Hammond gets new four year contract from school board

By a one vote margin, the Rockcastle County Board of Education approved a new four-year contract for Superintendent Larry Hammond at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

The 3-2 vote for a new contract came after an hour long closed session to discuss Hammond's new contract. His current four year contract expires in June.

Voting to give the Superintendent a new contract were board chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith, vice-chairman Terry Burton and board member Martin Vanzant.

Voting against a four-year contract for Hammond were board members Sherry Isaacs and Sam Stallsworth.

Burton said Wednesday that when you look at the overall picture, the Rockcastle County school system is considered an improving district.

Judge orders probation in sex abuse case

A local man who was indicted in 1997 on twenty felony counts of sexual abuse has been sentenced to probation.

On Monday, Circuit Judge William Cain sentenced Matt Geisi, 33, of Mt. Vernon, to twenty-four months probation in the case.

Geisi was indicted for allegedly sexually abusing three young boys he was counseling.

The judge also imposed several conditions on Geisi's probation.

They included: having no contact with the victims in the case, refraining from the use of alcohol or illegal drugs, refraining from any further violation of the law, avoiding places or persons of disreputable or harmful character, work faithfully at suitable employment as far as possible, permit the probation officer to visit him at his home or elsewhere and submitting to periodic testing for use of controlled substances or alcohol.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court hired employees and set salaries at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday.

Eleven current road workers, the current road supervisor and eleven other employees that fall under the court's area of employment were rehired.

Road Supervisor Denton Cromer was rehired at an \$8.66 per hour wage.

County treasurer Joe Clontz was re-hired at a salary of \$10,395 per year.

Young patient at Rockcastle Hospital furthers education

Attending college is something most people do out of necessity or requirement. But for Jody Adams, attending college has meant fulfilling his dreams.

"I could always be taken care of, but I want to prove to the world that I'm not just a disabled person," said Adams, 23, a ventilator-dependent resident of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. "I want to do something — make something for myself."

Adams was diagnosed with muscular dystrophy during his childhood, but he hasn't let that stop him from

having a normal life. Until August of 1997, when Adams moved to RHRCC, he lived at home with his brother, who suffered from muscular dystrophy, and his mom who reared them both.

While at home, Adams cultivated a dream and a talent for drawing from his mother and brother. Adams said his brother told him that the most vital thing associated with drawing was Adams' imagination.

"I really try to explore my imagination when I draw," Adams said. "The goal of my arts is to establish something that is different because I want people to know that it is O.K. to have a different style."

"From the beginning, Adams knew he wanted to become a cartoonist and a disk jockey.

He kept with his dream by being the star of every muscular dystrophy television he can remember. Adams also is the hospital's cartoonist. He supplies a full-page cartoon strip, titled *Buster Atoms*, for each internal hospital newsletter.

"I want the kids out there that are going through what I'm going through to see that I'm doing it — that they can live a fulfilled life despite the odds," Adams said.

Muscular dystrophy is a term used for a group of non-contagious dis-

So have it. All you need to do is write the company's name and address on the front of a post card and your's on the back with a one line note requesting their 1999 catalogue. It usually takes about 10 days to get your book.

Finally, if you're new to gardening or just want to know more, call your UK Agriculture Extension Office and ask them to order a copy of Home Vegetable Gardening in Kentucky for you. They may already have it in stock. The publication number is ID-128. You'll have to stop by their office to pick it up, but it's worth the trip.

County Attorney attends conference

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette recently attended the Kentucky County Attorney's Association Conference held in Lexington, on December 3-4, 1998.

At the Conference, Burdette was appointed Co-Chair of the DUI Legislative Change Committee, which was formed to draft a new proposed DUI law. Burdette, who has previously served on various committees within the Association, was appointed by Michael Fox, Garter County Attorney and newly elected President of the KCA.

"Jeff Burdette was an easy choice because of his knowledge of the law. He takes cases to trial and knows the practical side of the statutes," Fos said. "The Committee will present a draft bill at the Prosecutor's conference in August, 1999, and the Association will attempt to get it passed in the 2000 General Assembly," Fox added.

The Conference provided informational training in County issues, juvenile laws, delinquent tax collection and other prosecutorial functions.

The last time I recommend a series of seed catalogues I received letters from several companies wondering why they had been left out. Don't ask me how companies in California and Canada get copies of your weekly paper, but they do.

