with the board of directors, management and staff of Bank of Mt. Vernon," he added.

The purchase price was not disclosed.

The merger is subject to the approval of federal and state banking regulators and is targeted for completion by year end.

I've lived in the general vicinity of Berea/Paint Lick 25 of the last 28 years. As most of you know, I'm an avid fisherman and gardener which means that I keep a pretty sharp eye on the weather conditions.

I can tell you with certainty that it hasn't been drier around here since I've been a resident. Lowell Branch, Long Branch and Broadhead Branch are some of my favorite places to seine fish bait. All of them contain several holes that have always been reliable in the driest of times.

One big hole on Long Branch is normally waist deep and normally full of big creek chubs and crowds. Not only is it dry, it isn't even damp. The coon tracks have even blown away. More than half an inch

of rain last Friday night and Saturday morning that would normally have muddied the streams has done nothing to alleviate the conditions. We

need several inches to get them flowing again.

Dave Maggard and I have dutifully watered a few tomato plants, some late corn and beans, cucumbers, squash, peppers and snow peas with the garden hose using county water. The vegetables they are producing, such as they are, taste like they've been washed in chlorine bleach and, for that matter, the garden itself smells like a washing is going on.

The amazing thing to me is that the county hasn't caught on fire and burned to a cinder. There's a hay field behind my house that would go up like a bucketful of gun powder if somebody touched a match to it. So even though, I haven't seen or heard about any significant fires.

The lack of rain must surely be hurting wildlife too. I can't imagine that the hickory and oak mast crops are going to

amount to much and I expect that fishing, since most of the bait fish have been suffocated or made easy prey for raccoons, will be affected for the next several years.

Persimmons, however, seem to thrive on dry weather.

We have the largest persimmon tree that I've ever seen in our front yard and it has bushels of fruit that are already ripening on it. For those of you who have dehydrators, persimmons make a great substitute for figs. And if you want to come to my place and get a gallon or two, please feel free to help yourself.

I'd also like a recipe for persimmon pie if anyone has one. I know there is such a thing, but I've forgotten where I had it.

Pardon me for rambling around so much. I'm taking yet another allergy medicine that pretty much renders

me useless and completely wipes out my sense of humor.

One last thing though. On Saturday, I walked back to a pond on the farm that borders our place to see how dry it had gotten. It's spring fed and doing far better than I would have guessed. But walking around the bank were three big sandhill cranes, the first that I've ever seen in Kentucky on the ground. I hurried back to the house and grabbed a pair of binoculars, pulled out the National Geographic Bird Identifier Book, and made a positive identification.

Finally, when I tracked down a biologist with the Fish and Wildlife Department, I was assured that sandhills do migrate through Kentucky but that it was unusual to see just three and even more unusual to see them on the ground. They are magnificent birds, but when I went back Sunday morning, they had left.

"That's encouraging," I replied.

Farley paused a moment and then said, "Yes, but you know, John Norman, it's pretty sobering to realize that something is amiss in your system."

As I drove home, thinking about Farley, a line from one of the witches in *Macbeth* took on a new meaning. It played over and over in my mind.

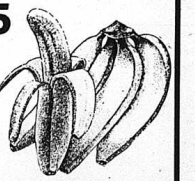

by to exempt any class of personal property from taxation.

It is interesting to note that history of the state Constitution shows us that the delegates to the 1891 convention were troubled over the issue of taxation. Under the old Constitution, some corporations had escaped taxation by contending that their property was devoted to a public purpose. The framers of the 1891 Constitution include the requirement that taxation must be for a public purpose, that taxes be uniform for all property in the same class, that all taxation be by general law, that all property be assessed at a fair cash value, and that the power to tax should not be surrendered by any grant or contract to which the Commonwealth should be a party. These restrictions hold true today under our Constitution.

Though an amendment sixteen years later states that: "Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prevent the General Assembly from

providing for taxation based on income, licenses or franchises; still the General Assembly has remained without the power to reduce any personal property taxes.

Passage of the amendment would make such changes possible, but not automatic, which is a little confusing from the wording of the ballot question. The exemption of any class of taxes, including motor vehicle taxes, would still have to go through the legislative process and be signed by the Governor. The amendment only gives the Legislature the authority to consider such exemptions.

