Briefly Charges dropped

On Friday, Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Cain dismissed a nearly four year old indictment for murder against a local man.

David Lindsey, 40, of Wolf Creek, was indicted in July of 1995, accused of shooting James B. Alexander to death at Poplar Gap.

Lindsey was tried twice on the murder charge. Once the jury hung in a eleven to one vote for acquittal and the other time, Cain ruled a mistrial because prosecutors could not reveal information to defense attorney William Gregory.

The case was dismissed with prejudice, meaning the case cannot be brought up again.

Open House at new jail

Want to see how the county has been spending hundreds of thousands of dollars lately, then go to the jail.

That is the newly renovated county jail at the local courthouse.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has scheduled an open house at the jail for Friday March 26, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Saturday March 27 from 8:30 to 1:00 p.m.

The state has scheduled a final inspection of the jail for April 5, after which the jail could re-open.

Tobacco leasing

Friday is the first day that local farmers lease tobacco for the 1999 growing season.

The period for leasing will run from March 19 to July 1.

This year's quota, (the amount of tobacco farmers are allowed to grow) has been cut by 28.8 percent, by the Department of Agricultural.

Gloria Robbins with the local Farm Service Agency said that local farmers were unsure about the average price that will be paid for lease tobacco and that currently she has no one seeking to lease or seeking to lease their tobacco out.

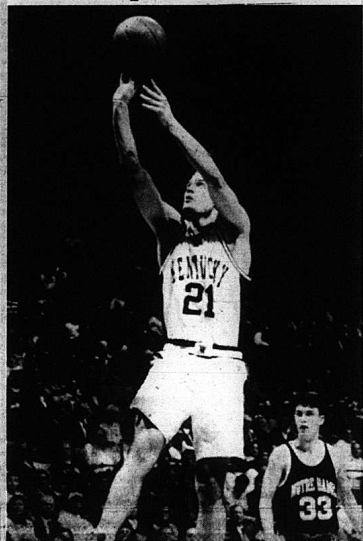

Man, wife indicted for Baker murder

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury indicted three people Friday in connection with a 1997 shooting death of a local man.

David Lovell, 31, and his wife, Barbara Lovell, 25, of Burr, were named in the six count indictment handed down Friday.

They are accused of murdering Charles "Toddy" Baker, 31, of Mt. Vernon, in May of 1997.

Baker's partially decomposed body was found at Tark Hill in Western Rockcastle County on February 2.

Police said Baker had been shot to death and buried 13 feet below the earth's surface on property owned by the Lovells.

Baker had been missing since May of 1997 when he did not show up for a court appearance in Rockcastle District Court.

According to the indictment, David Lovell is accused of soliciting Donald Crouch and offering to pay him to kill Baker on three different occasions beginning in January of '97.

According to the indictment, his final attempt to get Crouch to kill Baker came in April of '97.

And then in May of 1997, the indictment states that David Lovell and his wife Barbara shot and killed Baker themselves.

James Morris, of Pine Hill was also named in the indictment, but

only one charge was brought against him.

He is accused of helping David Lovell destroy evidence in the case.

State Police Detective Gary Lane would not comment on a motive for the alleged killing, but another officer close to the case, said "it was a drug deal gone bad."

According to that same officer, Lovell apparently used a dozer over about a period of a week to bury Baker's body.

Barbara Lovell was arrested at her home last Friday shortly after the indictment was returned and David Lovell was arrested on Monday night after he turned himself in to police.

Both the Lovells are currently being held in the Boyle County jail, under a \$100,000 full cash or property bond.

A criminal summons was issued for Morris, who testified before the Rockcastle Grand Jury on Friday, about his involvement in the case.

Several other indictments returned by Grand Jury

Ronnie Patrick Johnson, 38, of Rt. 2, Livingston was indicted on two counts of trafficking in illegal drugs. Johnson is accused of trafficking in illegal drugs on January 11, while in possession of a handgun. He is scheduled to be arraigned on April 23.

