## Man, wife indicted for Baker murder

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury ndicted three people Friday in con-lection with a 1997 shooting death of

a local man.

David Lovell, 31, and his wife,
Barbara Lovell, 25, of Burr, were named in the six count indictment

They are accused of murdering Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon, in May of 1997.

Baker's partially decomposed body was found at Tark Hill in West-ern Rockcastle County on February Police said Baker had been shot to death and buried 13 feet below the

earth's surface on property owned by Baker had been missing since May of 1997 when he did not show

up for a court appearance in Rockcastle District Court.

According to the indictment, David Lovell is accussed of solicit-ing Donald Crouch and offering to pay him to kill Baker on three differoccassions beginning in January

of '97.

According to the indictment, his final attempt to get Crouch to kill Baker came in April of '97.

And then in May of 1997, the indictment states that David Lovell and his wife Barbara shot and killed Baker themselves.

James Morris, of Pine Hill was also named in the indictment, but

He is accussed of helping David Lovell destroy evidence in the case. State Police Detective Gary Lane would not comment on a motive for

would not comment of a move for the alleged killing, but another of-ficer close to the case, said "it was a drug deal gone bad." According to that same officer, Lovell apparently used a dozer over Lovell apparently used a dozer over about a period of a week to bury Baker's body.

Both the Lovells are currently being held in the Boyle-County jail, under a \$100,000 full cash or prop-erty bond.

A criminal summons was issued for Morris, who testified before the Rockeastle Grand Jury on Friday, about his involvement in the case.



In case my readers are wondering why I didn't go to Mt. Vernon, our county seat, it was easy to explain. The road to Mt. Vernon through the hills was almost impassable and could only be made in the best of weather. Even then it was a long torturous drive in the truck. There was one section that had cliff like rocks protruding from the side of the hill that was like stars respond had to be taken one at a time by the truck till the top was reached. The motor would groam when Mas shifted to overdrive, then begin the climb, bumping and shivering as it slowly manipulated its way to the top. Going down the other side was almost as bad then there was the creek to cross without the benefit of a bridge. This was a 12 mile drive so

we didn't travel it much. But the natural scenery along the way was beautiful. So, when we went to Mt. Vernon we had to go by way of London. The first mile or so was on London. The Irrst mile or so was on the dirt road we had finally made passable in dry weather. Then 14 miles on Highway 80, a gravel road, to London. From there we took old U.S. 25, a paved highway, by way of Hazelgreen, Lamero, Livingston and finally Mt. Vernon.

When we made this trip we would leave by 6:00 a.m. and get back home sometimes as late as ten or cleven that right'. And it could only be made when the weather was dry for each end of our journey was on unimproved roads.

There was a fine hospital and a number of the best doctors in the country. That was when a town of any size had all the business was individually owared. Each clothing store had its own special brands and the employees were always willing and anxious to help one with clocking for and trying on clothes for any comparison of the country. The furniture stores were the same way, Help was always untained to the country. The furniture stores were the same way. Help was always on hand and ready to please the customer. There was a couple of places where one could fiss here one could fiss here. tomer. There was a couple of places where one could get good old fash-ioned hamburgers for a quarter and a cup of coffee for a nickel. The big five and dime store also had a good place to eat at the counter where hot plate lunches were served through-out the day. It also had a big glass covered candy counter just as one entered the door, where the best variety candy one could ever dream about was sold by the pound or ounce. I

guess the modern extended stores got the idea from those old dime stores to stock up and sell a little bit of everything one could possibly need. But the five and dime stores at least placed merchandise in an orderly way so the customer could find what was wanted without asking for a mape. Christmas would not have been complete if we hadn't been able to go to the five and dime to finish off the shopping, or perhaps do all our shopping.

Somerset was just becoming a medical center and even at that time they had some of the best physicians in the area. The doctors took time to get acquainted with their patients and their families so when a member of the family needed his care he knew exactly who he was dealing with. They had their own labs where simple tests were made on the spot. Shots were inefuded, when needed, as well as simple medication, in the office call bill. And by the way, most Doctors made house calls even if the patient lived far out in the boondocks. Dr. E.T. Smith, was known for his coming day or night, rain or snow, when he was called. Now back to my early days on the farm where things were happening and spring was stepping aside so sum-mer could take her place and put the finishing touches on things that

needed plenty of sunshine to ripen them. 

