USDA Making a Difference in
One Month

The USDA is once again holding a nationwide campaign against hunger. Secretary Glickman's initiative on fighting hunger has been a huge success each year. Food drives are encouraging as a great way of contributing to the community food banks.

During this month, we are asking the USDA employees and the com-

munity in the fight against hunger by organizing food drives and other awareness activities for the community.

Local offices, such as the Farm Service Agency, now have a box placed in the lobby for donated items. All community persons are asked to participate in this endeavor of the fight against hunger. You may bring your donated items to the FSA Office, Hwy. 150, Mt. Vernon, Ky., during office hours of Monday - Friday 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Marketing Cards
Marketing cards were mailed to burley tobacco producers in Rockcastle County on October 27, 1998 who had the required paperwork on file. If you are a producer who has not received your marketing card, as of today, there may be additional forms that you and/or your tenant need to sign. Please check to ensure that the paperwork is on file so that your marketing card can be mailed to you.

Burley Tobacco No Net Cost Assessment
The US Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation has announced a no net cost assessment of 4.222 cents per

pound for the 1998 crop of burley tobacco. Producers and purchasers will each pay 2.111 cents per pound.

In addition to the no net cost assessment, producers and purchasers must pay a tobacco marketing assessment. The marketing assessment for the 1998 burley tobacco crop was announced on January 31st as .889 cent per pound for the producer and .889 cent per pound for the purchaser.

The no net cost assessment, plus the tobacco marketing assessment, means that a total of 6 cents per pound will be collected on each pound of burley tobacco marketed for the 1998 crop. The assessments will be shared equally between the producer and the purchaser with each paying 3 cents per pound.

Funds in the no net cost tobacco account ensure, as required by the No Net Cost Tobacco Program Act of 1982, the price support program for burley tobacco will be operated at no net cost to taxpayers other than for administrative expenses common to the operation of all price support programs.

Both the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association and the

Burley Stabilization Corporation, the producer-owned associations through which price support is made available for producers of burley tobacco, were consulted before a final determination was reached.

Greg Terry was 2-2 in extra point attempts; Andy Hale also scored on a 70 yard kick off return and the Rockets had 225 yards of total offense and the Rebels gained 343 total yards.

Brooks Ingram was the leading tackler with 14; Josh Hendrickson got 9 tackles; Greg Harper, 8 and one interception; Josh Jones had 7 tackles and; Henry Bryant had 7 tackles and

two sacks; Derrick Bussell had 7 tackles; Josh Martin, 6; Matt Smith, 5 tackles and two sacks; Andrew Carrera and Andy Hale, 3 tackles each; Derek Bradley, 2 tackles and Jeffrey Linville, 1 tackle.


The Rockets have been defeated by Boyle County three times in the last four years by a total of 14 points. As for the Rocket football team, they will begin work in the weight room and get ready for the 1999 football season when they will move into the 3A division. Their district is yet to be determined.

Cash hearing suspended for 30 days

After two days of testimony in the hearing surrounding the firing of former Rockcastle County High School principal Ronnie Cash, the hearing has been put on hold for thirty days.

Rockcastle County Board of Education Attorney Carl R. Clontz said the hearing was continued in order to give both sides time to reach a compromise in the case.

In August, local Superintendent Larry Hammond fired Cash, who had been principal for twelve years and in the local school system for 27 years.

Clontz said no details would be released until all parties had signed off on the agreement.

Clontz said that if no agreement or compromise is reached, the three-member tribunal will reconvene and render a decision.

Woman found dead Tuesday in Brodhead

A 40-year-old woman was found dead in an apartment at the Brodhead/Elderly apartment complex on Tuesday morning.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Derrell Dean, Elsie D. Ramsey, 40, of Whitley Road London, apparently died from an overdose of drugs, sometime Monday night.

Dean said Ramsey was last seen alive around 11:30 p.m. Monday night by a relative.

Ramsey's body was found in Jonnie Nicely's apartment, a relative.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said Tuesday that he could not confirm a drug overdose as the cause of death. He said an autopsy was performed on Ramsey on Tuesday afternoon, which will reveal the cause of death.

Ramsey's body is at Dowell and Martin Funeral Home where arrangements are incomplete.