Billy Jack Rayburn, 21, Pine Hill, was indicted for possession of a handgun by a convicted felon and receiving stolen property.

He is accused of having a .357 magnum belonging to Dominic Collins in his possession on November 25, of 1998.

He will be arraigned on April 9.

Earl Brent Kirby, 42, of Mt. Vernon was also indicted for possession

of a handgun by a convicted felon, in connection with a March 28, 1998 incident.

Kirby will be arraigned in April, after he answers his criminal summons.

Robert Newcomb, Jr., 21, of Valley View Apartments, Mt. Vernon, Donald Ray Newcomb, 19, also of Valley View and David Allen Osborne, 20, of Mt. Vernon, were indicted on two counts of theft by unlawful taking.

They are accused of breaking into a building owned by Gary McGuire on Chestnut Ridge on February 5 and taking items over \$300. They will be arraigned on April 9.

Mills is the guest speaker at this quarterly gathering for Rockcastle County's High School and Middle School students that features live music, drama, videos, games and more!

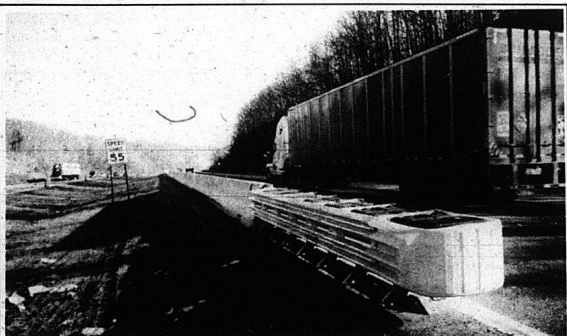
In his first year since graduating from the University of Kentucky, Cameron has been speaking to youth groups and congregations across the United States, sharing his faith and

Construction on interstate to make seven lanes

Often times with progress comes problems and for travelers along I-75 in Rockcastle County, the problem is just beginning.

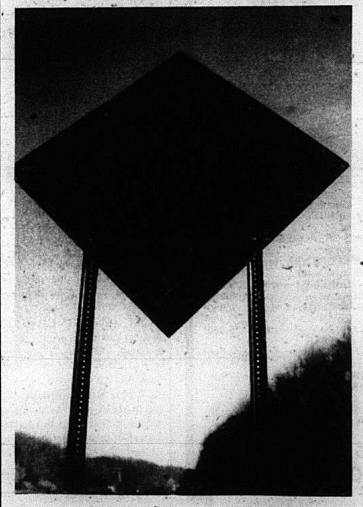
Elmo Greer and Sons of East Bernstadt has been awarded a \$25 million project that will widen 4.5 miles of I-75 from the 55.5 mile marker to just north of the Rockcastle River Bridge.

Lee Anderson of Elmo Greer and Sons said the project will include the building of two new lanes in the north-bound side of I-75, one of which will be a truck lane and one new lane in the southbound section of I-75.

Once completed the northbound section will have four lanes and the southbound a total of three.

Anderson said the truck lane was being built on the northbound section

I am fascinated by wood products and the tools that craftsmen use to make things out of wood. And if I had a lot of money and some time on my hands, I'd probably invest in a few saws and try to make stuff.

Like a lot of other folks, I've convinced myself that I can't even cut firewood on purpose. Loretta reminds me and her friends about the skill saw and miter box I already have and the fact that I finally called in a carpenter to do the basic trim work inside our house. She reminds me of the feeble attempts I have made at birdhouses, none of which were ever occupied by anything with feathers and which served more as scare-crows than habitat.

This—in spite of the fact that my wife tells folks that I can't even cut firewood on purpose. Loretta reminds me and her friends about the skill saw and miter box I already have and the fact that I finally called in a carpenter to do the basic trim work inside our house. She reminds me of the feeble attempts I have made at birdhouses, none of which were ever occupied by anything with feathers and which served more as scare-crows than habitat.

