

Hale for a 55 yard touchdown pass. The point after touchdown was good and the Rockets were up 21-3.

Engineers. The Rockets will travel to Pulaski County to play district rival Somerset for the Rockets last regular season game of the year.



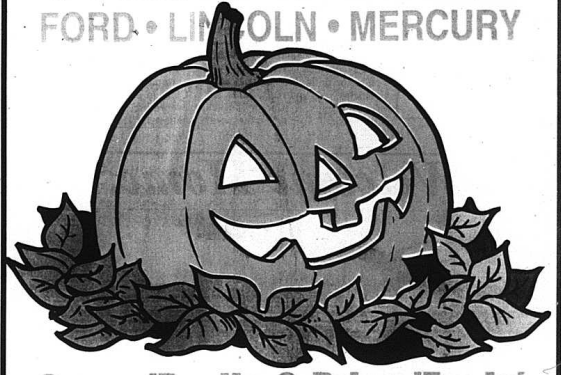

Sturgill claims he was victim

A Rockcastle County man currently serving an 18-year sentence after pleading guilty to first-degree manslaughter earlier this year, is claiming that he - and not the London woman he allegedly stalked and killed - was a victim of domestic violence.

In an affidavit filed in the Laurel Circuit Clerk's office on Aug. 17, Kenneth Wayne Sturgill, 48, of Livingston, claimed that 31-year-old Rebecca Lynn Mitchell repeatedly beat him throughout their five-year relationship, which ended with her shooting death in October 1996.

"As a man, Mr. Sturgill struggled with a lack of self-esteem and was embarrassed to tell anyone that his girlfriend was beating him on a regular basis," wrote Sturgill's attorney, Brenda Popplewell of Somerset, in an accompanying motion for shock probation.

Popplewell wrote that Sturgill, though he faced the death penalty, was reluctant to admit that he was a victim of domestic abuse. He chose, instead, to plead guilty to first-degree manslaughter while under the influence of extreme emotional distress.

"Although there were medical reports of Mr. Sturgill stalking Ms. Mitchell, the situation was actually reversed," Popplewell wrote. "Further, because Mr. Sturgill would occasionally defend himself, he was wrongfully characterized as the aggressor in the relationship."

"Everyone involved in the incident wrongly assumed because Mr. Sturgill is a man, he was the abuser and Ms. Mitchell was the victim," Popplewell added.

Sturgill's affidavit - which was given on July 15 - draws a stark picture of the couple's violent relationship, which Sturgill claimed was caused by Mitchell's use of various drugs, including Zantac, marijuana, crack and cocaine.

"She was a partier, she liked to party 24 hours a day as far as that goes," Sturgill claimed.

"But, without drugs, right out of the blue, she could go off on you in a heartbeat."

Sturgill claimed that he was afraid of Mitchell, and that he did not tell anyone "cause really I was ashamed to admit that I was afraid of Becky and that Becky... beat me up."

Sturgill claimed that Mitchell once struck him with an aluminum baseball bat across the back of the head and shoulders following an argument in the winter of 1995.

"Sometimes I would think she was going to kill me and then I would hit her back," Sturgill claimed. "But she always made me pay for it in the end."

Sturgill claimed that he did try to end the relationship on several occasions, but that, each time, Mitchell would find him.

"Becky would not stop until she got me back," Sturgill claimed.

"She would go by my house, come to where I live or she would call constantly to see where I was at. She had to know exactly where I was at all times."

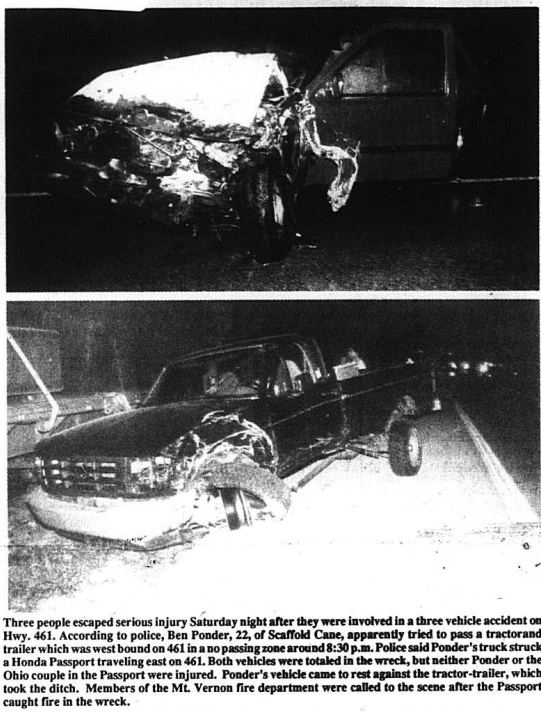
"If I tried to stay away from her, she would make up some kind of excuse to get me," he added. "She would drive out to my place, she would have other people in different vehicles, drive by my place... She was always calling different friends' houses and my house in trying to find me. I could not get away from her anywhere I went."