An Amendment to the Kentucky Constitution could pave the way for long sought tax exemptions, such as on motor vehicles, for citizens of the Commonwealth. Two proposed amendments, one on Legislative Sessions and one on taxes, will be presented on the ballot next month as voters go to the polls on Election

Day, November 3rd. The proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2 for the 1998 ballot includes two tax issues. If approved by the voters, (1) the homestead exemption would apply to any individual classified as totally disabled under any retirement system within or without the Commonwealth, and (2) would permit the General Assem-

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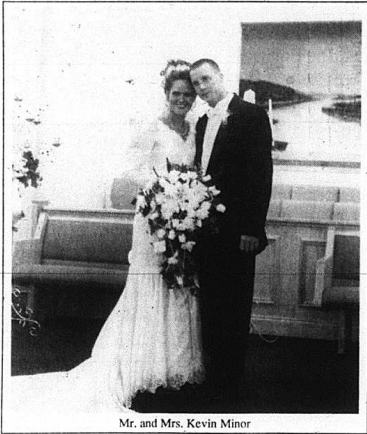

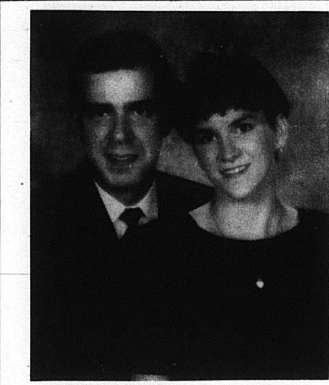

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Agricultural News

Loan Deficiency Program
The Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS) is currently taking applications for the loan deficiency payments (LDPs). New changes to the marketing assistance loan program and the LDPs program make them more flexible for farmers to use during the 1998 harvest.

Many farmers are experiencing low commodity prices and many others have suffered natural disasters and these changes will give farmers more marketing flexibility and will allow them the opportunity to maximize their cash-flow.

Farmers participating in the Agriculture Marketing Transition Act (AMTA) program will be able to obtain marketing assistance loans or LDPs for all of their production of wheat, corn and other program crops without regard to how the commodity is harvested. Similarly, producers of non-contract commodities such as soybeans, designated minor oilseeds, and extra long staple cotton will be able to take advantage of these changes.

If you are a farmer who is a participant in the AMTA program or a producer of non contract commodities in 1998 — we urge you to come to the local FSA office and obtain more details and to file for the LDP payments.

Conservation Reserve Program
Signup for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be held beginning Oct. 26 and ending December 11, 1998. This is the third general CRP sign-up since enactment of the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996.

CRP is a voluntary program that offers annual rental payments and cost share assistance to establish long term resource conserving covers on eligible land.

Annual rental payments are made based on the agricultural rental value of the land and cost share assistance is provided in an amount equal to not more than 50% of the participants costs in establishing approved practices.

The duration of the contracts are from 10 to 15 years.

To be eligible to be placed in CRP, land must be cropland that has been planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity 2 of the 5 crop years from 1994 to 1998 that is also physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity or marginal pasture land that is either enrolled in the Water Bank Program or suitable for use as a riparian buffer to be planted to trees.

In addition to basic cropland other conditions must be met to be eligible for enrollment.

SD = Service Quality
BA = Balancing Adjustment
KW(H) = Kentucky jurisdictional Kilowatt-hour Sales in the current quarter
q = Current quarter shall be the second calendar quarter preceding the billing calendar quarter in which the EPBR is billed.
KU also is requesting that the Commission approve the withdrawal of the Electric Rate Schedule Fuel Adjustment Clause after all fuel costs are collected pursuant to the Uniform Fuel Adjustment Clause Regulation (807 KAR 5:056) and final orders are issued in the pending fuel adjustment clause cases of the Commission's Order of September 12, 1997. "You treat your child more like an adult than a child," I pointed out to Wanda. "How do you think this affects her?"

"I think it's good for her," Wanda answered. "She is learning about life and responsibility at a young age. She is much more mature than her friends."

"Do you see any possible negative effects?" I asked Wanda.
She thought for a moment. "I don't think so," she replied. "It seems to me it will help her later in life."

