Blackburn to serve six years in jail

A local man accused of breaking into three homes in Livingston in June will spend the next six years behind bars.

Aaron Blackburn, 21, of Livingston pled guilty Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court to the June 27th break-ins.

Assistant commonwealth attorney Mike Pratt said that Blackburn will be sentenced on December 21 and will not be eligible for parole during his six year prison term.

On June 27 police were called to Livingston where Blackburn had broken into three homes. At one of those homes, Ms. Vonie Mink fired shots while Blackburn was in her home.

Elk killed on interstate 75

Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas said that a South Carolina man killed an Elk last week at the 53 mile marker of I-75 when the Elk ran out into his path around midnight.

The Elk was tagged as one of the ones that was released last year in Eastern Kentucky in order to repopulate Kentucky.

Thomas said that there was nothing to rumor that an Elk had been shot in the county, although several have been spotted in the Livingston area around the Rockcastle River.

Former Judge appointed to ethics panel

Former Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Roland D. Mullins, of Mt. Vernon, has been appointed to an ethics panel that will review complaints about misconduct of Kentucky's lawyers.

Supreme Court Chief Justice Joseph Lambert, also of Mt. Vernon, made the appointment last week.

Mullins will join two other non-lawyers and six lawyers on the nine member panel, which will meet monthly beginning December 7.

When the bar association receives an ethics complaint about a lawyer, the new Inquiry Commission can dismiss it or refer it to one of the bar's "trial commissioners" for further investigation.

Mattie Kirby, seven others indicted here

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down eight indictments on Friday, including one against an elderly Christy Ridge woman.

Mattie Kirby, 72, was indicted on one count of trafficking in a controlled substance in the first degree. She is accused of selling Oxycodone (prescription pain killers) to Amber Plowman, 19, of School Street, Mt. Vernon, on January 29, of this year.

Ms. Kirby was also indicted last year on ten counts of trafficking and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

That case was scheduled to go to trial on October 13, but did not because according to assistant commonwealth attorney Mike Pratt, a plea agreement was being worked out.

Pratt said Wednesday that he did not know how this latest indictment would affect the other case.

Ms. Kirby's attorney, Jerry Cox, filed a motion in that case to return \$16,769 police confiscated when they searched her home in 1997.

Pratt said Wednesday that he had also filed a motion strongly objecting to the return of the money, but that Circuit Judge William Cain had not ruled on either motion as of Wednesday.

Ms. Kirby was arrested Monday by Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan on the new indictment and filed a \$5,000 unsecured bond.

The teenager that Ms. Kirby is accused of selling drugs to was also indicted.

Amber Plowman, 19, was indicted on one count of possession of a controlled substance Oxycodone, (prescription pain killers) on January 28th of this year, one day before she allegedly purchased more of the drug from Ms. Kirby.

Ms. Plowman was also indicted on one count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Ms. Plowman had not been arrested as of Tuesday. Her bond was set at \$2,500 unsecured.

Charles and Teresa Cunagin, both 33, of Castle Village Apartments, Brodhead, were also indicted on drug charges.

The couple were indicted for trafficking in a controlled substance first degree. They are accused of selling cocaine to a local man on April 29.

They are also accused of possession of marijuana on May 7, and possession of Alprazolam (nervous pills) a schedule IV controlled substance the same day.

Bond was set at \$2,500 cash or property for both of them.

Willie T. McClure, 30, of Sand Springs Road was also indicted on drug charges.

McClure is accused of growing 58 plants of marijuana in the Sand Springs area of the county.

According to the indictment police found the marijuana on July 1.

McClure's bond was set at ten percent of \$5,000.

A Bonnyman Kentucky man was indicted on two counts in connection with the purchase of a vehicle from Hamm's Auto Sales on September 28.

Bryan Napier, 32, is accused of issuing a cold check to Hamm's for \$14,800 for a 1995 Chevrolet pickup truck and then selling the truck in Laurel County for \$10,000.

His bond was set at \$10,000 cash or property.