The fact of the matter is that it would take an entire page in this paper to list everyone in the seed business. My aim in this piece is to let you know about a few companies that I regularly order from, make a few recommendations and let you know how to get a free catalogue or save you money otherwise.

If you are stuck on old stand by varieties like white half-runner and Kentucky Wonder beans, Early Sun-glow or Kandy-sweet-corn, Southern Giant mustard, Black-seeded Simpson lettuce and so forth, don't even bother sending off for a catalogue. You simply can't beat the prices at Southern States where you can get twice as many seeds at half the price of anything in the mail order business.

If, on the other hand, you like to grow stuff a little out of the ordinary the books are mandatory.

Here's a sampling of the ones I can't do without.

Totally Tomatoes, P.O. Box 1676, Augusta, Georgia 30903-1676. More than 200 varieties of matters and about 100 peppers most of which can't be found anywhere else. Lots of very old heirloom varieties. My favorite catalogue of all time.

Vermont Bean Seed Company, Garden Lane, Fair Haven, VT 05743-0251. An international collection of beans and other veggies unavailable elsewhere. My second favorite catalogue.

Twilley Seed Co., 121 Gary Road, Hodges, SC 29653. Best selection of hybrid sweet-corn anywhere. Best prices for large volume/commercial growing. This is the company that got Ralph King in the snow pea business. (Oregon Sugar Pod II)

Park Seed Company, 1 Parkton Ave., Greenwood, SC 29672-0001. The catalogue is so nice that we order something every year just to

keep from feeling guilty. Try to dumping squash.

Stokes Seeds, Inc. Box 548, Buffalo, NY 14240-0548 or phone for free 1-800-396-9238. An old line company with good prices and a beautiful catalogue. Try the King Arthur Sweet Corn which is early, super sweet and huge ears.

Services were conducted Thursday, January 7, 1999 at Camp Nelson Cemetery.

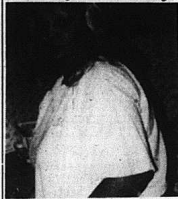

Caring For Chenille Garments

One of the hottest fashion items this winter is chenille. There are scarves, sweaters, gloves, hats, jackets and many other apparel items made with chenille yarn. And, just what is chenille? It has been defined by the International Fabricare Institute as "a fuzzy pile yarn that resembles a caterpillar or pipe cleaner commonly found in rugs, bedspreads, and bathroom accessories but is also used in sweater, blouses, and dresses."

If you were remembered by 'Ole Santa' this holiday season with a chenille item, you're going to need to know how to care for it. Small items of apparel are exempt from care labeling, and thus, may not have a tag telling you how to clean them. Here are some timely tips:

On loosely woven or knitted fabrics, chenille yarns tend to snag and pull out easily. Normal rubbing and friction on the fabric will initiate the condition. Agitation or cleaning in a clothes washer will

further aggravate the condition. For chenille articles that are labeled as washable, it is safer to hand wash, even if the articles are labeled—machine—washable. Machine washing even on gentle cycle, can cause fabric damage. Hand washing reduces the degree of mechanical action, which reduces the likelihood of snagging and fabric distortion.

If you choose to machine wash, use the delicate cycle. Laying the articles flat to dry will reduce the possibility of fabric damage. Once the articles are nearly dry, it may be necessary to place the articles in a net bag and tumble dry. This will help restore the loft or fluffiness of the fabric and/or yarns.

Snagging and fabric distortion cannot be entirely prevented in wear or cleaning, but taking some precautions in cleaning can help reduce or eliminate problems.

Last 60 Days
Crucial To
Weak Calf Control

The last 60 days of pregnancy for beef cows are crucial to preventing weak calf syndrome. Many area beef herds are on spring calving seasons with the majority of calves born in late February through March. Feeding cows adequate energy and protein now through early March is crucial to preventing weak calf syndrome. As the name suggests, calves displaying the syndrome are weak at birth; often too weak to stand and nurse which can result in their death.

Farmers must be certain their cows are getting enough energy and protein during the final two months of pregnancy. Research studies have found that herds receiving enough energy and protein during the last 60 days of pregnancy had no problems with weak calf syndrome. When protein intake was two pounds or more per day, herds had no problems with weak calf syndrome. But in herds which intake was only 1.8 pounds per day, 3.4 percent of the calves born displayed symptoms of the syndrome. At a protein intake of 1.21 pounds per day, the incidence of weak calf syndrome was 9.8

percent. It seems clear that protein intake is associated with the syndrome.