She mentions a kitchen door that I attempted to install at a previous residence and that fact that, after I had ripped out the facings and created a large rectangular hole in the side of the house, said hole was far larger than said door. She dutifully points out that if James Plardon had been working any place else that day, the thunderstorm that came up about 30 minutes after he finished the job would have destroyed everything in the kitchen.

She brings up, far too frequently, our hardwood floors which are very lovely to look upon. "Remember the \$350 bucks you spent on renting the

sander and the other \$200 on the sand paper to make the floor look like it had ocean waves?" she asks as though I could ever forget?

The short end to that story is that it cost nearly a thousand dollars to hire a professional to undo the damage I had done. But I still maintain that they would not have been reimbursed at all if I hadn't taken the initiative to start the job.

Loretta won't even let me put a shelf unless I'm under close supervision.

But last Saturday I spent the morning with the Circuit Woodworkers Club, a group of about 40 hobbyists who turn out virtual works of art and who gather monthly to swap notes and learn about the most recent inventions in blades and other tools of the trade.

Every year at Christmas time, several members of the club make astonishing toys, puzzles and bird houses that they bring down to the Christian Appalachian Project where I work. We then get the toys into all our child development centers, spouse abuse centers and other residential programs. We place the bird houses, some of which look too pretty to put outside, around our buildings and in our summer camps where they draw cooing and awe from both human-kind and fowl-life.

I had gone up to personally thank the guys who so generously share the fruits of their talent with the children in our programs, but before the morning was over they had convinced me that "anyone can do this" as I inspected toy after toy and literally drooled over a couple of chairs.

I rushed home in the afternoon in front of the snow story and spent an hour talking to Loretta about the intricacies of chair building and how you stalk the wood in a bathtub to make it bend just so and how you have to clamp it in shape until it dries—until she finally cut me off and wondered why I didn't just buy one off the guy who made them. "If you had a million dollars worth of tools," she said, "we'd still never have anything new to sit on. And if I were you, I would not be encouraging my readers to be placing any orders just yet."

My first spring in the country had almost passed before I had time to really enjoy it. The spring rains that kept us up moving furniture to keep it in a dry place during the nights and trying to get water from the spring that wasn't muddy, and dry weather in the cook stove during the day, hadn't left much time and energy to enjoy the sunshine hours. The good thing about it was Mat couldn't work on the building when it was raining so we were free to go to town to get the supplies he needed and occasionally I fixed Judy in her best dress and went along. If she didn't have a bib on the dress was ruined at the first grocery store we stopped at for she was always handed a stick of candy which went directly into her mouth and the sticky slobbers made short work of soaking the bib.

Somerset was 22 miles away from London 14, but the first mile of the road, from our place to Highway 80, was impassable when it rained, and when it was dry he had to work. So, my trips to town were few and far between. I had to stay home most of the time to take care of our belongings. It was unsafe to leave the house without a caretaker. But the trips I did make uplifted my spirits and I came home contented with my lot. I fell in love with Somerset, but only tolerated London. So Somerset was our home town for all our business and shopping.

In case my readers are wondering why I didn't go to Mt. Vernon, our county seat, it was easy to explain. The road to Mt. Vernon through the hills was almost impassable and could only be made in the best of weather. Even then it was a long tortuous drive in the truck. There was one section that had cliff like rocks protruding from the side of the hill that was like stair steps and had to be taken one time by the truck till the top was reached. The motor would groan when Mat shifted to overdrive, then begin the clunk, bumping and shivering as it slowly manipulated its way to the top. Going down the other side was almost as bad but there was the creek to cross without the benefit of a bridge. This was a 12 mile drive so

we didn't travel it much. But the natural scenery along the way was beautiful. So, when we went to Mt. Vernon we had to go by way of London. The first mile or so was on the dirt road we had finally made passable in dry weather. Then 14 miles on Highway 80, a gravel road, to London. From there we took old U.S. 25, a paved highway, by way of Hazelton, Lenoir, Livingston and finally Mt. Vernon.