Bradley to plead guilty

A Rockcastle County man who was charged in August with selling illegal drugs will enter a guilty plea when he is sentenced in March.

Ronnie Bradley, 45, of Quail, was scheduled to go on trial on October 26 in federal court, but the trial was scratched after he agreed to plead guilty.

Bradley's attorney, Jerry Cox, of Mt. Vernon said that the exact terms of the plea agreement have not been finalized, but that his client had agreed to plead.

Drug dogs, more cameras for schools

The Rockcastle County Board of Education took two more steps Tuesday night to ensure the safety of students at local schools and on school buses.

The board authorized the purchase of ten more video cameras for school buses, which will bring the total to 15.

Transportation Director David Perkins said the cameras will be used on buses with the most discipline problems and placed randomly on other buses.

The board also voted to use drug dogs at all the county schools.

Supt. Larry Hammond said the dogs would be used without prior notice to students or faculty.

The Superintendent said that educational sessions concerning the dogs would be held at the schools, so students and parents would be aware of the dogs purpose.

The landowners at Tuesday's meeting said that at times a barbwire fence has been stretched across the road, which they say has been in existence 50 years.

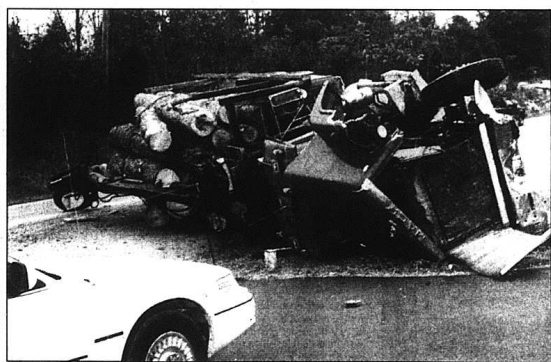

Local missionaries see Mitch's devastation in Honduras firsthand

At least one local church is trying to ease the pain of the victims of Hurricane Mitch.

One of the worst storms of its kind to ever hit Central America has left thousands dead and thousands missing.

During the week long storm, about one million people had to flee their homes in Honduras, the hardest hit country by Mitch.

In Honduras are Rockcastle County natives, Todd and Lynnell Fields, both 37 and their daughters, nine-year-old Savannah and six-year-old Sophia.

The Fields have served as missionaries in Honduras for the past eight years. Before working as missionaries they worked in Honduras as peace corp volunteers.

Family members have talked with the Fields on a few occasions since Mitch unleashed its enormous rain-falls on the country, two weeks ago.

Although the Fields are all doing okay after the storm, the country of Honduras is a disaster. Their entire infrastructure is gone and some experts say the storm has put Honduras' progress back 20 years.

Todd Fields e-mailed their families in Rockcastle a couple of days ago. His letter to family members explains somewhat the devastation in Honduras.

Todd Fields wrote:
Dear Friends,

Greetings from Honduras! What a mess! Hurricane Mitch left Honduras a disaster. We wanted to fill you in on some of what has been going on for the last two weeks. The first five days of the hurricane we only heard

about what was happening on the north coast of Honduras. We listened to the national radio to tell us about the damages. We had gusts of wind and a lot of rain here at the lake, but

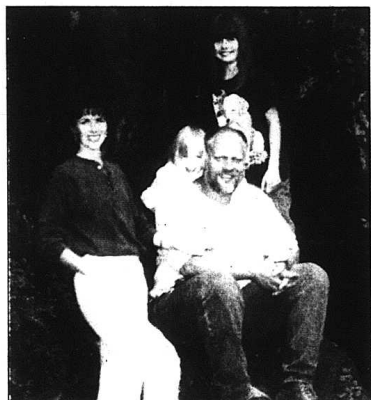

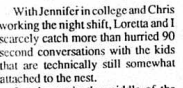

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and predilections to one and all, the elect and the damned, from the peaceful plot that I call Nod's Little Acre of Refuge, situated about one mile from the heart of dear old Wald, long-time abode of the late Tanager D. Bagges, long-time dyviner and digger of wells, and part-time order-taker for Sears & Roebuck's Heidelberg, Alternating Current Electric, Heils.

