

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



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Be prepared for winter weather

Winter Weather Awareness Week winter Weather Awareness week for Kentucky is November 16 through November 20. With winter just around the corner, now is the time to prepare for the coming cold, snow, and ice.

Kentuckians are no strangers to Kentuckians are no strangers to snowstoms, ice storms, and severe cold spells that disrupt normal activa-ties. Just last winter, February 3 through 6, a crippling snowstorm knocked outpower for weeks in some garts of eastern Kentucky. Other feptent winters serve as reminders of the severe conditions that can affect off area. In January 1996, a two day storm brought widespread 1 to 2 feet sidwas to eastern Kentucky, and in figurary 1994 a snowstorm blanketed much of the same area with over a foot of snow. The January 1994 storm was followed by record cold, with widespread temperatures of 20 to 30

below zero.

In major winter storms, preparation can be the key to survival. Take some time to get ready long before the storm strikes. At home, keep the following items available: flashlights and extra batteries, battery powered NOAA Weather Radio and portable AM/FM radio, extra food and water, ANI/PM ratio, extra foota and water, extra medicine, and first aid supplies. Always maintain an adequate supply of heating fuel, since fuel carriers may not be able to reach you after a major winter storm. If you have an emergency heating source such as a

Keep the following items in your vehicle: blankets, flashlight, hipper cidbles, tow rope, shovel, sack of sand, and windshield scraper. Keep your gas tank near full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines. Check the latest weather reports before you travel. Try not to travel alone, and let someone know your timetable and primary and alternate routes.

If a snowstorm traps you in your caff, do not panic. Stay with your vehicle. Run the heater about 10 minutes each hour, and keep the exhaust pipe clear of snow. Open the window a little for fresh air to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning. Make yourself visible to rescuers by turning the dome light on at night when running the engine. Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna or door.

body's heat loss can be from the head, it is important to wear a hat or hood. Also, always be sure to wear mittens or gloves.



Lice Problems on Cattle Increase **During Winter**

Cattle lice populations increase as temperatures decrease, making winer an important line to control sucking can reduce animal performance and stress tolerance. Controlling lice on cattle should be part of a total herd health program. Lice infestations can lower animals weight gain, lead to anemia, and reduce their resistance to stresses, clause to the controlling lice of the controlling lice of the control of the control

initiation caused by the biling and sucking.

To confirm a louse infestation, carefully examine the most agitated animals by parting hair along the neck, head, around the eyes, and on the withers, brisket and shoulders to look for lice. Sucking lice often occur in patches, have narrow, pointed heads and tend to

remain attached to the cow. Chewing lice have a wider, triangular head and are more

triangular head and are more active.

Several control options are available for lice but the list narrows as winter approaches. We are past cattle grub treatment date so a systemic insecticide should not be used unless a grub treatment was applied earlier. A whole animal spray provides thorough coverage needed for effective control and is paray provides thorough coverage needed for effective control and is one of the least expensive treatments. However, it isn't desirable to get animals wet when temperatures are low. Alternatives are pour-ons and dusts, both of which are relatively dry. Consult local yets for products which are which are relatively dry. Consult local vets for products which are working best in herds they work with. Ask for products which can be applied without catching cattle in a head gate. Many products use a heavy mineral voil carrier which when applied to back can be easily seen. On small herds, cattle can be treated as they eat at feed bunks. For season-long control, treat all animals and re-treat all animals is the control of the control

Because the slow escape, the food inside retains all the mousture originally there. Ingredients should not dry out burn, so there is no need to peek or stir your recipe.

To reduce any bacterial risk while using a slow-cook crock pot follow these simple guidelines.

*Keep raw ingredients refrigerated until they are to be put in the cooker. Use only good quality intenditions.

Affirm Yourself
Do you talk to yourself? Most of us do. The problem for many of us is that we do not make positive statements to ourselves. Check yourself sometime and monitor the conversation that is going but in your head. tion that is going on in your head. Sometimes this conversation will not be contributing anything positive to your life. Often we are not even aware that this conversation is going on.

The negative words we say about ourselves vary from person to person, but there are certain similarities. "You will never amount to anything"; "You are stupid"; and "no one wants to be your friend" are examples of the

to be your riend" are examples of the messages we give to ourselves. Usually these messages have been a part of our lives for a long time.

Take a moment now and put down your newspaper. Close your eyes and listen to the thoughts going through your mind. What do you say to your-self as you look to the future? Do you

your mind. Wratt do you say to your self as you look to the future? Do you regard yourself positively? or nega-ing those negative thoughts is to be aware of them. You have heard the old line, "If you can't say anything nice, don't say anything at all." We apply that mostly to our dealings with other people. I suggest that it is time to apply this to ourselves as well. If you can't say nice things about youself, don't say anything at all. Better still replace those negative thoughts with affirmations. An af-firmation is a positive statement that you make to affirm yourself and your life goals. It is especially useful when you are trying to change.

are trying to change

Here are some sample affirmations that I know have helped people change: "I am happier, healthier and trimmer each and every day of my life" (for someone trying to shed some pounds); "I enjoy breathing fresh, clean air into my lungs" (used when quitting smoking); and "I am a more positive person in all parts of my life."

You can write your own affirmations. There are only three rules in the creation of your affirmation: keep it simple, make it positive and use prescreation of your all'irmation: keep it simple, make it positive and use present tense. It must be simple so that you can remember it easily. Do not use negative words. Rather than saying "I do not want checolate anymore," use the thought "I am eating me I do not want of the colate anymore," use the thought "I am eating what is good for my body." And use present tense. Do not describe a change that you hope will happen in the future. Describe that change as if it has already begun, because it has! You might say "I am thankful that I now speak positively about other people." My current affirmation is "I am open to all that the world is giving me." I am using that to help me deal with my negative worries about the future. Plainly put, I worry too much

The s why it makes better sense to spend more time and energy, and set ou priorities in striving to lay up treasures in heaven. What do we deem mos calluable? For what do we regard and count the more valuable, treasures her on earth or treasure in heaven? And what ever our treasure is, that is where our heart will be also.

Rockcastle County Schools Plan for Inclement Weather, Schools Closings and Early Dismissals

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and three television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM-93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WAHY (FM 107.9), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive early.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up phone lines.

Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan

Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is neded to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.

If a one-hour delay status is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM-93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WAHY (FM 107.9), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1), and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVQ (Channel 36), at 6 a.m. or as soon as possible

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.

In instances of a delay schedule, breakfast will be served as soon as students arrive at school.
