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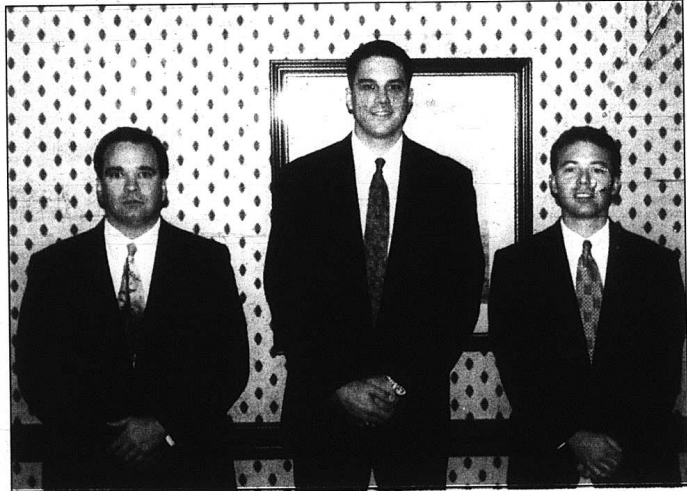

A three member tribunal made up of people from other areas of the state will hear evidence surrounding the firing when they convene next week at the Central Office. The hearing will not be open to the public.

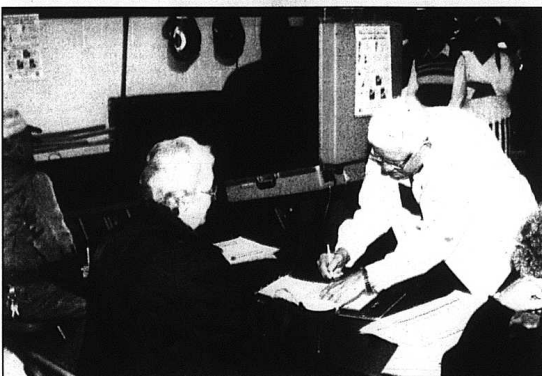
Two injured at Livingston

McKinney won 500 votes to Bradley's 487.

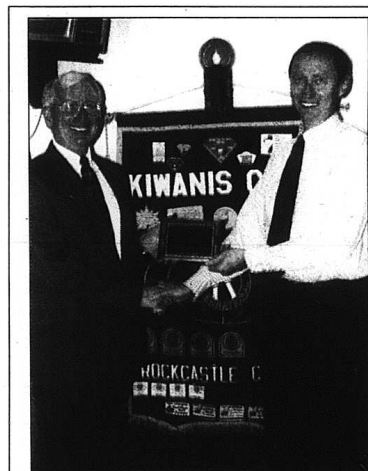

Dear Editor,
As I stated in my letter to you several months ago, I have tried to maintain a low profile over the controversial issue of the "Renfro Valley Log Cabin Village" project, which is being funded by hard earned tax dollars through a federal grant from the ARC. This \$440,000 grant was recently given to the local Mt. Ver-

non/Rockcastle Tourist Commission. In the best interest of wounds and hard feelings, which need time to heal, I have tried, and am still trying to put this situation behind me. However, the "scab" on this wound has once again been removed, this time by Larry Carter, in his letter to you last week. And although, just like the last time, it is I, who will once again be accused, by a few local people, as the one continuing to bring up this issue, I cannot let Larry Carter's comments go unanswered.

I found Larry Carter's "facts", as he put them, so inaccurate, and grossly incomplete, that I am compelled, once again, to respond to his allegations of interest of keeping the good citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County accurately informed so that they may draw their own conclusion. Therefore, I respectfully request that this letter, which lists the following accurate facts relative to this situation.

First of all, I direct this letter to you, and to the good citizens of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County, because, frankly, I do not know which of the "three characters" to respond to of which Mr. Carter identified himself. I suppose, however, that in due time, all of us will know which of the three titles he listed is his true identity.

In his letter, he misrepresents the facts when he states, "when we applied for the grant, we autowent with opposition from your great mayor and Jerry Hayes". That is not true. The Mayor and I did not object to the Tourist Commission getting a grant. Mr. Carter's characterization of the so-called opposition to their grant was "automatic" is so hilariously absurd, that it almost doesn't even deserve the status of an intelligent response.