Pretty far piece to go for a few groceries huh? And if we wanted to visit Mat's parents, Rome and Louisa Graves at Sand Springs we had an hour or five or six miles of dirt road to drive over. At that time the Sand Springs road, now known as 1249, followed the creek bed and its banks a big part of the way. When we made this trip we would leave by 6:00 a.m. and get back home sometimes as late as ten or eleven that night. And it could only be made when the weather was dry for each end of our journey was on unimproved roads.

Anyway, Somerset was much more fun. It was a bustling town with a five and dime store on the main street as well as several clothing and furniture stores. There was a fine hospital and a number of the best doctors in the country. That was when a town of any size had all the business in a compact area and each business was individually owned. Each clothing store had its own special brands and the employees were always willing and anxious to help one with their looking for and trying on clothes for as long as they were interested. There were bargain stores as well as quality clothing so the choices were more varied than the ones in the shopping mall of today. The furniture stores were the same way. Help was always on hand and ready to please the customer. There was a couple of places where one could get good old fashioned hamburgers for a quarter and a cup of coffee for a nickel. The big five and dime store also had a good place to eat at the counter where hot plate lunches were served throughout the day. It also had a big glass covered candy counter just as one entered the door, where the best variety candy one could ever dream about was sold by the pound or ounce. I

guess the modern extended stores got the idea from those old dime stores to stock up and sell a little bit of everything one could possibly need. But the five and dime managers at least placed merchandise in an orderly way so the customer could find what was wanted without asking for a map. Christmas would not have been complete if we hadn't been able to go to the five and dime to finish off the shopping, or perhaps do all our shopping.

Somerset was just becoming a medical center and even at that time they had some of the best physicians in the area. The doctors took time to get acquainted with their patients and their families so when a member of the family needed his care he knew exactly who he was dealing with. What their environment was and how he could best treat the patient. They had their own labs where simple tests were made on the spot. Shots were given and the results of the simple medication, in the office call bill. And by the way, most doctors made house calls even if the patient lived far out in the boonocks. Dr. E.T. Smith, was known for his coming day or night, rain or snow, when he was called. Some times he had to finish his trip on horseback because of the bad roads into the hollows where his patients lived. One night after one of these visits to an aged patient he stopped at our house when he saw the lights on and asked if he could watch the results of a test on that had been held that day. (This was after we had been settled into our new home and had electricity and a TV.)

The hospital gave excellent care and kept one as long as was needed. Not long ago I was going through some old papers and ran into an old receipt from the Somerset Hospital for the bill when Polly was born. Dr. E.T. Smith had delivered her. The bill was for ten dollars. My whole stay for less than a hundred dollars including the doctor bill. The insurance had taken care of the rest and I had stayed ten days. The ten dollars was for the baby's care. Times have changed a bit haven't they? This was why I loved Somerset, it met all my needs.

Now back to my early days on the farm where things were happening and spring was stepping aside so summer could take her place and put the finishing touches on things that

needed plenty of sunshine to ripen them. I was getting excited to farm them work pretty well and was beginning to love to listen to the whippoorwills calling to one another at night time and the frogs croaking out their love song in some shallow pool of water in the distance. The summer we had camped out here I thought the constant croaking of frogs and whippoorwill would add to the excitement I couldn't sleep at night for these strange sounds. I was used to another kind of sound, the jangle of streets cars rumbling by and trains whistling at the crossing or from a long way off where someone had blown out the whistle. The engineer played a sad tune as he approached a treacherous curve. I have often to hear the sound of it. I missed the sound of people gathered on their front porches talking or walking by on their way to and from the store where we were looking. But this was the place Mat loved and my wedding vows were "whichever god you will follow." So here I was and I would make the best of it.