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Nancy? What a day this has been! Nancy started me out of bed at 7:30 a.m., telling me about the coming storm and the terrible winds that were already whipping about and would do their worst between noon and five. I had gone to bed at 5:00 a.m. and a

night of pacing the floor, counting my bones, and trying to conjure a column that would have some semblance of import, advice, and insights about the humans seen.

It is now 3:53 p.m. We've had some really moving winds but no damage that I can discern. But we do have rain — and the leaks in our new sun room that were repaired a couple of weeks ago are still at it (One leak is around a best grade window; the other is in our chimney.)

Last Sunday evening I hired a cane with a contractor we raised in mid-July to build and install our hearth. His excessive tardiness worked to our advantage. I stuffed towels in atop the heating unit to absorb the water. The window leak is another matter, a matter that elicits no little profanity on my part. Hey! After thirty years of preaching and no cutting, I should have, I figure I'm allowed a few uncouth utterances.

A lot of leaves moved today at Nod's Little Acre. Most were blown across the road into an embankment by the road where they will do little harm, or on up the hill where Ken Norton will joyfully gather them and sing a lively tune as he spreads them on his garden.

But one of our trees did not shed a leaf, not even when the wind was at its peak. I'm speaking of the pin oak I planted a few years ago that for the last year or two has really taken off, spreading, I think, into a coarse canopy that flows underground out near our maple trees.

I more than once used the pin oak's tenacity in keeping its leaves as a sermon illustration. Let me explain. The Apostle Paul speaks of conversion as a putting off of the old garment of sin and putting on the new garment of righteousness. Now when I preached on that text, I pointed out that conversion doesn't immediately rid us of our worldly ways, but as the Christian puts on his coat of righteousness, good works burgeon in his soul and eventually push away worldly ways, sometimes called "the Adamic nature." No, that's not cussin'.

And I would say, "Look at the pin oak in Autumn. It's leaves do not fall. Indeed, they stay on throughout Winter. But, watch what happens in Spring. New leaves push their way out through those wooden traces and push off the old leaves."

"So it is with the Christian. He may struggle for a while with some clinging vanities, but as he wears God's coat of righteousness, new thoughts, new ways of looking at life, new ways of acting — and re-acting — all the newness of life leave no room for the old ways. The old leaves of folly fall away, and new leaves of love take their place."

Then I would go on to point out that we will find it difficult to quit any habit or evil until we put something in its place. To shove out the old action means supplanting it with another action, a good one.

It was a good illustration. Thank you, pin oaks of the world. (Who said, "That may be right, but he ain't talkin' about the church I attend?")

Dear hearts, the longer you and I wait to change some undesirable element of our nature, the harder it is to do. And when you get to be a Senior Citizen (which really means "Set-in-their-ways old folks), it's nigh unto impossible to change. And the matter is made worse when pride takes over and tells us we're pretty good folks, as we are. If anyone needs to change, it's someone else. Right?

One of my favorite hymns when I was in favor with the church was "Take Time to Be Holy." And that hymn became even more meaningful when someone pointed out that it "takes time" to be holy.

In fact, developing as a Christian is a lifetime of taking time to concentrate on the written Word of God and the Spirit-spoken Word of God. And if our time "apart with the Word" doesn't send us back to our world with definite tasks of Love and Mercy, then something was amiss back there, when we supposedly were with the Word. The Word of God is not black sym-

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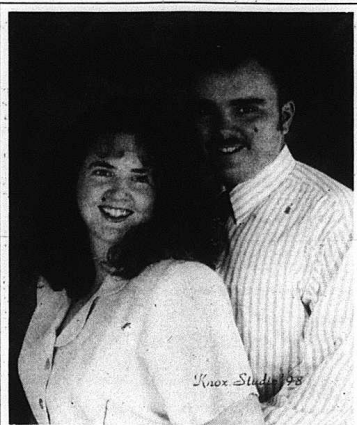
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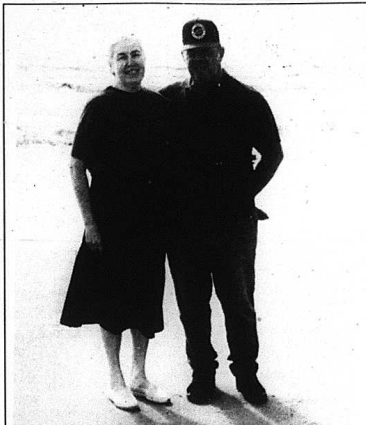

Probably, the latter. Most people

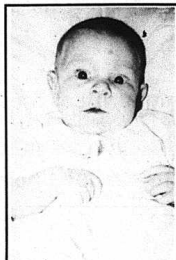

Girls cross-country competes at state

Saturday, November 7 proved to be an historic date in Rockcastle County cross-country as the girls competed at their first ever state championship meet. The team has had individuals qualify for the past four years, but never an entire team. The girls came really close last season during the regional championships at Green County where they finished sixth, only two places away from state qualification.