Vernon Graves, 70, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for possession of a handgun by a convicted felon.

His bond was set at \$2,500 unsecured.

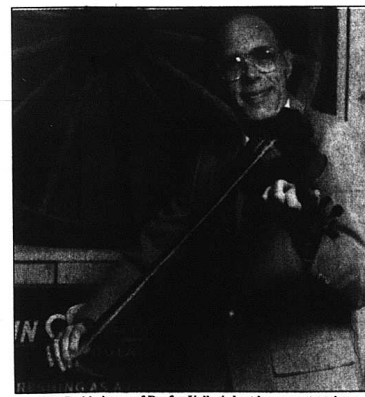
Robert Earl Newcomb, 45, of Upper Piney Branch, was indicted for a fourth offense of driving while under the influence of alcohol. His bond was set at \$2,500 cash or property.

Jim Gaskin loves to Fiddle Around, but Jim isn't just playing when he drives to Renfro Valley each week from his home in Danville, Kentucky. In addition to performing, Jim writes, produces and emcees the Sunday Renfro Valley Gatherin', emcees, plays and sings in the Thursday night Best of Both and Friday, Saturday night Barn Dance shows and the Mountain Showcases.

Jim's parents, and grandparents several generations back, were musicians. Some were old-time fiddlers, and other were song leaders in their churches. Music and song were plentiful at his boyhood home in Russell Springs, Kentucky. While Jim was growing up during the late 1930s and early '40s, the radio was a valued item in the Gaskin home. Dave and Debbie have daughters Katie, age 8, and Candice, age 3, and Loretta and I have spoiled them rotten. Now that our nest is empty and we don't get to see nearly enough

of our granddaughter, we like to take Candice and Katie trick-or-treating

or to school events and stuff like that. But anyway Cody was not too keen on the idea of sharing me with anybody else, particularly if they were of the female persuasion.

Cody's idea of a good time involved head and I spending several hours shooting demons and dragons and assorted other bad guys on Christopher's Playstation. The girls came equipped with two Barbie Movies and "Pocahontas". Cody did not intend to be caught in the same room as a Barbie anything and he registered serious doubts about any movie that had a girl for a hero. I finally found a copy of "Fivel Goes West" which proved to be acceptable to everybody. Except that Cody and Katie have attention spans of approximately ten minutes.

We wore the paint off the stairs running between the video games and the television. Except for Candice, who at three years of age is content to sit, for hours on end, through a movie she's seen a hundred times. When all three kids were content to watch the movie at the same time, I'd have Candice in my lap and the other two cuddled under each arm. This went on until 11:30 and about the time that Loretta made it

home all three were barely holding their eyes open. David picked the girls up and I'm absolutely sure he had no problem in getting them to go to bed when he got them home.

Cody had sacked out on the couch and Loretta and I decided we'd throw him in the middle of our bed, but he woke up long enough to let it be known, again in no uncertain terms that he wasn't about to sleep with any girls, even if one of them was his favorite aunt, Loretta. He allowed that he would be just fine on the couch if I agreed to sleep on the love seat. Loretta tucked him in and he went out like a light.

Anyone who watched the ball-game replay Saturday night knows that it didn't go off until nearly 3:30 a.m. I left the night light on and the doors open and sneaked into bed with Loretta. When I woke up Sunday morning Cody and Loretta had already had breakfast and gone to church.

In our most recent conversation with Todd Fields, he expressed an overwhelming need to have small medical teams made up of a doctor, nurse and 2-3 support persons to come immediately. Some have committed to coming, but are not coming until January or February. There is an immediate need in several villages in their area for medical attention. Please call the church if you are interested and we can send or give you information you will need to make a decision for volunteering.

Keep praying and giving. We are convinced that God is able to multiply what we send far beyond what is given. Just as Jesus took a few loaves and fishes to feed a multitude He is able to take what we send and care for thousands today.

