As included are statements imputing fashenod, dishonesty, and frauch mentioned only a few above, are allegations of criminal conduct. Any flase allegation of criminal conduct is slander per se. Even less onerous statements are

Even less onerous statements are

slander per se. Accusing lawyers with

dishonesty or improper practices in the performance of their duties

the performance of their duties (Cearhart, WSAZ, Inc., 150 F. Supp. 98 affirmed at 24 F. 12d 242) or with unprofessional conduct are actionable per se (Massengale v, Lester, 17 L. 154/12 550).

Accusing a public official with anything which if true would cause his removal from office is actionable per se. Cearhart, supra. Statements that a policeman was a person of no culture and a professional moncher were held to be actionable per se. Ciucker v, Kilgere. 388 S.W. 2d 112 (Ky. 1964).

Disparaging words about a merchant's goods are not actionable per se unless the words impute fraud, ceit, dishopersty, or other reproduction deceit, dishopersty, or other reproduction (Mario's Enterprises, Inc., 487 F. Supp. 1308 (D.C. Ky. 1980).

Wells, 94 S.W.2d 999 (Ky. 1936) which held that everyone who gives currency to a slanderous report becomes responsible for its truth. This is true even though the speaker names the person from whom he heard the report and states that he does not believe it to be true (Nicholson v. Rust. 52 S. W. 933). Even the United States Supreme

Court in McCall v. Courier Journal, 72 L.Ed2d 849 rejected the notion that neutral reporting could relieve one of liability.

Slander per se is conclusively pre-sumed to be injurious and need not be pleaded or proved (Gearhart, supra). To sum it up, it matters not that you repeat it in a barber shop, beauty shop, filling station or factory, you as a speaker are responsible for the truth-fulness of your statement.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) of the NH has revised the Healthy Heart Handbook for Women. There are now 100 pages of the latest information on preventing cardiovascular diseases like

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coronary heart disease, heart attack, high blood pressure, stroke, and

One in ten women aged 45 to 64 has some form of heart disease. After the age of 65, the number climbs to one in four. County Extension Agent for Agriculture Fall is Important Time For

With summer over, many

With summer over, many agradeners take a vacation from lawn care. But Fall is an important time to control weeds, remove leaves and trim and fertilize grass.
Fall is the number one time of the year to control broadleaf weeds like dandelion, plantain, chickweed, henbit and clover. It's easier to control broadleaf weeds when they are actively erowine in the fall.

control broadleaf weeds when they are actively growing in the fall. This time of year we have fewer sensitive plants in the yard that might be injured by drift or herbicide volatility. Winds usually are calmer, reducing the chance of drift. Don't depend on frost to control weeds; it stunts or kills the top but won't kill the crowns and roots.

Another advantage of fall broadleaf weed control is that grasses are actively growing and will fill in spaces the weeds

occupied.

It's very important to keep leaves off the lawn because they shade grass and this prevents growth of new tillers of grass plants. While

you can chop up leaves with a mower, it is best to remove them. because accumulation of chopped leaves on the crown hurts new plant and stem degledpents on the crown hurts new plant and stem degledpents on the critical state of the property mow and in molecular time to properly mow and in molecular when to stop mowing grass; keep mowing as long as grass is growings as long as grass is growings. Shorter grass maintains its greenness. Mow shorter in the fall han in the summer; grass should be no more that 2 inches tall going into the winter. Grass that is too tall tends to flop over and smother itself utility of the control of the

half the grass density.

Mowing grass shorter and fertilizing in the fall produces a more lush lawn.

Short grass allows more light penetration and this, plus a highentogen fertilizer, produces not penetration and this, plus a highentogen fertilizer, produces growth and greenup several weeks earlier in the spring. Applying a high-nitrogen fertilizer in the fall promotes root growth that increases lawn density without excessive top growth. This makes a lawn more succeptible to drought stress and means it has to be mowed more often. Spring fertilization also more often. Spring fertilization also encourages diseases and growth of crabgrass and summer annual

crangrass and someone weeds. In the Fall apply fertilizer at the rate of 1 to 1 ½ lbs, if actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. The percent nitrogen is the first number in the analysis on the fertilizer bag. To get 11 b. of actual nitrogen using ammonium nitrate (33-0-0), apply 5 bs per 1,000 square feet. 3 lbs. of 33% nitrogen equals 1 lb. of actual

nitrogen. With a 10-10-10 fertilizer, apply 10 lbs per 1,000 square feet. Make two applications between now and the end of November.

An Open Letter to Neighbors and

Recently, I was issued a Notice of Violation for violating Kentucky State Laws regarding the improper handling and disposal of household garbage. Other people in our county and across the state have been caught and fined for the illegal dumping of garbage.