As summer days lengthened so did the excitement of watching our house take its shape. Mat was up early and went to bed late as he stacked more lumber into tall stacks and

sharpened the saws every night so they would be ready the next day for use. These were hand saws and every board had to be hand sawed before it was nailed to the studs. Before any nailing was put on the bed braces on every corner and then the studs. He was cranking about braces and I must say he was right in doing so for no wind ever shook the house once it was finished. He had hired local men to help with the building and it was these men I had to cook dinner for every day. It was Tom's job to build the chimney for he said he was a brick layer and had built chimneys before. It stood between what would be the kitchen and living room so the cook stove and heating stove could both be served by it. Others who could use a hammer well was put to work driving

CROP INSURANCE DEADLINE
EXTENDED

Farmers who wish to purchase the catastrophic level of protection (CAT) under Federal Crop Insurance (FCOI) still have time as the deadline of March 15th has been extended to April 28th. Limited-resource farmers (farmers with a yearly income of \$20,000 from all resources) do not have to pay the \$60 fee for CAT protection if they fill out a waiver that may be obtained from a crop insurance agent. To obtain a listing of approved FCIC agents contact your local FSA office.

1999 QUOTAS

The 1999 quotas are scheduled to be mailed on Friday, March 19th. When these notices are mailed, all producers are reminded to review the poundage and if you wish to appeal the quota you have 15 days to do so. Leasing of burley tobacco quotas will begin Friday, March 19th and will end Thursday, July 1st.

EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR FARMERS-EXTENDED

The emergency relief for farmers deadline has been extended until April 9, 1999. Under the emergency relief for farmers - Farmers are eligible to receive payment for either losses suffered to the 1998 crops or losses in any three or more crop years between 1994 and 1998. Farmers can receive payments under either the single or multi-year provisions, but not both and USDA will make payments at the higher of the two levels. Rockcastle County eligible crops for payment are insured/noninsured crops such as tobacco and corn and the non-insurable crops such as hay, soybeans and vegetables for commercial use. Producers who suffered greater than a 35% loss on the above listed crops should provide the office will sale bills/ weight tickets and receipts for fertilizer, chemicals and related materials. Producers receiving payments must agree to buy crop insurance for the 1999 and 2000 crop years. REMEMBER: Sign up ends April 9, 1999. Producers should contact their local USDA Service Center or FSA Office for more information.

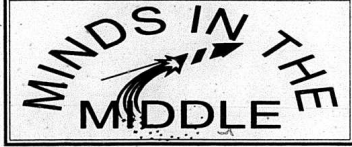
Tiger Pause

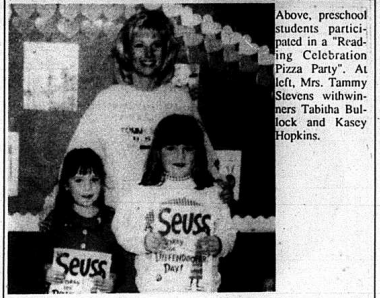
Dr. Patrick Kagan-Moore of the Centre faculty is assigned to live in England for the year, teaching classes and coordinating field trips and travel programs.

The 1979 General Assembly has required such a hearing with the enactment of House Bill 44. The purpose of the hearing is to inform the public that the Extension Service is proposing to take the compensating rate plus the allowing 4 percent increase. The anticipated revenue increase is \$2,406.00. The tax rate for the preceding year was 2.6% real property/2.74% personal property with revenue of \$72,161.00. 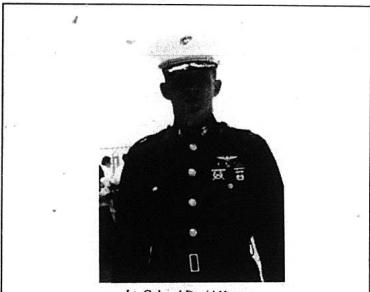



Nodding Thistle Robbing Farmers of Pasture Land

A controllable weed is robbing Kentucky farmers of pasture production. The weed, called nodding thistle, can be controlled by attacking them at the right time. The Weed produces thousands of seed each year capable of producing thousands of new plants.

The key to controlling the weed is to take measures to control it before it sets seed, which is usually in late May and early June. Once seed has set, it is difficult to control the spread of the seed and farmers will need to wait until fall or next spring to obtain control of even more weeds.