The fact is, I simply exercised my right as a "taxpayer" and as an entrepreneur who had just invested my entire life savings, my entire retirement fund, and put everything I owned on the line, into my "privately funded" Brush Arbor Log Village, located within walking distance of where they are putting these.

My second question to the Tourist Commission that day was, "why didn't they use the grant for something other than a second log village...why not something complimentary...something different?" Something creative on their part?

I felt, as many others did and still do, that that certainly had the right question their logic on this issue, since I had the common sense and courtesy to approach Renfro Valley and the Tourist Commission prior to the purchase of my land and the construction of my log village. Before I invested my limited dollars in my project I wanted to be sure that I wouldn't be stepping on any toes or doing anything that would be a conflict of interest. In other words, I wanted to be a good neighbor.

My third question to the Tourist Commission that day was to ask why I wasn't given the reciprocal courtesy of at least being "informed" of

their intent to put up a second log village...their own...within walking distance of mine.

My letter to the Governor came as a result of not getting satisfactory or even logical answers to my requests. In that letter, I simply asked the Governor the same three questions I had asked the Tourist Commission that day.

SPECIAL NOTE: I have decided to make that letter to the Governor public, for anyone to see, so that the courtesy and respect with which it was written can be seen and known by all who want the true and accurate facts of this controversial issue. That letter, will also be included in a book I plan to write about my wonderful and positive Brush Arbor experiences.

Mayor Cromer was present at the Tourist Commission meeting that day. It was the first time I had ever met him. Besides my wife and my immediate family, he was my only support that day. Having been in the business myself, and knowing Mayor Cromer honorably and bravely served in combat in Vietnam, we were quite at home being out-numbered and in hostile territory! He simply pointed out the ARC regulations on the issue, and simply asked the same basic three questions I was asking. As a result of the backbone and character he demonstrated that day, I will always consider it an honor and a privilege to stand beside him in a foxhole anytime!

Let me get to the bottom line. Although I did not receive a written reply from the Governor to my letter, he did have the courtesy and the honor, after publicly endorsing the grant, to visit Brush Arbor Log Village following the groundbreaking ceremony of the Renfro Valley Log Cabin Village.

Danny Ford, after his objection to my letter to the Governor, and after his public endorsement of the grant, had the courtesy to visit Brush Arbor Log Village with the Governor.

Glennis Miller, with whom I have gone head-to-head on this issue, not only had the courtesy and professionalism to personally invite my family and me to the groundbreaking ceremony, (which is why we were there Larry) but he has continued to support and promote Brush Arbor.

County Judge Ernest Buzz Catolius, who publicly endorsed the grant, had the courtesy to request a personal visit and tour of Brush Arbor and offered to support us in any way he could.

Not only have we not seen that same courtesy and professionalism

from Larry Carter, who claims to be the president of the Mt. Vernon/Rockcastle County Tourist Commission, but at this point I will ask Mr. Carter to just confirm or deny that by phone, just two days before his letter appeared in last week's Signal, he told me personally, and I quote him, that "I had better never see a Brush Arbor brochure in my motel (the Kastle Inn)!"

I submit to the reasonable citizens of Rockcastle County and surrounding regions...is that the kind of mentality, demeanor, and character you want in that position, in which Mr. Carter occupies, representing you and your community? Is that the kind of attitude you want in a person who sits in that position to promote you, your business, your county and tourism?

Wouldn't it be better served by an individual/individuals in that key position who can be creative enough to do something original and creative...something that will attract and bring entrepreneurs into Rockcastle County...those who might have a positive impact on tourism, the local economy, and job creation.

I point out that no one...and especially Larry Carter, recruited me and Brush Arbor to Rockcastle County. In fact, I would like to know what, if any, creative entrepreneurs he has had a part in bringing to Mt. Vernon and the county.

If he, acting as president of the Mt. Vernon/Rockcastle County Tourist Commission, treats all those who would consider making a move to Rockcastle County with the same lack of courtesy, lack of professionalism, and with the same open hostility and non-support which he has demonstrated toward me and Brush Arbor, much less not even a letter of welcome...nor a thank you for nearly a million dollar investment into the county for which he had absolutely no part in attracting there, and from which his motel has already benefited, will you all can draw your own conclusions.

Larry, the Mayor and I never

"fought you every way we knew how", as you put it. If we had chosen to do so, it would have been an ugly affair, of which I'm told by the legal profession we would have won.