However, soon after renewing the relationship, Sturgill claimed, Mitchell would return to her violent ways.

"The drugs made her more violent and I was actually afraid not to give her drugs. So, after the arrest, I was afraid to bring her drugs and at the same time afraid not to bring her drugs."

Sturgill noted that, on the night that Mitchell was fatally shot, she had called him and asked him to

County road names to be changed for E-911 system

Most certainly, the more progress the more change.

That is the dilemma the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court finds themselves in these days.

At last week's Rockcastle County Fiscal Court meeting Bob Ledbetter of Emergi Tech and Edwina Anglin director of the local 911 communications system told the court that about 80 percent of the road names in the county would have to be changed in order to correctly implement the enhanced 911 system in the county.

Ledbetter told the court that the most crucial step in implementing the enhanced 911 system is getting the similar sounding or duplicated road names changed.

About 180 of the 240 road names in the county will have to be changed.

By law, the fiscal court is the only governing body in the county that can actually approve the road name changes.

Each of the counties five magistrates will work with the 911 board to change the names of the roads, according to Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotis.

Carlotis said that magistrates would have the final say on the road names before it is brought to a vote of the court.

"Safety and response time are the main reasons the road names have to be changed," Carlotis said.

Not only will road names with the same name have to be changed but the road names that sound alike such as Toddy Payne Road and Tully Payne Road will also have to be changed.

\$500,000 in fed budget to find "wacky" weed

U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-5) announced recently that \$500,000 he requested to fund marijuana eradication efforts in the Daniel Boone National Forest has been included in the end-of-the-year funding bill that will become law.

"The Daniel Boone National Forest has the dubious distinction of being the top marijuana producing national forest in the country," Rogers said. "The funding will help authorities combat marijuana cultivation in the forest, stemming the tide of illegal drugs in our region."

Kentucky is one of the top marijuana states in the country.

Carlotis said the 911 board and magistrates will likely use historical names or topographic names when they change the road names.

Once the road names are changed and the changes are submitted to the United States Postal Service in Florida, addresses on those roads will also change.

However, it will take some time for the changes to take place. Ledbetter told the court that the mapping for the enhanced 911 system in the county was several months behind schedule.

But he encouraged magistrates to meet with Ms. Anglin to begin the road name change process as soon as possible.

Once the enhanced 911 system is in place the information on county residences will be so detailed that it will tell a dispatcher exactly how many feet is from the center of the road to the caller's front door, Ms. Anglin said.

The caller's medical information will also be displayed on the screen.

Ms. Anglin said that because many people will automatically tell a dispatcher their old road name that information will also be kept in the computer as a back up.

Ms. Anglin said that it could be sometime next Spring or summer before the enhanced version of 911 is ready to go on line.

The site based council at the Rockcastle County Middle School will allow students to continue to wear a controversial t-shirt to school.

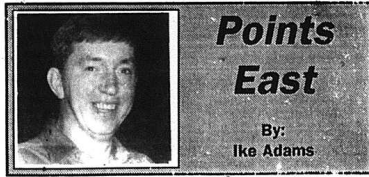

Week of Oct. 15

I have decided that about half of the drivers in central Kentucky have come down with bad cases of arthritis in their left arms, wrists and shoulders. I've reached this conclusion because that's, approximately how many of them I encounter on the road who refuse to use their dimmer switches and turn signals.

It's not unreasonable by my expectations to assume that if you are sitting at a four way intersection with your turn signal indicating that you are turning right at the first opportunity and that if someone else is sitting straight in front of you on the other side of the intersection without giving any signal at all, that they are intending to come straight ahead.

So when traffic thins out enough to get on the road, you ought to be able to turn right without interfering with them or vice versa. It doesn't

work that way in Richmond. Twice in the last week, I have come within inches of having head on collisions with folks who think I should have known they were turning left into the same lane I had indicated I was entering. In both cases, these drivers were highly irritated. In both cases, I pulled off the road to make sure my light was flashing and it was.

I've also encountered people whose left light was flashing and then they turned right and vice versa. But usually they don't give any signal at all. And, if you interfere with whatever is on their mind they act like it's your fault.

On the interstate, it's not uncommon for someone to pass you with their signal light flashing but they just keep on cruising in the same lane. Apparently it hurts so bad to turn the signal on that they are too disabled to turn it off.

If someone is approaching you with their high beams on and you

flash at them, they'll sometimes flash back and then right back to high beam because you've insulted them. I've also gotten out of my truck to make sure I don't have a light out and that my high/low beams are working properly.

The real thrill though is these smaller places like Richmond, London, Corbin, Somerset and Danville that have acquired large shopping centers over the last decade. The parking lots in these places are large and open, but they have clearly marked lanes with directional arrows that you are supposed to use to navigate them. Unfortunately, half the population doesn't have a clue as to what the arrows are for. Nor can they read the word STOP even though it is clearly stenciled in the pavement in bright orange letters six feet tall.

Or maybe they do read it and wonder why in hades anyone would write "STOP" out in the middle of a wide open field.