Friends in Rockcastle County:

Please Be Aware of the Following Facts:

- 1. First, all waste items including household garbage, household appliances, tires, automobiles and automobile parts, construction and demolition debris, or any other item you consider to be garbage, must be disposed of at a state permitted facility.
- 2. You cannot bury household garbage even on your own property. Placing garbage in a sinkhole or throwing it over an embankment is not only illegal but it contaminates our environment and may damage drinking water for you or your neighbors or pollute creeks and rivers.
- 3. You cannot burn household trash such as plastics and metals. You are allowed to burn leaves, trees and limbs.
- 4. All household garbage must be disposed of at a permitted landfill, a garbage transfer station, or picked up by a garbage collection service.
- 5. You need to sign up for regular garbage collection from a countylicensed hauler. Keep your receipts so you can show proof if your garbage somehow ends up in an illegal dump.
- If you are not currently subscribing to a collection service or have any other general questions about proper garbage disposal, you should contact the Rockcastle County Solid Waste Coordinator, Nancy Meadows at (606) 256-5315.

Be aware, if you are caught illegally disposing of your garbage, you can be fined from \$100.00 to \$5,000 dollars and be required to clean up the dump site. If you witness illegal dumping, call toll free 1-888-NODUMPS and report it to state officials.

Please join me in creating a clean and healthy environment for Rockcastle County.

Rockcastle girl's track team qualifies for state

Rockcastle's cross-country teams recently competed at the regional championships held at Green County last Friday afternoon. Beautiful weather set the stage for an historic day as both boys' and girls' teams sought their first ever state champisought their first ever state champi-onship berths. Each of the last four years, Rockcastle's girls have had an individual competitor qualify for the state championships. Former Rock-castle runner, Dee Reams, was the first to do so, qualifying as a junior and senior. Current runner, Chey-enne Carmack, carried on the tradi-tion, qualifying as an eighth grader tion, qualifying as an eighth grader and as a freshman for the past two

years. The boys' team was seeking its first ever state competitor, with Stewart Abney being the most probable recipient of the honor.

The girls' varsity team got off to a great start as sophomore Cheyenne Carmack led the way for Rockasatle through the first mile. Seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey and junior Brandy Reynolds stayed close behind Cheyenne, pacing themselves through her race experiences. Junior Jessica Cobb and eighth grader Rebekhal Lyons kept the others in sight while sixth grader Cheve' Embs and sophomore Rachelle Hammond remained near the middle of the pack.

Through the first mile and a quarter, everything flost mile and a quarter, everything flosted progisting for Rockeastle. Unfortunately, the promise seemed to fade as Cheyenne, a regional championship contender, pulled out of the race with a severe asthma attack. Cheyenne had fought through numerous attacks during the season and had sustained as many as its during the preceding week and a half leading up to regional competition. She tried to continue, but could not as the attack left her weak and brattless. Cheyenne did manage to get the team off to a good start, as most girls determined their own individual pace based on her. Despite the

apparent desperation of the situation, theremainder of the girls' team pulled together and ran harder to make up for the loss of their teammate. Seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey took over responsibility as the teams' leader as she made a strong push to the front of the pack. The remainder of the girls' team increased their intensity and put forth every effort to finish as strongly as possible. The end of the race was exciting as each Rockcastle girl sprinted to the finish

As a result of the strong, total team effort, Rockcastle easily placed third overall out of 17 represented teams.

In order to qualify for state, the girls were required to be in the top four teams. They easily defeated fourth place Green County by 18 points. In the final week before region, Green County was ranked fifteenth in the state in class 2A, Rockeastle trailed West Jessamine by only 20 points and champion Pulaski Southwestern by 37. This marked the first time in the history of Rockcaste County cross-country that a team had quali-

fied for the state championships. Leading the charge for Rockcastle was Cassandra Ramsey. Cassandra ran the race of her life as she finished sixin overall with an awesome time of 17:19. This represented a record time for a Rockcastle seventh grader and also the second best regional finish ever for a Rockcastle girl (next to Cheyenne's bird place finish last yequalification). Property is required to be reassessed once every four years. In 199, the areas to be revalued will be Brodhead, Ottawa and property in the vicinity.

If you would like to discuss the assessment on your property, come by the PVA office before January 1.

Attention **Senior Citizens**

If you own and occupy your home and will be 65 years of age any time during the year, you must file an application with the PVA in order to be eligible for the Homestead Exemption. If you are already receiving the Homestead Exemption, the amount of the exemption will automatically be deducted from your 1999 assessment, and it will not be necessary for you to fill out an additional application. If your property is valued at more than the homestead Exemption, you will pay on the balance.

Attention **Disabled Persons**

The Homestead Exemption also applies to anyone who is Totally Disabled. In order to qualify for this, you must receive 100% disability payments for the entire calendar year and must reapply each year. Your disability must be through the Federal Government or Railroad Retirement
