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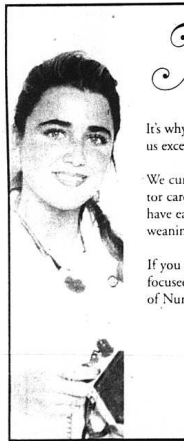

Feeding The Beef Herd Through The Winter

As winter moves in upon us, beef producers begin a balancing act. They have to try to hold down winter feed costs, which is one of the biggest expenses in maintaining a herd, and at the same time provide their cattle with adequate nutrition at the most critical time of the year. Cows can usually survive the winter on poor nutrition, but there may be long-term effects on productivity. Some effects are apparent right away, but others may not show up until two or three years later, in terms of reduced calf numbers and lower profits. Inadequate nutrition, especially through the winter, can result in poor reproductive performance. Thin cows rebreed more slowly, replacement heifers and first-calf heifers often skip a year before

calving, and the time between calves increases. Health problems also increase, since animals may have vitamin deficiencies and may become more susceptible to internal parasites and respiratory ills. Lower-than-minimum nutrition also may mean lower weaning weights. Under-nourished cows produce less milk and calves may have to be weaned early. So, producers cutting back too much on feed...and nutrition...will likely cut their income. Cull cows usually will weigh less and will sell for less and small calves mean fewer dollars.

But a little planning can help producers prepare for their herd's nutritional needs and avoid excess feed expense. Sample test

harvested forages for their nutritional value so you can supplement forages correctly and efficiently. Many times early cut grass-hays and grass-legume mixtures may need only mineral or vitamin supplementation to meet the needs of dry pregnant beef cows. After you take inventory of how much feed you have and how good it is, plan to allocate it to cattle on the basis of need. All beef cattle do not have the same nutritional requirements. Grouping cattle with similar needs and feeding accordingly will make winter

feeding more economical. Feeding all cattle the same means you'll overfeed and underfeed, and will waste feed dollars. For example, feeding dry cows and lactating cows together results in overfeeding the dry cows. Most herds can be split into two or three groups. Young calves should have first priority, lactating heifers next, then lactating cows. Mature dry cows can use lower quality roughage up till 30-60 days before calving. Prior to calving, a higher energy ration will

provide stronger calves to face winter weather, more energy for the cow to milk and rebreed. Consider reducing the size of your herd, since you can't afford to feed poor-producing or non-producing or not-pregnant cows. If you have kept production records such as the cow's age and weaning weights of calves on each cow in your herd, you easily can identify non-pregnant cows and examine your animals for

soundness. Cull cows that have lost their teeth, or that have feet and leg problems, bag eyes or unsound udders.

Use storage and feeding methods that make the most of you hay. Improper storage and feeding especially of large round bales, can result in losses up to a third or more. Store round bales indoors or under special hay tarps on a well-drained site. Feed hay on top of grass, in hay racks, or on special concentrated feeding pads, not in mud. Feed lowest quality hay first so that the best hay is available during late winter when the cattle really need it. And consider purchasing corn to balance the late cut fescue hay made last June. Low quality hay passes through animals slower, limiting how much hay they can eat. Cows could actually starve to death on low quality hay even though they have all the hay they can eat.

Arson, fraud trial ends in hung jury

The trial of suspended London City officer Terry Johnson and Bill and David Abrams, accused of conspiring to burn the Speedway Family Arcade in Renfro Valley last May, ended Tuesday in a hung jury.

Johnson, who is represented by London attorney Robert Cato, testified in his own behalf on Thursday and denied any knowledge of a plot to burn the arcade building. The case is centered around the insurance policy Johnson allegedly took out on the contents of the arcade building, which was leased to Johnson by a area McDonald's owner, Ernie Tackett, who had purchased the building from Willard Collingsworth. Johnson's testimony conflicted with that given by Shannon Sams, the London insurance agent who filed the initial policy on the machines. Johnson said Sams made a mistake in the policy, just as he had on other policies Johnson had with that agency; however, that statement and details of alleged other mistakes were thrown out by U.S. District Judge Jennifer B. Coffman.

Hatfield also questioned Johnson's motive in securing an insurance policy on machines he allegedly only leased from Bill Abrams when he could have taken separate policies. Johnson countered that the policy was "all in one policy," again contradicting Sams' testimony, while he explained that the policy was a "lease-purchase."

Johnson also denied telling Bill Abrams that he had a policy on the machines and confirmed that he wrote the insurance company after the fire, waiving any claim to damages because the leased machines did not belong to him. Johnson said that he was only supposed to lease the build-

ing, buy insurance and have the utilities connected.

Hatfield further drilled Johnson during the three-hour testimony, alleging that Johnson only had the electricity turned on in the building to decoy the alleged arson conspiracy, which Johnson also denied.