Their idea of getting through the parking lot is to take the straightest course available and get as close to their destination as possible. Meaning that they think nothing of driving across parking lots in whatever directions suiting their fancies at 40 miles per hour. If you are in a well marked lane and one of these idiots come sailing across the lot and you cut him off, he'll give you the finger and act like you're the idiot.

Every mall in the above mentioned towns could make their local police departments self-sufficient if they'd send in a couple of officers to write reckless driving tickets.

In the meantime, if you come here shopping, please be advised that it's state law to use your turn signals and stay in the lanes in the parking lots. But be careful. There's only a handful of folks who know that.

A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 Rockcastle History Book which was published by the Rockcastle County Historical Society

Lake Linville
In my opinion one of the best or absolutely the best thing to be accomplished in Rockcastle County was the building of Lake Linville.

It came at a time when rationing water was common in Mt. Vernon during the summer because their sole water supply was a small lake out the old Brodhead Road containing at most six acres.

Chyde Linville had a great do to do with the building of Lake Linville, but of course, many others shared in the responsibility.
In the mid-sixties, work began on I-75 and the roadway across Renfro Creek was built as a dam.

There were no land owners, to my recollection, in the Valley there were very approving of this undertaking. Some went to court to try to get more for this land than was offered.

Several of the land owners were near retirement age, so most never purchased any other land.

After much work and passing a few years, the lake began to fill in 1969. Everyone had their own opinion of how long it would take for the lake to be filled. Estimates were from a few months to a few years.

The acreage of Lake Linville is around 450 to 475 times larger than the lake of old Brodhead Road, comparing the six acre lake with a 450 acre lake. The 450 acre lake is 75 times as big.

One inch of water on six acres is 163,000 gallons, on 4450 acres is 12,000,000.

There are times when the water treatment plant pumps 1.5 million gallons daily, so one inch will provide eight days supply.

There is approximately 8,000 acres of water shed and numerous springs

that supply the lake, so the lake has never gotten really low.

Not only does it supply Mt. Vernon and industries, but much of Rockcastle County.

In the listing of post offices in the county a few weeks ago, Quail post office was omitted from the list.

Quail is located in the southwestern section of Rockcastle County, 10 miles southwest of Mt. Vernon and 7 miles south of Brodhead.

Quail got its name from the abundance of the bird named Quail. Hunters from far off came to hunt quail during hunting season.

Quail was a trading center for the southwestern section of Rockcastle, southeastern Lincoln and north section of Pulaski counties. At the turn

of the century, my great grandfather, Green Proctor, operated a flour and grist mill with a country store and post office.

Quail was and still is a very progressive community with men and women working for better improvements and things not only for the community but county. One of the outstanding projects was the Quail Community Park that is used extensively during seven months of the year.

Quail had outstanding two room school. Ida Mae Adams was one of the teachers, she went on to California and became the first judge in the U.S.

Quail 4-H Club was noted for its outstanding accomplishments.


Quail was an agriculture community trying out new variety of seeds, plants and no till of crops. Submitted by Roy G. Brown.

Learn about electricity

Are you one of the many Kentuckians who suffered through a power outage during last year's severe winter storms?

Often, people who have lost power during a storm do not understand why their power is out when they cannot see a fallen line close to their home. Real frustration sets in when power is out for extended periods and people are not seeing utility trucks coming into their neighborhoods to fix the problem.

Perhaps taking a closer look at the system that brings electricity into our homes will help to explain what those crews are doing to restore power, even when you cannot see them on your street.

As important as electricity is, few people realize what goes into bringing electricity into our homes and offices. The electric industry is made up of three basic processes: Generation, Transmission, and Distribution.

Generation is the production of electricity. Electricity is produced when steam (in Kentucky, most electricity is produced from generators that burn coal to produce the steam), under pressure, is forced across the blades of a giant fan, or turbine, causing it to spin. Through a series of coils and wires, this rapid spinning produces electricity. Once the electricity is produced, it is ready to be transmitted.

Transmission is the process of moving this electricity from the power plant into your community. Electricity that is generated at a power plant

is transported out of the power plant through high voltage lines. These lines tie together to carry electricity to communities throughout the country.

Once the electricity reaches your community, the Distribution process delivers electricity to homes and businesses. As you well know, your home is directly connected to your local electric utility through wires that carry the electricity to you.

Many power outages, like the ones Kentuckians saw last winter, occur when trees fall into power lines during strong storms.

If a strong storm causes a power line to go down, all the homes connected to that line lose power. The power line may be close to your home, but it may also be several miles away.

If the repair crew fixes that one line, they restore power to all the homes served by that line. For this reason, you may have power restored

without ever having seen a utility truck on your street.

Always remember that you should never go near a fallen power line. These lines should be avoided and reported immediately to your local electric company or emergency authorities.

Currently, Kentucky citizens pay for all these services, generation, transmission, and distribution in one bundled bill issued by their local electric utility.


However, some speculate that trucks may eventually be able to choose the company that actually generates the electricity. While such a change seems in the distant future for Kentucky, it is something Kentuckians should watch for and learn more about.