I felt that rather than pursue that avenue of action, it would be more beneficial to continue my efforts in making Brush Arbor not only "Kentucky's Newest Hidden Treasure" (TM), but to continue on the path of making it a "Living Memorial" to me and my family's eight generations of our earliest Kentucky Pioneer Ancestors.

If you really care and believe in the people of Rockcastle County as you say you do, be a stand-up guy and don't distort and misrepresent the truth and the facts.

In your next letter to the editor, Larry, why don't you tell all of us taxpayers, how much of our tax dollars did it cost us for 10 long meetings, as chinking. How much of the \$440,000 you have left to take them down, move them, roustack them, and stuff them? Or will you have to dip into our pockets even deeper to get the job done? How many jobs will your village create? Will the village in fact produce the profit which you promise? If so, how much? And what will you do with the so-called profit? And what other "market" will draw how did you reach that conclusion; and from what date did you reach that conclusion?



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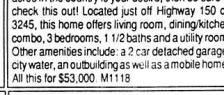
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Stop Heart Disease Before It Stops You

More American women die from heart disease than any other disease. This year it will kill 370,000 women. Another 93,000 will die from stroke. But it doesn't have to happen to you. According to an updated handbook from the National Institute of Health (NIH), women can take steps to prevent heart disease.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) of the NIH has revised the Healthy Heart Handbook for Women. There are now 100 pages of the latest information on preventing cardiovascular diseases like

coronary heart disease, heart attack, high blood pressure, stroke, and chest pain.

One in ten women aged 45 to 64 has some form of heart disease. After the age of 65, the number climbs to one in four. Women, like men, are more likely to develop cardiovascular diseases if they smoke, have high blood pressure or high blood cholesterol, are overweight, are sedentary, or have diabetes.

Did you know that of all women in the United States:
* More than half over age 65 have high blood pressure

* One fourth have high blood cholesterol levels
* More than half are overweight or obese
* Only 40 percent do 30 minutes of moderate physical activity on most days

The Healthy Heart Handbook for Women helps women develop a personal action plan for reducing the major risk factors. There's also news on other factors, like stress, birth control pills, and alcohol and care on the role of hormone

replacement therapy, aspirin, and vitamins. For women with heart disease, a new section explains diagnostic tests, medications, and warning signs and offers advice on talking to a doctor and preparing a heart attack survival plan.

Hungry? Find tips on choosing

low-fat, low-cholesterol foods. There are over a dozen recipes like Bavarian beef, baked pork chops, rice pudding, and crunchy pumpkin pie.

The Healthy Heart Handbook for Women was originally published in 1992 and immediately became a U.S. Government best-seller. About 30,000 copies were sold. According to a nationwide survey, most people buy it for personal use, but many nurses and other health care providers use it to educate patients.

Fall is Important
Time For
Lawn Care



With summer over, many gardeners take a vacation from lawn care. But fall is an important time to control weeds, remove leaves and trim and fertilize grass.

Fall is the number one time of the year to control broadleaf weeds like dandelion, plantain, chickweed, henbit and clover. It's easier to control broadleaf weeds when they are actively growing in the fall.

This time of year we have fewer sensitive plants in the yard that might be injured by drift or herbicide volatility. Winds usually are calmer, reducing the chance of drift. Don't depend on frost to control weeds; it stunts or kills the top but won't kill the crowns and roots.

Another advantage of fall broadleaf weed control is that grasses are actively growing and will fill in spaces the weeds occupied.

It's very important to keep leaves off the lawn because they shade grass and this prevents growth of new tillers of grass plants. While

you can chop up leaves with a mower, it is best to remove them, because accumulation of chopped leaves on the crown hurts new plant and stem development.

Fall also is an important time to properly mow and fertilize the lawn. The calendar has no effect on when to stop mowing grass; keep mowing as long as grass is growing. Shorter grass maintains its greenness. Mow shorter in the fall than in the summer; grass should be no more than 2 inches tall going into the winter. Grass that is too tall tends to flop over and smother itself out. This can cause losses of up to half the grass density.

Mowing grass shorter and fertilizing in fall produces a more lush lawn.

Short grass allows more light penetration and this, plus a high-nitrogen fertilizer, produces new plants that thicken up the lawn. It also produces growth and greenup several weeks earlier in the spring.