Sam has had several affairs over the fifteen years they have been married. Wanda has no qualms about discussing all the details with her eleven-year-old daughter. Sue has little to say to her father because she blames him for the tension in their home.
"Wanda," I said, "let me raise a couple of issues to think about. One is that Sue is learning to take care of people at an early age. In some ways she sounds like she is your counselor. Eleven-year-olds who counsel their parents have the situation reversed. It is much better if the parent is counselor to the child."
"But I do counsel her," Wanda objected. "She talks to me about all her problems."
"My concern is that Sue is growing up to be someone who finds her identity in taking care of other people," I explained. "She could end up in relationships with people who need taking care of. She may meet someone with an addiction problem." Sue looked shocked.
"Also," I continued, "she may be missing out on childhood. Children who grow up too quickly miss out on

the opportunity to be a child. An eleven-year-old who handles too much responsibility does not get to play and grow the way children need to."
"Now I am not saying you need to stop talking to your daughter," I added. "But perhaps you can find an adult to confide in about your problems with Sam. Talking to a counselor may be just the outlet you need. This will take some of the burden off Sue."

I could tell Wanda did not like what I had said. As she continued to be quiet, I asked her what she was feeling. "I don't like your insinuation that I am not being a good parent to Sue. She is all I have and we are going to stick together. Maybe if my husband would talk to me I wouldn't have to confide in her, but he's not going to do that. I need her."

Wanda never came back to counseling after that. Perhaps I spoke too bluntly. Perhaps I should have waited until she discovered these truths herself. While I question my timing, I believe the basic truth of what I was saying to Wanda: kids don't need to be put in the position of caring for their parents.

The danger in this is that the children will grow up to be codependent. Codependents are fixers and caretakers. They want to help and often end up in relationships with people who need a great deal of help. Codependents try to fix these people and find it very frustrating when the changes do not happen as they want. The addict continues to be an addict in spite of all the codependent's efforts.

What is happening to Sue is not uncommon, but kids need to be kids. Having to grow up too quickly can be a handicap rather than a blessing.

RHRCC making special efforts during October, Breast Cancer Awareness Month

The American Cancer Society has found that if breast cancer is caught in the local stage, which means it is confined to the breast area, there is a 97 percent survival rate.

"The only way to catch breast cancer early enough is to make sure you have your mammograms and clinical breast exams as often as recommended for your age group," said Janice Mullins, mammography technician at RHRCC.

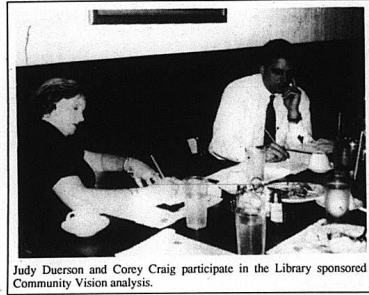

"It's important that every woman perform a self-exam each month," Mullins said. "And, if you have any of the risk factors, it is important to see your physician to determine your own personal exam guidelines."
The main risk factors associated with breast cancer are:
• Being a woman. Men can have breast cancer, but the majority of

people with breast cancer are women.
• Having a family history of breast cancer. This includes immediate family members, such as a mother or sibling.
• Not ever having had children.
• Having a first child after the age of 30.

In addition to offering mammograms at a reduced cost, RHRCC is also giving away RHRCC tote bags filled with goodies, coupons and information on breast cancer to every participant. All participants will also be registered for a drawing of an autographed copy of June Mumme's book, *Play The Next Play*. The book is about her experiences as the wife

of UK football coach Hal Mumme, as a mother, and her fight with breast cancer. One book will be given away each week of October. Copies of *Play The Next Play* can be ordered by calling 1-800-999-8881.

Anyone wanting to schedule a mammogram should call 256-2195 and ask for the X-ray Department for an appointment. All results will remain confidential and will be mailed to your family physician.

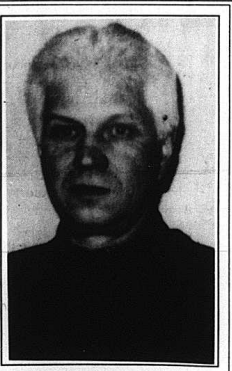
It is Written

October 18th at 1:30 p.m. Lambert was sworn in as Justice of the Supreme Court of Kentucky on January 15, 1987. Monday, October 5th, he was inaugurated as Kentucky's new Chief Justice.

A native of Mt. Vernon, Lambert is the first Republican to be elected to the state's highest judicial post since the late Flem D. Sampson of Barbourville, who served after leaving the Governor's office.

Chief Justice Lambert said, "I am always happy to have a part in something such as this. It is entirely appropriate to erect memorials and monuments in remembrance of those who have gone on before. Such events keep all of us in touch with our history."