Kentucky Baptist Convention set for November 10-11 in Louisville

The Kentucky Baptist Convention will hold its annual meeting Nov. 10-11 at the Galt House East Hotel.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention, a separate annual conference, is scheduled for Nov. 9 at the same location, will serve as the prelude to the KBC annual meeting.

The theme for this 161st meeting of the state's largest Protestant denomination will be "Jesus Makes the Difference."

Approximately 1,800 messengers from Southern Baptist churches across Kentucky are expected to attend the annual meeting. Messengers will worship together through drama and music and elect officers to guide the convention during the coming year.

The messengers will also hear reports from convention staff and messages from guest speakers. Dr. Kevin Cosby, pastor of St. Stephen Baptist Church, Louisville will deliver the convention sermon during the Tuesday, Nov. 10 afternoon session. Dr. Gayle Toole, president of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and Dr. Bill Mackey, the KBC's new executive secretary-treasurer, will also address the convention.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention also plans to announce new missions partnerships with Tanzania

and Poland. Through the partnerships, Kentucky Baptists will work with Baptists in those countries to meet medical, construction, educational and other needs.

Kentucky Baptists currently have partnerships in Russia and New England.

Featured speakers for the pastor's

conference include Al Mohler, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville; Jerry Vines, co-pastor of First Baptist Church of Jacksonville, FL and a former president of the Southern Baptist Convention; Johnny Hunt, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Woodstock, GA.; and Mackey.

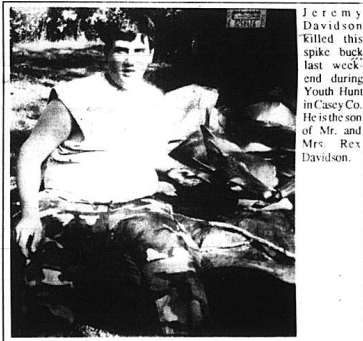

bring some crank to her.
"I didn't want to, but I was afraid not to," Sturgill said. "I told her I would try."
Sturgill stated that, when he arrived at Mitchell's Homestead Lane residence in the early morning hours of Oct. 24, 1996, he entered the house through a side door into the kitchen, then went with Mitchell into a bedroom.
After telling Mitchell that he would not bring her any drugs, Sturgill claimed that - as he started to leave - she grabbed him and struck him.
"I started into the kitchen to go out the door and she hit me again on the back with her fist..." Sturgill stated.
Sturgill said that during the ensuing struggle, Mitchell got on top of him and began slapping and striking him, and that Mitchell told a friend that was staying with her to call the police.
"Becky said go call the law...She

said she was going to beat the hell out of me and told her friend go call the law so we can have him arrested," Sturgill stated. "I said no you stay here because there wasn't a phone in the house because I was afraid to be in the house alone with her. I was hoping the friend would help me get Becky off of me."
The friend, however, left Mitchell's house and ran to a neighbor's home to call 911 as the struggle between Mitchell and Sturgill continued - and soon became deadly.
"In the meantime, my gun that I always carry, fell out of my back pocket and Becky had found it," Sturgill stated. "It was dark in there and I was struggling to hold the gun, trying to take the gun away from her."
During the struggle, however, Mitchell was struck in the head with the gun, which then discharged.
"But she did have a hold of the trigger of the gun and the handle of the gun and I was holding the barrel," Sturgill stated. "When the gun dis-

charged she turned loose of the gun. It was dark in there and I just couldn't see, and I didn't know she was shot."
Mitchell, who was still alive when police arrived shortly before 1 a.m., was airlifted to the University of Tennessee Medical Center in Knoxville, Tenn., where she was pronounced dead at 7:24 a.m.
Following the incident, Sturgill reportedly swapped vehicles with his ex-wife Dora Ackler, who then accompanied him to Sharonville, Ohio, where they spent the night at a Days Inn motel.
The next day, Sturgill returned to his home in Rockcastle County and was arrested without incident by Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane and members of the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department.
In addition, Sturgill was charged with first-degree burglary and first-degree stalking in a three-count indictment. Both those charges were dismissed as part of the plea agreement.
The motion for shock probation, however, was denied by Laurel Circuit Judge Roderick Messer, in an

Aug. 28 order.
"In the case before the Court, the Movant was ably represented by counsel," Messer wrote. "The Movant and the Commonwealth entered into a plea agreement which provided that the Movant would be sentenced as a violent offender."
"The plea agreement did not contemplate that the Movant would contend he was a victim of domestic violence or abuse," Messer continued. "Furthermore, the Movant made no such claim either before or during the sentencing."

- The funding is projected in the omnibus budget bill agreed to last week by congressional leadership and the Administration. A House of Representatives vote on the overall measure will occur later today, with a Senate vote scheduled for tomorrow morning.
As part of the omnibus bill, \$1.2 billion is included for the support of

teacher efforts to reduce class size in grades 1-3 by recruiting, training and hiring new qualified teachers.