The weather was cool, but extremely nice, for the annual event held at the beautiful Kentucky Horse Park. Conditions were the best they had been in the past five years of the championship meet. The nice weather helped to ease some of the tension built up in the team due to nervous-

ness. Also in question was sophomore Cheyenne Carmack, a two-time state championship qualifier. Cheyenne's health was a major concern as she was recovering from asthma related problems. It was undecided until race time whether or not she would be physically able to run. Cheyenne spent over half an hour warming up, trying to determine the effects of the chilling air on her lungs. At race time, it was decided that it wouldn't be safe for Cheyenne to attempt to run.

The Horse Park was flooded with fans and competitors as 15 schools qualified for the class 2A state championship. Out of 51 schools, 200 runners competed.

The race began with a flurry of

runners sprinting to gain an early advantage. Junior Brandy Reynolds got off to a fast start and remained in the front half of the pace for the entire race. Brandy ran with a great deal of heart and fought hard the entire race to lead her team. She finished in 100th place overall with a career best

time of 18:00. Brandy's finish represented the second best finish ever for a Rockcastle girl at the state championships. (Cheyenne placed 89th two seasons ago). Seventh grader Cassandra Ramsey ran a great race to come in second for Rockcastle. Cassandra's time wasn't quite as good as during the regional championships; however, she still ran an 18:22 and finished in 117th place overall. Junior Jessica Cobb ran very well and placed 135th overall with an 18:45, slightly off her career best regional time. Eighth grader Rebekah Lyons ran well and finished in 139th place, just behind Jessica. Rebekah's time was an 18:51, also slightly off her regional time. Sixth grader Cheré Emb's ran a great race and placed 163rd overall with a time of 19:42. Sophomore Rachelle Hammond ran well, but somewhat off her pace at region to finish in 176th place with a time of 20:56.

The girls' team placed 20th overall out of 51 represented schools. This was a major accomplishment for a very young team comprised of four middle school runners and no seniors.

Notable accomplishments for the girls included Brandy Reynolds' 100th place finish - second best all-time state and best ever for a junior girl. Jessica Cobb's 135th place finish was the second best ever for a junior girl. Cassandra Ramsey's 117th place finish was the best ever for a

seventh grader and ranked her 21st in the state among seventh grade state qualifiers. Rebekah Lyons' 139th place finish was the second best ever for a Rockcastle eighth grader and ranked her 27th in the state among eighth grader runners in class 2A. Rachelle Hammond's 176th place finish represented the best ever for a sophomore girl at state. Cheré Emb's 163rd place finished was the best ever for a Rockcastle sixth grader at state and ranked her 10th among sixth grade runners. Cheyenne Carmack still holds all-time records for best finish - 89th, and for best time ever in a season - 16:28.

The team has had a very exciting, enjoyable, successful season and continues to improve each year. The experience the team has gained this season, along with its youth, promises to push the girls toward new challenges and greater expectations for next season.

Special thanks to all of the parents who have helped make this season so special. Most of all, thanks to the athletes whose hard work and dedication has made everything possible. Congratulations to first year head coach Dawn Quigley on a terrific season. Dawn was misidentified as an assistant coach in last week's steam picture. Congratulations, also, to the girls' team for a great season with many more to come.

Watch out for deer on roads

Deer rut, or mating season, is now peaking in Kentucky. During this time, which runs from late October through November, the drive to mate dictates deer behavior. This means deer won't be looking both ways before they cross the street, so people need to exercise extreme caution while driving.

Here are some tips to help reduce your chances of having a deer-vehicle accident on the road:

- Slow down and watch for deer when driving through a wooded area or where deer signs are posted.