Beware of scam artists

Local residents should be aware of a group of men that have been in the area painting barns.

Last week Brodhead resident David Whit's suspicions about some barn painters certainly paid off for him and not them.

Whit said that a man approached him, asking him if his group could paint Whit's barn which was located behind Sowder Nursing Home in Brodhead.

Whit said that before he knew it

Laurel Sheriff Detective Jerry Hollon, who was Johnson's roommate at the time of the fire, testified that Johnson was asleep when he came home around 1:00 to 1:30 a.m. on May 12, but that Johnson received

the men were working on the barn with two large spray painters and, about two and half hours later, they presented him with a bill for \$1,175.

Whit said that while the men were working, his father, Lawson Whit, cautioned him about some scam artists that were in the area from South Carolina.

Whit said that one of the trucks the men were driving had South Carolina license plates and the other one had Tennessee plates.

Whit said that he called the Better Business Bureau in Lexington, where he was told to call the police because the Bureau knew of their scam.

Whit said he called police and told the men painting the barn they would have to wait on police before they were paid.

Whit said the men immediately left the job site and police are still looking for them.

Wally Junie Kirby sentenced to 5 years

A Rockcastle County man accused of shooting his girlfriend to death in 1995 has finally been sentenced in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Wally Junie Kirby, 41, of Chestnut Ridge was indicted for murder in April of 1995 for the February 24th, 1995 shooting death of Tracy A. Caudill.

At the time of the shooting, Ms. Caudill was carrying the couple's child which was delivered by C-section at the Rockcastle Hospital, before Ms. Caudill died.

Kirby who contended that he was acting in self-defense when he shot Ms. Caudill in the head, was tried in

Rockcastle Circuit Court last year. That trial ended in a hung jury. After Kirby was sentenced Friday he was taken to the Laurel County Detention Center.

Brent Kirby indicted again for murder

Only a few weeks after an indictment for murder against a Rockcastle County man was dismissed, the same man was indicted again on the same charge.

Earl Brent Kirby, 42, of Mt. Vernon, who was originally indicted over five years ago, for the shooting death of Lester Fmkie Griffin, on March 28, 1993, was indicted again on Friday by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Commonwealth's Attorney Eddie Montgomery said Wednesday that after he took over for former Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who was indicted by a federal grand jury, he (Montgomery) began to review some of the older cases in his office, including the murder indictment against Kirby.

"I'm not sure why the case has been put off so long, but something needed to happen," Montgomery said. So Montgomery said he asked for the original case to be dismissed with prejudice, meaning it could be brought up again.

The Commonwealth Attorney said that he re-presented the case to a new grand jury because he wanted to make sure there was enough evidence to proceed with the case.

Montgomery said that because the case was already over five years

old, he would seek a jury trial very soon.

According to court records, Kirby is accused of shooting Griffin in the head during an altercation in front of Griffin's Chestnut Ridge home around 4:45 p.m. on that Sunday afternoon.

At the time of the shooting, police said they found a .25 caliber automatic pistol in Griffin's back pocket although Griffin apparently did not fire any shots.

Police said that both men had apparently been drinking before the shooting.

A summons for Kirby, who has been out on bond the past five years, was issued but no arraignment date was set.

A former Rockcastle County resident was also indicted for sexual abuse.

Dewayne Hasty, 41, of Green-castle, TN, was indicted on one count of sexual abuse in the first degree.

He is accused of having sexual contact with a female member of his family less than twelve years of age on July 4 of this year.

State police detective Gary Lane is investigating.

A summons was issued for Hasty, but no arraignment date was set.

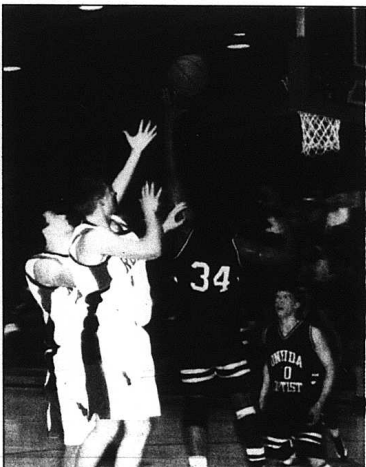
Cromer honored

SBDM minutes at RCMS

 The Rockcastle County High School SBDM Council met in regular session on Monday, November 30, 1998, in the high school conference room. Council members present were Debra Brown, Yvonne Carmack, Tom Larkey and Jeff Hayes.
 Chairperson Ruth Allen called the meeting into session at 4:07 p.m. She welcomed those in attendance and noted that SBDM Council Member Debbie Cash had undergone surgery the previous Friday and was resting at home. Chairperson Allen distributed CATS (Commonwealth Assessment Testing System) information to the parent members and noted that test results would be available on Thursday, December 4, 1998, when the state department officially released scores.