In addition to the funds for the Daniel Boone, Rogers has also secured \$5.2 million for the Kentucky National Guard's Counter-Drug Program. The newly-created Appalachia High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA), which targets illegal drug production and trafficking in 26 counties in southern and eastern Kentucky, is also slated to receive \$6 million next year.

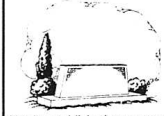

Safe Bread Making

Nothing warns an autumn afternoon like the smell of fresh bread baking in the kitchen. Breads make up the foundation of a healthy diet. Breads are rich sources of energy and provide some protein. Breads are naturally low in fat, contain iron and B vitamins, and are economical to purchase or bake at home.

Breads that use starters are traditional for this part of the country. Starters can cause some safety concerns. Use only starters that are sanitary. If a starter has been kept continuously in the refrigerator and has been made in a clean kitchen, it should be safe to use. To further ensure safety, starters should ferment in the refrigerator, not on the counter top. If a bread recipe suggests that the starter ferments at room temperature for 8 hours, it should ferment in the refrigerator in about 10-12 hours instead.

During the holidays, fruit breads are favorites in many families. Be very cautious of breads that are left at room temperature for long periods of time to allow for fermentation of the fruits. This process can allow harmful molds and bacteria to grow.

The recent practice of using terra cotta for baking breads can cause some problems as well. If you wish to bake in terra cotta, you should always use terra cotta that is food-grade. A food grade terra cotta container is made especially for baking and have a special coating that prevents any leaching of harmful substances from the container to the bread. A terra cotta pot that is not treated may allow lead and other harmful substances to penetrate the food.

The practice of baking bread-in-a-

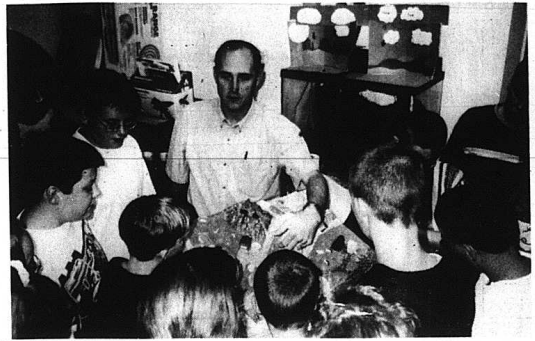
jar is also not recommended. Because bread-in-a-jar is a low acid food in a sealed container, clostridium botulinum can thrive in this product. In January, 1998, the Food and Drug Administration called for a halt to any further production of bread-in-a-jar both in homes and by commercial food producers.

Lady Beetle Invasion

r, a lady beetle has caused quite a stir. While people are able to put up with a few fall insect invaders entering their homes, this insect often arrives in the ten of thousands

or hundreds of thousands. Fortunately, they are not poisonous, do not bite or sting, are not carriers of disease, and do not eat wood. However, they do have a disagreeable odor and can leave a yellow stain when crushed.

These oval, convex, 1/3 inch beetles are pale green in color with up to 19 black spots on the wing covers. The variable number of spots makes an accurate description difficult. The margins of the segment in front of the wings is white with a characteristic black "W".

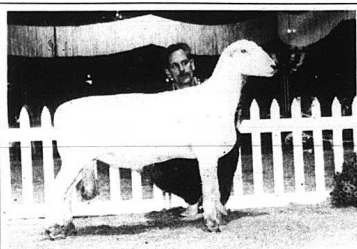
During most of the year, this insect is an important beneficial species. It feeds on aphids and scales on a wide variety of plants

including tobacco, apples, woody ornamentals, and shade trees. Because of this, we would recommend against using insecticides to kill these beetles if possible.

Cooling temperatures and shortening day lengths will cause these beetles to begin to search for overwintering sites. The flight begins suddenly, usually on a clear, sunny afternoon in mid to late October. The sudden onset makes it seem that there may have been an intentional release of this insect in an area. This is not the case. These insects have moved into and across Kentucky on their own. The massive flight is an instinctive response triggered by environmental conditions.

We expect that the same homes that had problems last year may have them again this year. Generally, we have seen many more of this species of lady beetle during this past summer than last year.

Prevention is the key to managing problems with these beetles, and now is the time to get your defenses in place. If lady beetles get into the house or attic, sweep or vacuum them out.

Timber sellers beware

As Service Forester for Rockcastle County with the Kentucky Division of Forestry, I want to encourage landowners to use the services we provide. At no cost to landowners, I will walk over the property with them, or alone, and collect data for a Forest Stewardship Plan. This plan will make suggestions to improve the health and growth of their forest stands. Cost sharing is available for some of these recommendations.

Thinning, cull removal, and natural regeneration are common recommendations. We also recommend harvesting mature fully stocked stands with advance regeneration that will develop into the next canopy. For a modest fee of \$3.00 per thousand board feet of timber marked, we will provide a list containing the total board footage marked, number of trees marked, and the number of cull trees marked for each species. This service is limited to 50 acres per year in order to serve as many as possible.