Applying a high-nitrogen fertilizer in the fall promotes root growth that increases lawn density without excessive top growth. This makes a lawn more susceptible to drought stress and means it has to be mowed more often. Spring fertilization also encourages diseases and growth of crabgrass and summer annual weeds.

In the Fall, apply fertilizer at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 lbs. if actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. The percent nitrogen is the first number in the analysis on the fertilizer bag. To get 1 lb. of actual nitrogen use ammonium nitrate (33-0-0), apply 3 lbs per 1,000 square feet. 3 lbs. Of 33% nitrogen equals 1 lb. of actual

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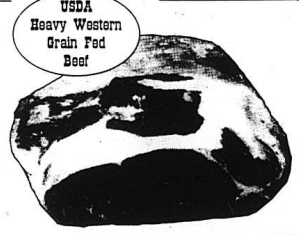

Agricultural News

Market Loss Assistance
(MLA) Payments

On Oct. 21, 1998, the President signed the Omnibus Consolidated and Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act, 1999. The 1999 Act pro-

vides an appropriation of up to \$2.857 billion "for assistance to owners and producers on a farm who are eligible for final payments for fiscal year 1998 under a production flexibility contract (PFC) for the farm under provision of the Agricultural Market Transition Act." The 1999 Act further provides that the assistance made available to producers shall be proportional to the amount of PFC payment received by the producers for FY 1998. These payments shall be equal to 49.72 percent of the FY 1998

PFC payment received after reductions. The projected date for issuance of these payments is November 3, 1998.

Electronic Funds Transfer (Direct Deposit)

In regard to the FSA payment(s) which may be issued to producers at the appropriate time, it is noted the payment MUST be made by direct deposit UNLESS the producers does not have a financial institution. The following paragraph is an explanation of the new ruling published in National FI Notice #2159.

In the government's effort to reduce operating costs, legislation has been passed which requires that all recipients of new Federal payments made after July 25, 1996, be made by

electronic funds transfer (EFT). The law further states that all payments made after January 1, 1999, must be made by Electronic Funds Transfer.

If you have not signed up for direct deposit please do so today. Your local bank and/or the FSA office will be glad to help you complete the form.

Public Notice for LAA Election-LAA #1 (Community A)

The Rockcastle County FSA Committee election will be held this year on December 1, 1998 for LAA #1-Community A. This is the western section of Rockcastle County bound by Pulaski, Lincoln, and Garrard County. Highway boundaries are: Hwy. 70, Hwy. 150, I-75 and Hurricane School Rd.

The FSA county committee is the most direct link between USDA farm programs and local producers. By making decisions on FSA programs, the COC system helps shape nationwide programs into programs that work at the local level. Duties of County FSA Committee members include: *informing farmers of the purpose and provisions of the FSA programs; *keeping the State FSA Committee informed of LAA conditions; *recommending needed changes in farm programs; *participating in county meetings as necessary; *performing other duties as assigned by the State FSA Committee.

In order to make the COC system work, it must represent all parts of local agriculture. FSA is committed to a diversified work force and a diversified COC and encourages participation from all different parts of local agriculture. This may include the small farmer, people in specialty crops, new farmers and women-all people with unique and valuable insights and perspectives to the farming business.

All farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age, can vote if they are eligible to take part in any FSA program. Eligible voters have the right to vote for one (1) candidate by casting their vote on the FSA ballot which will be mailed from the county office on November 20th.

 - * Increased conviction rates, including those for DUI by over 100%. (Source: Kentucky State Police Annual Crime Reports)
 - * Dramatically increased juvenile detention time. (Source: Rockcastle County Fiscal Court billing records)
 - * Provided Domestic Violence and other training seminars for law enforcement and court personnel.
 - * We have issued numerous search warrants and arrest warrants in cases of child pornography, child abuse and drug cases. Recently, cooperation between Federal, State and Local authorities have cracked down on major drug growers and dealers in our area. This type of continued cooperation between law enforcement agencies can help make Rockcastle County a safer place for our families and our young people, and we are excited about the future of our great county.

An Open Letter to Neighbors and Friends in Rockcastle County:

Recently, I was issued a Notice of Violation for violating Kentucky State Laws regarding the improper handling and disposal of household garbage. Other people in our county and across the state have been caught and fined for the illegal dumping of garbage.