Farmers should know the protein content of their feed, how much their pregnant cows are receiving, and be prepared to provide a supplement if it is needed. One caution regarding supplements is that producers should be sure that any protein supplement they feed to their cows is made up of high quality protein. Some supplements have high levels of non-protein nitrogen that can be utilized by the cow only if other high quality feeds with adequate energy are used with them.

Feeding low quality fescue hay and a convenient lick block or large protein block may not be meeting your cows needs. Protein blocks high in Urea should be supplemented with corn to provide energy for the utilization of non



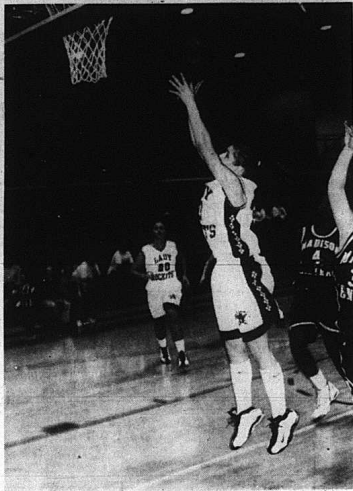
The Rocket Jayvees had a harder time, subduing the Indian Jayvees, but finally took a 25-22 win.

The Jayvees led 11-4 at the end of the first quarter; were ahead 17-12 at the half and 20-16 at the third quarter stop.

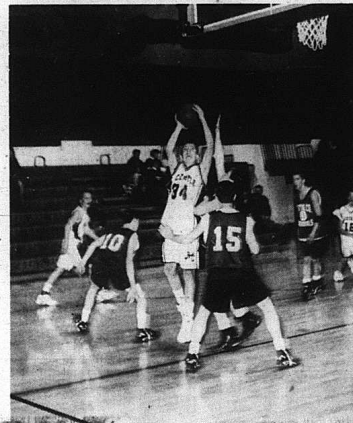
Freshmen lose 42-20

The Generals led at all the quarter stops 12-5; 20-12 and 32-16.

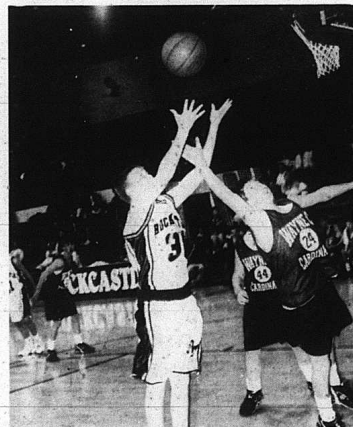

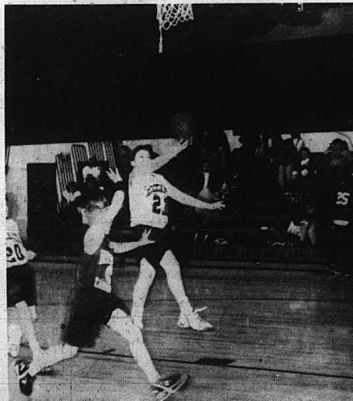
Jessica Cobb came off the bench to get 12 points in the Lady Rockets win Tuesday night.

Rockcastle then outscored the Warriors 5-2, going into the locker room down nine, 32-23.

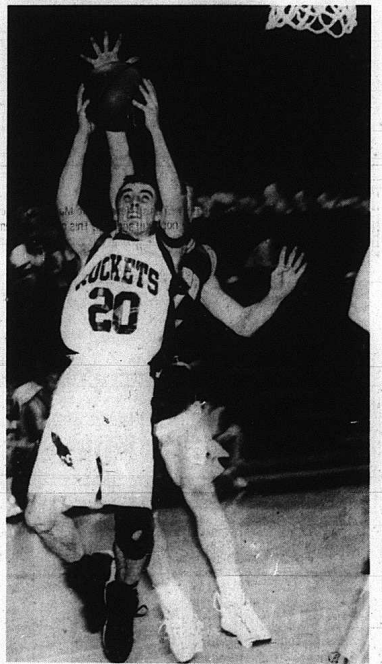
The Rocket team that showed up second half looked like the team of early season, as they played a much better team game, outscoring the Warriors 46-24 for the win.