There is no obligation other than the fee for a harvest marking. Don't be short changed on hearsay and innuendo. My position is dependant on promoting sustainable forestry practices. If your timber buyer is interested in your tract of timber only if we don't mark the timber for you, I

am very suspicious. While I cannot put a value on your timber, I will, in writing, tell you exactly what is there before any trees are cut. Armed with this information, you can shop for the best price by sealed bid. To me, this is the best interest of Kentucky's private woodland owners.

Only two weeks remain until we all will know who the Magistrate will be in District One.

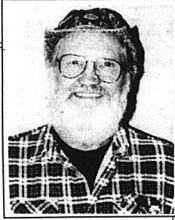

All Actions Have Consequences

Some of the saddest creatures I have ever seen are men whose wives have left them. No, not all men who have been left are sad, but some are extremely sad. Bill was one of those. (All characters are fictitious.) When he came for counseling, his first words were, "Doc, you've got to help me save my marriage. I will do anything you tell me, just help me get my wife back."

After reminding Bill that counselors could not work miracles, this counselor asked for more details to his story. Bill painted a grim story of a five-year marriage marked by arguments, separation and infidelity. He admitted to at least three affairs during their brief marriage.

Bill acknowledged that he had done wrong. He looked very penitent as he cried in the counselor's office. "I know that I really messed up," he said tearfully, "but I will never do it

again. I have learned my lesson." Bill seemed sincere. He was a broken man begging for mercy. "Just tell me what to do to get her back," he pleaded, "and I'll do it."

This counselor could not give Bill the miracle that he wanted. "This is not much you can do at this point. Just wait and see."

FSA Director
Loan Deficiency Program:
 The Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS) is currently taking applications for the loan deficiency payments (LDPs). New changes to the marketing assistance loan program and the LDPs program make them more flexible for farmers to use

during the 1998 harvest. Many farmers are experiencing low commodity prices and many others have suffered natural disasters and these changes will give farmers more marketing flexibility and will allow them the opportunity to maximize their cash-flow. Farmers participating in the Agriculture Marketing Transition Act

(AMTA) program will be able to obtain marketing assistance loans or LDPs for all of their production of wheat, corn and other program crops without regard to how the commodity is harvested. Similarly, producers of non contract commodities such as soybeans, designated minor oilseeds and extra long staple cotton will be able to take advantage of these changes. If you are a farmer who is a participant in the AMTA program or a producer of non-contract commodities

in 1998, we urge you to come to the local FSA office and obtain more details and to file for the LDP payments. **Conservation Reserve Program:** Sign up for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be held beginning Oct. 26 and ending December 11, 1998. This is the third general CRP sign up since enactment of the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996. CRP is a voluntary program that offers annual rental payments and cost share assistance to establish long term resource conserving covers on eligible land. Annual rental payments are made based on the agricultural rental value of the land and cost share assistance is provided in an amount equal to not more than 50% of the participants costs in establishing approved practices. The duration of the contracts are from 10 to 15 years.

As in any democracy, the FSA county committee system works best when everyone participates, and, like in any democracy, to participate farmers and ranchers must have the opportunity to vote for their representatives on the County Office Committee. As in any American election, to vote, a citizen must register, and producers need get their names on

the FSA name and address file to receive a ballot. It's just like voting in a presidential or other election - only registered voters can cast a ballot. It only takes a few minutes to register, and all farmers and ranchers should participate in the election process. For further information, contact your local Farm Service Agency office.

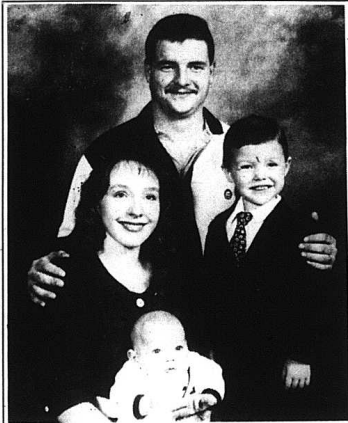

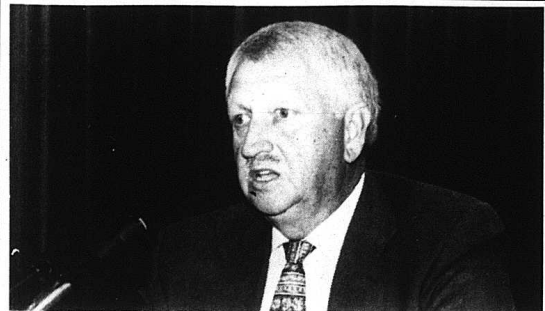

Sen. Albert Robinson of London discussed the effects of House Bill 495 at the October 6 meeting of the Interim Joint Committee on Transportation. The bill gave county fiscal courts the ability to raise weight limits for trucks on county roads. The bill also removed a \$500 maximum penalty for trucks which are more than 5,000 pounds overweight while leaving in a steeper fine based on how many pounds a truck is over 5,000 pounds in weight. The resulting fine is 9 cents for each pound trucks are over the limit. Some fines have ranged between \$2,500 and \$5,000. Lawmakers on the committee have said this was not the intent of the bill and have said they intend to change the penalty provisions in the future.