- The likelihood of colliding with a deer rises dramatically at night, and the danger is worst on rural roads. Drive cautiously during the evening and early in the morning hours—this is when deer are active, seeking food and shelter.

- When you see a deer, slow down immediately if you can do so without causing an accident. The deer could run out in front of you. Plus, deer rarely travel alone, so there are very likely other deer nearby.

- Flash your lights and sound your

horn to prod a deer to move out of the road or to discourage it from stepping onto the road.

Even after taking these precautions, it is sometimes impossible to avoid an accident. Deer-vehicle accidents usually happen when a deer runs into the side of a moving vehicle or jumps out in front of a vehicle. If this happens and you cannot stop safely, slow down. Do not swerve to try to avoid the animal. If you swerve, you may lose control of the vehicle and more than your vehicle could end up damaged.

If you are involved in a deer-vehicle accident, contact a local law enforcement officer or local wildlife and boating officer, or call the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources at 1-800-858-1549.

Your report will help the state's deer program coordinator keep track of such mortalities and better plan deer management. The number of deer-related accidents is a factor used in deciding whether the deer hunting season should be liberalized to reduce the deer population.

Slade Calhoun, of Mt. Vernon, is a defensive tackle for the 1998 football team at Campbellsville University.

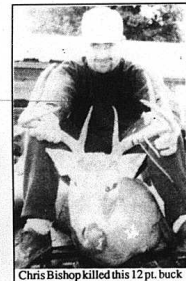

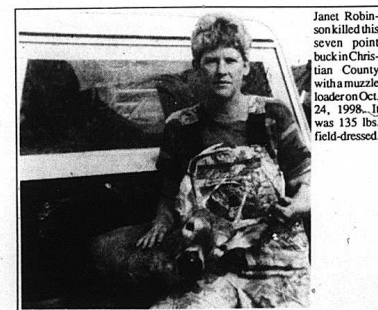

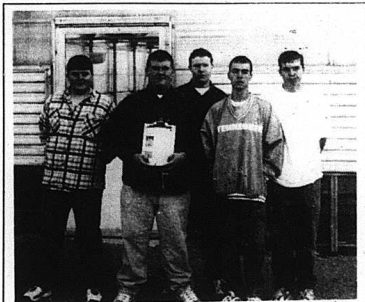
VICA Club takes regional offices

Census workers listing addresses in this area

To conduct Census 2000, the Census Bureau needs to know the address and location of every living quarters in the country, anywhere a person lives or could live.

The "listers" will go block by block, recording the locations and addresses of all living quarters. As part of this operation, the listers will knock on doors to ask for some basic information, such as mailing address, occupant name, and telephone number. This short interview should take only a minute or two for each household.

So be on the lookout for local area residents working as listers for Cen-

sus 2000. All census listers are identifiable by their red, white and blue badges that identify them as a "Census Enumerator." If there is any question on the identity of census listers, call 1-888-325-7733.

It is important to our community that all residents be counted in Census 2000. Cooperating in this address listing is a vital first step in being sure that everyone is counted. The current address listing operation is concentrating on mostly rural and suburban areas. Next year, listers will concentrate on urban areas.

Little World's Fair Inc., owned by Bill Frank Martin and Billy Gentry, has paid the county \$5,255 a year to lease the fairgrounds each August for the Little World's Fair, but their

contract expired this year. Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis has asked the court on several occasions to form a local fair board and he brought the matter up again on Tuesday.

Miller, that he (Miller) had amassed six weeks of comp time while working as maintenance supervisor. Carlotis said that Miller wanted the time off and wanted to be paid while off.

When the court emerged from closed session they did not take any action. "As far as we are concerned the county doesn't owe James anything, except his current job," Carlotis said. "We are not going to pay him not to work," he said.

As for taking the matter to the labor board, Carlotis said that was Miller's prerogative.

Carlotis said that if the fair board so desired they could contract with individuals to hold the fair, the same as it is now.

But no vote was taken on the formation of the board and the matter was tabled until December.

All total the county was out \$38,438 in October just to hold their prisoner's elsewhere.

be worked by the county, although work on the road had stopped earlier this year.

The court voted to have the road surveyed themselves and to continue to work it.

nothing serious.