Although the third quarter was much improved play for Rockcastle, it was a rough start as the Rockets could not connect for the basket and then committed a turnover.

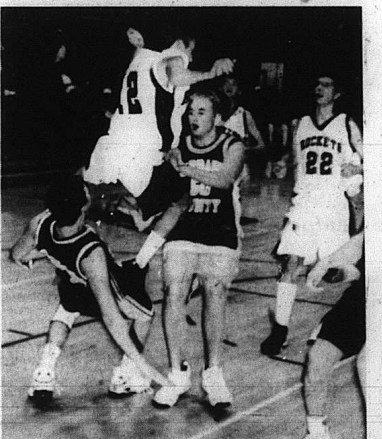
A good defensive rebound by Bradley set up the first points of the quarter, also by Bradley, for Rockcastle.

Matthew Brown scored next for Rockcastle, causing a Warrior timeout and cutting Southwestern's

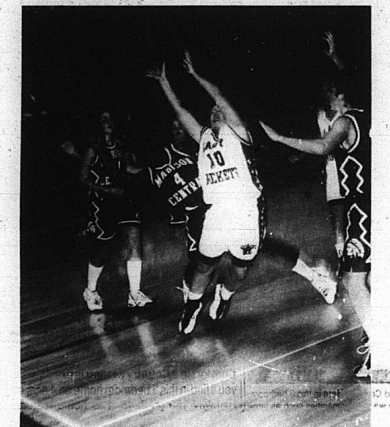

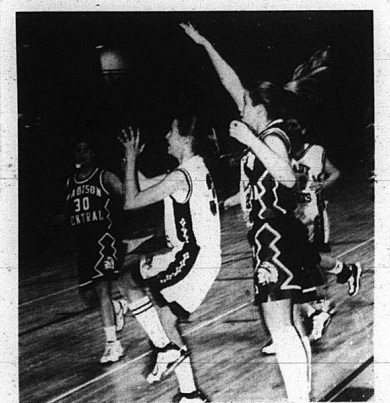
Andrew Cash goes up for two of his 20 points against Garrard County last Friday night. The Rockets lost in double overtime, 91-87.

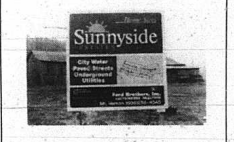

Library News

The new year has certainly started off with a spell of bad weather. But here in the county we have fared better than a lot of people in other parts of the state. We didn't have all the ice that was in other places but it was bad enough that I asked my son to bring me to work a couple of days. The main roads have never been too bad, but for those of you that know where our library is located, the hill coming out is scary when there is ice and snow. And it doesn't get cleared until most of the roads are done. There wasn't any school last week because some of the back roads were in a bad condition but hopefully things will be better soon and we can get

back to normal. We did close the library Thursday evening but other than that evening we have been here every day since the New Year's break. Since we didn't have many people in last week, we spent the week cleaning and dusting shelves and getting the books in proper order. Also other things that we have to let go when we are very busy. I was able to get some of the tax work finished, W-2 forms and etc. and now I'm ready to work on some of the new challenges that are before us. The library has received word from the Gates Foundation that the money is now available to purchase the four new computers. There are some things that have to be

done here at the library in preparation for them so we are now making plans for this to be done soon. Jerry is attending a workshop Thursday to learn some of the details that will help with the preparation. Some of the computers that we now have will be placed in other sections of the library such as the children's area and the Kentucky historical room. A lot of people like to use the internet for genealogical research so this will be available in the room where other genealogical material is located.

The internet is a very valuable tool in their family history research. I already had my father's ancestors traced back to the Revolutionary War. His name was Richard Gentry and he fought in the battle at King's Mountain in South Carolina. Three years ago, when my husband and I were in North Carolina visiting our son, Terry and family, we went to the battle ground in South Carolina and found his name inscribed as one of the soldiers in the battle. I have now discovered, with help from my son, Michael, where Richard's forefathers go back three more generations to England to a Nicholas family. I hope to be able to search for information on other family members when I have time. This can be addictive. The more you learn, the more you want to research for information to add to what you already have.