Not Making the Grade:

President Clinton Earns an "F" in Failing to Sign Education Reform

Overshadowed by the other news coming out of Washington this summer was President Clinton's veto of the Education Savings and School Excellence Act, a bipartisan education reform package that would have made a top-notch education more accessible and more affordable to Kentucky's students and their families. By vetoing this important bill, the President chose the laid status quo over the needs of Kentucky's students. Rather than embracing new ideas to improve our children's educational system, the President has once again proven that his administration remains beholden to the forces whom are dedicated to maintaining the current, broken-down, bloated bureaucracies.

Because of the President's veto, 14 million families — a majority of whom are low and middle income — will be unable to open tax-free education savings accounts. These accounts would have allowed families to set aside money for their children's education, where that money could accumulate interest without being taxed by the government. Families would have been able to use this money to pay for a variety of education expenses, including home computers, transportation, books or tuition at a private or parochial school. Instead, parents will continue to be taxed on the money they set aside for their children's education.

President Clinton's veto also killed a provision that would have made college more affordable to over 3,000 Kentucky families. This provision — for which I have led the fight — would have designated pre-paid tuition and saving plans, like those which we have in Kentucky, as 100% tax free. There are currently 20 states, including Kentucky, that have such programs, and more than a dozen states that are preparing to implement similar programs. Under the bill, families that contribute to such plans would not have had to worry about the IRS taxing them once the money was withdrawn to pay for their children's college education. Since the President chose to veto the bill, over 3,000 Kentucky students and their families are going to have a tougher time affording college. In addition to making education more expensive and less accessible to low and middle income families, the President's veto prevents us from freeing Kentucky schools from the Washington-imposed bureaucratic maze. Many local school boards and teachers are sick and tired of the mounds of paperwork they must fill out and the regulations they must comply with in order to qualify for funds from the U.S. Department of Education. Our bill would have given local officials and teachers the flexibility they need to best serve Kentucky's students. Locally-elected school administrators, teachers and parents know better than Washington bureaucrats what Kentucky students need.

It is quite apparent that the President did not do his homework when he decided to veto this bill. Instead, he decided to copy right off the pages of the education establishment that is responsible for the current state of our schools. Had the President done his own research, he likely would have found out how much families in Kentucky and around the country needed this legislation. In my estimation, the President deserves an "F" for failing to sign this bill and failing to help make education more affordable and more accessible.

Conscious up to the last and with a prayer on his lips this good and noble man passed into eternity. His life had been a model one, the life of a perfect Christian, a child of God. He was

born May 7, 1838 in Pulaski County close to where Somerset now stands. At the outbreak of the Civil War he enlisted in the Union Army, making a loyal and faithful soldier until he was overtaken by the ravages of smallpox owing to which disease he was honorably retired in 1865, at which time he settled in Mt. Vernon. A year later he was married to Miss Harriet Ferguson, which union was blessed with eight children, five of whom are still living, two boys and three girls: C.K. Carmical, W. Carmical, Mrs. Kittie Smith, Mrs. Sallie Soward, and Mrs. Nannie Harp. For nearly a half century he has been a minister of the Gospel and has proved himself a worth soldier of Christ. For several years he was pastor of the Baptist church at this place and at the time of his death had charge of the congregation at Preachersville. Bro. Carmical was one of our best citizens, and it is with the deepest regret that we bid him goodbye as he goes to meet his Father. The funeral services will take place at 1:30 this afternoon in the Baptist church, after which the body will be laid to rest in the Presbyterian Cemetery.

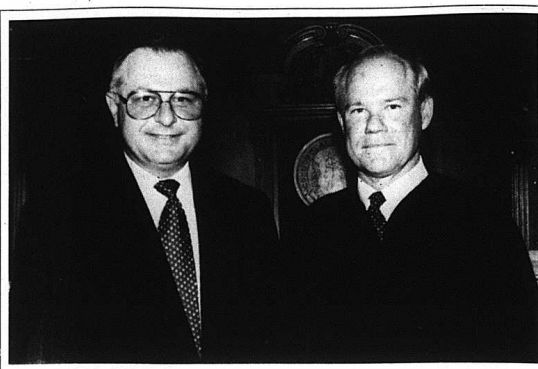
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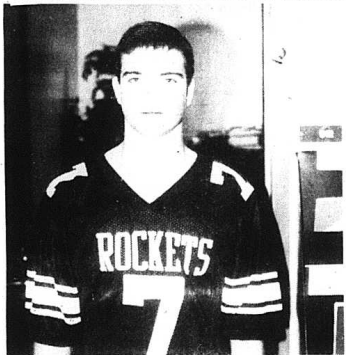

The Rockcastle County Rockets traveled to Irvine Friday night where they spoiled the Estill County Engineers Homecoming with a 38-9 victory.