Judge Lambert will be introduced by Bell Circuit Judge Farmer H. Helton.

The dedicatory rites honor legendary A.B. "Happy" Chandler, who built the road in remote southern Clay County 43 years ago.

The guest speaker is Happy's grandson, A.B. (Ben) Chandler, Kentucky's Attorney General.

Paying tribute to the late Governor are: Julian M. Carroll and Breton Jones, two of Kentucky's distinguished former Governors, Kentucky Secretary of State John Y. Brown will also be a special guest.

extended but played along with Carmichael as a form of insurance protection for his gambling operation, which took sports bets from several states and produced profits of as much as \$150,000 in a good week.

In March, Carmichael approached Adams attorney, Mark Knight, and said that he believed that Adams had access to large amounts of cash and he wanted \$100,000 for a "slush fund" to contribute to candidates he wanted to support. Knight testified in trial.

"He wanted me to be sure to ask for \$100,000," Knight said. "If you ask for \$100, maybe your client will give 50," Knight said that Carmichael told him.

Knight had been approached earlier by Carmichael about getting cash from Adams. Before Christmas last year, Knight said that Carmichael had asked him to get \$200 or \$300 from Adams to purchase Christmas decorations for the Commonwealth Attorney's office.

Knight asked and Adams agreed to pay. When Carmichael sent the bills for decorations, Christmas cards and invitations to an open house, the total was more than \$500.

Knight testified that Adams gave him five \$100 bills and he got the money to Carmichael.

Adams said he didn't relish making the payment but thought, given his illegal gambling operation, it was best to make friends with the prosecuting attorney.

"Mr. Carmichael is the highest ranking police officer in our county and he isn't going to make him mad over \$500," Adams testified.

Members of Carmichael's staff said they were given \$400 in cash to pay for decorations charged at K-Mart in Somerset. The change from that payment, about \$20, was combined with money from a federal or state grant to support a "violence against women" program to pay for the invitations and Christmas cards.

What happened to the other \$100 bill that Knight delivered wasn't established in the testimony.

What also was not established in the first two days of testimony was the return that Adams could expect for his donations to Carmichael's alleged slush fund.

Extortion laws require that the victim must be promised something in return for the payment or be afraid not to pay for some reason.

Nowhere in the tapes does Adams ask or Carmichael volunteer what Adams could expect for his money other than helping candidates that the Commonwealth Attorney wanted to win local elections.

Assistant U.S. Attorneys E.J. Walbourn and Nancy Newcomb tried to advance the fear aspect and implied protection for Adams gambling business but found little supporting documentation in the investigative records of the case.

Defense attorney David Tapp of Somerset, a former assistant to Carmichael in the Commonwealth Attorney's office, tried to make much of the grant of immunity prosecutors gave Adams for testifying and attempted to picture him as an untrustworthy crook.

His cross examination of the prosecution's main witness came late in the day on Tuesday and drew little information but some ire from U.S. District Judge Karl S. Forester, who kept prodding Tapp to make a point and hurry along.

Carmichael, whose trial is expected to last through Friday, faces a maximum prison term of 20 years and fines up to \$250,000 if found guilty by the three-man, nine woman jury sitting in Lexington.

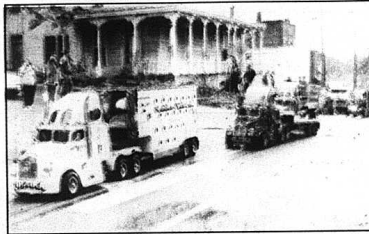

Rockets beat Wayne Co. 26-0 in first district game

With the possibility of dropping below .500 once again this season, the Rockets came out fired up for their game Friday night against Wayne County to kick off the district match-ups. And, it was a good outing for the home team as the Rockets won 26-0.

Rocketeas started the game with a kick return from Josh Singleton to the Rockets 35 yard line. The first offensive series for the Rockets however, turned into a disaster when they were hit with two holding penalties after two runs that would have gone for first downs. Henry Bryant had to punt the ball for the Rockets and did a good job with a 40 yard kick from his own 20 yard line that resulted in a muff by the Cardinals that was recovered by Derek Bradley. This gave the Rockets great field position on the Cardinals 30 yard line. Dergick Bussell then carried the ball four straight times and wound up on Wayne's six before a fumble gave the ball back to the Cardinals on the two yard line.