On Friday the 30th, the rivers started flooding and by Saturday we were completely cut off from the rest of the county. We began receiving reports of landslides and deaths in the villages above us. The two villages below us were flooded and bodies were being pulled from the river, from the landslides above. Saturday night was widespread panic as the local radio station was screaming to run for your lives as the mountain was collapsing. We evacuated for a couple of hours and then decided to return home. Our road to Pena Blanca was under water and that night we lost our water system as the river nearby cut a new course and caused lots of damage.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette told the court that O'Neil had no right to claim the roadway, which is "definitely" a legitimate county road and had been for years.

Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said he was in favor of condemning property of the owners of the road, including O'Neil and taking a 30 foot easement along the current road.

We have been ministering as best we can, by evacuating people out of flooded areas, helping with medical clinics, distributing medicines and food. By Wednesday, November 4th, the back way to San Pedro Sula was patched together so four-wheel drive vehicles could get in. We had received relief funds from the states and were able to buy 1,500 lbs. of food. The next day we made up food parcels and delivered them along with medicines to Planicosa, a village cut off by flooding. On November 6th, we received relief funds from the states and were able to buy 2,500 lbs. of food. We delivered it to another mountain village above us. They were retrieving bodies from the mud. One family lost nine members, mostly kids. It was extremely sad. I'm sure the death toll will exceed 10,000 for Honduras.

Currently deeds only call for 15 feet in some places and 20 feet in others.

One of the landowners Roland Isaacs said that he had talked with everyone that lives on the road, except for O'Neil and that they were in favor of giving the 30 foot easement if necessary, so that the problems they have incurred would not keep re-occurring.

Presently, we are constructing a 5,000 gallon water tank to store rain water. We have purchased a portable tank to haul water to areas without water.

Carlotis said he would go along with the court's action, but that he really thought the properties should be condemned to avoid future problems.

Please know that we have been encouraged by your prayers and concern in our prayers. We appreciate more than you know, all your efforts to support us in this trying time. We will continue to minister as we can and ask for your prayers as exhaustion and depression tries to set in. We also ask for wisdom in knowing the best way to be of help.

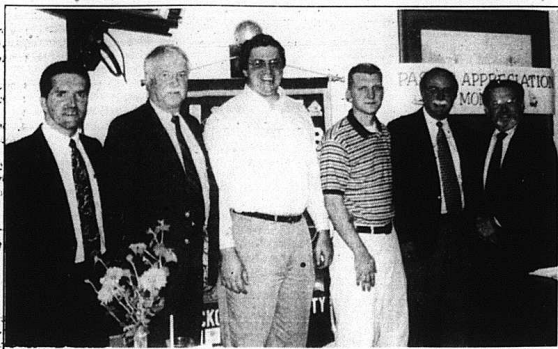

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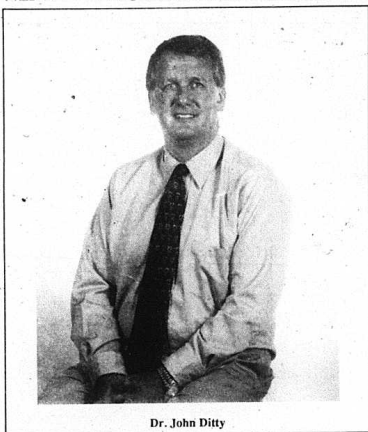

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Rockets lose in first round of play-offs again

 For the fourth straight year, the Rockcastle Rockets exited the state play-offs Friday night in the opening round with their 24-14 loss to Boyle County.

Danville, Lexington Catholic and Boyle Co., all familiar names to the Rockets at play off time, have each defeated the Rockets at least once in the play offs. Last year, it was Lexington Catholic, the two years before that, it was Boyle County and Danville.

The Rebels of Boyle Co. were the favorite Friday night due to their top ten rankings in the state but the Rockets were confident coming in to the contest.

Boyle County won the toss and elected to receive to begin the game. The Rockets kicked deep to them and the ball was returned to the Boyle 33 yard line. On the first play, the Rebels ran the ball to the 46 and, on the very next play, launched a pass that was hauled in on the Rockets three.

It was first and goal for the Rebels when senior Brooks Ingram got to the Rebel quarterback for a sack and the Rebels were penalized for intentional grounding. The Rocket defense held and forced the Rebels to settle for a 24 yard field goal.