The nodding thistle emerges as a rosette which is a circular cluster of leaves with the growing point close to the ground. The dark green rosette is 6 to 8 inches in diameter. Rosettes appearing in the spring can be sprayed and killed. Herbicides such as 2,4-D and Banvel are more effective when the rosette is small and actively growing. They can be sprayed in the spring as long as daytime temperatures are above 50 degrees. Timing is critical for good control. The weed must be attacked when it is small if the sprays are to be most effective. This means late April will be the last chance for farmers to get an effective chemical control this spring.

If spraying is delayed until the plant is older, it can be controlled by either mowing the plants or hoeing it out by hand. However, with either method, the weed must be destroyed before it sets seed.

Moving at or after bloom may mean that the seeds produced will be scattered to a larger area.

Chemical control is the best means in eliminating seed production. The Department of Agriculture and local Extension Service will be conducting 5-acre demonstrations on March 29. If

you have pasture or hay fields infested with nodding thistle and would like to participate, call Tom Mills at 256-2403. The Department of Agriculture supplies the chemical and sprayer. The farmer supplies the water and applies the chemical with his farm tractor.

METHYL BROMIDE UPDATE:
The scheduled phase-out of the fumigant, methyl bromide, by 2001 may undergo some changes in the near future. Since methyl bromide is classified as an ozone depleter, it comes under regulation by the Clean Air Act (CAA) as well as the Montreal Protocol. The CAA classifies ozone-depleting substances as Class I and II materials and mandates their phase-out, while the Montreal Protocol makes no classification, leaving phase-outs to be voted on by member countries.

While the CAA provides for no exemptions or essential uses, the Montreal Protocol allows both. At the 1997 Montreal Protocol meeting, developed nations of the world agreed to phase out methyl bromide in 2005, with interim reductions of 25% in 1999, 50% in 2001, and 70% in 2003.

In 1998, the savings rate for U.S. households reached zero. All of this is an indication that we are spending more than we earn. If the trend continues, we will have negative savings. The U.S. Department of Commerce tracks information on household savings rates.

Another concern about savings is that families do not have enough money saved to pay for their retirement years.

Many financially fit families set goals for saving more money. Setting goals will help you have funds for retirement, a planned vacation, or an emergency cash reserve. By making savings a regular part of your spending plan, savings can become habit forming.

Some people consider this as "paying yourself first." Check with

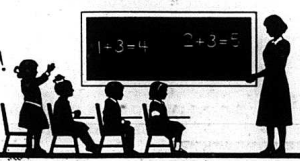

Depression Is Still a Problem For Many

More is known by scientists and researchers about depression than ever before. With all the medical advances, one would believe that fewer and fewer people suffer from depression. Right? Unfortunately, that is not true.

According to a recent article in *U.S. News and World Report* (March 8, 1999), depression has almost doubled since World War II. This is not just because of more awareness but because of more stress, fewer community and family ties, and nutritional deficiencies. Depression is on track to becoming the world's second most disabling disease by 2020. (Heart disease is number one.) In the United States depression afflicts eighteen million people at any given time, and one in five Americans will suffer from depression at some time in his or her life.

The name "depression" is misleading. Many believe that everyone "had bad days" and therefore every-

one suffers from depression. Nothing could be further from the truth. Depression is not merely feeling "down" or "blue." Depression is a serious illness that can bring down even a strong person. One researcher suggests calling it "hypo-thalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis dysfunction," to emphasize how serious the disease is.

A full-blown depression can render the victim dysfunctional. Having no energy or motivation, the sufferer prefers to stay at home or even in bed. The insomnia, lack of appetite and anxiety can bring life to a grinding halt. Guilt, hopelessness, poor memory, lack of concentration and anger are other results of the malady. A depressed person is thirty-five times more likely to commit suicide than another individual. One doctor suggests that if a person wants to know how it feels to be depressed, that person should combine the anguish of deep grief with the bodily sensations of three days without sleep. There is not simply one kind of

depression, but many. The traditional picture of the depressed person as crying, hopeless and unable to work is true for some. Other depressions leave the victim sleeping all the time and eating anything in sight. She may even appear hyper to friends or family.