Minutes were distributed for the October 27, 1998, and November 4, 1998, SBDM meetings. Tom Larkey asked for clarification about whether or not there was a policy requiring clubs and organizations to have trips approved by the SBDM Council. Chairperson Allen said that there was no such policy, but that many sponsors chose to present their plans to the council and often had the students do the presentations. After discussion, the council agreed that no policy was needed since the school board approved trips, but that the council appreciated the courtesy of being informed and enjoyed the presentations by the students. Debra Brown made the motion to accept both sets of minutes as presented, and Yvonne Carmack seconded. The council approved by consensus.

Debra Brown made the motion to go into closed session under KRS 61.810 to discuss the Half-Time Secretarial and Track Coach positions. Yvonne Carmack seconded and the council approved by consensus. At 4:21 p.m. the following met in closed session: Ruth Allen, Jeff Hayes, Tom Larkey, Yvonne Carmack and Debra Brown. At 4:31 p.m. Debra Brown made the motion to return to open session, with a seconded by Yvonne Carmack. The council approved by consensus.

Debra Brown made the motion to recommend Mark Brummett for the Track Coach position. Yvonne Carmack seconded, and the council approved by consensus.
 Chairperson Allen also updated the council on the ROTC position. Sgt. Major Charles Robinson, after being recommended for the job, communicated with Superintendent Hammond that he would like to change the salary offered in order to avoid a decrease in pay from his current position. Chairperson Allen also noted that the interview committee had scheduled an interview with Lt. Colonel Alano from Evansville, Indiana, on December 7.

Several departments are interested in creating new classes while others are refining names to clarify the content being taught. Out of only nine fouls whistled on the Rockets, sophomore Jessie Ricketts got five of them and fouled out with 2:46 left in the game with 7 points. Tiffany McClure had to leave the game also late in the second half with an ankle injury.

Besides Roberts 14 and Ricketts 7, junior play caller Brandy Reynolds got 11; Jessica Cobb and Suzanne Brown had 10 each and Tiffany McClure 1.

Tuesday night, the Lady Rockets topped the Clay Co. Lady Tigers 51-43, avenging two regular season losses from last year and handing the Tigers their first loss of the season.

The Rockets picked up their fourth win of the season against one loss and it was primarily due to some tenacious defense, particularly by junior Brandy Reynolds. Reynolds had the task of defending the Tiger's ace point guard Kristi Asher and defend her she did - holding Asher to 14 points in the game.

Ricketts led the scoring for the Rockets with 18 (12 in the second half) which included two threes; Brown got 14 and was perfect from the free throw line, going 4 for 4; McClure also got a three in her 11

points; Reynolds had six points and Brooke Roberts and Jessica Cobb, one each.

This Thursday night, the Rockets begin play in the Berea Holiday Tournament and are then off until December 28th when their own Holiday Hoopla Tournament begins.

Clay County picked up their game in the second half, outsourcing the Rockets forty eight to twenty one, proving why they are the number eight ranked team in the state.

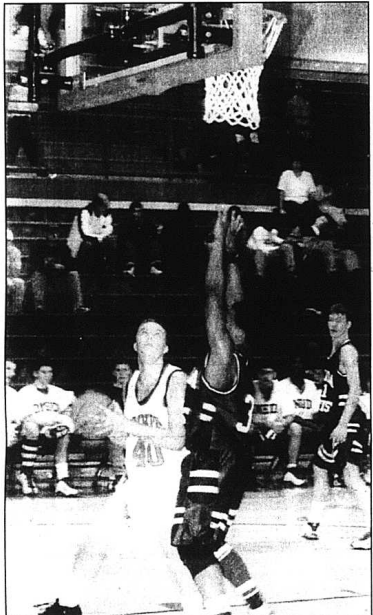
Rockcastle scored more points from the free throw line in the second half than they did baskets, go-

Child Abuse... A Matter of Fact

Information to Report

When reporting child abuse or neglect there is information which the reporter should be able to give to the child service worker who takes the report. Examples of that information is as follows:

The name and address of the child you suspect is being abused or neglected.

The exact or approximate age of the child.

Is the child a boy or girl?

The name and address of the parent or caretaker of the child.

The reason you suspect the child is being abused or neglected.

Any other information which may be helpful to the investigation.

You may remain anonymous, but you may give your name if you wish.

It is helpful if you provide as much of the above listed information as possible. You should not hesitate to report if you do not have all the information. Any uncertainty regarding whether to report should be resolved in favor of the child's protection.

a page, made a phone call and left their apartment about two hours later. Hollon and Johnson lived on Barbourville Road in apartments owned by Bill Abrams at that time.

The page came from Mark Begley, personnel supervisor for London-Laurel 911 Dispatch Center, who notified Johnson of the fire. Begley testified that he received a call from Mt. Vernon police and contacted Johnson to confirm that the building was indeed the not-yet-open arcade business.