Please Be Aware of the Following Facts:

1. First, all waste items including household garbage, household appliances, tires, automobiles and automobile parts, construction and demolition debris, or any other item you consider to be garbage, must be disposed of at a state permitted facility.
2. You cannot bury household garbage - even on your own property. Placing garbage in a sinkhole or throwing it over an embankment is not only illegal but it contaminates our environment and may damage drinking water for you or your neighbors or pollute creeks and rivers.
3. You cannot burn household trash such as plastics and metals. You are allowed to burn leaves, trees and limbs.
4. All household garbage must be disposed of at a permitted landfill, a garbage transfer station, or picked up by a garbage collection service.
5. You need to sign up for regular garbage collection from a county-licensed hauler. Keep your receipts so you can show proof if your garbage somehow ends up in an illegal dump.

If you are not currently subscribing to a collection service or have any other general questions about proper garbage disposal, you should contact the Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator, Nancy Meadows at (606) 256-5315.

Be aware, if you are caught illegally disposing of your garbage, you can be fined from \$100.00 to \$5,000 dollars and be required to clean up the dump site. If you witness illegal dumping, call toll free 1-888-NODUMPS and report it to state officials.

Please join me in creating a clean and healthy environment for Rockcastle County.

Bradley actually beat McKinney in the district's two largest precincts but lost to McKinney in Bullock the smallest of the three precincts.
Bradley won 238 to 193 at Broadhead and 212 to 199 at West Broadhead.

McKinney defeated Bradley by 61 votes in Bullock 82 to 21. McKinney also won the absentee count 26 to 16.

Rockcastle went along with the state on the race for U.S. Senate, with republican Jim Bunning getting 2,256 votes to democrat Scotty Basler's 1,256 votes in the county.

Bunning carried every in the county.
Sixth district U.S. Congressman

Harold Rogers easily won re-election in the district and in Rockcastle County.

The powerful statesman from Somerset got 2,880 votes in Rockcastle compared to his opponent Sidney Jane Bailey-Bamer's 485.

As did the rest of the state, Rockcastle voters voted down amendment number one and passed amendment number two.

Amendment number one would have allowed annual legislative sessions, amendment two will give lawmakers the authority to do away with some types of taxes.

third was also on membership council member, Clarence Kirby who garnered 318 votes.

Incumbent council member Lee Keene was fourth with 289 and Wayne Bullock, also an incumbent was fifth with 284.

Darrell "Moody" Smith took the last place on the council with 234 votes.
Local business woman Barbara

Bennett attempted to wage a write-in campaign but fell short with only 87 votes cast.

Cromer was seeking a fourth term as Mt. Vernon's Mayor.

third with 55 and Todd Mink was fourth with 50.

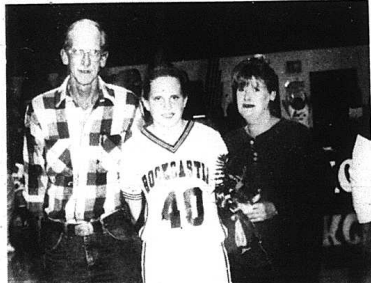
Challengers Charlie Newcomb, Timothy Hayes, Paul Owens and Marquita Phillips all fell short in the voter tally.

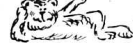

Rockcastle girl's track team qualifies for state

Rockcastle's cross-country teams recently competed at the regional championships held at Green County last Friday afternoon. Beautiful weather set the stage for an historic day as both boys' and girls' teams sought their first ever state championship berths. Each of the last four years, Rockcastle's girls have had an individual competitor qualify for the state championships. Former Rockcastle runner, Dee Reams, was the first to do so, qualifying as a junior and senior. Current runner, Cheyenne Carmack, carried on the tradition, qualifying as an eighth grader and as a freshman for the past two

years. The boys' team was seeking its first ever state competitor, with Stewart Abbey being the most probable recipient of the honor.

The girls' varsity team got off to a great start as sophomore Cheyenne Carmack led the way for Rockcastle through the first mile. Seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey and junior Brandy Reynolds stayed close behind Cheyenne, pacing themselves through her race experiences. Junior Jessica Cobb and eighth grader Rebekah Lyons kept the others in sight while sixth grader Chere' Embs and sophomore Rachelle Hammond remained near the middle of the pack.