The win also gave the Rockets their fifth win of the season and helped them toward a second place finish in the district and a first round home field advantage in the play-offs.

The Rockets received the opening kick-off and junior Matt Smith picked up an Engineers squire kick that was returned to the 45 yard line for good field position.

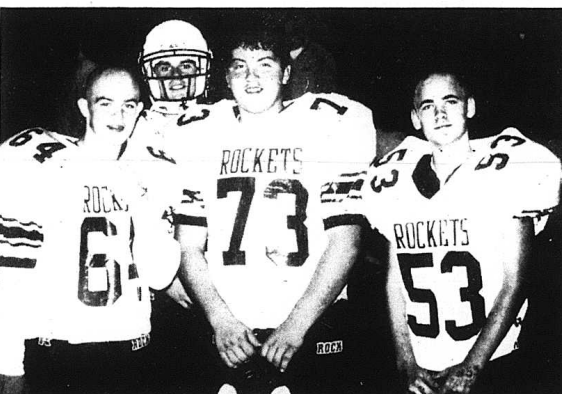

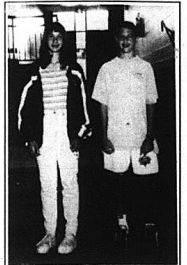
and placed 43rd in 23:15.

Vernon cemetery many years ago, but the tombstones if there were ever any to the grave, having been torn down and misplaced, it was a serious doubt in his mind whether the grave located is the right one or not. Mr. Love was on his return home from Manchester, Clay County, where he had been to celebrate, on Sept. 30th, the 86th anniversary of his birth, although he does not look to

be more than 60. Mr. Love visited the family of Dr. Joplin here about 70 years ago, and just after the close of the war passed through here and spent a night with Mr. J.L. Joplin, who was then running a hotel, where now stands the Joplin brick, the building occupied at that time having burned and the brick having been erected by Mr. Joplin. Mr. Love has traveled extensively and is a very entertaining conversationalist. He had with him a collection of souvenirs from Jerusalem, Palestine, and other foreign countries where he visited twenty years ago; one is a bouquet from the garden of Gethsemane, a small vial of water from the River Jordan, at the point where Jesus was baptized, a Bible bound in the Jerusalem olive wood. NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL OF AN ALTERNATIVE METHOD OF REGULATION

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, on October 12, 1998, pursuant to the Kentucky Revised Statutes, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") filed with the Public Service Commission ("PSC") an application for approval of an alternative method of regulation of its Rates and Service ("The Application"). The Application requests that the Commission approve an alternative method of regulating KU's rates and service, as well as an Electric Performance-Based Rate ("EPBR") Tariff. The Application, if approved, will change the method of regulating KU from the traditional rate-of-return method of regulation to a method based on KU's operating performance. The EPBR Tariff, if approved, will be applied to customers' bills so that customers will share on a timely basis in the benefits of utility improved performance accomplished by KU.

The proposed EPBR Tariff would apply to all electric rate schedules and special contracts for electric service. The monthly amount computed under each of the rate schedules to which the EPBR Tariff is applicable shall be increased or decreased by the Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor at a rate per kilowatt-hour of monthly consumption during the billing calendar quarter defined as follows:

EPBR(A) = FCR + MDS + GP + SQ + BA

Where:

- EPBR(A) = Electric Performance-Based Rate Adjustment Factor
- EPBRA = Electric Performance-Based Rate Amount for the current quarter
- FCR = Fuel Cost Recovery
- MDS = Marginal Dispatch Savings expressed as a credit
- GP = Generation Performance expressed as a credit
- SQ = Service Quality
- BA = Balancing Adjustment
- KWH = Kentucky jurisdictional Kilowatt-hour Sales in the current quarter
- q = Current quarter shall be the second calendar quarter preceding the billing calendar quarter in which the EPBR(A) is billed.

KU also is requesting that the Commission approve the withdrawal of its Electric Rate Schedule Adjustment Clause after all fuel costs are collected pursuant to the Uniform Fuel Adjustment Clause Regulation (807 KAR 8:056) and final orders are issued in the pending fuel adjustment clause cases of KU in compliance with the approval of the EPBR Tariff and KU's further requesting that the Commission approve conditions permitting greater tariff flexibility in the future.

The Commission's Order of September 12, 1997 in the Matter of JOINT APPLICATION OF LOUISVILLE GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY AND KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY FOR APPROVAL OF AN ALTERNATIVE METHOD OF REGULATION AND TESTIMONY regarding the traditional rate of return regulation or alternative regulation and file detailed plans to address any future rate regulation. The Application alternative method of regulation and the EPBR Tariff described in this Notice are the plan, regulatory method and tariff proposed in response to the Commission's Order of September 12, 1997. The Commission's review of KU's Application may result in a method of regulating KU or consumer rates other than the method of regulation and rates described in this Notice.

Any corporation, association, body politic, or person may, by motion within thirty (30) days after publication or mailing of this Notice, request a hearing to intervene in the case before the Commission (Case No. 98-274).