There are so many helpful search engines on the internet. We have found information on just about any subject that you are interested in and especially for the students that are preparing reports. We are able to get most magazine articles through First Search and these may either be printed out or can be E-mailed to the students if they have a computer available at home with an E-mail address.

But all of our services are not connected to the computers as you will find out when you visit our library. We just keep emphasizing the computers because a lot of people are still not aware of the many uses of them.

We continually get new books, videos, audio tapes, monthly issues of more than thirty magazines and the Lexington Herald-Leader is avail-

able every day. A FAX machine, a copy machine and a scanner is here for your convenience.

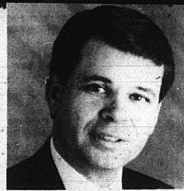

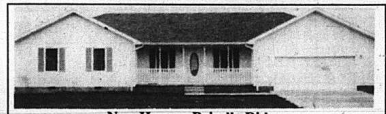

Agricultural News

Emergency Relief for Farmers
Farmers are eligible for compensation either for losses suffered to the 1998 crops or losses in any three or more crop years between 1994 and

1998. Farmers can receive payments under either the single or multi-year provisions, but not both and USDA will make payments at the higher of the two levels. Eligible crops are crops

that were insurable and uninsured crops that were not eligible to be insured. For 1998 single year losses, farmers will be compensated if their losses exceeded 35% of historic yields. The payment formulas provide greater benefits to farmers who bought insurance on their eligible crops. Farmers with eligible losses of insured crops will be compensated at 65% of crop insurance market price elections. Farmers with eligible losses to uninsured crops will be compensated at 60% of the crop insurance market price elections, and must agree to buy crop insurance for the 1999 and 2000 crop years. Farmers with eligible losses on non-insurable crops will be compensated at 65% of the 5 year average National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) price or crop insurance yield. Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) area loss triggers will not apply. Sign up will begin February 1, 1999. Farmers should contact their local USDA Service Center or FSA office at that time for more information.

Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP)

Kentucky has been notified that the fiscal year 1999 EQIP financial and educational assistance for the state will receive \$1,400,687 for eight priority areas and \$754,216 will be available to address statewide concerns in areas not covered by a priority area. Although the EQIP application period is considered to be continuous, ranking periods are established in order to rank the applications. This year's first ranking period will be February 1st through February 26, 1999. Official county allocations will be made after this year's ranking period has ended and applications have been evaluated. If all of the funds are not expended for applications ranked during this period, a later ranking period will be announced. It is highly unlikely that a second ranking period will be required. EQIP funds conservation practices on cost sharing basis for approved technical practices which include but are not restricted to: Waste Utilization, Conservation Crop Rotation, Forage Harvest, Management, Prescribed Grazing, Hayland Man-

agement and Stripcropping.

Forestry
The Ky Division of Forestry would like to remind landowners that free assistance is available to manage their woodlands. A forester will sample the existing growth and species present in your woods as he walks through with the landowners. After which topics discussed will be put in writing for further review. Most commonly TSI (Timber Stand Improvement) is recommended. This practice includes removing trees that are spaced too closely, of undesired species for timber or wildlife, and trees that are damaged from fire. Like growing a vegetable garden, your woodlot needs intermittent treatment prior to harvesting a bumper crop.

TSI is not rocket science. It requires time, a chainsaw, and herbicide. If a landowner decides to perform TSI, the forester will perform a spot on the trees to be removed. The landowner will then fell or girdle the painted trees, depending on their size, and spray them with Herbicide to prevent re-establishment from suckers. Cost sharing funds may possibly be available for 50% of the cost of herbicide and labor.

The Division of Forestry also offers a harvest marking for \$3.00 per 1000 board feet marked. This service includes the species marketed, the number of trees marked, and the board footage marked. All on paper before cutting begins. This should allow landowners to shop for the highest bid on their timber. More information and applications are available at the Rockcastle County FSA Office or by calling Guy Baker of the Ky Division of Forestry at (606)864-9396.

Dog Warden Harlan "Buck" Farthing, was rehired at a salary of \$446.25 per month, plus a \$300 per month expense allowance.

Deputy Corners Roy/Martin and Bud Cox's salaries were set at \$78.75 per month. Coroner Bill Dowell's salary is \$424 per month.

Solid Waste Coordinator Nancy Meadows was rehired at a salary of \$4,000 per year.