Nodding Thistle Robbing Farmers of Pasture Land

A controllable weed is robbing kentucky farmers of pasture production. The weed, called nodding thistle, can be controlled by attacking thema. The Weed p duces thousands of seed each year capable of producing thousands of new plants.

The key to controlling the weed is to take measures to control lite before it sets seed, which is usually in late May and early June. Once seed has set, it is difficult to control the spread of the seed and farmers will meed to wait until fall or next spring to obtain control of even more weeds.

The nodding thistle emerges as a rosette which is a circular cluster of leaves with the growing point close to the ground. The dark green rosette is 6 to 8 inches in diameter. rosette which is a crucial cluster of teaves with the growing point close to the ground. The dark green rosette is 6 to 8 inches in diameter. Rosettes appearing in the syring can be a considered from the control of the syring can be a controlled from the control of the control. The weed must be attacked when it is small if the sprays are to be most effective. This means late April will be the last chance for farmers to get an effective chemical control this spring.

If spraying is delayed until the plant is older, it can be controlled by either mowing the plants or hoeing it out by hand. However, with either method, the weed must be destroyed before it sets seed.

Moving at or after bloom may mean that the seeds produced will be scattered to a larger area.

Chemical control is the best means in eliminating seed production. The Department of Agriculture and local Extension Service will be cognducting 5-acre demonstrations on March 29. If



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Depression Is Still a Problem

Depression Is Still a Problem
More is known by scientists and
researchers about depression than
ever before. With all the medical
advances, one would believe that
fewer and fewer people suffer from
depression. Right? Unfortunately,
that is not true. that is not true

that is not true.

According to a recent article in U.S. News and World Teport (March 8, 1999), depress has almost doubled since World War II. This is not just because of more awareness but because of more awareness but because of more stress, fewer community and family ties, and nutritional deficiencies. Depression is on track to becoming the world? second most disabiling disease, by second most disabling disease by 2020. (Heart disease is number one.) In the United States depression afflicts eighteen million people at any given time, and one in five Americans will suffer from depression at

some time in his or her life.

The name "depression" is mis-leading. Many believe that everyone
"had bad days" and therefore every-

one suffers from depression. Nothing could be further from the truth. Depression is not merely feeling "down" or "blue." Depression is a serious illness that can bring down even a strong person. One researcher suggests calling it "hypo-thalamo-pituitary-adrenal axis dysfunction," to emphasize how serious the disease is.

to emphasize how serious the disease is.

A full-blown depression can reduct the victim dysfunctional. Having no energy or motivation, the sufferer prefers to stay at home or even in bed. The insomnia, lack of appetite and anxiety can bring life to a grinding halt. Guilt, hopelessness, poor memory, lack of concentration and anger are other results of the malady. A depressed person is thirty-five times more likely to commit suicide than another individual. One doctor suggests that if a person wants to know how it feels to be depressed, that person should combine the anguish of deep grief with the bodily sensations of three days without sleep.

There is not simply one kind of

depression, but many. The traditional picture of the depressed person as crying, hopeless and unable to work is true for some. Other depressions leave the victim sleeping all the time leave the victim sleeping all the time and eating anything in sight. She may even appear hyper to friends or fam-

even appear inyter to remease or tam-ber persons in not caused by sad life events or cured by good ones. White something bad may gord ones. White something bad may good ones. Not some one whose brain is suscep-tible to the disease will become de-pressed. Depression is too compli-cated to be explained by only one cause, but researchers do know that depression is partly caused by a chemical imbalance in the brain. This chemical problem, which has noth-ing to do with being crazy or weak, can be inherited. One of the most exciting treat-

can be inherited.

One of the most exciting treatments for depression is the antidepressant medication that has come along in the last few years. Prozac, introduced in 1988, was seen by some as the "magic bullet" that would cure all depression. While Prozac has helped many people; it does not work for all description, the program of t helped many people, it does not work for all depression victims and can have some unpleasant side effects, including sexual dysfunction. Medi-cations with fewer unpleasant side effects have been introduced in re-cent years and sixteen new ones are in the planning stages. As a counselor I have seen the benefits of these medications when used along with counseling in the treatment of de-pression.

The next twenty years should bring even more exciting developments in the treatment of this most misery-making of ailments.

Three members of Rockeastle County's track and field team re-cently competed at the U.K. Invita-tional held at the Nutter Fieldhouse on The University of Kentucky's

The U.K. Invitational is a national meet that brings together top competitors from around the United States.