A pooch kick by the Rebels on the kick off went through the hands of the Rockets and Boyle recovered and began their second drive of the game from the forty yard line.

The Rocket defense once again stepped up and the Rockets took possession after Boyle turned the ball over on downs. However, the Rockets couldn't get going offensively and

had to punt after three plays. The Rebels took over on the 45 but, the Rockets defense again stopped them. This time, the Rockets offense began to spark when Christopher Parsons threw a pass to Andy Hale to the 50 yard line. Andrew Carrera got 12 yards and Derrick Buscell picked up 9 yards but the Rockets then turned the ball over on downs and Boyle took over on their own 30.

The Rockets first score came in the second quarter when Brooks Ingrams picked up 31 yards on three straight carries; Derek Bradley added 13 yards to put the Rockets on the Rebels 21 yard line and, a pass from Parsons to Hale, took it to the seven. Boyle County then went in from the seven, Greg Terry's kick was good and the Rockets were up 7-3 and this was the score at half-time.

The Rockets had the ball to begin the second half and Bradley picked up 14 yards on the first play. Parsons then hit Hale for 8 yards and, on 4th and 1, Parsons pulled a quarterback sneak for two yards and a first down. However, the Rockets failed to get the first down and Greg Terry's field goal attempt sailed just wide right.

Boyle County came out tough on their first possession of the second half, picking up three straight first downs. They scored when a pass was completed to the tight end (an ineligible receiver) who bobbed the ball into the air and it was caught by another receiver for a touchdown from the twenty yard line. Boyle went ahead 10-7 on the play.

Andy Hale, fired up by the missed call on the touchdown, ran the

Rebel kick off back 70 yards for a Rocket touchdown. Terry's kick was good and the Rockets were back ahead 14-10.

Following the Rocket kick off, George Patton, the Rebels running back, began to sort through the defense, breaking tackles on every play. After two first downs by Patton, the Rebels threw a pass into the end zone

for a score and the 17-14 lead. Disaster struck for the Rockets on their first play from scrimmage, a fumble gave the ball right back to the Rebels. "Fundamentals is the name of the game and I feel we fell short in that category this year," Coach Tom Larkey commented on his team's turnovers. Following the fumble, the Rocket

defense dug in and stopped the Rebels on the one foot line but the Rockets, with no room to maneuver on the goal line, had to quick kick the ball away on third and 9. Henry Bryant's kick rolled to the Rocket 48. The Rockets got the ball back when the Rebels had to kick it away but the Rockets once again fumbled the ball away, giving the Rebels possession

on the Rocket 11 yard line. Patton scored two plays later for the final 24-14 win. The Rockets fumbled the ball away five times and gave up one interception. "Compared to 80-100 yards a game in penalties, we did improve," Coach

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

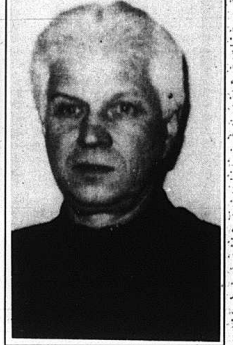

our patrons. Many of you filled out the surveys and this will help in the long range planning but we continually want input from our patrons.

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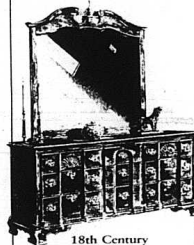
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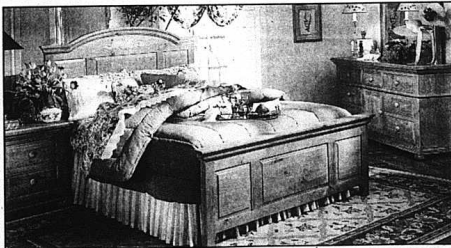
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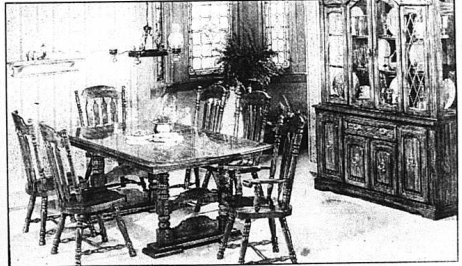