Volunteers are also need to pack and sort clothes and shoes before they are being shipped out. Call 256-2876 for times to sign-up. We are also in need of boxes. 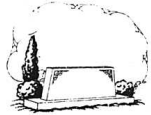

CRP Sign-up Doing Well at
Half-Way Point

Clarence Raymond Brown, Chairman of the Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee, today announced that at the halfway point of the Conservation Reserve Program's (CRP) 18th sign-up, land is being offered for enrollment in the program. "This sign-up is really going well," Brown said. "Local farmers care a lot about conserving our resources for future generations, and they're showing it by asking to participate in the

new CRP."

The new, environmentally-focused CRP provides immediate benefits to producers and taxpayers through reduced soil erosion, improved water quality and expanded wildlife habitat. Under this voluntary program, landowners enter into contracts with USDA to place erodible and other environmentally-sensitive cropland in conservation practices for 10-15 years. In exchange, landowners receive annual rental payments for the land and cost share assistance for establishing those practices.

Brown pointed out that, unlike under previous CRP's, current expiring contracts cannot be extended. "That means," he said, "that the only

way to stay in the program is to make a bid in sign-up like this one."

"I want to encourage all landowners to consider enrolling their eligible environmentally-sensitive land in the new CRP," Brown said. "The sign-up closes on December 11th, and it's coming to a close fast. You've still got time to come on down, but you don't want to wait too long."

All land that is enrolled in the program must compete for acceptance based on an environmental benefits index that ensures fair and equal consideration for all types of land. Interested producers and landowners should contact the Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency office at Hwy. 150 - Freedom School Road, Mt. Vernon or call 606-256-2525 for additional information.

AMTA Payments

The Emergency Farm Financial Relief Act was signed into law on August 12, 1998. The Act gives producers enrolled under AMTA the option to receive fiscal year 1999 PFC payments as two (2) 50% payments or a one (1) time 100% payment beginning Oct. 23, 1998 and

ending Sept. 30, 1999. Producers have been mailed notices to request the payments and should complete these notices and return to the office as soon as possible so payments may be issued as requested by the producer. If no choice is made the fiscal year 1999 payment will be issued in Sept. 1999. Remember: You have the choice when to receive your FY99 payment.

Electronic Funds Transfer (Direct Deposit)

In regard to the FSA payment(s) which may be issued to producers at the appropriate time; it is noted the

payment MUST be made by direct deposit UNLESS the producers does not have a financial institution. The following paragraph is an explanation of the new ruling published in National FI Notice #2159. In the Government's efforts to reduce operating costs, legislation has been passed which requires that all recipients of new Federal payments made after July 25, 1996, be made by electronic funds transfer (EFT). The law further states that all payments made after January 1, 1999, must be made by Electronic Funds Transfer.







Be prepared for winter weather

Winter Weather Awareness Week for Kentucky is November 16 through November 20. With winter just around the corner, now is the time to prepare for the coming cold, snow, and ice.

Kentuckians are no strangers to snowstorms, ice storms, and severe cold spells that disrupt normal activities. Just last winter, February 3 through 6, a crippling snowstorm knocked out power for weeks in some parts of eastern Kentucky. Other recent winters serve as reminders of the severe conditions that can affect our area. In January 1996, a two day storm brought widespread 1 to 2 foot snows to eastern Kentucky, and in January 1994 a snowstorm blanketed

much of the same area with over a foot of snow. The January 1994 storm was followed by record cold, with widespread temperatures of 20 to 30 below zero.

In major winter storms, preparation can be the key to survival. Take some time to get ready long before the storm strikes. At home, keep the following items available: flashlights and extra batteries, battery powered NOAA Weather Radio and portable AM/FM radio, extra food and water, extra medicine, and first aid supplies. Always maintain an adequate supply of heating fuel, since fuel carriers may not be able to reach you after a major winter storm. If you have an emergency heating source such as a

fireplace, wood stove or space heater be sure it is working properly, and is properly vented.