Depression is not caused by sad life events or cured by good ones. While something bad may trigger the depression (a divorce for instance), only someone whose brain is susceptible to the disease will become depressed. Depression is too complicated to be explained by only one cause, but researchers do know that depression is partly caused by a chemical imbalance in the brain. This chemical problem, which has nothing to do with being crazy or weak, can be inherited.

One of the most exciting treatments for depression is the antidepressant medication that has come along in the last few years. Prozac, introduced in 1988, was seen by some as the "magic bullet" that would cure all depression. While Prozac has helped many people, it does not work for all depression victims and can have some unpleasant side effects. While something bad may trigger the depression, only someone whose brain is susceptible to the disease will become depressed. Depression is too complicated to be explained by only one cause, but researchers do know that depression is partly caused by a chemical imbalance in the brain. This chemical problem, which has nothing to do with being crazy or weak, can be inherited.

"It Is WRITTEN"

This word "form" carries the idea of being identified with the nature, being, personality of God. He also came and took the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men. Because Jesus is God, he has the right and power to speak and command. We need to listen to all that he says. We can fully trust and expect him to fulfill all his promises. If we fail to grasp the Divine side of Jesus, we will have a warped view of the Christ. Sad to say some deny his Deity.

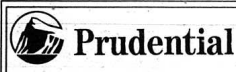

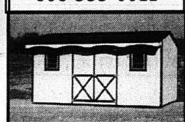

Track members compete at UK

Three members of Rockcastle County's track and field team recently competed at the U.K. Invitational held at the Nutter Fieldhouse on The University of Kentucky's campus.

The U.K. Invitational is a national meet that brings together top competitors from around the United States. Eight states were on hand for the annual competition including Indiana, Ohio, Alabama, New York, Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky. From those eight states, over seventy teams and four-hundred competitors were present.

Sophomore Cheyenne Carmack qualified in the 60 meter dash. Competing against thirty other qualifiers, Cheyenne ran an awesome race. Her technique was nearly flawless as she ran an 8.42, a Rockcastle County High School 60 meter dash record. She placed 18th overall in the competition, eighth out of Kentucky competitors and first among class 2A athletes.

Cheyenne also qualified in the 400 meter dash. She competed against twenty-five other mid-distance sprinters including Althea Thomas from national track power Pelham, Ala-

bama. Cheyenne ran her best indoor time ever as she ran a 1:01.79. She broke her own Rockcastle County High School record set last year by nearly three seconds. She placed 11th overall, sixth in Kentucky and second among 2A competitors. Cheyenne was also the only sophomore girl from Kentucky that qualified for the competition.

Cheyenne now holds or is a part of twenty-six track and cross-country records including both middle school and high school.

Two other Rockcastle County track members qualified in the 60 meter hurdles. Sophomores Theresa Chislum and Tara Abney both were among the twenty-nine qualifiers. Theresa holds the 55 meter indoor record at Rockcastle. Both girls ran in the same heat and were poised to set a new record. Tara ran her best indoor hurdle race ever on her way to a 21st place finish in a new Rockcastle County High School record time of 10.84. She also placed 10th among Kentucky competitors and fifth among class 2A girls. Theresa ran a great race and was very close behind, finishing in 23rd place in 10.96. Theresa was 11th among

Kentucky girls and sixth among 2A competitors. Both Tara and Theresa demonstrated awesome technique in their races as evidenced by their superb times.

All three girls were very fortunate to be among those who were selected to compete. The selection process

involved over a thousand athletes, many of which were turned down. Cheyenne's selection was her third in three years. Theresa has also qualified in the hurdles for three years running. Tara Abney's appearance was her first.

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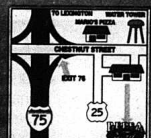
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