Begley said that he believed Johnson was asleep when the fire came informing him of the call. Knowing that Johnson was about to open a business, he then contacted Johnson to confirm the call from Mt. Vernon police.

Neither Bill nor David Abrams, testified in their own behalf, although David's wife, testified that her husband and Bobby Collins worked on a diesel engine on the evening on May 11 until around 11:00 p.m. Mrs. Abrams also said that David received a phone call from his brother Bill and left their home shortly thereafter without changing his clothes, which smelled strongly of diesel fuel.

According to earlier testimony, Kentucky State Police were tipped off that the building would be burned and began a surveillance of the business on May 11. Local KSP Trooper Jimmy Silvers stopped a vehicle registered to Bill Abrams traveling on a near-deserted roadway in the area soon after the fire was detected by surveillance units. The strong smell of kerosene on Abram's passenger, identified as David Abrams, constituted suspicion of arson by police investigators.

A Lexington man was also indicted on three counts involving illegal drugs.

Jerry L. Lawson, 25, of Locust Avenue, in Lexington, was indicted for possession of cocaine, possession of drug paraphernalia and operating a motor vehicle under the influence of drugs.

Lawson's arrest came on October 11, after a traffic stop by Mt. Vernon policemen Barry Adams and Matt Bryant.

His bond was set at \$5,000 cash or property. No arraignment date has been set for him either.

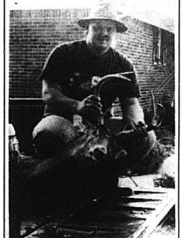

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The Family Room

"I'm sorry," she said. "I'm sorry that I forgot to call you. I feel really bad about that." She was supposed to have initiated the conference call for our planning group at 9:00 p.m. When she did not, I finally called her.

"I feel so bad about this," she apologized again. "I have a screaming baby, and I just got to call. It will take me a week to get over feeling bad about this."

"This was a bit of an overreaction to one phone call. I thought, so I asked her why this bothered her so much."

"I'm a perfectionist," she told me (and the rest of our group who had now joined the conference call). "I don't allow myself to make mistakes. I try to please everyone and not do anything wrong."

"Another member of our group assured her that forgetting the phone call was not a serious problem. I and another told her the same thing. She finally felt some better."

"Do you recognize yourself in this story of my friend? Are you also the Planner, who wants to keep everybody happy by doing everything just right?"

"Pleasers live unhappy lives much of the time. They can never do enough to please everybody, so they feel like failures."

It took me a lot of years to figure

out that, no matter what I did, not everyone was going to like me. Prior to that I spent a lot of time making sure that I had covered all the bases so that no one would be upset.

Goldie and George (not their real names) helped me with this bit of learning. Many years ago these two called me to their home and raked me over the coals for the terrible thing I had done to offend their family. To listen to them talk I was the scum of the earth.

The very next day my family and I left for a week of vacation. For that whole week I felt like scum, and all I could think was that I had failed. Since Goldie and George weren't happy I had obviously done something wrong. My wife could tell that something was wrong with me that week, but I never told her the cause of my depression.

Finally I came to the realization that Goldie and George's anger had little to do with me. They were still upset by an insult that had happened long before I came along. They were taking out on me the anger that they felt toward others.

Pleasers are generally well-liked because they try hard not to offend anyone. But even the best pleaser will have some who become upset with him. No matter how much he does not have perfectly, he tries to do

it, someone will object.

The Pleaser can develop a thicker skin to ward off the slings and arrows that others will inevitably throw at him. The Pleaser can stop caring so much about what others think of him and instead live his life the way he thinks is best. After all, *how* he lives his life is between him and God and is not open to judgment by anyone else.

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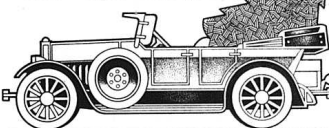

The surprise, a beautiful "Jingle Bells" penicillent, courtesy of Roy Reynolds and the FFA, was won by Paul Griffin.

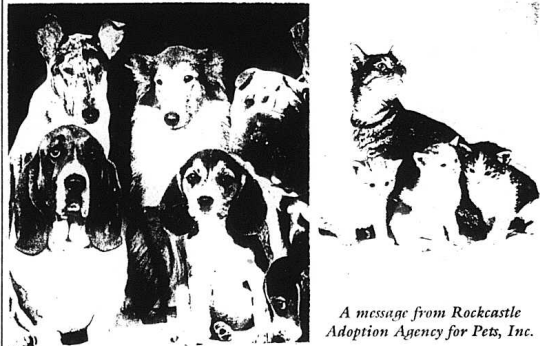

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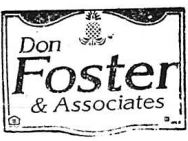