Fully check and winterize your vehicle before the winter season begins. Keep the following items in your vehicle: blankets, flashlight, high calories non-perishable food, jumper cables, tow rope, shovel, sack of sand, and windshield scraper. Keep your gas tank near full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines. Check the latest weather reports before you travel. Try not to travel alone, and let someone know your timetable and primary and alternate routes.

If a snowstorm traps you in your car, do not panic. Stay with your vehicle. Run the heater about 10 minutes each hour, and keep the exhaust pipe clear of snow. Open the window a little for fresh air to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Make yourself visible to rescuers by turning the dome light on at night when running the engine. Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna or door. Exercise from time to time by vigorously moving your arms and legs to keep blood circulating, and to stay warm.

Whether at home or traveling, always dress to fit the season. When going outside wear loose fitting, warm be removed to avoid perspiration and subsequent chill. Outer garments should be lightly worn, water repellent, and hooded. Since half of your

body's heat loss can be from the head, it is important to wear a hat or hood. Also, always be sure to wear mittens or gloves.

Do not let severe winter weather catch you off guard. Monitor NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, and television for the latest winter weather watches, warnings and advisories. Be prepared before a winter storm strikes, and stay safe this coming winter season.

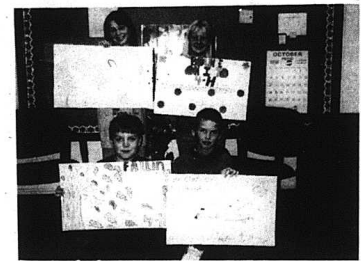

Lice Problems on Cattle Increase During Winter

Cattle lice populations increase as temperatures decrease, making winter an important time to control these pests whose biting and sucking can reduce animal performance and stress tolerance. Controlling lice on cattle should be part of a total herd health program. Lice infestations can lower animals' weight gain, lead to anemia, and reduce their resistance to stresses, such as cold, wet weather.

Lice become a problem in the fall and winter because they move from animals on whom they overwintered to others in the herd as cattle bunch together during cold weather. The whole herd might become infested, but usually only a few cattle have severe infestations. These animals rub and scratch excessively in response to the irritation caused by lice biting and sucking.

To confirm a louse infestation, carefully examine the most agitated animals by parting hair along the neck, head, around the eyes, and on the withers, brisket, and shoulders to look for lice. Sucking lice often occur in patches, have narrow, pointed heads and tend to

remain attached to the cow. Chewing lice have a wider, triangular head and are more active.

Several control options are available for lice but the list narrows as winter approaches. We are past cattle grub treatment date so a systemic insecticide should not be used unless a grub treatment was applied earlier. A whole animal spray provides thorough coverage needed for effective control and is one of the least expensive treatments. However, it isn't desirable to get animals wet when temperatures are low. Alternatives are pour-ons and dusts, both of which are relatively dry. Consult local vets for products which are working best in herds they work with. Ask for products which can be applied without catching cattle in a head gate. Many products use a heavy mineral-oil carrier which when applied to back can be easily seen. On small herds, cattle can be treated as they eat at feed bunks.

For season-long control, treat all animals and re-treat all animals 14 to 21 days later to kill any lice which hatch from eggs. If all animals coming into the herd are treated, then lice should be no problem.

Cattle producers are advised to read labels carefully before buying products to control cattle lice. Two products with the same concentration of an active ingredient might sell for different prices. Compare application rates and methods. Some products have an application or measuring device to help you deliver an accurate dose, especially when the rate is just a few cc's per head. Also check the label for cautions or restrictions, such as time to wait between applications and protective equipment to use during applications.

For more information on controlling cattle lice, consult Insecticide Recommendations for Beef Cattle, ENT-11, which is available from the County Extension Office.