Through the first mile and a quarter, everything looked promising for Rockcastle. Unfortunately, the promise seemed to fade as Cheyenne, a regional championship contender, pulled out of the race with a severe asthma attack. Cheyenne had fought through numerous attacks during the season and had sustained as many as six during the preceding week and a half leading up to regional competition. She tried to continue, but could not as the attack left her weak and breathless. Cheyenne did manage to get the team off to a good start, as most girls determined their own individual pace based on her. Despite the

apparent desperation of the situation, the remainder of the girls' team pulled together and ran harder to make up for the loss of their teammate. Seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey took over responsibility as the teams' leader as she made a strong push to the front of the pack. The remainder of the girls' team increased their intensity and put forth every effort to finish as strongly as possible. The end of the race was exciting as each Rockcastle girl sprinted to the finish line.

As a result of the strong, total team effort, Rockcastle easily placed third overall out of 17 represented teams.

In order to qualify for state, the girls were required to be in the top four teams. They easily defeated fourth place Green County by 18 points. In the final week before region, Green County was ranked fifteenth in the state in class 2A. Rockcastle trailed West Jessamine by only 20 points and champion Pulaski Southwestern by 37. This marked the first time in the history of Rockcastle County cross-country that a team had qualified for the state championships.

Leading the charge for Rockcastle was Cassandra Ramsey. Cassandra ran the race of her life as she finished

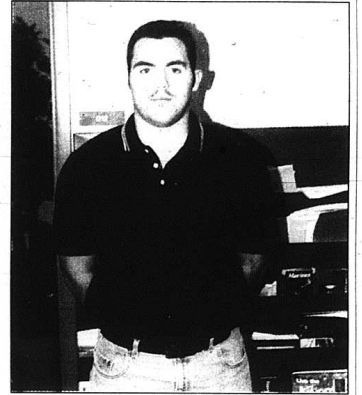
sixth overall with an awesome time of 17:19. This represented a record time for a Rockcastle seventh grader and also the second best regional finish ever for a Rockcastle girl (next to Cheyenne's third place finish last year). Attention Taxpayers

If you have built a new house, garage, barn, etc., purchased or sold a mobile home or made any changes in your existing property since last year, it is especially important that you notify the PVA office as soon as possible. Also, if you own property and did not receive your tax bill, check with the Sheriff's office or PVA office to see if we have the correct address.

Property is required to be reassessed once every four years. In 1999, the areas to be revalued will be Brodhead, Ottawa and property in the vicinity.

If you would like to discuss the assessment on your property, come by the PVA office before January 1.

Attention Senior Citizens

If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the PVA in order to be eligible for the Homestead Exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, the amount of the exemption will automatically be deducted from your 1999 assessment, and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application. If your property is valued at more than the homestead Exemption, you will pay on the balance.

Attention Disabled Persons

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is **Totally Disabled**. In order to qualify for this, you must receive 100% disability payments for the entire calendar year and must reapply each year. Your disability must be through the Federal Government or Railroad Retirement Act.



The Hospital and Physician networks for many of your health plan choices were not very extensive. From the onset, these networks have caused our facility and physicians concern resulting in legislator contact and support, state officials and health plans *on your behalf*. In a letter to state officials, we expressed our initial concerns: *"At the facility level, we hear and are touched by the specific cases of hardship and access to care and feel that we must forward the concern and frustrations expressed to us. I would urge that we proactively address these concerns prior to the open enrollment."*

We feel a community responsibility to assist you in any way that we can and will do so. We can assist many of you with special arrangements on a case-by-case basis. However, those state employees enrolled in an HMO plan that does not offer access to our facility, will receive **NO BENEFITS** if you utilize an out-of-network facility, such as Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital. If you desire to seek services at our facility, we encourage you to contact the president of your health plan immediately and urge them to contract with our facility. **It is your health plan's responsibility to contract for hospital services on your behalf.**

Some of you may have been told by your health plan that our facility is unwilling to contract, that is not the case. We have been and remain committed to providing access to quality healthcare for state employees.

On behalf of myself and the dedicated professionals at Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital, we will do all that we can to provide access for state employees. Additionally, we encourage you to contact the president of your health plan, who is responsible for providing you with an adequate network of hospitals and physicians.