Kathy Robinson, a secretary to County Attorney Jeff Burdette, was rehired and will be paid \$105 per month by the county.

Law Librarian Teresa Miller was rehired at a pay of \$52.50 per month.

The court also approved deputy salaries of County Clerk Norma Houk, at a combined \$125,000. They also approved her budget for this year at \$1.7 million.

The court was also informed of the state's recommendations for restructuring needs this summer.

The state will resurface main street in Mt. Vernon at a cost of \$32,000 and 7.18 miles of KY 1004 at a cost of \$270,000.

The county will also receive about \$302,450 in road aid money from the state this year.

again with scores up at each school, except for Brodhead because the test score line was so high, so you have to feel good about what is going on academically in the school system," Burton said.

"The district is also very sound financially, we have the money we need to do the things we need to do for our students," Burton said.

"Our facilities are some of the best in the state, and I think the feeling of this board is to try and build a new school at Brodhead as soon as possible. So, when you take everything into consideration, Hammond has done a good job," Burton said.

Stallworth, who attended his first meeting Monday night after being elected to the board in November said that his no vote was nothing personal against Hammond.

"I think all employees of the school system should be treated fairly, from the top to the bottom. Our teachers, bus drivers, custodian and cooks all get one year contracts, so I don't think the Superintendent should be treated any differently," Stallworth said.

"I don't know if Mr. Cash was voted for a two year contract, but not a four year contract Stallworth said.

Stallworth, who was terminated in 1996 by Hammond when he worked as maintenance supervisor for the school system, said that he was also concerned about the way the situation with former RCHS principal Ronnie Cash had been handled.

"I don't know if Mr. Cash was guilty of anything, but I think by reaching a compromise with him, before the firing ran its course, put the whole integrity of the school system in question," Stallworth said.

"I know of a situation where students have been expelled for the entire year for something that is a lot less important than what Mr. Cash was accused of.

"I think it sends the wrong message to school employees, by not allowing the case to run its full course and having a tribunal make a decision either way on the evidence presented in the case," he said.

"That compromise could make other employees think they can get by with stuff they shouldn't," Stallworth said.

Sherry Isaacs, the other dissenting vote, said Wednesday that she not want to comment a lot on the situation.

"I am concerned about the overall direction of our school district. As a parent and community representative, it is my duty to make decisions based on what is best for our schools and school age children," Isaacs said. Hammond said that he was looking forward to another four years as head of the school system.

"I will continue to work hard to see that our school system improves

year to year and that our students get the best education we as a school system can provide them," he said.

Hammond's salary for the new four year contract will be the same as his current salary, which is just over \$78,000 a year.

Before the meeting, Dr. Griffin and Burton were re-elected as Chairman and vice-chairman and Stallworth, Martin Vanzant and Dr. Griffin were sworn in for their new four year terms.

Hammond also presented his personnel actions to the board, which included the hiring of Jennifer Bishop, Sharon Gail Jones, Anna Stevens-Goff and April Ann Renner as substitute teachers and Ralph Powell as bus driver and Lorene Noe as secretary at RCHS.

Resignations for the period included: Daniel Stevens, math teacher at RCHS, Darren Cook, custodian at RCHS, Melanie Lyons, instructional assistant at RES and Scott Parkey as assistant football coach at RCMS.

cases. It is usually diagnosed within the first few years of life and is characterized by weak muscle tissue. The weak muscle tissue usually leaves the patient wheelchair-bound during the teenage years. Further weakening of muscle tissue can deteriorate the heart and lungs and usually claims the patient's life during the early twenties.

To protect his lungs, Adams chose to be put on a ventilator in 1993 after graduating from Jessamine County High School.

Since moving to the hospital and spending time with hospital staff members, Adams' dreams were enriched once again, the goal being a college degree. Last semester Adams began working toward that dream by taking a Somerset Community College class in U.S. History, which was held at Rockcastle County High School.

"He'll tell you himself that he didn't know what to expect at first," said Rodney Purcell, Adams' U.S. History instructor. "I'm glad he had the experience. I was pleased with how he progressed."

The hospital staff also appreciates Adams' talents and determination.

"We're all proud of Jody. He contributes to our hospital in more ways than one," said Carolyn Stevens, director of social work for RHRCC.

"It's always a blessing to see our patients strive for and reach their goals."