The Cardinals later returned the favor, giving the ball up to Brooks Ingram on the Cardinal nine yard line and, on fourth and goal from the three, quarterback Christopher Parsons couldn't find an open receiver and ended up tucking the ball away and running it in himself for the score. Greg Terry's extra point attempt failed but the Rockets were ahead 6-0. Fumbleitis again struck the Cardinals on their first play from scrimmage after the kick-off -- this time Henry Bryant picked up the loose ball for the Rockets on the Cardinal 28. Parsons then hit Matt Smith for an eight yard gain, but a 10 yard penalty and a six yard sack made it third and 36 from the Cardinal 35, forcing a Rocket punt.

The Cardinals couldn't get anything going offensively and the first quarter ended on a Cardinal punt. In the middle of the second quarter, it was third and five for Rocketeas when Parsons again couldn't find an open receiver and ran it himself for a 13 yard gain and a first down. Parsons then found Andy Hale open for a 15 yard pass play. The Cardinals got to Parsons for a seven yard sack on the next play but the Rockets got that back on an eight yard run off a shuffle pass to Derrick Bussell. An 11 yard gain put the

Rockets on the Cardinal 10 and, two plays later, Bussell went in from the six for the second Rocket score. A two point conversion attempt failed and the Rockets led 12-0 at the end of the first half.

The third quarter began with the Cardinals going on the offense from their own 35 yard line. The Rocket defense stepped up their action and caught the Cardinal runners for losses of three and six yard on the next two plays, before Derek Bradley came up with an interception and returned the ball to the Cardinal's 40 yard line. However, a clipping penalty against the Rockets caused them to have to start their series from their own 48.

Following four straight carries by Bussell that included two first downs and a 15 yard gain by Ingram, the ball was on the Cardinals 11 when Parsons' pass was picked off on the goal line ending that Rocket threat. However, the Rocket defense again came through, forcing a Cardinal punt. Bussell returned the punt 45 yards to the Cardinal seven yard line and, two plays later, Josh Hendrickson scored. This time, Terry's kick was on the mark and the Rockets led 19-0.

The Rockets struck again in the third quarter, compliments of a fumble recovery by Bobby Cundiff on the Cardinal 35 yard line. The "Rocket Special," a pass play to Andy Hale who was wide open, picked up 35 yards for the Rockets and scored their fourth touchdown of the game. Terry again found the uprights and it was 26-0 at the end of the third quarter.

Wayne County began the fourth quarter again not able to put anything together offensively, going three plays without gaining a yard. On fourth and ten, the Rockets were called for a face mask penalty that gave the Cardinals a first down on their own 10 yard line. On fourth and one, the Cardinals picked up a first down on a controversial measurement that fired up the Rocket defense and they responded on the next play with an interception by Derrick Bussell.

However, this time the Rocket offense sputtered and they had to punt the ball away. The Cardinals then put together their best drive of the night, capped by a 38 yard run that put the ball on the Rockets four yard line. A sewing tackle by Kevin Childress kept the shutout alive and two sacks, by Sean Smith and Henry Bryant, kept the Cardinals out of the

end zone.

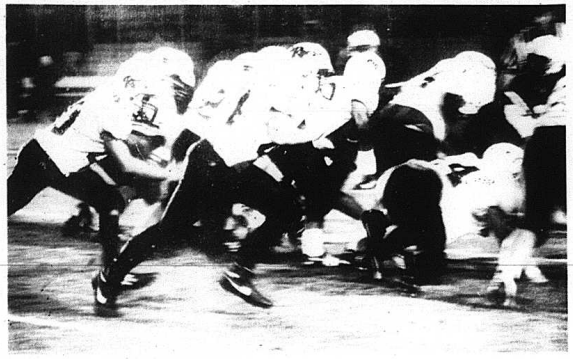
The offense was plagued with penalties and missed assignments. We must do a better job against Corbin," Coach Tom Larkey said after the game. "The defense kept us in the game and gave the offense a chance they normally wouldn't have had," Larkey added.

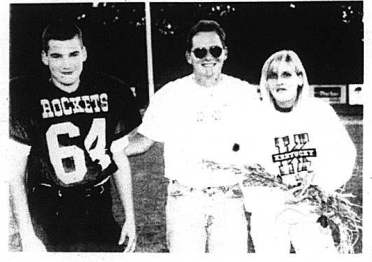