Putting Your Crock Pot To Work

If you have enough discipline to think about dinner at breakfast time, your reward can be a meal that's ready when you come home. The slow-cook crock pot not only improves the variety and flavor of the foods you serve, but it can cut the time you spend in the kitchen almost in half. The slow cooker doesn't replace the stove top or the oven because it cooks foods in a certain way. Main dishes, casseroles and soups are particularly adaptable to this method of cooking. The slow-cook crock pot is a glazed earthenware bowl housed in an outer casing. Electric slow cookers first became popular in the 1970's because of its economy of fuel consumption and suitability for cooking inexpensive cuts of meat. Its low temperature is designed for long hours of unattended cooking. The seal between the lid and the

rim of the pot should not be broken during cooking until it is time to test the doneness of your recipe. The heat inside the crock pot builds up slowly and every time you uncover the pot, you lose enough heat to slow the cooking process thirty minutes or more. Because the slow cooker doesn't allow steam to escape, the food inside retains all the moisture originally there. Ingredients should not dry out or burn, so there is no need to peek or stir your recipe. To reduce any bacterial risk while using a slow-cook crock pot follow these simple guidelines:
 * Keep raw ingredients refrigerated until they are to be put in the cooker. Use only good quality ingredients.
 * Thaw frozen meat or poultry before cooking.
 * Cut vegetables in small pieces to

ensure rapid heat transfer.
 * When cooking meat, the water or stock level should almost cover the meat to ensure effective heat transfer.
 * Do not overload the crock pot. Half full is the design of most crock pots.
 * Do not leave cooked food to cool down in the pot. Either consume it immediately or cool the food rapidly and refrigerate.
 * Never reheat leftovers in the

crock pot.
 * Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
 Very large cuts of meats, such as roasts or whole poultry, should be cut into small pieces to insure that the interior of the meat reaches a temperature of 155° - 170°. This temperature will kill most bacteria. For a free leaflet of crockpot recipes, contact the Extension Office at 256-2403.

Affirm Yourself

Do you talk to yourself? Most of us do. The problem for many of us is that we do not make positive statements to ourselves. Check yourself sometime and monitor the conversation that is going on in your head. Sometimes this conversation will not be contributing anything positive to your life. Often we are not even aware that this conversation is going on.

The negative words we say about ourselves vary from person to person, but there are certain similarities. "You will never amount to anything"; "You are stupid"; and "no one wants to be your friend" are examples of the messages we give to ourselves. Usually these messages have been a part of our lives for a long time.

Take a moment now and put down your newspaper. Close your eyes and listen to the thoughts going through your mind. What do you say to yourself as you look to the future? Do you regard yourself positively or negatively? The first step toward changing those negative thoughts is to be aware of them.

You have heard the old line, "If you can't say anything nice, don't say anything at all." We apply that mostly to our dealings with other people. I suggest that it is time to apply this to ourselves as well. If you can't say nice things about yourself, don't say anything at all.

Better still replace those negative thoughts with affirmations. An affirmation is a positive statement that you make to affirm yourself and your life goals. It is especially useful when you are trying to change.

Here are some sample affirmations that I know have helped people change: "I am happier, healthier and trimmer each and every day of my life" (for someone trying to shed some pounds); "I enjoy breathing fresh,

clear air into my lungs" (used when quitting smoking); and "I am a more positive person in all parts of my life."

You can write your own affirmations. There are only three rules in the creation of your affirmation: keep it simple, make it positive and use present tense. It must be simple so that you can remember it easily. Do not use negative words. Rather than saying, "I do not want chocolate anymore," use the thought "I am eating what is good for my body." And use present tense. Do not describe a change that you hope will happen in the future. Describe that change as if it has already begun, because it has! You might say "I am thankful that I now speak positively about other people."

My current affirmation is "I am open to all that the world is giving me." I am using that to help me deal with my negative worries about the future. Plainly put, I worry too much

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and three television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVWK (FM-93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WAHY (FM 107.9), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive early.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up phone lines.

Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan

Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is needed to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.

If a one-hour delay status is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WVWK (FM-93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WAHY (FM 107.9), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1), and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVQ (Channel 36), at 6 a.m. or as soon as possible.

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.

In instances of a delay schedule, breakfast will be served as soon as students arrive at school.
